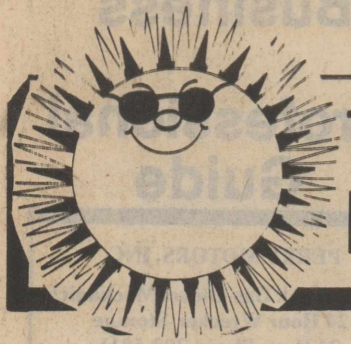

## Board continues plans for rooms conversion

Hospital board members considered converting some hospital rooms to "assisted living" facilities when they met on June 9. After discussion, the board decided to continue with plans to convert rooms to care center use.

Hospital district plans still await word from Sen. Sims' office that Washington has approved the local application, Bill Boswell, administrator, reported.

An estimate from Bob Davee and Morris King for enclosing the ambulance garage was read. Mr. Boswell was asked to get one more bid

for comparison. Boswell presented an estimate of \$24,245 to start up the on-premise laundry. It was decided to delay a decision on this matter until he looked into the possibility of leasing equipment instead of buying.

Financial reports indicated May revenues of \$36,704.74, deposits of \$39,039.48, disbursements of \$80,323.89 for the hospital. Care Center revenues for May were \$46,512.89, deposits were \$44,169.96, disbursements were \$50,626.15.

During the three month period since Dr. Marcus Sims and Dr. Robert Owensby went on contract, Dr. Sims has earned a cumulative total of \$27,178 for the hospital and Dr. Owensby has earned \$23,329 for the hospital.

In addition, Dr. Sims has earned \$21,965 of the \$25,500 guaranteed him for the period, and Dr. Owensby has earned \$4,517 of the \$15,000 guaranteed him.

A bid from a pathology lab in the Dallas area for external lab work was submitted which would save the hospital approximately \$3,000 over the current cost. The board decided to begin giving them some of the business on a trial basis.

The feasibility of offering immunization from Hepatitis B to

hospital employees and members of the EMS at hospital expense of \$118 per head was discussed. Boswell was asked to poll them and see how many would want the program, and to see what other small hospitals are doing in this area.

In other business, the board:

•decided to run a line to the outside of the north end of the hospital to flush rust from the pipes

•learned that an external pacemaker has been ordered to go with the LifePac 8 at a cost of \$500

•requested that a schedule be prepared of criteria for anticipating major repairs and replacement of ambulances

•appointed a budget committee consisting of Don Long, Joe Galvan, Bill Boswell, Jacquie King, Dr. Sims and Dr. Owensby

•learned that the automatic alarm to the fire station from the care center has still not been installed

•decided to offer a contract with travel consideration up to \$1,200 to an R.N. from Alabama who has worked here before

Board members attending the meeting were: Betty Perry, Don Long, Joe Galvan, Pete Maldonado and Jean Read. Others present were: Dr. Marcus Sims, Dr. Robert Owensby, Mrs. Elvira Caldwell, Bill Boswell and Zoe Green.

## Janet Hill sworn in as commissioner

Janet Hill was sworn in as commissioner of Pct. 2 Monday prior to the regular June court meeting. Mrs. Hill accepted the position following the death of her husband, Jerry Hill.

She will be required to run on the November ballot for election to the un-expired term. According to Judge Kathryn Mayfield, choice of a Democratic Party candidate for this un-expired term must be made by party chairman Steve Kenley and precinct chairmen.

Calvary Baptist Church minister Ken Eppler appeared before the court with a petition requesting the court to enact a resolution prohibiting sale of alcoholic beverages by businesses within 300 feet of a church, public school or public hospital.

The petition as presented contained 182 signatures, Eppler said.

After discussion, Jesus Castro moved to pass a resolution setting distances for sales which was seconded by Mrs. Hill. After further discussion, the vote was called with Castro and Hill voting for and Jack Williams and Sostenes DeHoyos voting against. Judge Mayfield broke the tie by voting against establishing such a resolution.

Commissioners voted to levy and collect fees for alcoholic beverage

licenses except a temporary or agent's beer license, issued for premises located within the county. The county may assess a fee equal to one-half the state fee for each license.

The motion was made by Castro and seconded by Hill.

A. L. Van Doren of Midland spoke to commissioners about the Permian Drug Task Force which was established in February to serve a 17 county area. This is the largest drug task force area in the state and is rated in the top three of the Criminal Justice task forces, Van Doren said.

Crockett County has been asked to join the group at a cost of \$400 per year. Commissioners voted to join and accepted the proposed agreement with the amendment that Crockett County officers are not to work on Task Force cases in other counties.

The new grand jury had recommended that the court accept the agreement after no action was taken on the matter last month.

Road supervisor Eddie Moore reported on a three-day landfill seminar he had attended in Austin. Moore stressed that a licensed person will be required to work at landfills within the next three years.

A second possible site for a landfill is being considered by the court. Moore's request for additional

help during paving season was discussed. Commissioners agreed to the hiring of part-time help for 32 hours a week.

Librarian Louise Ledoux brought a plan for a 40'x40' addition to the public library as part of her report. Grant money for the project is out there according to Mrs. Ledoux. The five year project would result in one large room for books, she said.

The Meals on Wheels report given by Mrs. Hill indicated 362 meals served and commodities given out to 161 families in May.

Commissioners voted to approve the release of Crockett County communication equipment on Ingram tower to Huey Ingram. The vote was taken on a motion by Williams seconded by Castro.

The court tabled the agenda item regarding appointment of a county health officer.

Due to the absence of District Attorney J. W. Johnson, agenda items addressing resignation of county attorney, executive session regarding resignation, employment and appointment of county attorney and appointment or hiring of a county attorney until next general election were not discussed.

County Attorney Tom Cameron was out of town Monday and Tuesday and unavailable for comment.

## Girls basketball coach hired

Frank Hughey, with eight years of coaching experience under his belt, has been hired as Ozona High School's new head girl's basketball coach.

"He comes to us as a highly recommended teacher and coach," athletic director and boys' basketball coach John Curry said. "He has a varied coaching background in all

sports. He's enthusiastic about coaching here."

Hughey will also bring his wife, Crystal, and their five-year old daughter, Leigh.

## No more sales tax on ranch feed

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week that sales tax will no longer be charged on feed normally eaten by farm and ranch animals that is also used to feed Texas game animals.

"It doesn't make sense to tax feed that farmers and ranchers use to support the native wildlife population when other farm animals get to eat the same stuff tax-free," Bullock said.

Bullock said removal of the sales tax on hay, corn, oats and other feeds that can be eaten by deer, turkey and other wild animals will promote progressive wildlife and conservation practices.

According to Bullock, Texas farmers and ranchers who lease hunting acreage will benefit by being able to provide supplemental feed during drought conditions or when animal habitats have been reduced.

Land owners will find it easier to buy feed under the proposed rule, since they will no longer have to declare the type and location of the animal eating the feed.

"We've have some confusing situations because of the current rule--for example, corn bought to feed deer is taxable, but corn bought to feed cows isn't," Bullock said.

Feed for domestic farm animals and work animals will remain exempt from the state sales tax, but feed bought for pets such as cats and dogs is still taxable, he added.

## Fire calls

Volunteer firemen answered a call June 7 to 210 Ave. K where a floor cleaning solvent had flashed from the water heater pilot. The fire was out when volunteers arrived.

A lumber and grass fire at the Laredo Street home of Danny Ramirez resulted in damage to siding at the home. Firemen used 100 gallons of water to put out the 7:14 p.m. fire.

A 2:16 a.m. grass fire at the Shell Station on Hwy. 163 June 9 required 50 gallons of water.

## His and Hers

### His

A recent letter from David Garver of Mesquite was written tongue in cheek, but we're not sure but what David has something. Along with his letter about the possibility of local ranchers harvesting mesquite and making some money at the same time, Garver sent an article from the May 1988 Health magazine revealing that a USDA chemist, Robert Becker, PhD, has extracted a sweet-tasting, high-protein flour from the pods of the mesquite tree.

According to Becker, mesquite flour is already an ingredient in sweet snack foods in Mexico. Chips and crackers containing it have been rated favorably in USDA tests.

The flour will not rise when baked, so has to be mixed with other flours.

The chemist has also helped develop a mesquite gum thickener for use in pudding, ice cream and other foods. Tests indicate it is a better thickener than the guar gum now used by most manufacturers of these products.

The next problem is efficient harvesting of the pods.

Those of us who have looked upon the lowly mesquite bean as livestock feed during droughts may have at our feet a supplement to help feed the world.

## Three California men arrested with 7 lbs. 13 ounces of cocaine

\$350,000 street value . . . . .

The discovery of a substance believed to be cocaine in a car at Pecos River Crossing resulted in the arrest of three California men Tuesday. Street value of the seven pounds, 13 ounces is estimated at \$350,000 by DPS officials if it is cocaine.

The cache was found in an inflated spare tire in the trunk of a rental car after Troopers Troy Hogue and Jess Malone of Iraan obtained written consent to a search.

The suspects, three black males ages 23, 24 and 27, were en route from Los Angeles to New Orleans.

Also seized at the time of the arrest was \$688 in currency.

Following their arrest by Hogue, the men were transported to Crockett County Jail.

Judge Christine Davee set bail at \$100,000.00 each.

A 31-year-old Junction man was arrested here June 7 by THP on outstanding traffic warrants. He laid out his fine and was transferred to Corpus Christi where he was also wanted.

On June 9 a 39-year-old Ozona woman was arrested by sheriff's deputies on a charge of public

intoxication. She was released the next day after paying her fine.

A 20-year-old Ozona man was arrested by sheriff's deputies on charges of terroristic threats June 10. He was later released after posting bond.

A 40-year-old Ozona man arrested June 12 by sheriff's deputies on charges of public intoxication laid out his fine in county jail.

Sheriff's deputies investigated an attempted burglary at a 14th Street business June 7. The screen was pulled off and an attempt was made to open the window. No entry was gained and no property was stolen.

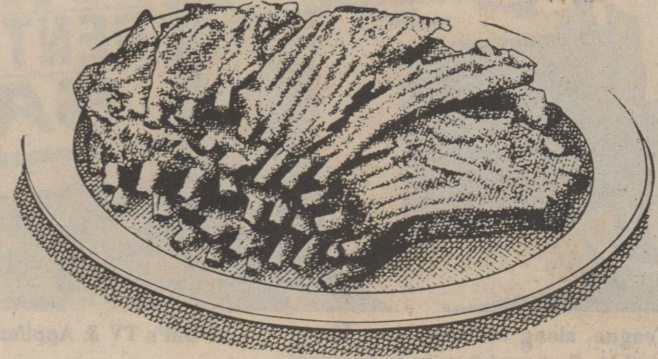

### Ross sweeps

#### Hamanaka Comp.

Ross has received previous Hamanaka honors with the top adult mohair in 1981 and 1982 and the top kid mohair entry in 1987.

In the adult hair competition, C. P. Kothmann and Pat Zirax of Mason placed second. Kothmann had also won in 1983. Wittenburg Co. of Rocksprings placed third. Forked Lightning Ranch of Menard fourth and Ruth Shurley of Sonora fifth.

GHH Ranch of Uvalde placed second in kid mohair competition. Mary Ross of Sonora was third, Bill and Sue Whitworth of Sisterdale fourth and Ruth Shurley of Sonora fifth.

Bob Childress of Ozona placed 18th in the adult mohair division and eighth in the kid hair division.

Other Ozonans placing in the kid hair division were: Gene Perry, 15; and Jeffrey Sutton, 19.

The contest is conducted annually by Hamanaka Co. Ltd. of Kyoto, Japan with the Mohair Council of American and The Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Assn. handling contest details. The event originated to improve acceptance of U.S. mohair in the world market and encourage producers to select and breed better Angora goats and prepare the fiber better.

There were 20 adult mohair entries and 24 kid mohair entries this year.

**Fishing laws**

School's out, vacation time's here, and folks will be hitting the rivers and lakes for some serious fishing. There's been a lot of fishermen lately that seem a bit confused about fishing regulations, probably because of the proposed changes that will take effect on September 1. To avoid mistakes arising from this confusion, I'll make an attempt to straighten things out by reviewing current laws regarding freshwater fishing.

Let's start with licensing requirements. Anyone fishing in the public waters of this state, including Lake Amistad, the San Angelo area lakes, and the Pecos and Devils Rivers, must have on his person a valid and current Texas fishing license. The only exceptions are those Texas residents under the age of 17, or 65 or over. Anyone in this age class will need only something showing their age, like a driver's license or ID card. And while we're on the subject, be sure your license is not expired. All licenses expire on Aug. 31 following the date of issuance, so if you got your license since Sept. 1, 1987, it's still good for the rest of the summer. If in doubt, check the expiration date on the license. If you have a current combination hunting and fishing license, you're covered.

Size limits are still the same as last year. Largemouth bass must be 14 inches, smallmouth ten inches, and all catfish a minimum of nine inches. At present, there is no size limit on white bass or stripers. The length is measured from the tip of the tail in a straight line to the tip of the lower jaw with the mouth closed. A pre-measured mark on the side of the boat or a piece of tape on your fishing rod will keep you from having to pack around a cumbersome tape measure. Bear in mind that there are some lakes in the state that have "slot" limits, so check for special regulations at the local level before wetting a line in strange waters.

Daily bag and possession limits are the same as last summer. The daily limit on largemouth, smallmouth, Guadalupe and spotted bass is five in the aggregate (meaning combined total). Possession limit on bass is 10, and this refers to what each fisherman can have in his possession after actually fishing for at least two days. If an all-night foray began before midnight and went into the next day, you could still only have one daily limit on your boat or hanging on your stringer.

The limit on stripers is five per day, and there's still no limit on white bass. The catfish limit is 25 for channels and in the aggregate, with double in possession. Flatheadcatfish, or yellows, or Opal, you want to call bag and possession limits of five and 10 per person.

Since it would be impossible to accurately measure the length of a filleted fish, it's illegal to fillet fish and have those fillets in your possession while fishing or on board a boat on the water. Once you've finally "landed" your catch and are ready to go home, you can cut 'em up before heading home (but like las, summer, they taste better when the cook cleans 'em).

Trotline laws are relatively unchanged, but some folks are still not tagging the line on both ends with the name and address of the owner and the date it was set out. Any untagged or outdated or otherwise illegal trotline will be removed by the game warden who finds it. There's still a maximum of 50 hooks per line with stagings at least three

feet apart, and no fisherman is allowed more than 100 hooks at a time.

Now I'm going to get brave and briefly discuss some of the new fishing regulations that will take effect on Sept. 1. I say "brave" because there will no doubt be some who'll insist that these new laws are in effect now, but I'm confident that the majority of Crockett County folks will have the intelligence to know the difference between future laws and present laws.

The proposed changes were presented to the public and comments taken at public hearings across the state in April. On May 12, the Parks and Wildlife Commission met and passed some of those proposals, over-ruled some, and tabled some for further study.

The 14 inch limit on largemouth bass was extended to state-wide status (except for those lakes with special slot limits, and some of those were changed, too), and smallmouth, Guadalupe and spotted bass were changed from ten to 14 inches.

Starting in September, white bass will have to be at least ten inches to go on the stringer and the daily limit per fisherman will be 25. This will hopefully allow more fish to reach spawning size, and it should help to get the numbers of whites back to where they were years ago. Also, the minimum length of stripers will go to 18 inches.

The proposal to increase the minimum size on catfish was tabled for further study, so till we hear different, catfish still only have to be nine inches long.

Trotlines will have to be redated every 30 days, instead of the 90 day period like it is now. The maximum mainline length of a trotline will be 600 feet, but that shouldn't cramp anyone's style since the legal number of hooks will still be 50 per line. There will be some restrictions as to where a trotline can be placed, like not in the city limits or within a state park, but the only place that will affect most of us is in some of the San Angelo area lakes.

Licensing requirements will remain basically unchanged.

This is by no means all of the new laws to come, but they're the ones that will be of most interest to fishermen in this area, and it'll give you and your fishing partner something to kick around while you're waiting for the wind to stop blowing. And remember, these changes don't go into effect until September.

**Hunter Education Camp held in Crockett County**

A group of Crockett County youths spent a very busy weekend attending the Texas Hunter Education Camp held on the Perry Ranch June 10-12. The camp was a project of the Texas Game Warden Association, in keeping with the association's goal of educating the youth Texas in outdoor skills, and was offered in conjunction with the Crockett County 4-H Field and Stream Program. The Texas Hunter Education Course, taught by certified instructors of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, is a nationally recognized course which was mandated this year by the Texas legislature.

The weekend began Friday morning with instruction in the various types of hunting firearms, followed by an afternoon at the firing range with .22 rifles and handguns, .243 scoped rifles, and shotguns. Darkness didn't bring any end to the training, as films and videos ran into the nights throughout the weekend.

Saturday morning was devoted to learning about wildlife management. Biologist Technician Mary Haecker presented concepts and principles of wildlife science, followed by a range tour to teach hunters to recognize preferred wildlife browse and forbs. The rest of the day was used by retired Air Force Colonel Tom Behr to teach wilderness survival. The students were instructed in proper clothing, procurement of food and water, and basic equipment one would need if found unexpectedly in a survival situation. The young outdoorsmen were shown how to produce water in arid regions and how to build a shelter from materials at hand when necessary for survival.

Sunday started with a devotional by camp director Rod Chalmers, giving thanks to The One who gave us the great outdoors. EMT and Ozona Fire Department personnel, under the supervision of Doris Haire, gave hands-on instruction in 'hunter' first-aid. Doug Meador gave a program on poisonous and non-poisonous snakes, with information about snakebite treatment. Randy Wilson, assisted by Martin Childress, gave a class on bowhunting and archery equipment, and Dennis Clark and Ples Childress III intro-

duced the students to muzzleloading arms and let each one shoot the 'smoke-poles'. Campers were taught Texas game laws by Game Wardens Rod Chalmers and Don Jackson, with emphasis on the purpose of laws in the conservation scheme.

The course was capped off with a final examination and barbecue, and 12 very tired youngsters left the camp, a bit more ready for a safer and more enjoyable lifetime in the outdoors.

Attending the course were Tess Worthington, Robert Gentry, John Foley, Jeanie Cooper, Randal Wilson, Jimmy McCary, Trey Harris, Bryan Hensley, Cassie Montgomery, Bonnie Martin, Martha Mayfield, Dana Jackson and Keith Sessom.

Sponsors for the event were J. Cleo Thompson, Joe Tobar, Texas Game Warden Association, Pon Seahorn, South Texas Lumber Co., Wool Growers, Ozona Gun Club, and last but certainly not least, Gene and Betty Perry, who so graciously

allowed the use of their ranch and facilities for this worthwhile project.

Audio-visual equipment was provided by the Crockett County School District and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. In addition to those already mentioned, adult instructors included Bob Harris, Vance Worthington and Brent Pool. Special thanks go to Shane Cooper and John Williams, who served as junior instructors. Crockett County Sheriff's Deputies Harvey Hill and Fred Fierro, assisted by Shane Fenton, handled the monumental task of meal preparation, and they did their

usual bang-up good job in that department.

Plans are, at present, to make this community project an annual affair.

## Fly management for Texas horsemen

Horse owners with stabled animals are faced with the annual battle to keep house and stable flies under control. County Extension Agent Billy Reagor suggests several management strategies to help reduce fly numbers and the most economical means of control once infestations exceed acceptable levels.

The first items of achieving manageable fly control is to practice good sanitation and keep stable areas as dry as possible. Spilled feed, moist hay and animal manure are the prime breeding sites for fly development. The absence of a good sanitation program will quickly lead to abundant fly populations demanding frequent and expensive insecticide applications. The trash pile of collected garbage material should be hauled off weekly. Manure and bedding material left for periods of six to seven days can be a major source of fly infestations. Biodegradable manure should be spread thinly in field areas so that it can be sun dried or plowed under. Reagor cautions the horse owner to prevent suites of abundant fly breeding which can result in fly problems for the surrounding neighborhood. A chemical treatment for larval control for fly breeding areas is trichlorfon and sold as Dipterex. The presence of adult flies is a fact of life in Texas during warmer months.

The second major control strategy for flies is to maintain several types of devices to kill incoming adult flies. These devices include well maintained bait stations and fly traps. The bait stations contain a sugar bait which contains an insecticide. Dead flies killed by the insecticide should be removed and destroyed daily. Keep ample supplies of fresh bait to maximize effectiveness. Golden Malrin bait containing methomyl is the most common bait material sold in

most areas of the state. A new fly trap sold under the trade name of the "Terminator Fly Trap" has proven to work well under Texas conditions. A water and fly pheromone (chemical attractant) mixture is used to attract flies into the trap to be killed. This is a nontoxic method of enhancing fly control for the horse owner. Dead flies must be cleaned out of the trap on a weekly basis. New attractant material must be added in the trap following cleaning. Both the fly bait and fly trap must be kept out of reach of horses and pets. Read and follow label directions carefully.

The judicious and timely use of selected insecticides are of major importance to Texas horse owners as residual wall treatments or direct animal sprays. Owners who attempt to depend on insecticide treatments alone and not follow other control measures discussed above will be disappointed in their fly control program. A wide range of insecticide formulations are on the market for the horse owner. Residual sprays containing one of the synthetic pyrethroids, fenvalerate or permethrin have proven extremely effective. Residual control action is good for these insecticides if treated areas are dry and dust is not abundant. Direct animal spray treatments are of critical importance. The horses' skin can be sensitive to various insecticides. Extreme care must be taken to follow label directions. Plant derived pyrethrins plus a synergist, selected pyrethroids, some phosphate insecticides and phosphate mixtures are labeled for horse treatments. Reagor emphasized care must be taken to follow pesticide safety directions for the person applying the insecticide and the treated animal. The choice of the selected insecticide will depend on costs, past application, experience and abundance of the fly problem.

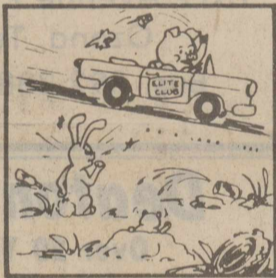

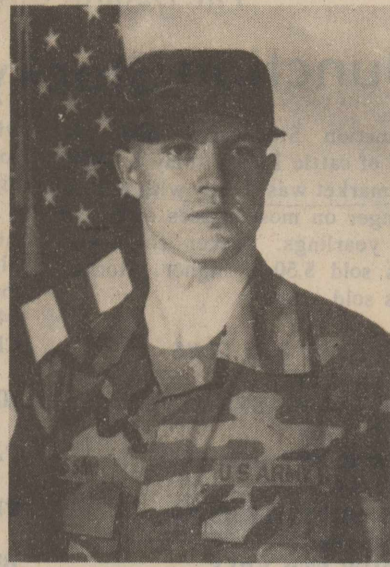
### Sessom airbourne

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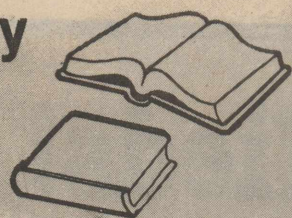
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## Crockett County Public Library

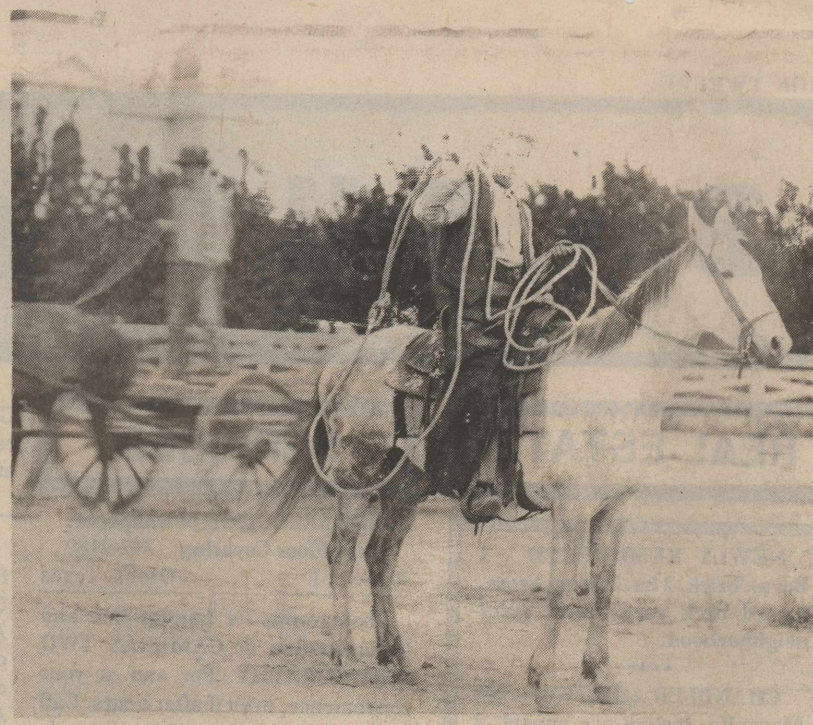

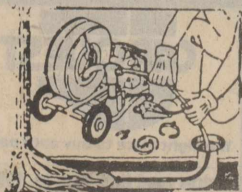
