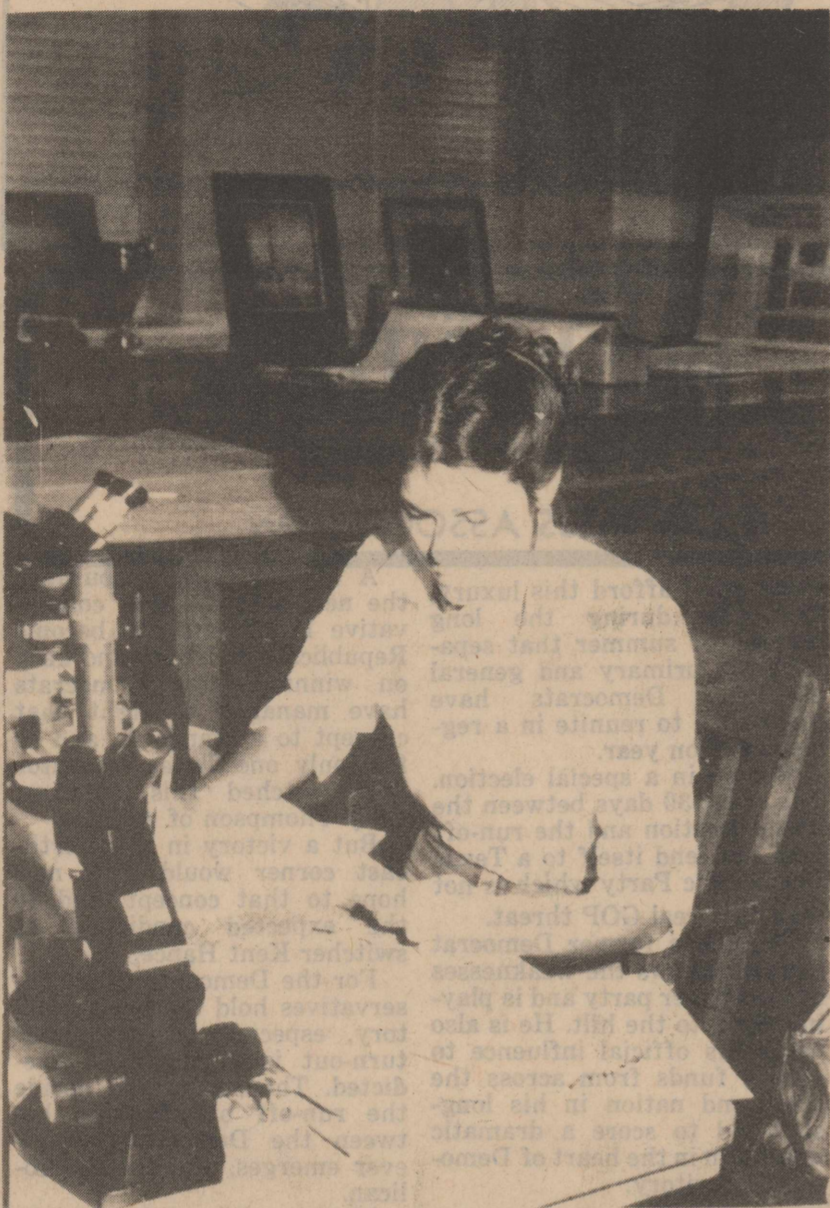

## State archeologists assist at Museum

The Crockett County Museum this week received assistance in their Indian artifact collection when three state archeologists came to evaluate and catalog the exhibit. The upcoming Indian exhibit will be the museum's Sesquicentennial offering.

John Stokes and Genevieve Childress will head up the Sesquicentennial activities here. They plan to give every organization and business the opportunity to participate.

Archeologists, who were here with the Texas Historical Commission, Friday were Dr. Robert J. Mallouf, Dr. Glenna W. Dean and Patricia Mercado-Allinger. The three were here at the invitation of Mrs. Childress to identify the functions of many items in the Crockett County Museum, what they were used for and the ages of the items. It will make it possible in the near future to set up an educational display of the Indian Artifacts at the museum.

Dr. Mallouf said he and his assistants have the job of helping in the understanding, interpreting and preserving the archeological resources of the state.

## Chamber makes plans for July 4th

Plans for the Fourth of July celebration were discussed at the regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening at the Chamber office. Although the fireworks fund was \$800 short, president Stan Lambert offered to raise the remaining money by going through the community and soliciting from organizations and individuals to make up the short fall. On the basis of this commitment, the Board voted unanimously to proceed with the fireworks show, which will be a 45-minute spectacular displayed over the skies of Ozona. The fireworks show will begin shortly after dark.

Most activities will be in the downtown park and activities should be in full swing by 2 p.m. Some food booths will be open earlier and the Crockett County Arts and Crafts Guild will open a show at 10 a.m. in Emerald Park. Also, the Emerald House will be open all day for tours of the historical first house in Ozona. A complete

line-up of activities may be found in another part of this edition of the Stockman. The schedule of activities is sponsored by local merchants.

The cook-off will be held at the rodeo arena with judging to begin at 1 p.m. As of Tuesday, there were no sign-ups for the cook-off, but chamber manager Beth Boyd said she expects a full crew by next Thursday. Booths will be \$15, plus \$10 for clean-up. The clean-up deposit will be refunded if the booth operator leaves the premises clean.

The local chapter of the Knights of Columbus will stage a parade at 1:30 p.m. The parade will begin at the rodeo arena park and continue to the downtown square.

In other business during the meeting the board voted to remove and store the plastic letters on the highway billboard east of town until further action can be taken. The county has agreed to remove the letters as soon as

## Local students show improvement in TABS

Superintendent of Schools Garland Davis gave a brief outline of the results of the TABS (Texas Assessment of Basic Skills) test taken the past year by Ozona third, fifth and ninth grade students.

Davis was pleased with the overall improvement and said in the overall area only one or two categories were down.

This will be the final appearance of the tests under that acronym. From now on, the tests will be known as TEAMS (Texas Education Assessment of Mastery of Skills). The tests will serve the same purpose, regardless of the name.

The two basic purposes are to identify weaknesses in the 3 R's, reading, writing and arithmetic, and to help school districts develop strategies to correct weaknesses. Up until this time, the tests were given only to grades 3, 5, and 9. The TEAMS tests will be given at three additional levels, grades 1, 7 and 12.

Seniors must demonstrate a mastery of the basic skills in order to qualify for graduation, a policy which has been adopted statewide. However, Mr. Davis said the preparation for the tests would begin at the 11th grade level.

Of the 71 third grade students (entry level) tested, the scores were good in all areas. In math, they scored 85% or above in all areas, with the exception of order of whole numbers where they scored just under 84%.

In reading the students scored 100% in four out of eight categories; and from 85% to 96% in the other four. The students scored from 91% to 100% in writing. In spelling and capitalization the students scored 100%.

An interesting fact, students in all three grades scored 100% in handwriting.

The fifth graders did not fare as well, in that the test becomes difficult in the upper grades. However, in math they scored 90% in eight out of the 12 areas, with only 2 areas falling below 85%.

In reading skills, the 65 fifth graders taking the test scored above 90% in four of the 11 categories. In three other categories they scored in the 80% range. In the remaining 4 areas, they scored between 72 and 77%. The goal is 85% in all categories, but Mr. Davis pointed out a 70% range was passing.

Writing scores were 100%. Spelling ranged from 80 to 97% on all areas, with the exception of one where they fell below the goal of 85%.

The 84 ninth graders tested showed an 81% mastery of Math. One area where they scored extremely low, pulled down the average. This was the area of "Proportions of ratio to percent." They scored 90% or better on four areas of the test and 85% or above on three others. They also fell off in the category of "managing

personal finances."

In reading the students failed to achieve the score wanted. They scored an overall 70%, which is considered passing, but will need more application and attention.

In writing the students scored 80% to 90% in every category, with a 94% in spelling and capitalization and an 88% in commonly used forms.

When Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton returns from vacation next week, he will make an official report and recommendation for the 1985-86 school year which will respond to student weaknesses with appropriate curriculum and instruction.

Comparison scores from regional and state will be available in the fall and will be made public at that time.

## Mitchell appointed as bank director

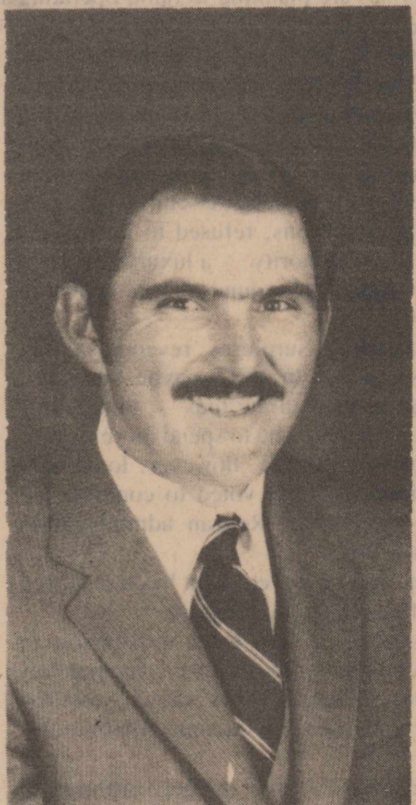

### DUMP REVENUE SHARING

Though many state and local governments are now enjoying healthy budget surpluses, virtually all local governments more than 39,000 of them receive federal handouts under the \$4.6 billion-a-year revenue sharing program.

When the program was first adopted in 1972, it was based on the rationale that the federal government possessed a stronger, more effective tax collection mechanism and had a far more secure financial base than state and local governments. In other words, big government has a bigger tax net. Now, however, the federal government faces record-high deficits, and state and local governments most of which are constitutionally prohibited from deficit spending are operating in the black.

In fact, some states such as California, are planning to build operating reserves for the future. Under the leadership of Governor George Deukmejian, California has paid off the \$1.5-billion deficit the governor inherited from his predecessor, Jerry (Medfly) Brown, balanced its budget, and set aside a 3.7 percent reserve for emergencies all without raising general taxes. This was achieved by virtually freezing state spending, reducing the size of the workforce, repealing 6,000 regulations, and vetoing \$2.3 billion in proposed spending passed by the General Assembly. Because Governor Deukmejian made those tough decisions, refused to raise taxes and willingly exercised his "line item" veto authority a luxury President Reagan doesn't have California's finances are sound and its economy is growing again.

Given current and projected state and local surpluses, revenue sharing is a federal program whose time has passed. In fact, maybe the states should start "sharing" their budget surpluses with the feds though this would probably just prompt the Bozors on the Potomac to spend more.

The prospect of revenue sharing getting the axe, however, looks dim right now. The Senate Budget Committee recently voted to continue the costly program for two more years, rejecting a Reagan administration proposal to end revenue sharing in fiscal 1986.

During the past dozen-plus years, the federal government has transferred some \$78.6 billion to state and local coffers under the program.

Worse, it has done so indiscriminately. Every local jurisdiction in America receives revenue sharing handouts, even posh resort communities and wealthy bedroom suburbs. Moreover, research has shown, wealthy communities often receive more per capita than low-income communities that may really need the money.

State governments ended Fiscal Year 1984 with budget surpluses in excess of \$6 billion, plus another \$1 billion set aside in "rainy day" reserve accounts.

So why is the flat-broke federal government which is looking at the possibility of a \$180-200-billion deficit in fiscal 1986 still sending checks to Palm Beach, Palm Springs, and some 39,000 other communities?

Revenue sharing funds could be eliminated entirely without causing any hardship. For one thing, revenue sharing programs already exist in 49 states meaning state governments can aid local communities during the adjustment period.

The federal government provides an enormous amount of aid to state and local governments. In the Reagan administration's fiscal 1986 budget, \$100.7 billion is earmarked for states and localities, amounting to 10.7 percent of the total federal budget.

Given the size of the deficit, the case for dumping the wasteful revenue

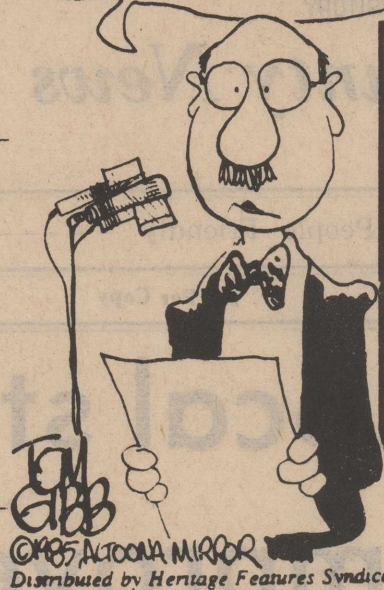

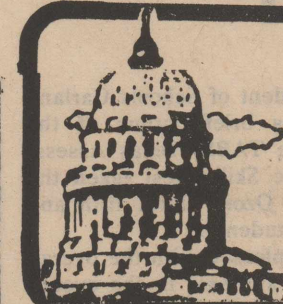

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—The political eyes of Texas are turned northeast to the First Congressional District where the first election battle of the new season is being waged.

At stake in this June 29 special election is not only a seat in Congress for one party or the other, but also precious momentum which the victors hope will carry over into the '86 regular elections.

Not so in a special election. The scant 30 days between the initial election and the run-off does not lend itself to a Texas Democratic Party which is not used to a real GOP threat. Gramm, a former Democrat himself, knows the weaknesses of his former party and is playing them to the hilt. He is also using his official influence to gather funds from across the state and nation in his long-shot bid to score a dramatic upset win in the heart of Democratic territory.

While most analysts agree that a run-off election will be necessary between the top two vote-getters, a Democratic victory will depend on whether the factions rejoin.

The situation on the election eve is one heavily influenced by the new Republican U.S. Senator Phil Gramm and very similar to the circumstances in his home congressional district which catapulted him to statewide office.

In that '83 election, Gramm drew heavily on unified GOP support from around the state and defeated a field of some ten Democratic challengers.

Now from his position as the top Republican officeholder in the state, he has engineered a similar scenario for victory for former Aggie quarterback Ed Hargett, his hand-picked candidate.

First, he enticed long-time Congressman Sam Hall to resign and accept a federal judgeship which Gramm asked Reagan to give him. Then, when Hall vacated the seat, thereby creating the need for a special election, Gramm was ready to run a well-funded, lone Republican.

The strategy of using special elections to win a GOP takeover in a Democratic district is one that pits Democrat against Democrat for the right to run in a run-off against an unblooded Republican.

Democrats are notorious for squabbling amongst themselves, and after the blood-letting, they are generally not in the mood to kiss and make up for some time.

In the past, Texas has been a one-party state and Demo-

crats could afford this luxury, especially during the long months of summer that separate the primary and general elections. Democrats have more time to reunite in a regular election year.

Not so in a special election. The scant 30 days between the initial election and the run-off does not lend itself to a Texas Democratic Party which is not used to a real GOP threat.

Gramm, a former Democrat himself, knows the weaknesses of his former party and is playing them to the hilt. He is also using his official influence to gather funds from across the state and nation in his long-shot bid to score a dramatic upset win in the heart of Democratic territory.

He has only to make a good, close showing to come out smelling good, because of the region's political history. A win would seal his position of leadership within a GOP that still eyes former Democrats with some distrust and jealousy.

A victory also encourages the new doctrine that conservative Democrats can become Republicans in Texas and keep on winning. The Democrats have managed to fight that concept to a standstill, and so far, only one Texas legislator has switched this summer, Gary Thompson of Abilene.

But a victory in this north-east corner would give new hope to that concept, and to the expected candidacy of switcher Kent Hance.

For the Democrats, the conservatives hold the key to victory, especially if the voter turn-out is mediocre as predicted. Then, they can decide the run-off by choosing between the Democrat, whom ever emerges, and the Republican.

If they choose the Republican, they may well decide to remain in their new party. The magnitude with which they will cross party lines will hinge on how fast the Democratic winner can repair fences with the seven Democratic losers.

And that is where Phil Gramm is counting on them not to succeed.

### Tips For Gardeners

From the  
Ozona Garden Club

Now that the summer winds prevail and not as much rain as we would like to have, we are reminded daily there are numerous chores to be done regularly in the garden.

Be especially aware of water needs for shallow rooted woody ornamentals as azaleas, camellias, and hydrangeas, and such herbaceous plants as caladiums, dahlias, impatiens, ferns and most outdoor potted plants. Deep watering is the key to healthy summer growth; shallow watering causes shallow rooting which can cause injury to plants during periods of dry weather. To avoid run off, apply water only as rapidly as it can be absorbed by the soil. Also a mulch around all ornamentals will conserve moisture and lengthen the time between watering. Make use of the cooler tempera-

tures of early morning or late afternoon for spraying, watering and fertilizing.

In our area dig and plant iris from June to October if they have become crowded. Usually this should be done every three to five years. Cut foliage to about six inches when replanting, but do not cut back foliage on ones not to be moved. If you intend to order new rhizomes, now is the time to make your selections while garden centers have sales.

Bearded iris, the most commonly grown in the south, need a neutral or slightly acid soil, and good drainage is very essential. Full sun is a must, so don't plant other flowers or plants near enough to shade iris. Too much fertilizer is worse than none at all, yet iris needs a moderate feeding-potash and phosphorus are essential, but too much nitrogen is harmful. It produces soft growth which is susceptible to rhizome rot. November and Feb. are the best months to fertilize. If your garden is small, select a few of the same variety and use them for a spotlight of color. Always hand cultivate bearded iris as shallow-growing rhizomes are easily injured with a sharp hoe.

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## EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

Making a pie crust can be "A Piece of Cake".

So you want to make a pie. No problem—even if you've never made your own crust before.

Making a good pie crust is not as difficult as it appears, especially when you know a few little tricks. Following is a recipe for a foolproof pie crust, followed by a few hints that will come in handy. I'd say "good luck," but you won't need it.

### Pie Crust

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup solid vegetable shortening
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup cold water
- Beaten egg white

Lightly grease a 9 or 10" pie pan. With a mixer, blend the flour, butter, shortening and salt until mixture forms little balls about the size of peas. Add the water and mix until dough comes clean from the sides of the bowl and forms one large ball. Flatten ball into an 8" circle, then wrap in plastic and refrigerate about 30 minutes.

Put chilled dough on a lightly-floured surface. Roll into a 12" circle (roll from the center toward the outside). Lightly dust the rolling pin and pastry with flour. Put the rolling pin on the edge of the pastry circle and roll the dough over the rolling pin. Lift dough over to pie pan, and gently unroll dough onto pan. Gently press dough into pan, avoiding having too much dough where the bottom and sides meet. Allow 1" of dough to hang over edge of pan. Trim off rest. Press overhanging dough over and under edges of pan. Flute edges.

If recipe calls for baked crust: Preheat oven to 400°. Prick bottom and sides of shell with fork. Cover

dough with a piece of wax paper cut to fit, and press gently onto dough. Cover crust with a layer of rice, lima beans, or bakers beans, making sure they are evenly distributed.

Bake 25 minutes. Remove paper and beans. Return pie crust to oven for 5 minutes or so, just until lightly browned. Cool, then glaze with beaten egg white. Fill.

\*If you are going out to buy a new rolling pin and surface, bear in mind that marbel is the best choice, followed by Formica. Each holds cold and prevents the shortening from breaking down.

\*Beware of over-flouring your rolling surface; too much flour will stop your crust from being tender and flaky.

\*If you are making a fruit pie, cut some steam vents in the top crust to keep the fruit from bubbling over.

\*Bake filled pies on a rack in the lower third of your oven.

\*To keep your crust from getting too brown, cover the edge of the pastry with a strip of aluminum foil, then remove the foil 15 minutes before pie should be done.

\*If you chilled dough is too stiff to work with, let it stand at room temperature until it can be rolled out more easily.

Don't freeze filled pies; the crusts will get soggy. Instead freeze unfilled crusts till they are ready when you need them.

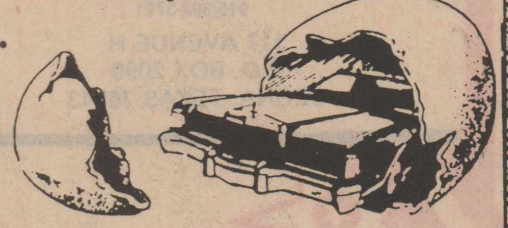

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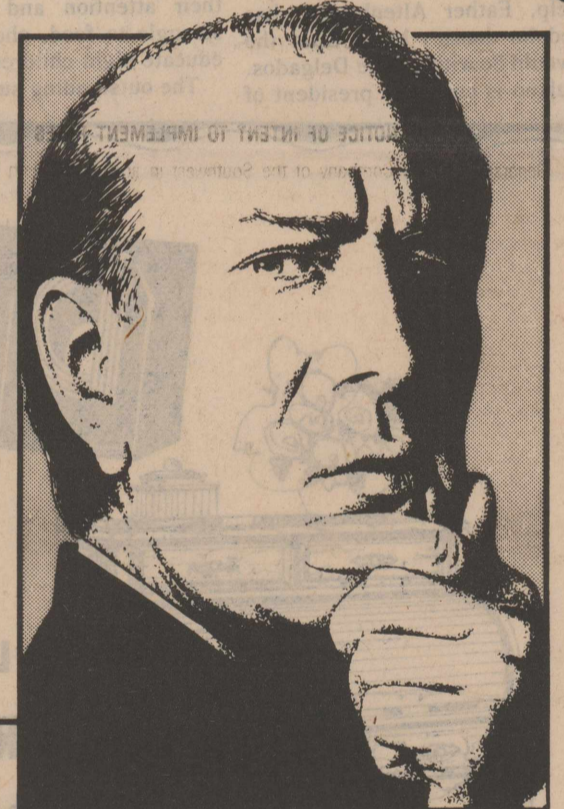
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## Just hors'in Around day is Saturday

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**NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES**

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible.
