The following fable came across my desk the other day, and it's so near reality I was impressed. It came from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. I'll pass it on to you:

"America is awaking to the fact that the liability crisis is for real. But how many have considered how much the crisis could affect us all from cradle to grave?"

Or even before the cradle, for that matter. Early February saw a strike by obstetricians in Boston fed up with rising malpractice insurance rates. And once Junior is born, a number of vaccines, including diphtheria-pertussis-tetanus, may be unavailable because litigation-shy manufacturers have stopped making them.

The baby may have been unplanned. G.D. Searle recently was forced to stop selling a safe and medically approved interuterine birth-control device. Searle had never lost a lawsuit, but just defending them was eating up nearly a tenth of the company's income.

Junior's cradle itself is bound to be more expensive since lawsuits have abounded over injuries to babies in their beds. He might not be able to get a car seat either.

And who's going to take care of Junior if Mom works? Many day-care centers can't get insurance.

As Junior grows up, life may not be as much fun for him. All those neat toys he sees during the cartoons may be off the market after being attacked by consumer safety activists. Skip the carnival. Who can afford the \$5 per ticket to cover the insurance for the pony rides?

And forget about peanut butter sandwiches and the Twinkies. They've been battered by suits over allegedly misleading labelling and turning youngsters into "junk-food junkies."

Watching the Super Bowl on TV—or participating in sports himself—is out of the question. Ten of 13 football helmet manufacturers already have been driven out of business by lawsuits over injuries. Mom and Dad had to send the dog to the pound since they couldn't afford the increase in the homeowner's insurance in case he bit somebody.

Depressed by the loss of these privileges—and his dog—Junior goes to discuss his problems with his minister. Sorry, the minister won't do any more spiritual counseling because he's been burned by malpractice suits.

Despite these setbacks, Junior manages to struggle through school, after he signed a release promising not to sue if he didn't learn how to read. But there aren't many new jobs. Those companies that haven't been forced out of business are laying off employees to cover higher insurance premiums.

Junior finally finds a job at the clerk of the court's office. They have plenty of work handling their share of the two million lawsuits filed every year.

At a ripe old age, Junior suffers a stroke and is rushed to the hospital. His bill for the 18 hours before he dies is \$20,000, largely because the doctors order a battery of extra tests to avoid a malpractice suit.

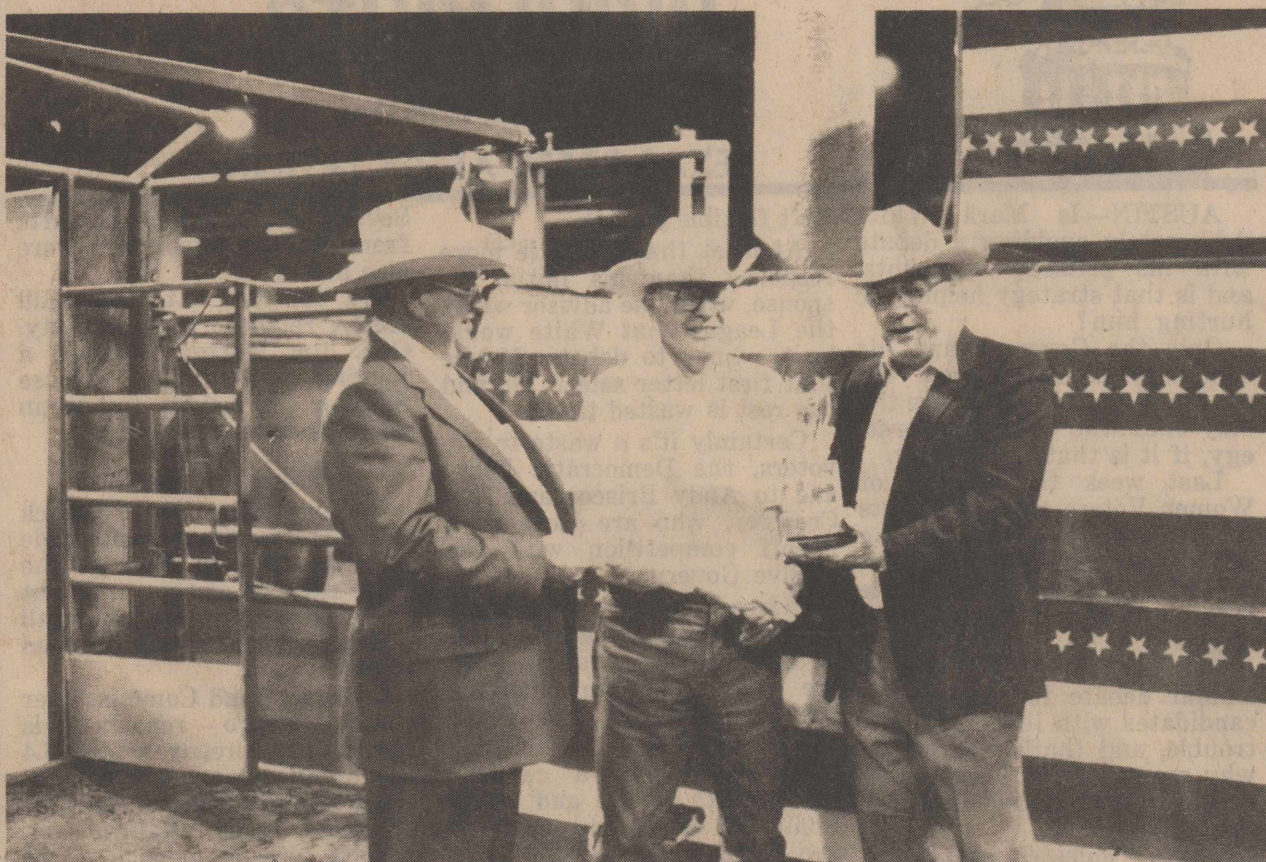
But that's OK. The insurance will pick it up.

Following contract approvals, Curtis Keith, school maintenance supervisor, met with the Board to discuss school roofing needs. The members were shown a video tape prepared by Mr. Keith which showed the condition of the roofs on all buildings owned by the school district. When asked about the overall condition of the roofs, Mr. Keith replied, "Approximately thirty percent are in poor condition, thirty percent are in fair condition, and forty percent are in good to excellent condition."

After discussing various types of roofing systems, the trustees voted to advertise for bids on a polyurethane roof-coating system which will be used by Mr. Keith's department to correct the problem.

The 1986-1987 Ozona School Calendar was read and approved by the members. The new calendar calls for teacher inservice to begin on Friday, August 22, for new teachers and/or for those teachers who have not fulfilled their one day of optional compensatory inservice. All teachers will report for work on Monday, August 25, and school will start on Tuesday, September 2. The last day of school will be Thursday, May 28, and graduation will be on Friday, May 29.

The new calendar will feature a longer period of time for Christmas holidays (December 20-January 4) but a shorter period of time for Spring Break (February 25-March 1).

The Board accepted and approved the Ozona Textbook Committee's recommendations for 1986-1987 state-adopted textbooks. Next year Ozona students will have new textbooks for supplementary reading (grades 1-6), computer literacy, life science, art, United States History (grade 8), English Language Arts I-IV, Correlated English Language Arts I-IV, journalism, pre-algebra, consumer math, physics, United States History (high school), industrial arts, auto mechanics, and business.

## Post office spends \$200 million on zip

Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced today that the ZIP plus 4 program is here to stay in the Postal Service.

This announcement was prompted by erroneous information which was recently published in Manhattan, Inc. Magazine and announced on the Paul Harvey News on March 9, 1986.

The magazine will print a correction in the next issue and Paul Harvey has been contacted regarding a correction.

Equipment needed to read the nine digit code has already been ordered, Hokit said. Two hundred million dollars has been spent on automated equipment to read the large codes.

## Pipeline shut down ordered

After right-of-ways had been cleared through Crockett County to the Sutton County line and trenching had progressed to Hwy. 163 south of Ozona, a federal judge in Austin issued an order prohibiting further construction of the All American Pipeline Co. line across central Texas for at least a month.

U.S. District Judge James Nowlin entered the order in Austin last week, and work on the pipeline shut down immediately. The order was issued Thursday, and crews began moving out of town early Friday.

Work has been completed on the high pressure, heated-oil pipeline from the California coast to McCamey. Under the order, further construction from McCamey to the Gulf Coast is prohibited until April 12. A hearing has been scheduled for April 10, where testimony will be heard about whether the ban should last longer, and whether construction should be delayed until the federal government

assesses the environmental impact.

Opponents of the line have protested that All American's planned route would take the line across the Edwards Aquifer, the region's major water source. They want to be sure if the pipeline is built, it is constructed in a way that guarantees protection of the environment.

Nowlin's order does allow the company to accept delivery of pipe at Corpus Christi, to take safety measures to protect the public where work already has been done, to continue archaeological studies and to participate in legal proceedings over the line.

The order was entered after negotiations between the attorney general's office, Travis and Hays counties, the company and the Federal Bureau of Land Management.

There has been much speculation locally about the pipeline, but no word from the company has been received.

## Absentee voting underway here

Absentee voting is now in progress for the school board election which will be held April 5, at the courthouse. Places are open for three trustees.

Members whose terms expire are George Ybarra, Cecil Buckner, and Joe Couch. Couch did not ask for another term, but both Ybarra and Buckner will be on the ballot, along with four other hopefuls.

The names appear on the ballot as follows: Sandra Childress, George Ybarra, Steve Sessom, Dan Pullen, Cecil Buckner and Tommy Wilson.

Mrs. Childress is a homemaker and mother of two school-age children. She owns and operates Cameras Two, and assists her husband, Pleas, in the Frame Shop. She has had school board experience, being on the board at Hardin Simmons University as well as having been a school teacher. Mrs. Childress comes well-qualified and, if elected will be among the few women elected to the board in the history of Ozons school system.

George Ybarra has served two years on the board and is asking for his third three-year term. He is an employee of the Texas Highway Department and

heads up the Ozona Little League. He has one child in school and a grandchild.

Dr. Steve Sessom practices dentistry here. He is president of the Chamber of Commerce and active in the First Baptist Church. His wife, Jodie, is a co-owner of the Teacher Store. They have two children in Ozona schools.

Dan Pullen is a former school teacher and an officer in First National Bank. He is a director on the Chamber of Commerce board. He has two daughters in school here.

Cecil Buckner is asking for his third term on the board. He is head of the Texaco plant south of town and helps his wife, Elma, in Elma's Roadside Grocery. Their three children attended Ozona schools and graduated from Ozona High School.

Tommy Wilson is a former school teacher who now works in an oil-related industry. He has two children in the Ozona School System.

### PRIVI-WHAT-IZATION?

In the coming months, there will be a bloody political battle in Washington over something most Americans have never heard of.

By and large, the story will be mangled and distorted—not necessarily because those doing the reporting will be biased, but because the "Spray Net" primadonnas of prime-time television won't know what they're talking about, and won't take the time to find out.

So instead of stories about an exciting new way of providing government services, we'll hear stories about shameless attempts to turn back the clock on social progress.

All of these stories will be part of a war of words—a war that will be fought over still another word: privatization.

Privatization is one of those rare Washington words that despite its cumbersome actuality says what it means: *the process of making private*. Thanks to the efforts of Johns Hopkins University economics professor Steve Hanke, who helped develop the concept while a senior fellow at The Heritage Foundation, the word is now included in the newest editions of most dictionaries. And just in time—because privatization will be in the eye of the political storm when Congress takes up the fiscal year 1987 federal budget later this year.

So just what is privatization?

*Newsweek* magazine calls it a "current-but-cumbersome buzzword for spinning off government's nonessential and less efficient assets and functions to private industry." Indeed, *Newsweek* says, "the ultimate issue in privatization is the definition of government itself."

To its credit, *Newsweek* comes very close to the mark. The ultimate issue is the very definition of government. And "privatization" does involve spinning off government functions and assets to the private sector. But this does not just mean private industry. Under the plans developed by privatization pioneers Stuart Butler, Director of Domestic Policy Studies at The Heritage Foundation, Hanke, and Robert Poole, President of the Reason Foundation in Santa Barbara, California, some government assets might be "spun off" to charitable and other nonprofit organizations, and others sold to the general public through public stock offerings.

The best way to visualize the process is through specific examples. Here are three:

1) Currently, the federal government owns a national freight railroad, Conrail, and a national passenger railroad, Amtrak. The privatization of Conrail already is in process; the Department of Transportation has accepted a bid from Norfolk Southern to buy the freight system for \$1.2 billion. The sale is awaiting Congressional approval. There is no reason the federal government should own and operate a railroad. And the same goes for Amtrak, which Butler has similarly proposed "privatizing," either by selling it—in whole or part—to an existing railroad, or by selling its routes and assets to the public and Amtrak employees through a stock offering.

2) The Post Office. I could start off with a joke, but just linking the words "postal" and "service" is joke enough. Butler does not propose selling off the U.S. Postal Service, but he does argue strongly for privatization through a process known as "contracting out"—more Washington talk for allowing private contractors to provide services now provided by over-priced postal service employees. Truck delivery, for example. Maintenance services, for another. Or perhaps even contracting with 7-11 or another convenience store chain to provide certain services now available only at the post office.

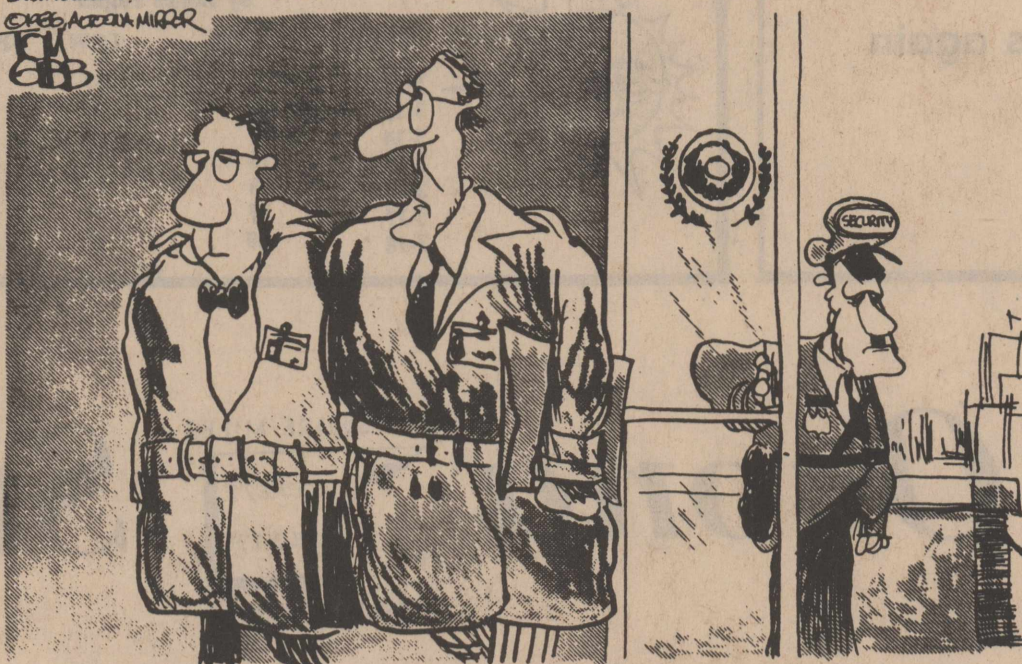
3) A third method of privatization is through the "voucher" system. A voucher is a slip of paper, like a coupon, which can be used to purchase a service. Right now the government spends billions of dollars every year to build and maintain subsidized public housing for low-income families. The results have been costly—and bad, as most housing projects rapidly turn into slums. Butler has proposed a double-whammy remedy. First, give public housing residents a choice by providing them with vouchers that they can use instead of cash to rent anywhere they want. He has also proposed turning public housing into low-income "co-ops," by selling the units to tenants at a great discount. Presumably, qualified tenants could even use their vouchers to pay the rent. Why is this good? First, because it will save the taxpayer lots of money in the long run. But more important, because it will give low-income families the same choices and the same stake in their communities that the rest of us have, changing them from slum tenants to homeowners.

Privatization is all of these things. But you will probably not hear it reported this way. Instead, you will see some \$1-million-a-year TV anchor talking about U.S. conservatives wanting to end low-income housing construction. He won't tell you that the conservatives have a better idea: privatization.

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Is Mark White deliberately avoiding a debate with his primary opponents, and is that strategy helping or hurting him?

Only the Governor and his campaign advisors know for sure, and probably they are the only ones who think the strategy, if it is that, is working.

Last week the League of Women Voters gave up efforts to arrange a debate among Democratic candidates for governor because Mark White, the lone holdout, won't agree on a date.

The League has arranged a similar debate for Republican candidates with little apparent trouble, and that's one reason why many of the Texas Democratic faithful are hopping mad.

White's sidestep means the Republican debate will get some millions of dollars in free television time while the Democrats get none. And don't kid yourself, the word all over the Capitol is that White is ducking.

### Excuses, Excuses

Only two weeks ago, White was confronted by challenger Andy Briscoe, who had to show up at one of White's own press conferences to get an answer out of him. White said he would debate March 20.

But as of last week, those arrangements couldn't be worked out with PBS, and the League, with time drawing short, announced it was giving up.

Could it be the old political dodge of just stalling for time on White's part?

### Voters Cheated

White's advisors are publicly saying he is trying to arrange a date, but the schedule just

isn't flexible enough.

At least that's a little more response than his initial response, when one advisor wrote the League that White would be too busy to debate. Maybe that first letter said it all, and the rest is wasted time.

Certainly it's a waste to the voters, the Democratic Party and to Andy Briscoe and Don Crowder, who are close to a runoff competition with the elusive Governor.

Briscoe is a conservative party loyalist. Crowder's style is daring and combative. Both are concerned with changing the direction of the Texas Democratic Party.

Politically, it's a collision course with White and Party Chairman Slagle on one hand and several Democratic officials and candidates on the other.

### Gifts To Officials

State officials filed their personal financial statements last week.

Some of the gifts White reported he received from friends and political appointees included an \$1,800 suit, a left-handed rifle, a tanned alligator hide, and a week-long Alaska fishing trip.

The \$1,800 suit came from a Lubbock surgeon who was appointed to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission by Mark White. He said White picked it out himself.

That same commissioner, Ray Santos, was also the gift-giver who killed the alligator and gave the skin to the Governor.

The rifle came from a Texas Employment Commissioner who was appointed by White.

Several other expensive gifts from White's appointees were also listed.

By contrast, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby reported a clock; Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox reported a jogging treadmill; House Speaker Gib Lewis, a shotgun and rifle among 11 gifts.

### Other Highlights

—Comptroller Bob Bullock said oil market instability made it impractical to forecast the state revenue at this time, but said the \$1.3 billion shortfall estimate "has already dropped a lot."

—Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro reports his agency has already made \$6.4 million in new state revenues from diversifying management of state lands. Mauro said, "We've already made a profit for the Legislature and the fiscal year is only half over."

—State Treasurer Ann Richards reported the state Treasury set a single-day record last week for processing 192,971 checks and warrants. Previous record was 163,970 in 1984. Last week's total cash flow was \$146.3 million income and \$185.8 million expenses.

—The State Board of Education learned Texas education faces a \$46.5 million loss in federal aid under the Gramm-Rudman act.

—Corpus Christi state Sen. Carlos Truan was honored as governor-for-a-day and said the Texas coast would bring millions more in tourist dollars into the state, properly managed.

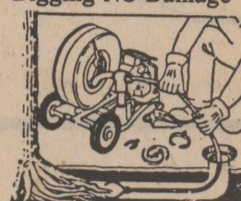

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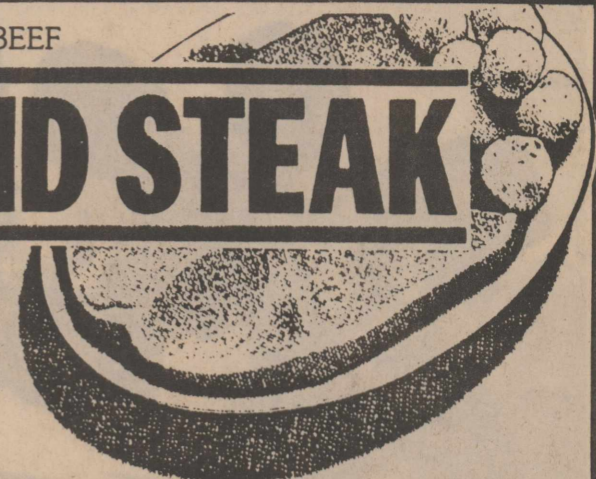

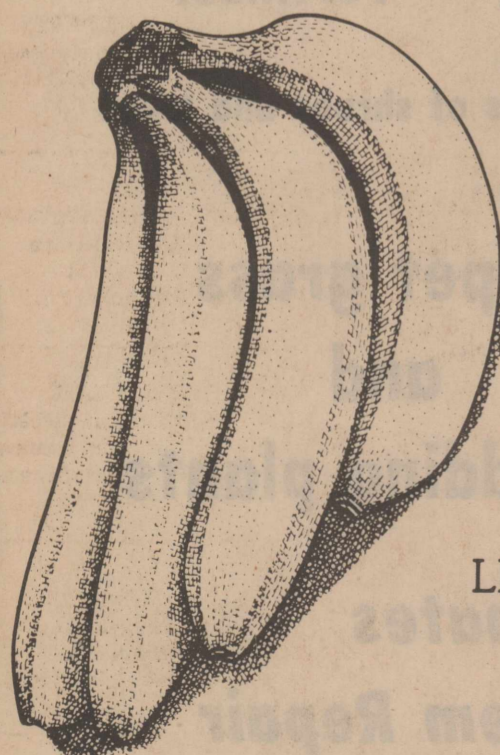

## WTU Customers to see decrease in rates Library

West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers should see another decrease in their electric bills soon if the Public Utility Commission of Texas approves a request filed Monday, March 17, in Austin.

WTU is asking permission to refund to customers a total of \$9.3 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate. The total includes \$9,146,092 in actual fuel cost savings which have accumulated since the current fuel rate for WTU was set by the PUC last August, plus \$215,837 in interest.

This would be the second time within a year for WTU to make

a refund and to lower its fuel cost factor. Over \$16 million was refunded in August 1985.

If a reduction in its fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factor, is approved, WTU officials estimate the fuel cost charges to its customers will drop by 8.2 per cent during the three month quarter beginning in May.

The due amounts on customer bills include both fuel costs and base rates. Utility companies are not allowed to make money on fuel. WTU has had no change in its base rates since 1984.

Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in the billing month of May, except for seasonal cotton gin customers, who would receive their refunds in December.

A typical residential customer would receive refunds of \$22.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said this refund, as well as the one made last year is necessary because of a softer

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# Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club  
by Mrs. Bailey Post

Another month has gone by without moisture, so all of you may not need to be reminded that plants should be watered thoroughly, especially newly planted shrubs, trees and small plants.

It is time to stimulate growth of pecans by applying one pound of ammonium sulfate per inch of trunk diameter for established trees. The year's nut crop will be borne on new growth. It seems that most everyone had a fine crop last fall.

Control insects, weeds and diseases in the garden-aphids are showing up on plants, especially iris.

Most established lawns get their initial spring mowing this or early next month. Cut the grass as short as possible and rake up the clippings. Also rake out any dead grass killed over the winter. This will allow easier movement of air, fertilizer, and water into the root zone. After mowing, apply a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 at the rate of about 25 pounds per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. In addition, make an application of iron sulfate (copperas) or chelated iron, if

the grass looks yellow and has had iron deficiency problems in the past.

For gardeners who like to use wire mesh hanging baskets, but have trouble keeping soil from washing out, here is a hint-after lining the basket with a damp layer of sphagnum moss, add a liner of double-thickness nylon net; cut it to fit just inside the moss. Then add mixture. Drainage is not slowed, but soil stays intact and has no tendency to wash from the basket when it is watered.

March signals the beginning of spring throughout the south, and with it comes the urge to till the soil and plant vegetables, if you have the space. In most areas, planting crops must be delayed until all danger of frost is past. In this mid-south zone a succession of plantings is often possible for such warm season crops as beans and squash. It seems safer to plant no earlier than Good Friday before Easter, except for the hardier vegetables and plants. Take cuttings this month. Succulent perennials and other plants you have been growing indoors all winter, can be rooted in water.

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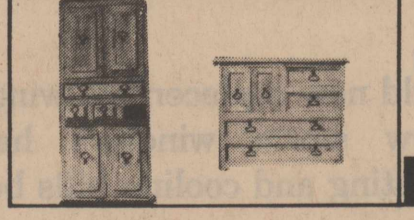

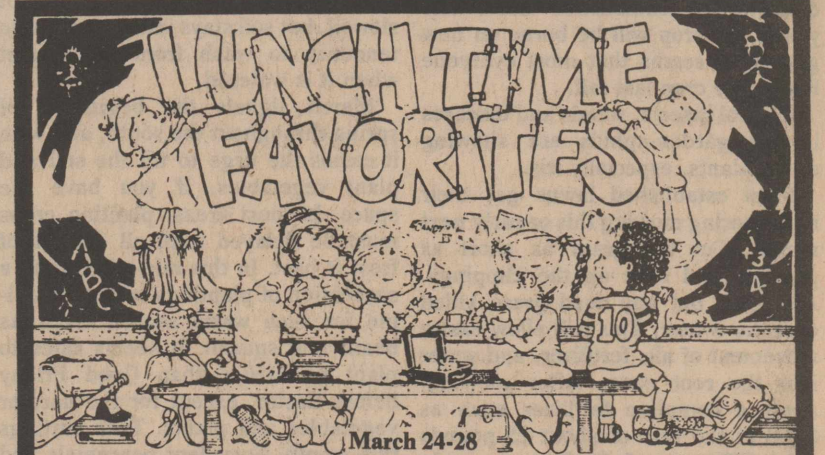

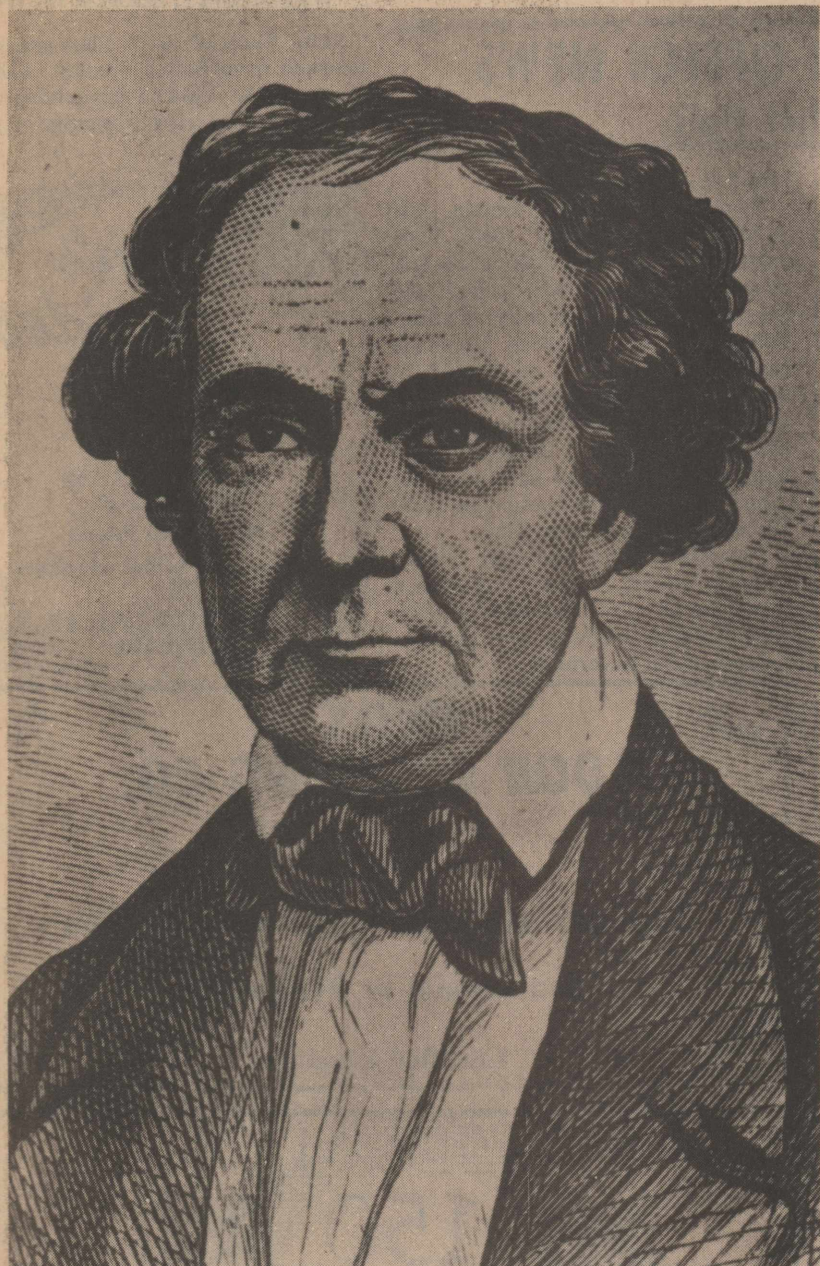

## Lamar and Houston mix like oil and water

Mirabeau B. Lamar left his home state of Georgia in 1836 to join Sam Houston in Texas' fight for freedom from Mexico. The 38-year-old had long, curly black hair with a dark complexion and gray eyes. At about 5'6" tall, he stood before General Sam Houston who towered above him, standing in excess of 6'2". The general was leery of the little man's talents, but glad to welcome another recruit into his ragged, rain-soaked army.

Enlisted as a general, it didn't take long before everyone is impressed by Lamar's bravery. A leader at the Battle of San Jacinto, he helped crack Santa Anna's army and secure Texas' independence. An impressed General Houston highly praised the man who, in just two years, would become his chief political enemy.

As the first president of the Republic of Texas, General Houston worked constantly toward two goals: getting Texas admitted to the union and making peace with the Indians. Houston enjoyed a strong reputation, but there was another faction that disagreed with his theories—the side on which Mirabeau B. Lamar stood.

The Texas constitution prohibited Houston from serving two successive terms as president, so while the "Houston Party" scrambled to find other strong candidates for the 1838 election, the independent thinkers nominated Lamar. Unfortunately for Houston's side, their two strongest candidates committed suicide. They were left with "Honest Bob" Wilson, who garnered only 252 votes to Lamar's 6,695 votes.

Houston sent the president-elect assurances that he bore no ill will and that reports to the contrary were false, writing that he was "a patriot (who) will always bury private animosity in regard for the public will."

On December 1, 1838, the capital city of Houston prepared for the inauguration of the second president. The retiring chief executive was asked to say a few words, but his captivating speech lasted for three hours. An angry Lamar handed his inaugural speech to his secretary and retreated in disgust.

Once in office, President Lamar fought for what he believed was right. Education, a free Texas, and "No Indians" topped the list. Almost immediately he became known as the "father of education" in the Republic. "(A) cultivated mind...is the only dictator that freemen acknowledge and the only security which freemen desire...." he told Congress on December 22, "...defer it until the public domain shall have passed from our hands and the uneducated youth will constitute the living monuments of our neglect and remissness." Before the end of January, 1839, Congress enacted and Lamar signed a bill that laid the foundation for the educational system in the Lone Star State.

The new president also didn't take long to reverse Houston's conciliatory policy toward the Indians. "As long as we continue to exhibit our mercy without showing our strength,"

he declared, "so long will the Indian continue to bloody the edge of the tomahawk." He organized many very successful campaigns to drive the Indians out of Texas.

Annexation to the United States also went against Lamar's way of thinking. "When I reflect upon the vast and momentous consequences, so fatal to liberty on the one hand and so fraught with happiness and glory on the other, I cannot regard the annexation of Texas to the American Union in any other light than as the grave of all her hopes of happiness and greatness."

In fighting for Texas' freedom, Lamar managed to gain the respect of Great Britain and other countries. Ironically, it was the advances made during the Lamar administration that caught the attention of the United States; these strides made eventual annexation to the U.S. possible.

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
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

Many of you have heard about the nationally advertised book titled **Fit For Life** written by Marilyn and Harvey Diamond. This book does not correspond to the Fit For Life courses being taught by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Unfortunately, they only have the same name. The Fit For Life book advises liberal intakes of fruits and vegetables, limited intakes of bread, limited milk products, and limited meats. Exercise is recommended, but without a specific plan. Portions of the book are factual, but a majority of the ideas expressed are severely distorted. Again, the Fit For Life book is not endorsed by Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Fit For Life course taught by Texas Agricultural Extension Service corresponds closely to United States Department of Agriculture dietary guidelines of eating a variety of the basic 4 food groups (limiting too much fat, sugar, alcohol, and salt), maintaining an ideal weight, maintaining a regular exercise program, and managing lifestyle habits (stress). These guidelines are especially helpful to individuals with heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, and the average American.

Sodium is a mineral which is necessary for proper body function. It is involved in maintaining blood volume and cellular osmotic pressure and in transmitting nerve impulse throughout the body. Body needs for sodium are not great. Intakes of 1,100-3,300 milligrams of sodium per day are considered safe by the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council. One teaspoon of salt contains about 2000 mg. of sodium.

The following guidelines will be useful in limiting salt intake:  
 Omit salt in any recipe  
 Use potassium bicarbonate instead of sodium bicarbonate (baking soda)  
 Use sodium-free baking powder instead of regular baking powder  
 Prepare vegetables from the fresh form as much as possible

Be aware of any processed foods that contain the word "sodium"  
 Use non-nutritive sweeteners made of calcium saccharin instead of sodium saccharin  
 Be aware that some over-the-counter drugs, particularly antacids, con-

tain large sodium amounts. Foods from plants contain less sodium naturally than foods from animals. The natural sodium content of animal foods is relatively high and reasonably constant in meat, poultry, fish, eggs, milk and cheese. These are nutritionally essential and should be used in specified amounts. Organ meats contain somewhat more sodium than muscle meats. Shellfish of all kinds is especially high in sodium, but other salt water fish contain no more sodium than freshwater fish. Processed foods, including commercially canned, frozen, and cured foods are likely to have more sodium since sodium products are used as preservatives, flavorings.

Rocky was our pet. He was two years old. He was shot with a pellet gun Thursday so we took him to Dr. Vannoy's Friday morning. We didn't know what was wrong with him. Dr. Vannoy had to operate on Rocky. The pellet hit him in the stomach, so we went back Friday afternoon and he looked fine. My husband and daughter went to pick Rocky up Saturday morning and we kept him in the house.

Rocky was like a kid. He liked to eat doughnuts and cookies in the morning and liked to stay in the Kleenex to lay around and liked people to pet him.

Sunday afternoon Rocky died. My two daughters and I cried and one of my daughters said "Why mom, why are people like that? Why don't they just scream at them to leave their yards?"

I didn't know what to say. It hurt me about what happened to Rocky, and to see my kids hurt. I wanted to write this so if the person who did this to Rocky has kids and he or she would know what it feels like to hurt an animal and the children who love them.

## Crockett County Library Notes

The Adult Literacy Projects offered through 41 libraries encompassing 32 West Texas counties, of which the Crockett County Public Library is one, welcomes adults 16 years of age and older to participate in one-on-one tutoring sessions to--

- \*Increase Reading Skills
- \*Increase Writing Skills
- \*Learn Listening and Number Skills

Classes are taught by volunteers twice a week in hourly sessions held at the Public Library during regular library hours. Adults seeking tutoring may not be currently enrolled in school.

Right in our own community there are many adults who are illiterate. In the U.S., 26 million adults can't read. These people suffer. They lack the basic skills to read a job application, a street sign, or to solve life's daily problems.

You can help as a volunteer in one of more than 600 local literacy groups, affiliates of Laubach Literacy International, offering FREE one-on-one reading and writing instruction. These

programs were founded more than 50 years ago with the work of Dr. Frank C. Laubach.

"You think it is a pity that they cannot read, but the real tragedy is that they have no voice in public affairs, they never vote, they are the silent victims, the forgotten people, driven like animals, mutely submitting in every age before and since the pyramids were built. It is a human weakness not to become aware of suffering unless we hear a cry."---

In Crockett County, we already have one recently trained tutor, Joan Nicholas. We are looking for more interested volunteers and we hope that a Literacy Council will be formed here in conjunction with the Public Library.

All tutoring is done in a private room during day or evening library hours and confidentiality is guaranteed to the student; which is an important aspect of the program. This study program uses structured reading and writing materials that allow steady progress and appeal to adult interests. There is no charge for this service to the student.

If anyone would like to volunteer as a tutor, please call Joan Nicholas, 392-3265, for more information. If anyone in the community knows of persons who speak English, but who cannot read or write and would like to study and learn, please contact Mrs. Nicholas.
