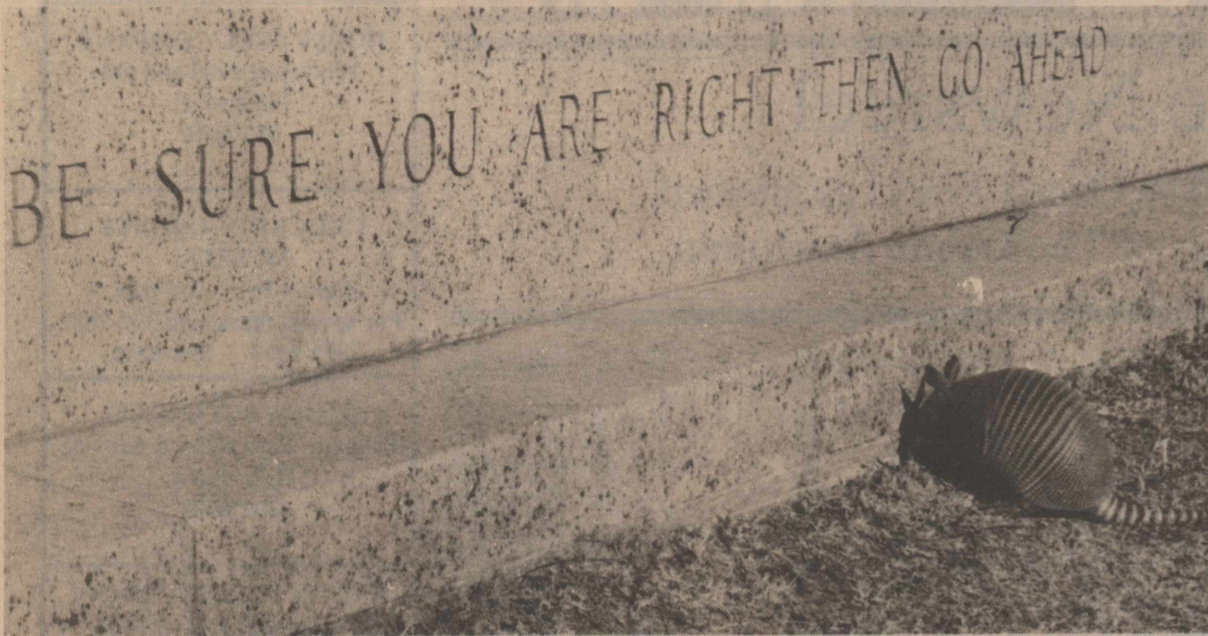

## End may be in sight for treasured trash

While one man's trash may be another man's treasure, a new law is on the books to determine whether or not beauty is in the eye of the beholder.

An amendment enacted by the Texas Legislature this year could result in "a safer, cleaner place to live" according to County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos.

DeHoyos discussed the law and the power it gives commissioners' courts when the court met Dec. 11.

House Bill 319, Section 3.04 of the Texas Litter Abatement Act, provides the authority for commissioners' courts to prohibit the accumulation of refuse and junk on a person's property for more than 30 days within 50 feet of a public highway in the county. According to DeHoyos, refuse may be defined as garbage, decayable and non-decayable waste. Junk would include all worn out, worthless and discarded material, whether metal or glass.

A road, street, way, bridge, etc. would be considered a public highway according to DeHoyos.

Under the law, the court can

require reimbursement from the property owner for the county's expense in removing and disposing of the refuse or junk.

Failure to pay these costs would result in a lien being attached to the property in favor of the county. Violation of the order would be a Class C misdemeanor.

The act requires that property owners must be notified by certified mail that the junk or refuse is accumulated in violation before action can

## Political filing dates close soon

Prospective candidates for office have until Jan. 2 to file for a place on the March 13 Democratic Primary ballot. Applications may be obtained from Democratic Party chairman Steve Kenley or at the office of County Clerk Debbi Puckett.

Kenley had received only six applications as of Tuesday morning. Incumbents requesting a place on the ballot are: Kathryn Mayfield, judge; Debbi Puckett, clerk; Jim Dudley,

Feb. 11 is the deadline for voter registration. Anyone not registered to vote may do so at the office of County Tax Assessor Tommy Stokes. Registered voters who did not receive their new salmon and white registration cards should contact Stokes' office.

Kenley requested that the commissioners' court adopt the law, stating that his office has received many complaints regarding refuse and junk on both empty lots and lots being used by property owners.

In conjunction with the notice is a 30-day waiting period before the court can remove or dispose of the material or assess charges.

Property owners have 60 days to pay assessed charges before a lien is attached to the property.

## Baby, it's cold outside!

Temperatures dropped to the single digits in Ozona last week as a cold front rivaling December of 1983 swept across the continent. According to James Pagan who keeps records for the U. S. Weather Bureau for Ozona, the temperature dropped to six degrees Dec. 21 with a high of 34.

Lows varied from six to 28 degrees during the Dec. 19-Dec. 25 period and ranged from highs of 34 to 63 degrees.

In 1983, Ozona experienced a reading of four below zero and highs ranging between 19 and 24 degrees during the week before Christmas.

Then as now, there was a lack of moisture with the cold weather.

"We're lucky we didn't have a major fire during this," said Fire Marshal Steve Kenley. "Any time we had to take the trucks out we put the nozzles in the tanks and let them circulate to keep them from freezing up." A trip of any distance during the severe weather would have frozen the hoses, Kenley said.

Although water had to be turned off to some homes where pipes were frozen, there were no major problems with the community's water supply.

"We were real fortunate," said Doug Meador of Crockett County Water District. "We only had a couple of leaks...no big time leaks."

The frigid weather kept electric and gas meters whirring as citizens turned up the thermostats in an effort to stay warm. There were no local curtailments of fuel service.

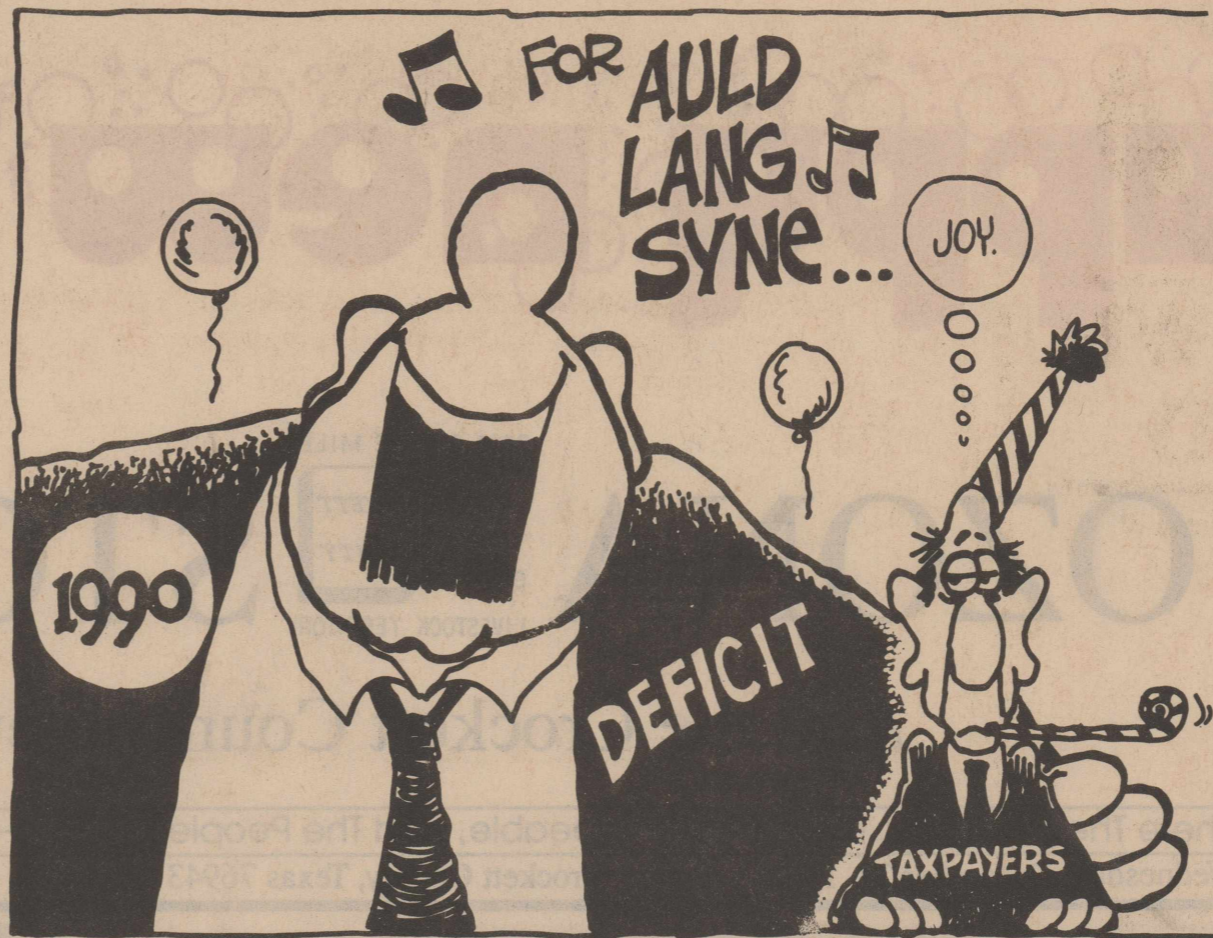

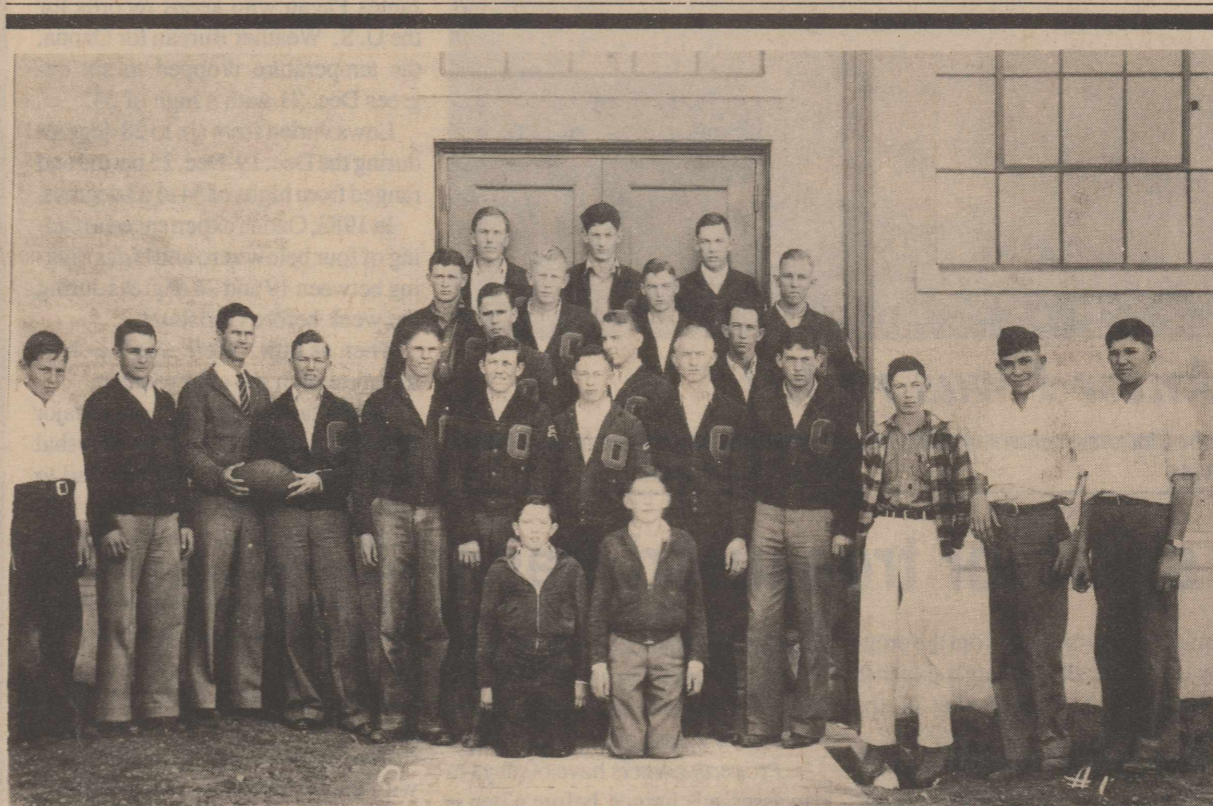

## A Word for You

How do you feel when someone says: "I need to have a word with you"? When you get a note from your child's teacher saying that the school principal wants to talk to you - or when the boss tells you he wants to see you after work on Friday - or the nurse calls to make an appointment for you to see the doctor about the results of some tests; what goes through your mind? Does the school want to put your child in a special class - and is it for slow, or fast learners? Is the boss going to fire you, or give you a promotion? Does the doctor have bad news, or good news? You probably spend some anxious hours wondering what the "word" is that someone has for you, but you have to wait for the appointed time to find out. Yet, the most important word of all is the one God has for you! Do you wonder what that word is? What does God want to talk to you about? Well, you won't have to wait very long to find out, if you'll stop and read John 1:1-18 right now. (Read it, please!)

Because of our disobedience toward this Word, which was before the creation of the world, our sin separated us from our Creator. We changed His creation and remodeled our human nature to serve ourselves, instead of Him. Our guilt made us afraid of His holiness, and our self-concern shut us off from the assurance of His love for us - so that all His greatness, His power, His glory, and His love be-

came too much for us to understand. But God still wanted us to know Him. In summing up an urgent appeal for the Student Exchange Program - so that people overseas, especially in Third World countries, might know of America's good intentions - a nuclear scientist said: "The best way to send an idea out into the world is to wrap it up in a person".

In a much higher sense, that is exactly what God did on the first Christmas Eve. In His infinite wisdom, God took His special Word - which was not only WITH God but also IS God - wrapped it up in a Person, and laid it in a manger! In his account, Matthew tells us about Jesus being born of the Virgin Mary, about her husband-to-be Joseph, and the Wise Men who came to worship this Child. Luke tells us about the Roman taxation, the Angels' song, and the shepherds who came to the stable to see the Christ Child. But John simply says: "And the Word became flesh and lived among us for a time". This is the Christmas Story of John, telling us that God wrapped up the marvelous message of His love in the Person of His only-begotten Son and sent Him down to earth - so that all people everywhere might know what is on the mind and in the heart of the heavenly Father.

And that's the Word God has for you! It's His first Christmas Gift to the

world, and also the latest Gift - because it's truly "The Gift That Keeps on Giving", and the one we receive today. Just as a word that's translated into another language doesn't lose its meaning, God translated His Word into a life that we could understand - not to stop being God, but to be God in a way that's understandable to those who don't know Him. The Babe of Bethlehem is the Word of God incarnate - the Word become flesh, sharing your death. Yes, God was even willing to demonstrate the message of His love by suffering and dying on a cross. And then He rose again to show that He had overcome your enemies of sin, death, and hell - and to offer you everlasting life. The Word that God has for you is full of grace and truth, not coming to condemn but to forgive. And He comes to you today as God's Christmas Gift, addressed to you personally - to give you that which you don't deserve, but that which He wants you to have.

And John tells us that some people "got the message", welcoming the Word that God loves His people and wants to be a part of their lives, to continue being the Father of those He created. And those who received the Word also got the power to become God's children - and part of His eternal family, not through the natural process of birth which He gave but because He made them His own. In

this special Word of God, which became Jesus born in Bethlehem, we see the glory of God - because through His life and teaching, His death and resurrection, He has revealed the Father's heart to us. The Apostle Paul got the message about this special Word of God on the road to Damascus, which opens our eyes to see God's glory - as he writes in 2 Corinthians chapter 4: "God, who said: 'Let light shine out of the dark,' has shone in our hearts to bring you the light of knowing God's glory in the face of Jesus Christ".

God has many words to speak to us. John says: "The Law was given through Moses, but Jesus Christ brought grace and truth". Because He loves us, God speaks to us through the Law. And because His love fulfilled the Law in Jesus Christ, God's written Word also tells us the marvelous message of our salvation - and gives us the responsibility of sharing that Good News with others. When God speaks to us through His written Word, He's always saying: "I have a Word for you". That's why it's so important for us to attend Church and hear His Word, to daily read His Word, and to weekly study His Word with our fellow Christians. You see, it's a special Word - the Word that was WITH God, the Word that IS God,

and the Word that "became flesh and lived among us, full of grace and truth". And THAT's the Word He has for you today. It's the heart of the Christmas Story, so let us bow down and worship before God Incarnate, the Word made flesh - and lying in a manger.

## Crockett County Hospital to sponsor breast cancer detection unit Jan. 22

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every 10 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state-of-the-art X-Ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early state

has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Monday, Jan. 22.

The mobile unit will be parked at Crockett County Hospital. Appointments may be made by calling 392-2671.

## House burns at Acton ranch

One of Crockett County's early day ranch homes was destroyed in a fire Christmas Day on the Earl Acton Ranch.

The frame structure was completely gone when firemen arrived at the scene 30 miles south of Ozona at 5:28 p.m. Monday, 26 minutes after receiving the call.

The destruction was so complete that there was no way anyone could tell what happened according to Fire Marshal Steve Kenley. No one saw the fire early enough to pinpoint where it began. A nearby barn was not damaged.

The 100-year-old structure was known as the Fayette Schwalbe house, Kenley said.

This is the second landmark house to fall to fire in the county this year, Kenley said. An earlier fire on the Noelke Ranch destroyed a ranch house which had been moved from Barnhart.

A Dec. 23 grassfire on Pecan Street was caused by fireworks. The blaze was out when firemen arrived.

## Putting the resolve back in the New Year's resolutions

What is it about the New Year's Resolution that seems to almost guarantee failure? Though the very definition of resolution indicates a firm commitment, the connotation of the New Year's Resolution is that of one made with great fervor, only to be abandoned in disillusionment even before we adjust to writing the correct year on our checks.

In spite of previous failures and disappointments, Dr. David McClellan of the Department of Family Medicine at the Scott and White Clinic in Belton believes that the new Year can be an excellent time to set new goals. "The problem with many New Year's Resolutions is they are not really reasonable goals. The person setting the goal may not have considered all the relevant factors and may actually be setting himself up for failure."

Dr. McClellan believes that goal which have the potential for accomplishment and satisfaction can be measured against four standards. "A goal worthy of effort must be definable, measurable, achievable and compatible," says Dr. McClellan.

### Definable

It is essential to think through what you hope to accomplish and define it simply and specifically. "If you can write it down on paper in one or two sentences, it has the makings of a worthwhile goal," according to Dr. McClellan. "Too many people make nebulous, abstract goals that are difficult to work toward." A definable goal can be broken down into the small, practical steps required to achieve it.

### Measurable

"If a goal cannot be objectively measured, there is no way to know when it has been achieved," says Dr. McClellan. For example, if you set a goal in the area of physical fitness to begin walking a mile, four days a week, at the end of the week, you can look back and determine whether or not you reached your goal. Without the ability to measure success, you may be easily discouraged, trying to hit an elusive target. Subjective goals, such as looking thinner or feeling healthier do not offer the satisfaction that comes from measuring success which gives you the boost to persevere over the "long haul".

### Achievable

It is essential that a goal be realistic for you where you are right now. "Setting goals that are too far removed from your starting point can be discouraging as you begin to realize how distant the goal is and how long it will take to reach it," says Dr. McClellan. "It is much more fulfilling to set a reasonable goal that can be attained in the short term." Or if your goal is long term, it will be helpful to break it down into smaller, "bite-size" segments that can be achieved along the way. This type of goal-setting offers periodic rewards for your accomplishment.

### Compatible

"Many times, people set goals that may be definable and measurable, but

they are not achievable, because they are simply not compatible with their lifestyle or other goals," Dr. McClellan comments. All commitments and constraints must be taken into consideration when making goals. Time constraints and physical limitations must influence goal-setting. This part of the process may require some decision-making and priority evaluation to determine whether or not your commitment to a new goal will interfere with other responsibilities.

One of the basic benefits from proper goal-planning is a balanced life. Therefore, setting priorities according to the various areas of life responsibilities is essential. Dr. McClellan compares life to a decathlon. "If an athlete works hard and excels in one area, but neglects the other parts of the competition, he may win that event, but lose the contest. Life is similar. Those whose lives are most fulfilling and least stressful are those who keep all the areas of life in balance."

### Priorities

Dr. McClellan suggests five areas that should be considered and prioritized before setting goals in any one particular aspect of life. The first and most important area of responsibility is that of personal beliefs. "Each individual must come to terms with his own view of the world and his belief system. Without that, he cannot effectively set other priorities and goals. Every person's lifestyle is a result of his or her belief system," says Dr. McClellan.

After that, Dr. McClellan believes, goals in all areas can be set according to the life priorities established. The other areas of responsibility which need to be considered according to Dr. McClellan are family, business/career, church/religion, the community and the world. When goals are set according to priorities and the guidelines of definability, measurability, achievability and compatibility, the likelihood of success is much greater.

A Houston family was injured Tuesday morning in a one vehicle rollover 10 miles west of Ozona. The accident occurred at 9:45 a.m. on Interstate 10.

Preliminary investigation indicated that the driver, Leticia Flores, fell asleep, said Trooper Ben English, investigating officer. The 1986 Nissan four door Mrs. Flores was driving ran off the right side of the road. The driver apparently corrected and lost control, skidding into the median and overturning the vehicle 3 1/2 times. The accident remained under investigation Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. Flores, her husband, Juan Flores, and their 3-year-old daughter were taken to Crockett County Hospital for treatment. The child was later transferred to a San Angelo hospital. Initial medical assistance was rendered by a traveler who was an EMT.

A one vehicle rollover at 9:15 a.m. Sunday in approximately the same area did extensive damage to a 1987 Ford Econoline van. The driver, Nawarat Kierairapanond of Baton Rouge, and his passenger were not injured.

The accident happened when the driver lost control after trying to dodge a deer according to the report of DPS Corporal Dale Taylor.

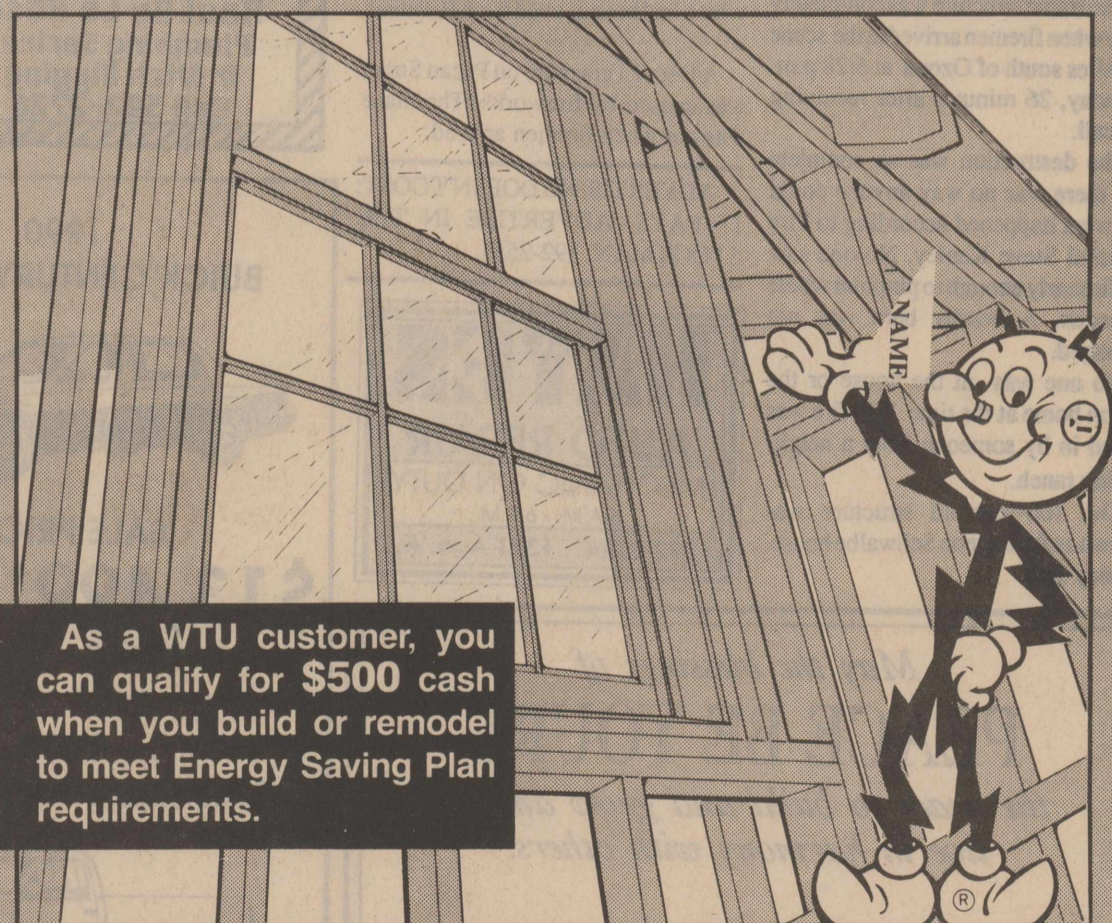

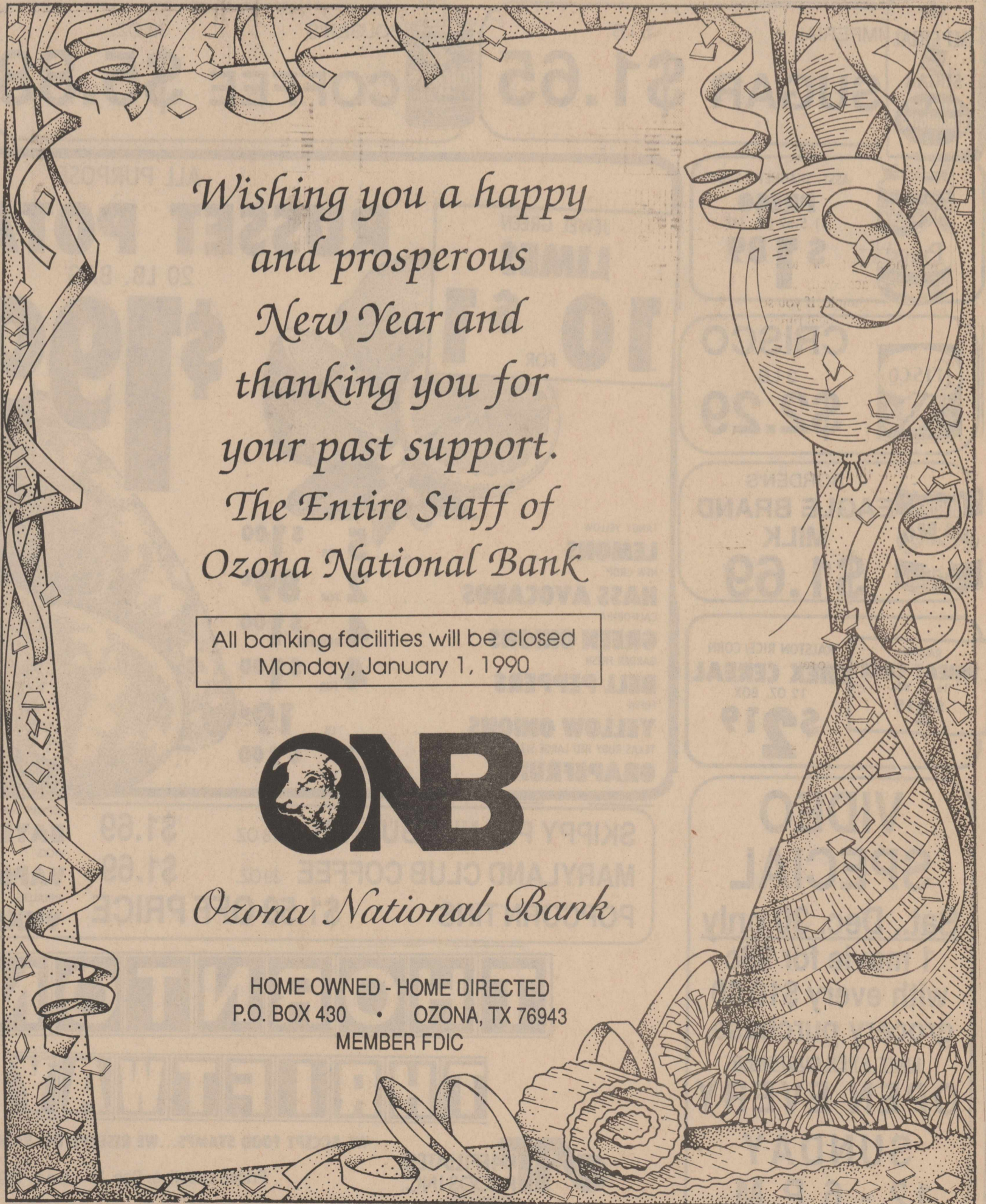
