All local contested races ended in run-offs when the votes were tallied on Super Tuesday. A 65 percent turnout of the county's 2735 registered voters included a record number of 621 absentees.

Kathryn Mayfield was the front runner in the race for judge, garnering 819 votes. B. W. Stuart followed with 490 and Jess Marley received 375 votes. In the sheriff's race, Jim Wilson

received 880 votes. In second place was Aldo Gonzales with 652 followed by Manuel Hartnett with 235. Incumbent Sostenes De Hovos was

the leader in the Precinct 1 Commissioner race with 247 votes. Richard Berry received 176 with 95 going to Cruz Tambunga.

Jim House was the leader in Precinct 3 with 140. He is followed by Beth Boyd with 125, Jim Marks with 115, C. E. Light with 89, Rex Fenton with 60 and Glenn Wheeler

Cotton bales smolder by roadside

Volunteer firemen answered a different kind of call March 3 when a 53,000 pound cargo of cotton bales caught fire on I-10 east of Ozona. A 12:44 a.m. call to a location east of Circle Bar Truck Corral occupied the volunteers until 1:30 p.m.

Exactly how the fire started is unknown according to Bob Falkner of the fire department. Possibly it began from a hot bale loaded in El Paso or from a flat tire. Falkner said. The tires were all burned, so there was no way to determine if that was the cause.

Houston was the destination for the 107 bales of compressed cotton. Instead, the smouldering remains were removed to a Crockett County dump by two county loaders, three county dump trucks, five state highway department dump trucks and numerous employees and volunteers. A 6,000 gallon county water transport also assisted the four fire trucks at the scene. A total of 20,000 gallons of water and 10 gallons of foam were used to control the fire.

In the process of moving the debris to the dump, a small grass fire was started on the dump ground road at 8:58 a.m. One truck handled that fire, but a later fire started from the cotton fire at 11:09 a.m. required three trucks and 1,300 gallons of water to extinguish. Three to four acres were burned on the Davidson

A 12:36 p.m. call to the south part of the county required three Ozona trucks with assistance from two Sheffield units.

A grass fire which began on the Reid Holmsley Ranch jumped the fence onto the Lee Graves Ranch, burning approximately 150 acres. Sotol and rough country combined to make the fire difficult to contain. A county maintainer and front end loader were used along with a dozer from the Bill Clegg Ranch to fight

Volunteers were back at the station at 7:15 p.m.

Still another fire on March 3 called volunteers to Man of War Street in Chandlerdale West. One truck used 100 gallons of water to put out the fire reported at 3:44 p.m.

A small fire started by children had spread to the pasture according to fire department reports.

During the Feb. 29 through March 1 period, firemen have answered 13 calls. Two were on Feb. 29.

A 2 p.m. grass fire at the park east of town started when a barbecue fire

At 4:53 p.m. two trucks from Ozona and two from Barnhart responded to the Bob Bissett Ranch to control a breakout from a fire the previous day. The Ozona trucks used 1,500 gallons of water on the 100 acres burned and returned to the station at 7:25 p.m.

A small area burned March 1 from another re-kindle at the Bissett

Undocumented aliens apprehended

The execution of a search warrant on all employees hired after Nov. o, at a Crockett County ranch resulted 1986. in the apprehension of three undocumented aliens from Mexico. The search was made by Border Patrol agents from San Angelo on Feb. 29, 1988. It is anticipated that a warning citation will be issued in this case.

The Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 requires employers to hire only United States citizens and aliens authorized to work in this country. In addition, employers must prepare and maintain an employment eligibility verification form (I-9)

The knowingly hiring of unauthorized aliens could result in peanlties ranging from \$250 to \$10,000 per employee. The penalty for failure to comply with the verification requirement ranges from \$100 to \$1,000 per employee.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

This year, for the first time, Texas voters can vote absentee without showing cause why they cannot vote on election day. That change was expected to produce a record number of absentee votes.

Citrus Ban Lifted

While most attention was being focused on the primary elections, state agriculture officials were in federal court trying to defend their quarantine on Florida citrus fruit.

A federal judge lifted the 30day ban the Texas Department of Agriculture had enacted to prevent Florida citrus from entering the

The Texas ban was imposed last month after the U.S. Department of Agriculture lifted a threeyear-old federal quarantine that prevented Florida citrus fruit from being brought into states with their own citrus industry because of Florida's citrus canker problems.

Letter to the Editor

A search is presently underway for "Orphan Train" riders, now living in Texas, or who were brought to Texas as children.

Between 1854 and 1929, over 150,000 orphaned, abandoned and homeless children were taken out of the institutions of New York City, and transported by trains to rural America. At stops along the way, the children were lined up on railway station platforms, churches, schools, and opera houses for local residents to look them over and perhaps choose a child to take into their homes.

Those not chosen were loaded back on the train, traveling to the next stop where the entire proceedure was repeated. Many brothers and sisters became separated for the rest of their lives.

This became know as the "placing-out" system and the trains were often called "Orphan Trains."

Texas had received 1,527 of these children by 1910, according to a New York Children's Aid Society

"Baby Trains" or "Mercy Trains" carried infants up to the age of three years old from the New York Foundling Hospitals to prearranged foster homes. A numbered cloth tag was sewn into the infants underclothing and a corresponding number given to the potential new parents. When the train arrived, folks holding a number card would

board the train and find their child. Federal child welfare reform laws were enacted in 1929. The "Orphan Trains" were stopped forever.

The Orphan Train Heritage Society of America, Inc. (OTHSA) is a nationwide clearinghouse for information concerning the history of the placing-out programs from 1854 until 1929.

The Texas quarantine was lifted by U.S. District Judge James Nowlin on the grounds that the recent federal action takes precedence over state rules.

Agriculture officials here said the ban was needed to protect this state's \$65-million-a-year citrus industry. That industry still is trying to recover from a devastating freeze in 1983.

Texas officials said they now will seek an injunction against the new federal rule, which allows Florida citrus that meets certain standards of other citrusproducing states to be shipped into

Racing Tax Fight

Opponents of pari-mutuel wagering lost last year's referendum on legalizing betting on horse and dog races in Texas, but they are waging a new fight to keep the state from giving track and horse owners a larger share of the bet-

Leaders of both Texans Who Care and the Christian Life Commission last week told members of the Texas Racing Commission that the public trust would be eroded if the state's share of betting proceeds is reduced.

Under the pari-mutuel law, the state will receive five percent of all wagering proceeds. Even though legalized betting has not yet begun, many horse owners have complained that their share of the betting proceeds is too small to attract quality horses to Texas.

Racing promoters also say the track owner's share is too small. Under the present rules, owners

of successful horses get five percent of the betting pool, while track owners get eight percent. The remainder—minus the state's five percent share—is returned to bettors.

Some states with legalized betting have reduced their take on wagering to as low as 3.5 percent.

Wagering opponents told the commission that "integrity in the industry" cannot be maintained if the state's share is cut.

Any change in the distribution on betting proceeds would have to be made by the Legislature, not the racing commission.

Bullock Seeks Opinions

Comptroller Bob Bullock is prepared to seek a series of legal opinions from Attorney General Jim Mattox regarding questions he has about the Texas Racing Commission's actions in its first two meetings.

Bullock, an ex-officio commission member, is worried the commission could endanger the future of Texas racing because of procedural bumbling at the outset, a source close to Bullock said.

The comptroller did not attend the initial meetings because he has been recovering from surgery.

Meanwhile, Mattox's office admitted its lawyers erred when they failed to stop commission members from discussing details about the executive director's job during a 90-minute closed session last

Meals on wheels Transplant needed by Ozonans' kin

Heather Preas of Midland, a teenage relative of both Jodie Sessom and Billy Mills of Ozona, is living an ordeal few have to face. The 15-yearold Midland High School sophomore has been diagnosed as having aplastic anemia.

The often fatal illness occurs when bone marrow, where blood cells are made becomes diseased and fails to produce enough blood cells. There are only six hospitals in the U.S. that treat the disease.



Treatment with potent drugs and special blood transfusions is often ineffective. A bone marrow transplant from a matching donor is the treament of choice. Since none of Heather's family match exactly, they are faced with a one in 10,000 chance of finding a donor through bone marrow registeries in this country or Great Britain.

Heather was diagnosed in mid-January after being taken to a pediatrician in Andrews and having a consultation with an oncologist in

Symptoms of her disease, which affects 2,000 people in the country annually, are similar to those of

acute leukemia. In the two months before being diagnosed, Heather had experienced unusual fatigue, shortness of breath and pangs. Even more recently she had bruised easily and displayed minute hemorrhages pinpoints of blood on the eyelids, on the legs, feet and hands. She was subject to uncontrolled bleeding. After diagnosis, Heather was promptly hospitalized in Baylor Medical Center in Dallas.

Heather's treatment with antithymocyte globulin (ATG), which could cause the bone-marrow to regenerate and resume producting blood cells, came to a stop when she had an emergency appendectomy two weeks ago. She will resume the blood treatments next week.

Heather's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Preas, take turns staying in Dallas with her while the other remains in Midland with 13-year-old daughter Holly.

"We've just leveled with her (Heather) and have been real honest with her," said Mrs. Preas.

Although she talks openly about the possibility of dying, Heather is determined to survive the disorder.

Would they at least ask how they had come to fall backward into the dust?

No! They had made up their minds - and even a miracle cannot change

made-up minds. So, as though nothing had happened, they answered: "Jesus of Nazareth". And this time they didn't fall to the ground, so they could write off the first time as mere coincidence. Their fall into the dust had nothing to do with this Man, Jesus of Nazareth.

But faith isn't born of seeing miracles, or being given reason to fear. It is born of God's love in His Son Jesus, the Christ. Jesus offered Himself to His captors, but He framed the conditions. They could take Him, but only as they let His disciples go free. Only One is to be taken here, because He is the Lamb of God - taking the place of us all. So He's taken and His followers must be let go - must be, for that's why He lets Himself be taken.

As we behold God's love in His Son, we kneel in the dust before our Savior- and can make this claim in the face of sin, death and the devil: 'You took Jesus, now you must let me go'!

Delivery date for Angora goat test in March

Delivery dates for animals on the annual Angora Goat Performance Test at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Sonora have been set for March 19-22.

The 112-day test has been scheduled for about one month later than in previous years due to lack of pen space at the station, according to Dr. Maurice Shelton of San Angelo, test coordinator.

The goats, male kids born in spring 1987, may be delivered as individuals or in sire groups, Dr. Shelton said. Animals do not have to be registered, but sale or use prospects would be improved with registration, he added.

A field day and potential sale of the top animals has been scheduled for August 18.

The goats will be sheared on March 28-29 and again on July 21-22. They will be "weighed-on" to the test March 30 and finals weights will be taken July 20.

"Ideally, the goats submitted for testing should be in fleece when they arrive at the Station," Dr. Shelton said. Shorn animals will be accepted,

but they will be resheared after they arrive. The fleece will be returned to the owner at the end of

Producers are advised to make sure their animals are free of internal and external parasites and have been vaccinated for enterotoxemia. After arrival at the Station, the goats will be drenched and vaccinated for enterotoxemia and soremouth, he said.

The goats' feet will be trimmed two times during the test-once toward the middle of the test and finally between the final weigh day and field day. The cost for doing this will be charged to the producer.

Producers are welcome to trim their own goats' feet as they wish, Dr. Shelton added.

The goats will be sampled for fineness determination in advance of the final shearing, he said. Yield values will be based on a core sample obtained from the shorn fleece. The actual mohair clip (fleece) will be packaged in plastic bags and will be on display at the end of the test.

Participants are asked to deposit \$100 to cover the cost of feed and shearing. Any unused funds will be returned at the end of the test.
