Post Office inaugurates new Mexican money order system

The United States and Mexico have introduced new procedures for the transmission of postal money orders to Mexico, announces Postmaster Floyd Hokit. These new procedures will provide purchasers of money orders greater control over the transfer of funds.


The purchaser will receive the money order and receipt and send the money order to the payee in Mexico. The Mexican Postal Service will not issue money orders payable in the U.S.

The maximum amount that can be sent will be \$500. The fee for any amount up to and including \$500 will

Money orders will be payable only to a payee in Mexico. If the Mexico address is a box number, it cannot be sent, said Hokit.

People having use for this service should start using the new Mexico money order, because in the near future, Mexico will not be cashing the domestic U. S. money order.

The Ozona Post Office now has the new Mexico money orders.





Herrera, of Toman, Coahuila, was pronounced dead at the scene.

GTE to increase rates

In accordance with recent Federal Communication Commission action, all single line business and residential telephone customers across the nation, including those served by GTE Southwest, will be subject to an increase in their interstate Subscriber Line Charge from the current \$2.60 per month to a \$3.20 per month.

This 60 cent increase in the interstate subscriber line charge is effective Dec. 1 and is the third phase of a federally mandated process that is intended to gradually eliminate the practice of charging customers more for long-distance service in order to keep local rates artificially low.

GTE officials said the interstate subscriber line charges are designed to shift from long-distance users to local customers, a larger portion of the actual costs of providing the line from their residence of business to the telephone switching equipment.

"If you did not receive a ballot, we have extras at the office. We urge everyone who receives a ballot to vote," Schwertner said.



NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODI-FICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

1. Notice is hereby given that North American Weather Consultants, a professional weather consulting company, 3761 South 700 East, Salt Lake City, Utah 84106 intends to file an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State Permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the methods sum-

2. North American Weather Consultants currently holds a Texas Weather Modification license [License No. 85-3] issued on 26 March 1985 and, renewed by the Texas Water Commission on 25 August 1987.

marized below.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall. The objective is to enhance the water resources of the City of San Angelo. The period of the proposed permit is March 1st through November 30th for a four year period beginning in 1989.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the City of San Angelo, P.O. Box 1751, San Angelo, Texas 76902.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in a "target area" in a manner so as to cause the intended effects to occur only within that area. The target area includes all of Irion, Reagan, and Glasscock Counties and portions of Tom Green, Sterling, Coke, Schleicher, Crockett, Upton, and Midland Counties. This area is bounded by the following points: a point on the Martin-Midland County line four miles east of Interstate 20, south to a point on the Upton-Crockett County line four miles west of the Reagan County line, southeast to the City of Ozona, east to the intersection of Sutton-Schleicher-Crockett county lines, east along entire Schleicher-Sutton County line, north along Schleicher-Menard and Tom Green-Concho County lines, west along

Tom Green-Runnels County line. northwest to the intersection of highway 163 with the Sterling-Mitchell County line, west along Sterling-Mitchell and Glasscock-Howard County lines, then west to the starting point.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification program is the target area. All activities of the program will be confined to the target area described above in

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein; a licensed meteorologist will select stratiform or cumuliform clouds for cloud seeding, using a dedicated weather radar display, standard meteorological data, and forecast techniques to direct seeding aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals into cloud tops or into updrafts at cloud base.

9. A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Cussler: Treasure to find

Muslim fanatics, Secret Service men, the lost Library of Alexandria, the world teetering on the brink of chaos. Sound like a fast-paced adventure novel? You bet! And with Clive Cussler wielding the pen and Dirk Pitt the sword, what better way to spend the evening than with the paperback version of the bestselling Treasure in hand.

Cussler pulls out all the stops in his latest, calling on what has worked in the past with such works as his ground-breaking Raise the Titanic! and further successes Deep Six and Cyclops, plus furthering his style with near-perfect pacing and characterization.

The two things that can never be changed and give Cussler's works their identity have to be, first, his tight, potato-chip like chapters (average length: five pages), and green-eyed Pitt.

This man could easily be called the hero of heroes. More suave and cool than James Bond and stronger than Indiana Jones, this guy even has wits to challenge the resident of 221B Baker Street. As special projects director of NUMA (National Underwater and Marine Agency), Pitt spends many of his adventures near or in water. Raise the Titanic! had him at the ocean bottom doing just that, and although the latest novel barely sees Pitt get wet, an efficiently hijacked ocean liner more than compensates.

However, Pitt may be Cussler's man-of-the-hour, he does not dominate as the main character; in fact, the other characters play supporting roles. The plot is the key. The chapters end as cliffhangers, enticing the reader on ("Ammar waited for Pitt to fall. His antagonist, he knew with firm certainty, was dead before striking the ground.") while their shortness encourages one to read just one more.

Cussler brings in characters from all over the world, his detailing of assassins, presidents and archaeologists in Treasure far improved over Raise the Titanic!'s. His tying all these characters and sub-plots together forms a clockwork precision that keeps the action racing.

Treasure involves the discovery of a Roman sailing vessel off the coast of Greenland, igniting a trail that leads to the famous burning of the Alexandrian Library and a chance that some of its material may have escaped the flames to be hidden in some distant land.

Before the trove can be located, Pitt has to detour his efforts in finding a supposedly vanished hijacked ship and evicting its unwanted crew.

Eventually, Pitt gets back on the lost artifact's trail, using his hero traits to fight off a mass invasion and save his own skin from an assassination attempt.

And at the end, you'll only be able to say, "Whew!".



Extension Connection

This week. I promised we'd talk about how to cut calories during the holiday season. Yes, I know you don't have any willpower when faced with your fifth serving of spiced pecans, but you'll have to face the consequences when you can't get into your new Christmas dress or suit!

What are some ways to painlessly cut out some calories? First, take smaller portions of everything. Then, see if you can still see the color of your plate. If you can, you haven't overloaded too badly!

Use a smaller plate (hostesses, take note!) and try not to stand right by the buffet table, or you'll be tempted to take more after you've finished the first batch of goodies. Then, throw away your paper plate or send your china plate back to be washed - before you can fill it up again. And don't get another one!

Opt for foods you know are low-calorie - thinly sliced meats over casseroles, for example, or a meringue cookie (mostly air) over a piece of fudge. You get the picture? Of course, thoughtful hostesses will provide some low-cal nibblers like fresh veggies and a low-fat dip, but you're the one who's responsible for what goes in your mouth.

At dinners, the same basic principles apply as for parties. At home, put away the snacks until you have company - or there might not be any left for the guests! After all, that's who you made them for - right?

When cooking, see if you can cut out calories culprits such as oil, butter and margarine, sugar, cheese - or use a lower-calorie version of the same ingredient. Cook meats such as turkey and lamb in racks so the fat will drip off - and baste with low-fat chicken broth or the broth with fat removed to lessen calories.

Just remember - it can't turn to fat until you eat it!



I would like to donate my body to a medical school for research, but my family would like to have a funeral service held. Can both of our wishes be served? How does one go about

Before a body can be donated to science it must be embalmed. Since that is the case, there is nothing to prevent a traditional, open casket funeral from being held in the church of your choice. Instead of going to the graveside at the conclusion of the service, everyone simply goes home. If you do not wish to have a traditional funeral, a memorial service may be held without the body

If you would like to donate your body to science, it is better to plan for this ahead of time, as requested by our closest medical school, in San Antonio. In order to do this you must request the necessary forms from your local funeral home, or you may write directly to the school:

The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio 7703 Floyd Curl Drive San Antonio, TX 78284-7762 **Attention: Professor Vick Williams** Department of Cellular and Structural Biology

Only part of the expenses are paid by the school receiving the remains. The remaining expenses must be paid by the family. This form of funeral arrangement may be prearranged with the funeral home of your choice, the same as any other funeral arrangement.

In some cases the medical schools will not accept the remains, such as, if the body cannot be embalmed before ten hours have elapsed since the time of death, mutilation of the remains due to the cause of death, death due to suicide, contagious diseases, or if an autopsy has been

After the study of the body has been completed, which usually takes between one and two years, the remains are then cremated and buried by the university. If the family wishes to have the ashes returned to them the arrangements for this must be made before or at the time the body is received. It may not be possible to get them back at a later time. Under no circumstances are uncremated remains returned.

Annual pecan crop tops

While not a bumper harvest, the 1988 Texas pecan crop has the makings of one of the best ever. And that should be good news for con-

"This year's pecan crop should total about 50 million pounds and be of high quality," said Dr. George Ray McEachern, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "That projected yield does not include backyard trees that are not harvested for commercial sale."

According to McEachern, the 1988 crop came a long way from a poor start in the spring and a season-long drought that caused considerable nut shedding in July and August.

However, disease and insect problems were only minor in this year's crop. For example, pecan scab disease was virtually nonexistent due to the dry weather. And pecan nut casebearers, pecan weevils and aphids did not cause major prob-

"The dry weather early in the season reduced nut size," McEachern said, "but, because of this, the kernel filling or percent meat is generally good over most of Texas.'

Because this year's crop is plentiful, of good quality and at a favorable price, consumers should stock up on the tasty morsels for the coming year, said McEachern. Should a dry winter follow this year's drought,




