Cold front plunges temperatures here

Another cold front hit Ozona Saturday night and temperatures dropped from a high of 71 degrees Saturday to 10 degrees early Sunday. This weekend the front came without moisture, but blustery winds kept the wind chill factor well below zero most of the day Sunday.

Under sunny skies Monday, the high only reached 38 degrees. The bright sunshine was deceptive, as it was far colder than it looked. A warming trend had set in by Tuesday afternoon and the temperature was 42 degrees at 2 p.m.

The past two weekends have set records here for snow and cold. Another record was set when December, 1984, bowed out of the picture with a total rainfall record of 2.87 inches. Normally a dry month, the

December rainfall pushed the total rainfall for the year to 16.72 inches. Otherwise rainfall for the year would have been considerably below the normal of 18.83 inches.

Since record-keeping began fifty-four years ago, there have been only three years of above 2 inches of rain in December. The year 1937 set a record with 2.84 inches of rain. Eight of the years saw no rain at all in December, with over two dozen years having a trace.

So far January, 1985 has produced .54 of an inch of moisture. Of this total, .42 of an inch was from the record snowfall January 12-13. The other .12 of an inch was from freezing rain and drizzle the weekend before.

The area was braced for another front due to arrive Wednesday.

Hospital. He was born October 16, 1901 in Brown County, Texas. He married Elizabeth Horton, November 12, 1922. They moved to Crockett County in 1945 and worked for 30 years on the V.I. Pierce Ranch.

Survivors include his wife, of Ozona; one brother, Feral Stewart of Zephyr; and one sister, Doris Stewart also of Zephyr.

Funeral services for Mrs. J.A. Fussell, 94, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday, January 19, in the Ozona United Methodist Church with Rev. Ken Harrison officiating. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Sizemore Funeral Home.

Mrs. Fussell died January 15, in Billings, Montana. She was born in Campbell County, Ga. November 13, 1890. She married Dr. J.A. Fussell in Atlanta, Ga. January 18, 1914. They moved to Crockett County in 1919 and ranched north of Ozona until 1924, when they purchased a home in Ozona, and Dr. Fussell resumed his dental practice. They were active in civic and community life for over 50 years, and a vital part of the life of the Ozona Methodist Church. Mrs. Fussell

was a longtime member of the D.A.R., the Ozona Womens Club and Order of the Eastern Star. The Fussells raised their three sons in Ozona, all graduating from Ozona High School and the University of Texas.

Dr. Fussell died in 1971 at the age of 87. Mrs. Fussell continued to make Ozona her home until 1973 when she moved to Billings, Montana to live near her eldest son.

She is survived by three sons, J.A. Fussell, Jr., of Cutbank Mont., J.M. Fussell of New Orleans, La. and John Carmichael Fussell of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, a brother, Chelsea Carmichael of Atlanta, Georgia; a sister Mary Carmichael of Athens, Ga.; nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Deadline looms for paying county taxes

The Crockett County Tax Collectors' office is a beehive of activity these days with the deadline for paying taxes coming up January 31. Unpaid taxes become delinquent February 1. Tax bills were mailed October 1, for a total revenue of \$7,830,276 for the county and schools. This represents an increase in revenue of \$739,032 over that of last year.

Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Stokes reminded property owners that delinquent taxes can become an expensive proposition. In addition to penalty and interest charges, non-payment can lead to lawsuits, clouded land titles, and even seizure and sale of the delinquent taxpayer's property if he makes no effort to pay.

Some property owners may fail to receive their tax bills, but these people should be aware that the law still holds them responsible for paying on time. The claim, "I never received a tax bill," does not excuse the taxpayer from liability for all taxes, penalties and interest charges.

Before February 1, passes, a property owner who failed to receive a tax bill should contact the tax office in the courthouse annex to determine his tax liability and make sure the correct name and address information is on record there.

The first expense the taxpayer avoids by paying on time is penalty and interest charges. Regular penalty charges can go as high as 12 percent, and interest is charged at the rate of one percent per month. Someone who pays his taxes a year later, for example, would have to pay not only the total amount of taxes due but also

an additional 24 percent in penalty and interest.

Taxing units that hire outside attorneys to collect their delinquent accounts can charge an additional 15 percent penalty to cover attorney fees.

Taxing units notify delinquent taxpayers at least once. Many tax collectors will send additional notices and warning letters to encourage payment.

By heeding these warnings and paying his bill, the delinquent taxpayer can avoid more drastic and costly consequences—namely, a delinquent tax suit and subsequent seizure and sale of his property to pay the taxes due.

The law provides protection from tax suits and seizures for homeowners age 65 and over. These people can choose to postpone paying taxes on a homestead by filing a "tax deferral" affidavit with their local appraisal district. Taxes will continue to become delinquent and accrue penalty and interest, but there can be no lawsuit to collect the taxes as long as the over-65 person owns and occupies the home. If a tax suit has already been filed, the suit can be suspended by filing an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the court. However, once the property changes hands the taxes become due immediately.

Appraisal district offices can answer questions on the over-65 tax deferral and provide affidavit forms.

Some tax collectors will allow delinquent taxes to be paid in installments for up to 36 months. Before signing an

installment agreement, the delinquent taxpayer should know that his signature is considered an "irrevocable admission" that he owes all the taxes covered by the agreement. However, he will not be sued for back taxes as long as he makes his payments on time and keeps other taxes paid up.

The tax collector's last resort is taking the delinquent taxpayer to court. If a delinquent tax suit is successful, the court costs will be added to the delinquent tax bill. Before the court enters its final judgment, the taxpayer is given one final chance to pay before the property is seized and auctioned off.

Delinquent taxes can't be avoided by selling or transferring the property. Since taxing units hold a tax lien on each parcel of taxable property within their jurisdictions, tax collectors can file suit to foreclose on the lien and seize the property even if its ownership has changed. As a result, a purchaser of real property cannot get a clear title until all the delinquent taxes owed on the property are paid in full.

In addition, the law makes each person who owns taxable property on January 1 personally liable for all taxes due. The January 1 owner can be sued personally for back taxes even if the property has been sold or transferred.

Property owners can avoid unnecessary expense and legal entanglements by paying their property taxes on time. If their taxes are overdue, it's to their advantage to contact their tax office without further delay and make arrangements for paying.

Both Seahorn and Haire are members of pioneer Crockett County ranching families. Ms. Haire's great grandfather, L.B. Cox, was one of the Ozona National Bank's founders in 1905.

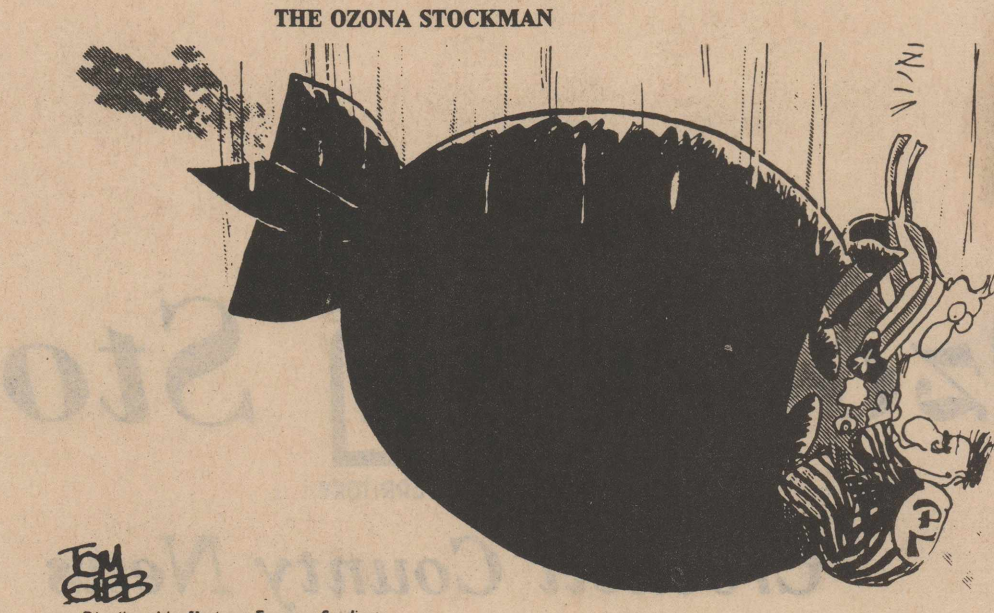

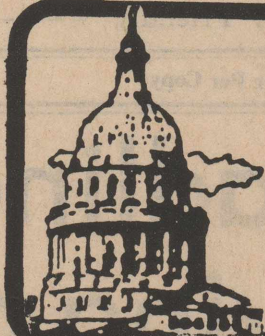

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Texas Legislators heard the governor urge them to raise fees but not taxes in his State of the State address on Tuesday, then many attended the funeral of former Gov. Allan Shivers as the session ended its first full week.

Meanwhile, the Republican Party revealed its plan to convert 15 Democratic House members, and the latest political contribution reports indicate two statewide offices held by Democrats are now vulnerable.

The hottest political revelation of the week came when former House Speaker Bill Clayton confirmed he was considering running for governor in 1986 as a Republican. Clayton, who served an unprecedented four terms as a conservative Democrat speaker, said anyone considering a statewide race, "must look at it both ways."

Clayton, who now works as a Capitol lobbyist, was the subject of a support letter recently mailed on his behalf by an oil and gas operator. The former speaker played down the publicity last week, but didn't say no.

Meanwhile, colleagues speculated how eager Gov. Mark White would be to sign bills pushed by Clayton during this session, wondering if he would be facing Clayton on the campaign trail. Clayton was among several gubernatorial appointees recalled by White when he first took office in 1983.

Fees Boosted
Legislators collectively breathed sighs of relief last week after the governor presented his budget which boosts "user fees" by \$184 million, but does not raise taxes.

Behind the relief, however, is a certain cynicism about Mark White which is plainly evident in legislators. Although White campaigned on a "no new taxes" theme, once in office he forced lawmakers to pass a record tax bill which contributed to the defeat of many Democratic House members.

Now, six month's later, he is preaching no new taxes again, but it's after the House leadership laid down that line, backed by new Republicans in the ranks.

Senate Skeptical
Over in the Senate, leaders expressed skepticism that White's proposed budget could be funded without tax in-

creases. Senator John Traeger of Seguin predicted a raise in the sales tax from 4 1/2 cents to 4 3/4 cents. Carl Parker of Port Arthur, openly supported a tax hike to support educational and social programs.

New president pro tem Sen. Ray Farabee said White's budget couldn't be realized solely on the basis of cutting spending in other areas and raising some fees. Farabee will most likely support the budget proposed by the Legislative Budget Board.

House Is Anti-Tax
House members were more gracious towards White's budget, but it's because they have confidence in their chamber's fiscal resolve.

Speaker Gib Lewis handed out committee assignments, giving Republicans about one-third of the chairmanship. He also stacked the powerful Ways & Means Committee, chaired by Rep. Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen, with anti-tax votes, including seven Republican members.

The makeup of the committee means a tax bill will get through the first "gate" only with great difficulty.

Mauro, Hiring Freeze
Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced his office has raised an additional \$27.7 million to go into the fund for public school children, which helps lawmakers avoid a tax hike.

A hiring freeze by state

agencies is also being implemented voluntarily, and so far Comptroller Bob Bullock and Treasurer Ann Richards have joined it. Bullock said he will fill only one out of every four vacancies. The University of Texas also responded and even added a salary freeze.

Dollars Await Taxing Units
Meanwhile, Bullock has issued an "all aboard" call for local government taxing units to be included when he distributes a projected \$58 million from the first year's revenue of the new corporate franchise tax on banks.

The new bank franchise tax replaces the old local bank stock property tax which was declared unconstitutional. Bullock will allocate the franchise money back to every local tax entity where each bank is located—but only if he knows who and where they are.

Bullock found it easy to list the counties, cities and school districts, but he fears that many small special districts—such as water districts, hospital districts and the like—are missing from the estimated 3,900 taxing jurisdictions in the state. Any taxing unit which has a bank in its territory should contact the Comptroller's Tax Administration Division.

Contribution Reports
Political contribution reports meeting the filing deadline last week showed the governor raised over \$2 million.

Cocoa is more nutritious than carob in the diet

"When cocoa and carob are compared, cocoa is shown to have more nutrients than carob," says Mary K. Sweeten. Tests by the United States Department of Agriculture indicate that cocoa has more protein, calcium, phosphorous, iron, potassium, vitamin A, riboflavin and niacin than does carob powder, she explains.

Cocoa powder does contain more fat than carob, says Sweeten, which is one reason why some consumers select it.

However, the commercially manufactured carob products often rival those containing cocoa since vegetable fats such as palm kernel oil and coconut oil are added to make solid carob products. Both of these oils are

more highly saturated than cocoa butter, she says.

Food products containing carob are often advertised as "natural foods," Sweeten observes. While some consumers may assume that "natural" foods are nutritionally superior to regular foods, this is often not the case, says the nutritionist.

Since there is no legal definition for the term "natural," Sweeten advises consumers to carefully read the food product labels before buying.

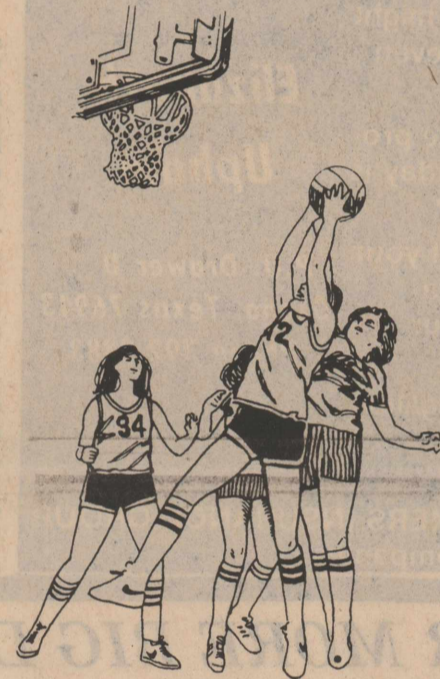

EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

Everyone's sensitive to the cold. With age, the body becomes less able to respond to long exposure to cold. The most severe danger in cold weather is hypothermia, a condition where the body temperature drops below about 95 degrees F. Accidental hypothermia can happen to anyone who is exposed to bitter cold without adequate protection. But some older people may develop accidental hypothermia after exposure to even relatively mild cold.

The chronically ill elderly, those who can't afford enough heating fuel and those who don't take normal steps to keep warm, are most likely to develop accidental hypothermia.

A small number of aged people have defective temperature regulation. For unknown reasons, these people do not feel cold or shiver, so they can't produce body heat when they need it. So if you have "felt cold" for years, it may be a good sign that your temperature regulation is functioning.

Follow these simple precautions to avoid accidental hypothermia:

Set the heat at no lower than 65 degrees F in living and sleeping area. If you are ill, you may need more heat. If you are trying to save on fuel costs, heat only one or two rooms of your home.

Dress warmly, even when indoors, eat enough food and stay as active as possible.

Since hypothermia may start during sleep, keep warm in bed by wearing enough clothing and using blankets.

If you take medicine to treat anxiety, depression, nervousness or nausea, ask your doctor whether it might affect the control of body temperature.

Ask your friends or neighbors to

look in on you once or twice a day, particularly during severe cold spells. See if your community has a telephone check-in or personal visit service for the elderly or homebound.

A special low-reading thermometer is the only sure way to detect hypothermia. But a regular thermometer that has been shaken down well can detect a possible problem. If the person's temperature is below 95 degrees F, or does not register, get emergency help immediately.

Other signs of hypothermia include an unusual change in appearance or behavior in cold weather such as slurred speech, sluggishness and confusion. A slow, and sometimes irregular heart beat or shallow, very slow breathing can also be signs. Treatment consists of re-warming the person under a doctor's supervision, usually in a hospital.

Take the cold seriously and you can avoid the dangers of hypothermia.






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
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
