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## His and Hers

The news media across the state received this week a news letter from Mary Scott Nabers, commissioner of the Texas Employment Commission representing employers of Texas pleading our case against the .2 percent FUTA surtax which has been in effect since 1976.

Many Texans remember that back in 1976 the federal government enacted a temporary .2 percent surtax to pay off a \$8.7 billion debt in the national employment system. Despite a promise that the tax would expire when the debt was paid off, the temptation of collecting almost \$1 billion in revenue was obviously too great for Congress to resist and the tax, due to expire in 1987, was extended through 1990.

There is absolutely no reason to continue to tax Texas taxpayers, and the Texas Employment Commission has supported elimination of the surtax since 1987. Finally, a bill to repeal the .2 percent FUTA surtax has been introduced by two Oregon representatives, Ron Wyden and Peter DeFazio. The Federal Unemployment Tax Relief Act of 1989, HR 2316, will, if passed, repeal the surtax at the

end of 1989 reducing every Taxpayer's annual FUTA cost by \$14 per employee.

Although a hearing has not yet been set, the bill will eventually be heard in the Subcommittee on Human Resources of the House Ways and Means Committee. For everyone who is interested in this legislation, now is the time to write congressional representatives. Taxpayers in this state may find that the bill will not pass without active support from the business community.

The Texas Employment Commission also opposed another federal measure that would have increased its administrative budget, but would have cost the employees of the state \$164 million in additional FUTA taxes in the next three years. The proposal, based on increasing the \$7,000 FUTA wage base, would have added \$300,000,000 nationwide to the operating budgets of employment security agencies. All state agencies are facing budget crunches, but TEC felt that the price was too high. Over three years, Texas would have received about \$45 million of the \$164 estimated collections from Texas employers for employment security operations. This is definitely not in the best interests of taxpayers!

### Lib Applewhite retires after 38 1/2 years

A surprise retirement party was also a birthday celebration for Lib Applewhite Friday, Sept. 22. "I was totally surprised," said Lib, who was honored at Ozona National Bank's Crockett Room by co-workers and friends.

Lib will retire from the water district Sept. 29 after 38 1/2 years.

Since she began work there March 1, 1951, Ozona has seen more than a

few changes.

There were no houses on the hills in 1951, Lib remembers. The coming of the radar base in 1953, Circle Bar Truck Corral, and expansion in town have increased the number of customers from the 750-800 of 1951 to the 1502 billed in July of this year.

### Lions scalp the Braves 28-14

The Lions showed fans that they can run the ball as well as pass it Friday night against Iraan in a 28-14 victory. The Lions demonstrated real potential as they won a game after coming back from an early Iraan touchdown. Like a spark, the Lions' score in the second quarter began a 28 point assault ending in a 73 yard run by George Ybarra.

The Lions' passing game cooled from last week as they produced a total of 80 yards for the night. Quarterback Chris Denman found Sotero Fuentes two times for 22 yards. Lonnie Martinez caught a pass for another 22 yards. Denman also found Domingo Perez for 28 yards and Gilbert Rico for 8 yards.

The Lions took advantage of the Braves' worry over their passing game to surprise them with a running game. Senior George Ybarra lead the Lions with 11 carries for 102 yards. Aiding Ybarra in the assault, Lalo Rodriguez got the ball 21 times for 97 yards. Lonnie Martinez also helped twice for 10 yards.

Ozona's defense played a great game once again. Nose guard Mark Fierro had 10 unassisted tackles. Andy Stokes also had 7 solo tackles. These two seniors led the other defensive

players in their attack. The defense was also helped by Issac Leal, Albert Talamantez, Pete Ramirez, Ricky Burger and Bruce Beasley.

The Braves took advantage of two first quarter Ozona turnovers to score with 2:22 remaining. The Lions used the remainder of the first quarter to begin a second quarter drive.

The Lions ended the drive with 10:04 remaining in the second quarter when Lalo Rodriguez scored on a 6 yard drive. Ruben Borrego made the extra point for the Lions. Soon after, the Lions scored on a fumble recovery with 6:05 on the clock. Once again Borrego made the extra point for the Lions.

After excellent defensive play by the Lions, the ball was turned over to Denman who connected with Lonnie Martinez for a 22 yard touchdown with 2:25 left in the ball game. Borrego again made the extra point.

The Lions came out early in the fourth quarter and scored on a 73 yard run with 11:34 remaining, and Borrego scored the extra point. Iraan scored with 8:10 remaining on a 26 yard pass, making the score Ozona 28, Iraan 14. The game ended with another Ozona victory.

The mighty Lions travel Friday to play the Junction Eagles who are recovering from a 61-0 slaughter by the Sonora Broncos.

There was a tie last week between Keith Miller and Jeff Sanchez with 10 correct picks each. Keith Miller was declared the winner with a score total on the tie breaker of 55 while Jeff came in second with a total of 43. Total of actual tie breaker game was 52.

### Soil and Water Conservation District election set for Oct. 10

An election for a director in zone 5 of the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Tuesday, October 10th at the S.C.S. office located at 401 First Street announced Earl Acton, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 6:30 p.m.

To be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district directors election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he or she represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming and ranching. He or she must also live in the county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 5 of the District includes land in Crockett County south of highway 290 and west of Howard Draw.

Current members of the board of

directors of the Crockett SWCD are Earl Acton, chairman-zone 4; Bud Hoover, vice chairman-zone 5; Gene Perry, secretary-zone 3; Pleas Childress III, member-zone 2; Larry Williams, member-zone 1.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District promotes sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch land within the district. The District serves as a voice for ranchers on conservation issues affecting private property rights of landowners. All conservation programs managed by the District are of a voluntary nature to the landowner.

### Unemployment figures released

Unemployment figures released Sept. 19 by the Texas Employment Commission indicate an 8.3 percent unemployment rate in Crockett County for August. This rate is up from the 7.9 unemployment rate of a year ago.

According to a spokesman for the TEC, the rates are based on numbers filing for unemployment. Current figures show a labor force of 1,782 in the county with 1,634 employed and 148 unemployed.

Figures for May were 6.6 unemployed. In June the rate rose to 10.2 percent; July's unemployment stood at 9.7 percent.

The August 1988 unemployment rate of 7.9 was based on a labor force of 1,771.

Statewide, the unemployment rate for August is 7.2 percent, down from 7.3 percent in July, but above the 6.7 percent recorded in August of 1988.

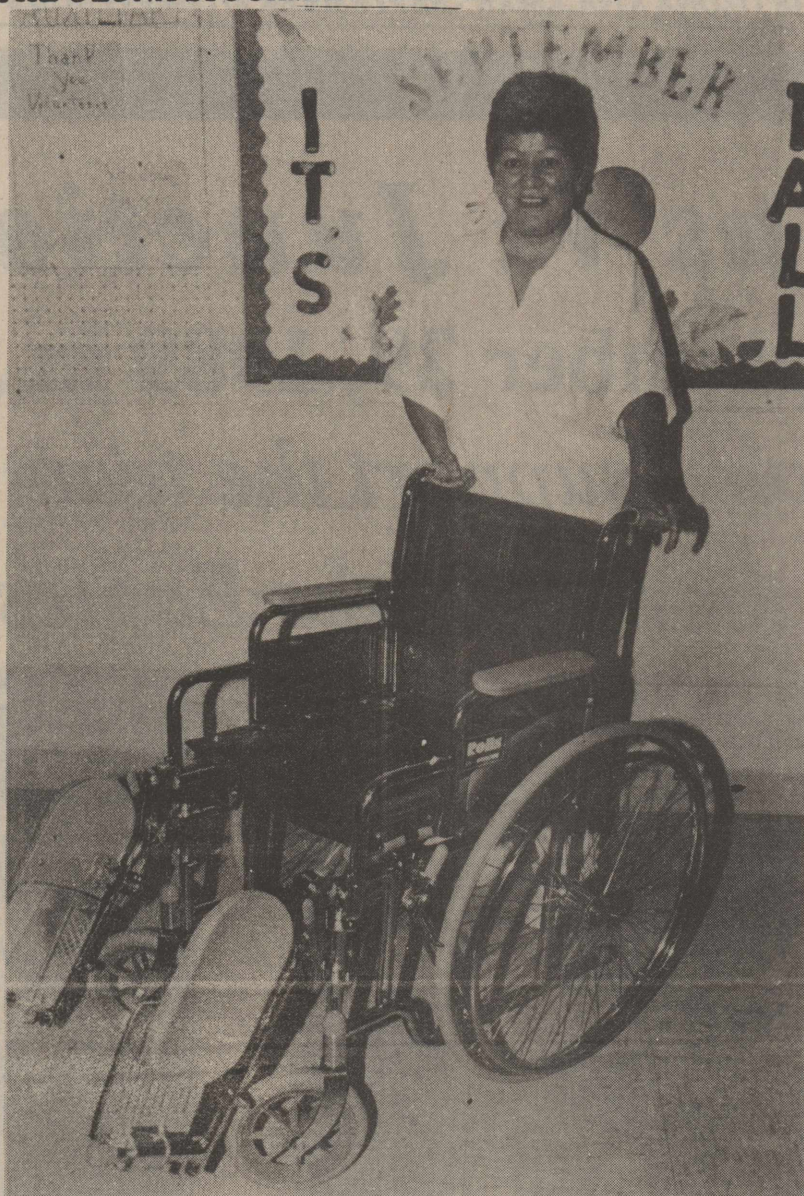

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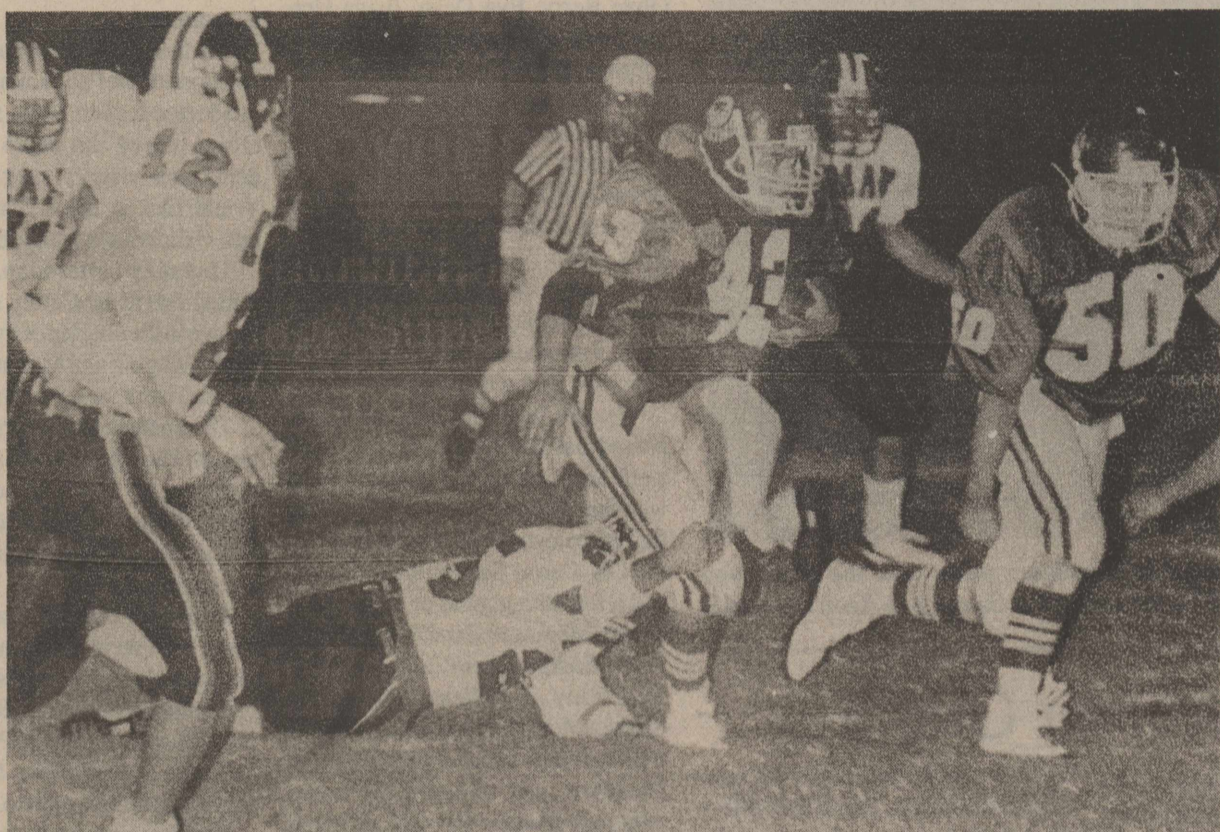

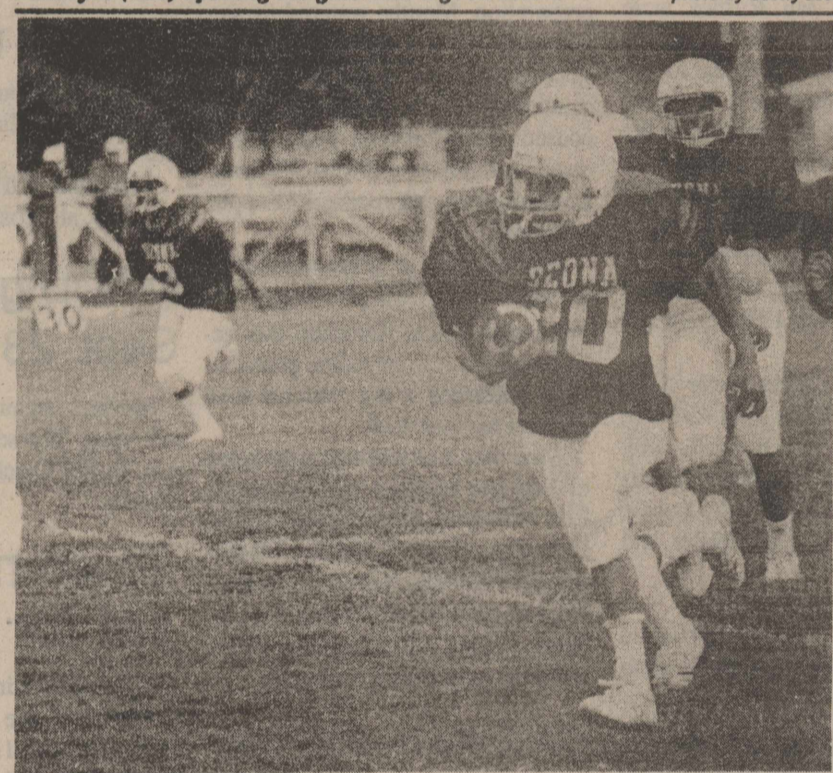

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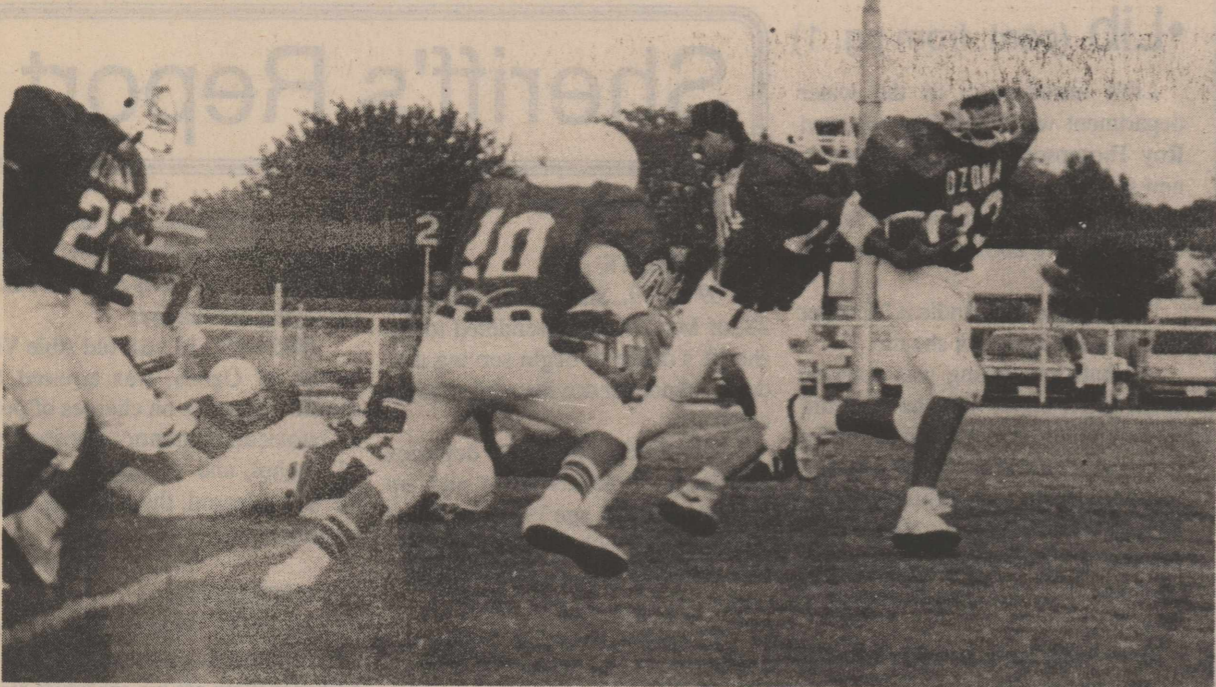

## Crockett County Commissioners Court adopts proposed school tax rate

Commissioners voted to adopt the proposed school tax rate of 96 cents per \$100 valuation at a one item agenda meeting Sept. 19. Combined with the county tax rate of 58 cents per \$100 valuation, taxes will be assessed at \$1.54 per \$100 valuation.

This rate is down two cents for the school district and down 1.5 cents for Crockett County compared to the \$1.575 assessed for the 1989 budget year.

At a 6 p.m. meeting Sept. 25, court members voted to approve contracts with juvenile detention centers in Tom Green and Pecos Counties, authorized Eddie Moore, road supervisor, to hire a private contractor to haul crushed rock given to the county from University lands, and approved hiring Ramon Sanchez as temporary dump ground supervisor. Sanchez was already a road department employee.

Visitors from Sanderson, Shirley Spence and Marion Childress, appeared before the court as representatives of S.H.O.W., a citizens' group opposing a hazardous waste dump proposed for Terrell County.

Mrs. Spence said such a dump could possibly contaminate water in the Edwards-Trinity Aquifer, creating a problem for 22 counties.

Eight miles northwest of the proposed site is the deepest cave in Texas, and in its bottom is a southeast flowing river which produces 4,000 gallons of water per minute, she said.

Also speaking out against the hazardous waste dump site was Mrs. Evert White who has obtained more than 600 names on a petition opposing the dump.

Mrs. Spence asked commissioners to consider a resolution opposing a dump site in Terrell County.

No action could be taken on the request since it was not on the agenda.

During a discussion of non-agenda items, Judge Kathryn Mayfield reported on a recent meeting with officials from Upton, Irion and Reagan Counties to discuss a possible regional landfill. An early October meeting has been set up with University land people to discuss possible sites in Reagan and Crockett Counties. University land representatives have said

they do not wish to continue to lease a landfill site west of Big Lake to Reagan County after that lease expires.

Judge Mayfield will attend a Texas Association of Regional Councils seminar on landfills in San Antonio this week.

Court members talked with Orlando De Hoyos about precinct boundaries on a map he is preparing as part of the information requested by the Department of Justice for the proposed hospital district election.

## Boys' Cross Country wins again

The San Angelo Cross Country Meet was the third win for the year by Ozona boys and their fourth time to capture first place in the San Angelo event.

"Not only winning the meet, but the improving of their times has been a big factor all year," said Coach Pete Maldonado. "All of the members of the team improved their personal best." Ozona was first with 40 points, Eldorado second with 60, Odessa 62, Coleman 98, Central 111, Cooper 145, Coahoma 148, Sweetwater 173, and Greenwood 198 points.

Luis Rico led Ozona runners by coming in third. Other placings for local runners were: Mark Ramirez 4, Pep Talamantez 11, Marcos Quiroz 17, Gilbert Rico 18, Ruben Borrego 29, Mingo Perez 37, Aaron Carrol 42, Jose Martinez 45, J. J. Coy 65, Adam Vargas 66, Adam Alba 67 and Steven Leal 76th out of 90 runners.

The girls' cross country team finished third for the second week in a row. The girls keep improving for the run of the district championship Oct. 21.

In the girls' division of the San Angelo meet, Eldorado finished first with 53, Irion County second with 55 and Ozona third with 99.

"Ozona was led by the strong finish of Claudia Avila who ran a fine time of 13:22 for the two mile course," said Maldonado. Claudia finished second, Myra Sanchez 12th, Tricia Etheridge 19th, Kim Coy 20th, Gloria Veloz 20th, Casi Montgomery 33rd, Mari-sol Castillo 35th and Susan Pullen 36th out of 96 runners.

The Ozona cross country teams travel to Big Spring to compete this Saturday, Sept. 30. The girls run at 10 a.m. and the boys at 11.

Lib's introduction to the water department was brief. She replaced Roy Thompson just as Bill Cooper, new superintendent of the district, and repairman and meter reader James Simmler were about to be away for several days.

"I think you can handle it," Cooper told her, and handle it she did.

At that time billing was done on small paper cards with the information and addresses typed in. Cost for sewer service was \$1.00 per month.

The district's first billing machine arrived the week of the 1954 flood. The district is now on its third billing machine, and that one is about 10 years old.

At the time of the Imhoff wastewater system installation in 1952, water rates were \$2 for the first 2,000 gallons, 50 cents per thousand for the next 3000 gallons and 20 cents per thousand for all water used beyond that.

Ozona's new wastewater plant was completed in 1986.

In August of 1958, the 50,000 gallon reservoir was completed on the west side of Ozona for increased storage.

Lib didn't just work for the water district when she began. The office was shared by Bright Baggett's insurance agency, and Lib worked for him, too. Bill Cooper was local chairman of the Red Cross, and that was also headquartered at the water office.

In the mid-50's, the waterworks got the contract to do the billing for Claude Fasselmann who was picking up the town's trash.

At first, Lib had help just during billing time, but as the town grew, so did the need for more help. With her now in the front office are Ampara Enriquez who has worked for the district since 1982, and Alena Faye Hokit who has been employed there since 1984.

No stranger to the business world when she began work at the water district, Lib received a diploma from Draughton's School of Business of San Antonio in August of 1939. She attended classes in the summer and took correspondence courses during winter months while working as secretary at Ozona Public Schools under Claude Denham.

The \$25 per month she earned was used to pay for her business school training.

She had also worked for WTU and as a secretary at Randolph Field for a year during World War II.

"I love my work here. I always have enjoyed it, but I'm ready to retire," says Lib. She is looking forward to being at home with husband Charlie.

Lib and Charlie met and married after he came to Ozona as a surveyor with National Geophysical. Originally

### The new lamb-lean and light

The "new" American lamb-leaner and lighter-is making a place for itself in the diet of weight-and-fat-conscious folks everywhere.

With an average of only 176 calories per 3-ounce serving, and only 78 mg. of cholesterol (compared to 76 in roast chicken) lamb is a good source of protein, Vitamin B-12, zinc, niacin and iron.

And the new, leaner lamb is good-tasting and easy to prepare! Working homemakers are discovering the versatility of this delicious meat—it can go in anything from shishkebobs to meatballs to stir-fry to a casserole.

Let's look at a few facts about the new lamb.

First, only about 56 percent of the fat in lamb is saturated. The rest is mono- or polyunsaturated. Polyunsaturated fats actually help to lower the blood cholesterol level. Saturated fats are the culprits which tend to raise these levels—and monounsaturated fats don't seem to have much effect.

What all this rigmarole translates into is that lamb only has 3.4 grams of saturated fat per three ounces of roast leg of lamb. Monounsaturated fat equals about 2.2 grams and polyunsaturated—.2 grams.

Using a method of cooking that won't add fat to your meat and trimming off the easily removed fat (there is no "marbling" in lamb) will help you enjoy your red meat and still keep your cholesterol levels in check.

"But I don't know how to cook lamb!"

That fear can easily be put to rest. Lamb is extremely easy—and fast—to cook. Gone are the days of long cooking times, and microwaving suits lamb perfectly.

The main thing to remember is to use lower temperatures when roasting, panfrying or panbroiling. Because of its natural tenderness, lamb is also a natural for barbecuing and roasting.

### Lamb symposium Oct. 19

The Far West Texas Lean Lamb Symposium will be held at the civic center in Ozona Oct. 19 with registration at 9 a.m. The symposium was planned and is being sponsored by the Extension Livestock and Range Committees in Crockett, Reagan, Upton and Glasscock Counties, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and American Sheep Industry.

Pre-registration by Oct. 7 is requested. A registration fee of \$10, which includes lunch, should be sent to Billy Reagor, Crockett County Agent, Box 969, Ozona, TX 76943.

Program subjects include: red meat production trends, lean lamb criteria, looking at the live lamb, live lamb evaluation, evaluating lambs with ultrasound, discussion of live lambs, lamb carcass fabrication, merchandising lean lamb, ASI Lamb Council lean lamb promotions, West Texas ewe types, rams for lean lamb production, feeding and sorting for lean lambs and a symposium summary.

To get you started, here's an easy recipe for lamb kabobs.

**Wine-basted Lamb Kabobs**  
1 1/2 lbs.. boneless lamb leg, cut in 1-inch cubes  
24 fresh cherry tomatoes  
24 fresh Chinese Pea Pods (or substitute bell pepper, cut in 1-inch pieces)

24 fresh or canned pineapple chunks in natural juice, drained  
1/2 cup bottled chili sauce  
1/2 cup (packed) brown sugar  
1/2 cup red wine  
2 T. fresh lemon juice  
1 T. dry mustard

Thread 12 skewers with lamb cube, pea pod, cherry tomato and pineapple; repeat, ending with lamb cubes. In small saucepan, combine remaining ingredients. Bring to boil, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat. Broil or grill kabobs 4 inches from source of heat, 8-10 minutes, turning frequently. Brush with sauce during final minutes of cooking. Makes 6 servings (2 kabobs each). A 3-ounce serving provides 174 calories from meat—301 total calories; and 78 mg. cholesterol.

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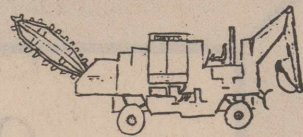

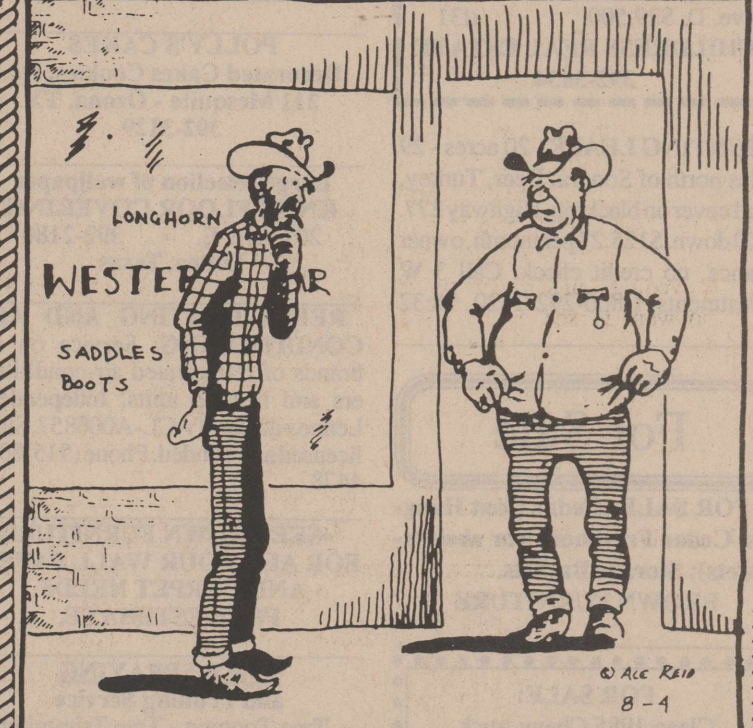
