Driving a Ford Thunderbird, Kelly won the race and brought back a trophy to owner Tom Mitchell.




### **Public Notice**

On March 14, 1989, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an application which proposes to revise its Toll Restriction Tariff in Section 21 of the General Exchange Tariff. The Commission received the application

The application proposes to reduce the monthly rate for Toll Restriction residence service from the current \$15 a month to \$5 a month per residence access line. This proposed application will affect approximately 2,487 residence customers who presently subscribe to toll restriction. It is estimated that the proposed rate schedule will reduce the Company's annual revenues from this service by approximately \$298,000, which is less than one percent of the Company's total intrastate revenues. If the application is approved, the effective date of the rate reduction will be set according to the Commission's Order.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A deadline to file motions to intervene has been set for May 30, 1989. Marguerite Higgins, a war correspondent, received the much coveted Pulitzer Prize for international reporting, for her coverage of the Korean War. It was particularly cold, far below zero, one morning when reporters were gathered with the Marines. The weary soldiers, half frozen, stood by their dirty trucks, eating from tin cans. One huge Marine was eating cold beans with his trench knife. His clothes were as stiff as boards. His face, covered with a heavy beard, was crusted with frost and mud. A correspondent asked him, "If I were God, and could grant you anything you wished, what would you like most?" The Marine stood motion-less for a moment, then, raising his head, he replied, "Give me

Out of the legendary past comes the story of an Eastern monarch, plagued by worries and harassed at every turn, who called his counselors and wise men together. Almost every Texas hunter has by now heard something about the mandatory hunter education program which goes into effect this year. Now, when we say mandatory, we mean law, and when we say law, we mean penalties for violations...if you get the

The message is basically this: it is a requirement that young hunters born between Sept. 2, 1971 and Aug. 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the Texas Hunter Education Course and have a card to prove it, to hunt in Texas. By September of 1990, those born between from '71 through '74 will be effected, and so on until 1993, when anyone born after 9/2/71 must have taken the course. Until 1993, an exemption will be a youngster hunting in the company of (accompanied at all times by) a licensed adult hunter.

The purpose of this program is to assure the future of the sport of hunting by making it as safe as possible through education of the young hunters. The purpose is sure not for raising revenue, because the five dollars charged per person barely covers the cost of processing by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin.

In an attempt to serve the local contingency of hunters and satisfy the legal requirement, Crockett County will hold the Second Annual Texas Hunter Education Camp early this summer. The dates will be June 2-4, and the camp will be hosted again by Gene and Betty Perry at their ranch on Taylor Box Road. Enrollment will be limited to 15, boys and girls, on a first-

During that time, classes and field trips will be held exclusively on the ranch, meals will be served in the "dining room," and sleeping will be done in the bunkhouses...and parents aren't invited! Students will receive instruction in hunter ethics and responsibility, firearms safety, wildlife management, wilderness survival and first aid, and loads of other topics that a hunter needs to know about.

The Texas Game Warden Association has said it would cover all expenses that local donations couldn't, but thanks to the generosity of certain businesses and individuals, that hasn't been a problem in the past for such a cause as this in our community. The TGWA has already provided all the ammunition and equipment, so if the groceries are donated, all the kids will need is \$5 for their handbook, and a bedroll. Oh ... and a swimsuit!

If anyone is interested in taking the course (and hasn't already had it), call the County Agents' office during business hours at 392-2721, or 392-3972 after hours, and we'll keep taking reservations until we have 15. "We had to remember everyone faced the same conditions," McWilliams said. "All the athletes kept their heads and refused to back down and we had a great race."



### Cancer Society says "don't get burned" chez to the state track meet last week

focus of an education/awareness project sponsored this May by the American Cancer Society and the Texas Dermatological Society. Their advice - Don't Get Burned.

Planned and implemented by American Cancer Society volunteers and the state's dermatologists, the project will involve a public awareness campaign throughout the summer as well as free skin cancer screenings in various locations statewide May 20.

The skin cancer awareness project will include public and professional education outreach programs, screening programs and a communications campaign centered on the theme "Don't Get Burned."

Billboards, print ads, and television public service announcements developed for the American Cancer Society as a public service by the Phillips Agency of Fort Worth will promote awareness of skin cancer prevention, risk factors, early detection and warning signals. Materials carry messages like: "Skin Cancer Can Make a Mountain Out of a Molehill," "Working on a Killer Tan?" "Red Necks Can Be Hazardous to Your Health" and "What the Sun Can Do to Your Child is Enough to Make You See Red."

"The goal of this project is to increase public awareness about skin cancer prevention and, as a result, motivate individuals to change their behavior in the interest of skin cancer prevention," said William Ramsdell, M.D., chairman of the American Cancer Society task force planning the project in Texas.

"Some 500,000 new cases of skin cancer will be diagnosed in the United States this year, and a fair share of those will be diagnosed in Texas," he said. "That incidence has been increasing at the rate of three to five percent each year.

"Most alarming, though, is the increased incidence of malignant melanoma," Ramsdell said.

According to the American Cancer Society and the Texas Dermatologial Society, the increasing incidence of cancer could be altered if individuals follow a few simple guidelines for reducing their risk of skin cancer. For example, Texans should:

\*Use a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 during all outdoor activities, and avoid sunburn altogether.

\*Avoid direct exposure to the sun

> \*Avoid tanning salons altogether Fort Worth. because they provide intense exposure to harmful ultraviolet rays.

Public knowledge is an important factor in the prevention and in the early detection of skin cancer, according to Ramsdell. "Individuals can do a lot to decrease their own risk of ever developing skin cancer," he said. "And, like many other forms of cancer, should a skin cancer develop, it is more easily treated and highly curable if it is found and examined by a doctor at an early stage of its devel-

"It is critically important for Texans to know that the consequences of a skin cancer can be quite serious, especially if the cancer is a melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer," Ramsdell said.

Texas State Association of Occupational Health Nurses will assist with the project by scheduling workplace skin cancer education programs. The American Cancer Society also is adapting curriculum materials promoting skin cancer prevention for school children. These materials will be derived from the "Slip, Slap, Slop" campaign originally used in Australia. In addition, the Society has developed a Skin Cancer Program training manual to use in teaching health professionals how to conduct educational programs for the public.






