A total of 970 students registered in all schools which includes 28 prekindergarten students. This is the first year the class has been offered and is for four-year-olds who meet certain requirements, such as economically deprived and English language defi-

A total of 246 registered at Ozona High School, with around 16 more students expected by opening day. Of this number, 75 were ninth graders; 71, tenth graders; 53 eleventh graders and 47 twelfth graders.

Registration figures at Ozona Junior High totaled 203, with 20 to 30 more students expected. Sixth graders numbered 66; seventh graders, 73; and eighth graders, 64.

A total of 245 students registered at Ozona Intermediate, with 12 or so more expected by opening day. The third and fourth grade registered 70 students in each grade, and fifth graders numbered 105.

Total registration at Ozona Primary was 276, including the 28 pre-kindergarteners. Eight to ten more students are expected to enroll. Kindergarteners numbered 95; first grade, 8, and second grade, 75.

High school and junior high students will begin classes at 8:05

p.m. Primary school students will begin at 8:10 a.m. with kindergarten dismissing at 2:00 p.m., first grade dismissing at 2:25 and second grade at 2:35. Pre-kindergarten will be 8:15 to 11:15, and 12:30 to 3:30.

October 11, will mark the end of the first six-weeks, November 22 is the end of the second six weeks and the first holidays will be November 28-29, for Thanksgiving. Christmas and New Year's holidays will be December 23, 1985 through January 1, 1986.

The third six-weeks and the first semester will end January 16, with a student holiday planned January 17, when the staff will conduct a planning workday.

Spring break will be February 24-28, with the fourth six-weeks ending March 6. The first Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers will take place March 10, and students will have a holiday that day. March 28, has been designated as the Easter Holiday and April 18, will mark the end of the fifth six-weeks.

April 21, has been set aside as a statewide holiday, Texas Sesquicentennial Day, and will be a holiday for students and teachers.

Baccalaureate will be held May 25, and the sixth six-weeks and second semester will end May 29. Graduation of 1986 seniors will be held May 30.

#### Hoover multipay gains a producer

The Hoover multipay field of Crockett County gained its current seventh Queen oil producer and a 3 7/8mile southeast extension to that pay with completion of J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, No. 1 University 29-8, 26 miles west of Ozona, to pump 198.8 barrels of 31 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 201-1.

Production was through perforations at 1,666-971/2 feet, which had been acidized with 1,150 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 77,000 pounds of sand.

Originally scheduled as a 2,500 foot wildcat, it was drilled to 1,801 feet, where 4½-inch casing was set.

#### STOP TAXING THE POOR

Many opponents of President Reagan's proposed tax-reform plan have condemned it as just another big payoff to the rich—the old class-warfare

Just 5.8 percent of the country's households had incomes above 50,000 in 1982. Yet, these people collectively paid 35.6 percent of all

personal income taxes collected that year, some \$98.97 billion. Because the 1981 tax cuts stimulated an explosive burst of entrepreneurial investment, the wealthy have actually been paying more than before

the tax rates were cut. What we really should be asking is not how the proposed tax-reform plan will affect those who already have made it, but how it will affect the less fortunate, especially the working poor. And in this respect, the

administration has earned bragging rights. Careful analysis of the plan shows that without exception those living at or below the edge of poverty will receive an important boost from the new tax regime. A single pension without any dependents, for example, will be able to earn 37 percent more under the plan—\$4,900, rather than

the current \$3,560—before having to pay taxes. What does this mean to a young person right out of high school, earning the \$3.25-per-hour minimum wage on his or her first job? It means he or she probably will earn \$3,900 or so that first year, assuming a 40hour work week from June through December.

Under the current law Uncle Sam would claim a share. Under the proposed plan, however, Uncle Sam wouldn't be entitled to anything that first year. While not a lot of money would be involved, every cent counts

for a young person just starting out. Married couples also would be able to earn 37 percent more, with the tax-free ceiling increasing from \$5,830 to \$8,000. If opponents of the president's tax plan can find something wrong with that, I'd like to know what it is.

How about "real" families? Current law has a married couple with two dependents paying taxes as soon as combined family income reaches \$9,575, though the government's poverty threshold for such a family is \$11,400. So we have the spectacle of the federal government taxing a poor family into continued poverty, which is about as illogical and inefficient as anything I can think of. The tax reform plan would end this

The really big winners from the tax reform plan—despite the class warfare talk from AFL-CIO headquarters and elsewhere—are families. The very real increases in the "zero-bracket" amount that people can earn before the tax meter starts running and the doubling of the personal and dependent exemptions would redress some of the inequities now faced by single heads-of-household and large families. This marks a significant and laudable shift in tax policy

Research shows that the majority of families would see their taxes fall under the plan, with the poorest families benefiting the most. This is a major plus.

Still the bill passed. Then the governor actually signed it into law at a press conference, and some speculated it was his biggest political mistake yet, big-

Blue Law, Fees

The blue law will officially end next week, and Sunday shopping is expected to increase as more retailers stay open that day.

Also in effect will be a new law forbidding an employer to make his help work seven straight days. Employers must allow time off for religious worship.

**Abortion Law** 

The new abortion law will require abortion clinics to file annual reports to the Health Department and to submit to periodic inspections by the agency.

The new reporting rules will require clinics to record personal statistics on each patient, the type of abortion and other related information.

The annual fee for an abortion clinic can legally be set as high as \$1,000 by the Health Department. Because the Legislature provided no start-up money for the Health Department, it must first collect the fees in order to finance the onsite inspections.

Do not pinch out tops any later, as they should be ready to set buds. These buds should not be pinched or rubbed out as the large mums, but left to form a mass of blooms.

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





Anyone who wants to file a claim for benefits, get information, or transact, other business with the Social Security Administration may contact him at this time.



#### Vignettes Remembering some stories heard over the years in Ozona BY EVART WHITE

WHEN WE SNOOKERED THE SNIPER Summertime is baseball time--anytime, anywhere.

Of course, it's fun to sit in the cool living room and watch 'America's Team' (The Atlanta Braves) and the Chicago Cubbies, and occasionally the Astros, the Yankees, The San Francisco Giants, etc. play baseball.

But that's not like getting out in the sun, going to the stadium or park and watching your favorite team match it with some hated rival. Sure, you come home with a sunburn, a hoarse voice, and a never to be matched thrill if your team won. If they didn't it still was fun--and "we'll get those bums next time, watch and see.'

Baseball once was BIG in Ozona; back in the thirties and later when we had a semi-pro club and matched games every weekend with similar teams both here and there in Sonora, Eldorado, San Angelo, Texon, Fort Stockton and others. The Ozona Giants, we were, and sometimes we felt just that big. We had some mighty fine ball players among our home town recruits and we added to that strength by recruiting some ex-big leaguers, class D players and amateurs that were goodies.

We had little trouble holding our own with teams from Sonora, Eldorado, San Angelo, etc. but the Texon Oilers--they were a different kind of headache. The Big Lake Oil Co., which operated the prolific Texon oil field following its Santa Rita discovery in about 1925, fielded a semi-pro baseball team to make life more bearable for the oil field workers it recruited for the rapidly expanding field.





As you know I have served this county as its sheriff for eight years and eight months, and I wish to assure you that I appreciate the splendid cooperation that the Commissioners' Court has given me..."

Thus Sheriff Mills became Ranger Mills in which capacity he served just as faithfully and effectively.

Frank Mills was not only a fair and just sheriff, but he was very popular and well known. He won the elections of 1928, 1930, 1932, 1934, and 1936 by a total vote of 15,610 compared to his opponents' 6,016. He was able to improve the conditions under which he and his men worked. From a salary of \$83.33 per month plus fees he was able to get the pay scale raised to \$3,000 per year plus fees by the time he left office. He was even successful in getting the Commissioners' Court to purchase part interest in the cars he used during his tenure. His chief deputy was receiving \$100 per month by the end of 1937. He was able, too, to secure a 75c food allowance per day along with a 15c lodging grant per prisoner. Added to this was an allocation of \$50 per month for guard hire. Not only was Mills able to improve salaries, etc., but people gained a greater respect for the sheriff's office and law and order.

Frank Mills made a pledge to the voters in his first public statement as a candidate for sheriff. That statement read in part, "The only promise I care to make is, if elected, I will do my best to see that the law is enforced without fear or favor, and all violators are brought to justice...Indeed these promises were faithfully, kept as there were eight murders and sixteen robberies with firearms committed during his tenure. All of these were solved. Thus, Mr. Mills gained the reputation for never having failed to get his man in a murder case or bank ro

To vouch for his reputation Sheriff and Police said of Mills: "He is a fearless, dignified man, claiming no personal honors...one of the outstanding law enforcement officers of Texas. a man with an enviable record and a highly esteemed officer." The periodical went on to say, "He is a real sheriff..." Indeed he was!

Even though this story dealt only with the highlights of Frank Mills' life as sheriff of Coleman County, he continued his same good work as a Texas Ranger and special investigator for many more years. He showed the same relentlessness, faithfulness and loyalty in this service as he did as sheriff. Those who are familiar with law enforcement history in Texas will long remember Frank Mills--West Texas Lawman.

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
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
