Court honors retiring fire chief

Dorris Haire, Ozona's fire chief for 19 years, received a surprise at commissioners' court Monday when he was presented with a watch, resolution commending his service and a cake.

Gratitude for Haire's service was expressed by Judge Kathryn Mayfield and the court as he nears retirement Dec. 31.

"Old chiefs don't die, they just go up in smoke" was the message on his cake.

Commissioners voted to allow repairs on the motor grader clutch and approved purchase of a water trailer for the road department.

Commissioners discussed preparation of cemetery plots in the new section at Cedar Hill. The area, which is solid rock, needs to be dug up and prepared before lots are sold. Further information will be presented at a later meeting.

The second Monday of each month was designated as the meeting day for the 1990 term of commissioners court.

Court members went into executive session to discuss names submitted for addition to the hospital board. After resuming open meeting, the court voted to add Concha Zapata, Cecil Buckner, and John Daniels to the hospital board.

Monthly reports were heard from Eddie Moore, Road Department; Onecimo Ortiz, Parks Department; Sheriff Jim Wilson, Garland Young, civic and youth center; Louise Ledoux, library; Bill Boswell, hospital and care center.

Following the library report, the court voted to accept Donnie York as a new board member. He replaces Sherry York, who has served two terms.

New library board officers are: Elliott Barrera, president; Chesta Stuart, vice president; and Marilyn Cox, secretary.

Local library joins Texas system

The Crockett County Public Library was recently accredited as a member of the Texas Library System, according to William D. Gooch, director and librarian of the Texas State Library.

"We are pleased to award a certificate of system membership in recognition of the efforts this community has made in providing public library services," said Gooch. "It is a symbol of having achieved a level of excellence."

Crockett County Public Library is a member of the Big Country Library System and serves all citizens of Crockett County. CCPL had to meet strict criteria, according to Librarian Louise P. Ledoux, such as hours of

access, professional staffing requirements, number of library materials, and local per capita support to become an accredited member. Public libraries must apply and qualify for system membership annually.

System membership entitles CCPL to important free state services such as interlibrary loan of books and materials, access to an extensive film library, equipment, funds for books and much more. "System membership is one of the most important funding and technical support sources for our small library and enables us to offer our patrons much better library service," said Mrs. Ledoux.

Authorized by the Library Systems Act of 1969, the Texas Library System was developed to improve library service in the state through cooperative efforts. Comprised of 10 regions, the statewide system provides an opportunity for local libraries to make the best possible use of both their own resources and those available elsewhere in the system. These cooperative efforts are made possible through state and federal funds appropriated to the Library Development Program of the Texas State Library. This year the Texas State Library will distribute about eight million dollars to the 10 library systems.

Area sheriffs meet Sen. Gramm, discuss drug war

Sheriffs from Rankin, Big Lake and Ozona met with Sen. Phil Gramm last week in Big Lake to discuss drug abuse and answer questions from a crowd of 30-40 citizens.

Steps being taken in these communities to address the problem of substance abuse were outlined by the sheriffs before Gramm spoke on the war on drugs from the Washington angle.

The senator's approach includes drug education for youth with the assurance that offenders will be arrested and punished, said Sheriff Jim

Wilson in an interview Friday. Gramm favors the zero tolerance policy used by the Federal government. Emphasizing that users are criminals as well as pushers, he believes they should be dealt with accordingly, Wilson said. Gramm reported that for the first time in five years, Congress has not cut budget funds for the war on drugs. Six million dollars had previously been allocated for use in Texas. This year's budget earmarked 26 million for Texas' war on drugs, and 40 million will be slated for Texas in the next budget year, Gram said. Some of the

money is allocated for area drug task forces.

Sen. Gramm commented that as a nation we have just now become a unified group in fighting drug abuse. "Don't lose faith; don't be disheartened," Gramm said. The senator believes that collectively we will find a solution.

"I was very impressed that Sen. Gramm would show concern for small West Texas communities and come and talk with us about our problems," Wilson said.

Gramm believes in working compassionately with young people, but also takes a hard line on punishment, Wilson said.

Sheriff Wilson learned from Sheriff Dan Brown of Rankin and Sheriff Paul Weatherby of Big Lake that those communities are "not doing much different than we are" in their efforts to curb drug abuse. Wilson spoke of the Just Say No club in Ozona Schools and the group newly organized to combat substance abuse during his portion of the forum.

4-H lambs stolen, slaughtered

Two show lambs belonging to Dario Porras and Roberta Ortiz were stolen from the 4-H Barn Dec. 6. Both youngsters had two lambs for the upcoming stockshow season, and both exhibitors were entered in the Houston show. "This will really cut their chances," said Nancy Hale, secretary of the County Extension Office.

Investigating officers found where the sheep had been killed in the pasture behind the barn and transported across the interstate. The investigation led officers to a residence on Piedra Street where the sheep carcasses were recovered.

Two suspects, Nino C. Tambunga, age 23, and David L. Gonzales, age 25, were arrested on two counts each of theft of livestock.

Officers seized a 1979 Chevrolet pickup which was used in the theft.

Theft of livestock is a felony offense, and the case will be referred to the Crockett County Grand Jury.

AMAX Oil & Gas opens Ozona office

OZONA, TX., DEC. 13...AMAX Oil & Gas Inc. today will hold the grand opening of its new Ozona District Production Office. The new facility will be the headquarters for Amax's drilling and production operations in the Crockett County area where the company has interests in more than 330 wells, of which 279 are operated by Amax. Otis Holt is the District Superintendent for the Ozona District.

Amax Oil & Gas said the opening of the new office is directly tied to its plan to increase its presence in the Ozona area, where it currently employs 29 non-operated wells with Kerr

McGee, J. Cleo Thompson and American Exploration. Additional drilling is scheduled for 1990.

In association with its production activities, Amax owns a 62.5% interest in and operates the Ozona Gas Processing Plant. The company recently increased its ownership in the plant through the acquisition of Enron's 25% interest. Jody Conaway is Superintendent at the plant.

The grand opening of the new Ozona District Office will be attended by local and county officials as well as leading area landowners and ranchers. Representing Amax Oil & Gas headquarters in Houston will be Lloyd

L. Parks, President and Chief Executive Officer; Jeff Robinson, Vice President of Production and Engineering; Bruce Peters, Vice President of Finance; Ernest Bodden, Vice President of Marketing; and Paul Traeger, Manager of Plant and Pipeline Operations.

Amax Oil & Gas Inc. is a wholly owned subsidiary of New York-based AMAX Inc., a worldwide supplier of metals and energy. Its major products are aluminum, coal, gold, molybdenum and oil and gas. AMAX has assets of \$4.2 billion and in 1988 had sales of \$3.9 billion and net earnings of \$741 million.

Hospital district legislation approved

Legislation enabling Crockett County to conduct a hospital district election cleared a final hurdle last week with approval by the U. S. Department of Justice.

County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos received notification Thursday that the Justice Department had approved S.B. 526 previously passed by the Texas Legislature.

The notification of approval from James P. Turner, acting assistant Attorney General of the Civil Rights Division, said that the Attorney General has no objections to the changes in question. The letter continues by pointing out that "failure of the Attorney General to object does not bar any subsequent judicial action

to enjoin the enforcement of such changes."

Crockett County's hospital district legislation has been okayed twice by the State Legislature. The first bill was rejected by the Justice Department in 1987 on an objection to the at-large method of board member selection.

After revisions which included election of three directors at large and four from single-member districts to serve two-year, staggered terms, the bill was again approved by the Legislature in 1989.

Justice Department approval is required on legislation pertaining to elections in southern states under the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

An election must be called within five years after Legislative approval or the enabling act expires. Elections may be called by a majority of temporary directors, by presentation of a petition signed by at least 100 qualified voters, or by the Crockett County Commissioners Court.

Customers may register at these downtown stores all week for prizes to be given away at these stores on Saturday. No purchase is necessary and you do not have to be present to win.

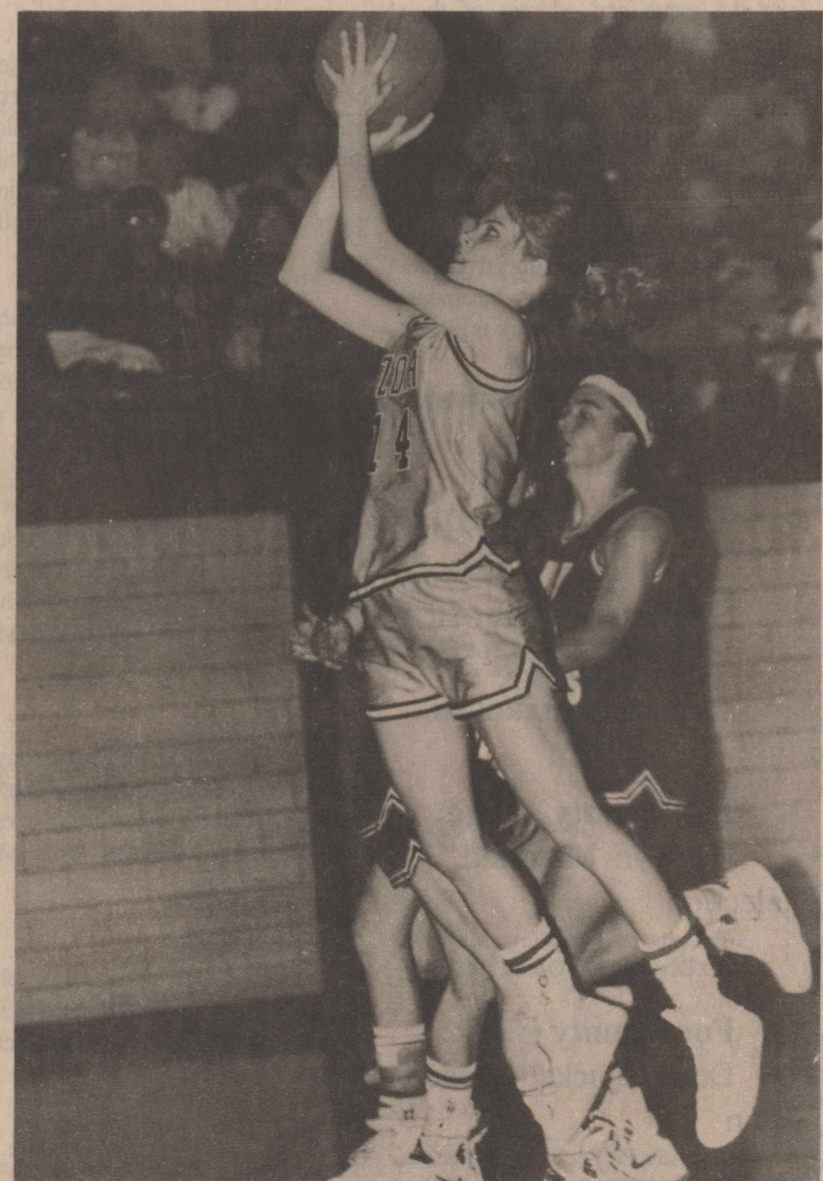
Santa needs his clothes!

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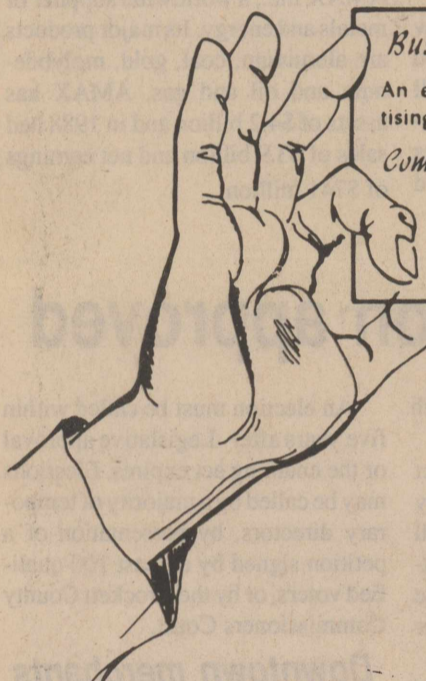

WINNING LAMB DISHES MAKE GREAT BUFFET

This past week, I was privileged to take 11 super Crockett County 4-H members to the District VI 4-H Food Show. As you probably read in Wednesday's paper, we did really well—you should be proud of those young people for putting in a lot of hard work and long hours preparing for the show. It's nice to see youngsters taking responsibility and doing something worthwhile!

At this year's food show, we started special awards for the lamb, beef and pork dishes. Since Crockett County is a major producer of lamb, we asked Crockett County National Bank to sponsor this award. Thanks to Drake McKinney and Kaye Stewart for helping get it together for us—and to Tamie Reagor, who volunteered to go down and request the donation last summer.

Through the lamb award, six lamb dishes were entered at the District Show and, of course, more were entered in the 22 county shows in this district. In Crockett County, we had three lamb dish entries. It's so important for us to promote lamb in this area—and I think the award provided a lot of encouragement to the 4-H'ers to try cooking with this lean, tasty product.

Crockett County's entry in the lamb award program was Julie Childress with "Lamb a'La Orange." She and her dad developed the recipe themselves, and it's really super. As a main dish for a holiday meal, or served cold on a buffet table, I don't think you can beat it!

The district winner was Wendi Skelton of Big Lake. Many of you know Wendi, and you'll enjoy her Lamb Tortilla Soup as much as the judges did. Wendi received a \$100 savings bond from CCNB for her efforts. She was judged on her knowledge of preparation and nutrition for lamb as well as the quality of the dish.

Wendi's soup is an excellent dish for a holiday buffet. If you're dieting, try cutting down on the oil and use a low-fat cheese. Be sure and keep the soup hot in a crock pot or chafing dish to avoid spoilage.

Remember, lean lamb is an excellent source of many nutrients and is no higher in cholesterol and saturated fat than any other red meat product (and is comparable to chicken!), so it can be a part of anyone's diet.

Also, remember that each time you eat lamb, you're helping out your friends and neighbors—Crockett County producers—as well as enjoying a great taste treat!

LAMB A'LA ORANGE
2 pounds lean American Lamb (boneless loin or leg)

MARINADE INGREDIENTS:
1/2 cup "Lite" soy sauce
1/4 cup cooking sherry
2 tablespoons ketchup
4 tablespoons olive oil
1/2 teaspoon orange extract
1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

GARNISH: 2 oranges, peeled and sectioned, mint or parsley leaves and paprika

In a non-metal bowl, combine all the ingredients for the marinade sauce and blend well by hand.

Trim all the excess fat from the lamb and then slice 1/4 to 1/2 inch thick pieces, across grain. Place pieces of lamb in bowl with marinade and cover. Refrigerate in marinade for at least two hours or overnight if desired. Remove lamb from marinade and coat with olive oil. Place lamb in skillet and saute over medium heat for approximately 2 to 3 minutes on each side or until desired degree of doneness. Place meat slices on plate and heat the remaining marinade in skillet for approximately 1 to 2 minutes. Baste meat with heated marinade. Arrange the lamb, sprinkle with paprika, and garnish with fresh mint or parsley and orange slices. Any remaining lamb would be tasty served as cold cuts for a second meal. Serves 8 (3 oz. servings).

TORTILLA SOUP

1 1/2 lbs. lean American lamb, cut into bite-size pieces
1 small onion, chopped
1 4-ounce can chopped chilies
2 cloves garlic, crushed
3 tablespoons olive oil
1 cup red cooking wine, optional
2 cups chicken broth
1 10 oz. can diced tomatoes and green chilies
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper

Tortilla strips
1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
Guacamole
Ripe olives, optional
Saute' lamb in 2 tablespoons olive oil. In separate pan, saute' onion, chilies, and garlic in 1 tablespoon oil until soft. Add tomatoes, wine, chicken broth, and lamb. Add seasonings. Bring soup to a boil; lower heat, simmer covered for 1 hour. Top with cheese, sour cream, guacamole and ripe olives. Place tortilla strips in individual bowls and spoon soup over tortillas.

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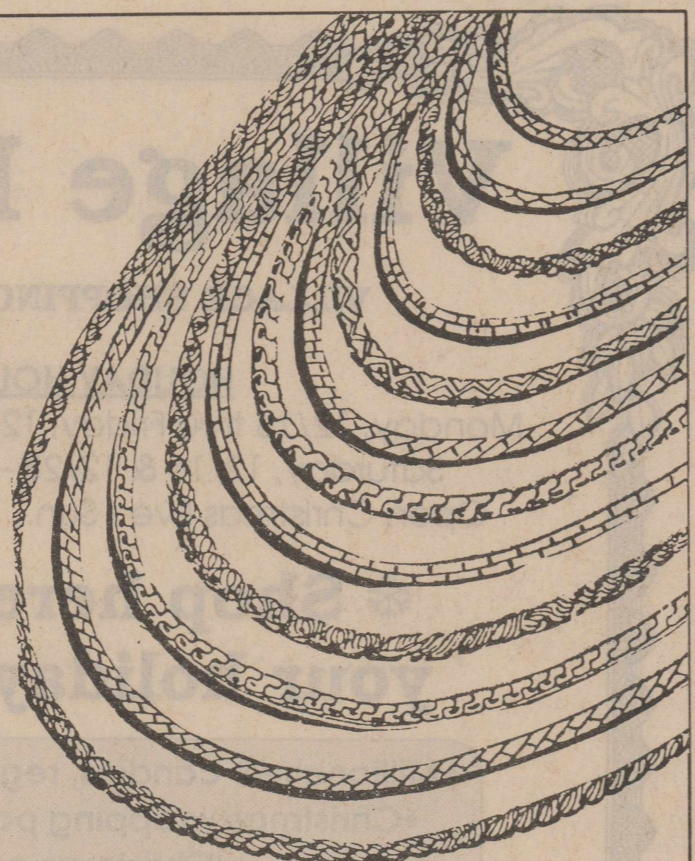
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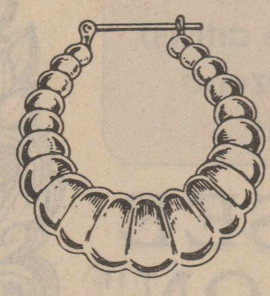
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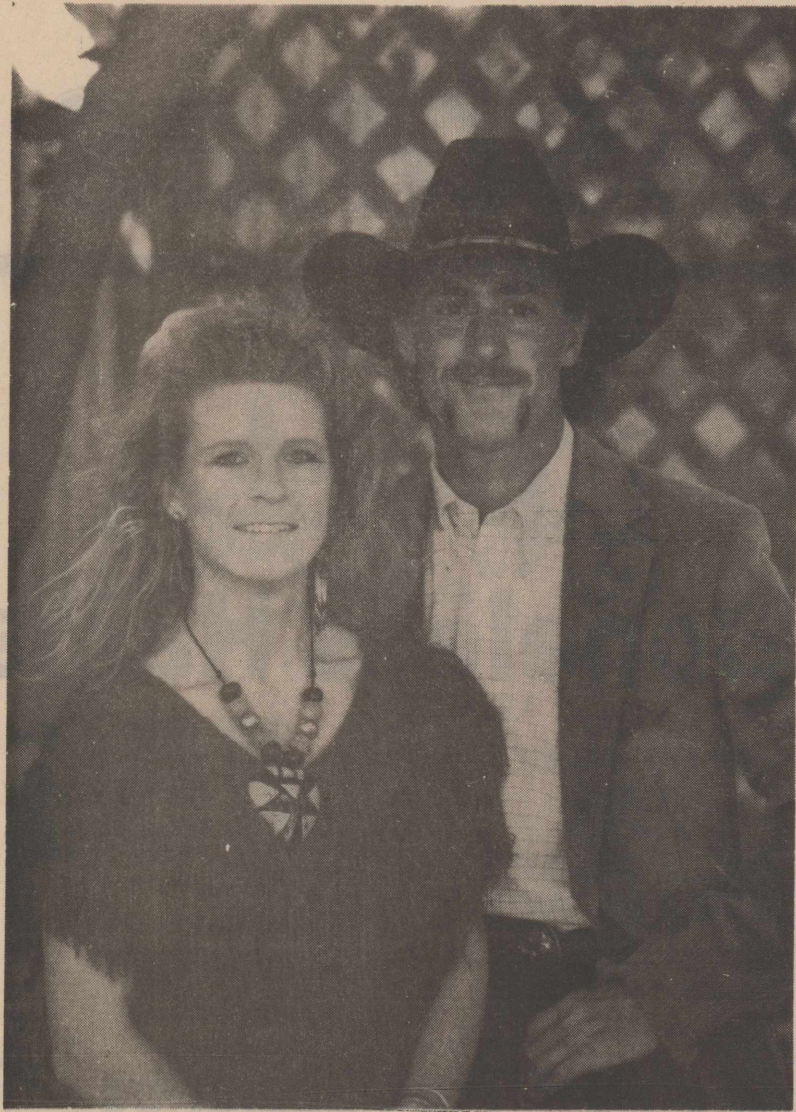


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Watts-Everett wedding plans told

Weatherization program available

The Weatherization Program, under the direction of the Tom Green County Community Action Council, will assist low-income persons, particularly those who are elderly and or handicapped, improve their home energy efficiency and lower utility costs by protecting the interior of the house from external extremes of temperature. Improvements are intended to conserve energy, and are not for rehabilitation, renovation or beautification.

Weatherization techniques include: insulation (attic, if roof leaks it will be patched before insulation is blown), caulking, weatherstripping, thresholds, window glass, windows, doors, glazing, underpinning, water heater blanket, insulation for hot water pipes, gaskets for wall outlets, vents or turbines when vents cannot be installed, storm windows on the north and west sides of the house, and other minor repairs, such as patching holes in walls and ceilings and rebuilding rotted out window frames.

The weatherization program does not assist with plumbing, electrical, add on additions or storm doors.

The homeowner and or renter understands that all the work will be of professional quality and that the work is provided charitably and gratuitously and not for sale or compensation, and thus without warranty and or guarantee.

Outreach worker Thelma R. Huichapa of San Angelo will be in Ozona twice each month to take applications. Applications may also be submitted at the Randolph Neighborhood Center, 1100 North Randolph Street, San Angelo, Texas 76903, 915-658-3147.

Mrs. Huichapa will be in Ozona Jan. 9 and 23 between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m. She may be found at the DHS office in the Village Shopping Center or at the courthouse during that time.

A verification of income must be received by the Community Action Council before any determination of eligibility or non-eligibility can be made.

Reader answers mascot question

The following may shed some light on a subject raised in a recent issue of *The Stockman*. During the late fifties and early sixties, I worked with Captain Allan R. Bosworth (now deceased) while he was doing the book *Ozona Country*. During the course of research on this book, we discovered that Ozona had changed the name of its football team from Ozona to Ozona Ponies to Ozona Stallions and finally to Ozona Lions. The reason for the latter change was because Sonora had named - and registered - its team as the Broncos and Ozona did not want to have anything which would in any way be similar to Sonora's mascot. This information was confirmed to me respectively by the late C. S. Denham, former superintendent of schools, and later by Ms. Denham (now deceased) who was my fifth grade teacher. We

also found in Mr. Denham's notes for his thesis this version. He never did use it in his thesis, Mrs. Denham told me when I saw her just before his death, because it just didn't fit into the overall body of his thesis. For like reason, neither Captain Bosworth nor myself could come up with where to use the information in *Ozona Country* so we left it out entirely. This information is probably the best version available.

Reduce stress for children at Christmas

Christmas is the most exciting time of year for children - and the most stressful. For parents with children younger than 8 years old, the Texas Medical Association offers the following suggestions.

--Try to maintain the children's regular sleeping, eating and playing schedule. Familiar routines provide a sense of security. When planning a visit to grandma or another holiday event, give children advance notice.

--Involve the children in simple tasks, such as decorating the tree and baking cookies. Children derive a sense of belonging from taking part.

--When decorating the tree, hang the larger, unbreakable ornaments on the lower branches and the smaller, fragile ones on the higher branches out of children's reach. Your children will enjoy touching the safe ornaments, and you won't constantly be saying, "No, don't touch."

--Place decorations with small pieces, such as nativity scenes, bowls of nuts, and glass bulbs on mantles or other high places children cannot reach even by climbing.

--Let your children decide whether they want to sit in Santa's lap. Children may perceive that big, furry-faced man as a monster until they are about 5 or 6 years old.

--When shopping with a preschooler, use a stroller, plan rest stops and snacks, and be prepared to leave earlier than expected if necessary.

--After a special event, such as talking to Santa, help children label their feelings: "Sounds like you're excited." By accepting their feelings, children can begin to cope with them in healthy ways.

--When children get cranky or tired, suggest a soothing activity. Let children play in the bathtub with plastic cups and bubbles, or give them a pail of water to "paint" the sidewalk or fence.

--Before Christmas, pack up the old toys except for one or two favorites. In mid-January, when children are tired of playing with the new toys, bring out the old ones. They will seem new.

--Avoid stress yourself. Be realistic about how many Christmas cards you can address or gifts you can wrap in one evening. Children can sense your tension and often react by whining, clinging, fighting and waking up at night. Sometimes putting away a chore so you can read a story to your child is best.

Bringing home the prodigal

There is a wonderful story about a lost son returning home. It can be found in the 15th chapter of the Gospel according to Luke in the Bible. In that story the son, who has gone off to squander his inheritance, recognizes the error of his ways and returns home to a father who has been waiting.

In the March issue of the *Honolulu Advertiser* is a news story by Terry McMurray. The story tells of a prodigal on who is brought home by someone else. It is a comforting affirmation that there are those along life's road who will take the time to bring those whose feet have strayed back to the path.

Here's what happened: On a Thursday afternoon, a 27-year-old man walked into a store, asked to try on a

\$105 pair of Nike Top Flight basketball shoes. After he put them on, he asked to see another pair. When the store owner, went to get them, the man got up, grabbed his slippers and ran out of the store. Mrs. Kim, behind a counter, screamed as the man disappeared through the door. Mr. Kim, a one-time athlete, chased the larger man across a busy four-lane highway and caught him on the median strip. The man was much larger and stronger than Kim and punched him and kicked him with the very shoes he had just stolen. Mrs. Kim had called the police and they arrived to find the two men wrestling on the ground. The man was

arrested for shoplifting, and he was also booked for investigation of second degree robbery, a felony punishable by up to 10 years in prison.

Later, the store owner, Mr. Kim, went to the police station and asked to talk with the suspect. He asked him if he wanted to mess up his life just for a pair of shoes. Then he wanted to know if the man would be willing to work to pay for the shoes. The police were astonished. They had never had a complainant drop charges and then hire the suspect. Mr. Kim said, "He had no job, but he really liked the shoes. I told him jail would worsen his life and he would probably come out and do something even more ridiculous. If you can promise me you'll try, I will give you a chance. And he thanked me..."

Kim took the man back to his store

and gave him a new pair of socks to go with the shoes that were now his, too. The man apologized to Mrs. Kim. Then, because of the newfound trust between them, the man wanted Mr. Kim to meet his family, so Kim drove him home. "He introduced me to his mother, who is ill, and to his sisters and brothers-in-law. He was going to tell them what had happened, but I told him not to tell it all, so he told them only that I was the man that was going to hire him. This is better for him, for me, and for society," Kim said.

In the story of the prodigal son, upon the son's return home, the father said to his servants, "Bring quickly the best robe, and put it on him; and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet..."

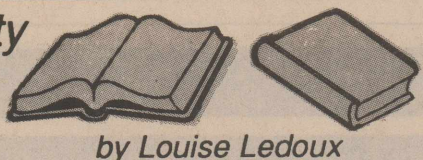

Special gifts for Christmas

The gift of family history and traditions is one of the most precious gifts you can give to children, grandchildren and other relatives at Christmas. Your family history is an important link to the past. You connect it to the future and to generations yet to come.

Young people, especially, like to know where they came from and about their family. They are interested in what their ancestors were like and the things they did. This information can become valuable to them and their descendants as time goes by.

You can prepare your gift of family history in several different ways. Some of it can be done at home in the comfort of an easy chair. If you have time and like to make quilts, you could make one with names and other information sewn or printed on the squares. Family information can be preserved also on samplers and other needlework pieces.

An interesting Christmas gift is a photo album or scrapbook containing family history. Copies of old records, letters, newspaper articles, etc., can be included in scrapbooks - as well as family pictures. Keep your original materials and photos for reference and future use. Do put important information regarding who, where and when with family pictures. If this isn't done, they will have no historical value to future generations.

A most appealing gift to give at Christmas is a book, written by yourself, about your family and your ancestors. Notebooks can be used. Blank books sold in department stores and bookstores are ideal for this purpose. You can make your own book from cloth, cardboard, construction paper and other materials.

When writing your family history, go back in time as far as you remember. Interview your oldest relatives and look through old records, letters, etc., handed down from the past. A family Bible is an excellent source of information. In your local library, you may find some of your family history. Your librarian will be glad to help you.

If you are near a large library that has a genealogical department, you can certainly find information about some of your ancestors. Your research there can involve considerable time and effort, but the results can be very rewarding. You will be surprised at how interesting it becomes. If someone else on your family tree has already done some research on your family line, then your project will be easy. These folks can certainly be helpful.

We all have stories handed down in our family about early ancestors. Perhaps some were in Indian attacks, or the Civil or Revolutionary wars. Some were famous, or perhaps related to famous historical people. Others were pioneer settlers of our country or immigrated here later. All

these stories are fascinating and exciting to young folks. So are stories about ancestors who were outlaws, gangsters and horse thieves. Sometimes these are not written or talked about - our ancestors chose to forget about them. But these characters do belong on the family tree and should be included in your family history, whether you like it or not. Their dastardly deeds and shenanigans can add a bit of spice to your book that children will certainly enjoy. These unworthy people will not detract from other ancestors you are proud of. They, really, will add an element of truth to your stories.

A book about your personal life can be a fine Christmas gift for children and grandchildren. This one should be easy to write, for it can be taken from your memories. Include in your book whatever you feel is important and interesting about your parents, grandparents, sisters, brothers and other relatives and friends who were a part of your life. Youngsters will love to read about the funny incidents and occasional trouble you encountered when young. Your experiences, beliefs, advice and family traditions recorded in this gift can help your children understand where they fit into the family group and can benefit them and their progeny as they go forward to an uncertain future.

The task of writing any history about your family and yourself is not difficult if you start early and write a little each day. If you don't like to write, use a video or tape recorder. If you do not have time to prepare this gift for giving this Christmas, why not start preparing one to give next year? This special gift is appropriate to give at any time.

Daniel Webster once said, "Those who do not look upon themselves as a link connecting the past with the future, do not perform their duty to the world." You keep intact this link to the future when you give the precious gift of family history to your children and grandchildren at Christmas. You also do your duty to future generations. They will bless you for it.

WTU committed to area economic development

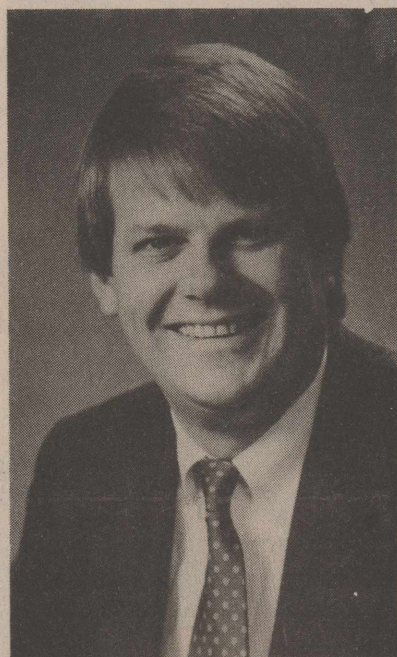
David Young has been named manager of economic development for West Texas Utilities Co. effective Dec. 1. The move was announced by Bill Elmore, the company's vice-president for business development.

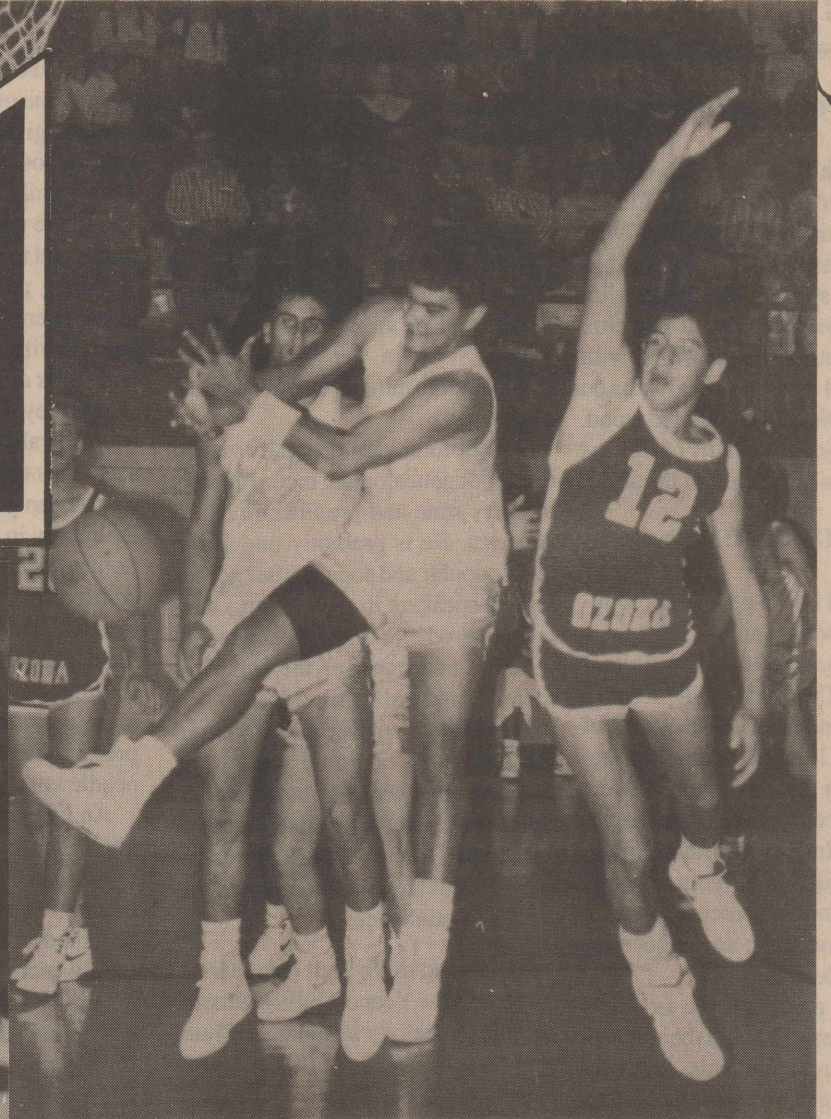
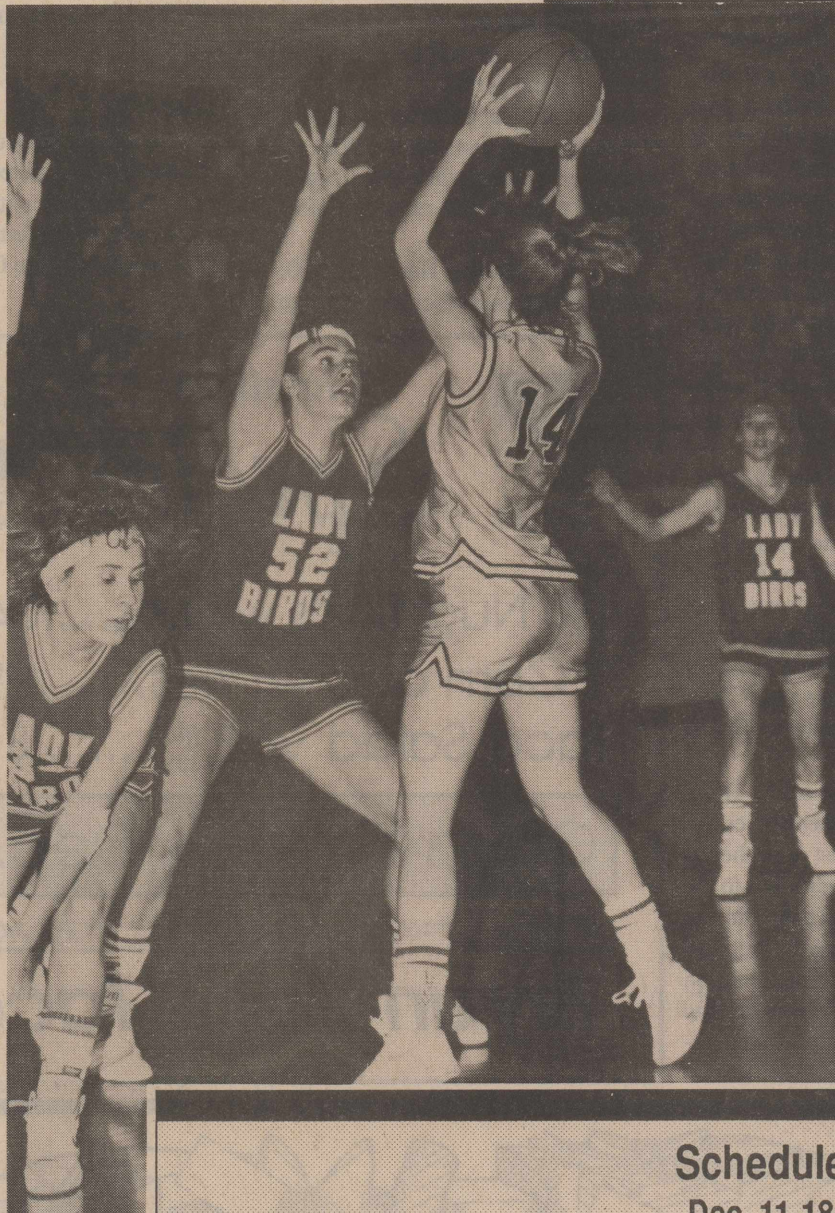

Each group has renewed its contract for two years.

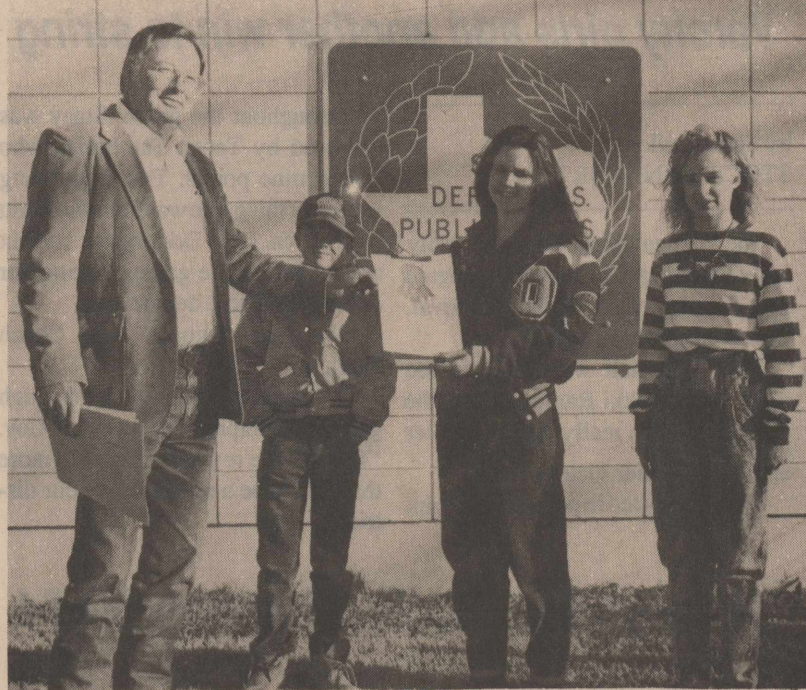
Beta Sigma Phi is the fifth organization participating in the program.

The Texas Adopt-A-Highway program is the first of its kind in the nation, said Koerth. Other states have since developed similar programs.

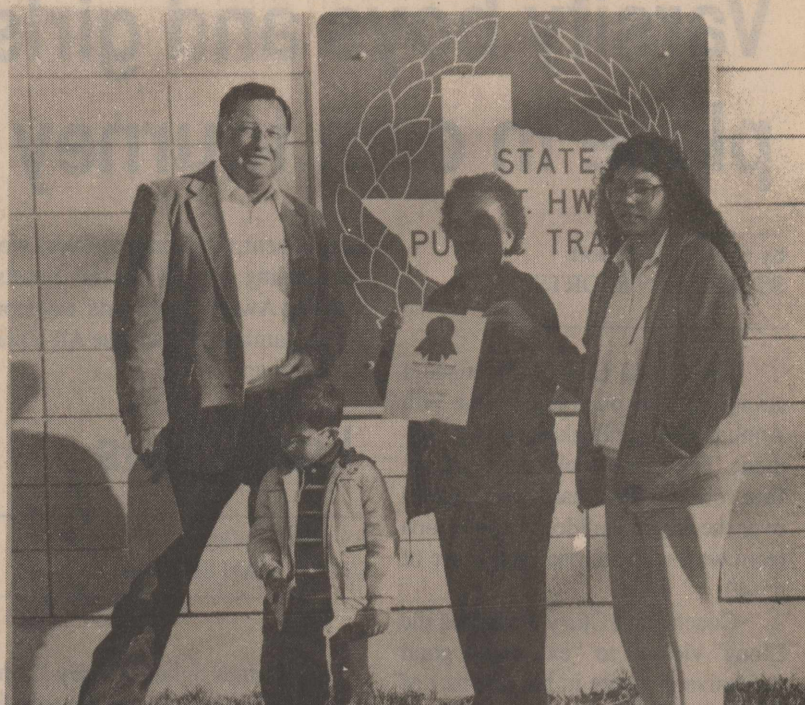

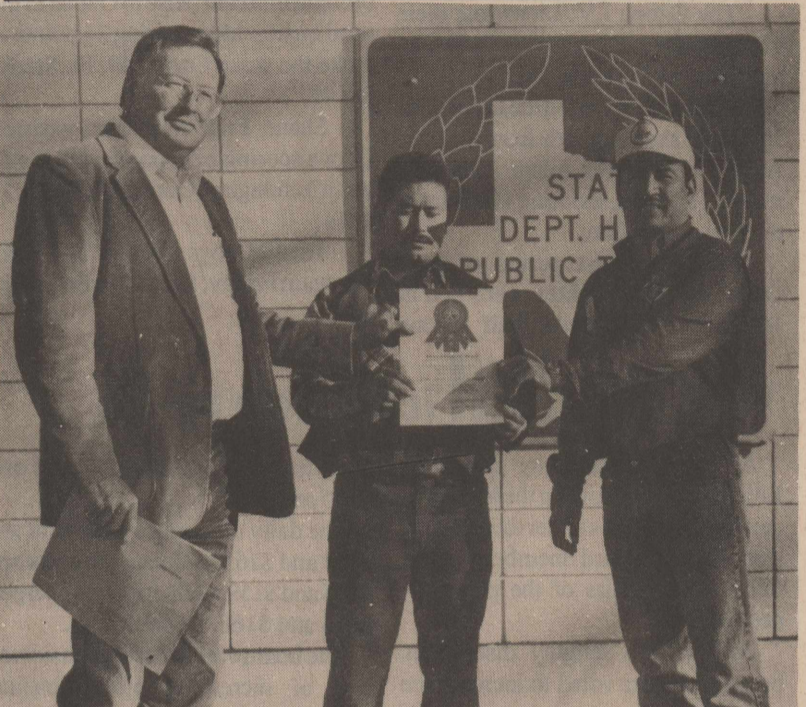

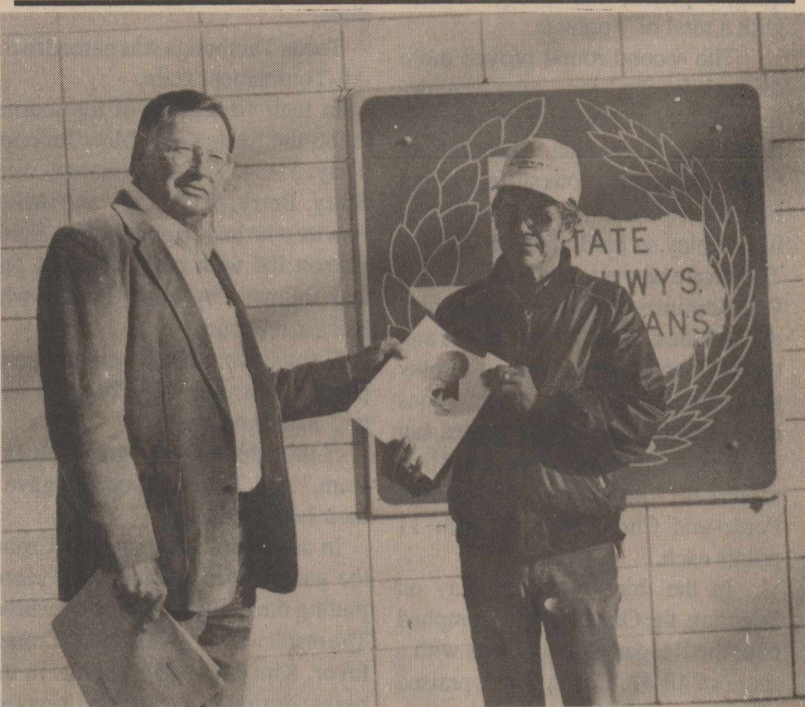

Hospital, Care Center under budget

After getting off to a 50 minutes later than scheduled start, hospital and care center board members met Dec. 7 in regular session.

Contracts were approved for Doctors Robert Owensby and Dr. Marcus Sims for a one year period beginning March 1, 1990 and extending until Feb. 28, 1991. Board members voted on the extension after an executive session.

Adding a new condition to the physician's contracts requiring the physicians to share the duties of county health officer without added compensation was tabled until the legality of sharing the responsibility can be verified.

The board voted to reappoint the medical staff consisting of Owensby, Sims, Dr. Joe B. Logan, Dr. Steve Sessoms and Dr. Jackson.

In reviewing the financial condition of the hospital and care center,

Administrator Bill Boswell stated that the hospital, through 11 months, was under its cash budget by \$36,734 and the care center under its cash budget by \$65,414. Both expect to end the year under budget, a distinct turnaround from past years.

Word was received this week that the U. S. Justice Department has given approval to the hospital district legislation. Boswell reminded the board that the act permitting an election will remain in effect for five years.

Boswell informed the board that the newly installed vent hood did not meet hospital licensure requirements. He was instructed to ensure that the contractor correct the problem. The board also agreed to pay a reasonable fee to have a state inspector travel to Ozona to inspect the vent hood installation prior to the first of the year.

Approval was given for a small group of hospital employees to travel

to Sterling City to examine equipment and supplies to be sold at the hospital there. That hospital has recently closed.

Boswell was authorized to travel to San Antonio to purchase two whirlpool baths at a cost of \$60 each from the Texas Surplus Property Agency.

Boswell told the board the hospital needs a Gomco type suction unit and

an Ultrasound machine. Prices will be presented at the next board meeting.

Several more hospital and ambulance personnel are to receive Hepatitis "B" shots in the near future. These people are at high risk of exposure to this extremely contagious disease, Boswell said.

Compliance with a new law which

comes into effect April 4, 1990 regarding disposal of health care related special waste will cost an undetermined amount of money, Boswell said. He also told the board that new regulations being written will force the shut down of the hospital incinerator in the near future.

Old charts stored at the care center need to be disposed of, and incineration or shredding are the only means

by which they can be successfully destroyed. Charts must be kept for a period of five years according to Doris Hull, care center administrator. All the files have been retained since the opening of the facility.

A video prepared by employee Julian Ramirez showing the hot water tanks and the pipes under the building was shown. Board members determined that repairs of the pipes are needed.

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

The eighth grade Cubettes stayed with their opponents all through the game and the game went into double overtime.

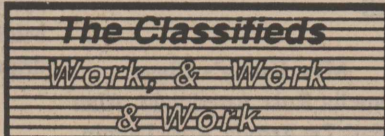
The Cubettes trailed by one point at the end of the first quarter, 5-6. In the second quarter each team scored two points and left the score 7-8 at halftime.

Claudia Avila led in both steals and assists. She had three assists and nine steals. Veronica Mendoza had two assists.

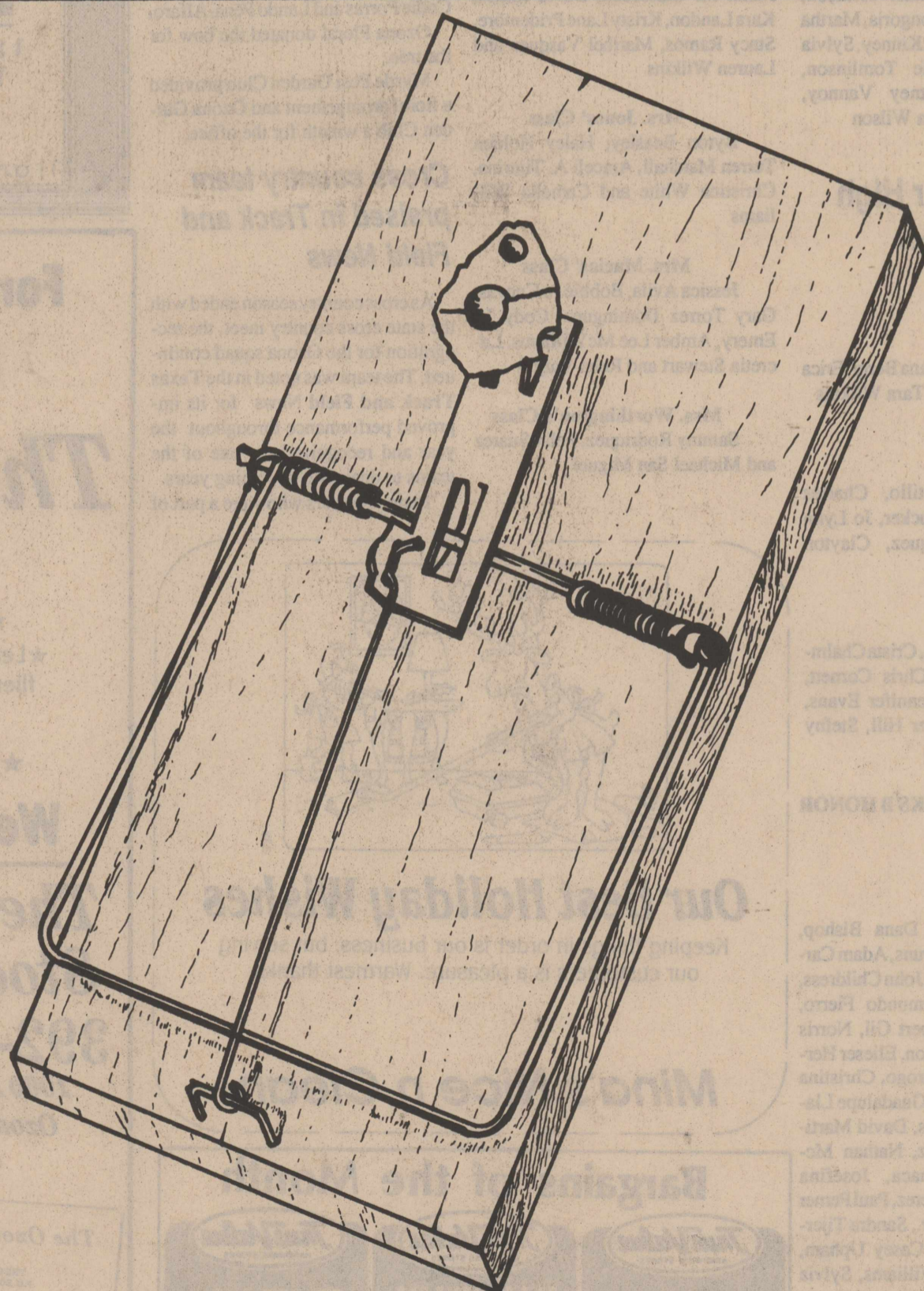
