## Reagor gives advice on spring gardening

It's time to gear up for that spring vegetable garden. And two major steps are getting the right varieties and planting at the right time.

Proper planting time is important if maximum quality and production are expected, points out Billy Reagor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Since such warm-season crops as tomatoes, peppers, corn, eggplants, beans, squash, cucumbers, okra, watermelon, sweet potatoes, pumpkins and cantaloupes are sensitive to cold temperatures and can be killed by even the lightest frost, gardeners must be aware of the average date of the last frost for their particular areas.

According to the National Weather Service, the average dates of last frosts for Crockett Co. is March 28-29. Remember, these dates are average which only means there is a 50 percent chance a frost may occur at a later date.

It's also wise to wait until the soil has warmed before planting seeds of warm-season crops, says Reagor. Soil temperature at planting depth should be in the upper 60s or into the 70s to increase seed germination and insure

a good stand.

Some vegetable crops are cold-hardy and can tolerate light frosts or freezes. These include beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, peas, lettuce, onion, parsley, radishes, spinach, cauliflower, collards, mustard, kale and turnips. These can be planted in late winter or early spring.

The Agent suggests planting some warm-season crops in late spring as they will produce more high-quality produce. During the hot summer such heat-tolerant crops as southern peas, okra, eggplant, sweet potatoes, squash and small fruited tomatoes do best.

The Agent advises planting the best adapted varieties that are available as this can mean the difference between gardening success and failure. Some of the current vegetable variety recommendations by the Extension Service are as follows:

Bean, Bush--Contender, Topcrop, Greencrop, Tendercrop, Bean, Pole, Stringless Blue Lake, Kentucky Wonder, Dade, Romano, Bean, Lima bush--Jackson Wonder, Henderson Bush, Fordhook 242, Betts--Detroit Dark Red, Green Top Bunching, Asgrow Wonder, Pacemaker, Broccoli--Green Comet, Bravo, Emperor,

Cantaloupe--Perlita, TAM Uvalde, Golden Perfection, Magnum 45, Carrot--Imperator, Danvers 126, Nantes, Red Core Chantenay, Corn, Sweet--Yellow; Calumet, Sweet G-90, Bonanza, Merit, Florida Staysweet, White; Silver Queen.

Cucumbers (Pickling)--National Pickling, Liberty, Crispy. Cucumbers (Slicers)--Poinsett, Straight 8, Sweet Success, Eggplant--Florida Market, Black Beauty, Highbush, Lettuce (Head)--Great Lakes strains, Valverde, Lettuce (Leaf)--Black Seed Simpson, Salad Bowl, Ruby, Oakleaf, Lettuce (Butterhead)--Summer Bibb, Tendercrisp, Okra--Clemson Spinless, Louisiana Green Velvet, Emerald, Lee, Peas, Southern--Black-eye No. 5, Burgundy, Cream 40, Knuckle Purple Hull.

Peppers, Sweet--Yolo Wonder, Keystone Giant, Valley Giant, Shamrock, Bell Tower, Squash--Early Prolific Straightneck, Goldneck, Dixie, Hylic, Bush Scallop, Zucco, Zucchini, Goldrush, Tomato--Spring Giant, Floramerica, (nematode resistant) Terrific, Better Boy, Celebrity, Big Set, Jack Pot.

Turnip--Purple Top White Globe, Royal Globe.

## C of C reviews annual budget

The Ozona Chamber of Commerce board of directors met last week and reviewed the budget for 1985. The board anticipates income of approximately \$16,500 from dues. With fixed expenses estimated at around \$18,000 the chamber will make up the difference with special projects through the year. Also, in the area of finance, the board voted unanimously to grant a \$300 bonus to its longtime manager, Beth Boyd, for a job well done in 1984.

The "Program of Work" committee, made up of Frank White, Dr. Steve Sessom and chamber president Stan Lambert, presented its proposal for 1985. The program consists of the annual tennis tournament to be held June 8, the July Fourth extravaganza to be held on that day, and the Halloween Carnival, Oct. 31.

Also included in these events would be another rifle raffle similar to the one held this past year but with a package of approximately \$1,000 consisting of a rifle, scope, mount, and gun case. This package will be donated by both banks, and the raffle will occur over a longer period of time. This raffle will begin around July 4th and end around December 8th.

Brock Jones Jr. mentioned that he would look into the idea of the Chamber becoming more involved in the Annual Sheep Dog trails which are

held every January. After some discussion concerning each of these projects, the Board voted to approve this "program of work" for 1985.

Stan Lambert indicated that another activity that the Chamber would engage in would be the development of a "facts book" about Ozona and Crockett County. This book would establish the basis for the beginning of a promotional effort to develop name recognition outside our immediate economic area.

The Chamber will also inquire as to what role it can play in the celebration of the "Texas Sesquicentennial" in 1986.

A discussion on refurbishing the signs around the community which advertise Ozona was held. The board agreed to ask for assistance from the vocational program at Ozona High School to see what needs to be done. Lambert offered to gather some information and estimate of costs to bring up at the April meeting.

New members for the month are Louis and Rachel Hall.

## Probst named new principal

The Ozona Board of Trustees announced today that Jack Probst, sixth grade social studies teacher, has been hired as principal of Ozona Middle School. Probst, who will begin his duties on August 1, is a 1963 graduate of Sul Ross State University and received his Master of Education degree from Southwest Texas State University in 1973. He will take the place of Charles Womack who is retiring after thirty-four years of service in Ozona Public Schools.

During the Monday night meeting, the Board heard a report from Superintendent Garland Davis regarding student enrollment and average daily attendance for the first semester, as well as for the fourth six weeks of school. He explained that at the end of the first semester there was an average of 994 students enrolled, and the school system had 97% of the students in school each day. At the end of the fourth six weeks, 991 students were enrolled, and they had a 92% rate of average daily attendance.

The remainder of the meeting session was spent in reviewing school policies.

## Committee urged to prohibit forced school consolidation

Spokesmen for Texans for Local Control of Public Education urged members of the House Public Education Committee on Wednesday, February 26, to approve a proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit forced consolidation of Texas' school districts.

"On paper, consolidation may be better, but in long term reality, it is not better--educationally or economically," said Joe Atkinson, member of the board of trustees of Hunt Independent School District and secretary of TLCPE.

Atkinson said that TLCPE, a statewide organization of more than 600 members, including more than 200 school districts, strongly supports the proposed amendment, House Joint Resolution 33, sponsored by Rep. Bill Haley, D-Center. He added that advocates of consolidation overlook that in small school districts, such as Hunt ISD, the school is the focal point of the community.

"The community calendar is formed

around the school," he said. "It is the foundation of our community on which all activities are based. If the foundation is taken away the heart of our community will be gone."

Dr. Eli Douglas, superintendent of Garland Independent School District and president of TLCP, said that most consolidation movements have been directed toward small, rural school districts, but that opposition to consolidation is shared by school districts of all sizes and geographic location.

Douglas said that research shows that small districts generally have smaller pupil-teacher ratios, greater student retention rates, greater levels of student satisfaction, higher levels of parent satisfaction with the school, greater opportunities for student participation in school-related activities, a higher degree of individual attention toward students, and a much larger percentage of students who hold positions of importance and responsibility.

Ozona Public Schools is a member of the organization.

Will Seahorn and Bret Hood were in Coleman with the Lion Band, so the Lions played with Andy Dews and Scott Westmoreland, as their replacements.

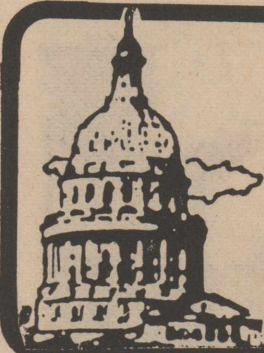

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN—An Austin jury breathed new life into the political career of Texas Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox, finding him not guilty of felony commercial bribery charges.

The prosecution failed to prove that Mattox ever uttered the threats he was alleged to have made to a Houston law firm, nor could it prove that Mattox acted substantially to carry out such a threat.

His defense lawyers painted Mattox as a public official doing his job in a high-stakes legal battle against big oil interests—and being dragged into the courtroom as a defendant by the law firm representing that oil company, Mobil Oil.

Two public figures, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and former Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, testified on Mattox's behalf, with Mauro telling jurors he was "absolutely convinced" Mattox was set up to be indicted.

Before his acquittal, a dozen potential candidates were standing in line to challenge Mattox in '86. Now he stands a good chance of finding no opposition among his fellow Democrats. Controversial as he is, Mattox is acknowledged as highly effective for his causes.

But on the other side of that controversy, Republicans say he is now "politically wounded" and have vowed to field someone to defeat him at the ballot box.

**No Pass, No Play**

A fiesty Texas Senate tried to alter the controversial '84 reform which requires high school students to pass all courses before playing sports, but Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby stuck to his guns to keep the rule as written.

Senators voted 20 to 11 to delay confirmation of 14 members of the new, reformed State Board of Education unless the board agreed to amend the no pass-no play rule which suspends failing players for six week periods. The Senate wants the suspension reduced to one week.

Meanwhile, Gov. Mark White, who launched the education reform movement last year which led to the new rule, began a \$200,000 statewide radio commercial campaign to rally support for no pass-no play.

**Hightower Under Fire**

The man really under fire these days in the Legislature is Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

A new bill was filed to eliminate his elected job and replace him with a six-member board appointed by the governor. The sponsor, Rep. Mark Stiles, D-Beaumont, reasoned, "The agriculture community simply does not have the population to elect someone whose interest is strictly their interest."

Hightower's background is consumer advocacy, not agriculture, a perceived shortcoming that has led the House

Agriculture and Livestock Committee to build rigid spending directives into Hightower's budget.

**Humorous, Angry**

He stands to see jobs for three of his top aides eliminated, including the woman alleged to be his live-in girlfriend. Earlier, Hightower faced legislation which would prevent such indirect nepotism.

The panel accused him of promoting his own ambitions.

Hightower responds they are political attacks, and he is not far off. Many legislators from rural areas view Hightower as an urban caricature of a farmer-rancher, and resent the lack of a genuinely experienced leader as farmers face a massive crisis. His foes are angered when he attacks the president, as when he called Reagan "stupid" two weeks ago before the nation, and they are afraid when his mixture of humorous-angry speech-making stirs up an economically troubled crowd.

But a good many lawmakers and voters see Hightower as a populist champion for the poor and disadvantaged, as exemplified by his recent pesticide rule changes to protect farm-

workers. Controversy surrounds him, and with the not guilty verdict that elevates Mattox above his political black cloud, Hightower becomes a more likely target of the Texas Republican Party.

**Budget Report**

The good news and bad news for the Senate Finance Committee last week was that although the state can raise more than \$900 million by increasing college tuition, repealing the blue law, and selling prison land, among other alternatives, it will still fall short by \$413 million the sum needed for the top 15 priority spending items.

**House Action**

The Texas House last week voted final passage for a bill extending the death penalty to multiple murders, and to second convictions of murder.

It also approved a bill preventing the Texas Department of Health from licensing low-level radioactive waste dumps in the state until 1987.

The House Higher Education panel also called for doubling state college tuitions, and recommended 4 percent cuts below present spending levels for colleges and universities.

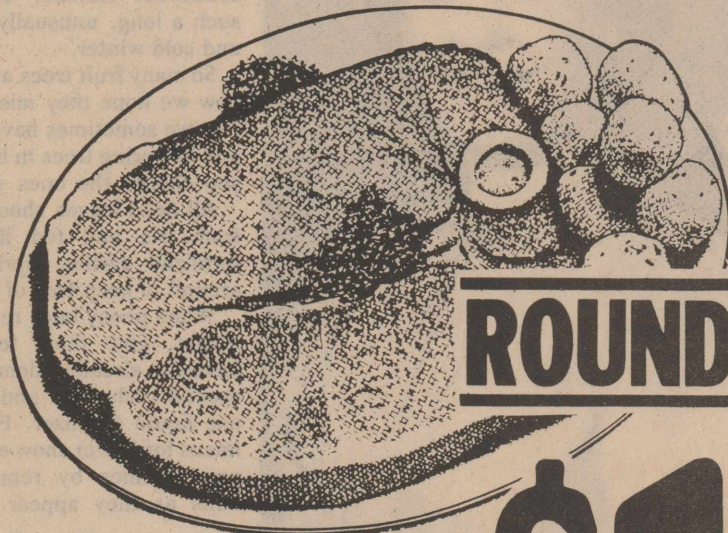

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

After driving over the different areas of Ozona, I noticed activity all over in various gardening chores. The bountiful mild days just seem to coax everyone outside to enjoy the great southwest climate, especially after such a long, unusually cloudy, damp and cold winter.

So many fruit trees are in full bloom now we hope they miss a late freeze that we sometimes have. Seeing these and flowering trees in bloom may help you choose the ones you may want.

All dead leaves should be removed from iris and fed if you haven't fertilized earlier. Sprinkle pesticide around to keep free of bugs.

When peony buds reach 6 inches in height, give them fertilizer if you haven't already done so. Spread around each plant and water well, or use liquid fertilizer. For large specimens for flower show exhibits, disbud your peonies by removing all side buds as they appear on the stem.

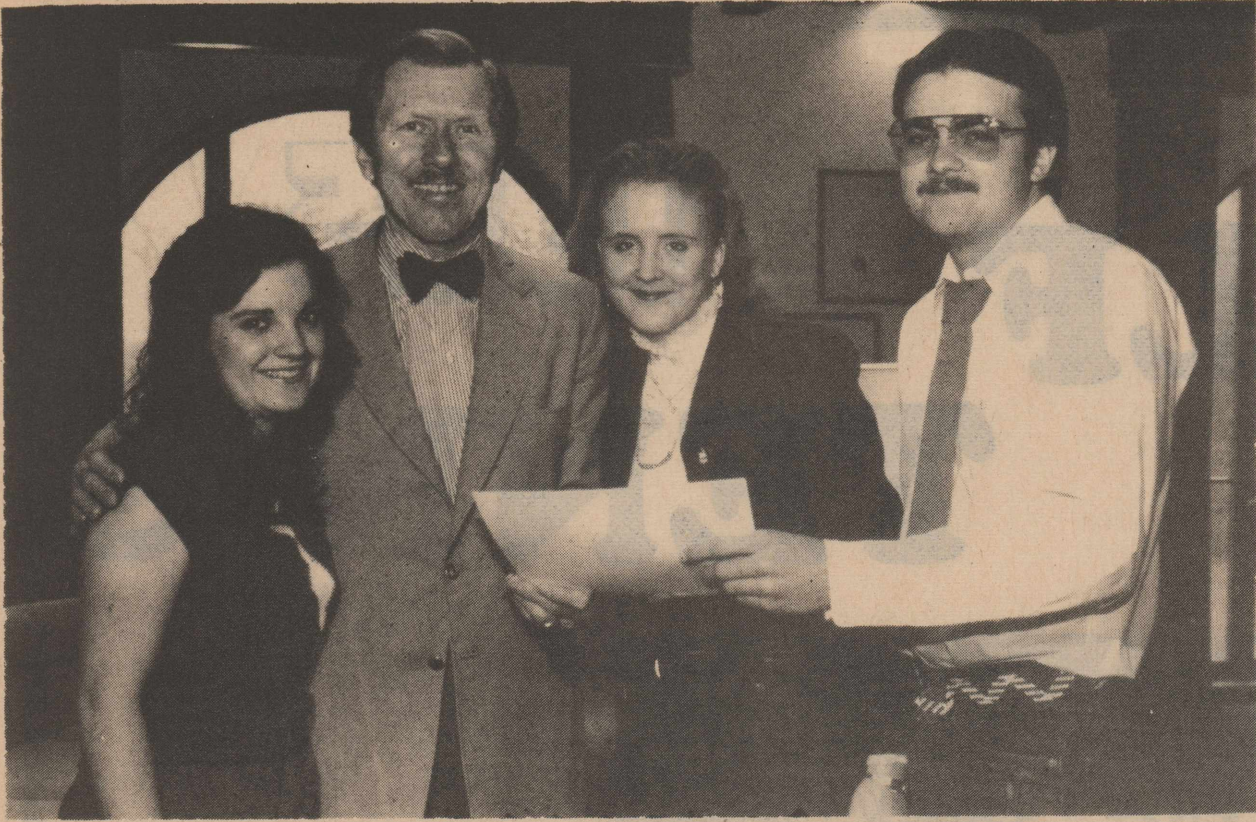

Dear Editor: March 19, 1985

About a year ago, a young family moved to Ozona, where the father was employed by a local company. The young couple have two beautiful little girls, aged 5 and 6.

The young family had a bright and happy future to look forward to, until tragedy struck.

Two months ago their 6 year old daughter, Michelle, became ill for no apparent reason. She was taken to a local doctor, who sent her to San Angelo, where they took X-rays and immediately rushed her to Santa Rosa Childrens Hospital in San Antonio. She was diagnosed as having a large malignant mass and was scheduled for surgery. While in surgery to remove the malignant mass, it was necessary to remove several parts of her body to get as much of the cancer as possible. After the surgery was complete, only 98% of the cancer had been removed.

The future of the family darkened, but the young family is courageous and carried on--chemotherapy began. A few weeks later darkness came again when Michelle went in to convulsions while at home. She was again rushed to the hospital in San Angelo, where she was placed in Intensive Care for several days, because her white blood count had dropped drastically. Michelle remained in the hospital in San Angelo for two weeks. The chemotherapy had to be stopped until her blood count could be built back up. She has now begun her Chemotherapy treatments again.

Even though we don't all know Michelle or her family personally, we would all like to help. But what can we do?? We cannot take the cancer away. We can offer our prayers and our money, in the hopes that they will make things easier for Michelle and her family.

There may be many who feel that they cannot afford to give anything. There has been a young Brownie Troop that has given everything in their troop fund and there has been another young cancer stricken family who have given, when they probably needed the money for themselves. If these people can give, surely we can all give something.

There was a fund opened at the Crockett County National Bank for Michelle three weeks ago. Many people have been working hard to raise money. There have been bake sales and small banks for Michelle have been placed in most places of business. Several of the business

places have made their own signs and have really worked to raise money for Michelle. We would like to compliment Jim's Foodway for raising the most money. We are also very grateful to Kitty for her help in continuing to publish the news about Michelle.

It is a wonderful thing to live in Ozona where people are always ready and willing to help their neighbor all they can.

After three weeks, Michelle's fund has grown to over \$2,000.00. Surely we can do more. Most important let's all keep Michelle in our prayers. Friends of Michelle

Dear Kitty,

I'm kind of at a loss as to how to respond to your article of last week (March 13, 1985) in Kitty's Korner, particularly your remarks about abortion. There are a number of your statements that are erroneous, unqualified and contrary if not contradictory. I'll cover just a few points in hopes that these will be sufficient and self enlightening.

First, I agree with your statement that like you a pregnant woman (normally) is nine months with child. And therefore, the fetus of which you speak is actually, a child, another human being in his or her earliest stage of development and growth: embryonic, fetal, infancy, etc.

Is it ever justified to directly kill an innocent human being? A child in utero at any stage of development is an innocent human being. A woman is not free to choose the direct killing of her child in a fetal stage or any other stage of his or her growth. On the contrary, the mother, by nature, nourishes the child and its life. The child is completely dependent on the mother for nourishment and proper growth. Because the human fetus is dependent that doesn't make it a parasite. A parasite, by definition, is an organism that feeds off its host. But, a child is fed.

Through process of osmosis, the mothers blood supplies nutrition to the baby ("She eats for two"). But the mother's blood and the baby's blood never mixes. They have individual and independent closed circulatory systems. After birth the baby is still fed by the nursing mother and later with baby food using a spoon. The distinguishing characteristics of a parasite is that it feeds itself (active voice), while a baby is fed (passive voice). A very essential difference. The human fetus is not a parasite!

Secondly, an abortion is not simply a "private" thing. Whenever there are two or more human beings involved or related, we have a social thing. And is that not the case of a mother with child...father, doctor, nurses, family, etc.?

Thirdly, to leave the rights of human life up to the capricious "feelings" or "situation" of another human being is ridiculous! If so, a mother could justify killing her child so she would not have to buy clothes (situation) or because people are putting her down for her bad figure (feelings). Failure to qualify, means anything could constitute "feelings" or "situations". Justice on the other hand, is based on rights and obligations, not emotions or subjectivism.

I am not addressing the fact that some pregnancies have many circumstances or problems: how, why, etc. I understand. Yet, once another human being is involved, that human life must be protected and given the opportunity to develop. Since the baby is not able to speak or plead for itself and its life, someone has too! Why not others? Why not us? In fact, in reality it is only others that can be advocate for the child!

In conclusion, I agree that the birth of your child was a "blessed event". What made this so was not the event but the "blessed" who was so from his very beginning. (cf Ps. 139:13)

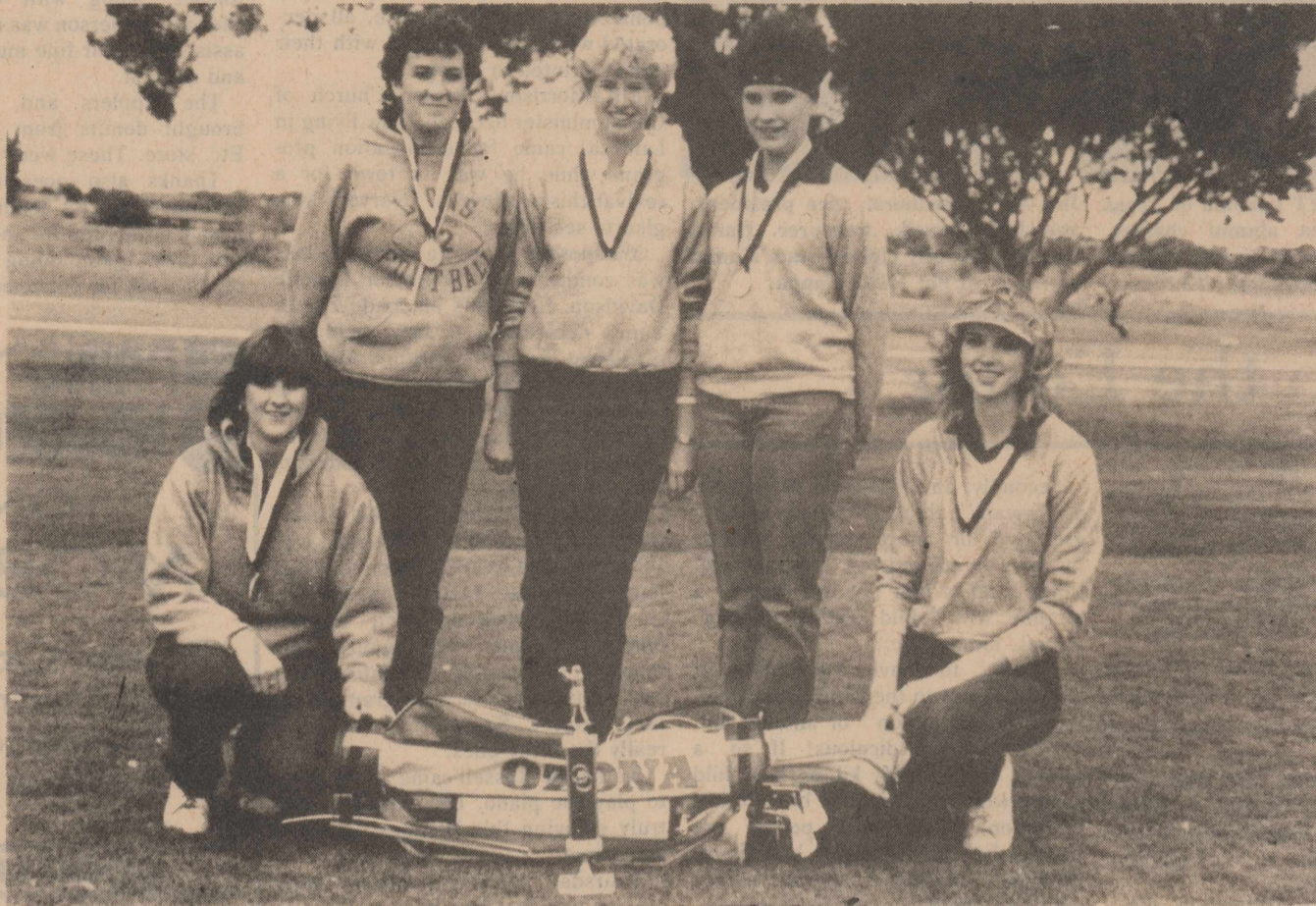

I recently attended a "Nutrition Fraud and Quackery" conference in Tucson, Arizona and was amazed to learn the facts about many popular diets and health practices. Most forms of quackery are not promoted by "quacks", but their confused customers. People who believe they have been helped by some magical method are often eager to share their experience with others. (A quack is defined as a boastful pretender of medical skill and the ability to cure.)

Most victims of quackery are not gullible. Some are desperate or looking for magic, but most do not suspect. People tend to believe what they hear the most and promoters of quackery maintain an enormous volume of communication. What sells is not the quality of their products, but their ability to influence their audience. Government protection against quackery is minimal.

Nutrition nonsense seems to be a glib business in America today. We snicker at the use of snake oil of the past, but are just as gullible and eager to believe wonderful promises today. Yearly consumers spend over \$10 million on worthless nutrition advice--for books, magazines, and dietary supplements. The big winner is the salesman and the loser is the individual who eats an inadequate diet or fails to get proper medical attention. It is estimated that 44% of America's total medical bills can be traced to improper nutrition and misinformation!

What are the techniques of nutrition quacks and how can they be identified? The food fake uses many propaganda techniques including: 1. The emotional appeal. A liquid vitamin supplement advertisement said, "Parents feel more secure knowing they are doing everything in their power to enhance their children's health." Appeals to our feelings of love, self-esteem, and sex appeal are effectively used to sell worthless dietary products. 2. The strawman. An issue that does not really exist is created and promoted as an imaginary problem. We are told that "the soil today is severely depleted of all nutrients and food supplements are a must." 3. The bandwagon. Everyone is doing it. An example would be "Millions of dieters have found an answer to their overweight problem by taking this pill before every meal, that only cost you a few cents per day." 4. The mixture of lie and truth. A mixture of truth and falsehood on nutrition or health make it virtually impossible for the general consumer to sort out reliable products. 5. The big lie. Purveyors of diet nonsense do not bind themselves to facts. They say whatever it takes to sell a product, even though it could be harmful to your health. 6. The testimonial. No matter what the product, someone can

be found (or hired) to promote it. Even well meaning testimonies reflect wishful thinking, the placebo effect, or a natural change that had nothing to do with the product.

How can you spot a food fake? In addition to propaganda techniques, you might hear the following claims: promotion of some unusual food (raw food, seaweed, apricot pits); something is for sale; sellers trying to convert individuals to a new way of eating or to start using supplements; miraculous results are promised (lose 20 pounds in 2 weeks); or offers through the mail only.

A nutrition fake is skilled at sizing up their audience.
