## Lions thaw the Blizzards

Heavy rain and lightning delayed the Ozona-Winters game last week in Lion Stadium by two hours. The opening kickoff by Ozona was made at 10:15 p.m. Despite the delay, Ozona defeated the Blizzards 7 to 3.

Ozona's defense, led by Mark Fierro and Andy Stokes, came out strong. The Blizzards were soon stopped and Ozona got the ball. The Lions' running back found trouble holding on to the wet ball, giving it back to Winters.

Throughout the game the wet turf caused trouble for both sides. Yet the talent of both teams showed as they kept each other from scoring.

Toward the end of the second quarter the Winters Blizzards kicked a field goal to gain the lead, making the score Ozona 0, Winters 3.

As the third quarter began, heavy rain continued to fall, causing more trouble on both sides. The downpour slowed as the quarter ended.

The Lions soon shot out with its passing game as quarterback Chris

Denman fired the ball to Lonnie Martinez, Gilbert Rico and Mingo Perez, making use of his receivers.

Ozóna's offensive line also allowed running backs George Ybarra, Michael Ybarra and Lalo Rodriguez to gain needed yardage. Ybarra ran the ball in for a Lion score.

Ruben Borrego made the extra point, bringing the score to Ozona 7, Winters 3.

Winters soon lost the ball to Ozona, and the Lions ran the clock down, ending the game with an Ozona 7, Winters 3 score.

Although heavy rain and lightning delayed the game for two hours, Ozona fans remained at the field. This type of support always helps the players and gives them a reason to win, which showed Friday night.

The Lions will play in Big Lake Nov. 3 to defend a 3-0 district record. Big Lake's defeat by the Wall Hawks last week removes them from the running for the district championship.

Wall and Ozona will battle for the top spot in the district in Wall on Nov. 10.

A cold front brought an unofficial 3.25 inches of rain to Ozona Friday night. The heavy rain and accompanying lightning caused a two hour delay in the football game and hampered firefighters in their attempts to reach a burning tank battery.

The fire, which was reported at 6:37 p.m., on the Big State Ranch, is believed to have started about 2 p.m. The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department report shows that the head was blown from a metal tank when lightning struck.

One well heater, two metal tanks and one fiberglass tank were destroyed and a large amount of crude oil spilled.

Volunteer firemen could see the blaze, but had difficulty reaching the location. Two trucks and seven men made the call.

The official weather station equipment south of Ozona indicated 2.48 inches of rain Friday night.

Ranches south of Ozona reported another good rain accompanied by winds and small hail in the early hours Monday.

## Parks and Wildlife surveys county deer numbers

Wildlife personnel with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed annual deer population surveys here in Crockett County. The resulting population estimate, 41 deer per 1,000 acres or about 73,000 deer county wide, represents a decrease over last year's estimate.

This year in Crockett County the deer season opens on Saturday, November 4, and runs through Sunday, January 7. The bag limit is the same as last year - 4 deer, no more than 2 antlered bucks.

Most Crockett County landowners are already aware that, as has been the case for several years now, doe permits or special doe tags will not be issued nor required to harvest antlerless deer here in the Edwards Plateau. Hunters will need only the appropriate tag off of their hunting license, and landowner permission, to bag doe or antlerless deer in Crockett and the other "either-sex" counties this year.

After reviewing the results of the recent deer population surveys, local

wildlife personnel are recommending that Crockett County landowners located in the western two-thirds of the county try for a harvest of 1 doe or antlerless deer for every 300 acres and 1 buck for every 500 acres. Those landowners in the remaining one-third of the county should try for a harvest of 1 doe for every 100 acres and 1 buck for every 250 acres. The recommended rates result from the need to better balance the sex ratio observed in the herd and from a desire to produce a healthier deer population that is properly matched to the existing supply of deer foods in the county.

These general harvest rates are based on county averages and may not be completely suitable for each individual ranch in the county. Landowners interested in closely managing their local deer herd need to conduct their own on-site fall population surveys, with resulting harvest recommendations that meet their specific management objectives.

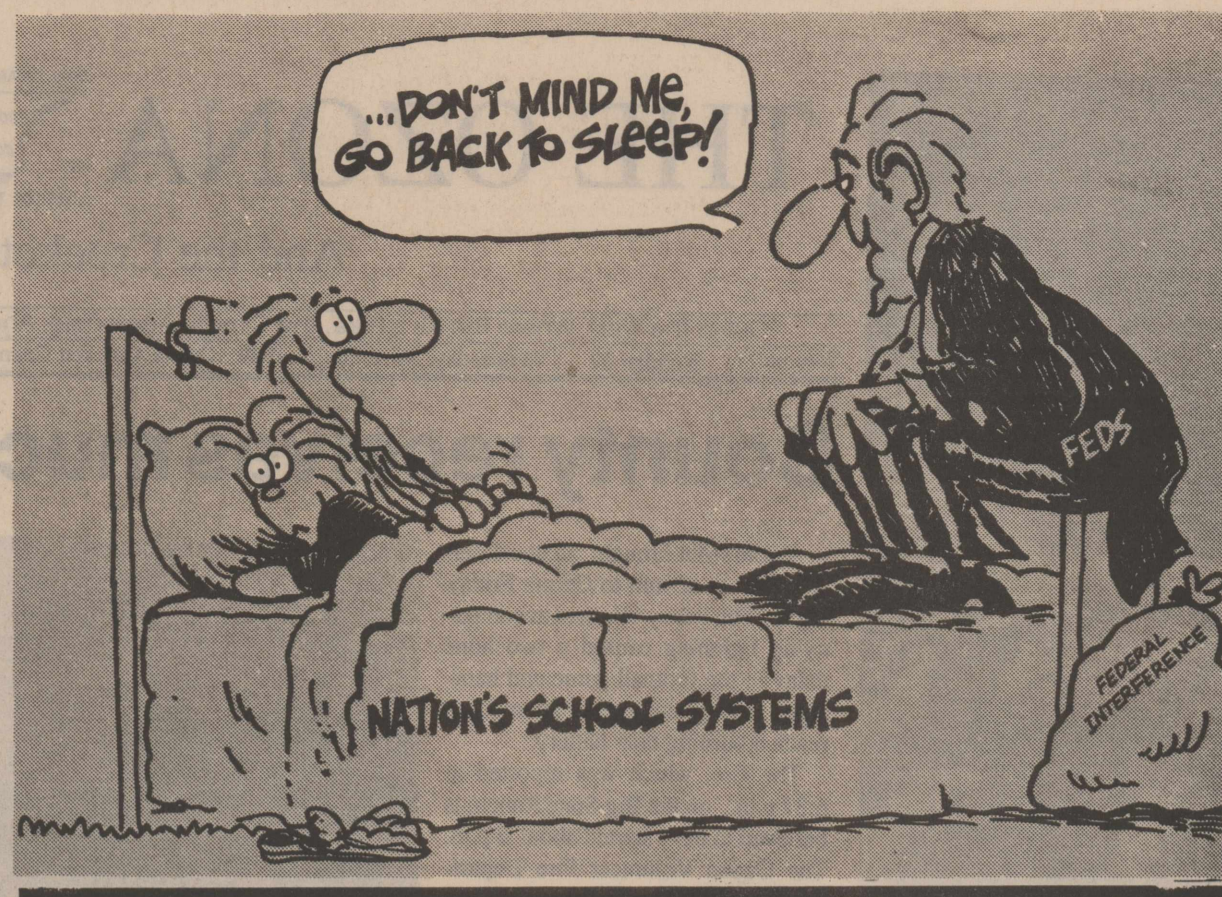

## Maness retires from classroom

A suggestion from a professor led religion major Joyce Maness into an education class, and "the first day in the classroom I knew that was it," said the former Ozona teacher.

Mrs. Maness retired this year, ending a career which began in 1952 in Liberty.

"I can't imagine anyone teaching and not loving it," said Mrs. Maness of her years in the profession.

The career she found so rewarding started with a third grade class she christened "My Little People". The pet name has applied to her classes since.

"They really are mine, for no matter where they go or what they become, that little part of them will always be mine. They have all richly blessed my life, and I want them to know how much I appreciate and love them."

Leaving the teaching profession on a good note was important to Mrs. Maness. Numerous eighth graders moving into high school this fall had been her students for four years. Some of the students were in her literature and theater arts classes three times a day.

At an end of school assembly last year, Mrs. Maness was honored by her class with the gift of a silver drop engraved with the words "Your Little People - We Love You". The students didn't know of her retirement plans, just that they were leaving the classroom of a beloved teacher.

Wanting to avoid any fuss over her departure, her retirement plans were not made public until sometime later.

Joyce Maness taught 26 years in Ozona schools, working with students in grades three, five, six, seven and eight. Her teaching was patterned after that of an instructor she once had who maintained, "If I could just show those kids they were loved, they would learn in spite of me."

Children in the early grades have too much put on them, stifling the excitement of learning, she believes. "Kids are too important to go through what the state is putting the schools through," she said. "If they'd just leave teachers alone, they'd get the job done."

"The first grade makes or breaks a school career in Mrs. Maness' opinion. "Those teachers are the most important people in the world and should be making three times the salary."

"The profession has been through so much criticism, but those teachers are actually controlling the world," she said.

Sharing the joys and sorrows of her career is rancher and businessman husband Weldon Maness. "Weldon was just as excited as I about their accomplishments. The most important influence in my teaching has been my family."

The Maness children were their mom's cheerleaders when she became discouraged, and they also shared in her successes.

Two of the children, Bobby Jack and Lynn, make their homes in Ozona. Lynn is married to Phillip Perner. Son Danny, his wife Margie and their sons Ben, Wade and Matthew live in San Angelo.

Children raise \$2,500 to fight lung disease

The Ozona Intermediate School and the second grade at the Primary School participated in the American Lung Association's Superspeller fundraising project. This project is designed to teach citizenship and an awareness of the needs of others while generating enthusiasm for spelling.

Dear Scotty and Linda,

This letter is to inform you about the school board meeting held on Oct. 10, 1989. I attended this meeting to discuss and make special requests for and about the dyslexia program in our schools. I noticed that the newspaper report did not mention anything about this two hour session (this was the second school board meeting that I had attended).

My purpose in this meeting was to request pay for the dyslexia teachers; a room for dyslexic and at risk students to be taught, especially a set of tapes from the Scottish Rite Hospital designed for dyslexics; and at least 50 minutes of teaching time per day as recommended by the current program adopted by the school.

At the end of 26 days of school the dyslexic program at the intermediate school had only had 4 and 1/2 hours of instruction. The reasons for this were varied: the first eight days in the schedule had not been complete; one day a piano tuner was in the same shared room; another eight days was dedicated to the dyslexia teacher testing another student.

Due to the time it took for a teacher to test one student the other six students went without instruction during that time. I strongly feel that if the school board purchased and used the tapes in our schools everybody involved would benefit.

Since the meeting some changes have taken place. On Oct. 24, a full 50 minutes of instruction started for these children. But, the teacher is being taken away from her regular classroom for 30 minutes a day to dedicate to this instruction. I received a note from the school that I am responsible for my child's studies in social studies, as she is taken from her regular classroom for 30 minutes a day and there is not enough time in school for her to be taught.

The children in dyslexia training were being taught from 3 until 3:30, during their activity period, now they attend class from 2:30 until 3:30. This is wonderful, but there are still some problems. The main ones being that the regular students of the dyslexia teachers must do without their teacher for 30 minutes of instruction every day while she instructs the dyslexic class. Another problem, but of lesser impact is the fact that there is not enough time for the children of the dyslexia program to be taught their other classes. They can be taught these studies at home, but is this how it should be?

I feel if the tapes were purchased and used to the best of their design it would be beneficial to the entire school system. The tapes are designed to be taught in a team teaching situation, with a teacher and an aide. If a child is

having difficulty with a particular problem the teacher can work with that child one on one and the aide can monitor the rest of the class.

The design of the tapes allows for greater flexibility and structure in teaching. Plus there are other advantages to the school in using the tapes from the Scottish Rite Hospital. The tapes and materials can be copied and used on all campuses. The Scottish Rite will come to Ozona and do an inservice for the teachers, as well as come out and help in testing for dyslexia. They will train our teachers and come to Ozona if our teachers need help. They will provide this service free. I view this as a tremendous boost to any school system. A team of professionals who are trained in this specific area would be available to us for diagnosing and recommending instruction for students and teachers.

If our teachers in Ozona are only able to teach until 3:30, an aide could monitor the first 30 minutes of class for dyslexia, while the teacher remains with her regular classroom. Then she could continue the last 30 minutes (the regular activity time). Due to the fact that teachers are not compensated for dyslexia teaching, working overtime without pay is not justifiable. Or, the teacher could be compensated and teach before or after school and remain with her regular classroom during their classtime.

According to the Texas Education Agency, dyslexia is part of the regular education program and not special education. The cost of these tapes is \$2,500.00 and can be paid in four installments of \$625.00 at the beginning of each semester for two years.

I strongly encourage the purchase of these tapes and the implementation of them as quickly as possible, so that our children can read and work independently and with self confidence, as is their right, and at the normal age of learning.

This letter has been written with the greatest of concerns for our education system and the betterment of our children.

### Venison jerky makes tasty holiday treat

If you're a great hunter, you may want to consider making a big batch of jerky for the holidays. When you're gritting your teeth in frustration over the Cowboys, you can try chewing a tasty bit of jerky instead!

With more than 20 million pounds of venison consumed annually by Americans, there's probably enough venison around for jerky-making.

Deer meat is a nutritious, lean meat that many of us enjoy. Of course, for the best jerky, good-quality meat is a necessity. Factors influencing meat quality include age (younger is better), sex (meat from does has a milder flavor), condition (well-fed and not in rut), and trauma associated with death (Instant or slow? Neck shots are best.)

Field dressing techniques are vital to good meat quality. The carcass should be field-dressed immediately, kept as clean as possible, and cooled as soon as possible. Young deer do not need to be aged; however, older deer should be aged one day for each year of age at 35 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

The fat has the gamey flavor; therefore, for a milder flavor be sure to remove all possible fat. It's important to remove the fascia or "silverskin" for a good product.

Of course, all your good care can go right out the window (where you'll probably want to toss the meat!) if you don't cook your venison properly. Using a moist cooking method or special techniques such as marinating, adding some type of fat or liquid when cooking, will pay big dividends when you sit down at the table.

As I mentioned, jerky is a terrific way to prepare venison - and you can

use some smaller pieces that aren't useful for other things. Be sure your meat is sliced thinly as possible, ACROSS the grain.

#### OVEN-DRIED JERKY

- 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. lean, boneless venison (or other red meat), partially frozen\*
- 1/4 c. soy sauce
- 1 T Worcestershire Sauce
- 1/4 t. pepper
- 1/4 t. garlic powder
- 1/2 t. onion powder
- 1 t. hickory smoke-flavored salt

\*Cut meat 1/4 to 1/8 inch thick; partial freezing helps in slicing.

In bowl, combine soy sauce, Worcestershire, pepper, garlic powder, onion powder and smoke-flavored salt. Stir until dissolved. Add meat strips and mix to coat all surfaces. Let stand 1 hour or refrigerate overnight.

Shake off excess liquid, arrange meat close together, placing on shallow pans and placing in oven.

Dry meat at its lowest temperature (150 degrees F to 200 degrees F) until brown, hard and dry (five hours for beef). Pat off beads of oil. Let cool and place in airtight container.
