## Chamber of Commerce banquet.....

### Henderson named Outstanding Citizen

John L. Henderson III was named Outstanding Citizen Jan. 18 at the 26th Annual Chamber of Commerce Awards Banquet. The surprise award was presented by Stephen Williams as organization president Diane Myers listed Henderson's accomplishments for an appreciative audience.

Other awards presented during the evening went to: Bruce Beasley and Ricky Burger, Outstanding Young People; Maridel Dudley, Teacher of the Year; Just Say No Club, Organization of the Year; and Mr. and Mrs. L. A. McCaleb, Unsung Hero award. Accepting a plaque on behalf of the Ozona Junior High Just Say No Club were organization president April Graham and sponsor Lloyd Winkley.

The Unsung Hero award was accepted for the McCalebs by Bob Falkner, fire chief.

Henderson, a native of Crockett County, exhibited definite signs of enterprising traits at an early age according to family members. His business ventures began at the age of five when he gathered vegetables from the family garden and sold them to the neighbors.

In high school he formed a fire-wood company cutting, hauling and selling wood to those who could buy it and giving it to those in need.

Following a course in welding taken during high school, he headed his own construction company, and after erecting a few small projects, constructed an airplane hangar.

He became interested in aviation at an early age and learned to fly single and twin engine planes. After high school graduation he enrolled in aeronautical engineering school in Tulsa, OK. He purchased a plane, and on his own time at personal expense assisted in searching for missing planes and people.

Upon returning to Crockett County from Tulsa, Henderson began his own conservation contracting business. In addition, he owns Henderson Towers and Henderson Communications and is a rancher.

He has been a member of the Ozona Fire Department since 1980, serving as president and second assistant fire chief.

His enthusiasm for helping others was extended in 1981 through the Emergency Medical Service as an EMT. He received his EMT with Special Skills in 1985 and has served as ambulance coordinator. He teaches life saving skills to adults and in public school programs.

Henderson is a member of Ozona

United Methodist Church, Ozona Lions Club and a director of Ozona Chamber of Commerce. He is currently first vice president of that organization.

Parents of the Outstanding Citizen are Sonny Henderson of Ozona and Martha Henderson of San Antonio.

He resides in Ozona with his wife Jeannine and 2-year-old daughter Jenna.

Bruce Beasley and Ricky Burger, Outstanding Young People award recipients, are both seniors at Ozona High School.

Beasley is a member of the Ozona Lion varsity football team, a member of the District Improvement Team of the Crockett County School District, president of the National Honor Society and annual staff photographer. He is presently ranked first in the Class of 1990.

A 10-year member of the Boy Scouts, he is working toward an Eagle Scout badge. His community service project to help attain this badge is planning park tables for the downtown park under supervision of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

Following high school graduation, Beasley plans to attend Texas A&M University to major in mechanical engineering.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Beasley.

Burger is a member of the Ozona varsity football and track teams, the Ozona Lion Band, the National Honor Society and a UIL literary participant. He is presently ranked fourth in the Class of 1990.

This 10-year-member of Boy Scouts has held positions of patrol leader and senior patrol leader. His community service project for attaining his Eagle Scout Badge in October of 1989 was the relocation of an historical marker to the downtown park under direction of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

Burger is a member of First Baptist Church and has served on the Youth Council there.

After high school graduation, he plans to attend the University of Texas to study civil engineering.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Burger.

Teacher of the Year Maridel Dudley received a standing ovation as she went forward to accept her award. She is in her 27th year of teaching with 25 of those years in Ozona. She taught music in San Angelo for two years before moving to Ozona where she continued teaching music six

years. Mrs. Dudley is noted for her work with a fifth and sixth grade choir. She also works with the UIL students in her school. These students placed first in picture memory competition.

The Teacher of the Year has the utmost respect and admiration of her co-workers and parents of students. She is a member of the Myrtle Post Garden Club and Ozona Women's Forum.

She and her husband, Jim Dudley, are the parents of two sons, Bill and Mark.

Ozona's Organization of the Year was formed in October of 1987 as the OJHS Just Say No Club. Goals of the organization are to educate students on drug use and abuse and develop responsibility, dependability and leadership among its members.

The club has participated in such activities as: donating canned foods to the needy, fund raising for community projects through a poster contest, sponsoring educational assemblies and the Just Say No Christmas Dance, and participating in Red Ribbon Week activities.

The Just Say No Club has been an asset to the school in that it teaches members how to say no to drugs. The club has also been an asset to the community in involving community leaders with young leaders.

Mr. and Mrs. L. A. McCaleb, recipients of the Unsung Hero award, came to Ozona in 1935 from Oklahoma. The station house of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department has been home for them for 17 years. As live-in caretakers of the firehouse they maintain eight firetrucks, answer phones and radios.

When there is a fire, no matter what time of night or early morning hour, they do not return to bed until the last fireman is back at the station.

Under the McCalebs, the fire station is run like a family. Many firemen have adopted the McCalebs, and visa versa.

"They are not with us tonight, instead, they are doing what they love best, manning the fire station," said Mrs. Myers in announcing the award.

### Fire destroys Chato's kitchen

Sparks from a wire damaged by flashing during construction were determined to be the cause of a fire at Chato Restaurant Thursday. Fire Marshal Steve Kenley detailed the events leading up to the early morning fire during an interview Tuesday.

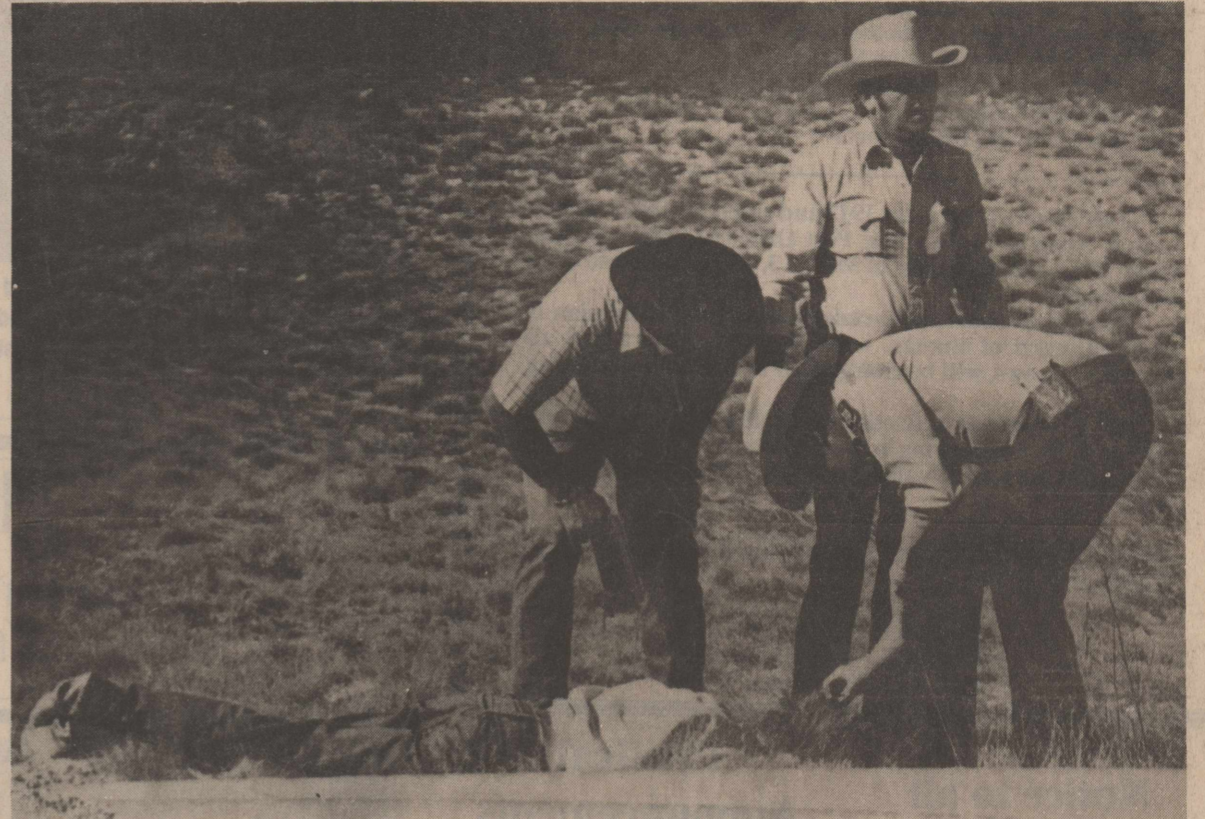
The fire was discovered at 3:36 a.m. Thursday by Water District employees picking up a fellow worker. When firemen arrived they found flames coming from the roof.

The fire originated in the wall of the kitchen, heavily damaging the room. Fire and heat damage were also heavy in the upstairs office and storage area.

A problem was discovered Sunday when restaurant personnel noticed smoke coming from the top of the building and found a hot spot on a wall.

Owner Joe Tobar removed three-fourths of a wall and discovered sparks on tin. After correcting the problem, he rebuilt the wall; however, one damaged section was missed where the wall was not removed, Kenley said. There was just enough electricity on the tin to cause heating which set the insulation on fire. This area continued to smolder, causing the Thursday morning fire, Kenley said.

Work is underway at the restaurant to reopen in the front portion of the building in about two weeks. Tobar has been remodeling that section for use as a banquet room.

## Three gun shots to the head.....

### Man found murdered on I-10

The body of a man found shot to death in Crockett County last weekend remained to be identified Tuesday, Sheriff Jim Wilson said. The victim, a white male in his late 20's, was discovered about 32 miles west of Ozona in a ditch alongside I-10 by a trucker about 10:30 a.m. Sunday.

An autopsy by the Bexar County Medical Examiner's Office in San Antonio revealed that the man died from three gunshot wounds to the head. A ballistics report showed that the victim was shot with a .22 caliber handgun.

No identification was found on the body, and the medical examiner was unable to obtain fingerprints that would aid in identification. The F.B.I. laboratory in Washington has agreed to assist in obtaining fingerprints and identifying the body, Wilson said.

The medical examiner determined that the man had been killed late Friday or early Saturday.

The victim had reddish-blond hair, was 5 feet, 11 1/2 inches tall and weighed 129 pounds. He was wearing a grey sweat shirt and blue jeans. Lace-up type boots were found near the body.

"We have two tasks," Wilson said.

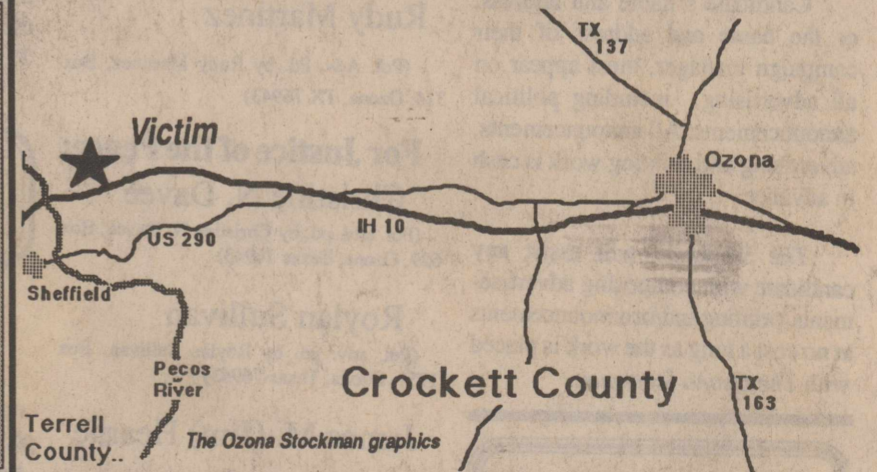

"We've got to identify the body before we can start a good murder investigation." and officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety. The Crockett County Sheriff's Office and Texas Rangers are conducting the investigation.

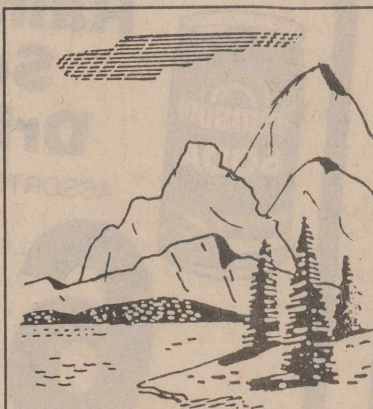

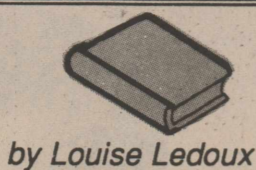

He makes projectile points and other tools using the same techniques utilized by the Indians.

Bachman is on the Crockett County Museum Board and has conducted archeological field schools for the museum.





Mike Fay led the team with 16 points and Keith Miller contributed 12.

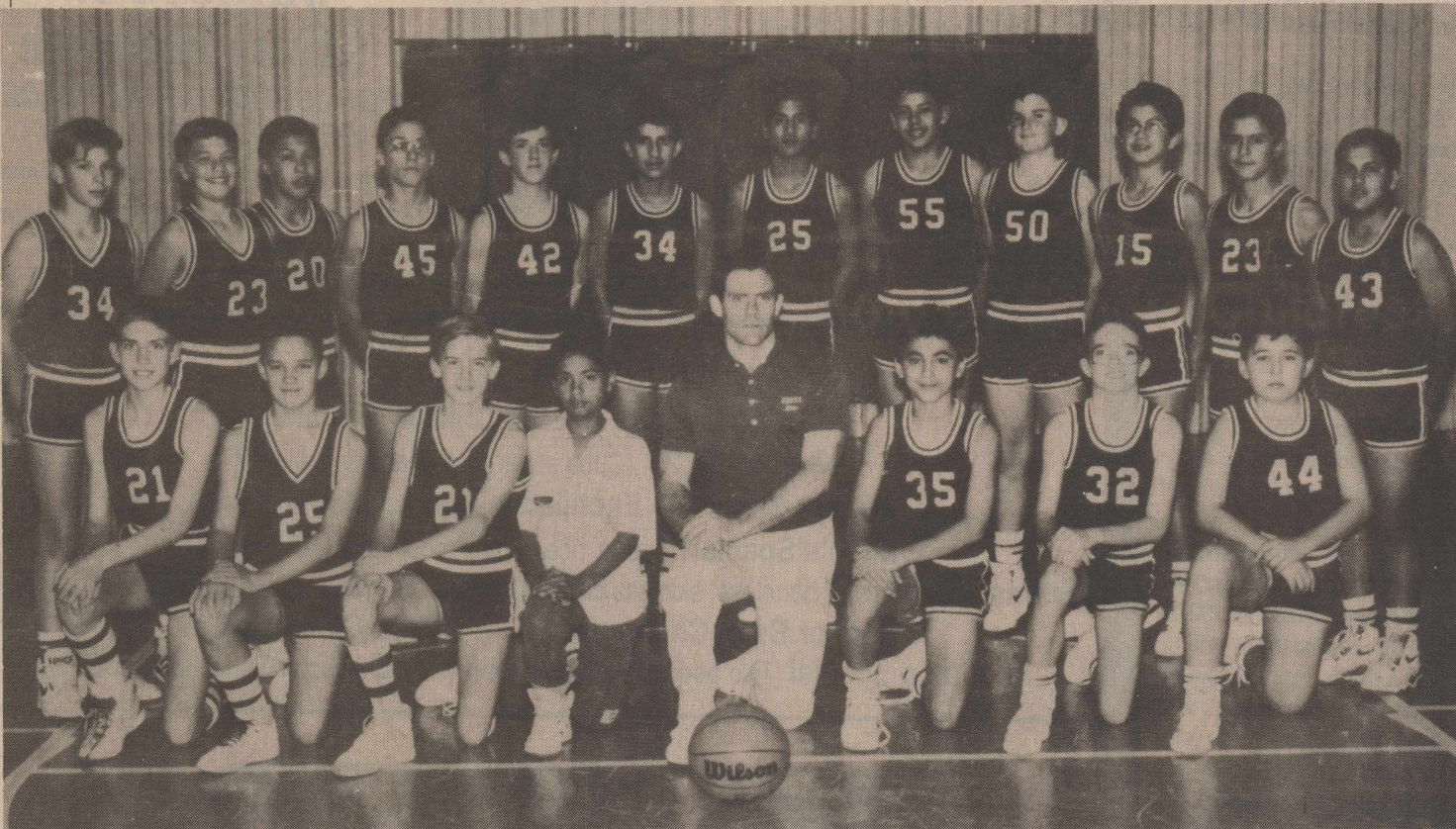
On the other side of things, the seventh grade Cubs merely ran over Big Lake and had no trouble in their 42-15 win.

Others adding points included Tricia Hartnett with seven, Claudia Avilia with five and Carri Chandler with one point.

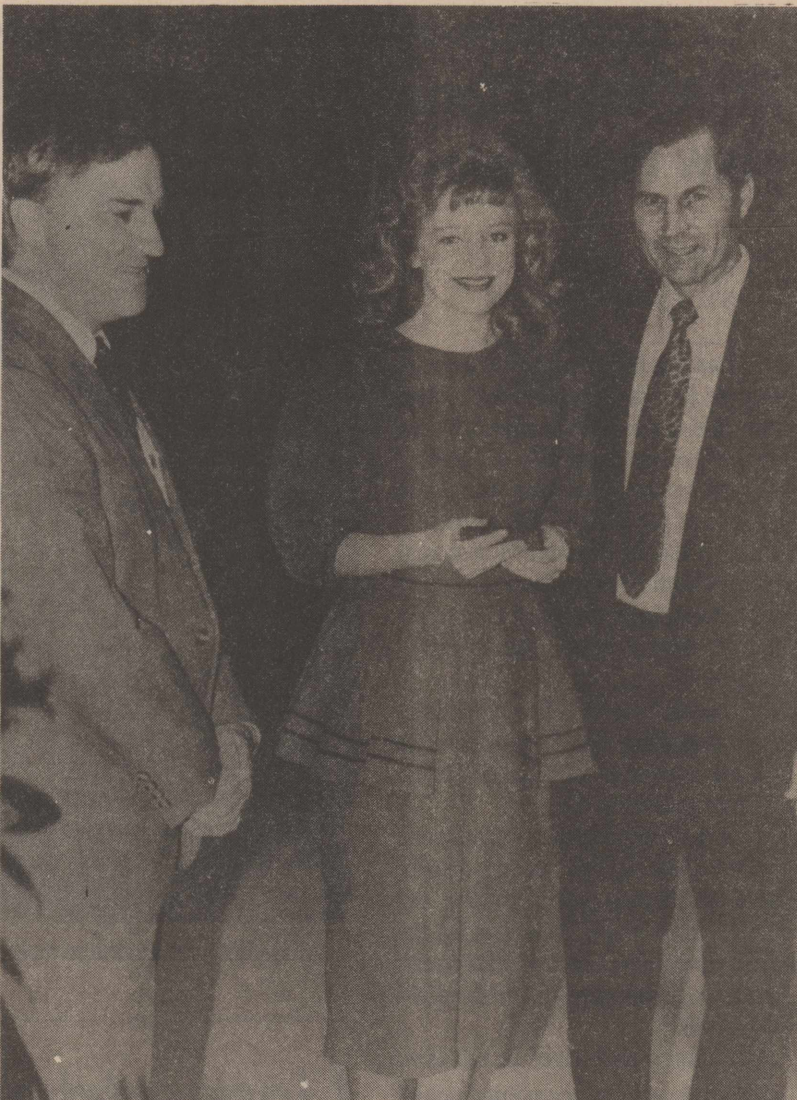

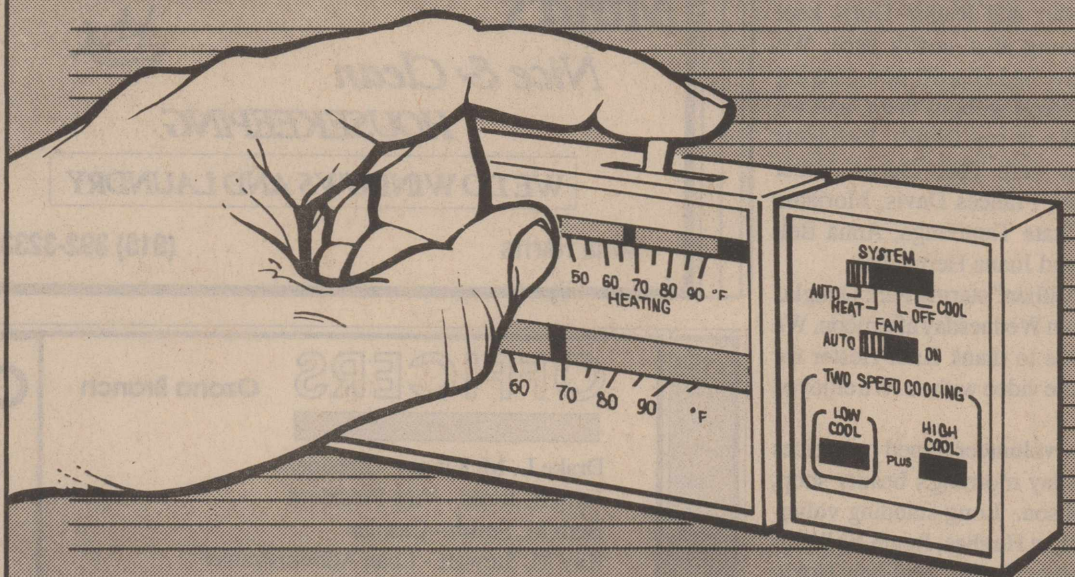
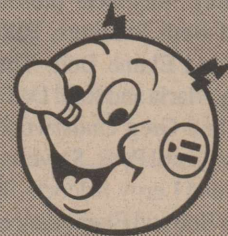

## Extension Connection

### INTERVENTION IS NOT INTERFERENCE

If you report suspected child abuse, isn't it because you're a nosy neighbor with nothing better to do than stick your nose into other people's private business? Is it because you're a vindictive person and you just want to get back at someone?

The answer is a resounding "No!" Last year in Texas, about 45 thousand children were sexually abused or neglected—including 97 who were killed by violent adults—according to the Texas Department of Human Services.

Despite continued public awareness of abuse, the people who perpetrate these violent acts often walk away untouched. Do you know that 32 percent of all child abuse reports involve families who were previously investigated by Child Protective Services?

And we're all paying for this abuse. Since abuse is a learned behavior, those who are abused now will often be problems later. And we pay millions in medical and social service costs each year. For example, if only half of the 13 thousand Texas children confirmed by the Texas Department of Human Services as being physically abused last year required hospitalization for five days each, the medical costs would exceed \$10 million.

But if you feel as I do, paying for services would be better than knowing that many confirmed cases of child abuse are never investigated and are dropped every day because of critical staff shortages in the agencies that handle the reports.

So what is child abuse? It's repeated mistreatment or neglect of a child by parents or other guardians resulting in injury or harm. It may be physical, such as shaking, beating, burning (or even failure to provide adequate food and other necessities of life) or verbal, such as excessive yelling, belittling or teasing.

Abuse can also be emotional—failure to provide warmth, attention, supervision, or a normal living experience. And, unfortunately, abuse can also be sexual—including incest, rape or other sexual activity.

And it's important to remember that child abuse can happen anywhere—in poor, middle class or well-to-do homes, in rural areas, suburbs or cities, and can involve one or both parents.

We do know now that child abuse

is a symptom that can be successfully treated, but more people have to understand abuse and be ready to report it.

Why do parents abuse their children? Experts believe it's often in reaction to past or present problems or stresses the adult can't cope with. Immaturity, unrealistic expectations, lack of parenting knowledge, social isolation, unmet emotional needs, frequent crises, poor childhood experiences and drug or alcohol problems can all be to blame.

And it's important to remember that every parent has the potential to abuse a child at some time—child abusers don't walk around looking like a child abuser—they're "normal" and relatively few are what you'd call "criminal" or mentally unbalanced.

So if the abuser isn't walking around looking like an abuser, how can you tell if there is abuse in a family?

Some common signs are repeated injuries, children with a neglected appearance, disruptive behavior—or passive, withdrawn behavior, parents who are "super-critical". That is, they discipline their children frequently and severely—they may begin to abuse when their unrealistic standards aren't met. And families that are extremely isolated, who don't share in school or community activities may be distrustful and afraid of people and the help they could provide.

It's important to use caution and good sense in identifying child abuse. Every parent makes errors in judgment and action at some times....but when it becomes plain that this is a pattern or is becoming one, then it's time to get help.

If you know or suspect of a child abuse case, you have a moral and legal responsibility to see that it is reported. By law, you can't be prosecuted for doing so in good faith. First, be sure you know the facts, then act upon them by being a friend and/or contacting local service agencies, such as Child Protective Services, the local welfare department and social service agencies, public health authorities, the school the child attends, the Sheriff's Department or a hospital, in an emergency.

A toll-free number you can call is the Child Abuse Hotline: 1-800-242-5400. There is also the Child Help USA Hotline at 1-800-422-4453.

Remember, intervention is not interference. If we are going to break the deadly cycle of child abuse, we all have to act responsibly and rationally—and help a child who needs us.

As semifinalists, they are being recognized for their leadership, achievements and potential.

On April 19-21, the 150 students selected as finalists in the Coca-Cola Scholars' Program will attend the national competition in Atlanta. All finalists must attend the national competition in order to be considered for a national or a regional award. Finalists will be interviewed and evaluated by the National Selection Committee.

The committee will select 50 National Scholars to receive \$5,000 awards, renewable each year for up to four years, and 100 Regional Scholars to receive \$1,000 awards, also renewable each year for up to four years.
