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

Sheriff's Report

Arrests

August 26-A 39 year old Ozona man surrendered to the Crockett County Sheriff's office to begin serving a 30 day sentence for DWI.

A 29 year old Ozona woman was arrested by Sheriff's deputies for disorderly conduct and public intoxication. She was released after paying a \$100 fine.

Q: My father inherited 100 acres of land from his mother. He died without a will. Before he died he gave a deed for 10 acres to the three children from his second marriage. There are seven of us from his first marriage who received the rest and divided it among ourselves. We agreed to give our stepmother 10 acres and the house; however, our three halfhours after the shooting. A. My suggestion would be for you to see an attorney about having your father's estate settled through an administration of the estate. The statute of descent and distribution will control the disposition of your father's estate because he died without a will. According to the statute of descent and distribution, your father's land will pass to stepmother, however, will be entitled to a "life estate" in one-third of the land. This means that she would be entitled to live on one-third of the land for the remainder of her life, and then that one third-will pass on to the children.

Q: My fiance has a 5-year-old son from a previous marriage. How do I keep custody of him if my husband-tobe should die after we are married? Can-I adopt? What is involved?

If there is no necessity for administration of the estate, the court may admit the will to probate as a Muniment of Title.

The problems with title may be cured by probating the will, if possible, or by obtaining a deed from the child of the

first marriage. Q: I have not been to court yet for divorce proceedings, yet our newspaper's divorce column has me listed as being divorced. How can this be? I was not notified that I was divorced. My attorney never told me. Can a person be divorced and not be informed?

A. Yes, under certain circumstances a person may be divorced without receiving personal notice. In a divorce suit, the party against whom the divorce is filed, the respondent is entitled to be personally served with the Petition for divorce by the sheriff or constable of any county in which the Respondent is to be found. However, if the location of the Respondent is unknown, or if the Petitioner has used due diligence to make service but has been unsuccessful, notice to the Respondent by publication under Section 3.521 of the Texas Family Code is allowed.

Furthermore, it should be noted that under Section 14.43 of the Texas Family Code (effective September 1, 1985), every divorce decree signed in Texas must contain a provision whereby child support, if ordered and not paid within a period of at least 30 days, shall be automatically garnished from the wages of the obligated parent.

> Q: Is there a law regarding people riding in the back of open bed pickup trucks? A boy was recently injured when the driver had to stop suddenly and the boy was thrown from the truck.

A. There are no laws in Texas which prohibit passengers from riding in the back of an open bed pickup truck. The only possible cause of action by the boy, sueing, (through his parents), would be against the driver under the common law theory of negligence, alleging that the driver should have known that the child could be thrown from the pickup, and didn't use proper care to prevent the accident. Other circumstances, such as the age of the child, whether the driver had been drinking, the condition of the roadway, and so forth, would need to be evaluated to see, given all the factors, whether the driver was negligent.



A. In order to keep custody of the child of your fiance, you must adopt the child. To adopt the child you must either obtain consent of the natural with the natural mother has not been terminated) or file suit to adopt which includes a request for involuntary termination of the parent-child relationship (if that relationship has not been terminated). To grant involuntary termination of the parent-child relationship the court must find "improper conduct" on the part of the nonconsenting parent and that the termination would be in the best interest of the child.

This is a hard thing to prove. Since your fiance is also a parent of the child, he must join in the petition for adoption. You should consult an at-

training order. Q: Must a will be probated before it

becomes legal? A woman sold some land left to her by her husband but never had the will probated. He had an only child by his first wife but did not mention the child in the will. Was the sale of the property legal? Could the man who bought the property get a clear title?

A. A will must be probated before its terms are effective. An application for the probate of a will may be filed within four years of the death of the person who made the will. If more than four years have passed since the death, the applicant must show the court that he or she was not at fault for the failure to present the will for probate within four Ozona. vears.

publication may, after filing a Petition showing good cause supported by affidavit, file a Motion for New Trial within two years after the judgment is signed.

Q: What is the maximum percentage of child support that may be assessed from a person's wages by court for arrears and current support? Is this percentage based on gross or net income?

A. The Texas Supreme Court has withdrawn the child support guidelines issued earlier this year, and there is no "maximum percentage" to be based upon either gross or net income. Child support is within the discretion of the Court. A Texas court can order either or both parents to make periodic payments or lump sum payments for the support of the child, and in determining the amount of child support, the court will consider the needs of the child, the ability of the parents to contribute to the child's support, any financial resources available for the support of the child, and any other matters it believes important.


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

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

It seems the good showers have colorful, due to less wind to damage been coming our way and are always welcome, but we hope floods don't come.

September is one of the most important months of the year for gardeners. A few hours spent weeding, mulching, and fertilizing can bring new life to the garden. Marigolds, sage, impatiens, petunias, geraniums, and other bedding plants can be revitilized if they are attended to early in the month. Also give similar attention to warm season plants producing until frost. Too, be sure to get the fall and winter vegetable garden planted.

Early September is the last time in the growing season that an application of fertilizer will benefit warm season lawn grasses. Fertilizer applied after this time may be wasted if a killing frost or cool weather causes the grass to turn brown and go dormant. When in doubt as to how much to use, apply fertilizer at one-half the label recommendation this late in the season. After the application, water the lawn thoroughly to wash fertilizer into the zone

A little grooming early this month can bring hybrid tea roses into a second season of beautiful bloom. Remove faded blooms to tidy up the plants and prevent seed formation, which saps plant energy. Snip off damaged or diseased parts and weak spendly wood. Cut off small branches that have no terminal bud, and remove shoots growing from the base of the plant below the graft union. Rake all litter out of the bed, apply a complete fertilizer, such as 5-10-10, at the rate of two tablespoons per bush. After lightly stirring the soil without disturbing the roots, water thoroughly to wash fertilizer into the soil. Usually our fall roses are the most perfect and







Bicycle laws and safety

rules need attention

Because of the recent bicycle- the street or road and stop when you automobile related accidents, all cy- hear the sirens of emergency vehicles. clists should be reminded of the Texas bicycle laws and safety rules.

These regulations include: Obey all traffic signs and signals. Warn other traffic when stopping or turning by giving required hand signals with the left hand. Always ride as near to the right side of the road as possible and in the same direction as motor vehicles. Be careful when can be seen at least 500 feet, and when passing parked vehicles or vehicles traveling in the same direction. Not more than two bicycles may be driven side by side. (It is safer to ride single file.) Do not ride double except on bicycles built for two persons. Ride only upon the bicycle's regular seat. Do not hitch to motor vehicles. Do not carry packages that will prevent keeping at least one hand on handlebars.

Always be alert for traffic from all directions. Also, watch for opening car doors and for cars pulling out into traffic.

Before leaving a driveway, alley, or when crossing a street or road "stop," look both ways, and wait for motor vehicles and pedestrians to pass.

Let pedestrians go first at street crossings and on sidewalks. Get off extra cautious.



poachers, under arrest for killing deer from the highway at night, tell me that they will do it again next chance they get-that it's cheaper to pay an occasional maximum fine of \$200 now and then than to pay for a lease like law-abiding hunters do. But at the end of the '85-86 hunting season, we surprised 'em with a new law. They got (or soon will get) a letter from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, backed by the State Attorney General's Office, advising them they now owe for the replacement value of the wildlife that they stole from the people of the State of Texas. Now they can pay the amount specified in the letter, or they can wait to be sued by the state, and if they cause that much trouble they can expect to pay the maximum-up to \$800 in the case of a good buck deer...or \$1,000 for an endangered species...or \$10,000 for a Whooping Crane or a Bighorn Sheep. Whatayasay, Mr. Poacher, is it still cheaper?

The folks writing the book in Austin have set a replacement value on just about everything that walks, flies, hops or slithers in Texas, and it'll apply in any case where wildlife has been removed from the wild and can't be returned thereto. There's been actually encourage) removal of surplus Recently retired, Rev. Mueller animals, but monies collected can sure be used to re-stock in other areas of Texas that need deer. Besides, who's to say that same deer wasn't going to be trapped and moved to just such a. place, if Ole John hadn't put a bullet tween her eyes! A sportsman's license entitles him or her to a legal limit of doves or black bass, but if he chooses to take a few extra for the pot, he can expect to pay a fine plus so much for each one over the legal limit. Some might term this a civil penalty, but regardless of what you call it, it's pure justice and a grand idea to all those concerned with effective game law enforcement.

Fish and game and other wildlife belong to all Texans. Some of the critters are there for us to catch or shoot to our heart's content-within the confines of seasons and limits and arrangements we make with the owners of the land. But if we take too much, or something we're not supposed to, or when or where or in a manner we're not supposed to, the TPWD has a legislative mandate to make us pay for our transgressions. If administered in the way it has been set up, the new system will be welcomed by law-abiding sportsmen. Regardless of the feelings of the masses, however, it should complicate matters considerably for those who choose to rob us of our wildlife


Juanita Martinez buried here in Monday services

professionals at the USDA recommend losing only one to two pounds in a week. Dropping food intake to lose seven pounds a week threatens to disturb the dieter's nutritive balances. To lose a pound, dieters must reduce their calorie intake by 500 calories each day for an entire week. This is 3,500 calories a week. So to lose seven pounds in a week the dieter would have to eliminate 24,540 calories from their weekly food intake. The body needs a certain number of

calories for basic metabolism. More calories are needed for work. Women usually need 1,800-2,000 calories a day and men about 2,700 depending on build and activity level.

The Rotation Diet drops calories for women to about 600 calories for the first three days, 900 calories for the next four days, then 1,200 for the next week and on the third week repeats One of the problems with the calorie intake of week one. 
