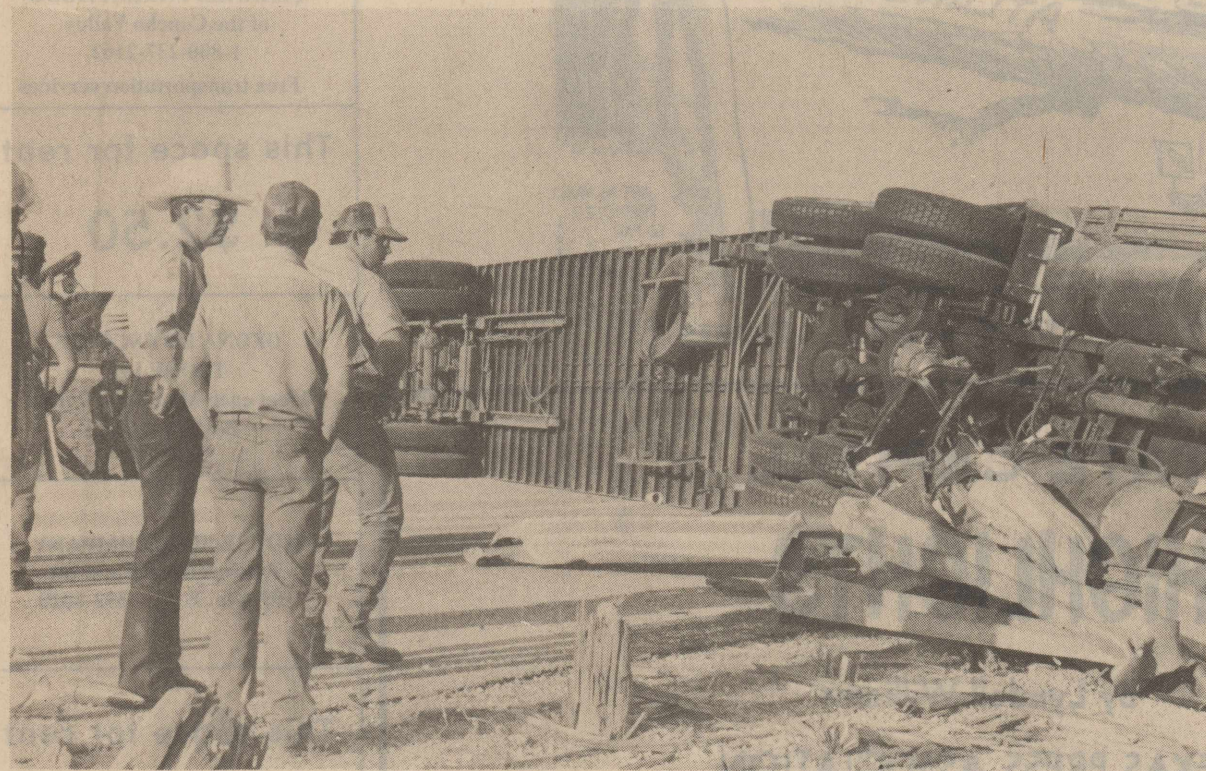

Lady golfers win district title

The Ozona Lady Lion golf team fired a 380 on their home course last Saturday in the final round of play in the District 6-AA championship tournament to clinch the district title and ensure their place in the regional tournament next week.

The Lady Lions finished the tournament with a four-round total of 1610 which was good enough to dust the competition soundly. Ozona's closest competition came from Stanton, which was more than 30 shots out of first place.

In a comeback of sorts, the Lady Lions' second team regrouped and resurged from the discipline debacle of two weeks ago and fired a total of 425 Saturday to place third in this week's round of play.

The Ozona varsity team was led by Randi Thompson, who recovered from a season-long slump to card an 89, which was good enough to put her into the third medalist spot.

Junior Gina McCollum, fully recovered from a season-threatening shoulder injury, fired a 95 on the day for Ozona's second score.

Loretta Ledbetter claimed the fifth medalist spot in the tournament by cranking out a 97.

Senior Trebie West slipped one spot in the medalist race and garnished the fourth slot on the all-district team with her round of 99.

Also shooting 99 was senior Larisa

Schoenhals. Her score gave her the number eight spot overall in the district.

The J.V. team was led in scoring by junior Julie Carson who fired a 104. Following her was senior Tanna Bixby with a 105, Stacy Berry with a 107 and Christy Cotton with a 109.

Angel Henderson, playing as an individual, took home honorable-mention all-district honors as she garnered the 12th spot in the medalist race.

Water District election underway

Absentee voting in the Crockett County Water Control District election began Monday, April 18, and will continue through Tuesday, May 3. The dates had previously been listed in the order of election as Monday, April 17, through Tuesday, May 4.

Dennis Clark and Pon Seahorn filed for re-election to the two places on the board.

Those wishing to vote absentee by personal appearance may do so at the water office between the hours of 8 a.m. and noon and from 1 to 5 p.m. weekdays.

Applications for ballots by mail should be sent to Elizabeth Applewhite, P. O. Box 117, Ozona, Texas 76943. The applications must be received no later than the close of business April 29, 1988.

Saturday, May 7, is the date of the election. Balloting will be at the Crockett County Courthouse between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Incentive checks will be ready soon

Incentive checks will be ready on Friday, April 22, 1988. Producers who would like to pick up their checks and have not already notified the office need to do so by Thursday, April 21. Otherwise, the checks will be mailed.

The incentive rate for shorn wool is 97.4%, unshorn lambs \$3.57 per hundredweight and 88.2% for mohair.

The average price received for wool in 1987 was 91.7¢ per pound and \$2.63 per pound of mohair.

Deduction funds for the 1987 marketing year will be 5.5¢ per pound for wool, 27.5¢ per hundredweight on unshorn lambs and 4.5¢ per pound on mohair.

First since 1959

Band captures sweepstakes

Ozona High School bandmen earned the coveted sweepstakes award in Ballinger April 13, the first such award for Ozona since the late 1950's.

The first step toward sweepstakes was taken in November when the band received a first place in marching competition. Four judges concurred and awarded the superior rating for the band's routines performed while playing three numbers.

Wednesday, the group performed

two concert pieces from a UIL selection list and a march chosen by Director Kelly Glaze. One of the songs, Royal Heritage Suite, featured an alto saxophone solo by Lydia Rivera. The band also played Modal Song and Dance and the march Highlander Regiment to earn a I rating.

During the sightreading portion of the contest, musicians were given six minutes to study a number not seen before. Their performance was again rated superior.

"I am extremely proud of the students," said Glaze. "They have worked as hard for this contest as any group I've ever had."

"I hope this is the start of a new tradition."

Glaze and assistant director Eric Wharton will present the band in concert May 19. The event is tentatively planned for the park in downtown Ozona.

Other bands competing in Ozona's district were: Bangs, Coleman, Reagan County, Eldorado, Wall, Dublin, Goldthwaite and Hamilton.

Annual wool sale scheduled for April 28

Crockett County's annual wool sales slated for April 28 follow in the wake of prices above \$3.00, almost twice that of a year ago. A record \$3.246 per pound for a 2,700-pound clip was reported earlier this month at a sealed bid wool sale in Sanderson.

This clip at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. was in the grease, and some other clips also brought \$3.00 a pound or more according to Rick Honaker, wool house manager. Second highest price at the sale was \$3.23 per pound in the grease for a lot of 11,100 pounds.

The sale included approximately

600,000 pounds of 12-month wool, 30,000 pounds of 10-month wool and 105,000 pounds of 8-month wool. Sanderson Wool Commission offered 602,000 pounds and Ozona Wool and Mohair offered 36,000 pounds.

A San Angelo sale by Western Wool and Mohair offered more than 165,000 pounds of mostly 12-month finewool April 8. Topping the sale was a 5,000 pound clip of superfine 12-month wool at \$3.045 per pound in the grease.

Wool Growers Central Storage of San Angelo sold 183,000 pounds of mostly 12-month finewool April 8. A

superfine clip of 2,000 pounds brought \$3.174 per grease pound.

Jim Adams, manager of Wool Growers in Ozona, announced his company's sale for 8:30 a.m. April 28.

"We expect a tremendous amount of buyer participation like there has been all year," Adams said. He estimates that Wool Growers will have an offering of approximately 200,000 pounds for the sale.

Mary Wilson, secretary at Ozona Wool and Mohair, said that company's sale will begin at 2 p.m. on the 28th.

Changes to be made at Ozona Community Center next September

"Great things are happening at the Ozona Community Center; we are always looking at new ways of expanding our ministry to the community," said Marilyn Cox. "Because the Ozona Day Care Center is closing its doors, we are taking this opportunity to enlarge our program to include day-long services."

Beginning in the Fall, preschool classes will be held for two, three, and four year olds from 8 to 11 a.m. The curriculum will be based on a developmentally appropriate approach. Classrooms will be set up to include activities designed especially for each age group enrolled in the program. There will be little change in the existing program other than the addition of a toddler class.

After 11 a.m. the structure of the program changes as Day Care routines are incorporated into the total program. Children will continue bringing lunches from home, but snacks will be provided by the center. Following lunch and a rest period, there will be planned activities for the children present. After 2:30 p.m. there will be an organized after-school program.

Much planning has been done to make this program financially affordable to everyone in Ozona. There are several payment options available depending on the services required. Scholarships will still be available for three and four-year-olds involved in the morning preschool program. Applications for these partial scholarships will be available at pre-registration.

Further specific information will be mailed in May to prospective students and their families. The Ozona Public School has been helpful in obtaining these names; however no two-year-olds are on their

list. If you do not receive one of these letters and are interested in these services, please contact the center at 392-2710 in order to receive information. Enrollment is limited because of space and staff required; thus applications will be taken on a first come, first serve basis.

A pre-registration will be held from 4 to 6 p.m. on Tuesday, May 24, at the center. Completed appli-

cations, birth certificates, and immunization records should be brought at that time. Board members and staff will be present to answer questions regarding any aspect of the program.

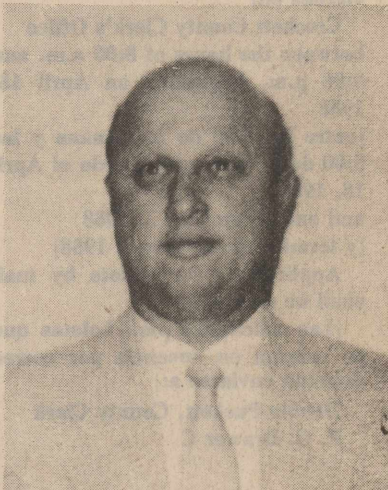
"The Community Center Board members and staff are excited about the additions to the program and look forward to a new beginning next September," said Mrs. Cox.

All-Sports Banquet to feature sports humorist Ronny Flowers

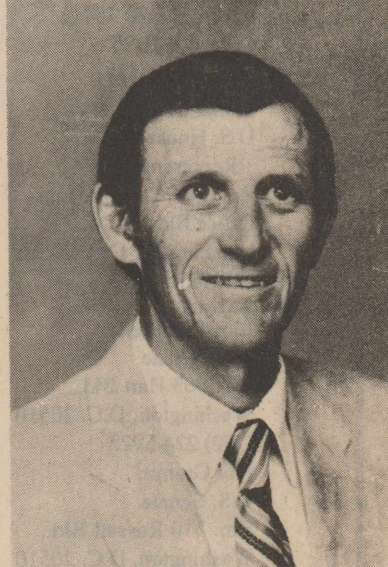

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Like a bolt from the blue, word that Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance may want Texas to follow OPEC's production strategy met with more warmth here than in Washington, D.C.

The feds said the idea was bad, bad, bad, but Texas leaders sat pat, a sign that Hance took as some encouragement.

Hance is at OPEC's meeting in Vienna this week to discuss trimming Texas oil production in line with the cartel's to force higher prices, a gambit to improve the Texas economy.

He will report back to Gov. Bill Clements, no stranger to the oil patch, before making any deals, he said.

The Railroad Commission sets Texas production allowances, fixed at 100 percent since 1972. When OPEC engineered the price collapse in 1986, Texas was hit hard. Hance's thinking is that Texas, following OPEC, could perhaps avoid another buffeting as well as increase the odds of attracting cash to the Texas economy.

School Finance Battle

Opening witnesses traded shots here in the trial to settle how to divide state funds among rich and poor school districts.

At issue is whether the Legislature will be forced to change the Constitution to steer more dollars to poorer districts.

Opponents of the present system pointed out the disparity which allows richer districts to spend up to three times more than poorer districts.

Supporters of the present formula said that once standards have been met, the constitution

Runoffs Still Hot

In the wake of runoff elections, some races won't cool down for awhile.

The local machine here and Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle declared a judicial candidate was not eligible, the voters said yes, she was, too.

The courts ruled Slagle's decision was unconstitutional, and the voters elected Jeanne Meurer two-to-one over her opponent. The chairmen have red faces, and they're talking new leadership in the precincts.

In Houston, Mexican-American Caucus chair Rep. Al Luna turned back his opponent in a campaign of two-way charges of substance abuse.

In the Valley, Rep. Renata Cuellar overcame former Mexican-American Democrats' chairman Juan Maldonado in a runoff where a side issue became whether statewide officials should be involved in Mexican-American Caucus down-ballot squabbles.

The Caucus emerged from the fray with leadership intact, but expect to see some paybacks during the coming session.

Unemployment Checks

Reforming the workers' compensation system will be top issue next session, but leaders are

at odds how to do it.

Texas employers pay one of the highest insurance rates in the nation, but Texas workers receive some of the lowest benefits checks.

Republican Rep. Mike Toomey said he favors eliminating the workers' right to appeal awards decided by the Texas Industrial Accident Board.

Texas AFL-CIO president Harry Hubbard favors reducing the cost, but said he'll never go for negotiating right of appeal.

Other Highlights

- Comptroller Bob Bullock made the cover of Texas Business magazine for his role in rebuilding the Texas economy.

- The Texas Racing Commissioner said he favors licensing no more than three of the existing small horse-race tracks here for pari-mutuel betting, the better to watch the young industry grow.

- A Dallas financier, Richard C. Strauss, said he will head a new group to raise money for Democrats running for the Legislature.

- Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower spent last week in New York giving speeches to farmers there on behalf of Jesse Jackson.

The colorful Hightower called George Bush "the hind end of a horse's costume."

Firefighting in China: an exchange of ideas

China, a country which because of population must place society over the rights of individuals, made a deep impression on Ozonan Steve Kenley. Kenley recently returned from a three-week stay in China as part of a People to People Arson

Investigation Delegation. "I know what we saw; I'm not sure what it meant," said Kenley shortly after returning to Texas. The People to People Program was founded in 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. He believed that

private citizens reaching out in friendship to people of other nations could make a significant contribution to world peace.

Kenley, who is president of the Texas Chapter of the International Association of Arson Investigators, was the only Texan chosen to be part of a delegation of 33 to visit China.

The itinerary for the trip included Hong Kong, Guangzhou, Shanghai, Nanjing and Beijing. In each city there were meetings to exchange ideas, banquets and tours.

"One of the biggest shocks came when we saw our first Chinese fireman," said Kenley.

In China every male child, when he reaches the age of 18, must serve time in the militia. He has a choice of police, fire or military for a four year period. Once enlisted in the fire department, the youths are sent throughout the country to fire brigades. Here they live and train in a military atmosphere. Upon reaching the end of their service time, a few will be selected to remain in the fire service. These men study at a university and go to a lifelong job as an officer while others are sent back to their homes to a government mandated job.

As the delegates' buses arrived at the stations they were met by ranks of firemen in military formation

performing drills to make any commander proud.

During demonstrations, the Chinese firemen showed their skills by scaling six story buildings without ladders, running an obstacle course while carrying a 30 pound dry powder and at the end, extinguishing a pit fire.

Delegates were told "to be a member of a fire brigade is an honorable and highly respected profession in China. They are soldiers whose job it is to protect the property of the state and its people. If they are injured, they and their families are cared for. If they are killed, they will become a martyr, and their families will be cared for."

"I know what we saw; I'm not sure what it meant," said Kenley.

"To understand the fire prevention and protection organizations, you must first have a basic understanding of the Chinese society," Kenley said. The nature of the society is basically rural where each family had an area of land to support it. You would never leave the place where you were born. You would live in the family house with all your aunts, uncles, cousins, brothers, sisters, etc. With so many people living in a close environment, there had to be a pecking order established. Thus, two basic values in the Chinese society today were established out of necessity thousands of years ago.

First is the basic premise that

someone is in charge. Second is the idea of saving face, getting along if you will, respecting the feelings of

the other person. A definite pecking order is established at every level of the society

which puts the feelings of others in a very high position, a society in which those who are unwilling to pull their load are punished.

Woman escapes death in truck accident

Vicki Evans of Argyle didn't even have a broken bone Thursday after the truck/tractor rig she was driving overturned west of Ozona. Evans had spent the night at Circle Bar and had just left Ozona at the time of the 7:45 a.m. accident.

According to investigating officer Richard Barton, the 1985 Freightliner drifted off to the right, and when Evans corrected, a load shift caused the vehicle to swerve sharply to the left. After a further attempt at correction, the rig turned over.

The cab of the truck damaged 150 feet of guard rail according to DPS Sergeant Glen Redmon. Firemen used a saw to remove the rig from the guardrail.

The top of the cargo area burst open, spilling six drums of concentrated orange juice which had to be washed from the highway by volunteer firemen. Another 75 drums of orange juice were poured out at the dump.

Evans was treated at the scene and later transported from Crockett County Hospital to a San Angelo for examination.

Three other accidents were investigated in the county during the April 11-15 period.

Edward Cervantez was the driver of a 1979 Chevrolet pickup in collision with a parked car at Crockett Apartments April 11 at 10:45 p.m.

Cervantez pulled in beside a 1987 Pontiac Fiero whose owner was at the car. When Cervantez backed away from the curb, he turned too

sharp, catching the front corner of the parked car.

Trooper Richard Barton investigated.

Linda Usener was the driver of a 1987 Ford in collision with a 1977 Ford pickup driven by Tomas Fierro on April 12 at 6:20 p.m.

Mrs. Usener was traveling north on Ave. I behind Fierro when he swung wide to turn left into a private drive. Believing he was going to

park, Mrs. Usener started around Fierro when he turned.

Barton investigated the accident.

An April 15 accident 1 1/2 miles east of Ozona occurred when driver Helen Collins of Pawtucket, RI dozed at the wheel. Ms. Collins was westbound on I-10 in a Ford Tempo when her car struck a guard rail, and bounced into the traffic lane.

There were no injuries according to Trooper Dale Taylor's report.

However, when the smoke cleared and the dust had settled, the Stanton Buffalos had made a brilliant charge and won the district by one shot over Ozona 1338 to 1339.

Stanton shot a 333 total on the McCamey Country Club course, beating Ozona on the day by 10 shots. The Lions' total of 343 was their most disappointing round of the year.

When the day began, the golfers teed off in winds estimated to be blowing 45 to 55 miles per hour with gusts up to 60 mph. These winds proved to blow the Lions right out of first place.

Junior Copie Davis recovered from a terrible front nine score of 44 to score 38 on the back nine for a round of 82 that put him in second place overall in the district.

Senior Will Seahorn also fired a round of 82 which put him on the

all-district team in the number six spot.

Freshman Jay Haire came away with an 89.

The hard luck award for the week goes to senior Bret Hood, who endured bad break after bad break to come in with a disappointing round of 90.

Freshman Shane Pridemore also suffered the wrath of the wind. As the speed of the breeze soared, so did his scores, and his total was dropped.

Although the Lions finished second in the district, they will still be going to the regional tournament along with the Stanton Buffalos, who have won District 6-AA for two years in a row.

In the medalist race, Ozona had three team members make the all-district squad. Davis, who shot a four-round total of 318, took the second place medalist spot, while Hood finished six shots back in third. Seahorn fired a total of 339 for the tournament which put him in sixth place.

The regional tournament will begin Tuesday morning at Comanche Trails Country Club in Big Spring immediately following the girls at 8 a.m.

School board seeking personnel

Athletic Director John Curry met with the Ozona School Board during its regular meeting on Tuesday, April 12, to review athletic personnel assignments and coaching needs for next year. During the meeting, Mr. Curry told the trustees that he had received several responses from individuals interested in the head girls' basketball position, and he would be making a recommendation for employment within the next month. Curry also stated that he is now in the process of seeking a replacement for Mark Duncan, the school's athletic trainer who has accepted a position with Dr. Ryan in San Angelo. Mark and his wife Pam, who teaches in Ozona Junior High, will move to San Angelo when school is out.

Curtis Keith, school maintenance supervisor, met with the board to give the trustees information on the Asbestos Hazard Response Act and review bids for the A.H.E.R.A. inspection process. Following board discussion concerning the A.H.E.R.A. requirements, the trustees voted to award Environmental Services Division of Houston the bid for inspection of school

facilities. Eight other companies submitted bids for the inspection process.

Superintendent Garland Davis gave the members information on a "cafeteria plan" for school employees. He explained that a "cafeteria plan" is a written plan under which all participants are employees and the participants may choose to pay certain after-tax expenses with pre-tax dollars, thereby increasing their take-home pay. The cafeteria plan must qualify under Section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code. Mr. Davis noted that the district has several companies that would like to administer a cafeteria plan for the school district, and if the district decided to offer a cafeteria plan to its employees, he would recommend that those companies interested in administering a plan make a presentation to the school board for consideration.

Also during the meeting, the seven-member board gave Davis authorization to write the school district's paraprofessional and auxiliary employees a letter of reasonable assurance of employment during the 1988-89 school year.

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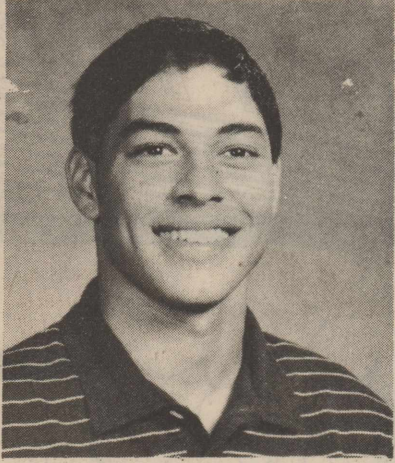
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Rodriguez chosen boy's state delegate

How difficult it is for us to live by Jesus' Word! We're always so sure of ourselves that we don't take our Lord's warning seriously. We're certain that even if everyone else turns against Jesus, we'll never turn against Him.

If warning was enough, no one would ever fall away from Him. If our confession of faith was enough, no one would be lost. If our promise

was enough, we would all reach the goal God has set for us. But these are always expressions of self-confidence, because they contradict our Lord's Word to us. So we attempt to do what we would do - as we would do it, even in spite of what our Lord says.

One man proudly boasted that he walked with his head up; that he

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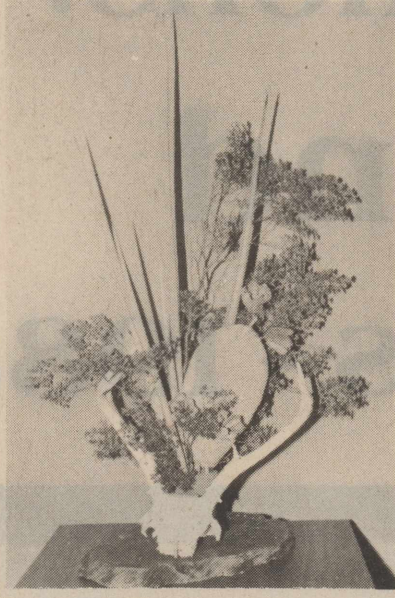
Ozona clubs represented at national meet

A deer, cow, goat or ram horn will



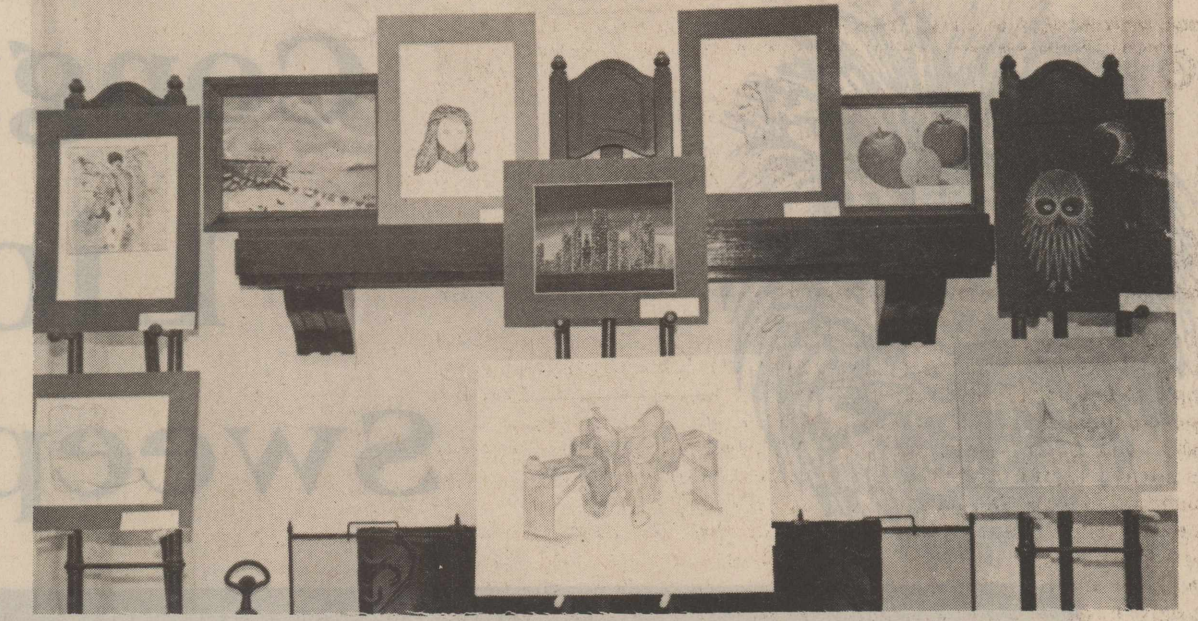
be the focal point of each centerpiece, accompanied by yucca stalks, spineless pear, greasewood, agerita,

Highway Department to recall worn plates

Some vehicle owners will see a new message on their registration renewal forms beginning in May: "New Plates Required".

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will start a program of recalling plates more than eight years old to comply with a state law that calls for issuance of safety plates.

Highway department testing personnel have found that "the reflective value of license plate sheeting begins to deteriorate dramatically after eight years," said Dian Neill, head of the department's Motor Vehicle Division. The dull plates are difficult to see in the dark.

Over the next 12 months, the department expects to issue 1.4 million replacement plates for all light trucks and passenger cars with tags originally issued from 1975 through 1980. Next year, recalls for 1981 plates will go out in the continuing program, conducted through county tax assessor-collector offices.

Vehicle owners who volunteer to trade their five to eight year-old plates may still do so free. "The state collects fees sufficient to replace license plates every five years, so you're just getting your

money's worth if you trade them in on time," said Tom Stokes, tax assessor-collector.

In addition to the recall message on the registration renewal form, owners of old plates will get a notice advising them to contact their county tax office for locations where new plates can be obtained.

The highway department has

plenty of plates ready and plans to monitor county inventories closely so no one runs out. The plates will be lettered in blue, with "TEXAS" and a state silhouette in red.

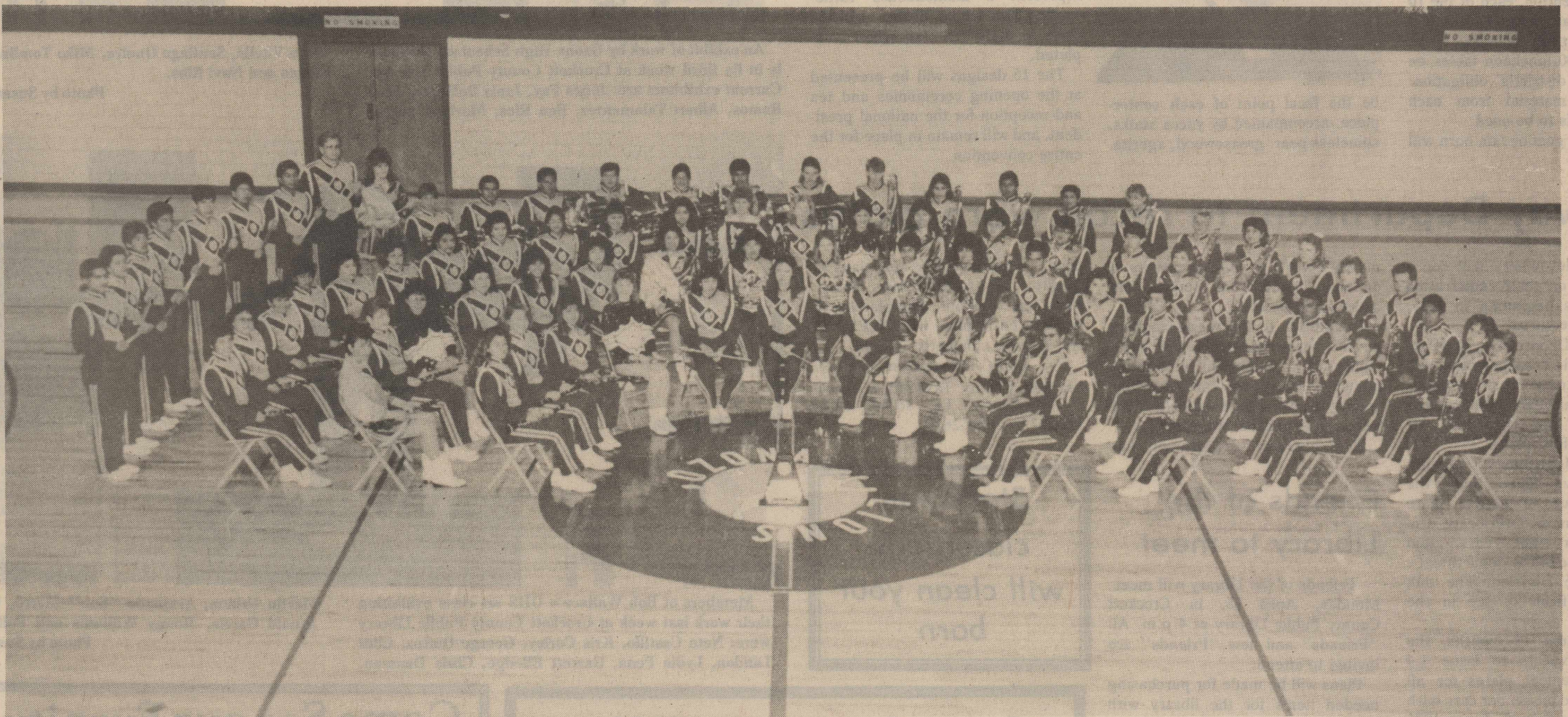
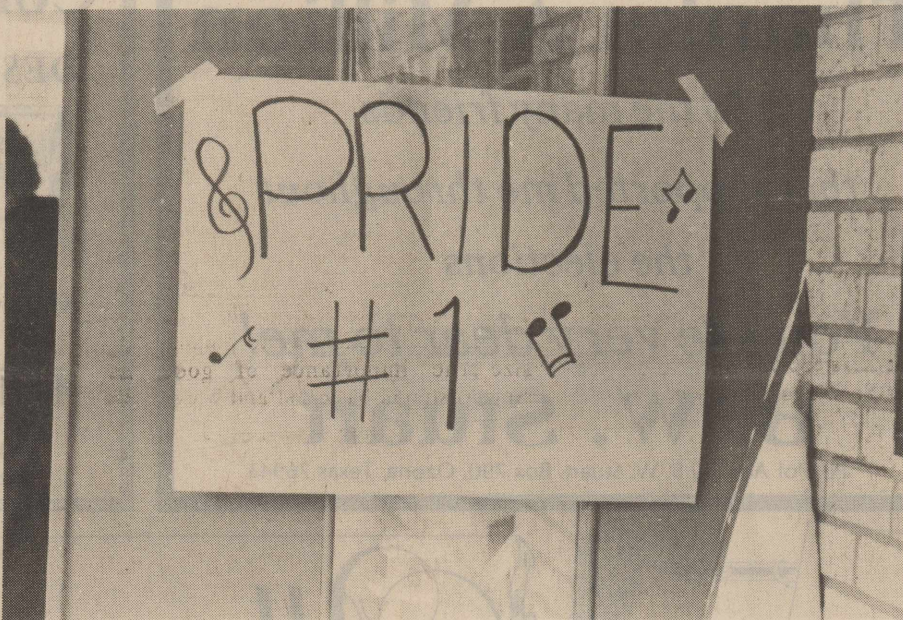

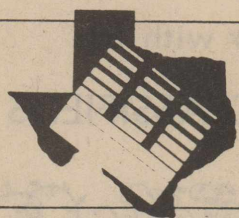

Beef checkoff goes for the gold

Like a fleet Olympic runner, the beef checkoff came out of the blocks full steam on Oct. 1, 1986. That was the date the nation's producers began contributing \$1 per head for research, promotion and education about beef.

Now the beef checkoff is entering the stretch run of its 22-month trial period as cattlemen ready for the May 10 vote on whether to approve it permanently.

However, unlike that Olympian whose energy is spent as the finish line comes in sight, the beef checkoff's momentum becomes stronger as the referendum date comes closer. Ongoing programs on national, state and local levels continue to encourage increased beef consumption. All these programs are coming together to improve the profit potential of cattle production.

"Studies reveal that the number of Americans who believe beef fits into their lifestyle increased from 59 percent in January to 64 percent in June," said Bill Black of Ozona, chairman of the Crockett County Steering Committee. "Those who believe beef is an important part of a well-balanced diet increased from 51 percent to 56 percent. These increases show that every dollar checked off by cattlemen in this program is an investment that pays dividends."

In the first year of the program, checkoff dollars collected nationwide totaled about \$73 million. About \$5 million of this amount came from beef and cattle importers. In Texas, checkoff dollars totaled \$12.6 million.

4-H range team competes in Menard

The Crockett County 4-H range teams traveled to Menard to compete in their Range and Plant ID contest.

The junior team placed second with Matthew Marshall third high junior individual. Other junior members participating were: Martha Mayfield, Gary Thompson, Jennifer Davidson, Jason Hignight, John Paul Usener, Ashley Farris and Justin Southern.

The Crockett County senior team was first place team, and John Williams was first place senior individual. He was also high over-all individual and received a belt buckle. Other seniors were: Angie Marshall and Keith Fowler.

Adults accompanying the group were Geroge Peacock, John Hignight, and Larry Williams.

"The checkoff is structured so that all producers invest an equal amount for each animal sold in the program," said Black. "Importers and all producers participate. The law sets a 5 percent cap on use of checkoff funds for administration so dollars go to their intended purposes of promotion, research and information. And the state council decides how to invest 50 cents of each dollar. This allows our Texas Beef Industry Council to respond to those needs within our state. The remaining 50 cents goes to the Beef Board for national programs."

Anyone who has owned or acquired one head of cattle between Oct. 1, 1986, and March 31, 1988, is eligible to vote May 10. One vote per

business entity is allowed. For purposes of the referendum, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has defined a business entity as any individual or group of individuals who has a common ownership in cattle, such as a partnership, corporation or family.

Registration and voting will take place May 10 at county extension service offices around the nation. You may vote in your county of residence unless your cattle are corporately owned.

The local district, which works throughout the year on soil and water conservation measures, is providing literature that highlights man's responsibility to be active stewards of our nation's soil and water resources.

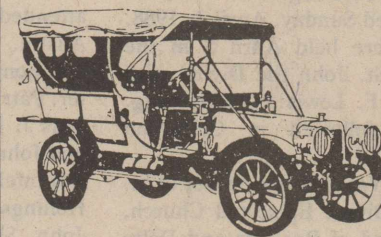
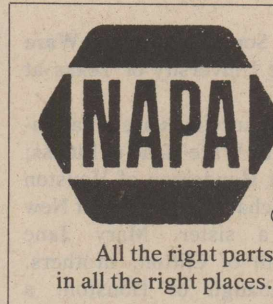

ship Is Our Future", are being distributed by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District to local churches.

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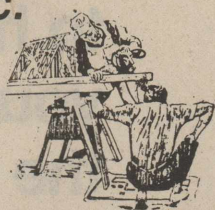

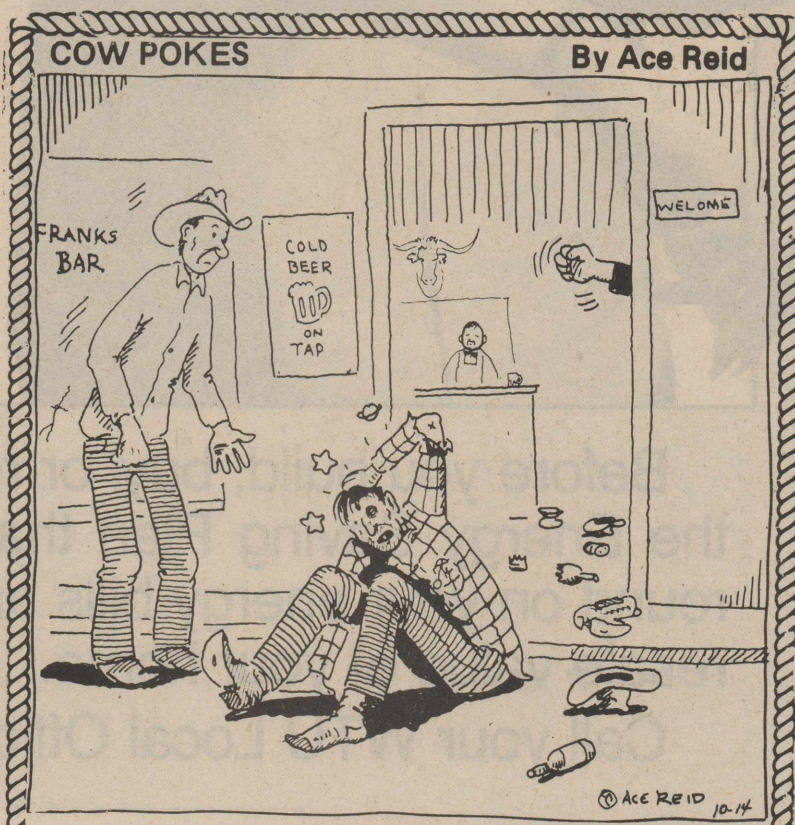

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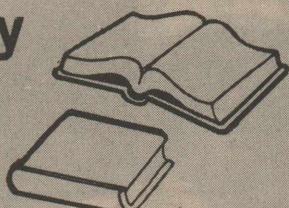

Following instructions is crucial in beef referendum absentee voting

Following instructions when voting in the upcoming Beef Referendum is important, particularly regarding absentee voting.

Voting in the referendum will take place in county Extension offices during normal business hours on May 10, points out Billy Reagor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

However, producers and beef importers who are unable to vote in person may request an absentee ballot from Dr. Milo Shult, Beef Referendum State Extension Coordinator, System Building 105A, Texas A&M University, College Station, Tex. 77843; telephone: 409-845-7907.

Absentee ballots will be available through April 29 and must be marked and returned to the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence by the close of business on May 3.

When requesting an absentee

ballot, an individual must provide his or her name or name of company if voting for a business, mailing address, telephone number and county of residence or the county where the business headquarters is located.

Once the absentee ballot is received, it's important to read the accompanying instructions and to follow them properly, Reagor emphasizes. The absentee voter must return the ballot to the county Extension office in the county of residence or location of business headquarters. The ballot must be in the special envelope that is provided and the voter must put his or her name and address on the outside of that envelope. Failure to follow these procedures will make the vote invalid.

Eligible voters are all producers and importers of cattle who owned or acquired cattle, beef or beef products during the period of Oct. 1, 1986, through March 31 of 1988.

A vote to make an emergency purchase of a pump for a fire truck was the big item of the day. The \$12,000 purchase was approved on a motion by Chuy Castro seconded by Sostenes De Hoyos.

Volunteers are nearing the 100 mark for fire calls during the first 3 1/2 months of the year.

After approving the treasurer's report, commissioners were told that county finances will only stretch so far. The county "will be \$200,000 over budget if the current trend in expenditures keeps up," said County Auditor Dick Kirby.

During a report from Road Supervisor Eddie Moore, court members were told that complaints had been received from the ASCS about maintenance of the draw. Under the original agreement between Crockett County and the ASCS, the county is to maintain the draw according to ASCS specifications.

Lack of proper equipment to reach the sides has resulted in scraping off

too much soil according to the ASCS.

Moore stressed the need for decisions on paving so rock can be ordered.

Overtime on fire calls when county employees are required to operate county owned machinery has amounted to 34 1/2 hours paid and 30 hours comp time, Moore said. The three to five employees involved worked three fires. Commissioners voted last month to offer a choice of overtime pay or comp time in this situation on a trial basis.

A county paid insurance program for retired employees has turned up nine eligible people, commissioners learned. The insurance will combine with Medicare.

During reports from department heads, officials learned that Helping Hands for the Elderly had served 370 meals during the previous month for an average of 16 meals per day.

Commodities were distributed to 164 families, totaling 485 people, in March, said Jerry Hill.

Other reports include those of Civic Center director Garland Young, librarian Louise Ledoux and hospital administrator Bill Boswell.
