Sesquicentennial plans made for Crockett County's part

Around 20 persons were on hand in the Emerald Room of the Ozona National Bank Thursday evening to make plans for Crockett County's Sesquicentennial celebration, and complete the application in order that the county may be sanctioned by the Texas 186 Sesquicentennial Commission and have a schedule of events in the official brochure.

Co-chairmen of the event are Gene Childress and John Stokes. Mrs. Childress introduced Melissa Hornick of San Angelo, who heads up publicity for the Sesquicentennial there.

She gave several pointers for projects locally, and told of several projects in the making in San Angelo. She told of an old-fashioned wagon train which would make up in Sulfur Springs and travel 3,000 miles around

the state. One of the 20 projects selected by the San Angelo committee is collecting firewood and assisting when they visit there. The wagon train will not be coming through Ozona, but will spend the night in Barnhart March 21. Some discussion was held on horseback rides to visit the train or taking a group of children to travel to Big Lake with the train.

Ms. Hornick also told the group a company will be in San Angelo July 17, at the Convention Center from 2 until 7 p.m. displaying Sesquicentennial items, such as mugs, scarves, trays, etc. with the state logo and commemorating the 150th birthday of Texas.

Several proposals were discussed and the following Crockett County Master plan for the 1986 Sesquicentennial celebration was agreed upon and sent to the state with the application for sanction:

January 10-11--Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show

January 19--Opening of Crockett County Museum Exhibit, "The Earliest People of This Land." Indians Exhibit will be open through December 29, 1986.

February 13--Chamber of Commerce Sesquicentennial Banquet

March 1--Hold a contest to design the best store window display on a sesquicentennial theme, with the winner on the front page of the local newspapers.

March 2--Create a "time capsule" containing characteristic objects from Crockett County of the 1980's. The time capsule is to be opened on March 2, 2036-Independence Day of the Texas Bicentennial Year. Ring every bell in town.

March 20-21--Crockett County Sesquicentennial Wagon Train joins the Texas State Sesquicentennial Wagon Train.

April 17--Ozona Garden Club Flower Show

April 21--Judging of the poster contest among school students for the best poster with a Sesquicentennial theme. Winning posters will be exhibited in the Ozona National Bank and Crockett County National Bank. Ring every bell in town in honor of San Jacinto Day.

June 13-14--Chamber of Commerce Sesquicentennial Tennis Tournament July 4--Chamber of Commerce 4th of July Sesquicentennial Extravaganza, including a Sesquicentennial Parade.

August 1-2--Crockett County Sesquicentennial Junior Rodeo, sponsored by the Ozona Lions Club.

October 31--Chamber of Commerce Halloween Festival, with a booth sponsored by the Crockett County Sesquicentennial Committee.

November 22--Ozona Woman's League Sesquicentennial Bazaar

December 29--Ring every bell in town in honor of the day the Republic became a state.

Ozonan's stolen car found near Sonora

A late model Lincoln Continental Town Car was stolen past midnight Thursday from a garage at a home in Country Club Estates. After it was reported missing around 8:30 the next morning, it was found shortly after noon abandoned on U.S. 277 below Sonora.

The car belonged to Cathy Dawn Moore and when she went into her garage Thursday morning she made the discovery. A neighbor, who had seen the theft, came to her assistance and called the sheriff's office. He said he saw two teen-age boys drive up in an old blue car around 12:30 a.m. One got out of the car and went into the Moore residence. The other car drove on and waited. The thief passed up two parked vehicles and went directly to Mrs. Moore's car. The keys were in the ignition, so he had no trouble in driving off.

The neighbor said he was not

particularly suspicious, and didn't want to wake the family at that hour of the night. He did say, however, he could identify both youths if he saw them again as well as the car they were driving.

When the car was found, the keys were in the ignition and the gas tank was half full. Missing were a \$20 bill, a hand-gun and the contents of the trunk. The trunk contained birthday gifts from Doris Moore, to her grandson, Matt. After Mrs. Moore's recent death, Cathy Dawn had placed the gifts (all wrapped) in the trunk of the car to await a more appropriate time for the birthday party. Every gift was unwrapped and taken by the thieves. Nothing but paper and cards were left in the trunk.

The family was more saddened by the theft of the gifts than that of the car. It is not possible to offer a reward for their return since they cannot be described.

Stockman photographer really gives all for her profession

Stockman photographer Betty Perry gave county road employees a moment of levity Friday as they paved in front of the courthouse. Deciding on a spectacular shot of the paving program which is now in progress, Betty hitched a ride on one of the dump trucks containing pre-mix.

Camera in hand and ready to focus, the driver yelled whoa! and threw Betty off balance and down the shoot, however, not before she got the shot. Betty was retrieved, but her shoes were found only by sifting the gravel. Her slacks and blouse will never be the same. She refused an offer to allow the Stockman have them cleaned, saying an overnight soak would clean them. This remains to be seen.

years ago while sailing down the Rhine River in Germany. Betty was on the topside busy photographing castles. It is her custom to wear a chain around her glasses while working, as she throws them off before taking a shot. This time she was wearing sunglasses without the chain and as she threw them off they went sailing.

We were in the observation lounge when a distraught Betty came rushing down with barely an explanation before plunging into the bowels of the ship. We were all sure Betty's glasses were somewhere in the river between Cologne and Strasburg. However, her luck held and she found them hanging by an earpiece on the lower rail of the ship. Since that time she checks her glasses chain religiously before going out on assignment.

Heavy rainfall noted for June

June brought bountiful rainfall to Ozona and Crockett County, with the largest amounts falling June 26-27. The total rainfall for the month amounted to 5.29 in the official gauge at the Water District office. However reports around the county varied with some areas reporting much more rainfall and others reporting less.

Last Wednesday morning, the bottom literally dropped out as good rainfall came on the heels of a front which afforded relief from some unusually hot weather. The rains started well before daylight and by 10 a.m. when it slacked off, a total of 2.35 inches had been recorded in the official gauge. Most home gauge owners reported at least 2.5 inches for the same rainfall. The Graves ranch near Pandale reported 4 inches of rain for the same period, while the Carl Malone ranch, in the general area had a 3-inch rainfall.

The following morning, Thursday, the official gauge recorded .90 of an inch in a heavy shower. Streets were flooded near the shopping center during both rains. Again most homeowners reported from an inch to 1.25

inches in their gauges. Rainfall amounts were varied with the western part of the county being on the big end of the rain. As a comparison, Tom Mitchell reported seven inches on his ranch southwest, while Dorothy Friend reported 1.66 for both days. The Friend ranch is down Taylor Box Road to the south and west. Bill Baggett, north of Ozona, reported good rainfall for both days.

June may go down as the drought-breaker month, as it recorded more rain than any other month this far. The rains fell almost weekly during the 30 days of June. June 2, came in with .13 of an inch; a total of 1.12 was recorded the morning of the 5th; on June 12, .56 of an inch was recorded, and June 24th came in with almost a quarter of an inch. An early morning shower brought .23 of an inch on that day, leading up to the heavy rains which fell later in the week.

Over the weekend and the first part of this week, temperatures began to spiral upwards and Ozonans were reminded that summer has only just begun. However, it was 83 degrees at 2 p.m. Tuesday with overcast skies.

Changes take place in local businesses

Several changes have taken place in Ozona business houses, the past few months.

New owners have taken over at the Adobe Min-Mart, and plan to completely remodel the facility. They plan a Grand Opening event following the remodeling.

Owner of the convenience store is Mike Walker of San Angelo. Richard Brown has moved to Ozona to manage the store.

The Montgomery-Ward catalog store, which was located in the village shopping center, and owned by Betty and Winston Koerth, closed its doors and merchandise was moved out last week.

L-B Motors was sold to a San Antonio group and will henceforth be

known as Buttery Motors. The new owners plan many changes, including painting and remodeling the building. They will continue to handle all General Motors cars. Jerry Lay will remain as dealer-operator and J. P. Pogue will head up car sales as usual. Diane Myers joins Pogue in the selling department and Max Schroeder has been hired as parts manager. Haley Anderson is working in the book-keeping department this summer.

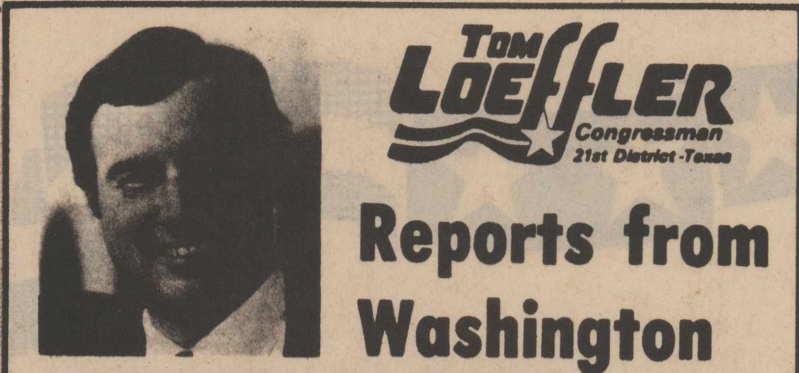
OJB and Magicland have ceased operations here and moved out of town. The Radio Shack franchise has also closed down.

Reports from Washington

International Espionage — The Threat From Within

Reports of the Walker family spy ring have stiffened the resolve of many of us in Congress — once and for all — deal with the growing problem of international espionage. In my view, this nation faces no greater threat to our security than a threat from within.

In a nation which places a high premium on individual freedoms, Congress has often found it difficult to pass laws effective in identifying, apprehending and punishing agents of espionage. For years, liberal members of the House and Judiciary Committee had blocked efforts to enact strong laws to address crime under the prosecutorial jurisdiction of the Federal government. Only after the wrath of the American public threatened to spill over into the November, 1984, election did enough moderates in the Congress join with conservatives to push through the Comprehensive Crime Control Act.

This year, armed with the "get tough" directives of the Crime Control Act, the FBI came before the Judiciary Committee of the House to request that additional agents and funds be authorized to combat crimes, including those committed by terrorists and spies. The same liberal majority which had blocked passage of the Crime Control Act for so many years refused to provide the necessary authority. The issue was recently raised to the attention of the full House of Representatives during consideration of the Supplemental Appropriations Act. The House was precluded from working its will and providing appropriations for crime control on procedural grounds since the Judiciary Committee had not yet acted on the authorization legislation. From a procedural standpoint, the House was correct in not funding the FBI request. From a policy standpoint, we were dead wrong.

With incidents of espionage and international terrorism increasing before our very eyes, it is imperative that the Congress live up to its constitutional mandate to protect the United States and its citizens from its enemies, both foreign and domestic. How can we expect our law enforcement agencies and intelligence organizations to be successful in their missions if we do not give them the necessary resources to do their jobs?

We in Congress are already taking steps to tighten our security net. I have cosponsored H.R. 1082, the Omnibus Intelligence and Security Improvements Act, which restores the death sentence as a potential penalty for espionage and treason. The bill establishes comprehensive, fair and constitutional procedures for imposing the death penalty upon those who intentionally jeopardize the security of the United States by committing acts of treason. I also support efforts to require counterintelligence polygraph tests for all those applying for security-sensitive positions within the Department of Defense, as well as random polygraph testing throughout the security ranks of DOD. According to our counterintelligence agents, such random testing would provide a strong deterrent to internal spying such as is alleged in the Walker case.

In my view, a clear deterrent may be the only real solution to the growing problem of international espionage. We must demonstrate to those who would sell the security of the United States for their own personal gain that such treason will not be tolerated. The war against international espionage is a war the United States cannot afford to lose.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—In these delicate days of budget peril due to dropping oil prices, several state officials are fighting for every cent due the Lone Star State. In recent days:

Garry Mauro challenged the Supreme Court to reconsider a controversial ruling he says could lose millions in future revenues to Texas schoolchildren.

—Texas Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace warned that conditions are ripe for another Arab oil embargo.

In June, the Texas Supreme Court gave shallow mineral rights on 817 acres to a Webb County property owner, a position opposite the state's long-standing claim of ownership.

But Mauro is challenging the high court to reconsider its decision, saying if applied statewide, it could eventually affect about seven million acres of land and the millions in

revenues which finance Texas public schoolchildren.

Mauro manages that fund, the Permanent School Fund, and warns that as much as \$918 million in future monies will be lost.

The Court's ruling changes the traditional interpretation of the 1895 Relinquishment Act, allowing the state to sell the surface but not the minerals of public lands. Since then, the state has divided all mineral income off Relinquishment Act lands 60-40 with the surface owner.

But the ruling would take from the state its heretofore assumed ownership of the shallow minerals, coal and lignite, and Mauro is arguing that the Supreme Court "has, given away the mineral rights to state land that the surface owner had never even paid for."

The case strikes near the heart of Texas' traditional mode of funding its public system, and the Texas legal world and several present and former state officials are much surprised, if not astounded, by the high court's decision.

Dropping oil prices are contributing to lower inflation, and if it weren't a Texas Railroad Commissioner sounding the warning, few would give heed to the thought of another oil embargo which caused high prices and long filling stations lines in 1973.

But Commissioner Mack Wallace is again warning of the folly of failing to plan for energy independence, and he's comparing today's conditions with those preceding 1973: foreign nations are flooding the U.S. with lower-priced, government-subsidized oil products and are driving American refineries out of business.

"I saw what happened in '73, and I don't want it to happen again. This is not a hollow threat. This is an economic war we are fighting now," Wallace said.

Texas comes out worse than any other state, bearing the brunt of decreased domestic production, closed refineries, loss of thousands of jobs.

Some oil industry spokesmen are predicting from \$4-\$8 billion in lost business for Texas by 1990. Domestic refineries would lose 63,000 American jobs.

Wallace says the free market isn't free, because nations like Libya and Saudi Arabia subsidize their refineries, which is why some Texans are calling for a tax or quota on foreign oil.

Skeptics may wish to recall that Wallace traveled the country with the same warning prior to the '73 crisis.

Believers can probably be readily found in Houston, where 35 percent of total employment is connected to oil and 120,000 jobs have been lost in the past 30 months. Area housing starts are down 47 percent, one-fourth of all Houston apartments are vacant, and some 37 million square feet of downtown office space is unrented.

White, Clements... Briscoe?

Former Gov. Bill Clements is happy about a movement to draft him to run against his old nemesis, Gov. Mark White, and White acted like he was happy, too.

Told of Clements' possible rematch challenge in '86, White said to reporters: "Come on, Bill! Come on, Bill!"

Clements, for his part, was flattered by the formation of a "Draft Clements Committee", but did not commit to a race. He has made no secret of his search for a GOP candidate to whip White, though.

But so far White has gotten the most fight from a Democrat, the second cousin of White's former boss, Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

Andrew Briscoe III, a Dallas businessman, criticized White for weak leadership, for raising taxes and for misleading voters about bringing lower utility rates.

White served as Secretary of State to Gov. Briscoe, also a strong supporter of White. The former governor was "a little hesitant" about the challenge.

Tips For Gardeners

From the
Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

The most welcome and best rains we have had in sometime should have pleased everyone and pep up our city folk as well as the ranchers.

Good green vegetation all summer really makes it cooler, cleaner, and a more beautiful countryside to enjoy. Of course we are hoping for more showers in July and August.

Artemisia (Dusty Miller) is the beautiful old fashioned plant grower for its silvery-gray foliage. A dwarf variety gives a quick edging to flower beds and borders and is an ideal contrast plant where brilliant colored flowers bloom. It should not be watered too liberally, and it likes a spot in the sun. Our hillsides are presenting an attractive display of the native variety along the highways and native landscapes. Also, it makes a very attractive dried plant for ar-

rangements. Gather it when it reaches its native height and hang it upside down to dry out.

Cut any material to use for arrangements the hottest part of the day, when it has the lowest moisture content. A drought year is an ideal time to dry plant material. Keep faded verbena blooms clipped to lengthen their blooming season.

Plant now for flowers in the late summer and late fall. You can sow the seeds of these annuals directly in the garden, or sit them out as transplants. Periwinkle, salvia, zinnias and moss rose do well here. Once the first leaves appear, thin them if necessary. To keep annuals blooming all summer, remove faded blossoms and seed pods. This will promote new growth and blooms.

A few tips to help cut flowers last longer:

Select flowers that are not yet fully open, cutting them in early morning or late afternoon. Use a sharp knife or garden shears for a clean, slanted cut. Remove foliage from any part of the stem that will be submerged, and place in a container of warm water. If not using right away, store them in the refrigerator after the water reaches room temperature. For best results, keep them away from direct sunlight or cool drafts.

It has been said July is the Thunder Moon of the Indians. After 30 years of residence in Ozona July first, I hope to have a repetition of that pleasant July and August with showers most every week. It seems as though we may.

Packing a Picnic To Go

Picnics usually mean that food will be packed up and not eaten until later on. This gives bacteria a great chance to grow-unless you are careful. Here are some tips to help you make sure your picnic travels well:

When preparing picnic foods, refrigerate cooked foods such as chicken, potatoes, and ham as soon as they stop steaming. Cooling foods to room temperature before chilling encourages bacterial growth. It's a good idea to prepare and refrigerate all perishable foods quickly. The shorter the time they are held at room temperature, the better.

Don't hold the mayo! Contrary to popular belief, the vinegar, lemon juice, and salt in commercially prepared mayonnaise actually help to protect foods against spoilage. For best results, add the mayo in the initial preparation, and in the amount the recipe calls for, when you make the sandwiches and salads.

Egg-rich foods such as custard and cream pies are not the best picnic foods. Save them for home entertaining, when you can serve them straight from the refrigerator.

All perishable foods should be chilled well before they are packed. Transport them to your picnic in an insulated container. For added protection, pack food with commercial frozen gel packets to keep the foods colder.

To help keep food as cold as possible, pack the foods you plan on using last at the bottom of the cooler, and the ones you want to serve first on top. Open the cooler only when necessary, and as little as possible.

Keep the food out of direct sun at all times. At the picnic, shade it under a tree.

Don't take home the leftovers. It's better to throw it out than to run the risk of food poisoning. Remember: Poisoned foods are not always obvious-the color, taste, and odor of the food may not change at all.

Crunchy Peanut Butter-Oatmeal Cookies

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon soda

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup uncooked regular oats
- 1/2 cup cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add peanut butter, egg, and milk; beat well. Combine dry ingredients; add to creamed mixture, mixing well. Chill 30 minutes.
- Shape dough into walnut-size balls; place on lightly greased cookie sheets. Press flat with a fork. Bake at 375° about 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Yield: 4 dozen cookies.

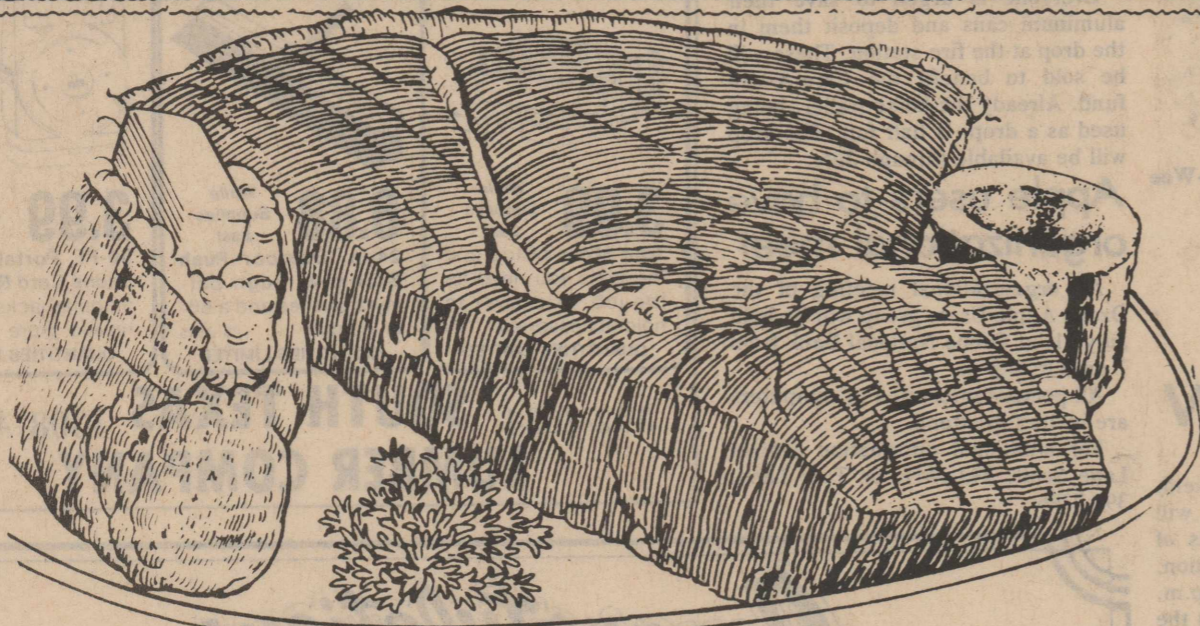
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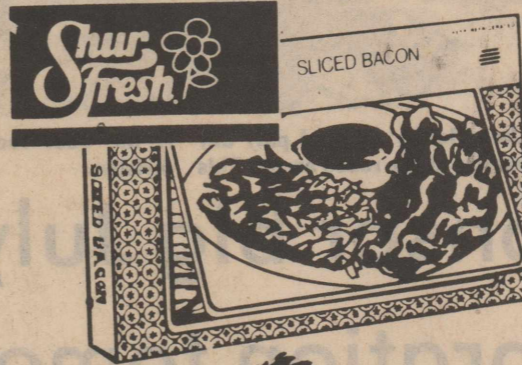

WTU asks to lower rates

West Texas Utilities Company filed a petition Tuesday with the Public Utility Commission of Texas asking permission to refund \$13.7 million in fuel costs savings and interest to its retail customers.

Steve Williams, local manager for WTU, said this action should save on utility bills locally, and probably lower the summer rates. This is the first year summer rates have gone into effect and with the unusually hot spring weather, local bills have shot up considerably.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the Company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available economy power

from other companies. As result, WTU has actually been able to spend less for power plant fuel than was anticipated when the fuel factors were established by the PUC.

The savings have accumulated since August 1984 when the fuel recovery account was last reconciled by the Commission. The total available for refunding includes \$12.6 million in actual savings, plus an estimated \$1.1 million in interest.

"We want to pass these savings on to our customers as quickly as possible in order to bring some relief during the season of hot weather and high utility bills," Churchill said. "While we are not yet due for a reconciliation, we are voluntarily asking permission to make refunds now."

Friends of Library organized

The Crockett County Public Library Board announced plans this week for formation of a Friends of the Library organization. All interested persons are invited to attend the organizational meeting to be held on Thursday, July 11, at 7:30 p.m. in the new library building at 705 Twelfth Street. This will be the first opportunity for the general public to view the renovated building.

The purpose of a Friends group is to promote the welfare of the library and to encourage all citizens to make fuller use of the opportunities their library offers. The group will be non-profit and non-policy making and will be open to everyone. Upon careful research of other communities in Texas, both large and small, it was discovered that many citizens like to participate in the life of the library. Some like to volunteer work hours, some prefer a financial contribution, and others prefer to do both. It is

hoped that the Crockett County Friends of the Library will be similar.

Membership will be divided into two categories: Active and Associate. Active members may wish to work on various projects for the group or be a volunteer aide at the Library. Associate members will be those who wish to support the Friends but are unable to donate volunteer time. The classifications and dues for membership include the following: Individual-\$5, Family-\$10, Supporting-\$15, Business firms, Organizations, and Civic Clubs-\$25, Patron-\$50, and Life-\$100.

It is anticipated that meetings will be held semi-annually and that the work of the organization will be carried out by various committees under the direction of the Executive Committee.

A witness to the accident said a slow moving vehicle pulled out from a side road in front of Jones and as Jones attempted to avoid collision, he lost

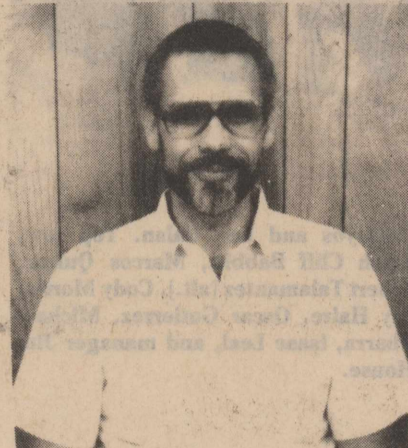
control and the pickup overturned. Jones suffered cuts and bruises. The other vehicle failed to stop.

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NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

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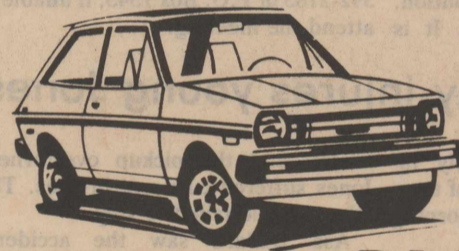
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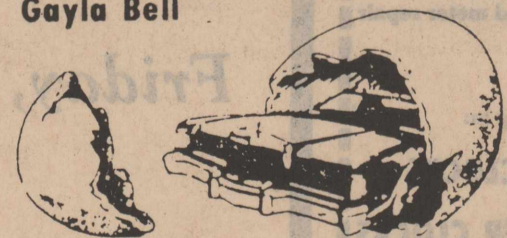
