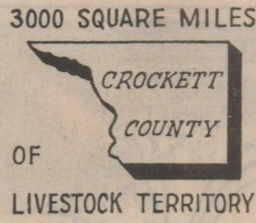

## Post Office inaugurates new Mexican money order system

The United States and Mexico have introduced new procedures for the transmission of postal money orders to Mexico, announces Postmaster Floyd Hokit. These new procedures will provide purchasers of money orders greater control over the transfer of funds. The purchaser will receive the money order and receipt and send the money order to the payee in Mexico. The Mexican Postal Service will not issue money orders payable in the U.S.

The maximum amount that can be sent will be \$500. The fee for any amount up to and including \$500 will be \$3. Money orders will be payable only to a payee in Mexico. If the Mexico address is a box number, it cannot be sent, said Hokit. People having use for this service should start using the new Mexico money order, because in the near future, Mexico will not be cashing the domestic U. S. money order. The Ozona Post Office now has the new Mexico money orders.

## County grand jury indicts six

A Crockett County grand jury handed down six indictments when it met Nov. 21. Indicted were Arturo A. Torres Jr. on a charge of theft in connection with the acceptance of stolen property; George Perteet on a charge of retaliation in connection with threats against jailer Shane Fenton; Adolfo Rodriguez on a charge of burglary of

the Cadillac Cafe; Isamel Reyes Castro on a charge of retaliation by striking Deputy Harvey Hill; Desidero G. Tijerina Jr. on a charge of burglary of the Cadillac Cafe; Paulino Borrego Longoria on a charge of possession of a prohibited weapon. An indictment means that nine of 12 grand jurors believe there is cause for trial.

## Autopsy rules natural death

The Nov. 27 death of Gary Lee Danford near an oil rig in Crockett County has been ruled due to natural causes. An autopsy report indicated that the man had died of heart failure, said Chief Deputy Jim Wilson. Danford was found by co-workers

at a rig seven miles down Miller Lane. The 34-year-old Eldorado man was discovered slumped over the wheel of his pickup truck. Attempts at CPR failed to revive him, and he was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Christine Davee. Danford was employed by State-line Drilling.

## Surveillance yields arrest

An all-day surveillance of a Willow Street residence resulted in the Nov. 25 arrest of an Ozona man on three charges. Richard Jesus Perez was charged with possession of cocaine for purposes of sale, possession of marijuana for purposes of sale and

possession of a stolen vehicle. The vehicle, a 1984 Chevrolet pickup, was reported stolen out of Baytown. Perez remained in Crockett County Jail Tuesday under a total of \$50,000 in bonds. Texas Highway Patrol personnel assisted with the case.

## GTE to increase rates

In accordance with recent Federal Communication Commission action, all single line business and residential telephone customers across the nation, including those served by GTE Southwest, will be subject to an increase in their interstate Subscriber Line Charge from the current \$2.60 per month to a \$3.20 per month. This 60 cent increase in the interstate subscriber line charge is effective Dec. 1 and is the third phase of a federally mandated process that is intended to gradually eliminate the practice of charging customers more for long-distance service in order to keep local rates artificially low. Business customers with more than one line... since May 1984. This interstate subscriber line charge for business customers will not change. Under the Federal Communications Commission plan for implementation of the interstate subscri-

ber line charges, the total revenues of the local telephone companies will not increase since the FCC in turn will reduce by an equivalent amount charges to long-distance carriers for use of local facilities and equipment. It is the intent of the FCC that this decrease in long-distance carriers' expense will be passed through to consumers in the form of reduced interstate long-distance rates. GTE officials said the interstate subscriber line charges are designed to shift from long-distance users to local customers, a larger portion of the actual costs of providing the line from their residence of business to the telephone switching equipment. Depending on the amount of interstate long-distance calling, the reductions for interstate rates could offset the \$3.20 interstate fee for many customers, especially high volume users. The \$3.20 interstate subscriber line charge applies to all residential and single line business customers of all exchange telephone companies providing local exchange service.

## One-vehicle rollover kills man

Luis Avalos Herrera of Mexico was killed in a one vehicle rollover Nov. 22 in Crockett County. The accident occurred when Herrera lost control of his pickup on a curve on Howard Draw Road. The 45-year-old Herrera was thrown from the pickup and then pinned by the vehicle when it overturned. Herrera, of Toman, Coahuila, was pronounced dead at the scene. Game Warden Rod Chalmers was injured Saturday night 8 1/2 miles south of I-10 on Howard Draw Road when he swerved his vehicle to avoid a deer. The washboard surface of the road caused Chalmers' 1988 Dodge RamCharger to veer to the left where it slid along the fence for 30 feet

before overturning one time on the edge of the road. Chalmers received lacerations and injury to his left hand and the left side of his head. He was taken to Crockett County Hospital for treatment by Chief Deputy Jim Wilson who was first on the scene. A deer also caused a Nov. 27 accident on Hwy. 137 22 miles north of Ozona. A 1989 Ford driven by Eleanor Grunwald was struck from behind after she braked and slowed to avoid the deer. Mario Batello of Big Lake was unable to slow in time to avoid hitting the Grunwald vehicle. Mrs. Batello was slightly injured in the accident and minor damage was reported to his T-Bird and the Grunwald car.

## Producers to elect one

Ballots for the COC election were mailed to all producers on Nov. 25, 1988, announces Herb Schwertner of the ASCS office. Nominees are David Bean, Bill Forehand and Mike Womack. "If you did not receive a ballot, we have extras at the office. We urge everyone who receives a ballot to vote," Schwertner said. Voters are asked to read the instructions and to be sure to sign the back of the ballot, otherwise the vote will not be counted. Deadline for returning the ballot is Dec. 5. The Emergency Feed Program is in full swing, and anyone who has not signed up should do so as soon as possible. All feed tickets for the second feeding period are due in the office by Nov. 30. The second period ended Oct. 15 for all producers. "For the third feed period, we will try to have all tickets dated through Dec. 16 paid by the end of December. This will not be easy, so the sooner you bring in your tickets the better," Schwertner said. The feed program will run through March 31,

Last week's revealing of the All-District 6-2A football team gave Ozona top honors along with Reagan County as each team filled nine positions on the roster. The Lions posted five offensive and four defensive members to the first team while two others received honorable mention. Andy Stokes and Oscar Galindo best summed up the general feeling of those honored as "very happy and exciting". Stokes, a junior, was one of four linebackers on the defensive first team. Senior Galindo was recognized for his efforts as receiver along with teammate Robby Tambunga who had 552 yards receiving during the season, almost 300 of that coming in district action. Although not as active in the air as last year, Chris Denman's passing and play execution at the quarterback position earned him that slot on the first team. The junior totaled

1100 yards through the air with some 600 of that during district. Junior Mark Fierro went both ways. In company with Pete Ramirez on the offensive line selections, Fierro also made the defensive line list. Fellow junior Isaac Leal joined him there. Copie Davis, senior, stated his making the defensive secondary first team list as "a good way to end my football career". Defensive secondary honorable mention selection went to George Ybarra. Harvey Dominguez received honorable mention as punter and linebacker. "I was satisfied with it as punter because I knew missing the last game hurt my chances for first team," he said. "I was totally surprised making it as linebacker." "I felt they all deserved it," Coach Don Payne said. "The rest of the district coaches seemed to think so as well. "With six of the guys being juniors, hopefully, it will inspire the guys and fire them up for next year."

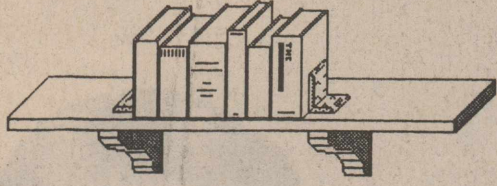

Cussler: Treasure to find

Muslim fanatics, Secret Service men, the lost Library of Alexandria, the world teetering on the brink of chaos. Sound like a fast-paced adventure novel? You bet!

Cussler pulls out all the stops in his latest, calling on what has worked in the past with such works as his ground-breaking Raise the Titanic!

The two things that can never be changed and give Cussler's works their identity have to be, first, his tight, potato-chip like chapters (average length: five pages), and green-eyed Pitt.

This man could easily be called the hero of heroes. More suave and cool than James Bond and stronger than Indiana Jones, this guy even has wits to challenge the resident of 221B Baker Street.

However, Pitt may be Cussler's man-of-the-hour, he does not dominate as the main character; in fact, the other characters play supporting roles. The plot is the key.

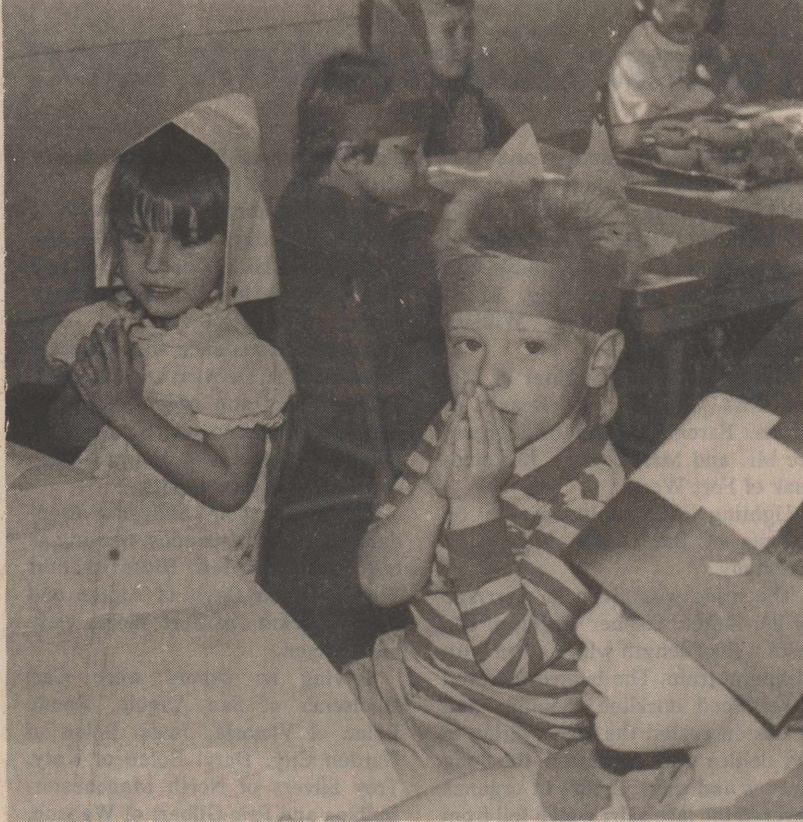
Cussler brings in characters from all over the world, his detailing of assassins, presidents and archaeologists in Treasure far improved over Raise the Titanic's.

Treasure involves the discovery of a Roman sailing vessel off the coast of Greenland, igniting a trail that leads to the famous burning of the Alexandrian Library and a chance that some of its material may have escaped the flames to be hidden in some distant land.

Before the trove can be located, Pitt has to detour his efforts in finding a supposedly vanished hijacked ship and evicting its unwanted crew.

Eventually, Pitt gets back on the lost artifact's trail, using his hero traits to fight off a mass invasion and save his own skin from an assassination attempt.

And at the end, you'll only be able to say, "Whew!"

Taking furbearers requires license

AUSTIN - Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement officials remind hunters and trappers that a Trapper's License is required of all persons hunting furbearing animals, whether for the purpose of sale or not.

Capt. Wayne Chappell said Trappers Licenses cost \$10.75, and may be purchased at TPWD law enforcement offices across the state. Only licensed trappers, retail fur buyers, wholesale fur dealers and furbearing animal propagators may possess furbearing animals or their pelts.

The open season for most furbearers is Dec. 1- Jan. 31, but the season for muskrat is Nov. 15-Mar. 15, and

the nutria season is open all year.

Furbearing animals are badger, beaver, fox, weasel, mink, muskrat, nutria, opossum, otter, raccoon, ring-tailed cat, skunk and civet cat.

For further information on regulations, obtain the department's Furbearing Animal Regulation Digest from license dealers or TPWD offices, or by calling 1-800-792-1112.

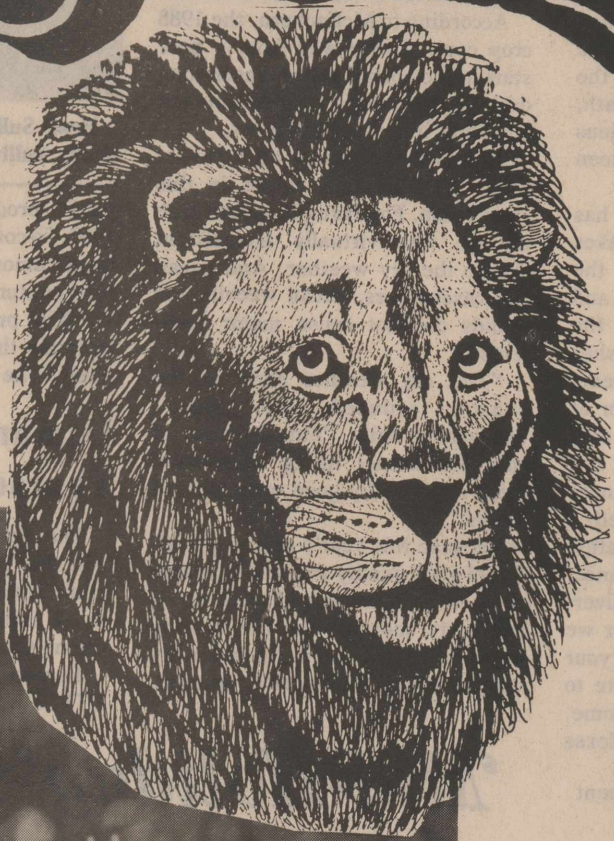

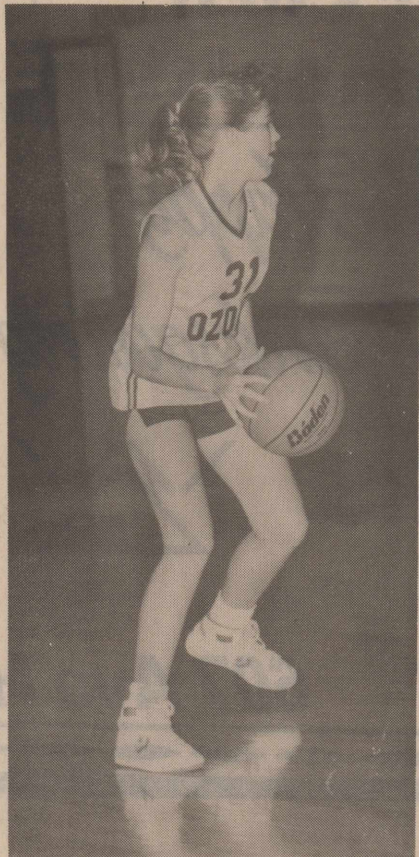

eight minutes, Fort Stockton won 91-77.

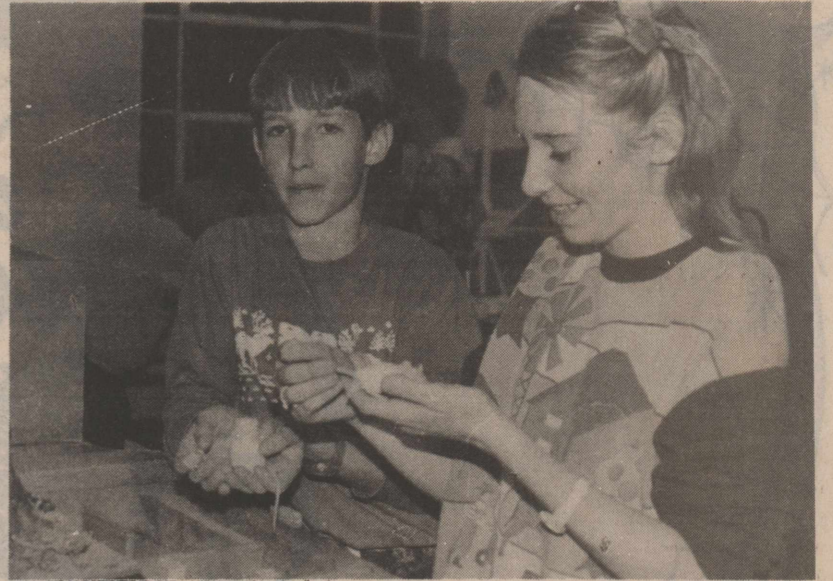
"I think the difference in the game was that they (Fort Stockton) were in better basketball shape than we were," Curry noted.

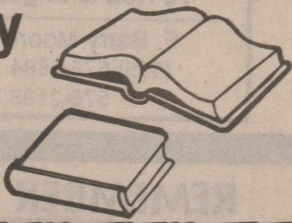
