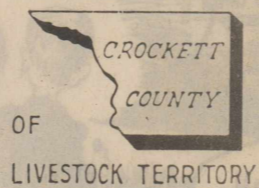

Mayfield appointed Judge

Kathryn Mayfield was appointed Crockett County judge April 21 during a called meeting of commissioner's court. Mrs. Mayfield won the Democratic Primary run-off election April 12 and will be on the November ballot as candidate for judge.

Mrs. Mayfield is Crockett County's second woman judge. First to serve in that capacity was the late Bernice Jones. Mrs. Jones was appointed to fill her husband's unexpired term after his death in 1965, and was then elected to the

office. Judge Mayfield replaces Judge A. O. Fields who resigned effective December 31, 1987, but has continued to serve as needed.

The new judge is 34-years-old, and has lived all her life in Ozona other than her university years. She received her Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree from Texas Tech School of Law in May of 1982 and was licensed to practice by the Supreme Court of the State of Texas in November of that year. She worked for one year as the director/attorney for the Lubbock Legal Aid Society Inc. before

returning to Ozona to open her private practice of law in February of 1984.

Kathryn and her geologist husband, Richard Mayfield, have two children, Martha, age 12, and Sara, age six.

She is the daughter of former district judge Troy Williams and Mrs. Williams of Ozona.

In the announcement of her candidacy, Mayfield stated that community awareness of county court happenings is an important issue. She believes in new and innovative

sentencing to prevent reoccurring offenses such as evaluation to determine drug dependency, community service or AA attendance.

Improved communication between the commissioner's court and hospital board and actively seeking a solution to the dumpground problem are also priorities.

The judge will maintain a separate office for her private office. She believes in an open door policy for the people of Crockett County.

"I intend to do a good job," said Judge Mayfield after her appointment.

Three advance to state in UIL literary

Three Ozona literary contestants earned spots in the state contest while competing in the University Interscholastic League regional contest at Big Spring Saturday, April 23.

All three placed second in their

respective events. The top three in each event advance to state competition at Austin May 6-7.

Both local journalism contestants qualified: Copie Davis in headline writing and T. C. Tucker in feature writing.

Isabel Benitez took her second place medal in spelling.

Eight students and three sponsors journeyed to Big Spring Friday afternoon after school.

Competition began Saturday at Howard County College with Lincoln-Douglas debaters beginning preliminary rounds at 8 a.m.

Margaret Jones and Mark Sanchez both competed in this event for Ozona. They had placed one and two respectively in district competition qualifying for the regional meet.

Both debated to 2-1 ratings in the preliminaries. However, wins in all three preliminary rounds were necessary for advancement to the finals.

Margaret was required to debate a young man in the preliminaries who later placed second at the state level last year. Margaret placed third.

"You could tell by the comments the judge wrote that he had a

difficult time making the decision," said Frances Curry, speech sponsor. "It was a close decision."

Margaret and Mark also compete in persuasive speaking. Mark placed fifth in the finals of that event.

Ozona's informative speakers failed to advance from preliminary rounds to the finals.

Larisa Schoenhals, Kelli Landon and Rita Rios competed in informative speaking after they had placed one, two and three respectively in district competition.

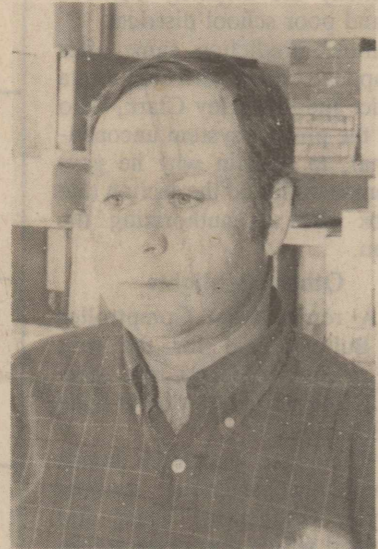
Texas is divided into four regions for UIL competition.

District 6-2A is included in Region I which encompasses the western half of the state from Coleman to El Paso, from Dalhart to the Rio Grande.

Eight districts are included in Region I. As each district has approximately six schools, theoretically as many as 48 schools may be represented in regional competition with 24 students competing in each event.

Frances Curry and Jill Crawford, speech sponsors, and journalism sponsor Jacquelyn Shacklette accompanied the students to Big Spring.

Upham files for trustee



Randy Upham has announced his candidacy for a place on the board of trustees of Ozona schools. Upham, who attended local schools, attended Baylor University and received a degree in biology from New Mexico State University.

He continued with graduate work in educational psychology at New Mexico State and worked for the Department of Justice two years before moving back to Ozona.

Randy and his wife Elizabeth have two children, Chad, 13, and Casey, 10. The Uphams are in the ranching and insurance business.

If elected, Upham plans represent students, parents and teachers. The candidate believes in listening to the ideas of the people and working together as a board.

"I don't have an ax to grind," said Upham, who would like to see the board continue to function as it is now.

Screening clinic May 5

Crockett County schools will hold a free screening clinic Thursday, May 5, at the Primary School.

This year the clinic will only involve children who will be five on or before Sept. 1, 1988. Parents will need to bring their child's birth certificate, shot record, and social security number to pre-register their child for kindergarten for the 1988-89 school year.

There are three basic areas tested in the clinic. The children are tested in areas of vision, hearing and language, which consists of gross motor, fine motor, concepts and

communication skills. When all areas are completed there is a final evaluation of the child's progress with recommendations made for any additional help the child may need before entering the public schools.

The clinic will screen children with last names beginning with the letters A-L at 8:30 to 11:00 a.m. and children with last names beginning with letters M-Z from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

This screening clinic will help parents to see how well their child is growing and will help them know what to do to help their child get ready for school.

Riverside Protection Coalition formed

Texas now has a group dedicated to maintaining rural land along rivers as private property. The Riverside and Landowners' Protection Coalition was formed in March according to Ginger Perner, who is carrying the message to area landowners.

At the initial meeting, 55 persons were in attendance representing eight Central Texas rivers stretching from the Guadalupe to the Devil's River.

Organized by Arthur W. Nagel of Boerne, the coalition seeks to prevent the turning of Texas rivers into public recreation areas.

Anyone interested in reducing the harassment experienced from trespassers and acts of vandalism affecting the business of ranching and farming is encouraged to join the group, Mrs. Perner said.

Canoeing down a Texas river can be enjoyable, she said, but when river users, without permission of the landowner, trespass on private property, that is illegal; explore across private property, that is illegal; deposit trash on private property, that is illegal; hunt and kill game on private property, that is illegal.

Chamber gears up for travelers

New travel brochures, renovated signs and some changes in the office top the Chamber of Commerce's plans for enhancing Ozona's image. A new travel brochure is now at the printer's and will be ready for distribution in the next two weeks. The brochure is different in design than most promotional. Its development and printing have all been done right here in Ozona.

The brochures are done in a pen and ink style with drawings of the David Crockett statue and other attractions. The brochures will be placed in state parks, ports of entry and other chamber offices. They will also be available at local motels along with a more extensive traveler's packet. The traveler's packet was developed earlier. Both the packet and brochure can be seen at the chamber office very soon.

The Chamber of Commerce's sign located by Interstate 10 east of town will be professionally renovated in the near future. A more visible and descriptive sign is planned. The

town square sign is also going to be renewed and repainted.

Creative ideas will be used to enhance the chamber's office. The changes should make the office more interesting.

Increased traffic is expected through Ozona on the interstate and all highways. The opening of the new Sea World in San Antonio, vacationer travel and the end of school are all reasons for more travelers. The chamber is particularly interested in informing these travelers that Ozona is the perfect place to stay a night or several. Ozona's location is just right for sight-seers on their way to some of the major attractions.

"It's just a matter of getting travelers' attention and telling them Ozona's advantages. We have a great museum, interesting buildings, the Davy Crockett statue, nice tree covered parks, good food, clean rooms and some of the friendliest people in the world," according to Dan Pullen, Ozona Chamber of Commerce president.

Cubettes take first, fourth at district

The 7th grade Cubettes had a field day at the track last weekend as they won eight events en route to scoring 153 points and claiming the district title.

The 8th grade placed fourth overall, winning four events.

Leading the pack in the 7th grade were Myra Sanchez, Hollie Williams, Krystal Cervantez and Carmen Borrego who teamed to win the 400 and 880m relays.

Cervantez also did well individually as she soared to victory in both the triple and long jumps. Borrego claimed the 100m dash while Julie Childress won the high jump.

Tonya Daniels cruised to first place wins in the 300m dash and 100m low hurdles.

Pulling in second placings for the Cubettes were Norma Quiroz in the shot put and Williams in the 200m dash.

Penny Ramirez, Michell Mendoza, Michell Gonzales and Daniels grabbed third place in the 1200 relay. In a solo effort, Mendoza also took third in the 300m dash and sixth in the 100m.

Gonzales' throw in the shot put earned her fourth place while she nabbed fifth place in the discus. Ramirez placed sixth in the 100m low hurdles.

Myra Sanchez paced herself to a

third place finish in the 600m run. She also placed fourth in the long jump and sixth in the shot put.

Claudia Avila and the 800m relay team highlighted the 8th grade Cubettes' efforts at the district meet.

Avila pulled in two first places, winning the long jump and 300m dash. Avila also served on the 800m relay team of Cullen Curry, Tamel West and Susan Pullen, who won the 200m dash.

The same four likewise made up

the 400m relay team that finished second. The 1200m relay team of Haley Carson, Tricia Maldonado, Terrie Willmon and Curry placed sixth overall.

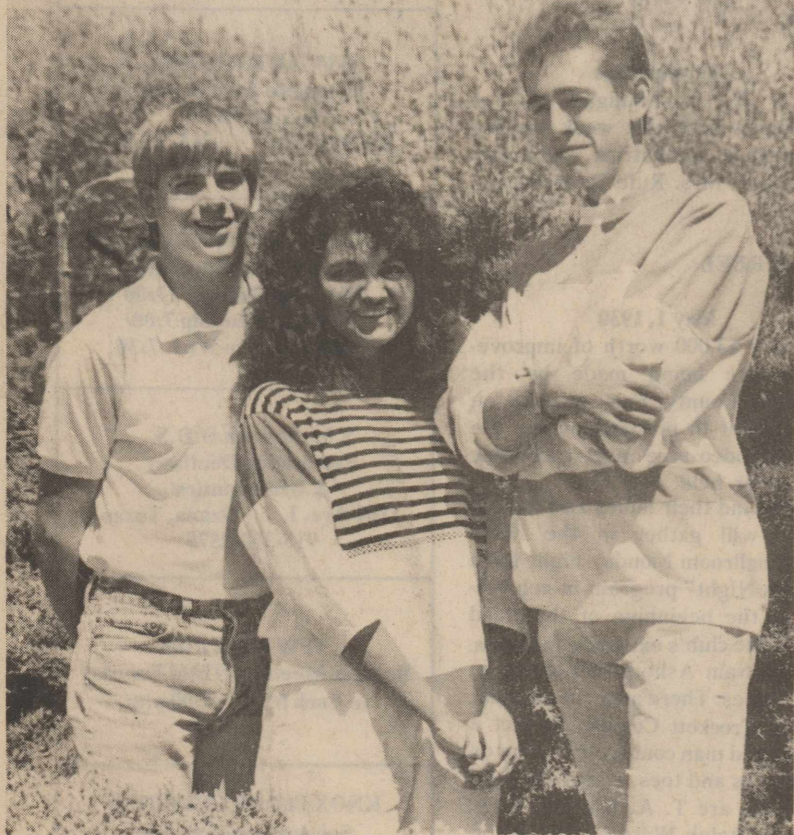
In individual accomplishments, West finished fourth in the 100m dash and fifth in the high jump.

Willmon placed sixth in three events: the 100m dash, 100m low hurdles and discus.

Tricia Hartnett took fifth in the shot put while Carson claimed the same in the 100m low hurdles.

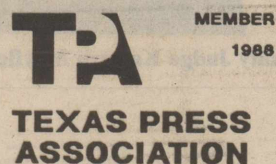

AUSTIN—The night before he quit the campaign trail, Albert Gore made an Austin fundraiser with the Democratic Party power elite who had backed him from early on.

The names read like a list of All-Pros: Bill Hobby, Jess Hay, Buddy Temple, Gib Lewis, even former Gov. Mark White.

For them, the evening was a prop-up for a future race for the 40-year-old Tennessee scion, whom they had recruited and endorsed as their hope for the conservative wing.

Despite the excellent teeth in their heads, they and Gore could bite off no more than a distant third in the primaries.

They were outnumbered, out-hustled, outorganized and overwhelmed in the precincts across America.

Sims aids the wildfire cause

Emergency measures to help with the wildfire situation in West Texas have been approved according to Pleas Childress, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Through the efforts of Sen. Bill Sims, the state highway department has been given permission to grade fire lanes inside the highway right-of-way.

Childress said Tuesday that he has received verbal confirmation of the plan from Sims. "Bill really understands our situation," said Childress.

Local highway department head Winston Koerth had not received notification of the measure as of late Tuesday.

The department has been asked to give more time to grading already established fire lanes outside the right of way. These areas are maintained upon written request by the landowner.

"I only have one blade," said Koerth, whose area of supervision covers some 700 miles within the county.

Gone With The Wind

In quitting, Gore urged the party to return to a centrist position. That will probably not occur.

As the baby boomers and children of the '60s age to a higher notch in America's establishment, they are changing the makeup of both parties, never to be changed back. Gone with the wind.

If the Republicans attract a new breed of white collar voter, the Democrats draw millions of new minority voters.

In Texas, the Hispanic bloc tested the waters first with statewide candidates, and then Jesse Jackson's national litmus for black voters blew Gore and the aristocrats out of the water.

Return to a centrist position? Look instead for the Hispanics to run a national candidate in '92, while Texas blacks field a statewide candidate in '90.

One Last Chance

Some foster the belief that the power elite will have one last chance this year at the national convention, if they can persuade Jackson to let a southern conservative have the VP slot.

Who knows? Stranger things have happened, but the deal is Jackson's to broker, not theirs.

Jackson played by their rules and won the marbles. He ran the gamut of primaries and earned a spot on the ticket. It's his to trade away, and why should he?

Like him or not, anything less

is grand theft.

School Financing

In the lawsuit which pits poor school districts against the Texas Constitution, Attorney General Jim Mattox predicted the state will win.

But he said the court victory is not necessarily the proper victory, and urged the Legislature to remedy the disparity between rich and poor school districts.

Mattox' prediction came after the appeals court directed State District Judge Harley Clark, who ruled the present system unconstitutional, to explain why he gave no consideration to the section that Mattox cites as authorizing the system.

Other Highlights

- A report from Comptroller Bob Bullock said for the first time in Texas history, the state has figured its net worth, at least \$43.8 billion.

- The state approved bonds to build privately-run prisons at Kyle, Bridgeport, Venus and Cleveland which may open within a year.

- The U.S. Census Bureau says Loving County with 100 residents is the nation's smallest in population, but the richest in per capita income, \$34,173. Overall, Texas ranked in the middle.

- A federal-state survey shows Texas farm value this year fell three percent to their lowest levels since 1980, an average value of \$466 per acre.

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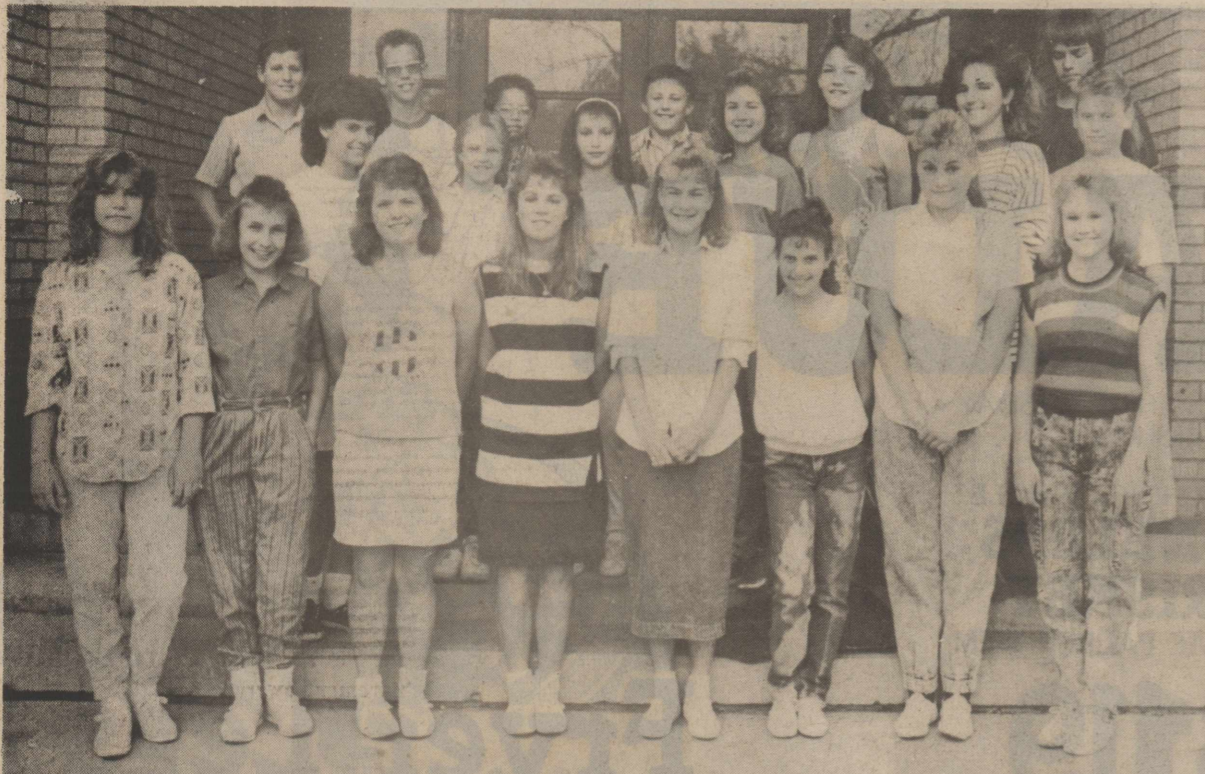

Firemen work overtime

Grass fires in Val Verde, Sutton and Reagan counties occupied Ozona volunteers last weekend. Two trucks were dispatched to the Jake Mayfield and Jarrett ranches in Val Verde Saturday afternoon. Volunteers assisted Comstock and Del Rio firemen 12 hours before returning home.

Two trucks assisted for another 12 hours Sunday after a breakout was reported.

"Ozona volunteers were the first to arrive," said a grateful Mrs. Mayfield Monday. An estimated six sections was burned on the Mayfield ranch according to Mr. Mayfield. The fire, believed to have been caused by lightning, also spread to the Jarrett and West ranches.

An Ozona truck went north Sunday to assist the Big Lake Fire Department with a grass fire north of Stiles. The truck was in service four hours.

Locally, a 7:54 p.m. grass fire at 1206 Ave. G was caused by tree limbs getting into a power line. The fire was out on arrival, but volunteers assisted WTU in cutting limbs away from the lines.

Ozona assisted in Sutton County Sunday and Monday with a large grass fire on the Jack Wardlaw and Atkins ranches.

A total of 111 calls have been answered by the Ozona department thus far this year.
