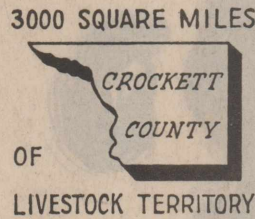

## Commissioners have short meeting

Commissioners voted Monday to have the 1989 budget typed in preparation for final approval. The budget should be approved and a tax rate set at the September meeting of the court.

Total estimated revenues and expenditures amount to \$4,850,474 with the proposed tax rate at .54 per \$100 valuation for the general fund, .01 for the road and bridge special fund and .045 for the farm to market road fund totaling .595 per \$100 valuation.

Fuel bids were examined and House Fuel Company selected as low bidder. Other firms submitting bids were Sonora-Ozona Oil and Shelton Oil and Gas.

Dan Pullen, president of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, asked the court to approve an order for four

picnic tables with benches for the park on the square. The equipment will be purchased through the Parks and Wildlife Department and must be ordered by a government entity, Pullen said.

The court approved the equipment with cost to be reimbursed to the county by the chamber. Lids will be placed on garbage cans in the park by the chamber, Pullen said.

A request for office space from the Texas Department of Human Resources for food stamp and Aid For Dependent Children distribution was approved by the court. The exact location for an office was not determined, but the court agreed space could be found. The measure was approved with the stipulation that there be no added cost to the county.

The food stamp program has an average of 421 participants in Crockett County, said Judge Kathryn Mayfield. There is an average of 36 families eligible for AFDC each month.

TDHR will hire a local person to screen applicants, Mayfield said.

Judge Mayfield asked the court for a directive regarding a public hearing on the amine gas sweetening plant planned by S.P.G. It was agreed that a recent public meeting to discuss the plant had allayed fears of odor and corrosiveness from the gas and that no formal hearing is needed.

Dr. Robert Owensby requested an explanation as to why his contract as county health officer was not re-

These two emergency programs are only implemented in times of disaster. Already tentatively approved, the fence program will deal with 100 miles of damage.

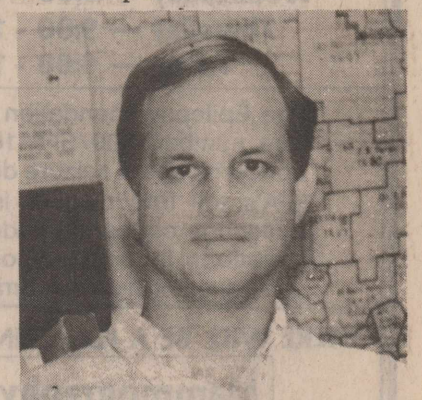
Schwertner's job as executive director ranges from managing offices in Crockett and Sutton Counties to doing field work. Crockett is the headquarters county for the two offices, but time is shared as needed - ideally on a half and half basis, Schwertner said.

"I am impressed with both offices," said Schwertner.

The main programs in this area are wool and mohair and agricultural conservation. The larger A.S.C.S. offices are situated in farming areas according to Schwertner.

"I look forward to producers coming by the office," said Schwertner, who is interested in increasing the participation of growers in the Crockett County A.S.C.S. programs.

Herb Schwertner and his wife, Diane Clary Schwertner, graduated from Wall High School. He holds a master's degree in agricultural education from Texas A&M, and Mrs. Schwertner is a nurse with a bachelor of science degree in nursing from Mary Hardin Baylor in Belton. The Schwertners come to Ozona from Temple.

Willis made her home in Coleman until the last few years when she made her home with her daughter Jeannetta in Houston.

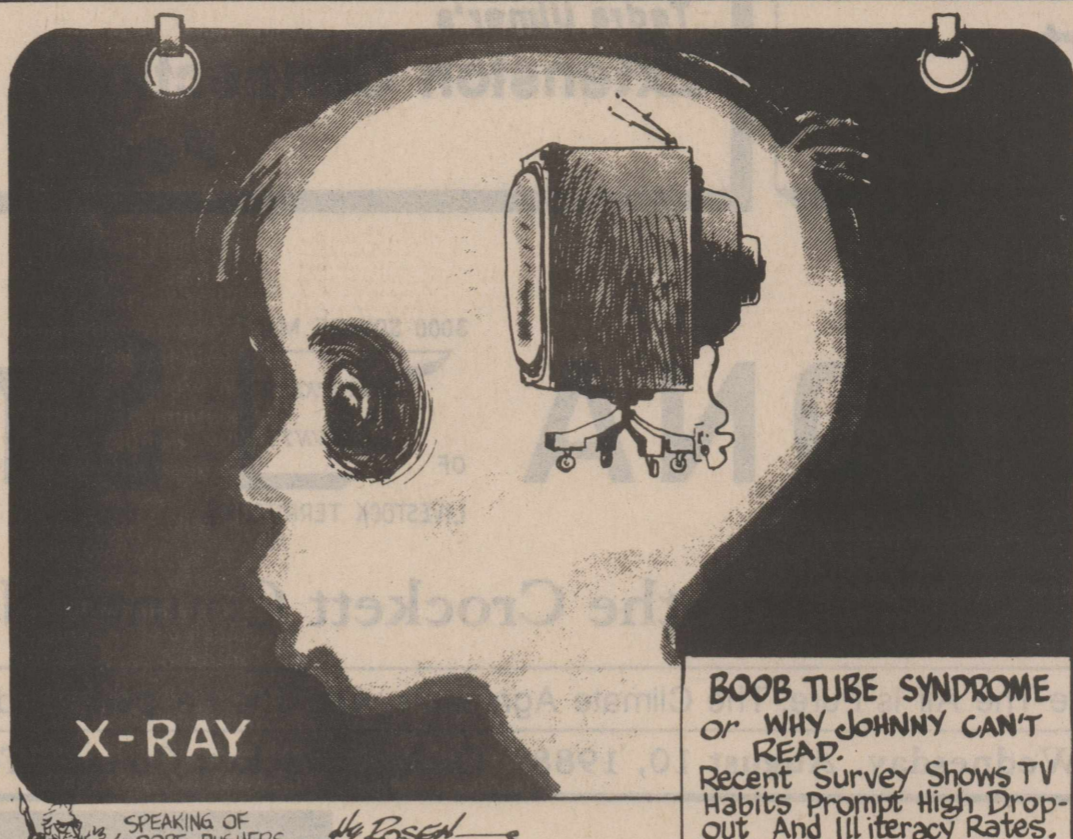

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—With the redistricting session for lawmakers just three years away, and with a Texan on the top of each ticket, the Capitol is not a safe place for the faint-hearted this summer.

Both parties are pulling out all stops, enough to make even the most jaded lobbyists look for shade from the heat to choose one side or the other.

In Texas, the Bush and Bentsen fundraising machines are at full steam, and the pressure is on contributors to guess early, guess publicly and guess right. The message seems to be: abandon hope, all ye who prefer the middle ground.

All signs indicate the 1988 election, at least in Texas, will indeed be a killer hurricane of a battle.

### Bush, Dukakis

Texas Republicans last week prepared to host their party's national convention in Houston, while the Dukakis Democrats tried to make peace with Hispanics angry at him for "snubbing" their Corpus Christi convention.

Some politicians are predicting George Bush will seek Hispanic votes at the convention with an eloquent bid that will surprise fellow Republicans as much as skeptical Democrats.

Former Congressman Tom Loeffler, now on Bush's foreign policy panel, quipped "Dukakis has two tools in his foreign policy program: a tall pole and a white flag."

In preparation, the GOP effort to win more congressional seats took state Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, and state Rep. Ashley Smith, R-Houston, to a White House strategy lunch with President Reagan.

### Official Statements

Meanwhile, state officials jockeyed to make themselves heard above the presidential campaign din:

■ Comptroller Bob Bullock told English-only advocates he decided in 1975 to print state publications in Spanish because a lot of taxpayers don't speak English and if they don't understand their responsibilities under the tax laws, the state will lose revenue.

When asked by what authority his office prints tax material in Spanish, Bullock told the group "under the authority conferred by common sense."

■ Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, who loves to goad big food processors and retailers, provoked adamant denials from their number by alleging they were profiteering from the drought.

■ Attorney General Jim Mattox wants \$6.5 million in child support collections returned to his office by the Human Resources agency, which he says it can't legally spend anyway.

■ Supreme Court Justice Franklin Spears said he would announce by Aug. 15 whether he will leave the bench for private practice.

### Minority U.S. Senator?

Texas could be just a few short months away from electing its first minority U.S. Senator in the special election that would be called to replace Lloyd Bentsen, if he goes to the White House.

Some astute political observers say it doesn't take too much imagination to realize this is a distinct possibility.

A runoff election would be between the two top vote getters, regardless of party affiliation, and, if the field is as crowded as it was in 1961, an undiluted black and Hispanic vote could fix their candidates as the two stars.

Houston Congressman Mickey Leland, a black, has already announced his intention to run, and San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros' wife has mentioned the mayor as a possible candidate.

### No Criminal Wrongdoing

The Public Integrity Unit of the Travis County district attorney's office reported finding "no proof of criminal wrongdoing" in its investigation of allegations that state Sen. Richard Anderson, D-Marshall, misused state telephones.

Noting that Anderson cooperated with investigators, an official said there was no evidence Anderson or members of his staff intended to defraud the state by using Senate telephones and credit

cards to aid his re-election campaign.

### Other Highlights

• Former Congresswoman Barbara Jordan is recovering from a near drowning after she lost consciousness in her swimming pool last week.

Jordan, who dazzled the nation during the Watergate probe, brought back that old thrill with her address to the Democratic National Convention just days before the accident.

• To rebut Gov. Bill Clements' remark that disenfranchised black voters will "go fishin'" on Election Day, the Austin branch of the Jesse Jackson Rainbow Coalition delivered ten cane fishing poles to the governor, who was in a meeting.

Afterwards, Clements told reporters he still predicts many Jackson supporters will vote Republican.

• U.S. Rep. Mac Sweeney, R-Wharton, in a letter to the feds, responded to allegations that he paid former President Gerald Ford for an endorsement, but the contents remained private.

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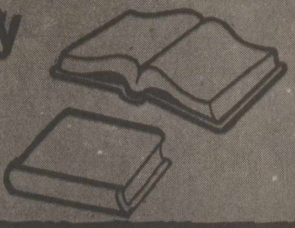

## FROM THE BOOKSHELF

Imagine being pushed to the border of sanity where it and its counter-part cloud together in meaningless form. Where instinct takes over and man turns to animal. Where everything and nothing mean just that.

Now imagine going one step further...over the border.

Dr. Norman Johnson does just that in Michael Crichton's sixth and latest novel, *Sphere*, which recently spent three months on the *New York Times'* best selling hardcover list and has now stepped onto the paperback racks.

Crichton has used timed-suspense previously in his work (*The Andromeda Strain*, *The Great Train Robbery*) but never so perfectly as in *Sphere*. Even the table of contents ring with building uncertainty and climatical sureness.

- THE DEEP 41
- THE MONSTER 155
- THE POWER 243

Hurtled through this abyss of doubt is Norman, a middle-aged professor of psychology, who has been called on by the U.S. government to aid in the investigation of a spaceship discovered beneath the Pacific Ocean.

Before long the team of scientists and government officials board the ship which, they realize, is an American craft of the future that apparently crash-landed three hundred years in the past via time travel. While beneath the waves, the

investigators are abandoned due to a top-side storm that forces the supporting Navy ships to port. It is during this time of solitude in an underwater habitat that the crew wait as, one by one, their number dwindles.

Norman, along with Beth Halpern and Harry Adams (a zoologist and stud mathematician), eventually figure out that the source of their all-too-real fears stems not from the spaceship itself but its cargo, a silver, dull-chrome like sphere of immense proportions. Hidden to their intelligent minds, the sphere plays on each person's furthest, but worst nightmare.

As they all struggle with the giant squid conjured up by one of their nightmares, Norman finds himself alone as he first trusts Beth over Harry, then realizes they both have the "power" of the sphere, and still later, doubts even himself.

So Norman makes a visit to the sphere and finds he already possessed the power to make his imagination reality. Still, his slice of the pie does not keep Beth from sorta accidentally setting off a timed set of explosives, forcing a furious skin-of-the-teeth escape by the three in a cramped deep-sea sub.

But the book's whole is not completed until topside where, with the awesome power in hand, the three, especially Beth, throw the entire scheme for a loop backwards (or forwards, perhaps) into oblivious innocence.

This final scene assures *Sphere* of its best seller status for the paperback list just as it did on the hardcover. After struggling to find that niche where everything clicks, Crichton has finally produced a fine piece to show for his work. Maybe in his next book, he'll take us not only across the border but deeper still.

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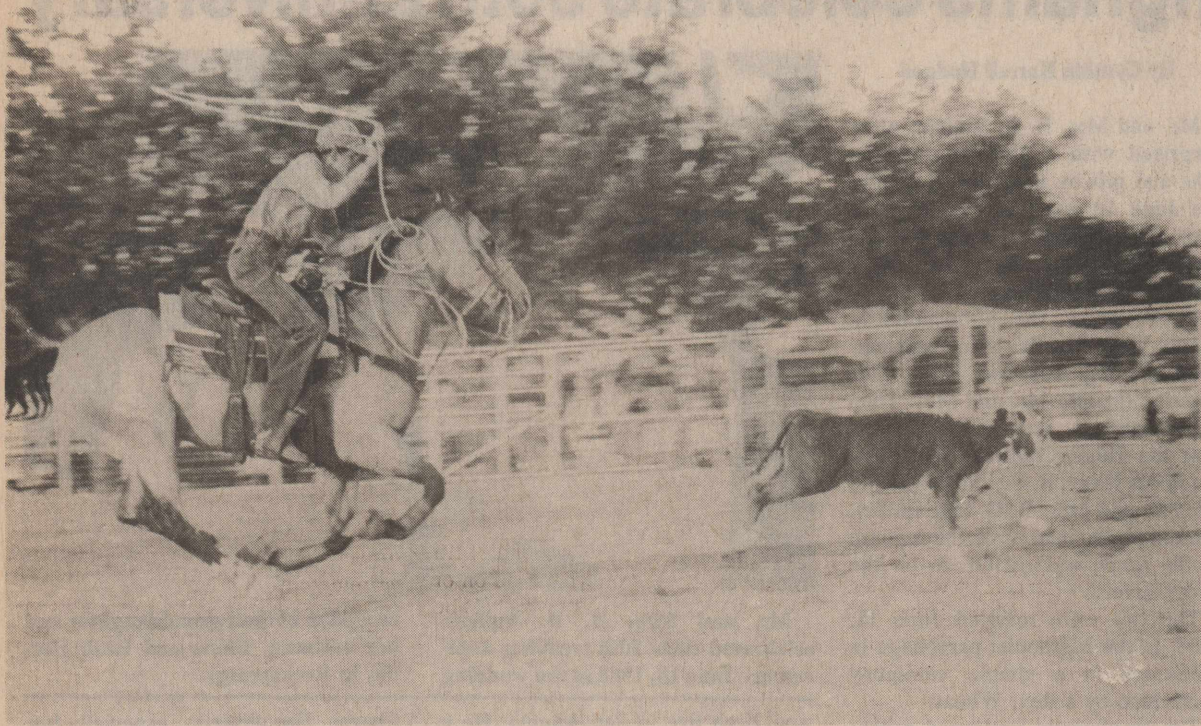

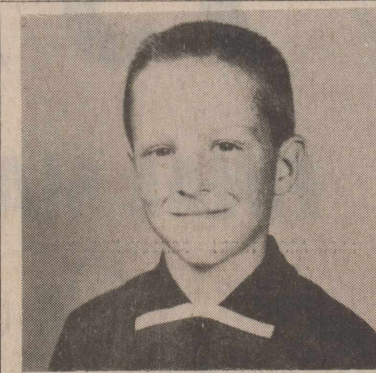

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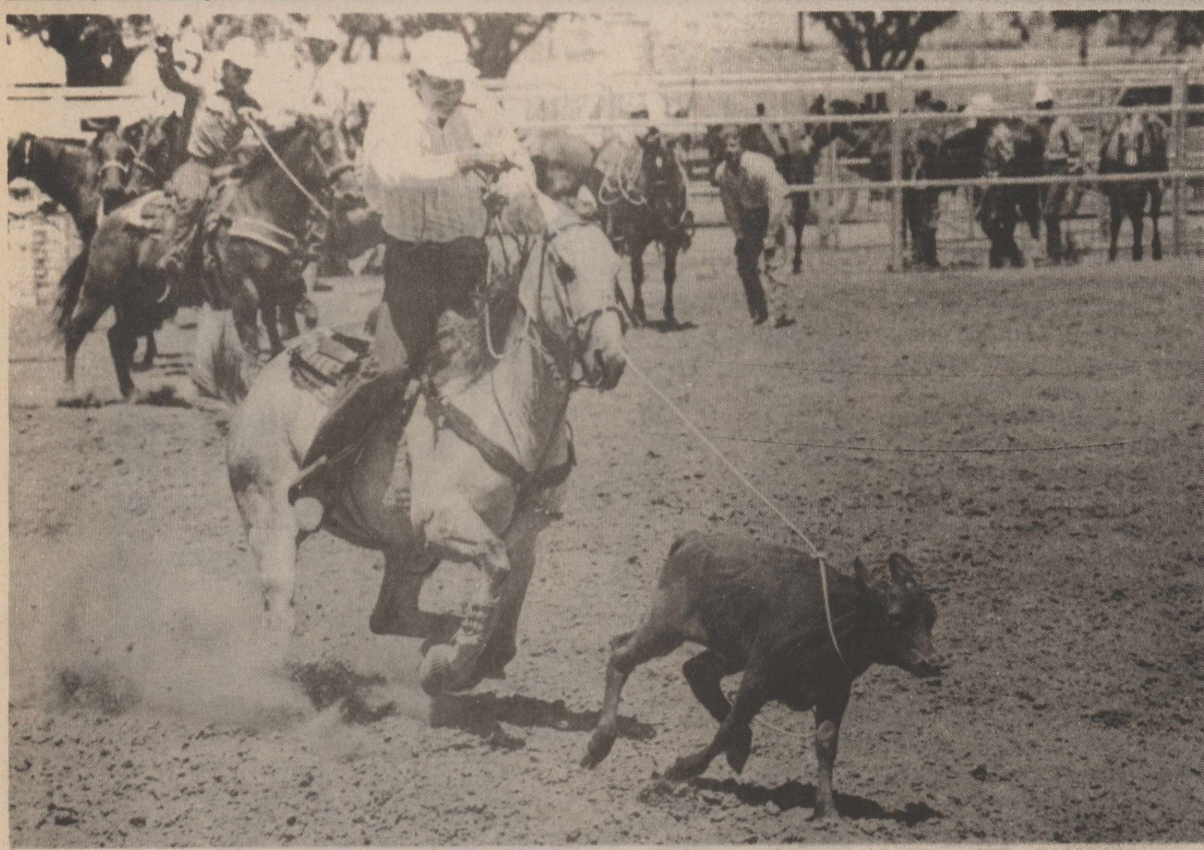

## Registration marks beginning of school year

School officials have announced registration dates for approximately 1,000 students who will be attending Ozona schools this year.

Registration in Ozona High School will begin on Tuesday, August 16. Senior students who are participating in football will register from 2:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m., junior students who are participating in football will register from 3:00 p.m. - 4:00 p.m., sophomore students who are participating in football will register from 4:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m., and freshman students who are participating in football will register from 5:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m.

Senior portraits will be made on Monday and Tuesday, August 22 and 23, and all high school seniors need to contact Mr. Payne, high school principal, or Mr. Probst, high school counselor, as soon as possible for information regarding these portraits. Picture taking will begin at 8:00 a.m. each day.

At Ozona Junior High School, eighth grade students will register on Wednesday, August 17, from 8:00 a.m. until noon, and seventh grade students will register from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. Sixth graders will register on Thursday, August 18, from 8:00 a.m. until noon.

Third grade students in Ozona Intermediate School will register on Wednesday, August 17, from 8:00 a.m. until noon, and fourth grade students will register from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. Wednesday. Fifth grade students will register on Thursday, August 18, from 8:00 a.m. until noon.

Ozona Primary School will register prekindergarten students on Tuesday, August 16, from 8:00 a.m. until noon. First grade students will register on Wednesday, August 17, from 8:00 a.m. until noon, and second grade students will register from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. Wednesday afternoon. Kindergarten students will register on Thursday, August 18, from 8:00 a.m. until noon.

Parents of kindergarten students are reminded that even though their children participated in the screening clinic that was held last April in Ozona Primary School, it will still be necessary to enroll them in kindergarten.

Students enrolling in Ozona Primary School for the first time must bring birth certificates, immunization records, and social security numbers.

### Primary registration

Walter Spiller, principal of Ozona Primary School, announced today that prekindergarten registration will be held on Tuesday, August 16, from 8:00 a.m. until noon. Parents of prekindergarten students will need to bring their child's birth certificate and immunization records with them.

To be eligible for enrollment in the prekindergarten program, a child must be at least four years old on or before September 1, 1988, and (1) be unable to speak and comprehend the English language; or, (2) from a family whose income would qualify them for free or reduced-price lunches.

The prekindergarten program will operate on a half-day basis with separate classes being held in the morning and the afternoon. It will be an intensive language development program and will be taught by Ms. Vicki Gonzales.

Parents who need more information about prekindergarten should call Mr. Walter Spiller at 392-5501 as soon as possible.

### Lunch guidelines

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District has announced income eligibility guidelines for student participation in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program for 1988-89. The income eligibility guidelines are as follows:

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-priced meals.

Application forms for the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program will be distributed during student registration at the district's four schools. Beginning on Monday, August 15, application forms will be available in the principals' office for parents who would like to receive them in advance.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, natural origin, age, sex, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Ozonans teaching at the school this year were Steve Kenley, Fire Prevention II, and Bob Falkner, Communications. This is Kenley's eighth year to teach at the school and the tenth year for Falkner.

There were 2,200 students and 460 instructors at the school according to Falkner. A number of the students were from out-of-state.

## Crockett County gains another producer

The Ozona multipay field of Crockett County gained another Canyon sand gas producer with completion of Ladd Petroleum Corp., Midland, No. 15 C.C. Montgomery, 20 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 10,400,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio at 34,984-1. Gravity of the condensate was 64.9 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,109-288 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 75,000 gallons and 130,000 pounds of sand.

It was drilled to 6,411 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, and plugged back to 6,370 feet.

Location is 2,143 feet from the south and 1,584 feet from the east lines of 1-R-TCRR Survey.

nnewed. Commissioner Jack Williams replied it was a matter of economics with salary and insurance benefits amounting to about \$9,000 a year. The court should have included the duties of county health officer in one of the doctor's contracts, Williams said.

During a hospital and care center report, Bill Boswell stated that records show 481 emergency room and clinic visits during the first six months of 1986, 1,510 during the same period in 1987 and 2,055 during the first six months in 1988.

Commissioners were asked by the hospital board to advertise for bids to enclose the ambulance parking area. Citing the fact that the hospital is expected to end the year \$120,000 over budget, the court voted against advertising for bids for the enclosure.

Board members Betty Perry and Don Long attended court briefly regarding the hospital budget. After being complimented on restraint by the board in not asking for large expenditures for equipment such as an x-ray machine, Long spoke about the safety of the machine the hospital uses.

Stressing the need to get the information to the public, Long said the x-ray machine is "operating at a safe, acceptable level and gives acceptable pictures for our needs".

Adjustments to the machine have cured the problem of scattering particles, Boswell explained.

In other business, the court ap-

proved renewal of bonds for Christine Davee, Shane Fenton and Rhonda Shaw, approved the placing of an interlocal government contract with the McCamey Fire Department in the minutes and learned that Crockett County is one of the few counties in Texas with no state maintained bridges in need of repair.

During a report from Eddie Moore, road supervisor, the court okayed plans to hold a county-wide sale of surplus equipment in the fall.

Civic Center director Garland Young announced plans to purchase a new T.V. and two used pin ball machines from Youth Center funds. A back to school dance is set for Aug. 30.

Margaret Porras has been selected to fill the position of library aide announced Louise Ledoux. Mrs. Ledoux also announced the acquisition of the museum's collections of newspapers by the library.

The Meals on Wheels report given by Commissioner Janet Hill revealed that 240 meals were served in July. Commodities were distributed to 154 families totaling 431 individuals. At the Aug. 18 distribution date, only flour will be available.

In response to a question by Mrs. Hill, Williams stated that the \$5.00 fee not collected by Crockett County on vehicle registrations would net an approximate \$10,000 for the county.

Commissioner Sostenes De Hoyos will attend a Midland workshop this month to learn about applying for grants which could benefit the county.

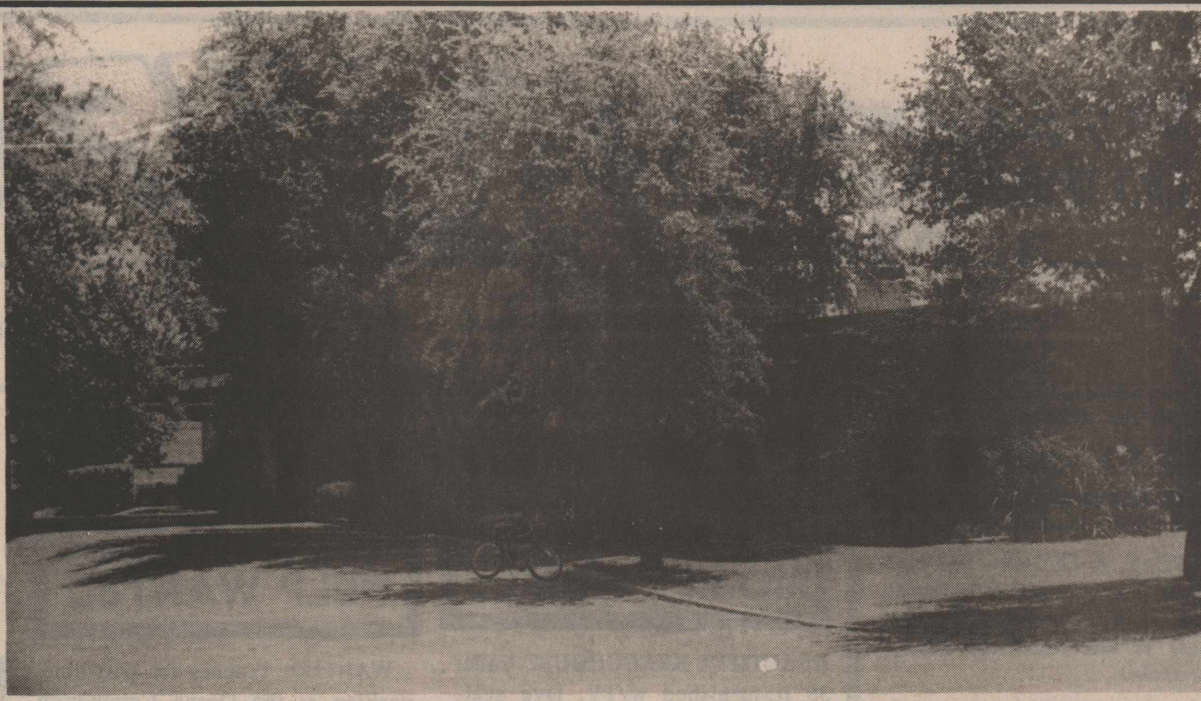

## An Ongoing Feast

"I am the Bread of Life. Come to Me, and you'll never be hungry."  
--John 6:35

There is a deep hunger within all people which can only be satisfied by the presence of the living God. An early Church father named Augustine put it this way: "You have made us for Yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they find rest in You." In the above verse Jesus proclaims Himself as the "Bread of Life".

The food we choose for ourselves will spoil--for it has no lasting value. The forbidden fruit of the Garden still looks good to us, because we think eating it will make us like God. We'd rather choose our own diet, find our own way, make our own rules and live our own lives. But such a meal doesn't sustain us. We're still hungry, undernourished and bound for death. Our hunger cannot be satisfied by fish and bread, steak and potatoes or burgers and fries. It's rooted much deeper than the walls of our tummy. We hunger for the relationship God first established in the Garden, which we destroyed. God has placed this hunger within us, and He has revealed the means by which it'll be satisfied.

Jesus taught us to pray: "Give us this day our daily bread". What do we hunger for? We hunger for forgiveness. The sin and guilt that cling to us can shrivel-up our lives and even paralyze us. To say we have not sin is to play a foolish and deadly game with out eternal future. Cleaning-up our act, accomplishing great deeds, being nice to our spouse and children and doing our best at work and home have not affect on our sin. At best, such works are appreciated by others and temporarily sooth our troubled conscience. But "the soul that sins will surely die" unless it is nourished by the life-giving forgiveness of God. It's when the hunger-pangs of repentance rumble within that we're fed and satisfied with the assurance that forgiveness is ours and are strengthened to rise and walk by the same words Jesus spoke to the paralytic in Matthew 9: "Take heart! Your sins are forgiven".

What do we hunger for? We hunger for fellowship. We desire acceptance and a sense of belonging. To be alone in this world is to be surrounded by fear and terror. Refugee camps, broken homes, runaway teenagers, drug abuse and many similar tragedies are the evidence that our society is "breaking apart". All people--the outcast, the hurting, the unattractive, the poor, the rich, the popular, the successful and the powerful--yearn for a place where they can be accepted and openly received. Aware of our need for a sense of belonging, Jesus calls us to Himself: "Come to Me, and you'll never be hungry". It doesn't matter where we've been, or what we've been up to. Jesus is the Friend of sinners. He identifies with us. He feeds us. He changes us. He gives us a reason to live--being in fellowship with Him, the promised Provider or our innermost desires and needs. He satisfies the hunger for fellowship that no one else can fill.

What do we hunger for? We hunger for a future. So we attempt to build one for ourselves, but the foundation is sinking sand. With our human reason we calculate what we need, and how we'll get it. Our search for a secure future can become a feverish race to accumulate money, material goods and position. Consumed with our pursuit for a good future, we ignore present relationships. Obsessed with financial gain, we lose sight of the real meaning of our work and the precious gifts of family and friends. When we finally get what we so long thought essential, we find that we are neither satisfied or happy. Only God, breaking into our lives in the Person of His Son, can show us our foolishness in such a way that we can place our cares and our future into His loving hands. We hunger for a future, and Jesus Christ offers Himself to us as "the Bread of Life", which will never run out or be found lacking in any way.

Even though we are slowed and weakened by sin and so often only look for what fills our belly, Jesus' presence will lift us up and nourish us. Just as He miraculously fed the

multitudes, so He will also feed us. The location of the feeding has changed, but, as writer to the Hebrews puts it in chapter 13, "Jesus Christ remains the same--yesterday, today and forever". And he promises to feed His people eternally. Once, as He traveled the dusty roads of Samaria, His disciples went into the nearby town to buy food. When they returned and urged Him to eat, Jesus said, "My food is to do what He wants who sent me, and to finish His work". He guaranteed our eternal feeding when He took upon Himself our sin, our pain, our guilt, our hatred, our affliction and all kinds of spiritual hunger. Everything that would crush us, destroy us and plunge us into despair and death was heaped upon Him. And on Calvary's Cross it broke Him. The "Bread of Life" was broken and laid in a tomb. But that Bread didn't mold or decay. Instead, our Lord Jesus Christ, the life-giving Bread, was resurrected on the third day. Sin could not hold Him! Death could not hold Him! Satan could not hold Him! HE IS ALIVE! And He continues to feed the hungry!

Drawn by His love, the hungry gather around the Lord. They gather around His Word, in Worship and Bible study, to be fed. And we ARE fed! We're fed with forgiveness, with fellowship and with the assurance that the ultimate victory is ours. Speaking about An Ongoing Feast in Matthew 22, Jesus gives the invitation and says, "Come...Everything is ready"! So, LET'S EAT! Again today, let's taste the goodness and grace of a Savior whose presence is real, whose love is unconditional and whose acceptance of us will consummate in a heavenly banquet which will never end! May our prayer be: "Lord Jesus, feed me today as You have the multitudes down through the ages. Fill me with Your loving presence and fill my deepest hunger. Amen."
