## Lions boot Stanton out of playoffs

In their Friday night struggle against the Stanton Buffaloes, the Ozona Lions surpassed official expectations, tying the 15-point favorites 6-6, and winning 4-1 by penetrations. Ozona will now advance to the second round of playoffs. This contest will be held at 8 p.m. Friday in San Angelo Stadium where the Lions will face Albany, a 9-1-1 team from the Abilene area.

The Lions were in peak form Friday night in what Coach Don Payne referred to Monday as "one of our best efforts of the year." The defense, he said, "did real good at holding them all night, keeping us in the game long enough to get our scores."

Mark Fierro, Andy Stokes, Michael Ybarra and Isaac Leal led the defense in tackles. George Ybarra and Andy Stokes made key interceptions which put the Lions in good offensive positions. The Lions' defense as a whole proved to be a very effective barrier to the Buffaloes' offense.

The Lions provided a skillful offense on Friday, dominating the field for most of the night. Quarterback Chris Denman completed some important passes on third down, and was, according to Coach Payne, "on target most of the night". Coach Payne commended the offensive line as well for its effective blocking.

The Lions were also aided by Stanton's penalties. The Buffaloes received seven penalties - for a total loss of 59 yards. The Lions, as Coach Payne pointed out proudly, had only one penalty all night, for a total loss of five yards.

The first quarter was essentially a defensive battle, with neither side able to overcome the defense of the other. Ozona's Lonnie Martinez made a

promising 23-yard punt return half-way through the quarter, but the Lions were unable to capitalize on it.

Ozona put a drive together late in the first quarter, which included an impressive run by George Ybarra. The drive stalled on the Stanton 35, and a punt gave the Buffaloes possession on their own 15-yard line with only five seconds left in the quarter.

The second quarter began with the Stanton Buffaloes on their 18, with third down and six. The Buffaloes converted this to a first down, but were ultimately forced to punt from their 36-yard line.

Lonnie Martinez made a long return, starting the Lions off on the Ozona 42-yard line. Chris Denman completed a long pass to Sotero Fuentes, converting a third down, but the Lions' offense was stopped on succeeding plays and punted from the Ozona 40-yard line.

After effectively shutting down the Buffaloes' offense, Ozona mounted an impressive 45-yard drive which took them into distant field goal range. Michael Ybarra spearheaded the drive by breaking a series of almost-tackles and scrambling for 25 yards of gain. Lalo Rodriques moved the ball still further, with a solid 10-yard run. The field goal attempt was unsuccessful, and the Buffaloes took possession on their 25.

Stanton's third possession of the quarter was cut short when Andy Stokes picked off a pass on the Buffaloes' 43-yard line with 1:52 remaining in the first half. A series of plays took Ozona within field goal range, but once again, the attempt was missed.

At the beginning of the second half, the Stanton Buffaloes' possession ended when George Ybarra made Ozona's second interception of the night. This gave the Lions possession

at the Stanton 36-yard line with 9:06 left in the third quarter.

A long run by Lalo Rodriques and a 5-yard penalty against the Buffaloes helped put Ozona in field goal range once more. This time Borrego was right on the money with a 34-yard field goal. This made the score 3-0 Ozona, with 6:28 left in the third quarter.

After a 9-play, 63-yard drive, Stanton came up with a touchdown. The extra point attempt was blocked, however, making the score 6-3 Stanton, with 1:43 left in the third quarter.

Ozona responded with a 14-play, 55-yard drive which ended in a 31-yard Borrego field goal. With 6:38 remaining in the game, Ozona was tied with Stanton 6-6.

A final missed field goal attempt late in the game proved irrelevant. Ozona's control of the playing field paid off in the end, with a 4-1 victory by penetrations.

The bi-district trophy was awarded after the game by Stephen Williams on behalf of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

Being mounted on the dark chestnut gelding, AM Royal Rive, the two have been an exciting team bringing roars from the spectators and a pile of trophies to Lee's collection.

Lee has been an active member of the Alamo Arabian Horse Association for a number of years. 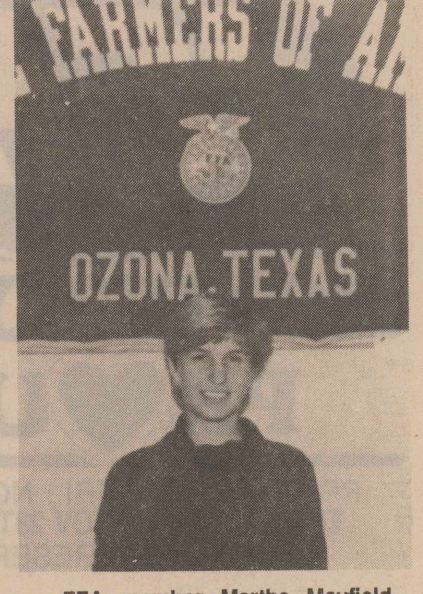

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## Lest we forget.....

For a couple of weeks now we have been witnessing exciting and momentous changes in eastern Europe and, in particular, East Germany. A couple of months ago we would not have believed such things to be possible. They say as folks grow older they tend to reminisce a lot; I am no exception and for several days I have been drifting back in time to school days in England and in particular to the summer of 1936.

As my second foreign language after French, I chose German instead of Latin (two foreign languages were compulsory subjects). Our German teacher came from Germany and through her I obtained a correspondent in that country -- a school girl like myself and six months older than I. This eventually led to an exchange of visits in 1936. Leonie Kohl came to my family first, then I returned with her, by boat and train through Belgium, for six weeks in her home in the city of Halle-an-der-Saale, about 60 miles from Leipzig in, what is now, East Germany. Little did I realize that I was in the midst of history in the making.

Adolf Hitler had been in power for three years and, by this time, he seemed to have won the full confidence of the people who showered him with unreserved adulation. Germany had been the victim of gross unemployment and their economy was in chaos. They were ready for someone to come along and promise them the moon. Hitler seemed to have made their day-to-day living a lot easier; the construction of the Reichs Autobahn (similar to our interstate highways) was giving employment to thousands of Germans. Herr Kohl, my host, was a civil engineer on this project. The

young men, after completing high school, were conscripted into the Labor Corps for, I think, about nine months, followed by a two year compulsory stint in the army. Life for the average German was becoming good in comparison with the past, and this is why they looked upon Hitler as their savior, leaning on his every word and believing him implicitly.

In 1936 war was the farthest thing from my mind, so I was surprised, when in Halle, they put on a huge 2-day air raid exercise. Everyone had to have their windows blacked out at night, and if a light was shown there followed a fine of 30 marks which was quite a lot back then. The air raid sirens wailed at various times during the day and night, and if one was caught down town, it was a matter of being herded into the many underground air raid shelters until the "all clear" sounded. At night there were searchlights everywhere sweeping the skies and picking up the war planes flying overhead. There was the firing of anti-aircraft guns, with blanks I assumed. The streets were without lighting, and it was a sort of adventure for a group of us - Leonie, her friends and I - to go out into the neighborhood and try to find our way around. Fun? Maybe, but it all gave me an uneasy feeling, and I finally asked what all

these preparations were for. The quick reply was "Ach! Die Russe kommen", or something like that (the Russians are coming). This was the story Hitler was giving them to cover his real plans.

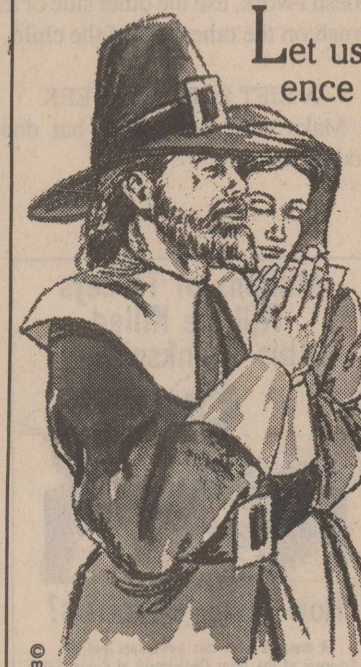
The young people were all very politically minded as Nazi dogma was taught in the schools; they learned of the "injustice" of the Treaty of Versailles. I was often asked if I did not think Kenya should be returned to Germany (this was German East Africa before World War I and became British). They were constantly talking of the need for "lebensraum", a favorite subject of Hitler's meaning living space, probably to condition them for his later aggression against neighboring countries. Sometimes I would be asked, "Who do you prefer in my head! I did know that Stanley Baldwin was our Prime Minister at the time. Churchill's rise to greatness was yet to come. Certainly I felt at a disadvantage with such political speculation -- the most I knew was that on election days, if our parents were Conservatives (Tory) we wore blue ribbon rosettes on our school uniforms, which happen to be the majority in my school, but there was

a sprinkling of red rosettes (Liberal Party) and green rosettes (Labor or Socialist).

Sometimes I would be asked if my father was a Free Mason - Hitler had banned their activities in Germany, as he had many organizations; I think he saw any group of people as a threat against his power, and he used the "divide and conquer" technique rather successfully, setting one group against another as is common in all totalitarian countries.

There was great stress being placed on physical fitness. There was the Hitler youth organizations for boys and for girls, each resplendent in their uniforms with Swastikas much in evidence.

Hitler was constantly raving and ranting about the Jews; he placed most of the blame on them for the country's plight when he came to power. Later synagogues were burned to the ground, and we all know how ultimately millions of Jews were carried off from

### Holiday stress for non-traditional families

The Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays can be a source of joy — and of stress — for single-parent and step-families.

The divorce and re-marriage statistics tell us that there are a high percentage of non-traditional families in every community. Thirteen percent of all children under 18 now live in a stepfamily; 17 percent live in single parent families.

Even on television sit-coms, non-traditional families are now the norm. Yet parents and children in these families often feel "different," especially around the holidays.

One reason is that most of us have strong, idealized images of the holidays, with mom roasting the turkey, dad fixing a fire and the whole family happily gathered together at grandmother's house. These images have been reinforced through decades of advertisements, songs, movies and television. Children in step-families or single parent families may see this as sharp contrast to their own situation.

Children should not feel like they are alone or the only person experi-

encing this stress. One of the best antidotes is simply to talk about it. For younger children, check the library for books about non-traditional families that you can read together. This will give you a common ground for discussing feelings.

Well in advance of the holidays, decide where and how children and stepchildren will spend their time without placing them in the middle of disagreements among ex-spouses, parents and stepparents.

Remember that the bonds in step-families often grow to be very strong. As a result, a child may miss stepbrothers or sisters and feel sad about missing the family celebration when he or she spends the holidays with the noncustodial parent.

Parents and stepparents may need to talk with children and help them deal with these feelings. Sometimes, the noncustodial parent will recognize that children want to be at home over the holiday itself, and will make arrangements for a visit before or after their child's stepfamily celebration.

If necessary, remind relatives that children and stepchildren should be treated similarly. These courtesies should extend to gift-giving, family celebrations and ceremonies, family pictures on Christmas cards and other activities.

### Time is running out

The following letter from Mr. Milton Hertz, Administrator, USDA-ASCS, is important to all producers. The deadline for developing a Conservation Compliance Plan is Dec. 31, 1989. This plan for highly erodible crop land must be developed by the Soil Conservation Service for producers to remain eligible for Wool and Mohair Incentives, Crop Program Payments, Federal Crop Insurance, and other USDA Programs.

Dear Producer:

The conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985 (the Law) provides that anyone who farms highly erodible cropland must develop a conservation plan for the land and have it approved by the local soil conservation district by Dec. 31, 1989, in order to remain eligible for many USDA farm program benefits.

Producers who do not have an approved plan will be giving up USDA program benefits on not only their highly erodible acres, but on all of the land they farm. Program benefits include not only price supports and commodity-related payments from ASCS, but also federal crop insurance and Farmers Home Administration loans.

Remember, cropland in the Conservation Reserve Program is in compliance. And, we anticipate additional Conservation Reserve Program sign-up periods.

Nationwide about 65% of farmers participating in USDA crop programs have already obtained approval of their conservation plans. I commend those producers. Nevertheless, I am still concerned about the thousands of farmers who will need a plan to remain eligible for USDA program benefits.

If you have highly erodible cropland, you must have a conservation plan by Dec. 31, or you will be ineligible for farm program participation until you have a plan approved. Time is running on, so don't let it run out on your program benefits.

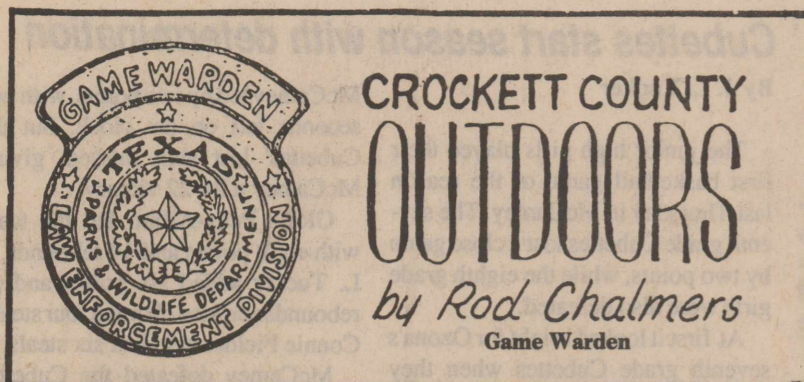
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## Let's go hunting son

About thirty years ago, a Texas Game Warden by the name of Gene Ashby decided that deer hunting should not be limited to only the privileged—that the forgotten, abandoned, or abused kids of our society should experience the thrills of a deer hunt of their own. That marked the beginning of a tradition that came to be known as Operation Orphans, at a place that came to be known as Camp Gene Ashby in Mason County. And about five years ago another Texas Game Warden figured that anything they could do in Mason County could just naturally be done in Crockett County. That marked the beginning of another tradition that came to be known as the West Texas Boys Ranch/Texas Game Warden Association Youth Deer Hunt, at the Perry Ranch in Crockett County. The weekend of Nov. 10-12 was the occasion for the fifth annual hunt for 10 boys that otherwise might not know the joys of a weekend with a "hunting dad" on a ranch abounding with deer and turkey.

If the Game Wardens claim to be the originators of such a program, they can't take the credit for perpetuation of the tradition. That credit has to go to the unselfish people of the communities where these events take place—folks like Gene and Betty Perry, who donate their deer and ranch for charity instead of income from commercial hunting—folks like W. D. Haire, who administers and oversees the whole weekend—folks like Charley Boy Davidson and some big-hearted people from Eden, who buy the groceries for 25 or more people for six big meals—folks like Harvey Hill, who use their vacation time to slave in the kitchen cooking for such an army of appetites—and folks like the 10 men from our community that give our only un-replaceable commodity, our time, so that 10 boys can have someone to put an arm around them and say, "let's go huntin', son."

And hunting they did go! To the tune of 10 deer and two turkeys... and a little extra ammunition.

So what's so special about this hunt...what separates it from the others? Well, let's call it emphasis. That emphasis is not on how much game is taken, but rather on the fellowship between a man and a boy, and a communion with nature—the land—the wildlife. The hunt is not measured by the sag of the game pole at the end of day, but rather by a smile on a face or the sparkle in an eye of a youngster who got a chance to see "the other side of life." The peace of a glowing campfire. The silence of the hills at twilight. The beauty of a blazing sunset. The mystery of God's creation. The excitement and suspense of the anticipation of a big buck or a fat doe. And, finally, the reward of patience and perseverance. If these are the true measures of the success of a hunt, then the Fifth Annual WTBR/TGWA Youth Deer Hunt was indeed a success.

The youngsters who participated in this year's hunt were Roger Kirshbaum, Mark Colon, Stormy Ashley, Jimmy Montenez, Scott Killam, Darrell Sharp, Junior Salinas, Ricky Jones, Marshall Craker, and Chad Guerra. Their hunting partners were Jack Probst, Vance Worthington, Buddy Hooper, Armondo Arredondo, Bob Harris, Lane Scott, Dee Keilers, James Montgomery, Randy Wilson, and David Tijerina.

As anyone knows who's ever tried to organize a project such as this, the most important link in the chain has got to be the cook. Captain Harvey Hill of the Crockett County Sheriff's Department has fed this group for the last five years, and we believe the grazin's better each year. Harvey not only does the cooking, but he also plans the menu, hauls groceries, ac-

quires donations of food, and lines up all the kitchen help. His crew this year consisted of friends, Fred and Clay Garcia from the San Antonio area, Jose Hernandez, Eduardo Cervantez and Fleet Worthington of Ozona.

The grocery bill for this project is monumental, but some generous folks rose to the occasion and donated enough to cover it. Our own Charley Boy Davidson absorbed a large part of the expense, and the balance was provided by a group of people from Eden through the efforts of Game Warden Mike Hutchinson. This group has been making donations to the Texas Game Warden Association, to be used in youth functions such as this, in keeping with their adopted slogan of "help a boy become a man." One nice couple over there asked to remain anonymous, and the rest of the gang consists of A. R. (Rusty) Taylor of the Eden Police Department, and Calvin and Silyia Hyles of Eden Chevron. Other out-of-town donors were Robert and Big Nix and Ed and Little Templeton of Robert Lee, who donated all the fish fillets that 33 people could eat on a Saturday night. We really thank all of these neighbors for helping us help the boys.

We should probably count Cecil Buckner of Texaco, Inc., as part of the kitchen staff, because his donation of paper/plastic ware kept the dishwashers from having to spend all night in the kitchen. And David Pagan provided the ice used to cool down the cold drinks and candy was provided by the Ozona Lions Club. And as a capper, Buck and Granny Williams of

Ozona home-baked enough pies and cakes to satisfy the sweet tooth of any 12-year-old boy...and add five pounds to any 45 year old boy!

Lest it should sound like all we did was eat, we'll give you a rundown on the weekend's activities. The boys were brought to the Perry Ranch by WTBR House Parents Wyatt Misener and Larry Barber and then filled up on venison and gravy. After a conservation talk and explanation of game laws from Game Wardens Rod Chalmers, Al Vielma, and J. C. Flores, the boys retired to the bunkhouse to get acquainted with their hunting partners...and talk half the night about deer hunting. (There's always more deer shot inside the bunkhouse than outside!) Saturday morning saw a session at the rifle range to familiarize the boys with their rifles, then off to the hunting blinds for the first try. Two turkeys later, the group ate lunch and were then treated to a fancy shooting exhibition by Crockett County Sheriff Jim Wilson. The evening hunt produced a few deer, followed by that memorable fish fry mentioned earlier. The campfire blazed until eyelids got heavy, and one more short night ran into the Sunday morning hunt. A few more deer, some bucks this time, and all too soon it was time to say goodbye and send our little friends back to Boys Ranch. We could only hope that they got as much out of the weekend as we did. We did notice that an 11 point buck can make a kid's chest swell up to about twice its normal size!

On a final note of credit, what can you say about men who would give an entire weekend of their lives to help a boy they really don't even know? Knowing only that they might help an attitude, give a little hope, or instill a value that might help that young person later in life. It can best be described by the slogan used at Operation Orphans (we didn't figure they'd mind if we borrowed it for the occasion)....

"No man stands so tall as when he stoops to help a boy"

A joint meeting of the Crockett County Hospital board of directors and commissioners court has been scheduled for Nov. 27 at 6:45 p.m. in the district court room.

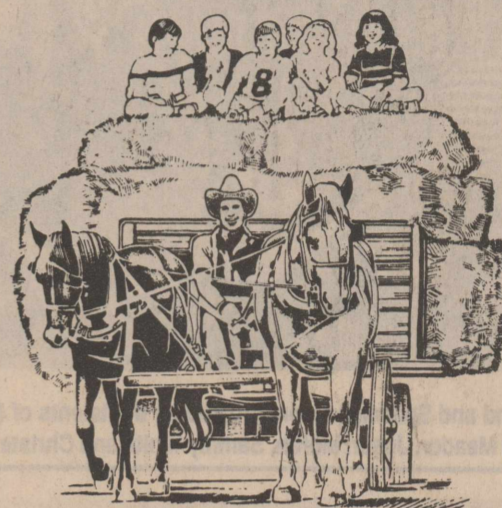
According to the agenda, after the meeting is opened there will be an announcement of executive session for the purpose of discussing A. contracts and B. personnel, hospital board members.

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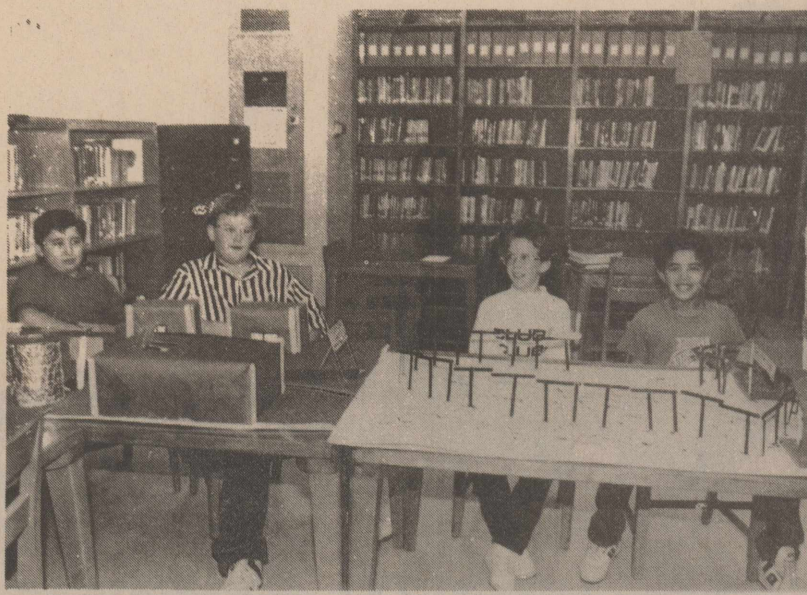

The girls will travel to Sonora Monday with the seventh grade starting first at 5.

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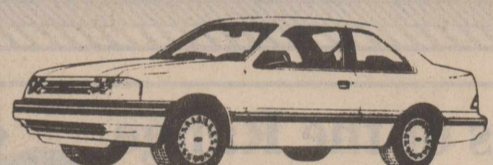
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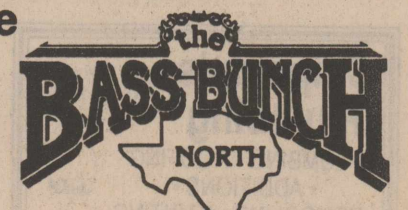

who worked nights was trying to sleep and had become sufficiently irate to call the police about the piano playing. Much to my relief nothing was mentioned about the Jewish composer!

While Leonie was at school, sometimes I would meet with an English girl I had met at several of the functions. We are, incidentally, still good friends. One day we met downtown to do a little shopping. Betty asked me if I had been forbidden to go to a certain cafe in the corner of the square. I had, indeed. Neither one of us had been given a reason for this, so, naturally, we had to find out for ourselves. We located the cafe, and feeling very adventurous we went into the somewhat darkened room from the bright sunlight. At first glance we thought we were the only ones in there, selected a table and ordered coffee and cake. As our eyes became accustomed to the rather dim interior we noticed that sitting along the wall on the opposite side of the room was a dozen or so rather sleezy looking females, and they were all examining us with some interest and less than friendly looks. Then we noticed a man would come in, speak to the waiter at the end of the room, and then would take one of the women and vanish through a curtained doorway. It took two or three times for this to happen before Betty and I, in our young innocence, finally realized that there was something strange going on. We hastily paid our bill and rushed outside. We had, obviously, stumbled into some sort of house of ill repute! The mystery was solved. We never told our hosts of our experience.

Another day we went to a huge Nazi youth rally to celebrate the opening of a new stadium in Halle. It was very impressive of course, and during the march flag bearers were carrying the German flag replete with huge swastika. The Kohls insisted that I should give the Nazi salute (outstretched arm) or I would draw unwelcome attention to them. I hate to admit that I felt forced to oblige not wanting to offend my hosts.

Herr Kohl had lost an arm in World War I and Frau Kohl told of the deprivation and starvation they went through during the last months of that war and after the armistice...she said it was impossible to get milk for Leonie and if there was ever another war she would kill herself as she could not go through that again. Perhaps, deep down, she was also a little nervous

about all these war-like preparations.

In 1938 Leonie visited us again in England; she was so changed, it was hard to believe that she was the same friend of two years ago. She was very critical of everything, very arrogant and very rude to my parents and I. She seemed highly nervous and was constantly trying to find German stations on the radio. It was about the time of Hitler's invasion of the Sudetenland (northern Czechoslovakia) and perhaps she thought that he would finally incite the wrath of the British and she might be stranded. We had some Royal Air Force stations nearby where they were training officers to fly, and every time she heard planes going over, she would rush out, gaze at the skies, come in with her head in the air announcing "ours are better than yours!"

We took her on vacation with us to the Welsh coast and one day made friends with three young men on the beach. It turned out that they were Jewish and started to ask Leonie why Hitler was being so hard on the Jews. She would give no answer, and flounced off. Next day I met them again, and she was extremely angry with me for associating with Jews! The Nazis had done their deadly work, to be sure. I was so shocked at the change in her, I was loath to continue our correspondence after she returned home, but I was still writing to others that I had met, until the war started on Sept. 3, 1939.

Did I think about my former friends during the war years? Yes, I sometimes wondered as during my service in the RAF I would be tracking enemy planes on my radar screen and guiding our fighters to intercept them, whether any of them were manning those planes, but I did not allow myself to dwell on it.

Could the catastrophic events of the thirties ever happen again? Possibly. We should be ever wary and alert, because when any country is down and out, there could well be another Hitler awaiting in the wings to strut across the world stage.

Once again, we live in unusual times. East Germany is moving rapidly toward freedom, and I want to think that perhaps the grandchildren of those I once knew are celebrating atop the Berlin Wall. That would be very nice.

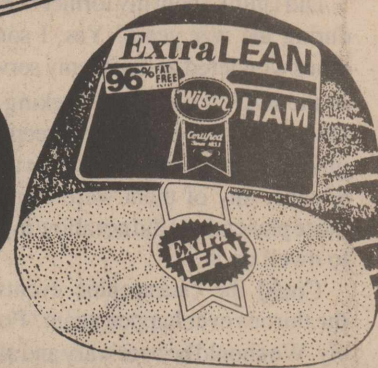

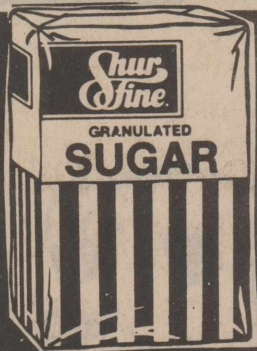

### Board approves bids

The Ozona School Board, in its regular meeting Wednesday, Nov. 15, approved a bid, subject to approval of specifications, from Track Masters of Dallas to recondition the all-weather track located at Lion Stadium. The track will be cleaned of all dirt, grease, oil, stains, and other foreign materials, and all cracks and low or worn spots will be repaired prior to the installation of a latex running surface on the track, the high jump pad, pole vault, and long jump runway.

The latex surface is expected to last approximately eight to 10 years and will be much easier to maintain than the existing resolute surface. The resurfacing project is expected to begin during the first week in December and will be completed in about a month. Other bids on the project were received from Southwestern Track Builders, Abell-Dougherty Contractors, and Marathon Track.

In other bid items the trustees approved a bid from Iraan Motors for a new pickup truck for the school system's vocational agriculture department, and they approved the selling of a 1982 Chevrolet. Bids on the vocational agriculture pickup were also received from Jim Bass Ford, Mustang Chevrolet, Schumann-Duwe Ford, Ivey Motor Company, Lubke Chevrolet, Sonora Ford, Cecil Atkisson Chevrolet, and Glasscock Chevrolet.

Curtis Keith, school maintenance supervisor, met with the board to discuss federal requirements for complying with the Hazardous Communications Law and the Underground Storage Tank Law. Following

discussion of these two laws, the members voted to purchase computer software to maintain records required by the HCL and to proceed with the removal of an old fuel tank located in front of Davidson Gymnasium.

During the meeting the trustees also voted to have an employee appreciation dinner during the present school year, and they approved an agreement between the district and Iraan I.S.D. for servicing the district's Iraan route bus at Iraan's school bus maintenance facility.

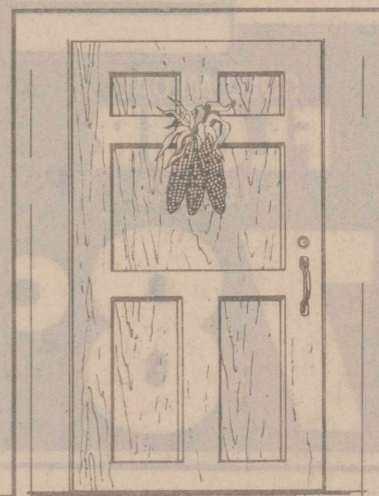

fined \$500 and assessed a \$1,500 restitution fee for court appointed council.

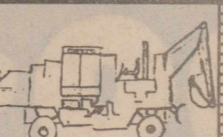

**Fetal alcohol syndrome**

Eminent anthropologist, gifted novelist, Dartmouth professor, husband and writing partner of Louise Erdrich - Michael Dorris would seem to have it all. Yet every day for nearly 20 years he has coped with the anxiety, frustration and pain of raising a damaged child. Tragically, it's a disability that didn't have to happen.

Michael Dorris, the author of "A Yellow Raft in Blue Water" and an expert on native Americans, tells the deeply moving story of his adopted son, Adam, who suffers from Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, in "The Broken Cord".

The U. S. surgeon general and the American Medical Association recently stated that there is no safe level of alcohol consumption for a woman during pregnancy - a fact unknown in 1971 when Michael Dorris became one of the first unmarried men in the U. S. to legally adopt a very young child, an affectionate Sioux Indian he named Adam. At the time, little was revealed about Adam's past, except that his biological mother had died of alcohol poisoning.

The past two decades have been a time of alarming discovery about FAS, both for the growing Dorris family (through the single-parent adoption of two more infants, and a 1981 marriage to writer Louise Erdrich, which has produced three more children) and for the international medical community. Findings about the genetic and cultural causes of FAS - and the enormous scope of the problem (thousands of physically and behaviorally impaired children born each year) - parallel one father's unceasing battle to solve his eldest son's developing health and learning problems.

"The Broken Cord" is a chilling

account of the devastating effects of this disease. Dorris offers evidence that just a small amount of alcohol can effect a fetus: Adam's mother drank herself to death, but even one glass of wine during pregnancy could do crucial damage.

But this is also a moving personal story. Beautifully written, it is, ultimately, a powerful tale about a family, a father's love and "the possibilities that illuminate life within even such painfully narrow horizons". - from Publishers Weekly

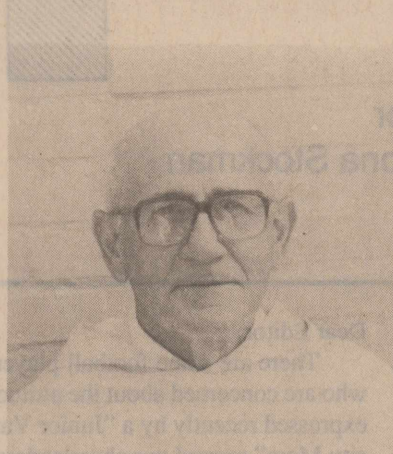

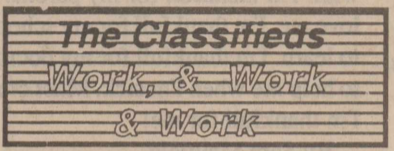

their homes to the ghastly concentration camps. There was a lot of graffiti on walls and on stores owned by Jews downgrading them and their faith. Hitler was attempting to create a super race, a super white race because, in his sick mind, only the white race was pure. They say if one is told something day in and day out one finally believes, and this would appear to have been the case in Nazi Germany.

I met some lovely, friendly people and young folks of both sexes, and a teen-age girl was bound to be impressed with these muscular, handsome young men!

At the same time that I was in Halle, there were other visiting groups of students from Britain, usually with their teachers. Leonie and I were often included in their local tours, parties and dances put on by the German youth, so we really had a lot of fun. One evening we were invited to a dance at a military academy where young Waffen S. S. officers were receiving training. These were Hitler's specially chosen elite. Unfortunately these were the men who were guilty of so many atrocities in the years to come. How these lovely, intelligent young men could carry out such orders so willingly, I will never really understand.

The Kohl family gave me a wonderful time; I was given the choice of a week traveling in Bavaria and to many historical spots, or two days at the Olympic Games in Berlin. I chose the former and was very glad that I did because it was a fantastic learning experience. When we were in Weimar, the Goethe and Schiller town where both poets were born, little did I know that there was a concentration camp nearby - such a contradiction of culture ... so much beauty and so much horror.

I remember in particular a couple of humorous incidents. At Leonie's request I had taken some popular and classical piano music with me. Upon arrival she examined it all very carefully and noticed I had included some music by Mendelssohn. She told me I could not play this because he was a Jew and if I did, I would be in bad trouble. I guess that was as good as a dare to me! After all, I was British, I could play what I darned well pleased!

It was a very warm day, the windows were open and Leonie was in school. Within minutes there was a loud banging on the front door. I peeked through the curtains and there stood a uniformed police officer! My heart sank - I just knew I was about to be arrested. It transpired that a neighbor
