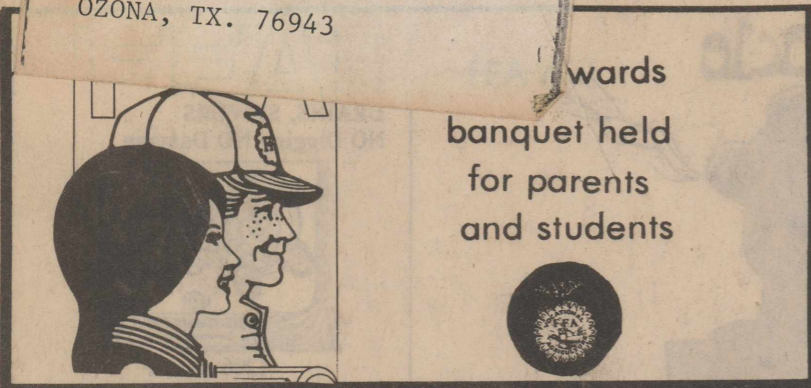

Services here Monday for L. D. Kirby

Funeral services for L. D. Kirby, 69, were held at 3 p.m. Monday in Ozona United Methodist Church with the Rev. Ken Harrison officiating. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Sizemore Funeral Home.

Mr. Kirby died at 7 p.m. Friday in St. John's Hospital in San Angelo, where he had been a patient four weeks.

Mr. Kirby was born June 6, 1916, in Lometa. He married Georgia Williams July 6, 1943, in Lamesa. He had been a resident of Ozona since 1937. He was a member of the Ozona United Methodist Church, the Lions Club and the Masonic Lodge. He served as a captain in the Air Corps during World War II.

Survivors include his wife, of Ozona; one daughter, Barbara Zimmerman of Guttenberg, N.J.; two sisters, Bernice Cass of Lampasas and Frieda Dyer of Athens, and two brothers, Forrest Kirby of Breckenridge and Glen Kirby of Cedar Park.

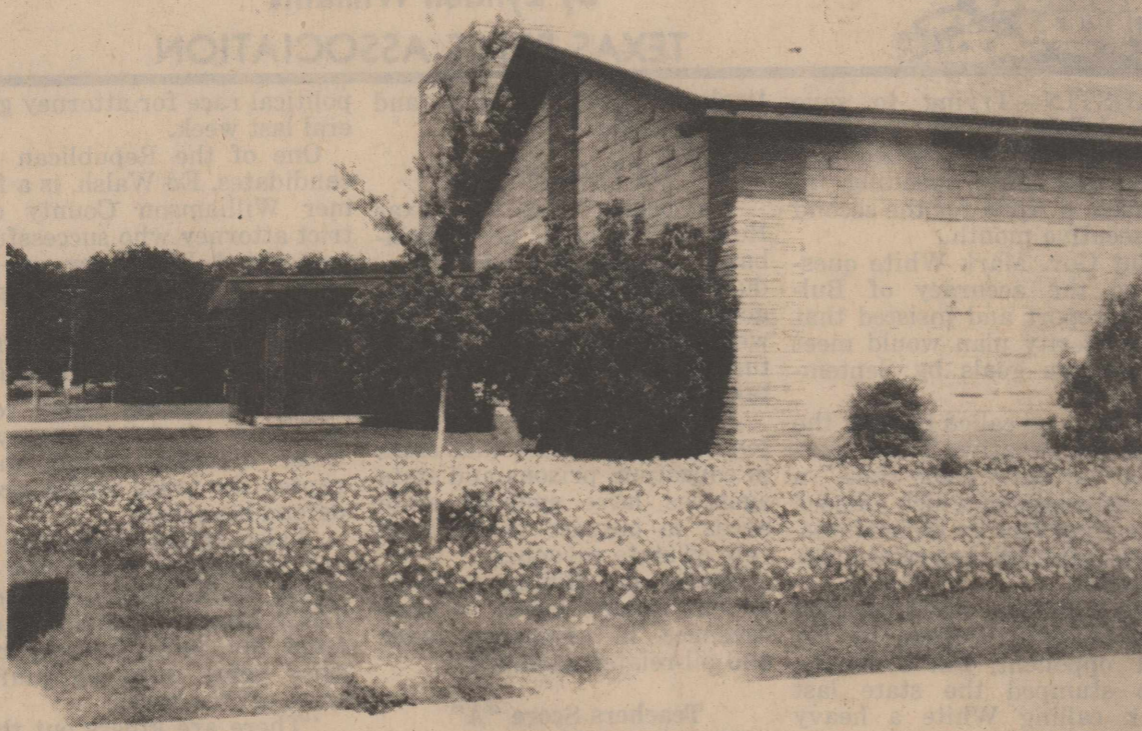
Ozona misses heavy rainfall over weekend

Ozona missed out on the big rains which drenched the area on the heels of a front Friday and Saturday. Much promise was held in the threatening clouds and booming thunder, but only .67 of an inch of rain fell during the electrical storms which came throughout the day Friday and the night until Saturday morning.

Several homeowners reported up to an inch of rain in their home gauges, but the official gauge at the water district office only recorded .67 of an inch. The weather station on cable television lists .64 of an inch for the period.

Heavier rains were reported to the north and to the south of Ozona, but all fell to the east. Hail was reported on some ranches and Hwy 163 south was closed to traffic due to high water and at least one drowning death was reported near Eldorado.

Draws ran throughout the area. Johnson Draw was impassable except by the bridge on Eleventh Street early Saturday morning, but by noon, the water had run down and the rain had passed.

Commissioners pass sub-division regulation

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in what turned out to be an all-day session. The agenda was brief, but lengthy discussions on several subjects forced the court to return following a lunch break and met well into the afternoon.

The morning session was taken up with reports from various department heads, and the afternoon session was taken up with discussion on the budget for 1987, discussing the county's role in sub-divisions setting guidelines and the canvass of election returns.

Eddie Moore appeared to give the road report. Moore reported the gravel being delivered for the summer paving program often did not meet specifications. This subject set off a lengthy discussion on gravel specs, county roads, etc. Some time later, Judge A. O. Fields urged the court to get on with the meeting. "We can argue about it until doomsday," he said, "and still accomplish nothing, we have been an hour on gravel."

Moore brought up the possibility of purchasing a Jay Miller Co. truck in the amount of \$3,500. Commissioner Jack Williams expressed the opinion that the county had no need to buy any more old, worn out equipment. He also expressed the belief that the road department had more vehicles than it had employees. Some discussion was held on the proper care and maintenance of equipment before Moore completed his report.

Onesimo Ortiz reported on the parks department and was given permission to replace boards on the stands at the rodeo arena. He reported the lowest bid received on a 20-ton jack was \$1,262.40. Commissioner B. W. Stuart made the motion that the purchase be made and Commissioner Chuy Castro made the second. The motion passed. It was reported the newly poured sidewalk at the library was not acceptable and had been replaced.

Garland Young reported a record month for functions at the Civic Center. During the month, 36 functions were held at the center with large attendance. Young reported on the all night, alcohol free graduation party which will be held following graduation May 30. The first event of this kind was held last year and was very successful. Young expects an even larger turnout this year.

County Librarian Louise LeDoux gave the library report, reporting on a wide variety of activities planned for the summer months. She also reported the board is in the process of securing a drive-in book drop.

Jeanette Hill gave the Helping Hands report. The organization served 878 meals in April with a 39.9 daily average. Meal donations amounted to \$731. Average cost per meal was \$2.58. She reported a total of 177 families received commodities in April. The next distribution day is May 22.

Bill Boswell appeared to give the hospital report. He had no good news on the financial condition of the hospital, reporting a patient load of 19 persons for the 4 months this year. Boswell said keeping the hospital open at such a tremendous loss comes down to the people in the community. Do they want their tax dollars used to support a hospital which is not utilized?

Bids were opened for hospital liability insurance. Jack Baggett of Baggett Agency submitted the only bid for professional and premises liability. The premium was \$25,000. To show the amount of increase in the premium, it was brought out the same policy last year cost just over \$11,000. Five years ago it was \$4,000. County Attorney Tom Cameron expressed the opinion the liability insurance should be continued in spite of the cost. After discussion, the court voted to accept the policy.

Commissioner Stuart's plan to lower the streets in Precinct 2 where flooding occurred last year was brought up in the meeting. Stuart said the plan had been scrapped due to the water lines and sewer lines being so close to the surface of the street.

After a discussion on the 1987 budget, the County Auditor Dick Kirby pointed out an estimated loss of \$820,000 in revenues for the next year, there was talk of raising taxes. Commissioner Williams made it very clear he would not vote for any tax increase. He said "the way this court spends money it is ridiculous to even consider a tax increase."

After some discussion on paving and working in sub-divisions the court took a lunch break and returned to continue deliberations at 1:30.

A report on the erosion of the tax base came from the Auditor. He said the firm of Prichard and Abbott had informed the county to expect an estimated \$650,000 lost in property taxes.

Although the bill has yet to be passed, another \$120,000 loss in federal revenue sharing funds is expected. The estimated loss on license plate sales is estimated at from \$50,000 to \$60,000. The court briefly

went over the budget and the auditor pointed out some places where costs could be cut in 1987.

The court decided against replacement of employees who quit or retire, and will continue to attempt to cut costs in other areas. They will attempt to keep the hospital open, but have yet to find the money to do so. The hospital is in the budget for the present year, so current action is not critical.

The court adopted a resolution on subdivisions. The resolution reads as follows: "No subdivision plan will be accepted by the Crockett County Commissioners Court until all roads and alleys are completed by developer or owner to county specifications."

Monthly bills were approved for payment, and the Democratic Primary election results were canvassed before the court adjourned. The election was approved. Several write-in votes for Democratic County Chairman were counted, with Steve Kenley, current chairman, getting the nod with 19 votes. Robert Longoria received 17 write-in.

Judge A. O. Fields is inquiring into the possibility a run-off may be forced between the two men. The law on write-in votes is not clear on this matter, but neither received a majority of the write in votes.

\$600,000 in illegal money confiscated

Approximately \$600,000 in suspected illegal narcotics money was found in the truck of a car during a routine speeding investigation in Crockett County Sunday afternoon.

The money was confiscated after the two occupants of a vehicle stopped on Interstate Highway 10 about three miles east of Ozona denied ownership of the money. Numerous stacks of \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills were discovered inside a suitcase and attache case, a spokesman for the Department of Public Safety said Monday.

"The seizure is the largest ever made as result of a routine traffic stop," said Mike Cox, a DPS public information officer.

"We've had larger seizures in joint state and federal investigations but this one is the largest since \$400,000 was confiscated near Laredo early this year," he said.

Cox said the money was found after the driver of the auto, a 37-year-old Riverside, Calif. man, signed a "consent to search waiver" allowing

investigating officers to make a warrantless search of the Florida rental car he was driving for possible contraband.

"Both the driver and the passenger denied ownership of the money," Cox said.

Neither man was arrested, Cox said. "The driver was cited for speeding and allowed to continue on."

Highway Patrolman C. J. Babbitt of Ozona said the men were in route from Florida to El Paso.

State officials are in process of making individual photocopies of the bills for later examination by the Drug Enforcement Administration at Washington, Cox said.

"They (DEA) will check the serial numbers to see if any of the money was used in any undercover narcotics investigation," Cox said. He said the bills would be retained by the DPS pending formal seizure action by the U.S. Attorney at Lubbock.

Salutatorian is David M. Adams,

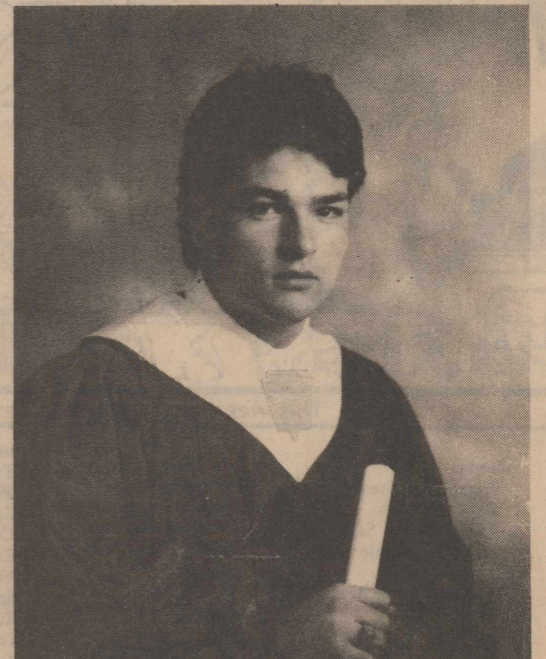
son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Adams, who graduated with a 7.13 average.

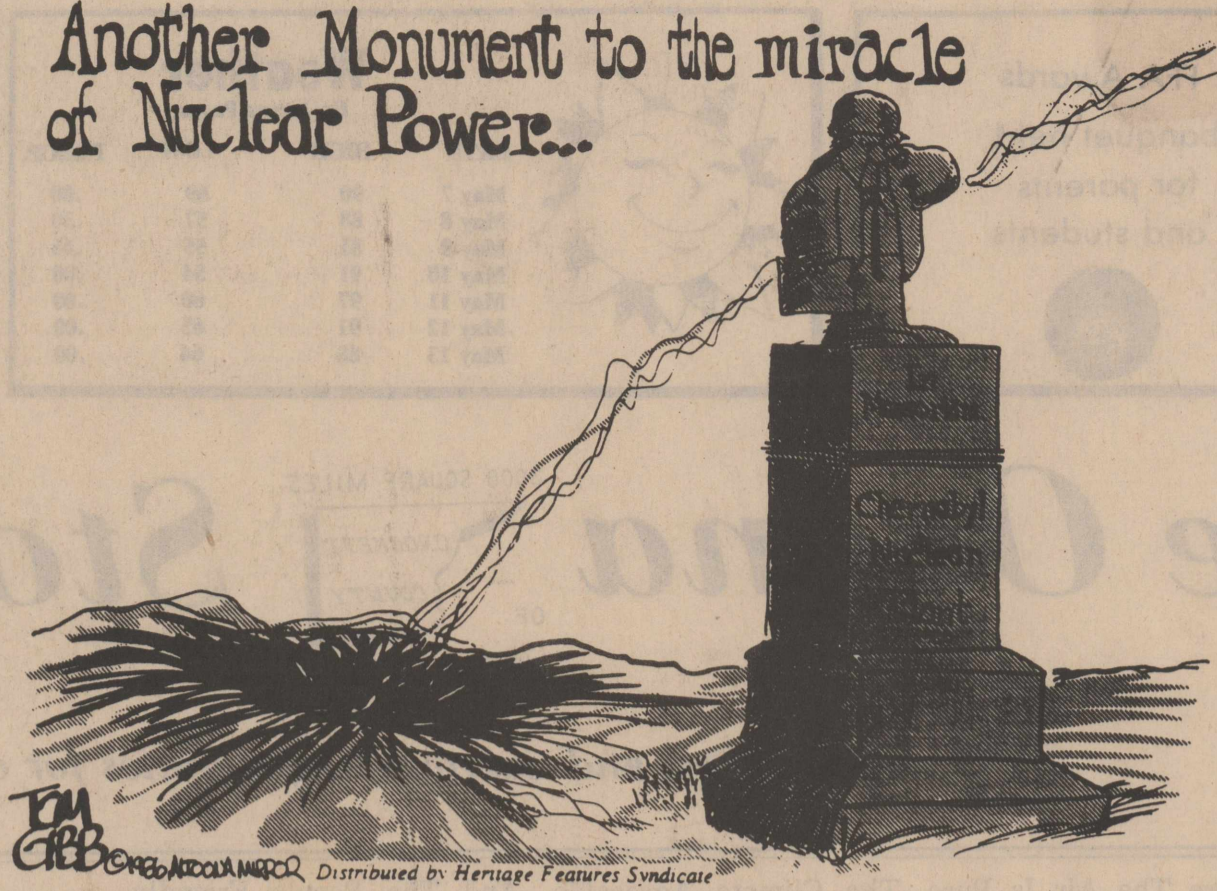

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Trying to save state dollars, Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock warned last week that state spending increased in April for the second consecutive month.

But Gov. Mark White questioned the accuracy of Bullock's report and insisted that his austerity plan would meet its savings goals by September.

White also called himself the most conservative Texas governor "in quite some time," a characterization which amazed some observers by its boldness. White, after all, has raised taxes twice.

His statement was a political reaction to criticisms by his GOP opponent, Bill Clements, who stumped the state last week calling White a heavy spender.

Clements labeled himself as the underdog, which is true since White defeated him in '82. But in terms of campaign spending, Clements has the resources to wage an impressive campaign.

Replay '82

After election results showed both White and Clements winning their party nominations without runoffs, the politicians at the Capitol seemed to settle back to watch the main event: a replay of '82.

On election night, Clements gathered the public support of his two defeated opponents, Tom Loeffler and Kent Hance, in an immediate show of Republican unity.

By contrast, White hasn't announced whether he plans to meet with his opponents, particularly Andy Briscoe and Don Crowder.

Oil Patch Woes

The president of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based organization which conducts private research on state government financing, last week said the Texas Legislature probably will have to raise taxes next session.

Jarred Hazleton told Houston business leaders that costs in education, prisons and state agencies have spurred state needs to outpace the growth rate of state revenues.

Again, the falling price of oil has caused losses in state revenues in severance taxes and oil-related sales taxes.

Teachers Score "A"

Texas teachers performed better than predicted on the controversial literacy exam, with almost 97 percent passing.

The state education agency had predicted five percent would fail, but whether their success will appease the teachers who had hotly protested White's reform remains to be seen.

Conference Clash

The issue of convicted killer Henry Lee Lucas' hoax on Texas lawmen cropped up in the

political race for attorney general last week.

One of the Republican AG candidates, Ed Walsh, is a former Williamson County district attorney who successfully prosecuted Lucas for one of the many murders Lucas said he committed.

Last week, after Attorney General Jim Mattox issued a report indicating Lucas could not have committed many of those murders, Walsh interrupted the press conference to defend his record.

Walsh criticized Mattox for not supporting Texas law officers, while Mattox said some Texas Rangers should be criticized for being too eager to clear some unsolved murder cases off the books.

"There are killers out there walking the streets today... as a result of the unprofessional handling of the Lucas investigation," Mattox said.

Walsh is involved in a GOP primary runoff with San Antonio Judge Roy Barrera, Jr., with the eventual winner taking on Mattox in November.

Other Highlights

—Mattox also announced his office obtained a verdict worth over \$400,000 in civil penalties against two men whose Orange County company violated state pollution laws.

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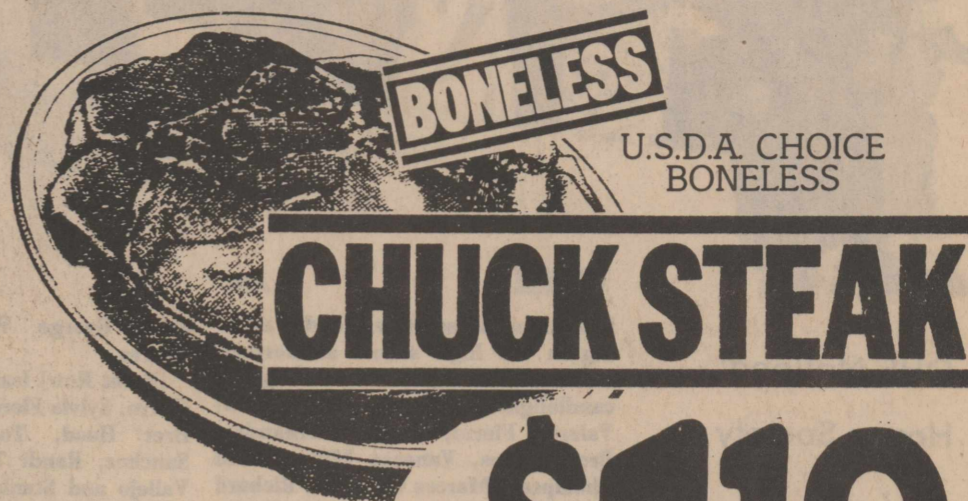

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

Landscaping with edibles is becoming very popular and can be economically sound, functional and pleasing.

With limited space, more and more gardeners are turning to edibles in preference to strictly ornamentals when landscaping their property. A perennial bed edged with low growing strawberries can be extremely attractive. Asparagus, rhubarb, Jerusalem artichoke and dwarf curled kale will add color, form and texture to a flower bed.

Grapevines on a trellis, as a divider, or along a fence can be attractive and fruitful. With proper pruning and cultivation they will prove as satisfactory as a hedge. Pear, apple, peach, plum and cherry trees provide shade and offer a variety in shape, height, ultimate size and certainly in fruits.

Miniature vegetables are becoming increasingly popular with gardeners who have limited space and with those who simply want to add a new dimension to their gardening experience.

There is a new breed of plants, small vegetables grown on small plants. Their miniature size and delicate flavor are appealing. If you want to grow these, suggest you read carefully the descriptions in seed catalogs and on seed packets. There are standard sized plants which produce both small and regular-sized fruits, as in the case of cherry tomatoes.

There are many dwarf and bush varieties of beans, peas, squash, melons and cucumbers. These require less space than standard-size plants but the true miniature is the one to watch for. Look for beets, carrots, egg plant, lettuce, muskmelon, pumpkin, summer squash, sweet corn and watermelon. These can be found listed among miniatures in new seed catalogs.

Too, you may want to try growing some of the odd-colored vegetables. More and more gardeners are planting these for their novel appearance and their fine flavor. There are most any odd-colored vegetables being offered so you may want to go along with the colored trend.

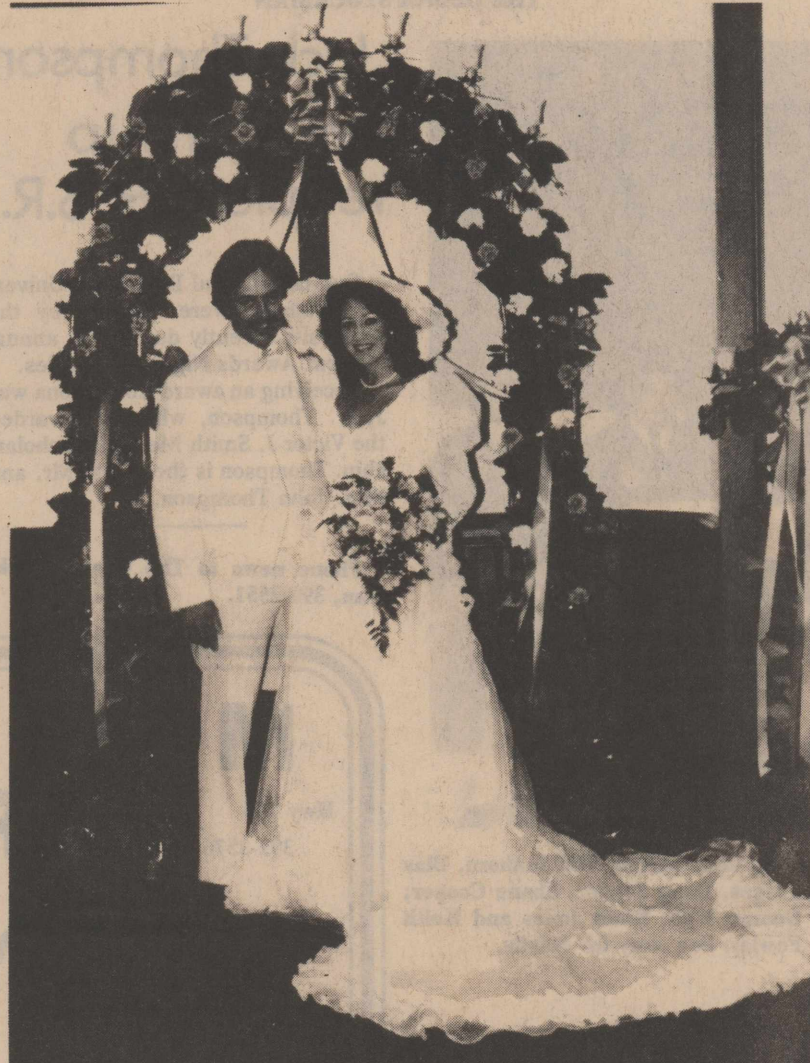

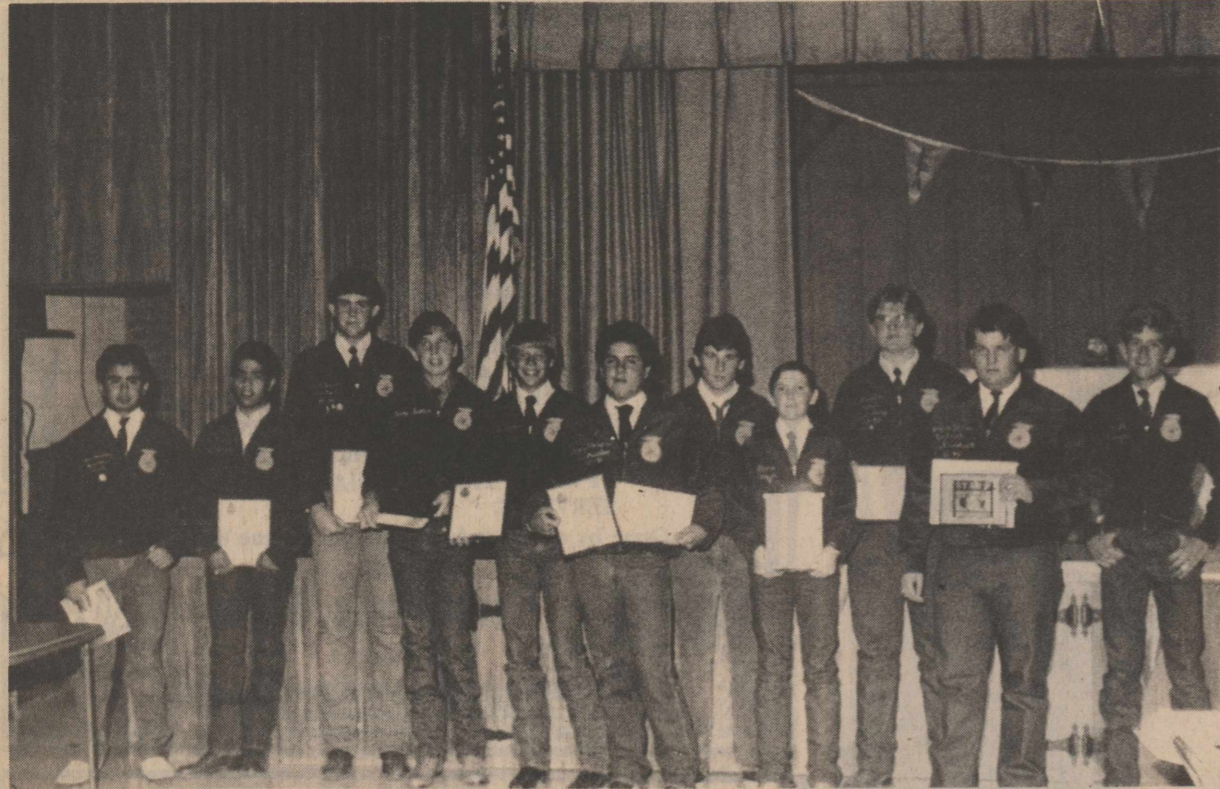

Hospital board meets in regular session

Crockett County Hospital Board met in regular session May 8, 1986, at the Care Center dining room.

Bill Boswell reported the employee handbook change states new requirements for employee physicals. A physical examination shall be given at least annually to all direct patient care personnel, including dietary staff; this examination shall include at least a TB test and a VDRL.

Boswell also told board members that the copy machine is installed and working. The ER monitor original Life Pack-8s quoted price was \$9500. However, the hospital received a new, discounted price quote this month of \$8455. Other companies have been contacted and will be reported on next month. The proposed Board of Director By-Law changes were received from Austin, and after a final version is typed, these will be returned to Austin for final legal counsel opinion.

The whirlpool tub is currently being installed at the Care Center and will be in operation this week. Plans for the expansion of the resident dining room at the Care Center have been sent to Austin. Photographs, as supporting documents, will be mailed this weekend. The cabinet for the Care Center Exam Room will be completed Monday afternoon.

Commercial Laundry Equipment of Odessa is sending an estimate on costs per pound to operate commercial laundry equipment. By including the jail and civic center laundry, an estimated savings of 47% to 50% per year could be anticipated. The Chief Architect of TDH feels the present fire alarm system can be salvaged. The hospital is still communicating with Simplex on this matter.

The Administrator's financial report was submitted. Cash deposits for April were \$28,201.24. Total disbursements were \$90,337.37. Deposits for the Care Center in April were \$43,354.73 and disbursements were \$74,311.62. Disbursements for both facilities were unusually high because of an extra payroll period, quarterly unemployment and worker's compensation payments and major equipment purchases in March. It was moved and seconded that the bills be paid. Motion passed.

Mr. Boswell reported that Medicaid has agreed to pay for services rendered to Medicaid patients for the same type of charges that Medicare has agreed to pay for.

Starting May 1, 1986, the Hospital Dietary Department began providing daily meals for the County prisoners. The program is working well.

Mr. Boswell explained the lease on the hospital TV sets has gotten so expensive that he will cancel the contract if at all possible.

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Big Foot Wallace has a mean reputation

Among the rag-tag army of Texas Rangers and soldiers of fortune harassing the Mexicans here along the Rio Grande in this year of 1842 is Big Foot Wallace—a man with a mean reputation.

William A. Wallace, 6 feet 2 inches tall and 240 pounds, claims he wears only a 9½ size shoe. He got the name Big Foot while living in Austin when he was accused of stealing his neighbor's horses. The neighbor followed the thief's footprints until they stopped at Wallace's yard.

Wallace cleared himself by putting one of his own moccasins inside the imprint of the thief's. The thief's moccasins were a good two inches larger and belonged to a notorious Indian named Big Foot. Wallace has stalked the Indian many times, but with no luck. Despite his innocence, the nickname stuck.

Wallace came to Texas from Virginia in 1837 to avenge the deaths of his two brothers who were murdered after the battle in Goliad. Although he's never been married, Big Foot is no loner. His concern for his community leads him to ride with the Texas Rangers who sweep across the prairies, protecting the settlers.

Big Foot automatically thinks if it isn't Indians causing trouble, it'll be the Mexicans, whom he considers a strategic and crafty lot. Their language, religion and politics are unfamiliar and most Americans cannot sympathize with their neighbors to the south.

In the past few months there have been several skirmishes between Texan and Mexican troops along the border. This has prompted President Sam Houston to send out General Somerville and these troops which Big Foot has joined. Most believe the

fighting is caused by increasing talk of the United States' plans to annex the Republic.

Things start out well enough for Somerville's troops with the capture of Laredo. But then the unruly men set to plundering the town. When General Somerville makes them return the goods, they revolt; 200 men desert and 500 ignore Somerville's orders. He declares the mission aborted and marches home.

However, 300 men (including Wallace), stay for more action. They march into Mier, an adobe town in northern Mexico. But with their leader injured, the rabble becomes disorganized and are surrounded by Mexicans. They vote to surrender to the Mexicans.

The Mexicans march them across the desert. Some try to escape and become lost, some eat insects, others drink their own urine and die, and still others dig into the ground searching for some moist earth to soothe their swollen tongues.

Santa Anna orders the rest of the prisoners to be executed but relents due to the protests of American and British ministers. Instead, they are to be killed in a strategic fashion.

A container filled with 159 white beans and 17 black beans is set down and each prisoner draws a bean. If it's a white bean, he is taken prisoner; if it's black, he is executed. One out of every ten men will be shot.

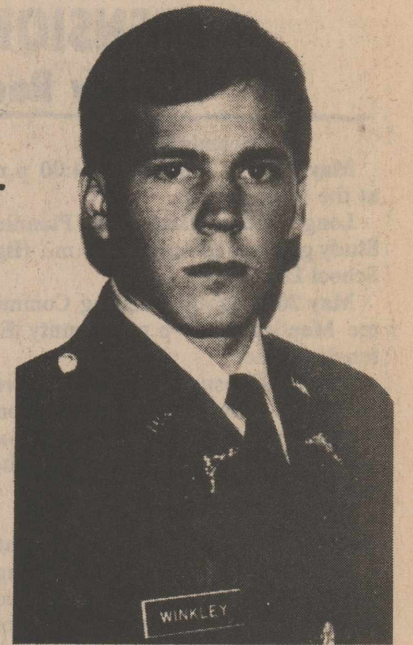
Crafty Big Foot notices the black ones have been poured over the whites, so he "dips deep," and survives. He and the rest of the survivors return to Texas, but the repercussions from the Mier Expedition will be felt for a long time. Some feel the action may even be a strong impetus for a future war with Mexico.

Housing Decisions For Single Parents
 Becoming a single parent through death or divorce may mean you'll need to evaluate your housing situation. Many newly single parents prefer to stay in their present home or apartment at least until they and their children feel more secure and better prepared to face the adjustment of new surroundings.
 For some single parents who feel comfortably rooted in a home with pleasant memories, staying put may be the best decision—if it's possible financially.
 But economic realities dictate that many single parents must choose among renting or buying a new residence, joining forces with another single to buy or rent, or moving in with parents or other relatives.
 If you're trying to decide whether to buy another home or rent a house or apartment, you should carefully consider these questions:
 How much money do you have to keep up a house? Your total monthly housing costs—including mortgage,

utilities, telephone, maintenance fees, insurance and taxes—should be between 25 and 30 percent of your monthly salary.
 Which is more important to you, being free to move from a rented residence or being a permanent part of a neighborhood in your own home?
 Do you consider yard work and home repair or improvements a hobby and a pleasure, or a drag? If you want a home, rather than an apartment, yet do not want to do yard work and repairs, a condominium may be what you need.
 How long do you plan to live in the new area? If it's less than three years, you may want to rent.
 Is real estate in your new area considered a good investment?
 Are neighbors and the general environment satisfactory for you and your children.
 Before renting or buying any type of residence, carefully consider all the options open to you.

Extension study group to meet Thursday night

The Crockett County Extension Study Group will hold its final meeting on Thursday, May 15, at 7:30 p.m. in the High School Library.
 During the past month, Task Forces have met to identify and prioritize critical issues in an effort to develop a Long Range Extension Program for Crockett County.
 During the meeting, Thursday night, discussion leaders will report on their Task Force Committee's prioritized list of critical issues. The entire study group will select the 5 to 10 most critical issues that should be addressed by Extension Educational programs and activities in the Long Range Extension Program.
 Task Force committees that will report are Agriculture-P. L. Childress, chairman; Home Economics-Karen Huffman, chairman; 4-H-Gary Vannoy, chairman; and Community Development-Steve Sessom, chairman.

Employed women with families commonly experience conflict and stress over childcare arrangements and household tasks, says home economist Mary Clayton Nance.

While the problem of balancing the demands of a job and home is not easily solved, advance planning can reduce some of the stress, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension specialist.

To avoid being thrown into a turmoil if a babysitter moves or a child gets sick, plan for backup child care before an emergency arises, Nance advises.

A good back-up plan will require a list of several people—relatives, neighbors, friends or professional sitters, who could be called on in a particular situation.

Check the school calendar or call the school to find out in advance about important daytime school activities, such as parent-teacher conferences or the class play. Often you can arrange a parent-teacher conference after work hours.

But for special events you may wish to take paid vacation hours or make arrangements to work overtime as compensation for the time taken to attend these events. If your work record is free of tardies, it may be easier to request an hour or two off to attend a school event, notes the TAEX home economist.

Working women who do not have the flexibility to take off work time for a daytime school event, can make it a point to attend parent-teacher association meetings and special events held in the evening.

Nance also suggests having a plan to keep from being overwhelmed by children, husband or meal preparation the minute you walk in the door. Discuss with them what can be done to give you 15 to 20 minutes of time to relax.

You may need to lie down for a few minutes, do some exercises or just have some quiet time before starting dinner and listening to all the happenings of the day.

Having pre-dinner snacks on hand can keep you from being pushed to cook immediately or tempted to over-extend your food budget by eating out too frequently.

Try to get the entire family to agree on a workable schedule for after-work hours, says the specialist. This might include time set aside for homework, chores, making lunches or advance food preparation for the next day, dinner clean up and relaxation.

Also consider a family work night so the weekend can be left for rest, recreation, worship and family sharing. Make a complete list of weekend tasks such as grocery shopping, laundry or yard work. Then divide tasks among family members and do those chores on a Thursday or Friday night.

"Since the average full-time employed woman works 40 hours per week outside the home and another 22-27 at home, she shouldn't feel reluctant about getting other family members involved in planning for and doing household chores," says Nance.

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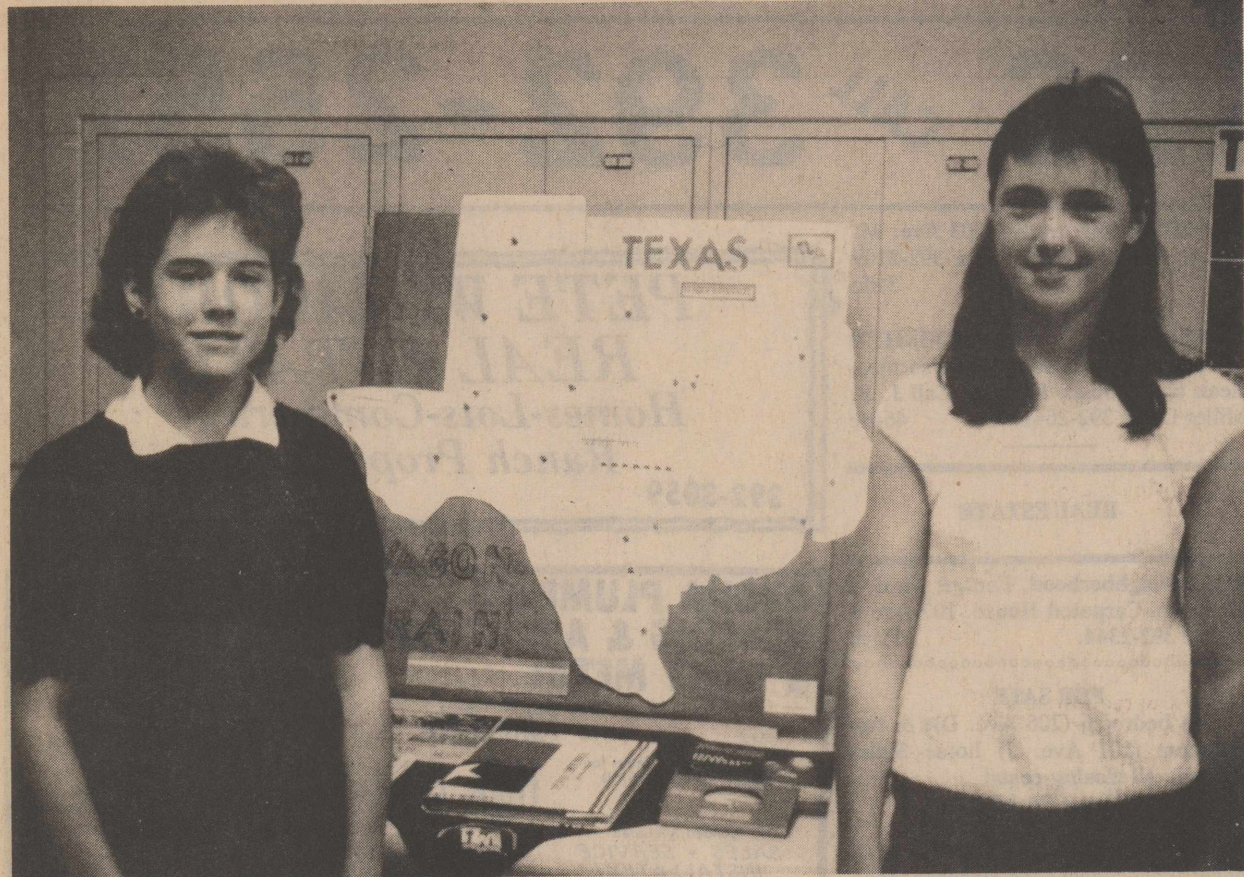
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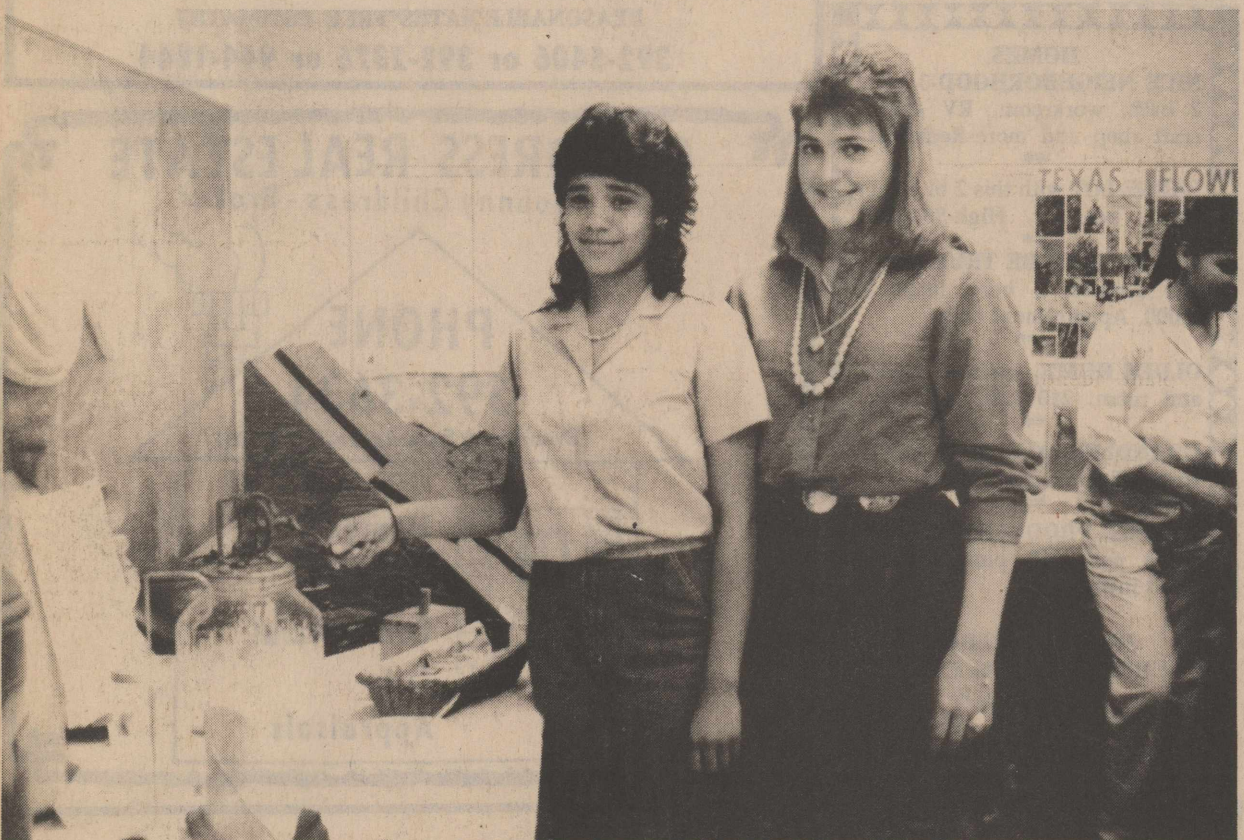
