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Weekend man hunt keeps county officers busy

The Crockett County Sheriff's Department, Texas game wardens, Texas Highway Patrol and deputies from Pecos and Sutton counties were all involved in a man hunt in Crockett County that lasted through Sunday. Helicopters from the Department of Public Safety and a local aircraft piloted by Jim Hearne were later called in to aid in the search for a Houston man who is still at large.

Shortly after 1:00 a.m. Sunday, June 4, sheriff's deputies and Texas Highway patrol officers located a vehicle that was reported stolen out of Monroe, Louisiana which was parked at the truck stop east of town. Officers attempted to stop the car west of Ozona on Interstate 10. The driver, E. J. Harris, Jr. of Houston, let

his companion, Walter Lee Dart of San Antonio, out of the car and sped away from pursuing law enforcement vehicles. The car was finally stopped when the driver spun out at the Howard Draw exit. The driver, Harris, escaped on foot into the pasture north of the interstate. Officers arrested the companion, Walter Lee Dart and placed him in county jail on charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

The area around Howard Draw Exit was surrounded by law enforcement officers, but they failed to apprehend Harris who is wanted in Harris County for kidnapping and sexual assault. At 10:30 a.m., the ground search was called off, and was continued the rest of the day along Interstate 10.

Foreign exchange students to reside in Ozona

Several Ozona families will host foreign exchange students this summer, and more host families are needed. Already scheduled for home-stays here for four week periods in July and August are two students from Germany, two from Japan and one from France.

Maxine and David DeBord, local contacts for The Experiment in International Living, learned about the program through a San Angelo friend, and decided to locate Ozona families to participate.

The Experiment places about 2000 foreign visitors every year in homes across the United States. Some are adults, and many are high school age students. Most are selected by The Experiment offices in their home countries for their motivation, flexibility and interest in living with and learning from an American family. All have studied English.

Hosting does not mean providing a vacation for the visitors, but allowing them to share in the usual family routines.

Participants apply through Experiment national offices around the world. On completion of application papers, applicants are interviewed either by an Experiment national office member or by a volunteer representative.

Part of the application process includes a "Dear Family" letter and photograph to be sent ahead to the host family. Potential host families are required to complete a family description form which is used to help match the interests of the family and the experimenter.

Host families are not legally or financially responsible for experimenters, Mrs. DeBord explained. Each experimenter pays a fee to The Experiment, and all experimenters are covered by health and accident insurance and provide for their own personal expenses. Experimenters are not allowed to purchase or drive any motor vehicle requiring a license while guests in this country.

Founded over 50 years ago, The Experiment in International Living is a private, non-profit organization devoted to citizen exchange, language training and academic degree programs in international education. The Experiment is headquartered in Brattleboro, VT.

Applications for prospective host families may be obtained from David or Maxine DeBord. Applications must be returned no later than June 16 from those desiring summer participants. Call 392-5102 for more information.

Seahorn selected as congressional page

Summer won't be long and dull for Terel Seahorn. The Ozona miss leaves

next week for Washington, D.C. where she will spend a month as a

Terel joins others from all over the United States who will spend part of their summer working as pages in the nation's capital.

"I'm excited," said the Ozona High School senior-to-be. "I loved Washington last summer." Terel visited the city last year while vacationing with friends.

The page program is open only to students who have completed their junior year of high school. Students must be recommended by a senator to be considered for the position.

A dress code for pages includes charcoal gray or black pants or skirts, white blouses or shirts, neckties for both males and females, and in certain parts of the Capitol, a jacket.

"I'm looking forward to meeting a bunch of people," said Terel who will room with two other girls in a dorm two blocks from the Capitol. A 10 p.m. curfew during the week will expand to 12 p.m. on weekends for pages.

Terel is a member of the OHS band and the golf team. She was a member of the 1989 regional qualifying one act play and will be in the flag corps next fall. Terel is a member of Methodist Youth Fellowship and serves on the administrative board at Ozona United Methodist Church.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pon Seahorn.

Perry Hubbard retires after 30 years of firefighting

1989 marks a double retirement for Perry Hubbard. Hubbard turned the reins of Hubbard Body Shop over to son Steve in April after 30 years and four months, then resigned from Ozona Volunteer Fire Department in May after 30 years and four days.

A barbecue supper hosted by the fire department in his honor commemorated that retirement. Retirement from the business he began Dec. 3, 1958, was on a quieter note.

Only Bill Cooper served longer as an active member of the fire department, Hubbard said. Dick Kirby was close behind with 28 years.

"I joined the fire department because I felt like it was my civic duty," said Hubbard who believes everyone should do what they can. "I feel like I partially fulfilled my civic duty. I

never did like eating smoke. It's not my hobby.

"At times the three of us at the shop have closed to go to fires," said Hubbard who believes the time is coming when there will be no volunteer firemen.

"Every county employee, doctors included, should be required to be firemen or on the ambulance - the judge, commissioners, all of them," Hubbard said.

Times have changed since the 1930's and '40's when there was no organized fire department, no trained men and only one or two trucks. Since the department's organization, Ozona has maintained a volunteer fire department with 25-30 members. Most are certified, and a number of training schools have been held here.

Hubbard remembers the fire at the present primary school as the worst he fought during his years in the department. Other memorable fires were the ones at the former Methodist Church, now the County Annex Building, and a fire at the Ranch Theater.

Hubbard was at his ranch when Skains' Garage burned, but could see the smoke.

Volunteer firemen have to contend with a lot. "People are fast to criticize and seldom give any credit," Hubbard said. Once a body shop customer told him "if you'd spend more time with your business instead of fighting fires, you'd get my car done."

Firemen also take criticism for driving fast to reach the station in answer to a call. But Hubbard believes the critics would feel just the opposite if the call was to their property. He remembers only two incidents where firemen were involved in wrecks on the way to the station. One of the accidents happened when a traffic light changed, and the other involved people chasing the alarm.

Hubbard gives credit to wife Virginia for her support of his volunteer work. "It takes a willing wife for a man to be a fireman. In fact, in everything it takes a willing wife behind a man."

In addition to being supportive of her husband's work as a fireman, she has kept the books at the shop for 30 years and continues to keep books for son Steve. She also worked 19 years as secretary for the I-10 resident engineer.

Hubbard has been involved with volunteer fire departments all his life. His father, Cecil Hubbard, was fire chief at O'Donnell when Perry was born. Cecil Hubbard was a mechanic with Cage Brothers, the construction company building Hwy. 290, when the family moved to Ozona. Perry was five at the time.

Perry first got into the auto body building business in California where he met and married Virginia in 1947 while in the Navy.

The couple moved to Ozona, and he worked for his dad in the garage business, worked in the oil field and tried his hand at operating the M & M Cafe. Then the Hubbards went back to California.

Early training stuck with Hubbard, though. "I did my first valve job on Red Fusselman's car when I was 12 years old." He remembers his first brake job as being on a car owned by

Dean Phillips.

Although retired, Hubbard plans to help son Steve at the body shop when needed. Perhaps he remembers his first 10 years in business when he and Virginia never had a vacation.

Steve has worked in the body shop for 12 years. He was raised in the body shop and has been driving a wrecker since he first became old enough, Hubbard said.

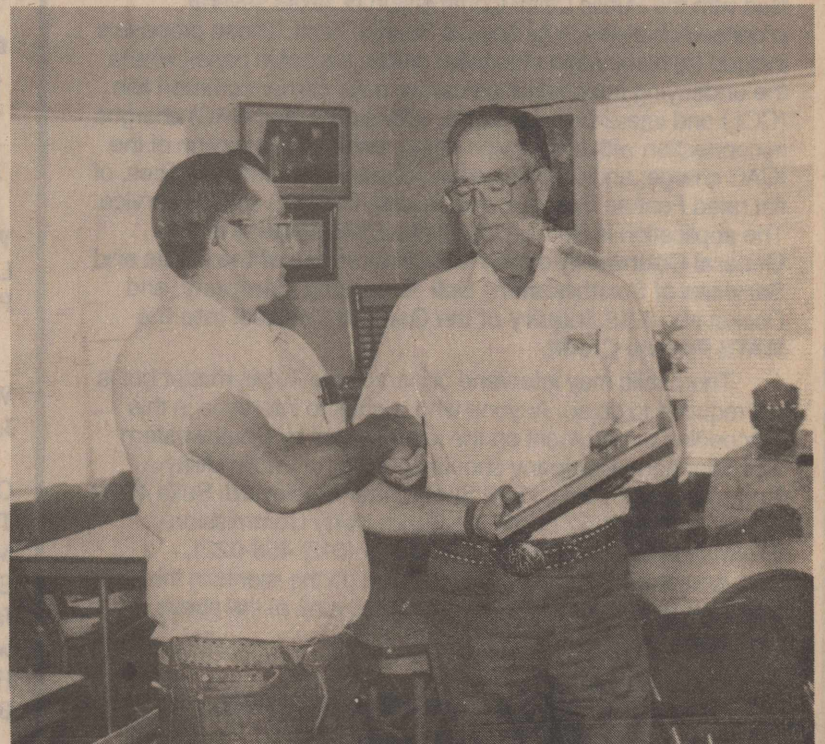
Brian Morrow, also trained by Perry Hubbard, works at the body shop with Steve.

In addition to helping out at the shop, Perry will be kept busy with his ranch north of Ozona. He has been in that business 11 years, raising cattle and sheep.

The Hubbards' Ozona grandchildren keep their grandparents and parents, Steve and Linda, busy with youth rodeos. Following in their father's footsteps are Marshall, Nathan and Ashlee. Marshall was the fire department's first mascot.

Perry and Virginia's daughter, Connie and her husband, Thomas Hall, a captain in the Border Patrol, live in Del Rio. Their daughter, Rene, has recently completed beautician school and will marry this month.

"We live in Ozona because we want to," said Hubbard in summing up their life here. "I learned my business in the city, but this is where we wanted to be."

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN-U.S. House Speaker
Jim Wright's resignation dominated the conversations at the Capitol last week, as legislative leaders attempted to estimate the federal funding and political impact on Texas.

In addition to protecting federal projects in Texas, foremost the superconducting supercollider and NASA facilities, state leaders in both parties quietly considered strategies to implement when Wright resigns his congressional seat.

The impact on the Texas Legislature could be greater than most would think.

The normally quiet summer could highlight at least two political events, possible three.

For one, Gov. Bill Clements has already called a special session for June 20 to consider workers' compensation reform and possibly other issues. For another, Clements will get to call a special election to fill Wright's vacated congressional seat.

Lewis for Congress?
Many legislators think Texas Speaker Gib Lewis would be a formidable candidate for the Democrats in that race.

Lewis has not commented one way or the other, but the chain of events that would follow his election to Congress might likely change the face of Texas politics.

The Texas House would have to elect a new speaker, but this election would be different.

Fragile Truce Possible
Republicans in the Texas House now number 60, just 16 short of a majority. More important, with Lewis gone, the fragile truce between liberal and conservative Democrats stands to fall apart.

Caught in the middle, the conservative Democrats would have to choose between party and philosophy.

If enough of them choose philosophy, if that's the term to use, Republicans could elect their first speaker in Texas history.

What would clearly boggle things is if Clements called

the special election during the already-called special session.

The man on the spot then would be Speaker Lewis, who might be forced to choose between running the House session or running for Congress. If he chooses one, Texas Republicans could have an edge in the other.

Bullock vs. Edwards

Shortly after lawmakers returned home, several Democrats announced their plans for the coming election.

Both Comptroller Bob Bullock and state Sen. Chet Edwards announced for the race to succeed outgoing Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Bullock announced the support of 17 Democratic senators and 63 of the 91 Democrats in the Texas House, while Edwards said many on the list were simply too afraid of Bullock to oppose him.

Bullock is expected to run on his credentials of long-time service and knowledge of state government. His plans to raise tax revenues and his positions on sales tax reform and state income taxes, when he announces them, could well hold center stage in this race.

Edwards is expected to paint Bullock's leadership style as ruthless, and his relationship with Clements as too supportive for loyal Democrats to accept.

Mauro Seeks Re-election

And Land Commissioner Garry Mauro surprised everyone by announcing for re-election, rather than going for attorney general.

Mauro, plagued by personal finance problems and a recent FBI probe of his agency, will run on his record of management and protection of the environment, notably his clean beaches program.

Congressman John Bryant of Dallas is expected to announce soon for attorney general. A former Texas House member, Bryant led the liberal Democrat faction and was an outspoken critic of former Speaker Bill Clayton.

Watchful eyes are now on San Antonio state Rep. Dan Morales, who inherited the organization of Henry Cisneros, to see if he will make his expected race for AG.

And observers are watching state Sen. Hugh Parmer, who could forego his announced race against U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm to run for Wright's congressional seat.

Other Highlights

- Gov. Clements vetoed legislation which would have allowed UT-Dallas and UT-Permian Basin in Odessa to expand into four-year institutions.

- Sam Carroll, a member of the Texas Higher Education Council, resigned in protest of a bill which allows creation of a four-year university in Killeen.

- Clements asked the federal government to declare 18 additional Texas counties disaster areas as a result of severe storms that struck the state earlier this month.

- Twenty-one proposed constitutional amendments will appear on the November election ballot.

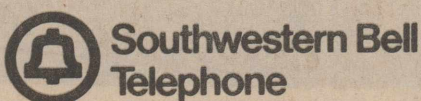

Friday afternoon was spent in friendly conversation and a challenging game of dominos.

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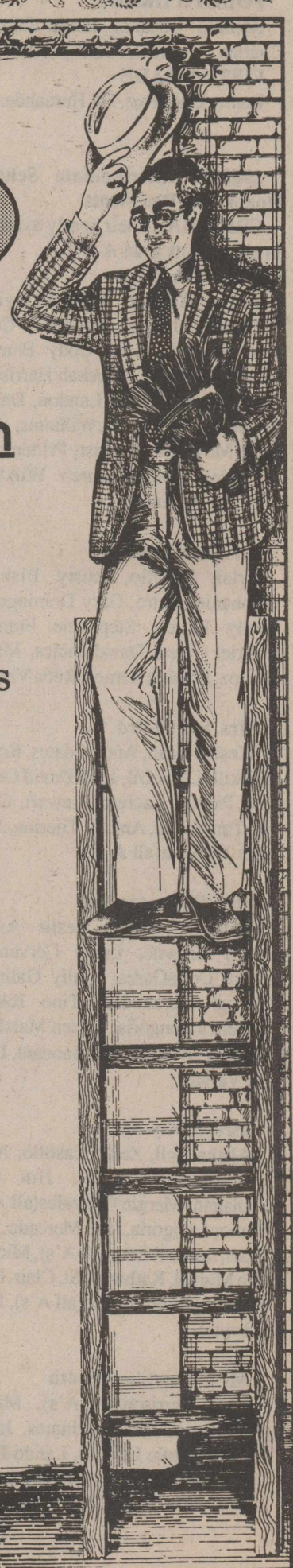

Presidential Academic Fitness Award given

In 1983, President Ronald Reagan established the Presidential ACADEMIC Fitness Award program to honor students who have achieved excellence in their studies.

Awards are given at three levels to students who are graduating from elementary school, middle or junior high school or high school. Students who fulfill all criteria qualify for the Presidential ACADEMIC Fitness Award, and these national criteria may not be modified.

The first criterion is grade point average. A student must have maintained a B+ average in all years in the school (K-2 not included).

Second, a student must have scored at the 80th percentile or higher on the most recent standardized achievement test given. This battery score must include both verbal and mathematical skills.

Third, high school seniors must have completed 12 high school or higher level course units in the "New Basics," which include English, mathematics, science, social studies, foreign language and computer science.

In addition to the above criteria, an Extraordinary Effort Award may be given to a limited number of students who do not meet all the academic criteria, but whom the school wishes to recognize for extraordinary effort.

The Fitness award is optional and may be presented to no more than 10 percent of the number of students who meet all of the academic criteria for the award. The award is a certificate signed by President George Bush, U.S. Secretary of Education Lauro Cavazos, and the school principal.

According to Mr. Cavazos, "The

Presidential ACADEMIC Fitness Awards (PAFA) program helps schools honor students for outstanding academic achievement. The award is evidence that students have mastered their studies and demonstrated their ability to work hard over a sustained period to realize their full academic potential. In this way, the award seeks to foster the development of good character as well as academic success."

President Reagan has stated, "America's future hinges on the education we give our children—on the knowledge and skills, the values and virtues we impart to them. Citizens who have received such a well-rounded, deeply-grounded education will lend unity to our society, strength to our economy and vigor to our public life."

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Extension Connection

Most of the time, the messages we send to other people about their behavior are "you" messages—directed at the other person and meant to put them down, make them feel guilty, or make them feel their needs are not important.

"You" messages generally make people resist change, such as when you say, "You're acting like a baby." Your child probably decides right then and there that since you think they're a baby, they might as well act like it!

Orders, commands or name-calling statements, or statements that give solutions ("You should forget that idea. You'd better reconsider that plan.") remove the responsibility for change from the other person.

Maybe the worst choice of all is the "if....then" threat—"If you don't clean your room, then I'll ground you!" That's calculated to stir up even the most mild-mannered person into rebellion!

An "I" message, on the other hand, allows the person who is affected by the behavior of another to express the impact it has on him or her, and at the same time, leave the responsibility for modifying that behavior with the person who demonstrated it.

An "I" message has three parts: the specific behavior, the resulting feeling you experienced because of the behavior, and the tangible effect on you.

So, you might say to your child, "When you leave clothes and makeup lying around all over your bathroom, I feel upset because I don't know where you are or if you're all right."

In effect, the "I" message allows the sender to implicitly say, "I trust you to decide what change in behavior is necessary."

"I" messages build relationships between people because they enable us to really say what we mean—and mean what we say.

Shannon teamwork helps accident victim fight back

Editor's Note:

The following story from the June issue of the Shannon Medical Center "Stetho-Scoop" is shared with readers by Jesusita Flores, mother of Stevie Chipman.

On the evening of September 16, 1988, Steve Chipman and four friends were riding in a van in Ozona when they failed to negotiate a corner and crashed into an embankment.

Steve's four companions escaped the accident without serious injury, but Steve was struck in the head by a large stereo speaker that broke loose from the back of the van during the collision. The friends thought Steve had been killed.

The nineteen-year-old cook received primary emergency care in Ozona, then was transferred to Shannon's Emergency Department. He arrived at 2:21 a.m. Sunday morning unconscious, a breathing tube in place, wearing a cervical collar, strapped to a backboard, a fluid catheter inserted, and IV's infusing. He had a temperature of 106 degrees.

Shannon Emergency Department personnel placed Steve in a cooling blanket, administered medication, sutured the head wound, and performed a CT scan. Stabilized but still gravely injured, Steve was transferred to Shannon Intensive Care.

Steve remained in Shannon ICU under the care of a neurosurgeon, pulmonologist, general surgeon, and a cardiologist for the next two weeks. He required a tracheostomy so he could breathe, and a jejunostomy so he could receive nourishment. As the immediate danger passed, Steve was transferred to Shannon's intermediate care unit, then to surgical and orthopedic units as various members of the Shannon team repaired the damage the stereo speaker had caused. Finally, Steve was moved to the Shannon RehabCare Unit.

When Steve arrived at Shannon RehabCare, he had physically survived a devastating head injury, but his condition was still bleak. He had a nagging, low-grade fever, he could not straighten limbs, he had spastic muscle movements, his head rolled uncontrollably, he could not speak, he could not move in bed, he was incontinent, and he could not swallow. Feeding tubes and the tracheostomy were still in place.

Steve was still a very sick young man who had a long way to go," according to Dan Stultz, M.D., the RehabCare medical director.

The RehabCare team called on the full resources available at Shannon: medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, psychology, social work, dietary and chaplain service. A plan to improve Steve's functional independence was put into effect, and it began to work.

Over the next months, Steve slowly began to recover.

On May 8, after 174 days of treatment at Shannon's RehabCare Unit, Steve's mother, Jesusita Flores, took her son home.

Steve's recovery is far from com-

plete. He will need continued assistance from family members and continued outpatient rehabilitation services.

But in almost six months of treatment in the Rehab Care Unit, Steve recovered from near death to a moderate level of functional independence with the promise of continued gains in the future.

Today, Steve can sit erect in his wheelchair and propel himself independently. He talks in sentences and carries on conversations with others. He can feed himself and swallow. His muscles are noticeably less spastic. He can stand with a walker. He can make decisions on his own. He is able to laugh and to cry.

Many people participated in the miracle Steve is living: emergency technicians in Ozona, Shannon's trauma team in the ER, physicians and nurses who kept Steve alive during two tough weeks in ICU, and members of the Shannon RehabCare Unit who worked patiently with Steve, who saw hope in the tiniest signs and built upon the inner core of Steve's strength and determination the accident could not extinguish.

On the day Steve Chipman left the Shannon RehabCare Unit, everyone gathered for the traditional "coin ceremony" in which unit members told Steve their best memories of his stay and the changes he had made.

Steve received the coin last. He stood up, smiling broadly. Holding his head steady and erect, Steve Chipman said in a voice all could hear and understand: "All I can say is, 'I love you.'"

Mrs. Flores is filled with gratitude for the people of Ozona and all they did for Steve. She moved to San Angelo to be near Steve during the four months he was in a coma and to continue to be with him during the gradual recovery.

Even though Steve is at home with his family in San Angelo, he continues in the rehab program four days a week.

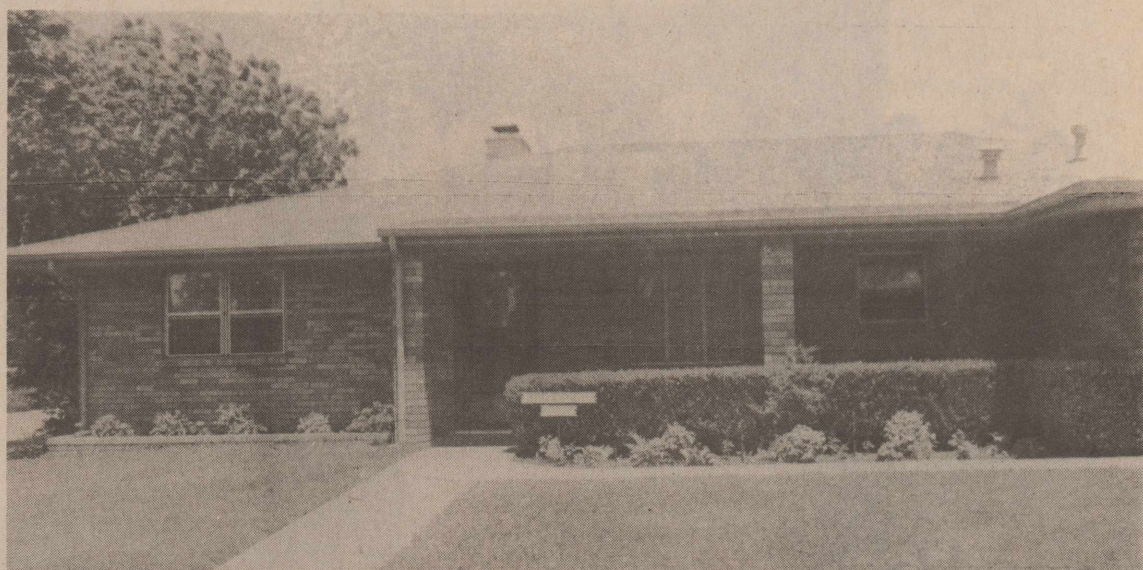

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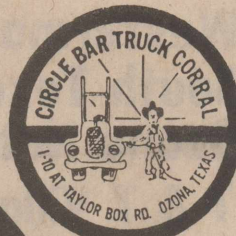

The Old Testament closes with God speaking to Israel through the prophet Malachi, saying "Bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house, and prove me now in this, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it (Malachi 3:10)."

Are you practicing "storehouse" giving?

In the New Testament, Jesus tells us "give and it shall be given to you." Many people dislike the emphasis that preachers, in general, place on giving. Perhaps there is some overemphasis and some "wrong" emphasis, but giving is emphasized in the Bible as required by God and blessed by God.

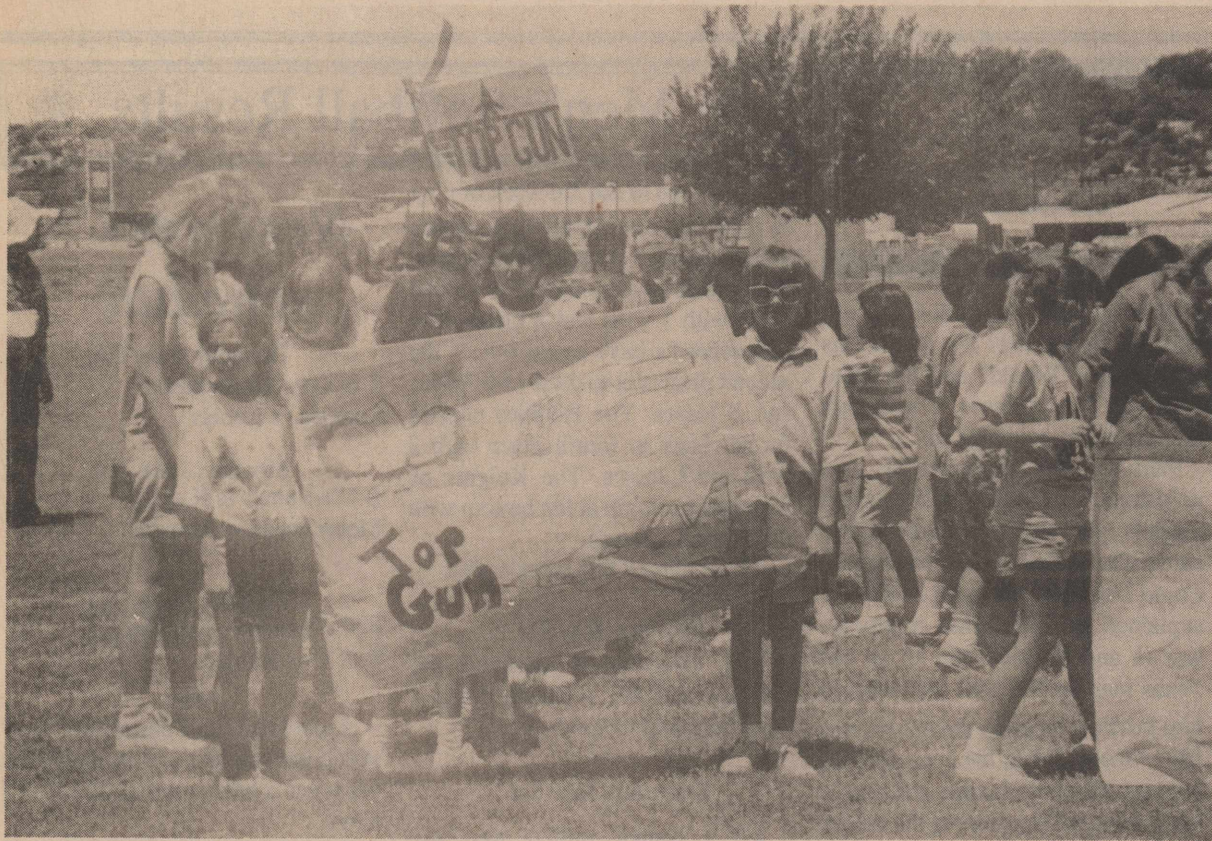

Extention Agent hosts Finnish technician

Raila Talus, a shy, quiet blonde from Finland, got a whirlwind tour of this area during her two week stay in Crockett County. The 23-year-old home economics technician will visit in Texas four months and in Vermont two as part of an international foreign youth exchange sponsored by the 4-H.

While here, Raila was the guest of Tedra and Neal Ulmer and their children. Tedra is the County Extension Agent - Home Economics.

Raila first arrived in New York and then went to Washington, D.C. where she toured the National 4-H Center before coming to Big Spring for her first two week homestay. After two weeks here, she accompanied Tedra to the State 4-H Roundup where she will meet her next host family.

As the daughter of a dairy farmer of Alavieska, Finland, a community about the size of Ozona, and a lover of history, Raila had an automatic kinship with this area. She visited a working ranch, spoke to children in the local schools, and toured Fort Lancaster, Langtry, Fort McKavett, Sonora Cavens and Fort Concho during her stay.

Raila's work in Finland includes giving demonstrations on food and nutrition to organizations in different communities. Cost of the program, which is under the auspices of the Women's Society, is paid by the hosting organizations and by the government.

Upon her return to Finland, Raila hopes to teach high school level home economics. The prospective teacher speaks Finnish, Swedish, German and

English.

As a memento of her visit, Raila presented County Agent Billy Reagor with a reindeer ear tag. In Finland, ear tags are notched rather than animals. There are approximately 16,000 different notch combinations for the tags, Raila explained.

Reindeer are raised in northern Finland for their meat and hides and

must be rounded up by snow mobile or on foot according to the season.

Texas people were praised for their friendliness by the young visitor who may have had some pre-conceived ideas from seeing Dallas and western movies on Finnish television.

"Everything is bigger here than we have," she said of the cars and population.

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
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

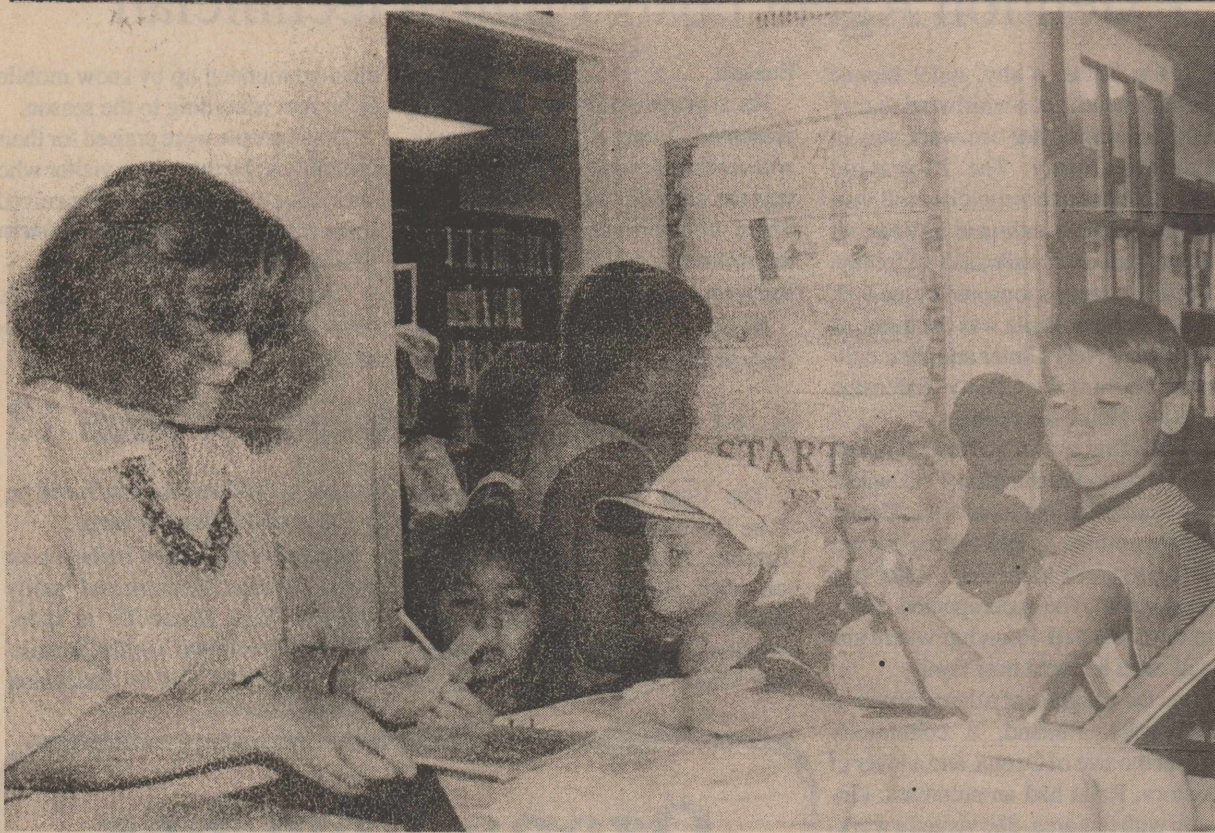

Sewells retire after successful education careers

Rip and Ellen Sewell are excited about retirement. "My life has been regulated by the school bell since I was six years old," said Rip. Remarkable that he had been late very few times through the years, Rip commented that he is looking forward to the "silent sound of no school bells".

For now, they are enjoying the luxury of not having to do anything. Travel and catching up on scrapbooks are ahead. "And I've already started on my 'Honey Do's'," said Rip with a grin.

Rip Sewell ended a teaching and coaching career last month that spanned 36 years. He came to Ozona in June of 1968 as a teacher and assistant coach under Sam Mosley. Through a series of events prompted by the death of Swede Pelt, Sewell became head track coach.

During his 21 years in the Ozona school system, he has coached track, football, basketball and golf.

"It was a challenge," said Sewell, who taught the safest tackling technique he could find. "I never had a player with a permanent neck, back or spine injury," he says with pride.

"Coaches have to make instant decisions, and sometimes they are not always right," Sewell admits, "but when you're coaching there can only be one boss."

Sewell remembers a decision which cost his football team the district championship in a close game. The night before the game, Sewell awoke in a cold sweat from a dream in which he saw one of his senior players carried from the field on a stretcher. The young athlete had been injured in a game the previous year.

"He didn't get off the bench one time that night," said Sewell who never told the player or his parents the reason for the decision.

Agreeing that the pressures of coaching can make one "a nervous wreck", Sewell acknowledges that people stay in the profession because they love it.

He has had the satisfaction of coaching two All-Americans in addition to developing many other fine athletes during his career.

Ozona's Larry Payne achieved All-American status while attending Angelo State University. Sewell's first All-American was a Plains High School athlete.

A personal highlight of his career was his election to the Coaches' Hall of Honor in 1986. Since the Hall of Honor originated in 1960, approxi-

mately 130 coaches have been selected by their peers for induction.

Sewell is also proud of a local award he received in May. Principal Jim Payne presented Sewell with a certificate honoring him as a "lifetime teacher and coach at Ozona High School" during an assembly program.

Both the Sewells were recognized by their respective faculties with retirement gifts.

Recalling the lean years of his early teaching days, the Sewells wonder how they got by. A \$300 a month salary and \$100 house payments back in 1963 didn't leave much for the family.

"But our kids didn't know we sacrificed. They didn't know about steak, silk shirts and caviar," Sewell said.

"I worked summers and weekends. We did everything we could to stay in teaching," said Sewell who waited more than 20 years to begin work on his master's.

One of the drawbacks Sewell sees to career teaching is the fact that there are no increases in salary (state base) after 25 years. Although the older teachers have the experience to help younger teacher develop, there is no financial reward possible for their valuable expertise, he explained.

Sewell has instructed an average of 40-45 students a year during the 36 years he has taught driver's education. "I taught driver's ed many years before ever losing a student to a traffic accident. Don't be a traffic statistic," has been his motto for the beginning drivers.

Anything that keeps kids in school should be used said Sewell of legislation designed to prevent dropouts from acquiring driver's licenses.

At the same time, he understands that subjects such as English, math and science are not for everyone. As a coach and former teacher of general math, algebra, world history, Ameri-

can history, biology, chemistry, physics, economics, world geography, civics and government. Sewell understands the importance of a varied vocational program. He is full of praise for the teachers and vocational program in the Ozona schools.

"Teaching is a new world every day," said Sewell who admits to getting as much enjoyment out of classroom teaching as coaching.

Reinforcing the students' attitudes toward right and wrong is important to him. "If there's a question in your mind, then it's probably wrong," Sewell told his students.

Ellen Sewell retired this May as librarian of the intermediate school after 21 years in the system.

She worked as secretary to a principal in Plains for two years before the family moved to Ozona. "Mr. Sikes decided that I should be librarian and teach Spanish to first and second graders," she said. "I didn't know any Spanish." She learned enough to keep ahead of the students, however. After a few years, the requirement that Spanish be taught in elementary and intermediate schools was dropped.

Intermediate classes visit the library once each week for 30 minutes. Part of their library time is devoted to mandatory training on Apple II E computers. Despite their short visits to the library, Mrs. Sewell manages to become acquainted with each child, "especially the readers". Children who like to read have the opportunity to check out books at times other than the weekly half hour.

Shelves at Ozona Intermediate School library contain books from first grade level to some that could be in the high school library, Mrs. Sewell said. The intermediate library still has room for expansion, but with budget cuts and the price of books averaging \$10 each, additions are limited. "I've tried to keep the library current and varied with information on new technology, people and authors."

The pleasant, carpeted library with well-filled shelves wasn't always the norm during Ellen's 21 years with the school. "We stayed packed for a year and a half before the school got moved to the new building," she recalls.

Ozona Intermediate School has very

good teachers and very good discipline according to Mrs. Sewell. "I don't believe we've ever had a drug problem in our school."

The Sewells' four children acquired numerous trophies and awards during their years in Ozona schools.

David is married to the former Bridget Dunlap and works for AMAX in Ozona. He has a daughter, Ami.

Kathy Gail is completing the year in the Spearman school system and will move to Ozona to join husband Vaden Aldridge, district conservationist for the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District. Their children

are Andrea and Jacque.

Dan and Martha also live in Ozona where he is employed by EN-SOURCE.

Daughter Karen Dee and husband David Huff live in Coleman where they own the Coleman Monument Works. They have two sons, Geoffrey and Lance.

"We hope we've satisfied most of the people we've served through the years," Sewell said. "We've really enjoyed living in Ozona. We've been accepted in the community, and we're staying right here."

Wherever they go, they will remember their stay in Ozona.

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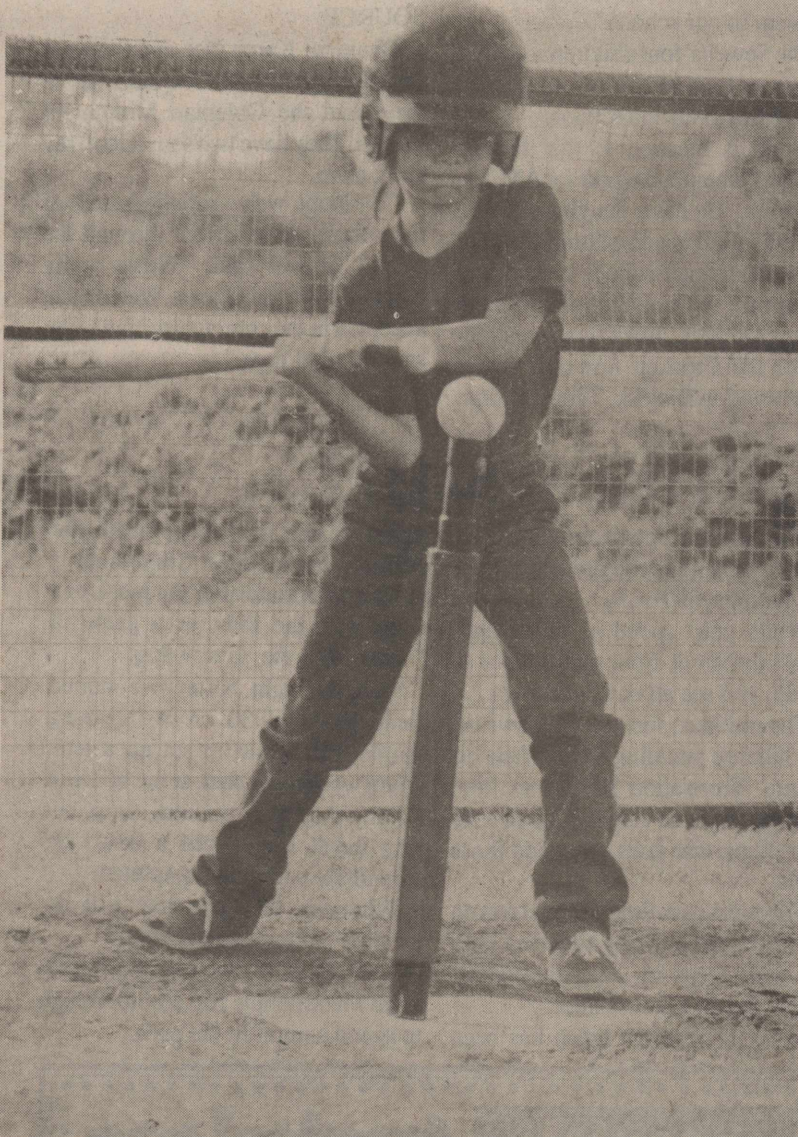

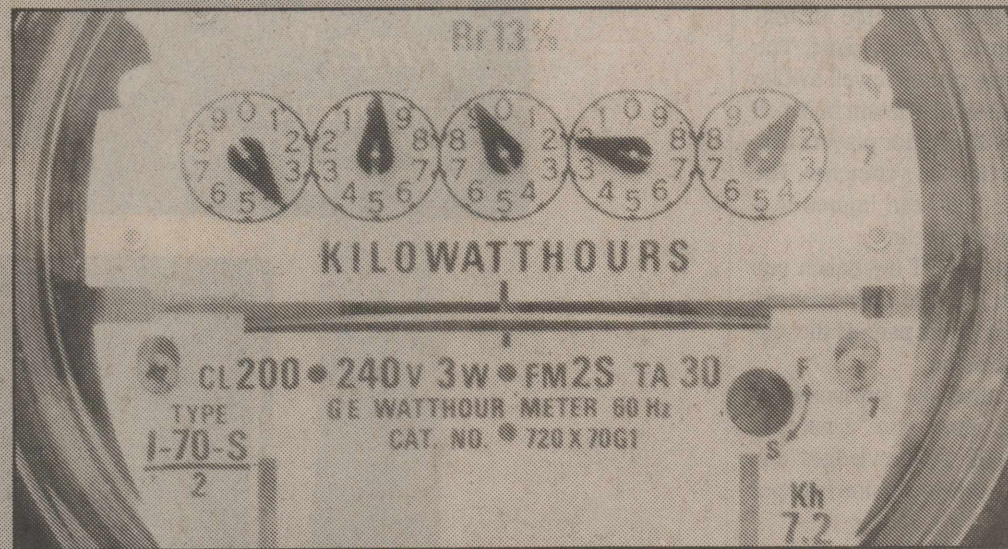

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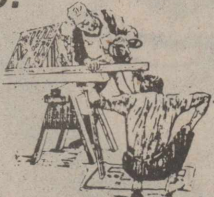

Ulmer photos on display in library this month

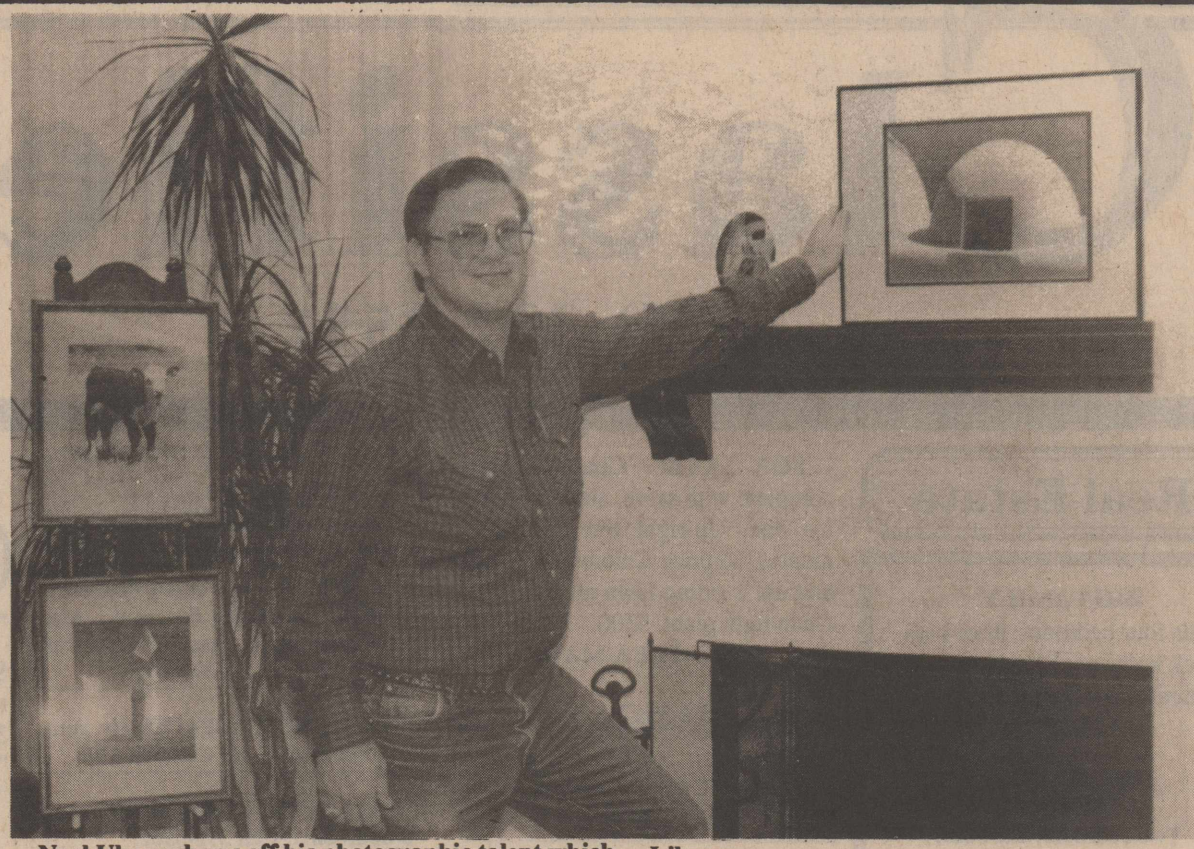
Lovers of the west and southwest will find a feast for their eyes this month at Crockett County Public Library when they view photographs by Neal Ulmer.

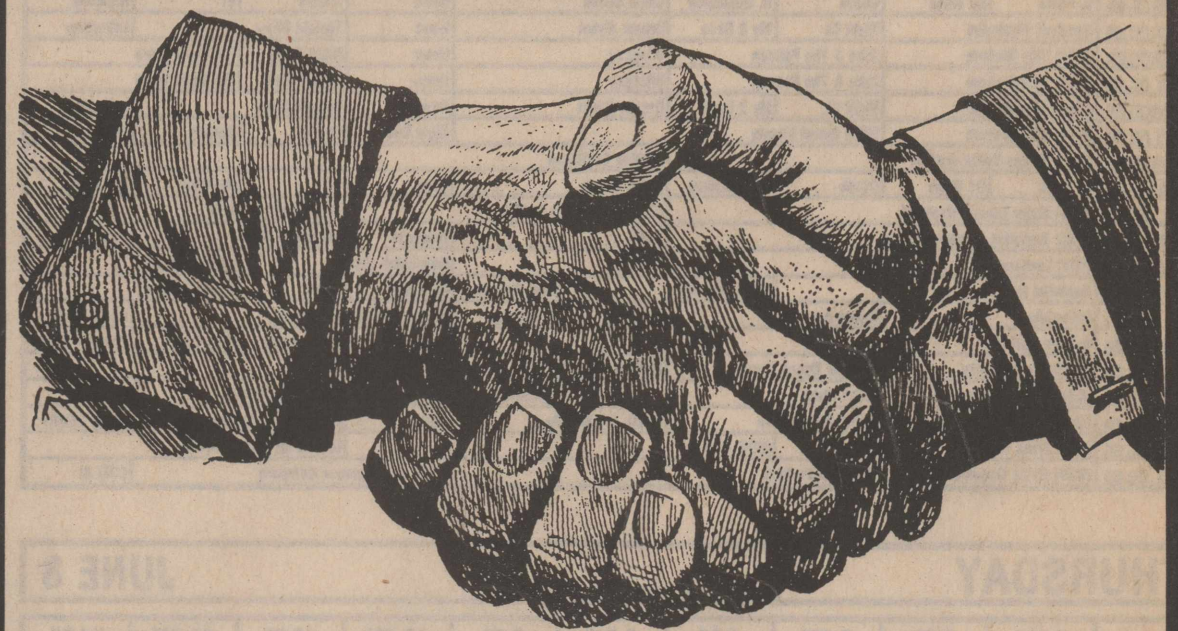
