She was born Nov. 27, 1905 in Ballinger. She married Roy Killingsworth October 1, 1932. She retired from the teaching profession after 30 years in the Ozona Public School System. Her husband retired at the same time, having served as school principal for many years. They moved to San Angelo to make their home after their retirement several years ago. She was preceded in death by her son, Dr. Roy Neil Killingsworth.

Survivors include her husband, Roy, of San Angelo; one daughter, Beverly Nevins of San Angelo; a grandson, Phillip Ward of San Angelo, seven sisters and one brother.

Mr. Saunders died Thursday afternoon, April 11, in Sid Peterson Memorial Hospital in Kerrville, following a lengthy illness.

He was born May 24, 1948 in Sonora. He was married to Donna Gambrell Wilkerson October 18, 1984 in Kerrville. He was a certified drug and alcohol abuse counselor at Starlite Village Hospital in Center Point at the time of his death.

A graduate of Ozona High School, he attended North Texas State University in Denton, and was a graduate of St. Mary's College in San Antonio. He had been a resident of Kerrville since 1978.

Survivors include his wife of Kerrville; a daughter, Stephanie Saunders of Ozona; his mother and step-father, Maxine and Johnny Henderson of Ozona; his father and step-mother Alan and Ann Saunders of Spring Branch; his sister, Sherry Berger of Irvine, and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Winnie Saunders of Blanco.

Suit holds up sewer plant construction

Although the Crockett County Water District has been granted a permit to construct and operate a waste water disposal plant on the Sarah Seay property approximately 2.5 miles south of I-10 and 3,000 feet west of Hwy 163, Arlington Helbing, immediate downstream land owner has filed suit to have the permit set aside.

The permit which was granted December 21, by the Texas District of Water Resources, would allow the water district to discharge treated water into Johnson Draw. Helbing claims this would so damage his property he would be unable to sub-divide it in the future. He has filed suit in the District Court of Travis County, 98th Judicial Branch, to have the TDWR permit set aside.

If this permit is set aside or rescinded, the directors of the Water District would be forced to start over with the hearing in Austin to secure

another permit. Plans for a new sewer plant have been in the making for at least ten years. The present plant has been adequate up until last year, when the State Health Department declared it inadequate and ordered the district to build a new plant.

The district has filed an application to the Environmental Protection Agency to operate the plant. Plans have already been approved by the State Department of Health.

The engineering firm of Dan Glass prepared plans for the project and they were approved February 28, 1985, as the permit requires. Estimated cost of the new waste water plant is approximately \$700,000.

The Austin firm of Underwood, Neuhas and Co. is aiding the district in the financial planning for a bond election to finance the plant later this year.

At present the project is on hold, due to the Helbing suit.

Town meeting set by C. of C.

The Ozona Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a town meeting Thursday, April 25, on what is going on in the oil industry. The meeting will be held at the high school auditorium at 7:30 p.m. All persons interested in the industry, which is so vital to the Crockett County economy are urged to be present.

Giving the report will be a representative of the Permian Basin Petroleum Association, under the direction of Ed Thompson, who is executive director of the association. A question and answer period will follow the report.

The board of directors of the chamber, agreed to this important meeting after reading a letter from Mr. Thompson at the regular meeting last week. In his letter, Thompson said he would like to come to Ozona and present an up-to-date report on what is going on in the "oilpatch." The slow-down in the industry over the past year had a direct effect on the local economy as well as other West Texas towns. Pending tax rules to do away with gas and oil exploration incentives will have dire consequences for the industry as well as the West Texas economy. This will be one of the problems under discussion.

Further information will be forthcoming next week.

In other business at the board meeting, Stan Lambert, president, reported on costs associated with

repairing the sign on the interstate, east of Ozona. He reported a major reconstruction of the sign involving metal letters would cost approximately \$2,000. Beth Boyd, chamber manager, reported on the cost of replacing the plastic letters which are missing or damaged. She has received two estimates, one bid came in at \$600, and the other was \$250.

The board voted to take the lower bid on the condition that the letters match the existing letters on the sign. Other signs were discussed, with Bobby Aycock volunteering to look into a proposal at a nominal cost for a sign located on Highway 163 north of Ozona.

Lambert encouraged the committees to begin work on the various summer events coming up. The annual tennis tournament has been set for June 8, and publicity on the event is underway.

Various committee reports were given. Donuts, Etc. is the new member for the month. The finance committee reported all current bills paid. Discussion was held on a Chamber of Commerce review which will be published as a supplement to the Ozona Stockman in the near future.

Local girl dies in automobile crash

Alma Kay Ramos, 17, was killed instantly here Saturday night when the late model sports car she was driving went out of control under the I-10 underpass on Highway 163, crashed into a traffic light pole, overturned twice and crashed into another metal light pole.

She was traveling south on Hwy 163 at a high rate of speed when the crash occurred, according to witnesses to the accident, who saw the brake lights come on before the car entered the underpass.

Justice of the Peace Raymond Davee pronounced Miss Ramos dead at the scene at 10:15. Firemen attempting to get the scene with the "Jaws of Life" tool were hampered by vehicles of on-lookers which created a dangerous situation.

Funeral services for Alma Kay were held Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church, with burial following in Lima Cemetery.

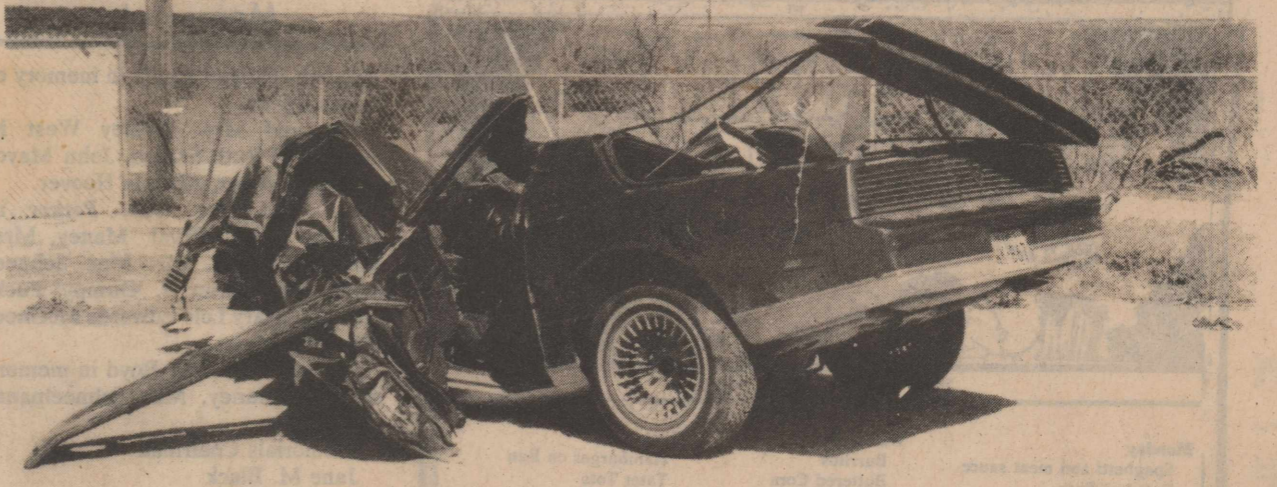




Wreck claims fatality

I'm sure everyone is very happy and grateful for the wonderful, slow rain of last week. The rain should improve the many horticulture specimens to be exhibited the 25th at the Flower Show from 4 to 6 p.m. in the Civic Center. Everyone is cordially invited.

Even though the winter and spring months were very dry with severe freezes, we hope you will be surprised, for usually unexpected beauty shows up in great numbers. Many blue ribbons and high awards will be given in the horticulture division. Everyone is welcome to enter, but your exhibit or plant must be named and in good condition to enter. Only Garden Club members can enter the Artistic Division to receive to receive awards. Also, there will be several classes in the Youth Division in both horticulture and design exhibits.

Caladiums and elephant ears may be planted any time now where they will not be exposed to hot afternoon sun. Remember, they need water almost everyday during the summer and sometimes twice a day.

For a quick screen, plant castor beans to give lush bronze foliage in the late summer and fall.

Lilacs need a feeding of superphosphate. Easter lilies may be reset from pots when they finish blooming. Try not to disturb the roots by tapping pots to take them out easily. They will bloom yearly.

Chrysanthemums should be divided for specimen plants and borders by the end of the month. Rework the bed where they are to be planted and separate into single plants. Discard the old root stem, using new side branches for better plants. To have well grown mum plants they should be kept well-watered all during the summer. They will repay you with beautiful and colorful blooms in the fall. Pinch out the top when planting it too tall, to about 6 to 8 inches high.

Plant zinnias now for summer color. Sow seed 6 to 12 inches apart in a well drained, sunny location. Water well. Selections are available in colors of red, yellow, pink, orange, white and green.

Guard dog program set for April 24

The Livestock and Range Committee is sponsoring a Guard Dog Program that will be held at the High School Library at 7:30 on Wednesday, April 24. Dr. Raymond Coppinger, Director, Livestock Dog Project, Hampshire College, Amhurst Massachusetts, will present the program. Dr. Coppinger did much of the research for the National Wool Growers on guard dogs.

Last spring some local ranchers leased dogs through his project. There are still many questions by local ranchers. This will be a very informative meeting by one of the most knowledgeable people on livestock guarding dogs.

Predators continue to be on the increase and legislation continues to make it more difficult for land owners to control predators. The guard dog may be one tool that can be used by ranchers to reduce predation on sheep and goats.

Wreck victims making good recovery from injuries

Last week's report on a wreck which injured an Ozona couple was incomplete due to inability to obtain an official report. It was learned Monday that Alice Couch, who was critically injured in the crash, had been taken off the critical list and was due to be moved to a private room in the Val Verde Memorial Hospital.

This information was relayed to the Stockman by her husband, Joe Couch, who also suffered injuries in the wreck, but not as serious as Mrs. Couch.

The couple was returning from a fishing trip on Devils River when they stopped to assist a fellow fisherman with a flat tire. As they were turning around on Highway 277, 30 miles north of Del Rio, their rig was hit by an 18-wheel truck-tractor rig. Estimated speed of the truck was 75 miles per hour. The highway in that area tends

to obscure vision due to many hills and curves and Couch did not see the approaching truck.

Mrs. Couch was thrown out the back window on impact and was found 40 feet from the crash site. She suffered numerous cuts and bruises, along with a severe head injury. She spent a full week on the critical list in intensive care at the Del Rio facility. Couch reported she began to regain consciousness Sunday and was fully conscious Monday. He suffered a crushed knee-cap with a fracture of the leg below it.

Couch said doctors had given no indication of a release date, but he was not concerned about that. He felt Mrs. Couch's recovery was a miracle considering the extent of her injuries.

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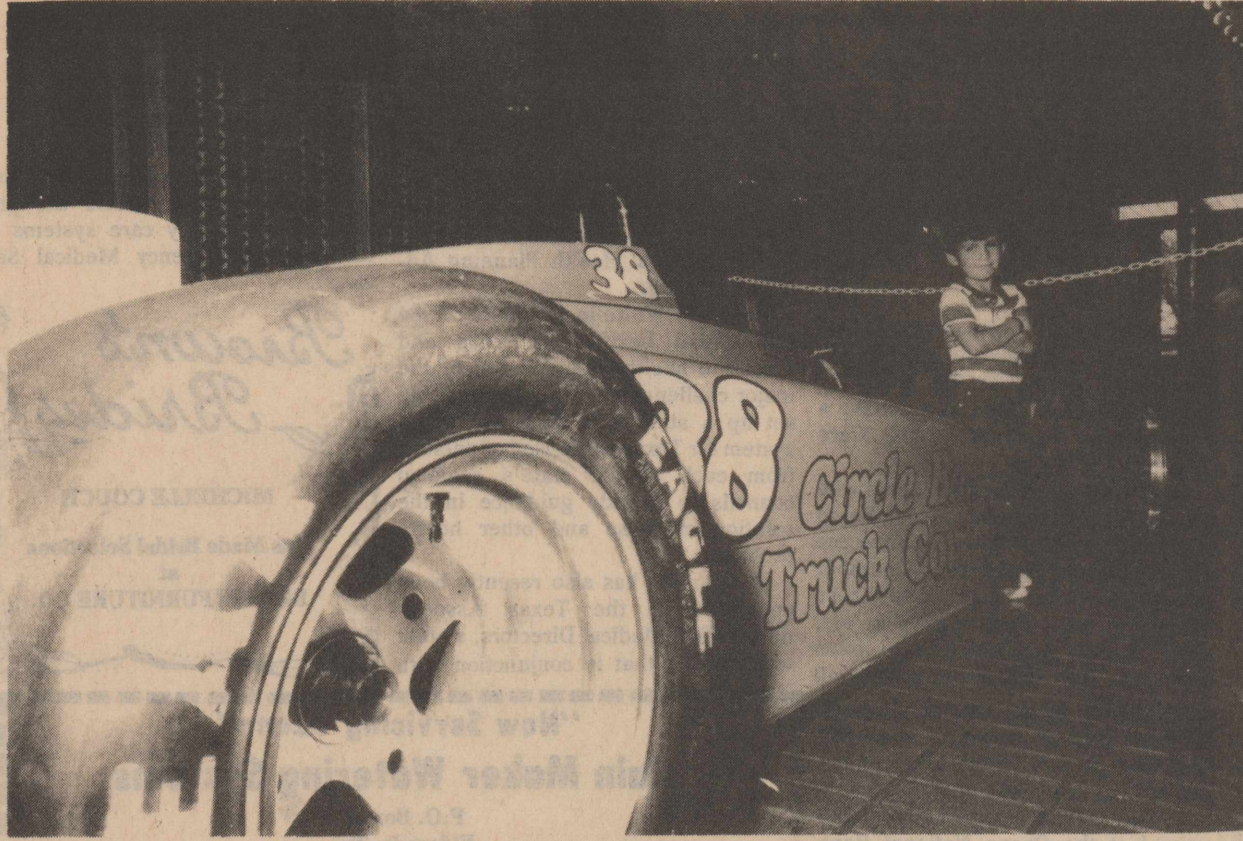
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A genuine Indy 500 racer

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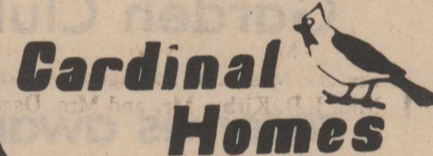

Osteoporosis is a disease which is receiving much publicity today. Marium Curry, R.D. and representative of Associated Milk Producers will be present at the Health Fair to answer numerous questions on this subject. Osteoporosis is a painful and crippling bone disease which eventually causes bones to become brittle and susceptible to cracks.

Osteoporosis has multiple causes, most of which are due to calcium deficiencies. Other contributors include aging, menopause, genetic factors, stress, smoking, alcohol abuse, certain drugs, and a sedentary life-

style. Osteoporosis may be preventable but presently there is no known cure for osteoporosis. Steps that may prevent bone loss include: 1. eating a nutritionally adequate diet, including calcium rich foods daily; 2. exercising regularly and 3. quitting smoking. Persons who are physically active have more bone mass than those who are sedentary.

A daily adequately balanced diet provides enough calcium for most people. Daily minimal requirements for adults include 2 milk servings, 4 fruit-vegetable servings, 2 meat servings, and 4 bread cereal servings. Dairy products should be part of every healthful weight reduction diet.

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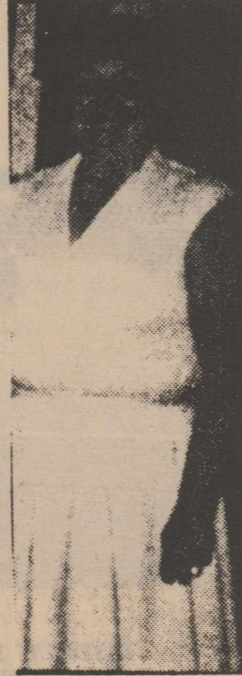
