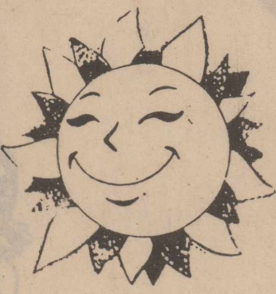

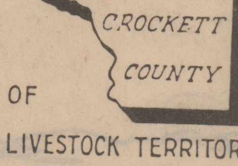

Wool houses conduct sales

Both Ozona wool houses are conducting sealed bid sales on wool today. Wool Growers Central Storage started their sale this morning at 9 a.m. with 260,000 pounds of bag wool. Ozona Wool and Mohair will open their sale this afternoon at 1:30 with 110,000 pounds offered.

Ozona Wool and Mohair participated earlier this week in a five warehouse West Texas sale that saw more than 1 1/2 million pounds of graded and skirted wools selling at strong prices.

Brian May, manager of Ozona Wool, said the local warehouse sold \$240,000 pounds of graded wool with prices ranging from \$1.80 to \$2.65 per pound clean. Clean fall wool went for from \$2.05 to \$2.40 per pound. The big buyers for the graded wool included Burlington and J. P. Stevens. May was excited about the prices and felt

producers would be well pleased.

Ozona Wool will offer 60,000 pounds of 12 months wool this afternoon and 50,000 pounds of short wool. This will be the regular wool sale of original bag wool. May expects strong prices in the sealed bid sale. He said all mohair had been cleaned out and sold earlier at good prices.

Jim Adams at Wool Growers said yesterday that prospects for the sealed bid wool sale this morning look very good with a lot of participation from the buyers. The firm offered 260,000 pounds of bag wool. Adams also reported a complete clean out of mohair at good prices earlier. He said Crockett County producers were lucky, because many West Texas houses had a lot of mohair left.

Adams also extended an invitation to all participating growers to attend the sale and the barbecue to follow.

Judge Fuller candidate for court of appeals

District Judge Larry Fuller of Monahans, Texas is a candidate for the position of Justice of the 8th Court of Appeals, located in El Paso. The district covers 22 counties of West Texas. The position is now vacant due to the death of Judge William Ward after his decision not to run for another term.

Judge Fuller has served over 9 years as District Judge for the 143rd Judicial District having previously served as District Attorney for the same district.

A graduate of the University of Texas with a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree and a Law Degree, he has been a resident of Monahans for over 15 years.

Before becoming District Judge, Fuller had spent his entire legal career as a trial lawyer in both the civil and criminal fields.

A recent Judicial Poll was conducted by the State Bar of Texas in which the lawyers and judges of the 8th District participated. Larry Fuller was voted the best qualified for the position.

He stated, "The pressing volume of litigation, both civil and criminal, has put a great burden on our trial and appellate courts requiring diligent working judges to render prompt decisions. I'm running as a working judge with a proven working record. It

will take enormous support from our smaller communities to overcome the advantage held by my opponent from the larger city of El Paso, but we in the smaller populated counties of this state should have judicial representation on our appellate courts".

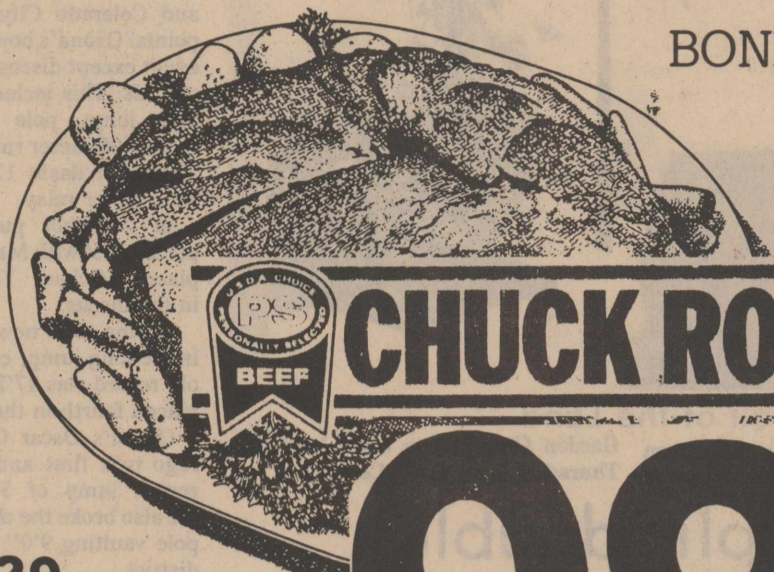

Royals split double header with Sonora

The Ozona, Royals traveled to Sonora Sunday, April 20 and split a double-header with the Colt 45's losing 12 to 4 and winning a close one 6 to 4.

The Royals lost the first game after opening with a four run inning. Sonora pitcher Pat Badillo ran into early control trouble and walked Steve Sanchez, Oscar Payne, and Abel Lara. With the bases loaded John Galvan drove in a run with a single. The Royals scored two runs on Richard Sanchez' single. Cruz Garza ended the Royals scoring by driving in a fourth run on another single. Sanchez was on the mound and pitched 3 1/2 innings as Sonora's contact hitters scored five runs on five hits, three walks, and four strike outs. Abel Lara came on in relief, pitching 3 1/2 innings allowing seven runs on four hits, five walks, four strike outs and two errors.

Game two proved to be a close and exciting game as the Royals came through in the clutch to win 6 to 4.

The Royals once again scored four runs in the first inning on a lead-off double by Galvan, two walks, and a two RBI single by R. Sanchez. R. Sanchez was on the mound for the Royals and allowed four runs on six hits, six strike outs, six walks and three errors. The Colt 45's gradually cut the Royals lead and tied the game at four in the bottom half of the fifth inning. With the score tied in the top of the seventh, the Royals rallied

behind the bats of Galvan and Sanchez as the Royals scored two runs. R. Sanchez set the Colt 45's down in order in the seventh to secure his second complete game of the season.

A strong and undefeated Big Spring Red Sox team came to Ozona Sunday and improved their record to 8-0 by sweeping a double-header from the Royals 12 to 0 and 9 to 2.

The Red Sox showed their strong hitting throughout the day by hitting nine homeruns of Royals pitching.

In game one, the Red Sox scored their first runs off Abel Lara after two walks and two base hits to make the score 2 to 0 after three innings. The Red Sox scored six more runs in the fourth on five homeruns, two off Lara, two off relief pitcher Willie Fierro and one off Cruz Garza. The Red Sox scored four more runs on three homeruns to end a 12 to 0 route of the Royals. The Royals could only manage one base hit off Big Spring ace Ernest Castro who struck out 12 Royal batters in five innings.

In game two, R. Sanchez was on the mound as the Royals hoped to take one game from the Red Sox to keep pace in the Western Division behind Big Spring.

The Royals will try to bounce back Sunday against San Angelo Angels in San Angelo's Cielito Lindo Ball Park at 1:30.

Seventh grade track team wins district meet

The Seventh Grade Track Team took a big win in Ballinger at the District 7AAA Jr. High Track Meet April 12. The Ozona team took first place in the meet with 218 points. Ballinger followed with 84, Sonora was third with 71.5, Coahoma placed fourth with 47 and Colorado City was fifth with 7 points. Ozona's boys took first in every event except discus, and set nine new records. This included the long jump, high jump, pole vault, 400 meter relay, 600 meter run, 300 meter dash, 200 meter dash, 1200 meter run and 1200 meter relay.

In the shot put Ruben Borrego placed first with Martin Urbina in fifth place. Michael Ybarra was fourth in the discus.

Urbina set a new record of 17'3 1/4" in the long jump, coming in first. The old record was 17'2 1/4". Mingo Perez placed fourth in the event.

Ozona's Oscar Gutierrez and Borrego took first and second tying the record jump of 5'4" each. Gutierrez also broke the old record of 8'6" by pole vaulting 9'0" and taking first in district.

Ozona's 400 meter relay team of Perez, Borrego, Gutierrez and Urbina took first with 48.63, again breaking a record of 50.68.

Urbina placed first in the 600 meter with 1:34.44 breaking the old record of 1:40.45. Jose Ramos came in third with 1:40.48.

Jason Vitella was first in the 110 meter hurdles. Lonnie Martinez placed third.

Gutierrez took another first in the 100 meter dash with 12.65 and Ybarra came in second.

In the 300 meter dash Urbina was first with 39.89 (old record was 41.49).

Perez placed first in the 210 hurdles. This was a new event so Perez's time set the record, 31.47. Vitella placed second and Martinez was third.

Borrego was first with a new record of 24.77 in the 200 meter dash, over the old record of 25.51. Ybarra was

second. In the 1200 meter run Ramos was first setting a new record of 3:44.72 over the old time of 3:57.55. Gilbert Rico came in second with 3:53.62, also breaking the old record.

In the 1200 relay race the team of Perez, Gutierrez, Borrego and Ybarra was first with 2:44.94 breaking the old record of 2:57.13.

Individual points included Oscar Gutierrez 40, Martin Urbina 37, Ruben Borrego 38, Mingo Perez 24, Michael Ybarra 24, Jason Vitella 18, Jose Ramos 16, Lonnie Martinez 12, and Gilbert Rico 8. Ozona totaled 218 team points for the big win.

The eighth grade boy's track team came in third in district at the meet. Ballinger was first with 143, Sonora had 104, Ozona 85, Coahoma 68, Colorado City 65, and Crane 29.

In the pole vault Lalo Rodriguez had 10'0" placing first with George Ybarra taking third place. Rodriguez was second in the discus. He took fourth in the shot put with Pete Ramirez placing sixth. Ybarra took fourth place in the long jump.

The 400 meter relay team of Moe Cruz, Andy Stokes, Isaac Leal, and George Ybarra placed fourth.

Chris Denman took first place in the 110 meter hurdles with 17.58 setting a new record. The old record was 18.13. Lalo Rodriguez came in second and Andy Stokes placed sixth.

Moe Cruz placed fourth in the 100 meter dash. He came in sixth in the 200 meter dash.

In the 210 meter hurdles George Ybarra was first and Lalo Rodriguez was second.

Individual points included Lalo Rodriguez with 38, George Ybarra had 22, Chris Denman 10, Moe Cruz 7, Andy Stokes 3, and Pete Ramirez 1.

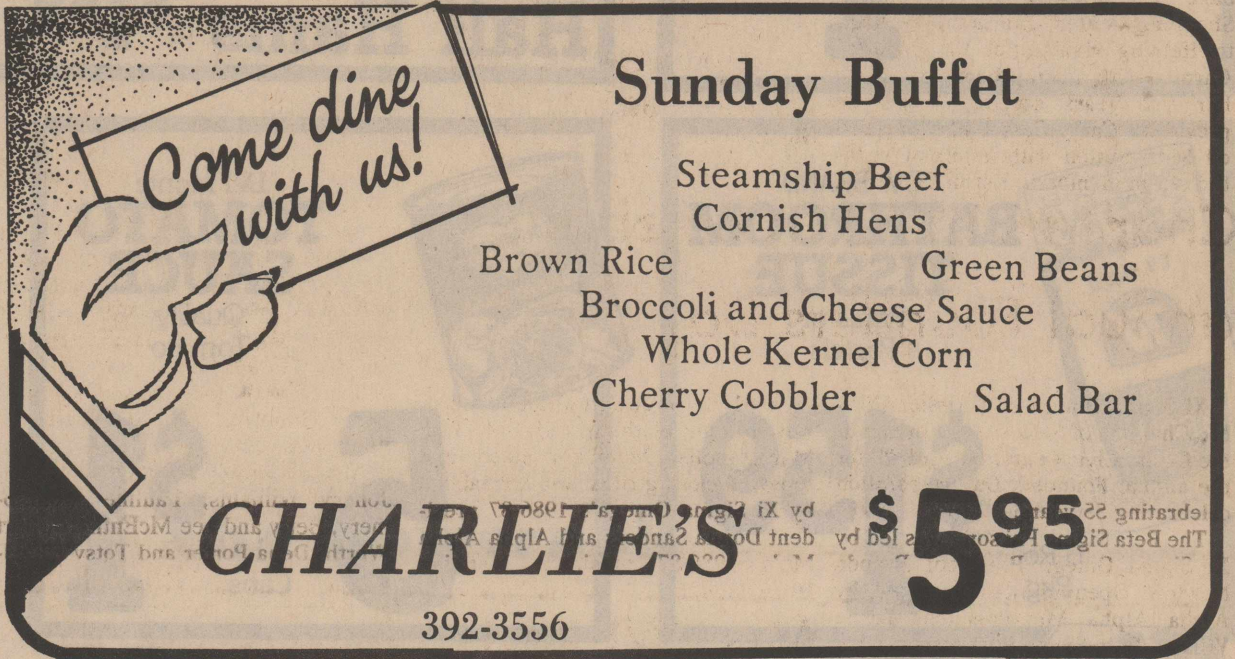

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club

In spite of no rain up to now, garden club members and viewers were pleasantly surprised at flower show entries last Thursday at the annual Garden Club Flower Show.

Horticulture specimens were scarce and the rose section was very disappointing. The houseplant section was outstanding with beautiful foliage, succulent and blooming plants.

The Artistic Division was beautifully staged this year with well-designed entries in keeping with the celebration of the Texas Sesquicentennial many guests and the judges said they thought the show was one of the most attractive the club has ever staged. This was especially rewarding to new members.

Many blue ribbons were awarded in the different divisions. You may have seen blooms and plants that you would like to try in your landscape or home. Too, there were many design arrangements in the Artistic Division that will stimulate your imagination and interest in the new trends of arranging in a

number of classes.

Though rain in our area has been mostly on the minus side, our city has been aglow with a beautiful array of roses, iris, peonies and amaryllis. Too, the native yellow daisies have been in full bloom as though there had been ample moisture.

Now that May is approaching this month you can see spring-to-summer transition in your garden. Early bulbs and shrubs have bloomed, and later varieties are coming into flower.

It is not too late to plant gladiola bulbs for late blooming. Support those that are about to bloom with a strong stake.

If climbing roses that bloom only in the spring have finished blooming, cut out all dead limbs and old canes, and prune back for new growth to form for next year's blooms.

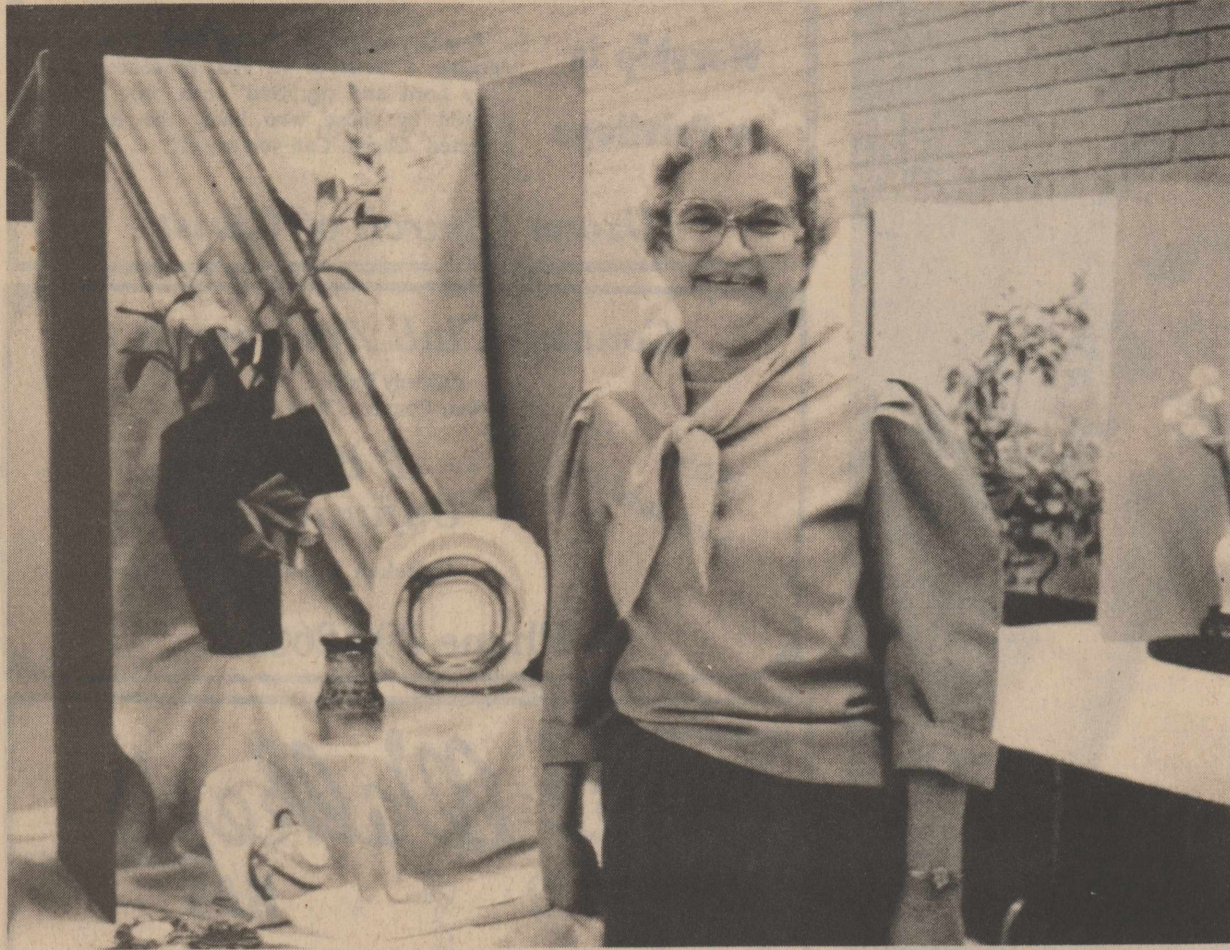

Families and financial crisis

No family wants to be in financial crisis. That's why we try to prevent it by learning about budgeting and family financial management.

But there are many factors which can force almost any family into financial straits—at least temporarily. The Texas families facing financial problems include:

Farm Families. Economic conditions in agriculture have placed a severe financial strain on some farmers. Not only does the farm enterpris suffer, but the family finances feel the squeeze too.

Unemployed families. Practically every family experiences unemployment at one time or another. Plant closings or layoffs can affect a whole community as well as individual families. Unemployment may be buffered somewhat in two-paycheck families. When a family's lifestyle and debt level are based on having both incomes, however, the effects of unemployment will still be considerable.

High debt families. To buy a home, many families have taken on debts that consume a fourth to a third of their incomes. In addition, the availability of credit for almost every type of purchase has increased the debt level of many families. Families deep in debt may not have the resources to meet a financial emergency, such as unemployment. Some have faced foreclosure on their homes.

Fixed income elderly. Faced with rising medical costs and other expenses and fixed incomes, many older families experience difficult economic times. Even families that planned carefully for retirement may face a period of adjustment as they downscale their lifestyle to fit their retirement income.

Single heads of households. Figures show that divorce typically means a substantial drop in income and standard of living—especially for mothers who have custody of the children.

Remarriage families. A person who remarried after being divorced may have financial obligations to children from a previous marriage as well as children and a spouse in the current marriage.

Military families. Enlisted personnel and their families face the extra financial strain of moving often and becoming resettled in a new community. Spouses of military personnel may also find it difficult to work outside the home because of frequent moves.

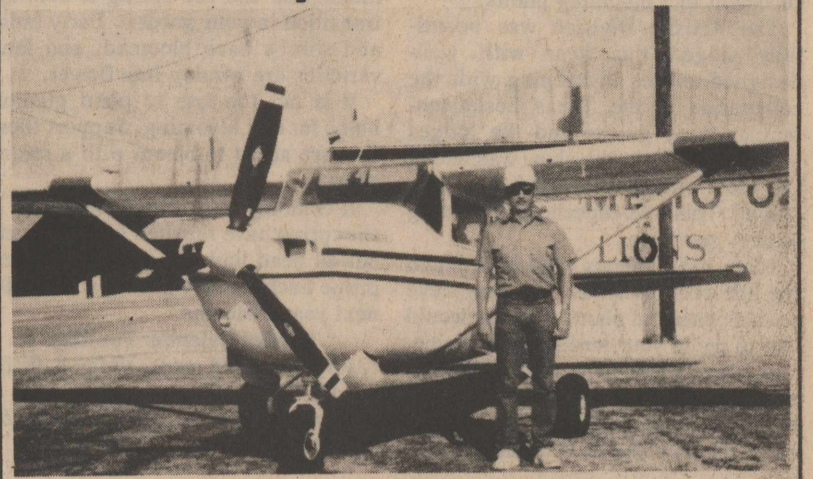
Although economic conditions can't be controlled, families facing a financial crisis can make good use of money management skills to make the best of their situation.

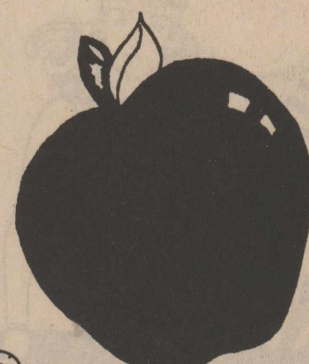

In checking the mail the other day I received a letter from the Ozona Public School Systems. The letter was to inform me that my kindergarten daughter has been absent too much and that she is getting too far behind the rest of her class and there's a possibility of retaining her back. The letter went on to say if she's sick anymore I'd have to furnish them with a written excuse from her doctor and it was signed by her principal.

I'll have you know this letter upset me very much. First of all my little girl has bronchial asthma, she's had it since birth. She's been in and out of hospitals since she was born up until the last 2 years. Since then we recognize the symptoms and treat her at home with antibiotics and croup medicine. A cold with her can turn into bronchial pneumonia overnight.

I've talked to her teacher and find she's at the top of her class in performance.

My husband and I work hard and do our best to see that our children are healthy and attend school regular. We have enough trouble paying for medicine and doctor bills without taking chances of having our little girl hospitalized.

I understand that the government is intertwined in our school systems and if a child has 5 unexcused absents they can be failed.

What I don't understand is how the government can come in and tell us what's excusable and what's not. A primary school child cannot do as he or she wants to do, they do what their parents tell them. As parents we can't afford to spend \$30 everytime our children holler they have a stomach ache or sore throat. It seems to me the government has enough to keep them busy without worrying about who has the flu and who doesn't. I feel if the government and schools want and need written doctor excuses someone should make arrangements to pick up the tab.

I'm concerned about what's happening to our school systems! This used to be a free country where a child could afford to be sick without breaking any rules.

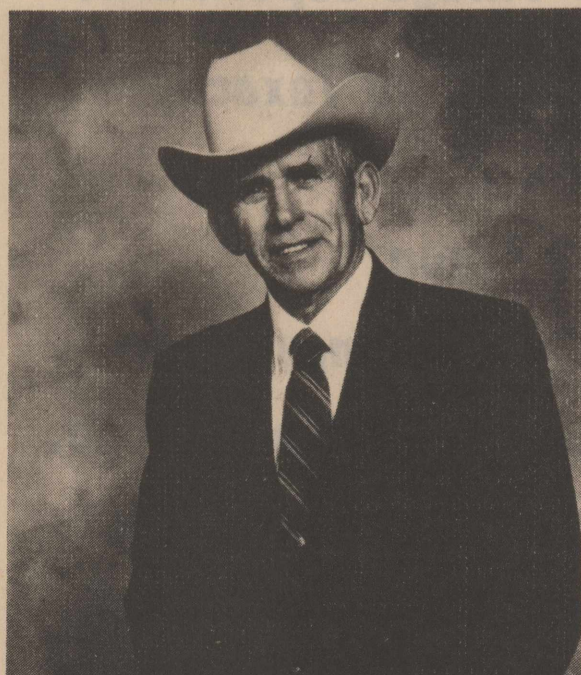

Conservation field day for students

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District and the Crockett County Extension Service sponsored the second annual conservation education field day tour for the sixth grade students of Ozona last week on April 23. The purpose of the tour was to give the students a basic understanding of what our renewable natural resources are and how they must be properly cared for to sustain our current way of life. As future leaders of our land, another purpose was to impress upon them that they will be the ones taking care of our natural resources.

The morning portion of the tour consisted of taking the students to the Bill Baggett ranch where they were presented subject matter on range, wildlife, and soils.

At the range stop, the students learned how grass grows, the need for proper grazing use and deferred grazing, brush control and water consumption of brush and grass, and a hands-on demonstration of water infiltration on various types of grass cover and bare ground.

The soils stop consisted of learning the characteristics of soil and potential erosion problems, how soil is formed, and applicable conservation practices for conserving soil.

Subject matter presented at the wildlife stop included basics of deer antler development and aging of deer, important habitat for game and non-game wildlife species with management implications, and wildlife laws and regulations.

The students were then taken to the fellowship hall of the Methodist Church where they were fed a barbecue lunch provided by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District.

After lunch, the students were taken to the Ozona Wool and Mohair warehouse where they had the opportunity to see a sheep being shorn. Brian May presented a talk on wool and mohair as it relates to Crockett County and Texas and gave the students a chance to see and feel several different wool and mohair samples. Rachael Hall then gave a presentation on the processes wool and mohair go through to become a finished clothing product.

The entire day was enjoyed by all who attended and plans are to continue this event annually. Much appreciation is expressed to the Ozona school officials for their continued support, Bill Baggett for the use of his ranch, the personnel in the area of the Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and others who contributed to this educational activity.

Crockett field gains another producer

The University 31 multipay field of Crockett County gained another Strawn detrital gas producer with completion of J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, No. 2 Henderson 8-10, 15 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5,400,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 874.713-1. Gravity of the condensate was 52.2 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 8,511-668 feet, which had been acidized with 12,000 gallons.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,203 feet: San Andres, 990 feet; upper Canyon, 6,088 feet; Strawn, 8,507 feet; Devonian, 8,704 feet; and Simpson, 9,010 feet.

Drilled to 9,075 feet and plugged back to 9,071 feet, 4 1/2-inch casing was set at 8,958 feet.

It is located 990 feet from the north and 1,090 feet from the east lines of 8-SL-T&StL Survey.

Good News America God Loves you !!

This is not just a story--it is history. In 1829, George Wilson, in Pennsylvania was sentenced to be hanged by a United States Court for robbing the mails and for murder. President Andrew Jackson pardoned him, but this was refused, and Wilson insisted that it was not a pardon unless he accepted it. That was a point of law never before raised, and the President called upon the Supreme Court to decide.

Chief Justice John Marshall gave the following decision: "A pardon is a paper, the value of which depends upon its acceptance by the person implicated. It is hardly to be supposed that one under sentence of death would refuse to accept a pardon, but if it is refused, it is no pardon. George Wilson must be hanged!" And he was hanged.

This story, though documented, seems hardly believable. If he was guilty of murder, I don't know why President Jackson would pardon him. But since he did, why didn't George Wilson accept it? No one would be that stupid! Or would they?

Every day men and women are refusing the pardon offered by God. The Bible says we are all guilty. We may not have committed murder but "all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" and "the wages of sin is death." Even though we deserve to die for our rebellion (that's what sin is), Jesus died in our place and received the "wages" for our sin; and He offers to us "the gift of eternal life through Christ Jesus our Lord."


This "gift," God's pardon must be accepted. It is offered to all but it must be accepted by faith. The Bible says "whosoever calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." How do we "call upon the name of the Lord?" Some people are trusting in their own good works, but the Bible says we are saved through faith and that faith is a gift of God, not of works. Some people are trusting in their Church membership, but nowhere in the Bible does it tell us that the Church can save us. Some people are trusting in a Godly mother, or father, or grandmother, or aunt, but nowhere in the Bible does it tell us that anyone else can accept the gift of eternal life for us. When I approach the gates of heaven, God is not going to be interested that I was a "Baptist" or anything else. He will only be concerned with my relationship to His "only begotten Son." You see, the Bible says "if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. "You will be saved!"



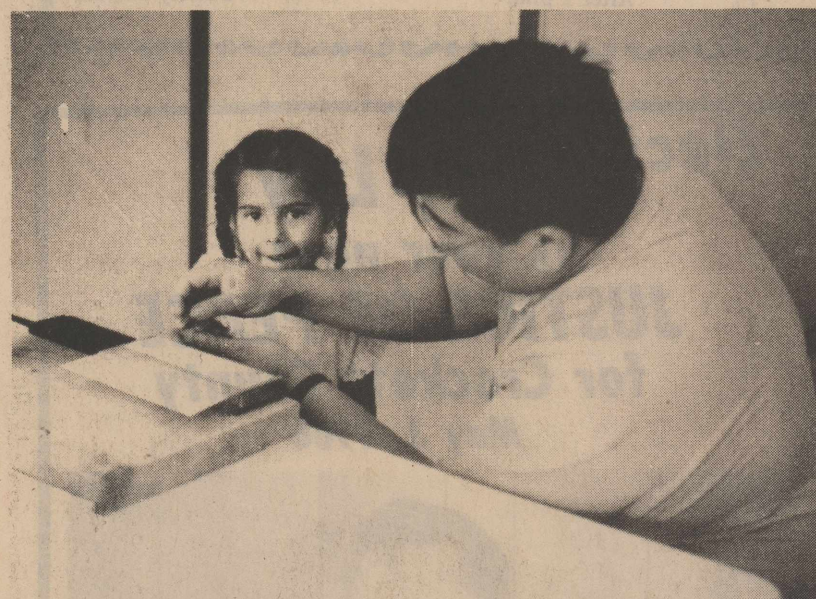
Screening clinic for children successful

The Ozona Community Center, in conjunction with the Crockett County Schools and the Region XV Education Center, held its fourth annual Screening Clinic on Wednesday and Thursday, April 23 and 24.

The Screening Clinic involves children 4 and 5 years of age. There are three basic areas tested in the clinic. The children are tested in the areas of vision, hearing, and language, which consists of gross motor, fine motor, concepts, and communication skills. When all areas are completed, there is a final evaluation of the child's progress with recommendations made for any additional help the child may need before entering the public schools.

On Wednesday, April 23, seventy-two children were pre-registered for the 1986-1987 school year with sixty-six 4 year olds screened on Thursday, April 24.

The Clinic was administered by a few primary teachers, the primary aides and secretary, the school nurse, and the Public Health Nurse, but the bulk of the work was handled by volunteers from the community. The Clinic was considered a huge success because of the good turnout and the participation of the volunteer workers.

Taxpayers should keep records of all returns

Taxpayers should keep records of tax returns and all attachments. Tax information may be required for income averaging, college grant applications, real estate purposes, etc.

Taxpayers who have not retained copies of prior year tax returns can either request photocopies of previously filed returns or transcripts of tax account information, according to the Internal Revenue Service, either request can be made on Form 4506, "Request For Copy of Tax Form or Tax Account Information."

The charge for photocopies of prior year returns is \$4.25 per return. Alternatively, transcripts of tax account information will be provided for \$2.25 per tax year. The tax account information includes type of return filed, marital status, tax shown on return, adjusted gross income, taxable income, self-employment tax and number of exemptions.

Full payment must accompany all orders. Taxpayers should allow at least 45 days for delivery when requesting photocopies of prior year returns, and at least 30 days when requesting tax account information. Allow at least six weeks processing time after the original return is filed before requesting a copy or other information.

To order Form 4506, taxpayers can write the IRS or call the IRS Forms/Information number listed in the local telephone directory.
