### Sheriff's Report

## Willie Tooke retires

A local institution at the grocery store check-out counter, Willie Tooke, retired New Year's Day. Willie had watched a generation of Ozonans grow from being rambunctious children to having children of their own behind her cash register at T&T Supermarket.

The store had become a second home to the vivacious, friendly master of the cash register since her first day on the job June 1, 1960. Willie and her husband, Marcus, a local carpenter, moved to Ozona from Big Lake, and Willie first worked at Ted Lewis' Drive In Grocery market for six years before her move to Jim's Foodway (now T&T).

"When I started, I was paid \$0.75 per hour, and the sackers earned \$1.00 per hour. The tea bags that sold for \$0.49 now cost almost \$2.00. The prices on the products and our salaries have really changed," Willie said.

Throughout the years, Willie has come to love the people of Ozona. "I'm really going to miss the customers. I may come here in the afternoons just to visit and see all my friends. They have been so nice. I have learned what each family is going to buy. I have enjoyed every minute of this work."

Retirement has beckoned the brown-haired, business-like, checker because of her age (65 years young) and because of her husband, Marc, and their cat, Stinky.


"I didn't intend to stay here this long when I first started part time. When I started, we used loud manual cash registers and we had to figure up the tax on each sale. The new register, though computerized, isn't any faster than the older method. The scanners in San Angelo

are even slower because the checkers often don't get the UPC symbol of the product purchased the first time. I can ring the price up more quickly manually," Willie said.

Post retirement plans include getting caught up on housework. Closets and drawers which are in disarray, will be neatened and organized, and not stuffed, as they have been. Walking and working in her yard will also occupy her hours.

retired, and presently under Winston Koerth.

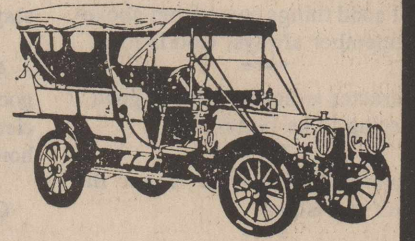

In the long run, the Lions came out ahead 67-63. Will Seahorn, Danny Sanchez and Oscar Galindo led Ozona scorers with 16, 12, and nine points respectively.

Mike Morrow had 10 of the Lions' 21 rebounds while Sanchez had three of the team's six assists.

From there, the Lions moved on to the third-place game against Alpine. The two traded the lead throughout the first half with Alpine taking the intermission lead.

"We had a good second half against Alpine," Coach Curry said.

The Lions brought things even in the third quarter then pulled away in the fourth, outdistancing Alpine 48-43 with the final buzzer.

Morrow sank 12 points to lead the Lions. Scott Denman and Sanchez followed with 10 and nine points. Morrow, Denman and Oscar Payne provided rebounding coverage with six rebounds each. Sanchez and Morrow sustained their All-Tournament from leading in assists (Sanchez) and steals (Morrow) during the final game.

District competition resumes this week as the Lions take to their home court against Stanton this Friday, then travel to Rankin next Tuesday, Tuesday.

"This next week will be very important for us," Coach Curry said. "On the good side, the next three out of four games will be at home."

# T.C.'s Bookie Turf

**Late last night and the night before, Tommyknockers, Tommyknockers, knocking at the door. I want to go out, don't know if I can, 'cause I'm so afraid of the Tommyknocker man.**

No more than a simple poem, a child's nursery rhyme. Yet, the slight chill it depicts will come to life as a full haunting nightmare in the pages of Stephen King's latest, **The Tommyknockers**.

It begins innocently enough with Roberta Anderson, a novelist of better-than-average selling wasters. As she and her dog, Peter, trek in the woods behind her rural homestead near the town of Haven, she trips over her fate.

Jutting out of the rain-moistened ground is three or so inches of solid metal; metal that when first touched, holds a faint vibration; metal that slowly eats away at her conscience and invades her sleep in the form of green-lit nightmares.

She digs. As she removes more and more dirt, she uncovers more of the strange metal which gradually swells from the initial three inches and she realizes the object buried in the ground is more than a sunken Model T; it's a space ship.

Enter Jim gardener; a dying poet who earns his meager living off summer reading tours. A constant premonition keeps telling him that his friend and ex-lover, (Roberta) Anderson is in trouble.

After certain problems of his own, including a near-suicide drunken black out, Gardener arrives at Anderson's house and almost overlooks her, considering she weighs thirty pounds less and suffers from complete exhaustion.

And Gardener discovers batteries. Anderson's electric source is no longer Central Maine Power. Her water heater runs off a dozen D-cell batteries which produce a blinding, green light. She has a new, improved typewriter that transmits thoughts to paper and produces a novel in three days.

Aided with "New and Improved" (as Gardener comes to describe the resulting changes from the exposed space ship), Gardener joins Anderson indigging up something that has been hidden in the earth for over two million years.

In the second part of the book, attention swings from Gardener to the townspeople of Haven who have suddenly inherited a keen sense for batteries, New and Improved gadgets, and telepathic communication.

There are a few who oppose the subtle changes, but they take turns for the worse since the "New" Haven has a way of dealing with those not of its kind.

Along with the gaining of knowledge, though, there comes a loss among those living in Haven; a loss

of teeth, that is. Slowly, the people are "becoming" Tommyknockers.

One or two stand out like sore thumbs to the Havenites. Gardener is one. Due to a skiing accident of long ago, he carries a steel plate in his hand and evidently it shields him from Haven's atmospheric mutations and the people's mind probing.

In the long run, this will make the difference. Gardener knows that once the interior of the ship has been reached, his death will follow.

Thus, Gardener sets out to right wrongs: save an innocent boy's life and get rid of the ship. Easier said than done.

As the New Tommyknockers close in, Gardener alone must decide the world's fate (since no outsiders seem to make it into haven without being poisoned from the air and/or struck down by a mechanical sentry guard; A Coke machine for example).

King provides a fast and steady pace that quickly tingles the spine. Not often has King been able to mesh both good, constructive writing and haunting suspense. But here the combination comes together and though the end may seem more like that of **Star Wars** than typical Kingish twitch, the book may just be King's best on account of continual flow and message.

He leaves you with more than an imaginary beast to contemplate. He points out in his foreword that the Tommyknockers are real.

Please don't forget to lock the door.

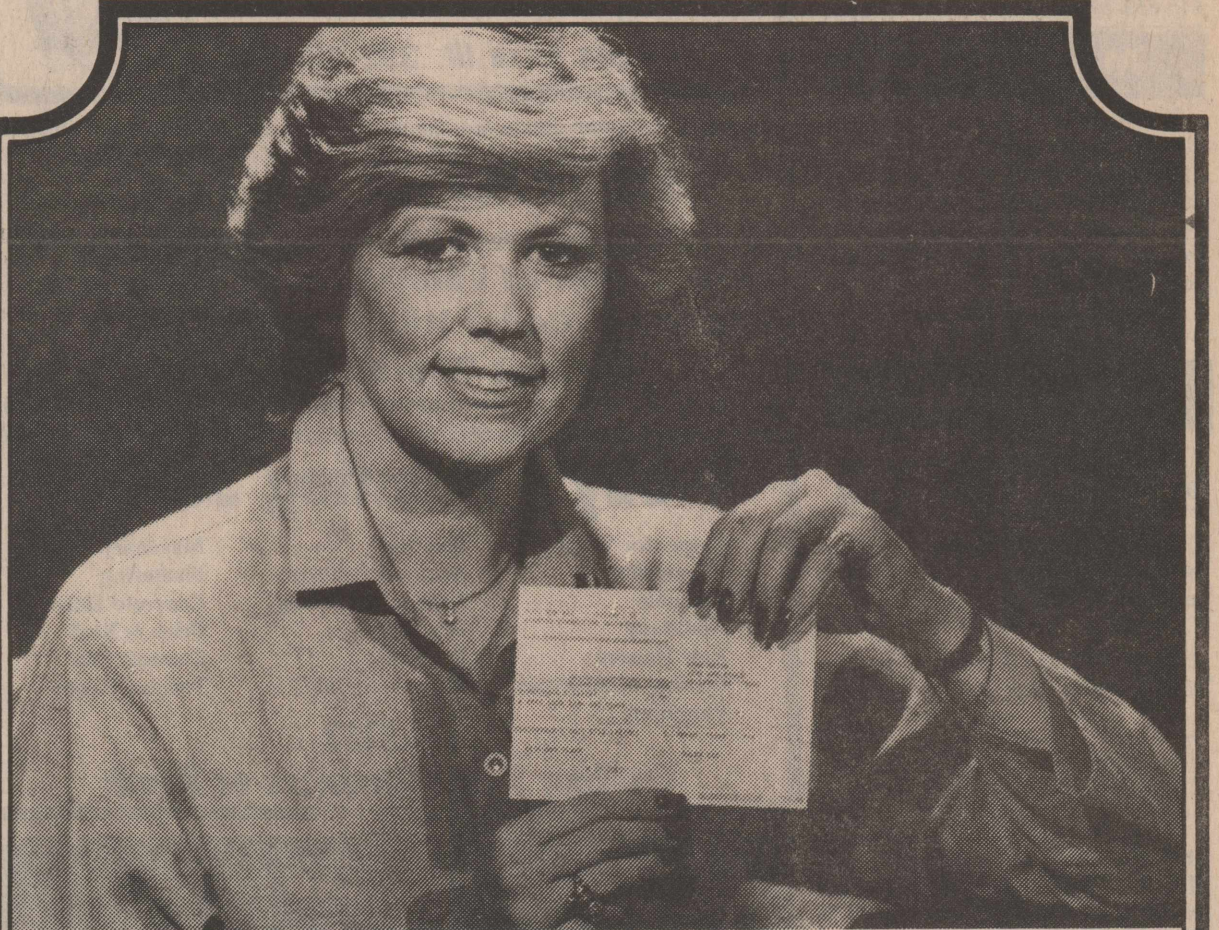

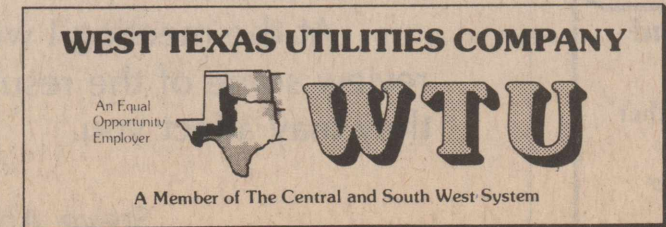
