## Lions to open football season at Greenwood

The Ozona Lions will open the football season Friday night, Sept. 6, in Greenwood. They hosted a very tough McCamey squad Friday evening at Lion Stadium to close out the pre-season scrimmages. Coach Jim Green continues to be pleased with his team's hard work and determination, and is looking forward to opening the season Friday.

McCamey brought a very good ball club to Ozona, and fans got a good chance to see how the Lions would match up with some tough competition. The team and coaches are optimistic about the coming season.

The varsity team found their opposition as tough as anyone they will face the rest of this season. Both teams came out very aggressive and played good hard football. McCamey knew they were in a fight from the first play as Ozona dropped them for a loss on an outside sweep. McCamey did not score until their sixteenth play of the game when they capitalized on a five yard run, and once again on their twenty-sixth play when they capped off a drive with a two-yard carry.

The Lion defense kept the McCamey offense pretty well contained throughout the night by not giving up any long plays and making the Badgers sustain long drives. McCamey brought in a powerful offense that had rolled at will the week before but they soon found that in Lion country you work for every yard you gain. The Badgers attack was both on the ground and in the air so the Lions got a good chance to work on all aspects of their defensive game. Harvey Fierro had another good game defensively in the backfield as did David Adams and Roger Flores. The front line played well up against a much larger line on the average and helped to control McCamey's running game.

Offensively the Lions were able to move the ball but not as effectively as they would like. McCamey had a real good defense as they kept the Lions from scoring throughout the contest. Ozona was unable to put together any long drive but they did move the ball on the Badgers. Chuy Hernandez carried the ball five times for forty-four yards to lead the Lions and Valdo Galindo rushed four times for six yards. Ozona turned the ball over only two times in both outings combined once on an interception and the other on a fumble.

The evening started off with the Jr. Varsity and freshman ballclubs scrimmaging. The Jr. Varsity finished up even with McCamey as both teams were able to score once. Ozona's score came on an exciting seventy yard run by Sophomore Sub Fierro that accounted for the longest gain of the

evening for any team. Oscar Payne also had a good night carrying the ball for the Lions as did quarterback Derold Vargas. The Jr. Varsity defense also played very well as they held the Badgers to only one score and no big plays. Coach David Porter was very pleased with the effort he received from his players and is expecting them to continue to im-

prove throughout the season.

Fans are urged to come out and support the Lions as they begin the '85 season.

## Hearing set for proposed budget for Ozona schools

There will be a public hearing on the proposed 1985-86 budget for the Crockett County Common School District at the regular meeting of the school board, Sept. 10, at 7:30 p.m. in the board room at the administration building.

Although all phases of the budget were cut, the total surpasses the 1984-85 budget due to items mandated by House Bill 72. State aid to the Crockett County District amounted to

\$683,100 last year, and will amount to \$278,100 for this budget.

Legislators claimed pride in the fact they did not raise state taxes in the final session, however, local property owners will feel the brunt of their actions when they get their school tax bill.

The school tax rate will not be set until the budget is approved after the hearing, but an increase is sure to come, and officials fear steeper increases for future years.

## Services here today for victim of vehicle accident

Funeral services for Matilda Castellanos, 19, are scheduled for 10 o'clock this morning at Templo Bautista Church with the Reverends Mateo Rendon Jr. and Pedro Estrada officiating, burial to follow in Lima Cemetery under the direction of Sizemore Funeral Home.

Miss Castellanos died at 11:22 a.m. in a Lampasas hospital, the result of injuries received in a one-vehicle accident which occurred at 8 o'clock Monday morning north of Lometa. The 1984 Datsun pickup in which she

was a passenger ran off the road, hit a culvert and rolled over three times, throwing Miss Castellanos from the truck.

She was born July 3, 1966 in Chicago, Ill. She had been an Ozona resident most of her life and was a 1984 graduate of Ozona High School.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Juan Castellanos Jr.; a brother, Jaime Castellanos; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Juan Castellanos, and her maternal grandfather, Alberto Longoria, all of Ozona.

## County benefits from new bank franchise tax

Last week, Bob Bullock, state comptroller sent checks totaling \$61.6 million from the first collection of the state's new financial tax on banks to 1,996 local taxing jurisdictions.

A total of \$42,249.71 was rebated through the taxing jurisdictions in Crockett County. Of this total, \$17,269.19 went to Crockett County and \$24,980.52 to the school district.

In a special session last year, the Legislator brought banks under the franchise tax for the first time and

allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other taxing units where the banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other Texas corporations. Previously, bank stocks were subject to local property taxes. The Legislator exempted the stocks from property taxes, substituting the new bank franchise tax. Collections are prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

## New laws to change habits

Hundreds of new state laws took effect September 1, but only two in particular will change the habits of many Ozonans—mandatory auto seat belt use and repeal of the Sunday-closing Blue Law.

It may be some time before the effects of those laws are felt. Fines backing up the seat belt law won't start until December 1, and so far only one Ozona retail outlet has been open for business on Sunday.

Perry Bros. was open Sunday afternoon from 12:30 until 5:30. Store manager Jorge Briones said the opening was well-received by local people and the store enjoyed a brisk business during these hours. He fully expects the store will be open on Sundays in the future.

The Texas Blue Law, which was stricken from the state's law books Sept. 1, has a varied and uphill-downhill history.

The controversial law was made during the Civil War. In 1863 the states' lawmakers passed the first legislation restricting activity on Sundays. The first Blue Law banned all labor on Sunday and hunting within one-half mile of any church.

It was gradually amended through the years to allow some labor and sporting activities.

In 1961, the modern Blue Law was born. Texas lawmakers identified 42 items that could not be sold on

consecutive Saturdays and Sundays. In 1964, the Texas Supreme Court rules that emergency purchases were exempt from the Blue Law. Suddenly, seeing a chink in the armor, discount stores began handing out emergency certificates at checkout counters. Toys and radios became emergency items.

The Texas Legislature closed the loophole in 1967. A person could purchase beer on Sunday, but not a baby bottle.

In 1977 the Texas Supreme Court rejected claims that the Blue Law was unconstitutional because it was being enforced in a discriminatory manner. In 1979 the legislature considered repeal, but decided against it. In 1981, that body shunned calls for Blue Law repeal.

In 1981, State District Judge Dee Brown Walker of Dallas struck down the Blue Law, declaring it obsolete, unenforceable and unconstitutional. The ruling applied to Dallas only.

In 1982, the state of Massachusetts struck down its Blue Law, the oldest in the nation at 352 years. However, in 1983 the Texas Legislature again nixed the repeal effort.

Rulings were overturned and upheld throughout 1984, but in October of 1984, a poll released by Texas A&M showed Texans favored repeal by

## Reports from Washington

### WHAT'S GOOD FOR SMALL BUSINESS IS GOOD FOR AMERICA

The corner drugstore, the farm equipment dealer, or the local trucking firm are businesses that mean a lot to our communities, because they serve local needs and employ local people. But they're also important to the rest of America, because small businesses are the backbone of our economy.

Fourteen million small businesses in America employ nearly half the nation's work force, and generate 38 percent of our gross national product. When small businesses grow, they create most of the new jobs in this country, and smaller firms also produce many of the new ideas that help to revitalize our economy.

President Reagan's recent annual report to Congress on the state of small business in America shows the role of small business in putting people to work, pioneering new areas of research and development and keeping the economy growing.

From March 1984 to March 1985, employment in industries dominated by small firms grew twice as fast as employment in large business-dominated industries, for example. An estimated two million of the three million new jobs generated in the past year were generated by small firms. In the West South Central region dominated by Texas, employment in small firms grew by 34.6 percent over the past six years, greater than any other area but the mountain states.

If the national economy is to continue growing steadily, a strong factor in that growth will be the number of new businesses created each year. Last year, a record 634,991 new businesses sprang up, and the vast majority of these were small businesses. In the fastest growing areas of our economy — services, trade and transportation — small businesses were responsible for a great deal of that growth.


Small businesses have even begun revitalizing our nation's older industries that some economists view as "sunset" areas of our economy. For example, from 1976 to 1982, small manufacturing firms with fewer than 100 employees represented less than 20% of employment in manufacturing, but they produced 87.4% of the new jobs in manufacturing.

Innovation is critical to economic success. Small businesses trail large businesses slightly in the number of overall innovations, but they provide more innovations per million employees than large firms. That shows that smaller firms generate more new ideas for the same labor investment than larger companies. In small business, you run lean or you don't survive.

When you consider the factors that have conspired against small business in the past — regulatory intrusion by government, tax rates that bordered on the confiscatory, and double-digit interest rates — it is amazing that so many have survived. As the President's report illustrates, small business has not only survived, it is thriving, because our nation's entrepreneurial spirit is so resilient and because President Reagan has initiated policies to restore a national economic climate in which enterprise and initiative are rewarded.

As your representative in Congress, I have supported regulatory reform, lower taxes and responsible fiscal policies, because I want small business to continue chalking up its excellent record of new jobs, new business and new ideas.

It doesn't take a Ph.D. in economics to understand that those three factors are a pretty good signpost to economic health. Small business is not only the backbone of our economy, it is our future. If we keep it healthy, we will keep our economy healthy.

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—Last week, as school doors prepared to open for the fall term, Texas seemed to be coming out on the short end of the stick in several ways: too few teachers, too many pupils, and too little financial aid.

Public school students will be facing some of the most far-reaching reforms in Texas education this fall, a phase that includes smaller class sizes, new programs for younger students, tougher graduation requirements, and higher standards. And, of course, no pass-no play.

They are also facing a teacher shortage, considered by many Texas educators to be a by-product of the new reforms.

Teachers will also face tougher standards in the form of a competency test, a controversial test that teachers bitterly opposed at the Legislature.

But it's the other measures that are forcing school districts to hire thousands of new teachers.

### Years To Come?

The lack of "new hires" is causing Texas educators to fear a shortage of teachers this fall, and school districts are scrambling to fill their slots, even recruiting across the country.

Also, the increase in the number of Texas kids who will need an education, is also increasing the need for more teachers.

Some have dubbed it the "baby boomlet," and it means the teacher shortage will probably be a problem for years to come.

The Baylor University education dean predicted the shortage will last into the "mid 1990s, at least."

### No Pass, No Teach

The ranks of incoming teachers is decreasing. In the past year, universities and colleges have screened their students

with a basic skills test required to enter a teacher training program. About 35 percent have failed the test.

The teacher competency exam is expected to fail more, but Texas is not producing enough new teachers to fill the vacancies. Some 11,000 teachers leave every year, and we train only 6,000 to replace them.

### New Changes

Some of the new changes we will see in the '85-'86 terms:

- **NO PASS, NO PLAY:** This fall will be the first time this controversial rule has been applied to high school football players.

- **NUMERICAL GRADES:** Students must be graded with a number, not a letter.

- **MORE MATH:** High School sophomores will have to take an additional year of math to graduate.

- **STATE AID:** Poorer school districts will receive more state aid, at the expense of many suburban districts which will probably raise taxes.

- **SMALLER CLASS SIZES:** The maximum size is 22 students for first and second grade classes.

- **TESTING:** High school juniors will be given an exit exam to graduate. Teachers and administrators must pass a basic literacy test by June to keep their jobs.

- **PASSING AVERAGE:** Students must have a 70 average to pass to a higher grade. The practice of promoting students on basis of age is meant to be eliminated.

- **DISCIPLINE:** Officials have broader authority to crack down on discipline problems, particularly drugs or weapons in schools. School districts must open guidance centers to cope with problem

students.

### Minority Teachers

Potential minority teachers are doing poorly on the teacher training exams.

Only 203 of 900 black students and 732 of 2,136 Hispanic students have passed the pre-professional skills test which college students must pass before being allowed to take upper-level education courses.

With a third of their potential students hampered there, minority groups have started a "stay in school" program, and they have charged the tests are racially biased.

Last week, federal judge William Wayne Justice agreed and ordered Texas colleges to admit all upper-level students who would have been qualified but for failing the test.

Texas Education Commissioner William Kirby said the problem was not in the test, but in the basic education received by minority students. The state may appeal the ruling.

### Short Takes

- The Texas Department of Health reports locating 63 abortion clinics operating in Texas as part of its effort to implement new standards for those and other facilities involved in medical and health related services.

- Sen. Bill Sarpalius, D-Canyon, is reportedly trying to decide whether to run for Agriculture Commissioner or to oppose U.S. Rep. Beau Boulter, R-Amarillo. Sarpalius says he is not switching parties.

- Comptroller Bob Bullock says he expects a "mild improvement" in the Texas economy, despite problems in the oil industry. Bullock notes that for 25 years, oil taxes have been the No. 2 revenue source, but have dropped to No. 6 for the '86-'87 biennium.

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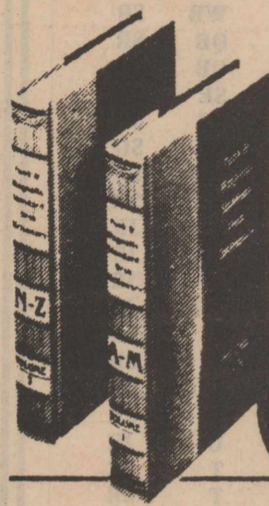

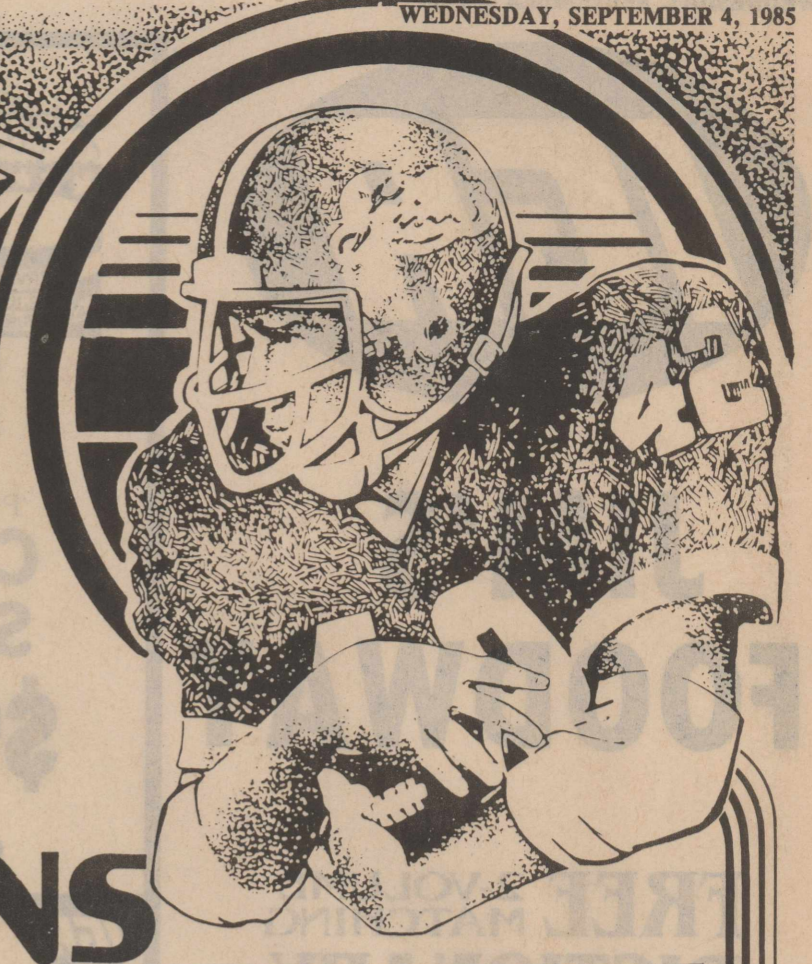

### Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

It seems too early for fall to be here, but it seems time marches on so fast. This is the season to start planting bluebonnets especially. This will ensure a higher germination rate if you plan to plant them. I usually just throw the seeds on our hillside and they came up without really planting them.

September is a good time to take cuttings from broad-leaved trees and shrubs—both evergreen and deciduous. Cut sections 3 to 6 inches long, leaving about 1/2 inch of stem below a leaf node. Strip off all the leaves except the top 2 or 3. Dip the base of each cutting into a rooting hormone. Stick the cuttings into a moist mixture of equal parts of sphagnum peat moss and perlite. Place them in a greenhouse or cold frame, or cover container with clear plastic. Place in bright, indirect light. They should root in 4 to 6 weeks. Keep sheltered during the winter, then plant when you see new growth in early spring.

Have you seen the red periwinkle. It is new so be on the lookout for it. It is called Pink Panther. It is such a deep pink that it seems to be red. At this time it is not easy to find, but you may want to look in the nurseries.

If you have a Christmas cacti, it should be placed where they will receive light, but not in hard, direct sunlight. Also they need water on a regular basis but not over watered. If your houseplants spent the summer outdoors, they may need repotting now.

I notice they are having the same trouble with pecan crops down here, partly due to very little rain here in Houston. Most of the way pastures looked very dry. Many trees are dropping leaves like it is Fall.

I think I gave some tips for watering, but guess it won't hurt to repeat. Water late, forget that nonsense about wet leaves promoting fungus ailments. In the evening the temperature is lower, so evaporation is less. Use drippers, drop by drop irrigation system uses 90% less water and puts it exactly where it is needed. Water deep—a light sprinkling, except for azaleas, does more harm than good. Roots come up to get water, stay close to the surface where they dry out faster. Let your hose trickle slowly around trees. Or use a soaker hose.

Have to get this out for the mail man.

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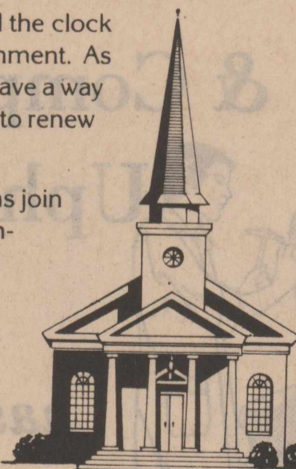
### Take Five

nearly a three to one margin, and in May of 1985 the Texas Legislature voted to repeal the Blue Law act effective Sept. 1, and Governor Mark White signed the measure into law.

The new seat belt law states that anyone in the front seat of a moving automobile or pickup must be wearing a seat belt. State troopers will first issue warning tickets, but after December 1, persons not wearing seat belts will be fined from \$25 to \$50. Gov. Mark White said he was "reluctant" to sign the law, but later did television spots urging Texans to "buckle up." Sponsors said the law will save more than 1,000 lives a year.

State officials estimate the repeal of the Blue Law, will bring additional sales tax revenue of \$24 to \$40 million annually.

HB 72 does allow a very limited number of days in which the school day may be shortened. We plan to use one of these days for the Ballinger game. The pep rally for the Ballinger game will be held at approximately 3:15 p.m.

There will be a Thursday night pep rally held for the Homecoming game against Eldorado.

# Season opens with few birds

Dove season in Crockett County opened Sunday morning and will run through October 30. Crockett County is in the Central Zone which extends from Highway 90 from Del Rio west and from Interstate 20 from Texarkana to Van Horn.

So far hunters have not fared well in this area due to the scarcity of dove. Bag limit this year is 12 dove to include no more than two whitewings and two whitetips but as many as 12

mourning dove. Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. There will be another dove season for the Central Zone January 4-13, 1986.

There is no whitewing season but hunters are allowed two mistake kills in the total bag limit. However, persons who expect to hunt in areas populated by the whitewing dove should take the precaution of purchas-

ing a white-winged dove stamp. Each whitewing killed must be tagged with one of these stamps.

The whitewing dove stamp may be purchased for \$6. Resident hunting license are \$10, combination hunting and fishing \$15, resident hunting exempt \$6, general non-resident hunting \$200, and non-resident small game hunting \$75. Stamps and licenses are available at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices.

#### Working Women

As more and more women joined the job force during the 60's and 70's many people predicted the downfall of the American family. In reality, hundreds of research studies of working mothers and their families show little impact from outside employment.

In general, a mother's full-time employment does not harm a child. Studies show virtually no difference in school achievement and social adjustment between children of working mothers and those of non-working mothers. Even during the often-troubled teenage years, a mother's employment alone seems to have little impact on youth.

There are some job related factors which can impact the working woman and her family. Six are listed:

The quality of substitute care for young children. It's difficult for a mother to find satisfaction in her job if she's worried about the care of her children.

The supervision of older children. Working mothers may be concerned about older children's after school activities especially if it is spent alone.

The mother's attitude toward her work. If she doesn't like her job, that attitude will show and affect family attitudes toward her working outside the home.

The attitude of her husband and her children toward the job. If they feel "cheated" because they don't have enough time with mother, that can cause problems.

Job demands. A woman who has a very demanding job may have less energy for family support activities--especially if she receives little or no support from family members.

Ability and willingness of family members to help. When family members are not able or willing to take on household chores, it can overburden the working woman and create less time for family members.

According to Gray, 550 hamburgers were sold during the scrimmage against McCamey Thursday night. He did not have a total on the amount made by the Booster Club.

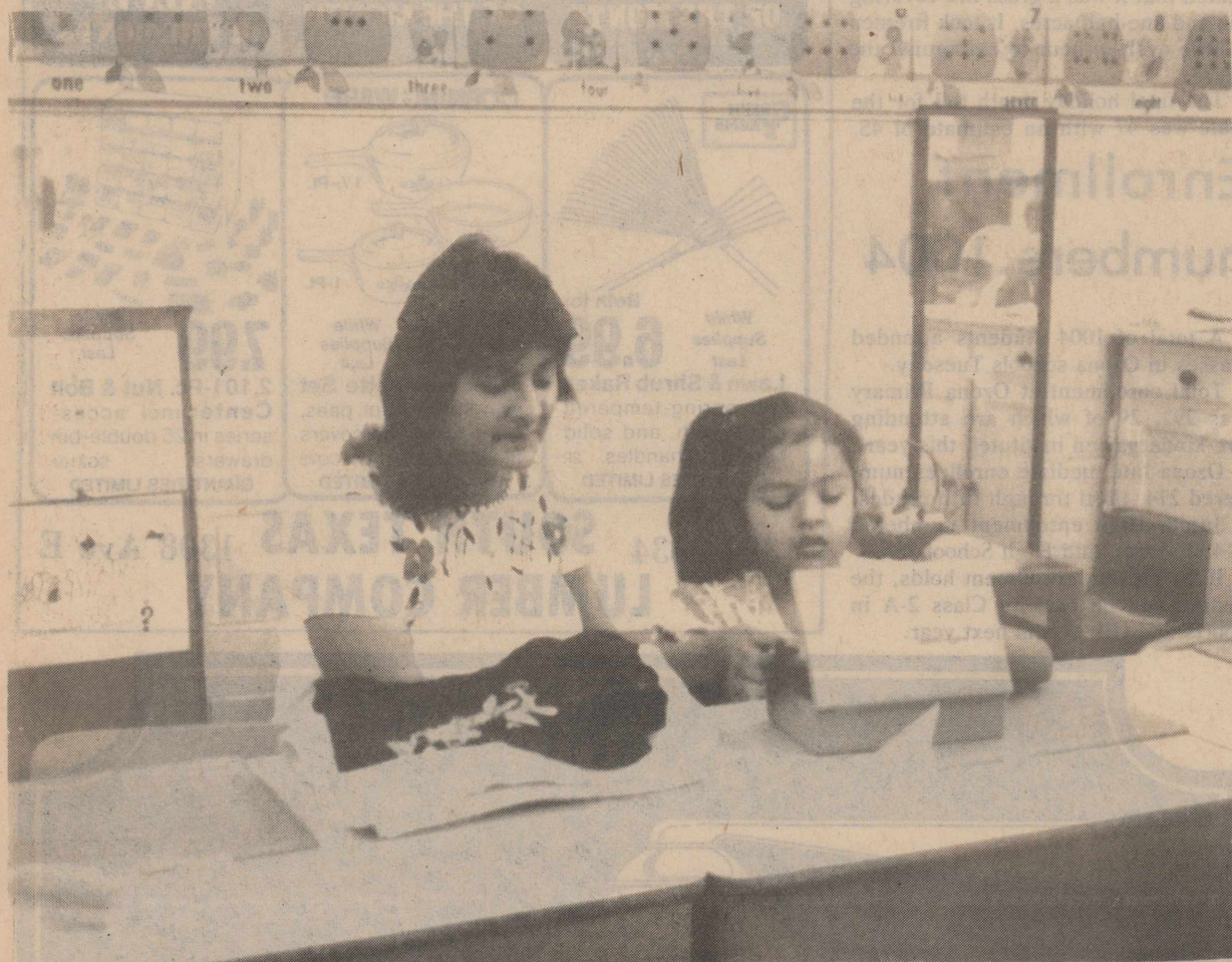

## UGH! I CAN'T EAT THAT GOAT MEAT

Ozona's Fourth of July Celebration and Rodeo events, which persisted through drought times and good times, drew visitors from all over Texas and from other states as well. The competition was keen among sheep breeders all over the nation and the stock show drew entries from many far away states. But that's another story.

This is about the barbecue dinners that were served in the city park. It consisted of barbecued goat, cowboy beans, onions, pickles, iced tea, and bread. Bob Cooke barbecued the meat and cooked the beans. Other volunteers fixed the iced tea, provided the light bread, pickles, etc.

Ranchmen and business men volunteered to serve the seething crowds (attendance approached 10,000 visitors each summer). One well known Crockett County rancher button-holed

John Bailey, one of the servers, and confided: "John, you know I can't eat goat meat. It makes me sick invariably. Would you pick me out a good piece of beef?"

"Sure," said John and searching in the giant container came up with a meaty piece of barbecue. "Here you are," John said and placed a morsel on the rancher's plate. He was duly grateful and wandered to the shade of a tree to enjoy his meal.

In a short while he was back and again in a confidential voice said, "John, that was the best piece of barbecue I ever ate." "Could you find me another piece of beef?" "I'll try," said John and again dug in his container and came up with another meaty morsel. The tender stomached rancher again was grateful, and bragged to John about the delicious beef barbecue for days.

It wasn't beef at all it was goat.

# Incidents and accidents over holiday weekend

Incidents and accidents occurring over the Labor Day weekend kept Ozona Volunteer Firemen and Crockett County law enforcement officials busy from Thursday night through Monday afternoon.

Robert Stone, a truck driver, was transferred from Crockett County Hospital Thursday night to Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo following a small explosion when he took the lid off a gas tank. The incident took place at Circle Bar Truck Corral. Witnesses at the scene said that diesel vapors shot up into the air as high as the trailer of the truck and Stone was in a position to receive the full impact of the vapor pressure when it was released.

According to Steve Kenley, local fire marshal, Stone was taken to San Angelo because he was wheezing as a result of the inhalation of the fumes.

Friday morning a truck fire occurred 11 miles east of Iraan on Highway 190. Rusty Coleman of Hondo, driver of the truck, abandoned the vehicle after its motor quit and overheated. He hitchhiked into Iraan in search of a wrecker. After Coleman left the scene, the truck caught fire and exploded completely destroying the tractor. Through the efforts of the Iraan Fire Department, the trailer and the load was saved. Coleman was transporting two U.S. Army vehicles, a blazer and a two and one-half ton truck.

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department also answered the call but the blaze was extinguished before local firemen arrived.

Saturday morning at 2:57 the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, the Crockett County Sheriff's Department, and two local D.P.S. officers responded to a call from the Circle Bar Truck Corral after another truck driver noticed what appeared to be smoke coming from the rear of his truck. The truck was loaded with approximately 56 drums of toxic chemicals. One drum of ammonia hydroxide had begun to emit fumes, causing the smoking appearance. Ammonia hydroxide cannot be carried in closed containers due to the humidity.

While firemen were unloading the drums it was discovered that one drum containing nitric acid was actually leaking. The chemical was neutralized and the drum plugged. During this process, firemen had to wear all of their protective equipment because of the danger of inhalation of toxic

vapors. After the truck was reloaded, there were no further problems and the driver proceeded to his destination in El Paso.

According to Fire Marshal Kenley, at least one-third of the Ozona Volunteer Firemen have up to or more than 100 hours of hazardous material training and are continually training in that area.

Saturday morning two persons were transported to Crockett County Hospital by ambulance following a traffic accident on Interstate 10.

Trophenia Pelt was driving a jeep when it apparently rolled over at Mile Marker 350 located 15 miles west of Ozona. Dawn Chitty was a passenger in the Jeep. The accident occurred at approximately 5:30 a.m. and was investigated by D.P.S. Trooper Neil Lovorn who reported Monday that the injured parties were still in Crockett County Hospital.

Monday afternoon the fire department answered a call to the Kwik Marc where a fluorescent bulb was smoking.

Firemen answered a call Tuesday at 12:21 p.m. to the Vaughn Ranch. A spokesman for the fire department stated that it was a grass fire covering six and one-half acres. It took firemen a little over an hour to extinguish the blaze.

The final holiday death toll for the state was 47 with an estimate of 45.

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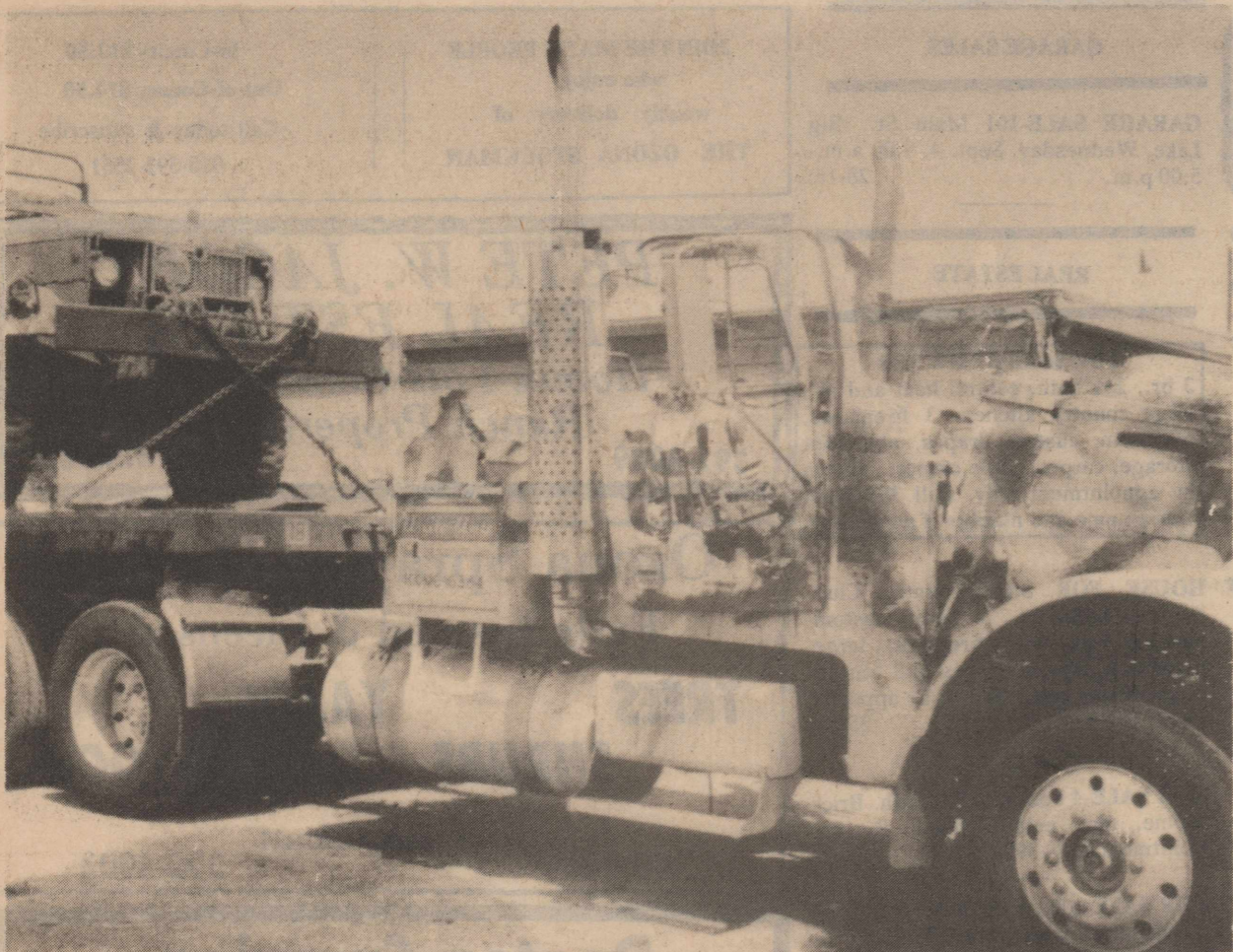
