The object of the project is to make home-owning within the This is in line with the meeting of FHA officials held Dec. 10, 1953. The loans are made available to Muleshoe people under the FHA Title I, Section 8, of the National Housing Act.

The houses will all be twobedroom, living room, kitchen hall, plenty of cabinet space, floor furnace inlaid linoleum on kitchen and bath. The entire cost will only be \$6200, for the lot and house, with a down payment of only \$500, and monthly payments approximately \$42. This down payment takes care of all loan closing expenses, legal fees, abstract, and a year's prepaid fire insurance. Also, the monthly payments take care of the taxes and insurance each





Research scientists have now and lygus bugs. announced another forward step in the battle of man vs. insects. One of the latest insecticides to come from the crucibles of the research laboratories is Endrin, a chemical believed to be effective against a large number of cotton pests.

This new formula has been Be Here Thursday found to be the best insecticide thus far tested against the combination of the bollworm and the boll weevil, two of cotton's most destructive enemies. Several other cotton pests are also hit hard by Endrin, according to en-

The Pink Bollworm, is still a hold-out, however. This tough little destroyer which accounts for a bigger percentage of damage to South Texas cotton than any other, is relatively unaffected by the discovery.

Drouth Measures Are Recommended

Presidents of county Farm Bureaus of this district, meeting in Lubbock Tuesday night, adopted recommendations to be presented to Congress to aid farmers in drouth areas. They suggested:

1. Make emergency loans to farmers who are unable to get

1. Make emergency loans to farmers who are unable to get help from existing credit agencies.

2. That this aid be made possible through FHA production and subsistence loans. (The agency is empowered to make loans now but sufficient money is not available).

3. Extension of these loans for a sufficient time to allow farmers to recover from drouth. Eight to ten years if necessary and an interest rate not to succeed 2%.

4. Repayments be held in a permanent fund instead of being turned back to the government, and new appropriations be made each year.

These recommendations were to be made known to representatives in Congress.






