Christmas closings here this week

Most of Ozona is observing the Christmas holiday this week. Schools were dismissed Friday and will reconvene January 2, 1986 at the regular hour.

County offices will close this afternoon and will not re-open until Monday. Banking facilities will close at 2 p.m. today and open at regular hours Thursday. The Water District office is closed today and tomorrow. Energas will close at noon today and West Texas Utilities will be closed tomorrow only.

The Ozona Stockman office will close today at noon and open at regular hours Thursday. Most retail outlets will close for the holiday, but open at the regular hours Thursday.

Exceptions are Watson's, which will close today for the Christmas holiday and re-open December 30, Happy Hollow will remain closed until January 2, and Baker Jewelers will close Christmas Day and the day after.

A survey indicates only one day will be taken for the New Year holiday and that will be Wednesday, January 1.

Winter comes early to Ozona this year

Winter officially began Saturday, but Ozona has had its share of winter weather all month. Record low temperatures have plagued the area and heavy morning fog and frost has set in almost daily.

For the past week temperatures have been near normal for the season, but earlier in the month lows of 15 and 16 degrees were reported. There has been no precipitation with the Arctic fronts, so the exceptionally cold weather has not affected ground travel.

New hospital administrator gives views on decertification

Bill Boswell, recently appointed administrator for Crockett County Hospital, submitted some facts about the Medicare decertification he said he felt would clear up some confusion about the recent action by the board.

The Medicare and Medicaid program will no longer pay for the hospitalization of Medicare or Medicaid patient after December 31, 1985 except in cases of extreme emergencies where actual life or limb is threatened. A physician can admit a non-emergency Medicare or Medicaid patient to the hospital, however, the patient must agree to pay the bill himself/herself, Boswell said.

As soon as the hospital receives its designation as a Medicare approved

non-participating emergency hospital; all emergency diagnostic and therapeutic outpatient tests will be paid for by Medicare Part "B".

According to Boswell, the Crockett County Hospital has already made application for the designation and the designation as a non-participating emergency hospital should be forthcoming.

Crockett County citizens who have commercial hospital insurance will not be affected. Private insurance companies will pay as long as the hospital is licensed by the state. Crockett County Hospital will retain its state hospital license.

Getting out of the Medicare/Medicaid program is not necessarily perm-

anent. It is no harder to get back into the program than it is to stay in the program, Boswell assured those who are concerned.

The Medicare conditions of participation were written to cover all hospitals whatever the size. This means that a 10-bed hospital must meet the same requirements as the 1000-bed hospital in order to participate in the Medicare program. As the Medicare program began tightening up the requirements, it became difficult if not impossible for smaller hospitals to comply.

By becoming a non-participating emergency hospital, the hospital will divest itself of most of these cumbersome rules and regulations; rules and regulations 90% of which had nothing to do with good patient care anyway.

The Crockett County Hospital will still have to pass an annual inspection by the State of Texas in order to maintain its hospital license, Boswell concluded.

Activity picks up in county oil fields

The Pikes Peak Draw multipay field of Crockett County gained its second Canyon oil producer and a 1/2-mile south extension to that pay with reclassification of Joe McGuire Inc., San Antonio, No. 3 Joe F. Bean South, former Canyon gas producer in the field, 14 miles northwest of Ozona, for 1.5 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus a 1/2-barrel of water, with gas-oil ratio of 6,000-1.

Production was through 1-16-inch choke and perforations at 6,625-7,141 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 104,000 pounds of sand.

Details of the original completion were not available. Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 34-UV-GC&SF.

The Canyon oil opener, McGuire's No. 1 Joe F. Bean North (also a former gas producer), was reclassified June 6, 1982 for 20 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 8,000-1 through a 14-64 inch choke and perforation at 6,199-7,148 feet.

Extender finalized Ellenburger oil production was extended 5/8-mile northwest in the Holt Ranch multipay field of Crockett County with completion of Baytech

Inc., Midland, No. 1 ARCO-Holt "35" 10 1/2 miles north of Ozona, for 143 barrels of 42.8 gravity oil, plus seven barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 378-1.

Production was through a 16-64 inch choke and perforations at 7,953-62 feet which had been acidized with 100 gallons.

It topped the Spraberry at 4,036 feet and the Ellenburger at 7,888 feet on ground elevation of 2,569 feet.

Drilled to 8,000 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 7,975 feet.

Location is 1,880 feet, from the north 467 feet from the east lines of 35-OP-GC&SF.

Confirmer stated Joe McGuire, San Antonio, has scheduled the No. 47-2 Joe F. Bean in the four-well Ellenburger oil area in the Pikes Peak Draw multipay field of Crockett County, 14 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,880 feet from the north and 2,080 feet from the east lines of 47-UV-GC&SF. Contract depth is 7,400 feet.

Plans made to prevent floods

After heavy rains flooded the north part of Ozona, twice during the year, Commissioner B.W. Stuart was appointed to determine the steps to alleviate this problem. He has been in conference with the Soil Conservation Service and a civil engineer, who offered plans to correct the channelization of flood waters in that area. The project needs to be coordinated with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, and Stuart is awaiting a representative from the state to make the plans final and take action on the proposal.

Unfortunately, the area in question is flood prone. However, this comes about only when heavy rains fall between the dams in the north part of the county and the city. Many relatively new homes are built in the watershed around the Country Club golf course. The flooding problem on First Street and adjacent area has increased since the building of the new bank at the corner of First and Hwy. 163. Grates on a culvert built there will not allow the flood waters to progress to Johnson Draw, creating a back-up.

The engineer who toured the area said the topographic natural flow area of flood water would be through the residential district south of First Street. He suggested diversion of flood waters away from this area would require constructed water courses and structures designed to carry a peak flow for a desired level of protection. He suggested a possible solution would be construction of a channel along the north side of the vacant lot owned by the county. This would require a larger culvert across Hwy. 163. The outlet would need to be on a stable grade into Johnson Draw. He also suggested additional channelization further upstream in the vicinity of the golf course.

The SCS engineer also looked at a proposal for a crossing in the south part of town, where a new edition, Chandlerdale West, has been plotted. It was determined any kind of culvert or flume in the bottom of the channel would impede the flow of water, and he recommended no construction of a road crossing above the bottom elevation of the channel.

Needy families get help for Christmas

Thirteen Ozona families were recipients of foods and gifts, from the tree fund drive held at the Circle Bar Truck Stop. Donations to the fund began Thanksgiving, and as of late Thursday, the fund amounted to \$1189. Tom Mitchell and the Circle Bar, Inc. matched that amount, giving a total of \$2,378 to spend on needy families. The families were selected through the schools and churches.

Personnel at the Circle Bar Fuel desk coordinated the drive, with money and checks pinned to a decorated Christmas tree. Truck drivers usually get to use the showers free of charge, but were asked to make a contribution to the Christmas fund. All were thrilled to do so, and contributed from \$1 to \$10 and some \$20.

Some businesses also contributed to the fund. They include Crockett County National Bank, Lilly Construction, Stockton Savings, Hubbard Body Shop, Jamey Sawyer, and Harvey Hill.

After purchasing the gifts for the children and gift certificates for groceries, the remaining money was given to the Crockett County Care Center. Gifts included toys, clothes and shoes, no tobacco nor soda pop was included.

Fuel desk personnel who put the project together were Dana Stokes, Char Renault, Albert Longoria and Maurine Harrison. Nicole and Maurine Harrison, and Albert Longoria assisted in making the deliveries Friday.

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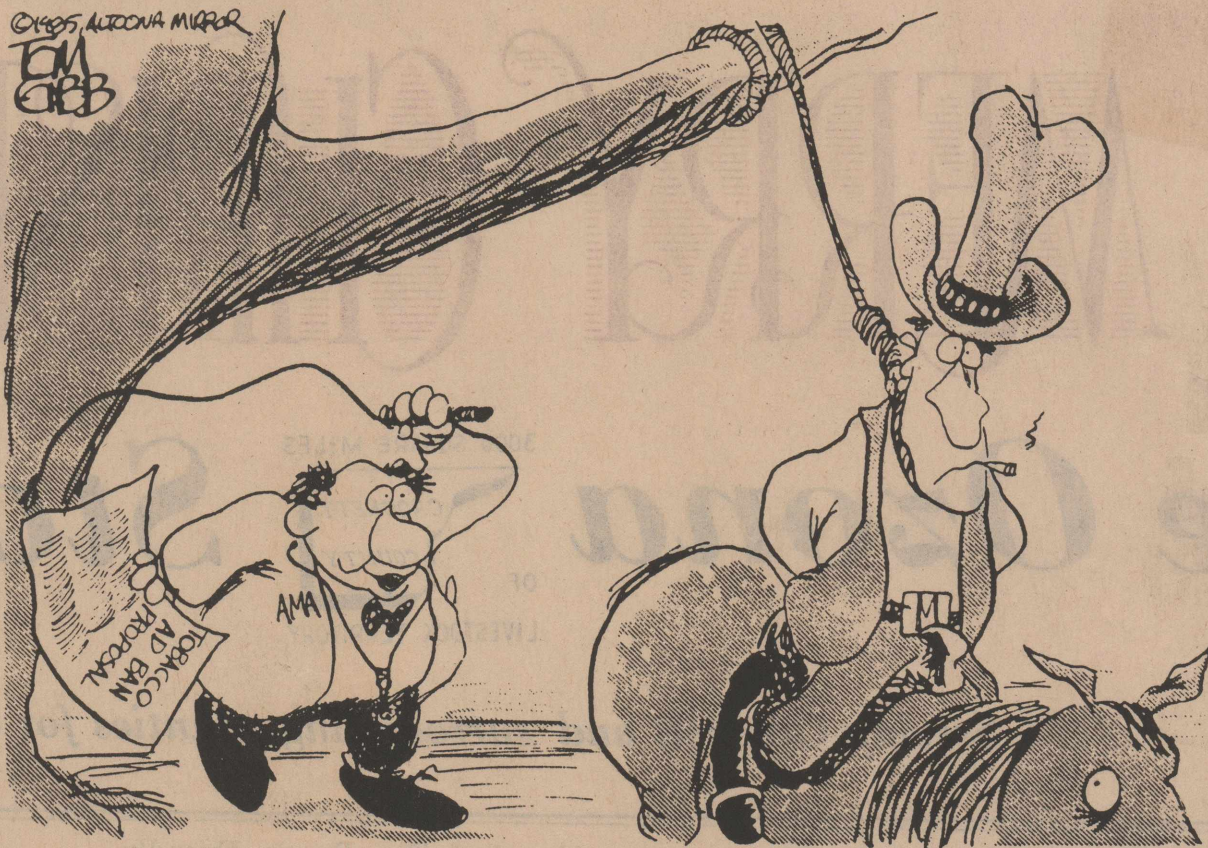
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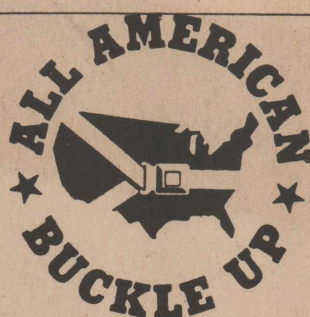

Bobwhite quail can be an important wildlife enterprise

Bobwhite quail can be an important wildlife enterprise on rangeland—one a rancher should consider in management decisions since it offers a good opportunity for income. Fortunately, range management for quail and livestock is highly compatible, says a range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Providing the correct quantity and quality of forage to cattle through proper stocking rates and pasture rest allows for a variety of quality quail foods and grassy cover. Also, judicious use of brush management practices provides food and cover for both quail and livestock. Special use practices such as strip discing, food plantings and erecting artificial shelters are not costly and offer great returns on investments.

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Q. My husband and I have been fighting about child support during divorce proceedings. He has refused to negotiate, because he said that since he is in the Army, no one can reach him or touch his salary, so I'll never see support, even if the Court tells him. Does he get to skip payments as long as he is in the service?

A. No, the new direct wage assignment law applies not only to private industry but to all government employees. The United States, as well as the corner grocery, must withhold part of the disposable pay of an employee if ordered to do so by the Court.

An Order signed by the Judge the same day the divorce is granted will be served on the correct pay officer. Out of the first paycheck after 14 days, the employer, including the military, must deduct child support and send it back to the Court.

Q. Can welfare mothers still ask the state for help in collecting back child support? I remember reading about the program, but not knowing how to go about it.

A. The Attorney General has 25 locations in Texas to help all custodial parents with child support problems. This service is no longer limited to welfare parents: all Texas citizens are entitled. The toll free number is 1-800-252-3515.

These offices are not available for custody or visitation problems, but they will help locate a parent and enforce child support orders.

Q. My lawyer has told me I need to make up a Power of Attorney, but I don't understand what it is and why I need one.

A. A Power of Attorney really should be called an appointment of agent. In signing the document before a notary, you are authorizing someone to do anything you could do, if you were present.

The document provides a way to handle your personal and business matters if you are out of town, or if you are struck with an illness or accident. Without the power, in order to endorse your checks, consent to surgery, renew your lease, sell stock, any of a thousand places your signature is needed, someone would have to apply to be your guardian. A temporary guardianship, granted in an emergency, presently cost \$265 in court charges alone, not to mention lawyer and doctor fees. A Power of Attorney is in all ways cheaper.

Q. Both our children turn 18 before they graduate high school, but my ex-husband said that's my problem, not his, and he will stop the child support. What can I do?

A. You may return to Court and seek a modification of your prior divorce decree. Under new state law, child support can be ordered past the 18th birthday until the child graduates, as long as the child is enrolled in an accredited school leading to a degree program. The new section 14.05 of the Family Code specifies that child support can be ordered "until the end of the school year in which the child graduates," either in new divorces, or by going back to modify prior divorces.

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HONK IF YOU HATE RADAR

The 55 mile-per-hour speed limit is one of the most widely disobeyed laws in the United States.

Police in some states now resort to rolling roadblocks — driving side-by-side across all available lanes at exactly 55 — air patrols, decoys, and radar to enforce what was supposed to have been a "temporary" energy-saving measure. Even the merits of fuel economy are doubtful in view of today's engine technology.

Thousands of people every week are ticketed by the metermaids of the highways for driving over the 55 mph speed limit, on roads that just a few years ago were posted at 70. Despite some of the exotic tactics that are being used to hunt down these criminals, most are the victims of radar.

The problem with radar is that it steals away the accused's right to a fair trial. Members of the law enforcement establishment and assorted safety nannies like to brag that radar has a 99 percent conviction rate. That's because the average accused offender has about as much chance of beating a ticket as George McGovern has of being elected president. A radar-based ticket is practically an on-the-spot conviction.

The hitch, of course, is that radar, as infallible as it is reputed to be, is prone to certain types of errors. Just because the courts say radar is always right does not make it so.

For example, using recommended factory radar procedures, trees have been clocked at 40-miles-per-hour. Things like high-voltage power lines (common near highways) and heavy traffic also do strange things to radar. Some radar units also read higher when they are cold — a nice way for the police to make their ticket quotas. Radar reflections from large vehicles, such as trucks and motor homes, also have been known to cause errant readings for cars ahead of them.

Most people do not even bother to fight radar tickets. Thus, there is something like a 97-to-98 percent guilty plea rate.

One Christopher Murphy, thankfully, is not most people. He is, to borrow a phrase, "mad as hell" about radar, and he's not going to take it anymore. As *Car and Driver* Editor-at-Large Brock Yates reports, what sparked Mr. Murphy's madness was a May 1984 speeding ticket he received on New York Route 17, near Elmira. Murphy was zapped at 76 mph by a New York state trooper using a Kustom Signals KR-10 radar gun. The catch is that Mr. Murphy insists that he was driving his 1977 Olds station wagon at or about the sacred 55. Traffic happened to be heavy, and the road is flanked by high-tension power lines — both of which are known to play havoc with radar accuracy.

Murphy has filed a civil suit in U.S. District Court for the Western District of New York, asking for summary judgment against the use of radar evidence in speeding trials, as well as one dollar in damages from four principal radar manufacturers and assorted New York state officials, alleging that they conspired to violate his constitutionally guaranteed right to due process.

The entire legal structure of radar evidence rests on a series of cases from the 1950s in New York and New Jersey. The same expert witness, Dr. John Kopper of Johns Hopkins University, testified in both cases, and on the lone strength of his statements the state courts allowed the use of radar as evidence (*People v. Magri*, 1958). The amazing part is that all other states simply accepted the ruling as a legal precedent, and so it stands — except in Dade County, Florida, where another brave individual successfully fought radar in court.

Murphy is confident of victory, according to *Car and Driver's* Brock Yates. Murphy said, "I have an incredible amount of ammunition, and before I'm done I'll have a great deal more, once I start using the federal discovery tools to, in effect, poke around the files of manufacturers, police, etcetera."

If Murphy does win, the safety nannies will be heard squealing like pigs from coast-to-coast. States will no longer be able to employ such an extensive network of highway metermaids to raise revenue, and will have to instead spend these resources on real law enforcement.

The speed law ought to be tossed out anyway. Contrary to what Ralph Nader (who does not drive himself) and his fellow nannies tell us, speed — at least 65 or 70 mph on interstate highway — does not in and of itself cause accidents. The real cause is stupid driving: tailgating, failing to move with traffic, and driving under the influence.

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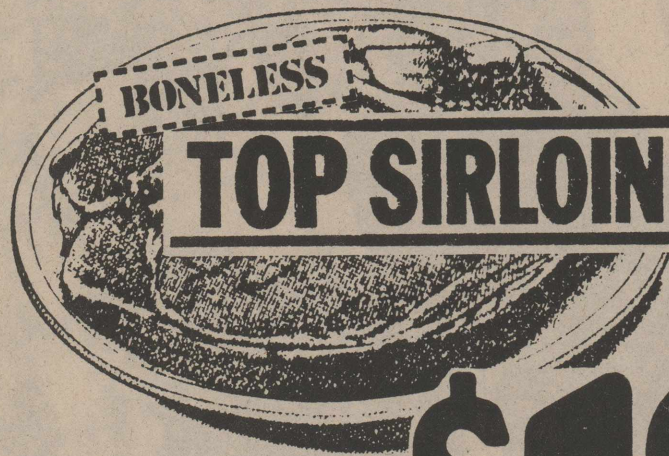
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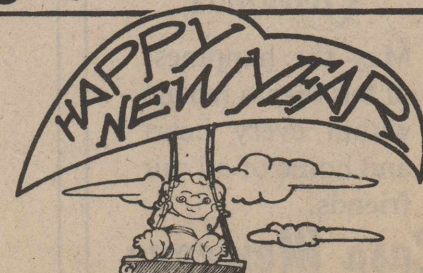

Deer harvest good early in the present hunting season

The first two weeks of the 1985 deer season produced surprisingly good hunting, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

Warm weather and lush range conditions had lowered expectations for a high harvest early in the season which opened Nov. 9, but reports from the field indicate the harvest has been good and deer body and antler development are above average.

Several outstanding bucks have been taken by hunters on the department's wildlife management area

hunts. Herb Kothmann, public hunt program leader, said a buck which field-dressed at 200 pounds was weighed at the Daughtrey WMA near Tilden in South Texas.

A 180-pounder was brought in at the Gene Howe WMA in the Panhandle. "Several bucks field-dressing in the 130-pound range were taken on the three National Forest WMAs (Alabama Creek, Bannister and Moore Plantation in East Texas.) Kothmann said.

On the Kerr WMA in Kerr Coun-

ty, hunters participating in an antlerless-only segment of the public hunts enjoyed an approximate 80 percent success rate, and some of the deer weighed more than 100 pounds field-dressed.

Kothmann attributes the outstanding body condition and weight of deer to controlled herd levels and good range conditions during the months prior to the hunting season. Antler development, also related to nutrition, is above average on all the areas, he said.

A total of 24,348 persons applied for deer hunts during the 1985-86 general gun season on 15 departmental wildlife management areas containing more than 245,000 acres. Hunts were offered to 6,803 applicants who were selected by computer drawing.

TDPS estimates holiday traffic deaths at 29

Texas Department of Public Safety officials have estimated that as many as 29 persons will die as a result of traffic accidents during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. The DPS expects 12 fatalities during the 30-hour Christmas period and 17 deaths during the 54-hour New Year's period.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, asked motorists to maintain safe driving habits during the holidays to minimize the loss of life in vehicles crashes.

"We'd certainly like to see our fatality estimates prove to be too high," Adams said. "Unfortunately, there will be drivers who will ignore speed limits and attempt to operate vehicles after drinking. The best way to avoid becoming involved in an accident with a careless driver is to drive in a defensive manner. It also makes good sense to be sure everyone in the vehicle uses a safety belt."

Adams said he has authorized Highway Patrol captains to utilize troopers from other uniformed Traffic Law Enforcement services to augment the regular patrol.

"Additional troopers will be assigned where large volumes of traffic or additional accidents are likely," Adams said.

During the 102-hour Christmas period in 1984, vehicle accidents caused 43 traffic deaths in Texas. A total of 42 deaths were attributed to crashes occurring during the 102-hour New Year's period last year.

The Department of Public Safety will provide state traffic death updates as part of the "Operation Motorcade" program. The counting period for Christmas begins at 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 24 and concludes at midnight Wednesday, December 25. The

New Year's counting period begins at 6 p.m. Monday, December 30 and ends at midnight on Wednesday, January 1.

length of time the person remains outside the country, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo said recently.

However, Social Security checks may not be sent to people in Albania, Cuba, Democratic Kampuchea, East Berlin, East Germany, North Korea, or Vietnam.

In addition, checks cannot be sent to Iran or the U.S.S.R. "However" Upp said, "A U.S. citizen can receive all the checks that had been withheld once he or she leaves that country and goes to a country to which checks can be sent."

"In general, a person who is not a U.S. citizen cannot receive any checks for months spent in one of these countries even though he or she leaves that country and satisfies all other requirements."

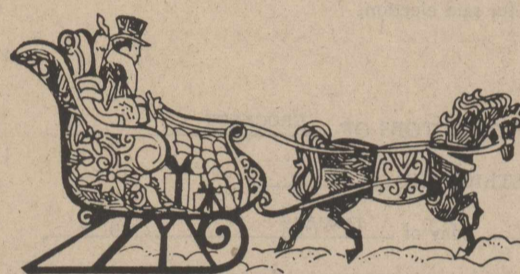

Proper stocking rates minimize feeding

Careful adherence to proper stocking rates may be the best solution to minimizing supplemental feed purchases.

Annual pasture forage is generally an inexpensive feed source, but seasonal and annual variation in production, quality and availability make it difficult for many ranchers to know how many animals can be adequately maintained, says Dr. Larry Boleman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist.

Boleman says most ranchers eyeball a pasture and with experience estimate how many animals to graze.

Often, however, these estimates are over-optimistic, resulting in stock and pasture stress and ultimately lead to supplemental feed purchases.

Boleman advises Texas ranchers to evaluate pasture carrying capacity each year during the three critical periods of October, March and June. Since rainfall normally peaks in May and September, two growth and stress periods occur.

"October is the traditional adjustment period with sale of spring calves and limited winter forage growth," he notes. "At this time a rancher knows how many animals he plans to hold

over. Animal condition, remaining forage, birth rates, and amount of feed purchased are evidence of a rancher's success in balancing numbers into March when spring growth should begin."

Boleman says the March range evaluation provides hindsight of success and a plan for how long forage will last if spring growth is late. The June evaluation indicates how much spring growth occurred and if adequate forage is available to last during the summer drought until September rains grow new forage.

Finally, if September rains fail or

inadequate forage is available to carry the foundation herd during the summer and into winter, early weaning in June or July may be necessary to market quality offspring and reduce nutritional requirements of livestock for maintaining reproductive ability for future income.

To better evaluate the forage supply during these critical periods, Boleman says a rancher must first know how many animals of different nutritional requirements are on hand at any given time and the acreage of grazable forage. The rancher then calculates how large an area will be required to

feed one animal unit for one day during the period in question. Pastures are then evaluated in an unbiased manner to determine if enough grazable forage actually occurs on the "animal unit area" to meet forage requirements with some residue remaining to maintain range health.

Boleman says the seasonal and annual variations in forage supplies are primarily due to rainfall and stocking rates which require ranchers to adjust management practices to insure satisfactory animal performance and reduce supplemental feed costs.

Tambunga named to TSTI honor roll

Paul Tambunga of Ozona has been named to the Dean of Instruction's Honor Roll at Texas State Technical Institute in Sweetwater for the fall quarter, according to Dr. Herbert Robbins, campus president.

LATE-CALVING COWS LOSE MONEY

Cattlemen should have little respect for late-calving cows because they are income robbers and should be culled, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. Late-calving cows wean lighter calves and have lower re-breeding rates than early-calving cows, and that means money down the drain. In a recent study by the Extension Service in Calhoun County involving 200 cross-bred cows, 16 percent were considered late calvers. These would have contributed three additional calves to the total calf crop for that year. At a weaning weight of 450 pounds and a market price 65 cents a pound, that's an extra \$877.50 in gross income.

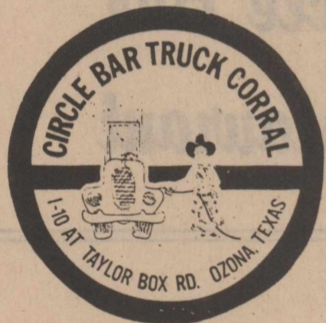

Selective Service Registration

The Selective Service System reaches an important milestone in the registration of young men on January 1, 1986.

Beginning on this date, men who were required in 1980 to register with Selective Service will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations of men after they turn 26. Men who failed to register will have permanently forfeited their right to certain Federal student aid and job training benefits as well as Federal employment. Additionally, registration with Selective Service is a requirement in some states for various employment opportunities, such as law enforcement agencies and permission to practice law.

Men born in 1960 who have registered, will reach age 26 in 1986 and, under present law, will no longer be eligible for selection for induction. Over 15 million men, age 18 through 25, have registered with Selective Service since President Carter initiated registration in 1980.

Many of the men who are non-registrants may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized they were required to register if released from custody prior to age 26.

Men age 18 to 25 who have not yet registered should register promptly to avoid prosecution and/or loss of benefits. Registration takes only five minutes at any post office. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years imprisonment.

EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

With reasonable care and proper lighting, Christmas poinsettias can be year-round houseplants, providing color until spring and green foliage during the other months.

Poinsettias do best and flourish near a window that brings in lots of light. They require lots of moisture and should never be allowed to dry out. Water is required daily or thorough soaking at regular intervals. Make sure drainage is good.

Normal household temperatures 62-72 degrees are ideal for poinsettias in bloom. Night temperatures can drop to 55 degrees. Avoid heated rooms above 75 degrees, temperatures below 50; chilly drafts and direct heat from furnaces. Plant misters can be used to keep the plants humidity level adequate.

When Christmas color fades, cut poinsettias back to about 8 inches. This pruning will look severe, but allows new shoots to emerge. Poinsettias may be transplanted outside when night temperatures exceed 50 degrees. Summer pruning may be necessary during the summer months.

After the Christmas season is over and the Christmas Cactus has finished blooming, it will be excellent as a hanging plant. During the winter months, place it in a window or other area of high light intensity. In the spring and fall, full sun and outdoor growing area is ideal. During the hot summer months, light shade during the mid-day period is best.

Christmas cactus grow best in all plastic containers. Since it is native to the tropical rain forests of Brazil, it likes plenty of moisture, but will not tolerate wet soggy soil. A diluted

solution (1/2 recommended rate for houseplants) of a liquid houseplant throughout the growing season.

Christmas cactus bloom only when it has 12 or more total darkness. If kept in a lighted room, flower buds will not appear. If placed in a light

proof box or enclosed with a light-proof cover from 6 p.m. until 8 a.m. every evening, it can be brought into bloom almost anytime desired provided night temperature is 65 degrees or lower.

Christmas cactus can be readily propagated from cuttings by placing a short section of the flattened stem in a clean rooting medium for a few weeks until rooted. Many years of pleasure can be derived from the Christmas cactus with moderate care and attention.

CONTROLLING TREE BORERS

Tree borers can be controlled by injecting insecticides into holes made by the insects. Injecting the insecticides carbaryl, diazinon and chlorpyrifos into borer holes with an eye dropper and then plugging the holes with a silicone caulk has proven effective, notes a forester with the Texas Extension Service. However, the economics of injecting insecticides into trees to control boring insects are probably only favorable where trees are of extremely high value. Boring insects weaken trees, cause structural defects and eventually girdle and kill them.

pure cane sugar, fresh and frozen egg yolks, select nutmeg powder and pure rum.

The host who prefers non-alcoholic eggnog prepared at home will use whole eggs, sometimes beating the yolks and whites separately. For southern-style Eggnog, beat together 4 egg yolks, 1/4 cup sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Three cups of milk and 1 cup of whipping cream are gradually added, and the mixture is cooked over hot water or low heat with constant stirring until it thickens and coats a metal spoon. Cool this custard sauce, add 2 teaspoons of vanilla and chill it thoroughly. At serving time, beat 4 egg whites until soft peaks form and gradually add 1/4 cup of sugar. Beat the chilled custard until smooth and frothy and fold in the beaten egg whites. To serve this delicious eggnog, sprinkle it with nutmeg and garnish it with whipped cream.

After caroling, a Winter Warmer combining milk and port wine takes the chill off tonsils. Simply heat three cups of milk, a cup of port wine and a tablespoon of confectioners sugar on to serving temperature. Add a cinnamon stick stirrer or a sprinkle of the spice on each mug. (You can serve this Warmer to everyone; heating evaporates the alcohol from the wine and only its flavor remains.)

Wildcat slated in Crockett Co.

Mobil Producing Texas & New Mexico Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Shannon Memorial Hospital, an 8,700-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 2 3/4 miles south and slightly west of 2,558-foot production in the two-well World, South (San Andres oil) field, 3 3/4 miles northwest of 2,215-foot production in the seven-well Virlaw (upper San Andres gas) field and east of Iraan.

Location is 1,411 feet from the south and 985 feet from the west lines of 11-BB-EL&RR.

Rendova Oil Co., Midland, will re-enter and deepen to 9,000 feet at its No. 1 Cowden, former Crockett County Ellenburger oil producer, and as a 1,500-foot east stepout to the three-well Pennsylvanian Detrital oil area of the Tripoli multipay field, 62 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finaled June 11 to pump 204.1 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 125.06 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 42-1, through perforations at 8,161-266 feet. Original total depth was 8,300 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the northwest and 168 feet from the southwest lines of 22-36-H&TC, Abst. 5513.

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup pumpkin
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 3/4 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 tsp nutmeg

Social Security disability benefits

Whether or not a person applying for Social Security disability benefits is disabled under the law is a decision made by the Disability Determination Services office in the State in which he or she lives. The decision is made by a

team of trained people that includes a physician and a disability evaluation specialist.

In arriving at the decision, every reasonable effort is made to get medical evidence from the person's physician and from hospitals or other facilities where he or she may have been treated. The Government is authorized to pay a reasonable fee for any medical reports requested.

The physicians and facilities contacted for this purpose are asked for a summary of the person's medical history. This would include a diagnosis, the date of onset of the illness or injury, the degree to which it limits the person's activities, the results of any medical tests that may have been performed, and the treatment provided. The physician or facility is not asked to pass judgment on the extent of the individual's disability, if any.

If the medical information already available is not sufficient to permit an evaluation of the person's condition, a special examination or test may be required. Social Security will pay for such an examination or test, including certain travel expenses that may be associated with it.

It may take as long as 3 months to process a disability claim. Once a decision is reached.
