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Law office relocates

The private law office of County Attorney Thomas Cameron was moved this week from the courthouse annex to the Miller Building at 801 Ave. E.

In response to inquiries about a possible resignation by the county attorney, law firm secretary Beth Scoggins stated "at this time we are separating the two offices".

An Allied moving van spent most of Monday transporting Mr. Cameron's law office furnishings from the annex to the new location.

Judge A. O. Fields said Tuesday that he had not received a letter of resignation from Cameron. "If he does resign, I don't expect it to be before the next commissioners' court meeting (March 14)," Fields said.

Cameron is the only candidate who filed for the position of county attorney on the March 8 Democratic Primary ballot.

"If he does resign, he will have to serve, just like I am, until someone is appointed to fill his office," said Fields. Judge Fields resigned as county judge effective Dec. 31, but has continued to serve because no replacement has been named.

Jump Rope for Heart Feb. 27

Students in grades K-6 will jump rope to raise funds for the American Heart Association in a "Jump Rope for Heart" scheduled for Feb. 27 at the Ozona Junior High Gym from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

The three hour event will feature teams of six members, with each member jumping until tiring, then passing the rope to another member.

Prior to the event, participants will recruit sponsors (family, friends and neighbors) to make pledges based on each minute his or her team jumps. Following the event, students will return to sponsors with a verified report of how long they jumped to collect pledges.

Barnhart threatened by giant range fire

Twenty trucks and over 100 men battle blaze. . . .

Firemen and equipment from seven towns worked to contain two unrelated fires that endangered property and livestock in Barnhart last weekend.

A fire on the Bob Bissett Ranch in northern Crockett County Saturday raced through four ranches to approach Barnhart from the south. Most of the 20 trucks which had responded to the range fire poured into the Barnhart area once the danger to the town was known.

The fire jumped the railroad track and Highway 67 and was battled to a standstill after destroying a mobile home, two barns and damaging a house inside the town.

"By Saturday night, a fire lane had been built around the area and ranchers were watching," said Ozona Fire Chief Dorris Haire. Ozona volunteers returned to the station at 11:45 p.m. from their 2:09 run.

"It was a monster fire," said Bob Falkner of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department. "The head of the fire was traveling 25 miles per hour with 14 foot flames. There were not enough trucks to contain something like that."

Ozona sent five units, San Angelo one, Sterling City two, Big Lake two, Mertzon three, Sonora three, and Eldorado one to join the three Barnhart units in service.

Falkner was in a plane that flew over the burned and burning area Saturday and reported that the sight was "awesome".

Estimates provided by Haire indicated that the burned area was approximately 12 miles long and one-half to four miles in width.

A second fire broke out one mile north of Barnhart Sunday morning caused by a downed power line. Strong winds pushed the fire toward Barnhart which was still partially surrounded by smoldering pasture.

Four Ozona trucks responded along with trucks from Big Lake, Eldorado, Mertzon, Barnhart, Ozona and Sonora.

County graders and water trucks and privately owned water transport trucks also gathered in Barnhart to assist as needed.

Aerial estimates made after Sunday's fire indicate that approxi-

mately 22,400 acres - 35 sections, had burned.

A report of a grass fire on the Jack Baggett Ranch south of Ozona Sunday caused an Ozona and a Sonora truck to start back this way.

Investigation proved the alarm unfounded, with smoke from the Barnhart fire blanketing Ozona and appearing to be a fire to observers.

The two trucks were diverted toward Eldorado where they assisted at a fire on Toe Nail Trail.

Ranches affected by the weekend fires included Mike and Steve Elkins, Annie and Lucy Hinde, Bob Bissett, Bissett and Hemphill, Tim Bennie of Murphy Ranch, Buck Owens, Bode Owens and Edwin S. Mayer.

"There was a lot of fence burned," said Haire. "I'm sure there was some livestock lost, but I can't confirm that." Pastures filled with dried broomweed and other dried plant matter, the results of plentiful spring and summer rains, make the county ripe for more fires. "We're sitting on a time bomb," said Falkner.

Trip promotes livestock industry

Pleas Childress III returned from a trip to Washington, D. C. last week with positive feelings about the reception he and other livestock group representatives received there.

Pleas, who is president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, Sen. Bill Sims, who is executive secretary of TSGRA, and Bill Pfluger, president of National Wool Growers Association spoke to Lamar Smith, J. J. Pickle, Charlie Stenholm, Lloyd Bentsen, Jim Wright and Phil Gramm on issues of prime concern to the livestock industry.

"We are asking that imported lamb have a quota placed on it equal to other red meats (beef, veal, mutton and goat)," said Childress.

Lamb was left out in the original 1979 bill because lamb import numbers were not a factor and technology was not developed to handle fresh lamb.

Since it is possible to bring in chilled lamb as well as frozen lamb,

imports have multiplied at an alarming rate up to 12-15 percent of U. S. production and are climbing. "We are asking to hold them at the same rate as beef and other meats which is 7-10 percent of U.S. production. This is a tough problem due to the 'free trade' position of our administration. Free trade has its place, but fair trade must also be considered, and we are asking for that equality. Other countries such as Japan have strong protective limits on imports, and I feel the U.S. should likewise protect our industries and products."

The group also had opportunity to discuss the textile trade bill. The textile, apparel, fabric and leather industries are suffering severe losses due to increased imports. "We met with American Textile Manufacturing Industry representatives and discussed the textile trade bill with them. They feel their bill will pass in both houses, be vetoed by the president, and they must then override the veto," said Childress.

"Some of the facts they gave us were: 1) 60% of goods in the world are consumed in the U.S.

2) Textile imports are increasing at 1 1/2 billion yards of material per year

3) Textile imports are growing at 16% compounded annually

4) One out of every two garments in the U.S. is imported

5) Four out of every five pair of shoes is imported with 400 U.S. shoe factories closed since 1981

6) As imports increase, American jobs decrease

7) One out of every 10 jobs is textile related (Labor also supports this bill)

8) Senator Ruddman said it is 'foreign policy versus American workers'.

Problems of identifying lean lamb were discussed with the Lamb Advisory Committee of the USDA.

The American Sheep Producers Council lamb advisory group was

League to sponsor candidates forum

Candidates for county offices will be given the opportunity to state their platforms and answer questions from the audience Monday night at Ozona High School Auditorium. A political forum is being sponsored at 7 p.m. by Ozona Women's League.

Political hopefuls will be invited to speak on their qualifications for office and their plans if elected.

Absentee voting by public appearance begins Feb. 17 and will continue through March 4. The large slate of candidates and high voter interest should contribute to a strong turnout for the March 8 election.

At the close of voter registration Feb. 7, Tax Assessor/Collector Tommy Stokes' office had 2,733 registered voters. Of these, 819 were in Pct. 1, 423 in Pct. 2, 730 in Pct. 3, 730 in Pct. 4 and 31 in Pct. 36.

A summary of the duties of officials up for election follows.

COMMISSIONERS COURT

The county judge presides over the meetings of the Commissioners Court and sees that the meetings are carried on in an orderly manner. The Commissioners Court is not really a court, but is an administrative body for the conduct of county affairs. The judge does have the authority to hold in contempt those who try to disrupt the proceedings of the court in the conduct of its business. The court may ask the sheriff to maintain order and the sheriff must comply. The law requires the Commissioners Court to meet at least once each month, and the regular meeting must be held the second Monday of each month. The

court can meet in special session at any time it so desires so long as the proper notice is given and there is the proper posting of such notice.

Any three members of the court may constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business, therefore, any three Commissioners or the County Judge and any two Commissioners may transact all county business as a quorum. This includes the business of levying county taxes. In the absence of the County Judge, the commissioners constituting the quorum select one from their number to preside.

The main functions performed by the County Commissioners Court are:

1. To supervise and control the county courthouse, county buildings and facilities.
2. To adopt a county budget.
3. To determine county tax rates.
4. To fill vacancies in elective and appointive positions.
5. To let contracts in the name of the county.
6. To build and maintain county roads and bridges.
7. To administer such services as libraries, county hospitals, welfare programs, parks and playgrounds.
8. To make other decisions relating to county welfare, such as county hospitals, libraries, parks, relief to the indigent and civil defense.

COUNTY JUDGE

The legal basis for the office of county judge rests in Article V, Sections 15-18, of the Texas Constitution: "There shall be established in each county in this state a County Court, which shall be a court of record; and there shall be elected in each county, by the qualified voters, a County Judge, who shall be well informed in the law of the state; shall be a conservator of the peace; and shall hold office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified..."

The county judge is the presiding officer of the Commissioners Court, which is the policy-determining body of the county. The county judge is a voting member of the Commissioners Court although in many counties, by custom, the

judge votes only in case of ties. A county judge in Texas is usually the judge of the County Criminal Court, County Civil Court and Probate Court. If the county judge is an attorney, he may also serve as the judge of the Juvenile Court. The county judge is also head of civil defense and disaster relief, county welfare, and in counties under 225,000 population the judge prepares the county budget along with the county auditor or county clerk.

As an administrative official, the county judge handles such widely varying matters as hearings for beer and wine license applications, hearings on admittance to state hospitals for the mentally ill and mentally retarded, waivers for marriage of persons under age, juvenile work permits and temporary guardianships for special purposes. The judge is also responsible for calling elections, posting election notices, and for receiving and canvassing the election returns. The county judge is a notary public and may perform marriages.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER

Each county in Texas is divided into four commissioner's precincts. Each of the four commissioners is directly elected by the voters of their precinct. As a member of the Commissioners Court, each commissioner participates in all decisions and work of that body. In most counties, the county commissioner is solely and directly responsible for the administration of the road and bridge program in his precinct, but today, with increased administrative responsibilities, a county commissioner is much more than a "road commissioner".

COUNTY TAX ASSESSOR-COLLECTOR

The main duties of the county tax assessor-collector are to assess and collect property taxes for the county; to issue certificates of title and license plates for motor vehicles and trailers; to issue voter registration applications and certificates; and to compile election poll lists. In some counties, the county tax assessor-collector may also serve as the chief

meeting in Washington and discussing the lean lamb situation. Two of their guests, Pete De Jesso with Wake Fern Food Corp. of New York, one of the largest distributors of lamb in the U.S., and Dennis Brein of Superior Package Co. on the West Coast, brought the message that consumers prefer lean lamb, but availability is difficult. The men said lean lamb was worth a premium to them.

"We then met with Paul Fuller from USDA and other USDA staff discussing the need of a system to identify these preferred types of lambs in a nationwide, uniform manner that would reward producers feeders, packers and retailers for the added value of such a lamb. A new grading system is a possibility."

Live lamb imports were also discussed on the Washington trip. While they were in Washington, 10,000 head of New Zealand lambs arrived in the states, the first of 160,000 approved by a permit from USDA. The stock reportedly arrived in good condition with a two percent death loss, Childress said. The lambs will be quarantined, then moved to feed lots in California and Colorado and then killed as U.S. lambs with no country of origin labeling. Close monitoring of these lambs is being conducted.

The ASPC lamb committee does not want to see these lambs sold under the "Fresh American Lamb"

logo and packers have been asked to cooperate.

The ranch labor problem was also addressed during the five day trip. The newly formed Texas Ranch Labor Association has met with some difficulty in regard to wage rates set by the Department of Labor.

The process began by a survey that was conducted determining current wage rate benefits and housing conditions of a ranch sheep worker.

The D.O.L. did not use a survey conducted by the association according to government guidelines, but instead used a survey conducted by the Texas Employment Commission which Childress said did not follow the guidelines. The results were too high for a workable H2A or range labor program.

"We discussed this with D.O.L. and they agreed to reconsider the issue and possibly conduct a new survey using the proper guidelines."

"We also visited with many congressmen and their staff, explaining the problems with D.O.L. They were very helpful and offered support where needed," Childress said.

Some of the congressmen represented were: Rep. Lamar Smith, Rep. Charles Stenholm, Rep. Larry Combest, Chairman Kiki de la Garza, Congressman Phil Gramm and Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

appraiser for the central appraisal district.

COUNTY ATTORNEY

The county attorney is required to have a license to practice law. The main duties of the county attorney are to serve as legal advisor to county officers, and to represent the state in criminal cases in County and Justice of the Peace Criminal Courts. The county attorney works with law enforcement officers in the investigation and preparation of cases to be heard before the criminal county courts.

SHERIFF

The principal law enforcement officer in the county is the sheriff. The sheriff has jurisdiction over the entire county to prevent criminal actions and to arrest offenders. In counties with a population under 10,000 and where there has been no vote to separate the two offices, the sheriff may also be the tax assessor-collector for the county. The sheriff acts as executive officer of the County and District Courts, serving writs and subpoenas and processing lunacy warrants. The sheriff is also responsible for sending out jury duty summons. He has the authority to appoint deputies and is in charge of the county jail and the prisoners.

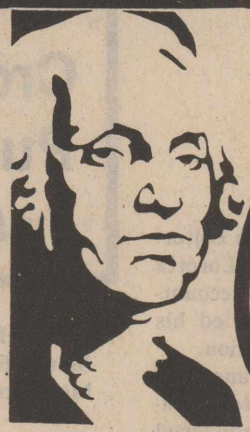
Announcement fees are \$45 for all paid offices and \$30 for offices which receive no pay. This entitles the candidate to a news story with picture and a spot in the political column until the election.

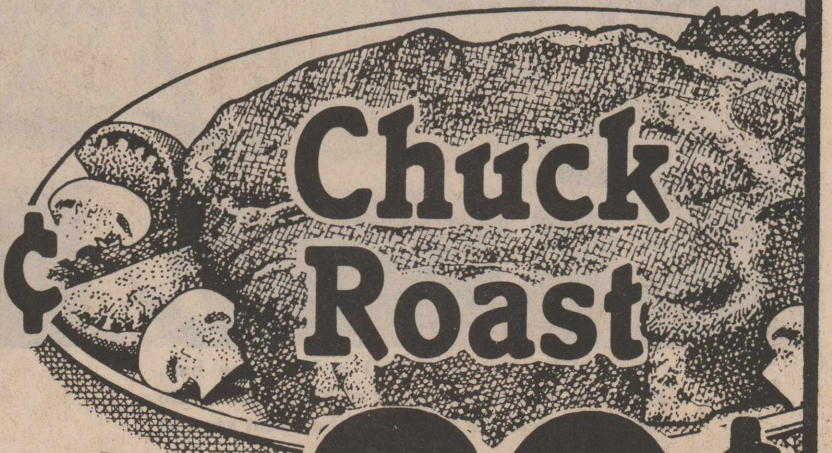

Dottie Gonzales competed in newswriting and did Robby Tambunga. Tambunga also wrote headlines.

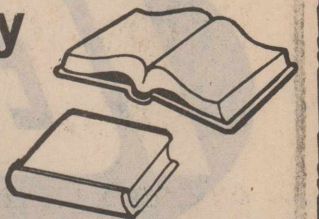
Ozons participants totaled 162 points while Llano had 184. Bandera finished in third place with 134 1/2 points.

Seahorn again led Ozona scorers, this time with 16 points. Chris Denman and Morrow had 13 points apiece while S. Denman added 11 of his own.

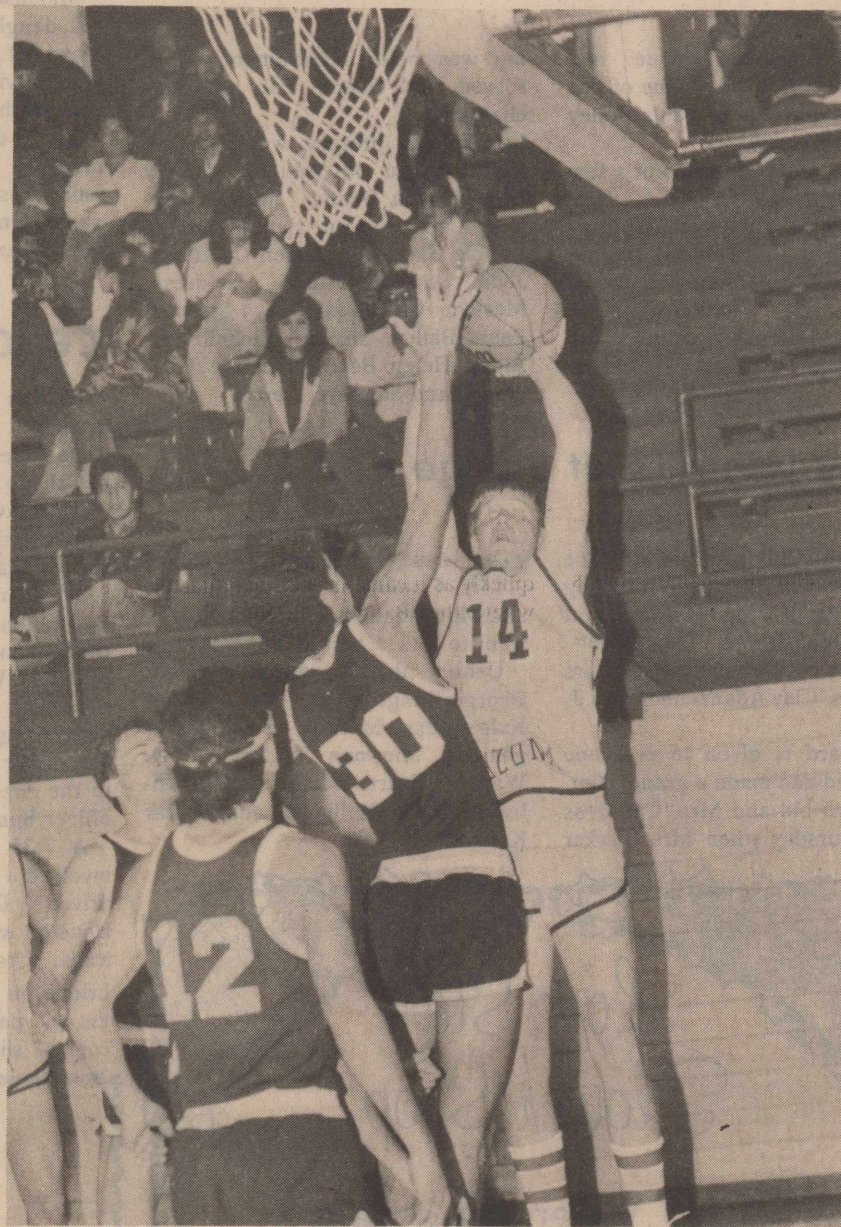
The big test came Friday when the Lions faced Reagan County, whom the Lions beat 101-51 the last time they met but now sported a quicker team.

In the second quarter, the Lady Badgers burst out for 10 points, while Ozona once again managed six points. At the intermission,

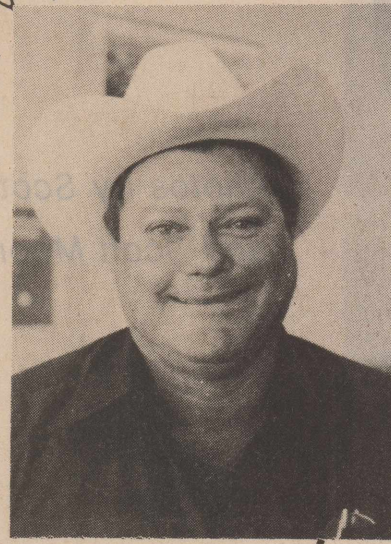
McCamey held a 17-12 lead.

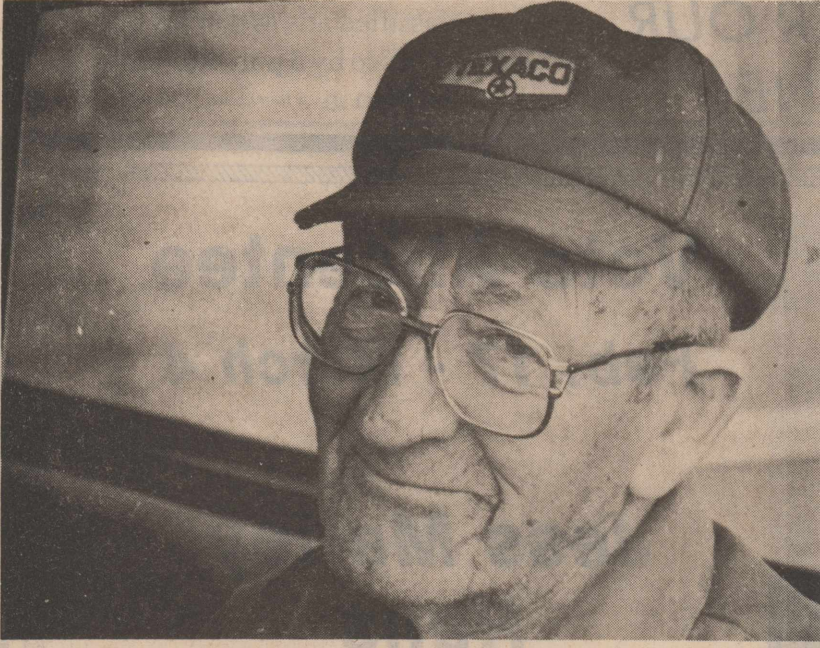

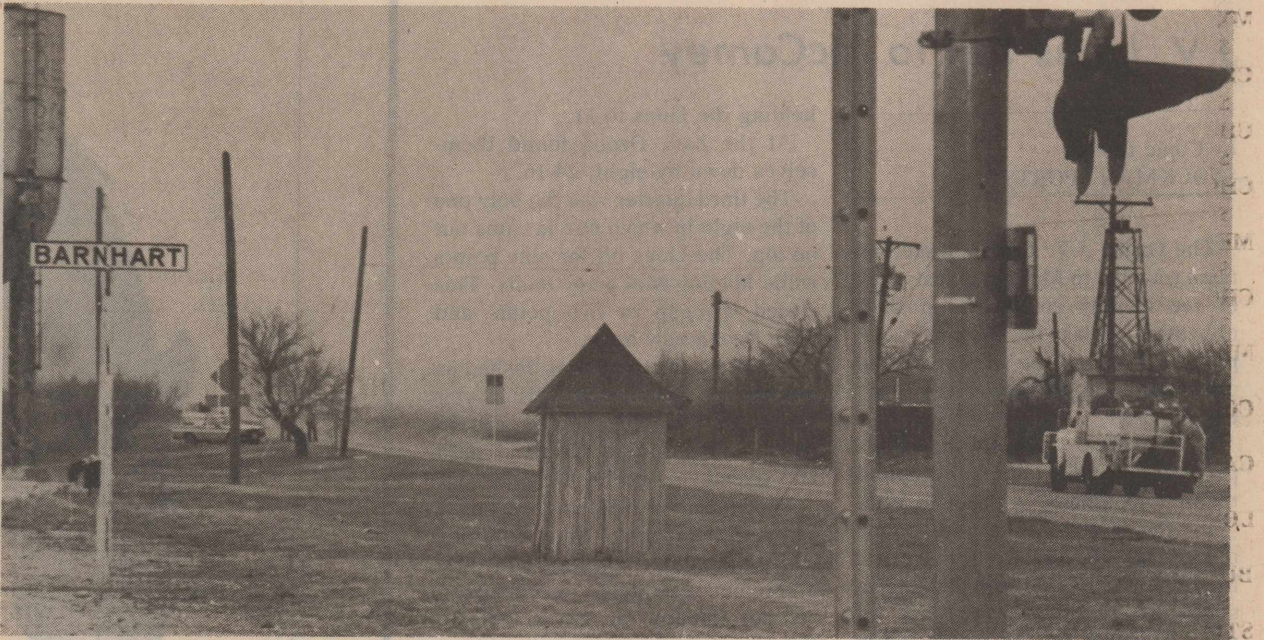

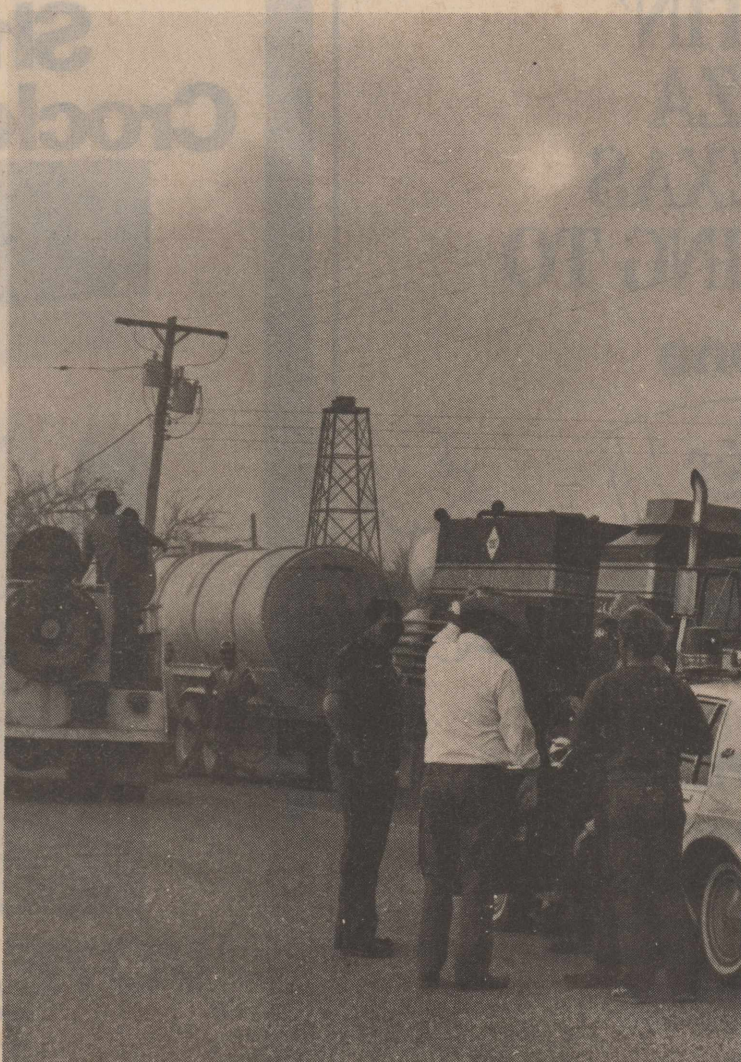

CROCKETT COUNTY OUTDOORS

OUTDOOR TRAINING FOR YOUTH

In last week's column I mentioned a new 4-H program called Field & Stream and promised to expand on the new project area, but first let me explain why I believe such a program is so timely.

During a time when our entire society is becoming more and more urbanized, our natural resources and the wise use of those resources are becoming more and more endangered. There are movements gaining momentum that would not only take away our firearms, but would also do away with the very institution of sport hunting, all the while ignoring the fact that the sportsmen that engage in hunting and fishing are the greatest supporters of conservation of those resources that we are accused of threatening. And don't ever think that anti-hunting movements are limited to the great metroplexes of the North. It's going on right close to home-Dallas, Houston, Austin, San Antonio, and a dozen other areas right here in Texas. Try watching the kids' Saturday morning cartoons for an eye-opener. The problem is propaganda, and you can find it on every major television network and in many metropolitan newspapers. Add that to the fact that we have many young people right here in Ozona that don't know how to pitch a tent or build a campfire or set a trotline or skin a rabbit, and you can see the importance of the 4-H Field & Stream program.

So what's Field & Stream all about? It's simply a program designed to develop understanding, appreciation, and basic skills in hunting, fishing, camping, outdoor cooking, firearms safety, wilderness survival and first aid, boating and water safety, wildlife management and identification, and dozens of other areas that seem to be currently taking a back seat to more "civilized" activities like "riding around with friends", alcohol, and drugs. Field & Stream is a program designed to educate our youth by re-introducing them to the outdoors like our dads and granddads did for us. Education and appreciation. It's the key to the future of our outdoor heritage.

Now it's time for me to get off my soapbox and tell you how to get in

the program. Any boy or girl in Crockett County 4-H that will be 13 years of age by June 1, 1989 (this includes today's 12 year olds) can sign up for the Field & Stream project area by going by the Extension office or calling 392-2721, by March 1st. Pre-registered 4-H'ers will receive a newsletter later advising them about an organizational meeting to set up groups and schedules. There's no fee for signing up, but participants can expect to pay their share of expenses that arise from camping trips and the like. And, of course, they'll be expected to provide their own personal equipment such as sleeping bags, cook kits, ammunition for some of the shooting activities, etc. No doubt, there will be some equipment purchases from time to time, but then show me anything our kids do today that doesn't cost something! Besides, the same equipment can and probably will be used by the young sportsman for the rest of his or her outdoor life. And I wouldn't be surprised to see Dad want to borrow it for next year's hunting trip to Colorado.

The first official function on the drawing boards is a Texas Hunter Education Course, slated for June 10-12 at a local Crockett County

ranch. This will be a "mini-camp" that'll last from sunup on Friday till sundown on Sunday, sleeping in the bunkhouse and "eatin' on the grounds". We'll be getting some financial assistance and instructor expertise from the Texas Game Warden Association. This will be an intense course, developed by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department's hunter safety division, dealing with such topics as hunter responsibility and ethics; safe handling of firearms; wildlife conservation and identification; game laws, and many other aspects of hunter training. Those attending the course will receive a completion certificate that will satisfy the new mandatory hunter education law that goes into effect this year. Anyone can sign up for the course, but a person must be at least 12 years of age to receive a certificate. There will be more on this camp in the future, but the ideal time to register for one of the 15 slots will be when you sign up for 4-H Field & Stream at the county agent's office.

If anyone has any questions about the Field & Stream program or the hunter education course, they can call me at 392-3972, or the Extension office at 392-2721.

Angora fleece placings announced

The Commercial Angora Goat Fleece Show and Mohair Program was held Monday in the County Show Barn. Some 19 youths fed 72 doe kids.

The 4-H doe kids were brought to the barn, shorn, weighed and the fleeces weighed, evaluated, and placed by Dr. Frank Craddock, Sheep and Goat Specialist with the

Extension Service.

During the evening program, Dr. Craddock discussed mohair quality, preparation, grading and chute sorting goats. He discussed the fleeces and gave his reasons for placing them. He used 100 Angora muttons provided by Steve Wilkins to demonstrate chute sorting and culling. He discussed body size, mohair quality and pounds of hair. Following the sorting demonstration, he demonstrated grading fleeces by pulling out the fine portion of a fleece into one grade and the coarser portion into a lower grade. By doing this, producers may significantly improve returns on a clip of hair provided the quality is present and the market is strong. Dr. Craddock encouraged growers to visit with their warehouse man prior to grading to be sure they would get paid for the extra labor involved.

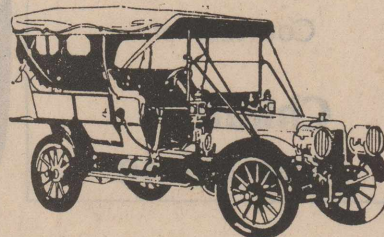

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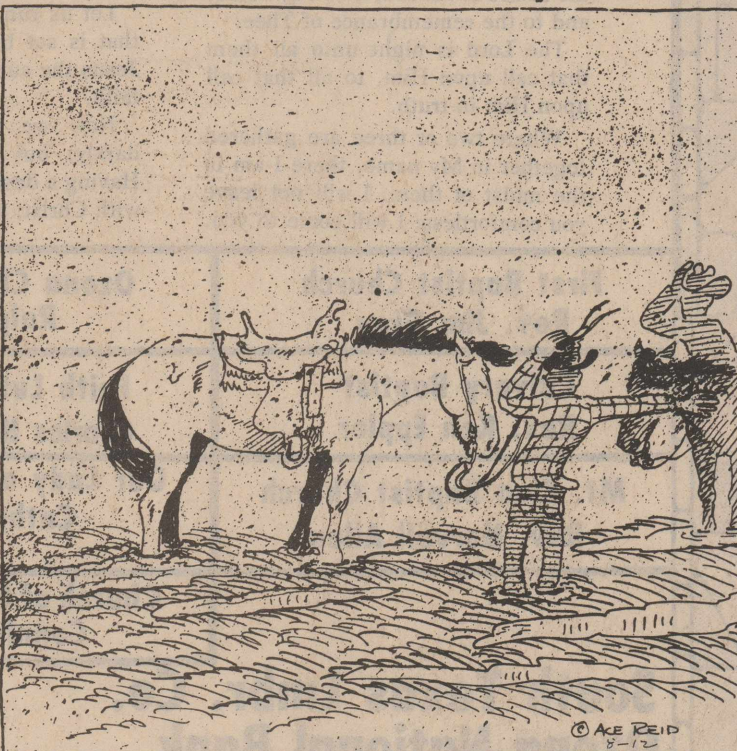

San Angelo facility offers treatment

The new River Crest Hospital, specializing in psychiatric and substance abuse treatment, is now open at 1636 Hunters Glen Road in San Angelo. The \$8 million, 56,000-square-foot facility deals with detoxification and treatment of all types of chemical dependency for adolescents 12-18 and adults, as well as psychiatric problems.

Each patient room in the 80-bed facility is equipped to handle two patients. The hospital employs 50 people and will ultimately have from 150-170 employees as patient numbers increase, probably within two years, officials said.

In addition to staff psychiatrists, San Angelo physicians of all specialties have been invited to accept consulting privileges at the hospital.

The new hospital includes a school for adolescents through arrangements with the San Angelo Independent School District.

River Crest Hospital is owned and operated by Universal Health Services, Inc. of King of Prussia, Pennsylvania and will serve an 11-county region including Tom Green, Runnels, Concho, Menard, Schleicher, Sterling, Irion, Coke, Crockett, Brown and Reagan.
