Hide your junk!

Court adopts cleanup act

Adoption of Section 3.04 of the Texas Litter Abatement Act was approved by Crockett County commissioners Monday. The move gives the court authority to order the cleanup of areas in the community containing junk or refuse.

County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos presented information on the act and requested its adoption in the regular December meeting of the court.

Judge Kathryn Mayfield told the court they must deal with each instance separately. State laws defining junk and refuse have been repealed, Judge Mayfield said.

Commissioners voted to follow the lead of school trustees in adopting a resolution to preserve the right to tax certain goods held in the county while in transit. The right of entities to vote to tax specific items referred to as freepoint goods was approved in the November constitutional amendment election.

The Crockett County landfill will be full at the end of February, a month earlier than projected some time ago. Judge Mayfield reported that Environmental Protection Agency regulations regarding solid waste disposal will not be released in their final form until April. Hopes for statewide leniency or a national standard may or may not be realized when the regulations are released.

"We're in a horrible situation here because we don't know which way the regulations are going to go," said Mayfield. Other area counties are not as near landfill capacity as Crockett County.

Literature on a \$164,000 trash baler

was studied by commissioners. The equipment discussed is one of the smaller balers and handles four tons of solid waste per hour with an estimated 25 year use period.

Commissioners spent part of the meeting to discuss purchase of real estate, but no action was taken.

During a report by Auditor Sandy Stokes, commissioners were told that the county ended the year with a 1.6 million dollar fund reserve. 1989 began "right at two million" according to Stokes. The auditor anticipates a lesser use of reserve funds in 1990.

Supplements to the hospital and care center in 1989 were \$522,727 and \$229,393 respectively, Stokes stated.

Commissioners voted to accept a vehicle liability bid from The Baggett Agency and a health insurance bid from White and Zesch of San Angelo. Advertisement was authorized for fuel bids to be opened next month.

Court members voted to increase the reimbursement rate for mileage expense from 20 cents to the 24 cents approved by the I.R.S.

Salary schedules were approved for 1990, and a vote was taken to pay regular time to Sheriff's Department personnel for excess hours worked in a four week pay period if part of the total hours are vacation or holiday time and the individual is not physically present.

County holidays for 1990 were set as April 13 - Easter, May 28 - Memorial Day, July 4 - Independence Day, Sept. 3 - Labor Day, Nov. 12 - Veteran's Day, Nov. 22-23 - Thanksgiving, Dec. 24-25 - Christmas, Jan. 1 - New Year's.

Regular monthly reports were heard.

Commissioners approved payment of \$2,618 for a generator for the 4-H Club with \$1,618 of the amount to be refunded to the county by the club, okayed purchase of a printing calculator for the civic center and heard a request for an already budgeted copier for the Sheriff's Department. Two popcorn poppers needed for the civic center will be paid for by youth center funds.

Juan Hernandez, director for the Permian Basin Adult Probation Department, requested purchase of a computer for the local probation office and explained that grants received by his department will make possible the return to Crockett County of \$8,000 allocated for salaries for the local office. Purchase of the computer was approved.

A contract with Dr. Marcus Sims was examined by commissioners and returned to Bill Boswell for slight revision. The contract will be presented to the court at its next regular meeting.

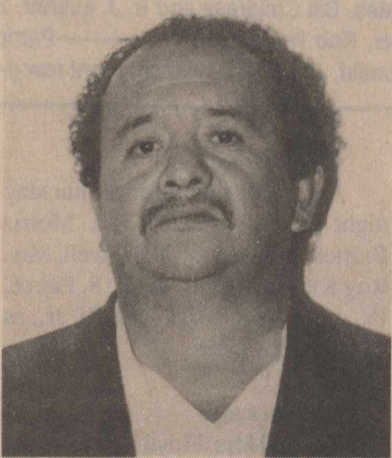
Commissioners approved payment of travel expenses for Boswell to attend a free seminar on indigent health care in Abilene this week.

A request by Carl Strain that the county consider a joint paving project for 1.7 miles of Millspaugh River Road was tabled until more specifics are available.

Eddie Moore reported on a Mac truck purchased for \$24,000 after being approved at an emergency court

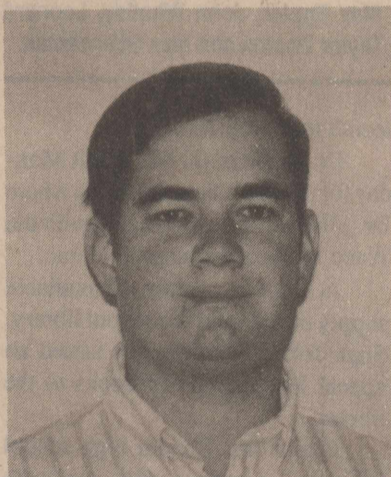
Rudy is a charter member of the Knights of Columbus. Rudy and his family won that organization's Family of the Year award in 1988.

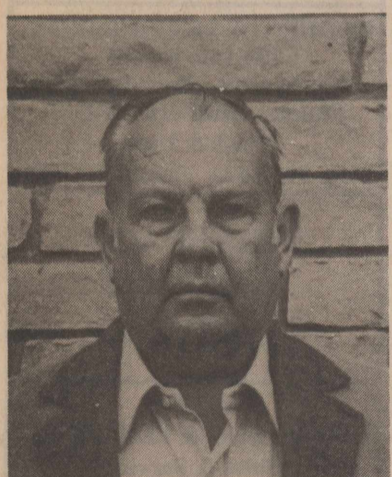

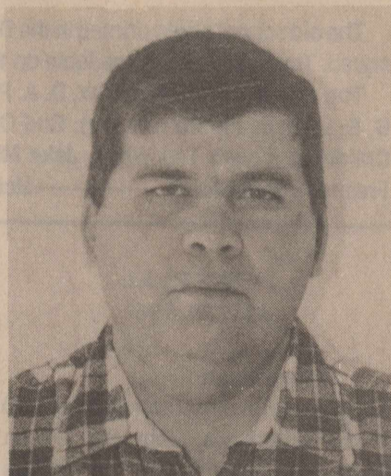

Candidates look to March 13 Primary

Filing for a place on the March 13 Democratic Primary ballot ended Jan. 2 with four contested races in Crockett County.

The justice of the peace slot drew five candidates. Included are: incumbent Christine Davee, Roylan Sullivan, James M. (Jim) Hearne, Hector De La Garza and Mike Sadler.

Hector De La Garza seeking J.P. slot



"In announcing my candidacy for justice of the peace, I feel that I am highly qualified to carry out the duties and responsibilities required of a justice of the peace. Having served under Sheriff Billy Mills for eight years, initially two years as a jailer and then six years as a deputy sheriff, gave me the opportunity to become well-acquainted with law enforcement and the Crockett County criminal justice system, including the specific duties and responsibilities of a justice of the peace, such as the setting of fines on Class C misdemeanors and traffic citations, the ordering of autopsies, and the setting of bail on those accused, the arraignment of individuals and the issuing of warrants."

The candidate is a 1980 graduate of Ozona High School. He attended T.S.T.I. in Waco where he studied range management before entering law enforcement.

He is certified by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Office Standards and Education as a jailer. In 1982 De La Garza completed a two day certification program in civil and criminal child abuse investigations through the Texas Department of Human Resources Office of Investigator General. He is certified in the laws of arrest and is a certified peace officer through the Concho Valley Regional Law Enforcement Academy. The peace officer certification training required 328 hours.

"I would hereby pledge that if I am elected justice of the peace, I would carry out the duties of this office in a fair and impartial manner, taking into

You can use it or sign up the way you have in the past. Remember, Jan. 31 is the last day to file for timely payments.

Producers who have feed tickets need to have them turned in by Jan. 19 so that payments may be made the last week in January. Turn your tickets in as soon as you have them to avoid being late.





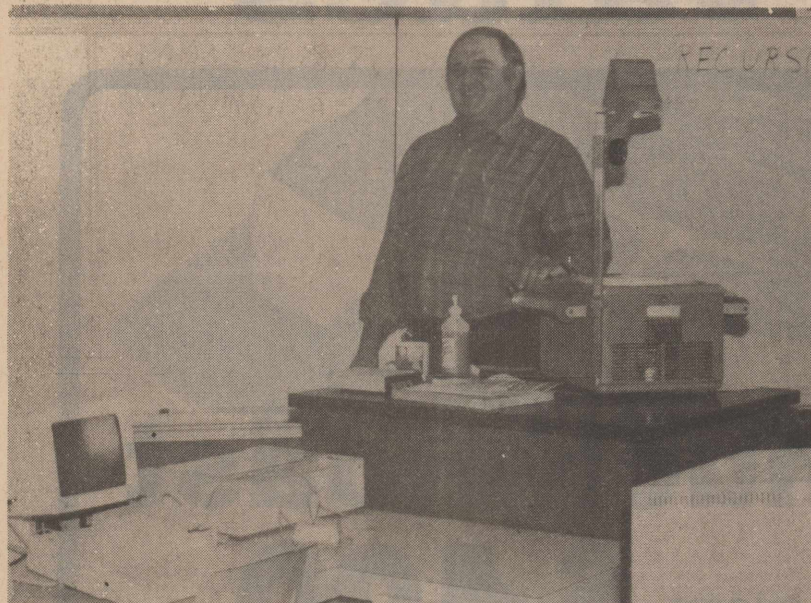

Lane Scott appointed to state post in Austin

The Jan. 15 close of the semester ends an 18-year career in the local school system for Scott who has accepted an appointment to TEA's Division of Educational Technology in Austin.

Scott will be in charge of the division's secondary level computer science curriculum development, implementation of new ideas, and preparation of proclamations informing publishers what materials should be included in computer class textbooks.

He will work closely with the 20 Education Service Centers which serve Texas' 1063 school districts.

Texas is a leading state in educational technology use and training among educators, and Scott is excited about his role in the field.

"This was an opportunity I couldn't turn down, an opportunity for tremendous professional growth," said Scott.

As education specialist, Scott will be second only to department director Dr. Geoffrey Fletcher.

Since implementing Ozona High School's computer program nine years ago, Scott has designed, developed and taught graduate level computer courses at Sul Ross State University for two summers. He wrote the current computer science work text used by the district, developed and installed computer systems in the school offices and instructed staff in the use of the systems.

He conducted numerous summer workshops at Education Service Centers, and others for the Texas Computer Education Association's state conferences, the Minnesota Educational Computing Corporation's national conferences, Lubbock and Ysleta school districts.

Scott compiled, established and maintained a 300 plus volume library of public domain software for the Texas Computer Education Association.

Through his activity with computer education organizations, Scott has a "feel for the pulse of what's going on in Texas." Although his position as education specialist will be quite dif-

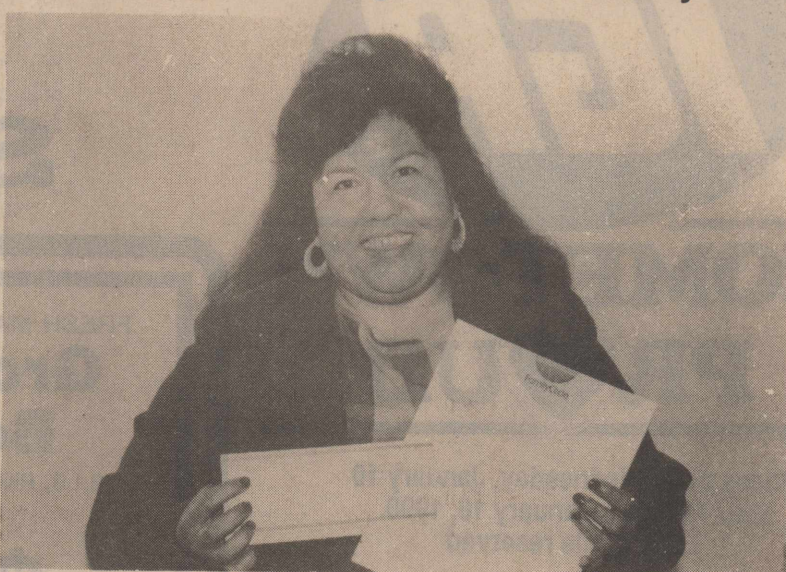

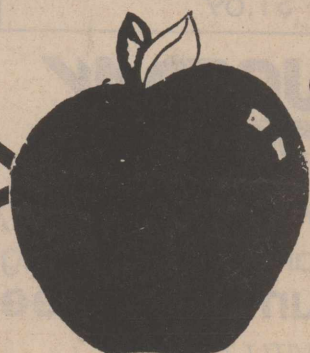

Propane retailers and consumers perplexed over price increases

Texas LP-Gas dealers watched in frustration as wholesale prices of propane skyrocketed nearly 200 percent while icy winter weather sent temperatures plummeting. Many propane retailers experienced a dozen price increases in thirty days that left them shivering, along with consumers, over the historic cost climb.

Gas processing plants and oil company refineries who manufacture propane dealt retailers a heavy blow by charging prices approximately 50 cents a gallon higher than just a month ago.

"Supply and demand is ruling the marketplace," said Lynn Gray, president of the Texas LP-Gas Association. Gray, who is also president of Dixie LP Gas in Hillsboro, is mystified over the way gas producers have responded to the situation. "It appears they (gas producers) are taking advantage. Its not costing them any more to produce, but they are getting all the market will bear. It's a windfall profit for them." Texas producers are shipping propane out-of-state where they can get more money for their gas.

Propane dealers are caught in the middle of a difficult situation as they try to balance unhappy customers on one side with escalating wholesale prices on the other. Most dealers are absorbing a percentage of the increases while the cost of doing business goes up. "We are faced with increased capital in inventories, larger accounts receivables to carry and setting aside more bad debt reserves," Gray explained.

According to Gray, the existing LP-gas supply/production infrastructure is operating at reduced levels in response to several years of warmer weather. The industry has been hard pressed to cope with the demands of the nation's record-setting cold temperatures. A turn towards warmer weather should allow inventory to build up and a moderating wholesale price index.

In the meantime, propane dealers have their hands full meeting delivery demands amplified by the cold weather while keeping prices as low as possible.

Diabetes program open to public

Are you—or a family member or friend—a diabetic? If so, you may want to make plans to attend a special program on "Dealing with the Diabetic Diet" at the January Progressive Extension Homemakers Club meeting on Thursday, Jan. 18, at noon, at the civic center.

Diabetes seems to be linked to genetics, obesity and age—and nearly one in every 20 North Americans has diabetes. Hispanics seem to be a high-risk group, and many of the diabetics in Crockett County are Hispanic.

Since diet is an important factor both in prevention and control of diabetes, it's vital to educate yourself about diabetes and the role of diet and exercise.

There is no charge to attend this meeting, and anyone interested in the topic is welcome. The meeting lasts from noon to 1 p.m. and many people plan to bring sack lunches so they can come on their lunch hour.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap. For more information, contact the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721 or come by the office, located on the second floor of the courthouse annex.

Diabetes Mellitus is a chronic metabolic disorder that affects the body's ability to manufacture and use insulin, a hormone necessary for the conversion of food into energy.

There are two major types, juvenile (insulin-dependent or Type I) and maturity-onset (non-insulin-dependent or Type II). Juvenile diabetes, the more severe form of the disease, can appear at any age, but is most commonly diagnosed from infancy to the late thirties, according to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation International and the Diabetes Research Foundation.

Maturity-onset diabetes usually begins in the middle or later years, and both weight control and diet management are important in its treatment.

About 11 million Americans suffer from diabetes, and the number is increasing at a rate of 11 percent each year. And although many of us have begun to think of diabetes as a "controllable" disease, diabetes and its complications are a leading cause of death in America, with 150,000 persons dying each year.

In addition to being a major cause of death from disease, diabetes is the leading cause of new adult blindness in the United States, and kidney disease and circulatory problems also often result from diabetes.

At the January program, if there is enough interest we may form a local diabetes support group or plan a series of programs to assist diabetics, their friends and families in controlling this serious illness.

So join us next Thursday and bring a friend...we'll be looking for you.

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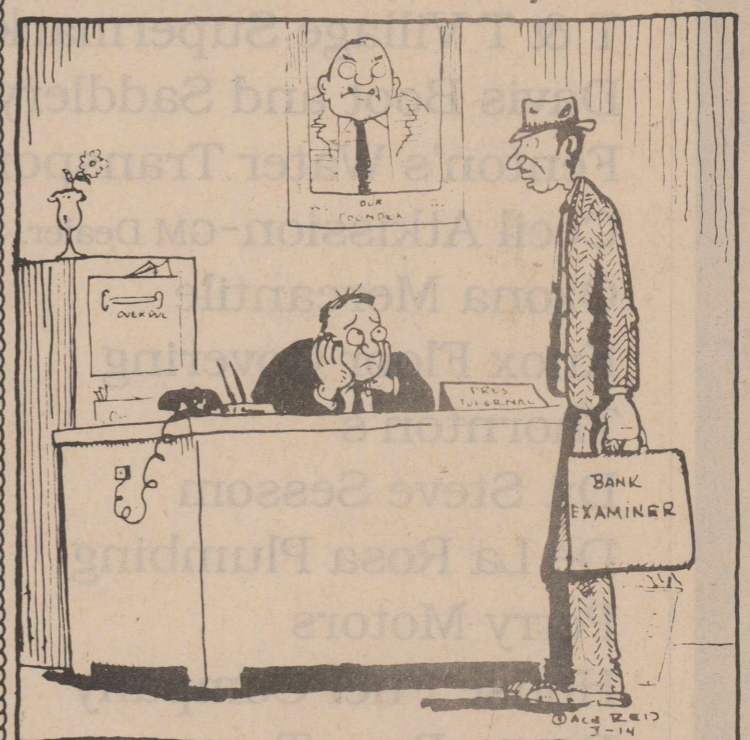

Valerie Perez, Tricia Hartnett and Tamel West each had two rebounds.

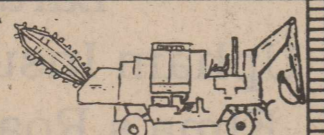

"We could have blown them off the court had we had different referees," said Melissa Moore.

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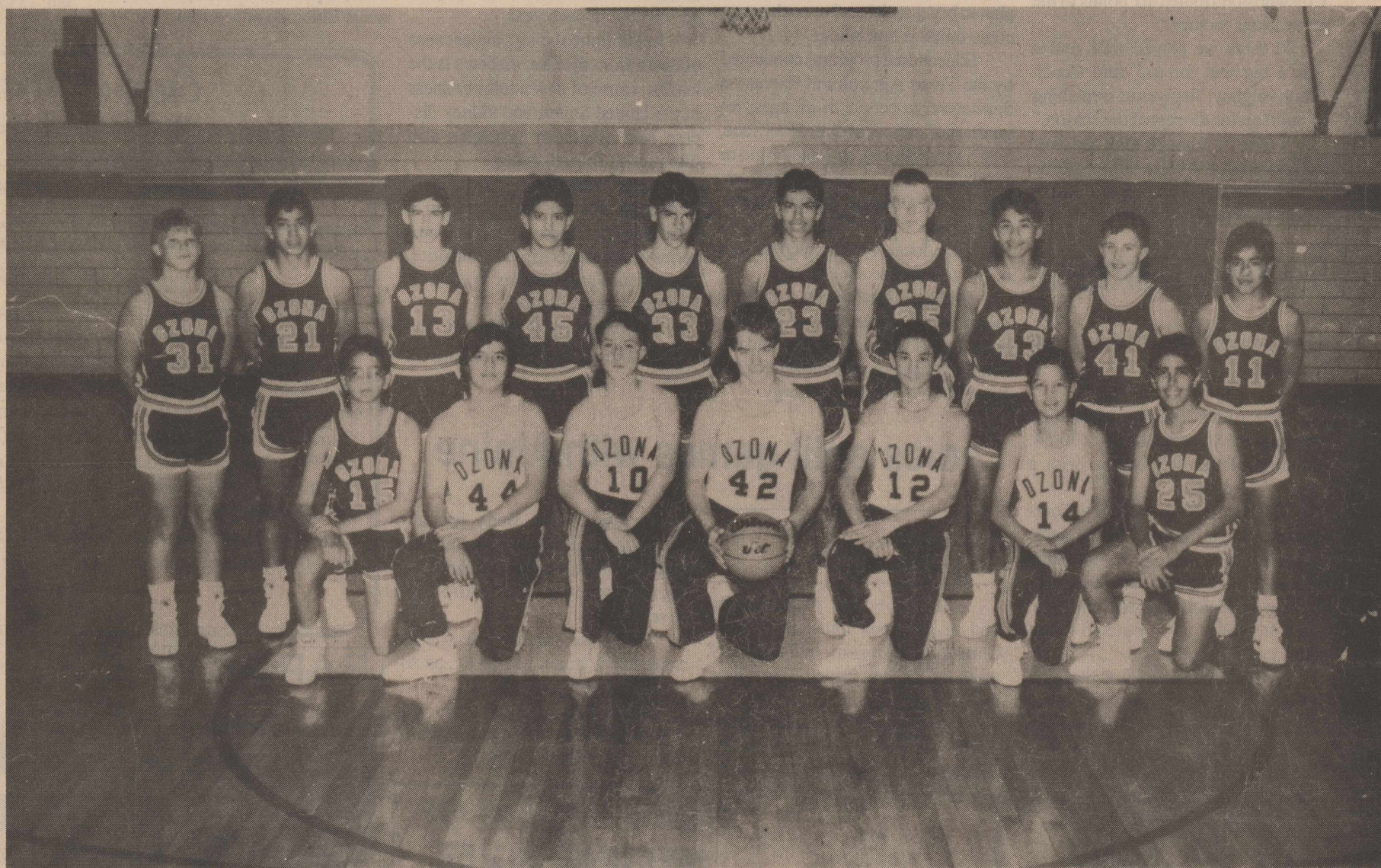

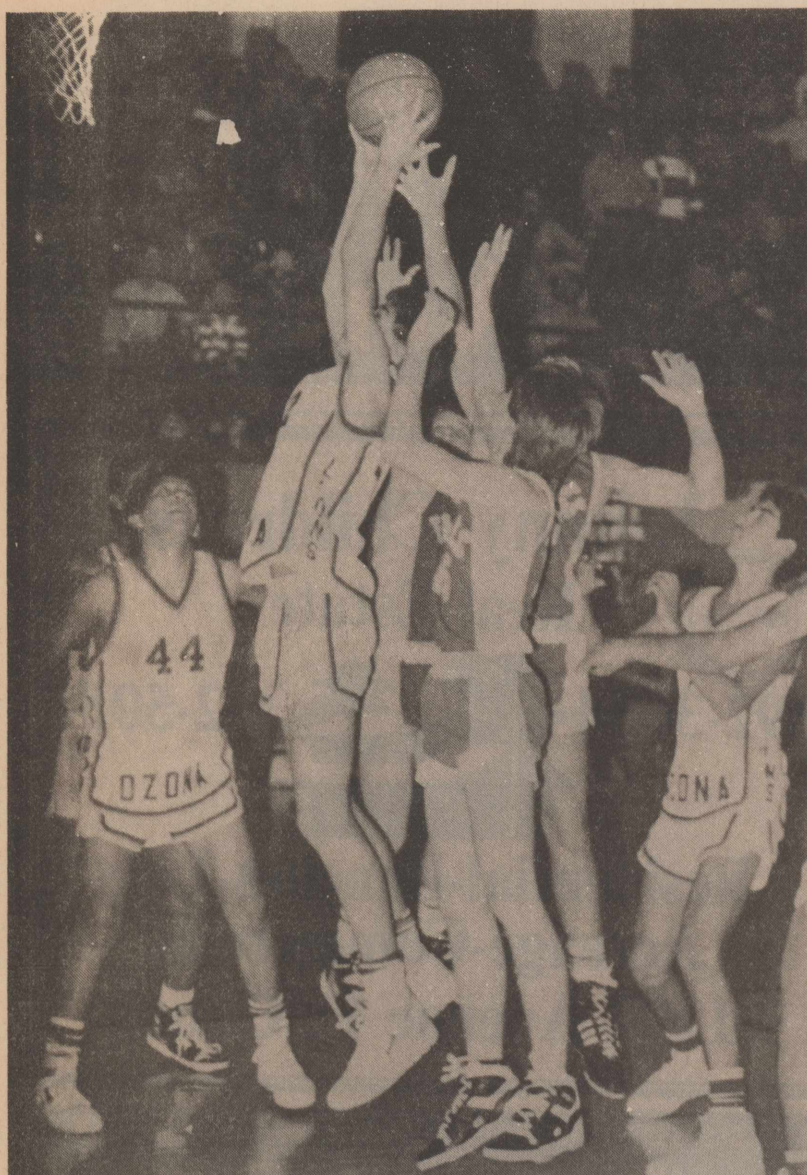

different in some ways, but the Cubs still overcame McCamey, 38-31.

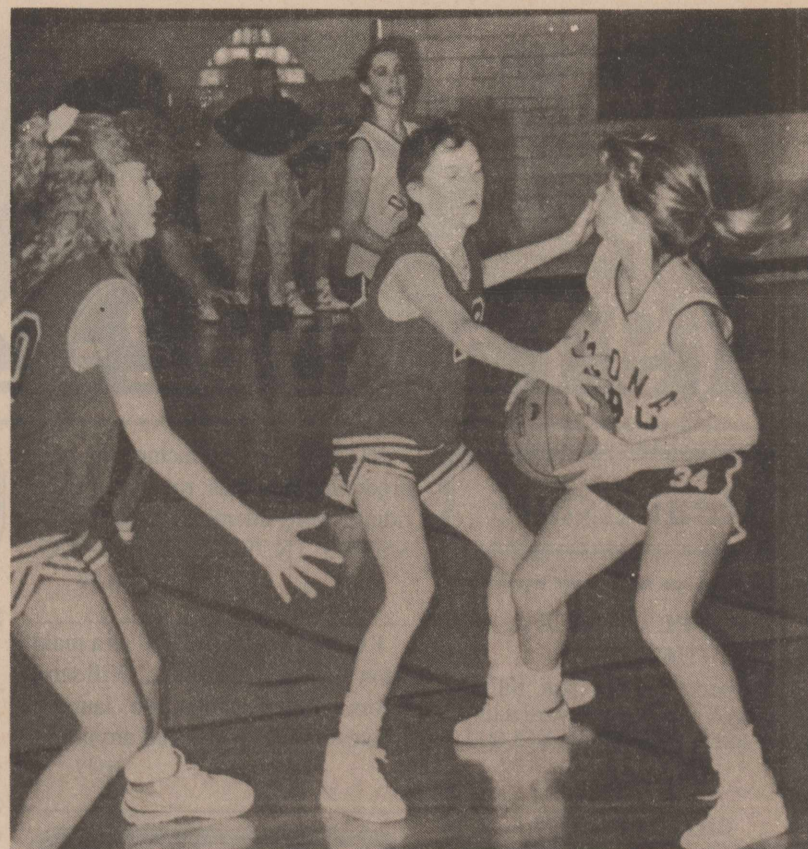

Avila also was the leader in rebounds as she had four during the game. Claudia also helped the team out quite a bit by taking the ball away 15 times which made her the leader in steals.

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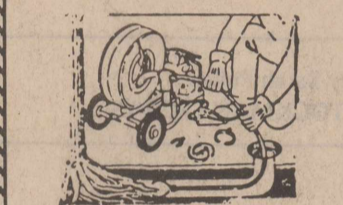
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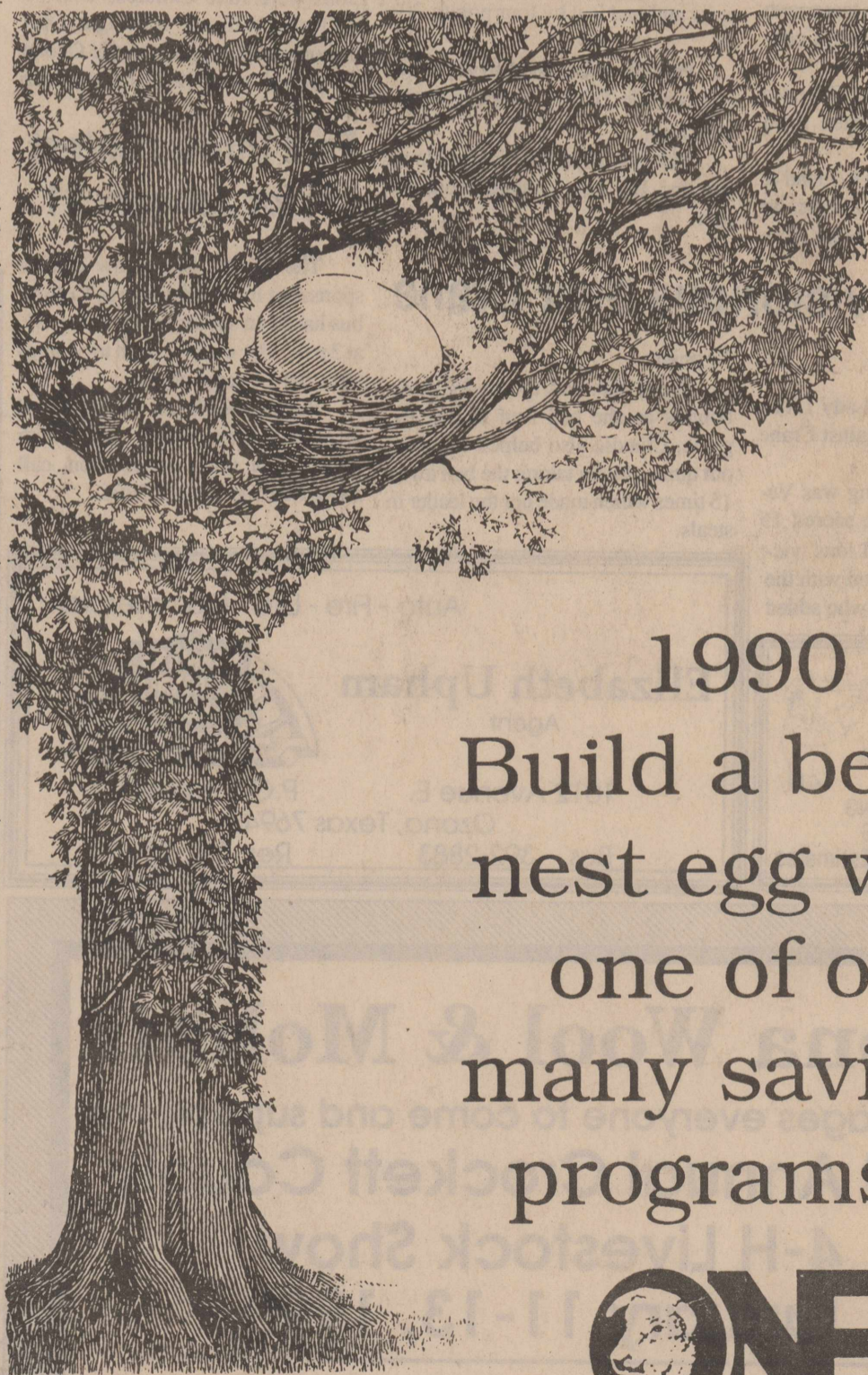


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
