Owensby supporters fill court room.....

Board, court sign doctors' contracts

Approximately 50 community members attended commissioners' court Monday in support of a revised physician's contract for Dr. Robert Owensby. The court heard comments from Owensby and all who wished to speak before they voted to approve a contract which Owensby and the hospital board had previously signed. The motion to accept the contract contained the stipulation that renegotiation begin as quickly as possible.

Later in the day, members requested a 7 p.m. meeting to discuss contracts with both Dr. Owensby and Dr. Marcus Sims. Judge Kathryn Mayfield and commissioners Chuy Castro, Sostenes De Hoyos, Janet Hill and Jim House met in executive session with hospital board president Armando Arredondo and board members Fred Deaton and John Daniels. Dr. Sims was asked to remain in the room and discuss his contract first.

After waiting in an anteroom at the courthouse with others for some time, Dr. Owensby said he had completed 60 hours of medical coverage in Sonora at 7 a.m., was tired and was going home.

When the commissioners were unable to speak with Dr. Owensby, a call was made to his home by Arredondo who was told the doctor was too tired to return to the meeting.

"We stayed this late to discuss Dr. Owensby's contract with him; he failed to stay, so we were unable to renegotiate his contract," Judge Mayfield said after returning to regular session.

The meeting adjourned at 8:37 p.m.

The community involvement Monday was an outgrowth of the hospital board meeting Feb. 8. Four citizens attended that meeting to speak on Dr. Owensby's behalf.

"My doctor is leaving and I want to know why," said Mrs. Margaret Coates.

The ladies indicated they had heard if the doctor's contract was not revised to equal that of Dr. Sims', Dr. Owensby would be closing his private practice and leaving Ozona.

Board member Fred Deaton explained that budgets are drawn up in late summer and finalized in the fall for the following year. When Dr. Owensby presented a revised contract at a Jan. 12 meeting and asked that it be considered, the new budget year had begun. No funds were budgeted to handle a contract increase from \$5,000 to \$8,500 per month for the doctor or for the additional salaries

for 1 1/2 employees who would be required for additional paper work and assisting with exams.

These expenses could put the hospital \$70,000 to \$80,000 over budget according to Bill Boswell, administrator.

"I was not consulted about my contract when it was entered in the budget," Owensby said Thursday night.

Both doctors, Boswell and two board members make up the budget committee for the hospital.

When asked what he wanted, Owensby said the main points were hospital billing, clerical assistance and the same basic contract money-wise as Dr. Sims.

"After the end of February, I'll have no secretary. My practice as it is now will not exist," Owensby told the board. His secretary, Lara Baggett has resigned effective Feb. 28. The doctor stressed the necessity for perfection in processing Medicare forms and said he is unable to keep up with constantly changing Medicare regulations.

"I did not say I was going to leave right away; I did sign a contract. I plan on staying under the new contract for the present," Owensby told the board Thursday night.

When asked at the board meeting by Judge Mayfield if he did not want the court to accept the present contract, Dr. Owensby said, "I'm not withdrawing the contract. I will accept because I have no choice." He did request that revisions be considered.

Contracts for Doctors Owensby and Sims expire Feb. 28. Both have signed one-year contracts identical to those which expire. A clause in the contracts provides for cancellation by either the doctor or commissioners after giving the other party 30 days written notice.

Under the contracts, both doctors are on call two weekends per month. Both conduct three-hour clinics on the Saturday mornings they are on call.

Each doctor is on call 50 percent of the month between the hours of 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. Monday through Friday.

Each doctor provides six weeks coverage for the other to have vacation and continuing education time during the year.

Dr. Owensby receives rent and utilities at no charge in his office at the medical building where he conducts his private practice.

Dr. Sims has no private practice.

He conducts a clinic at the hospital Monday-Thursday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. until noon Friday.

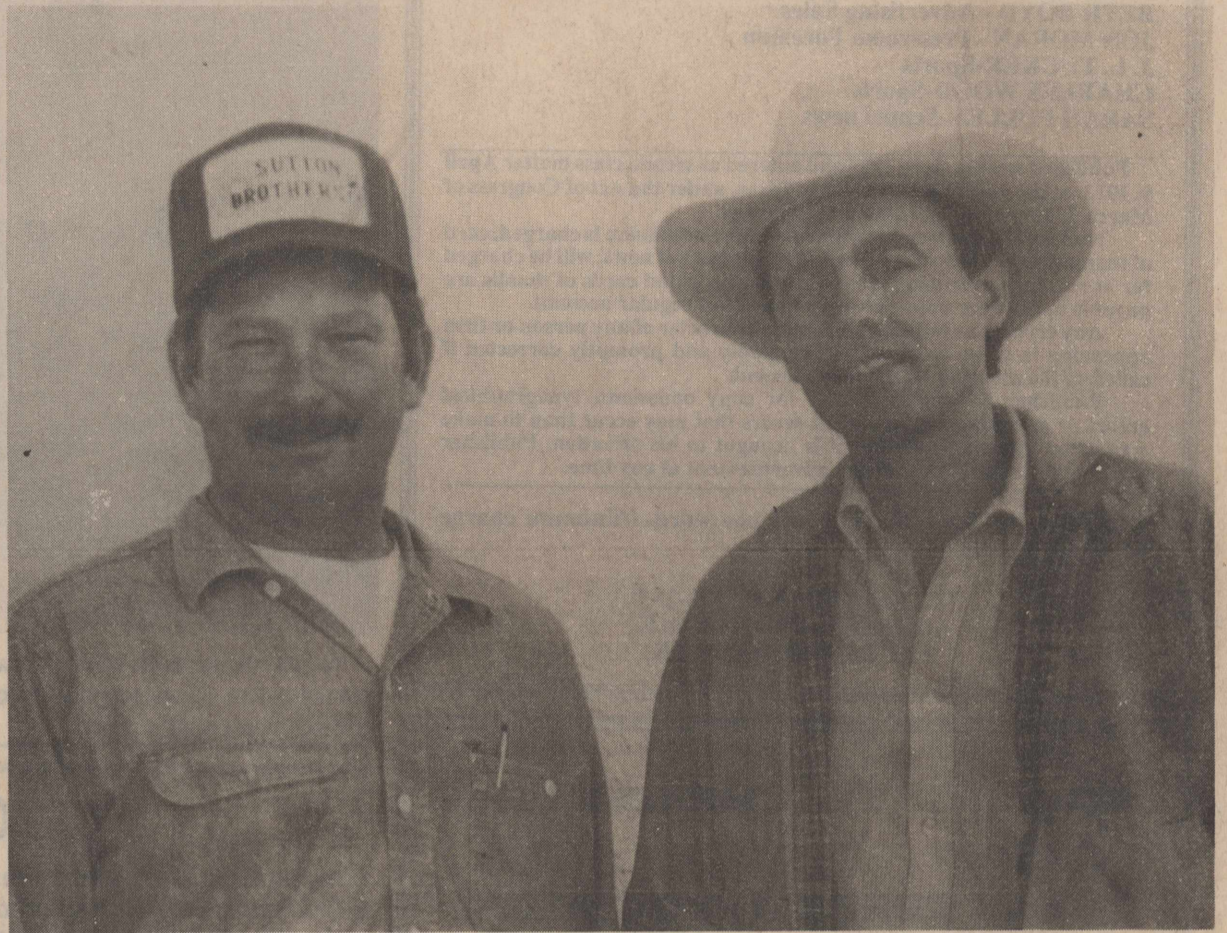
Dr. Owensby's contract is for \$5,000 per month.

Dr. Sims' contract guarantees him \$8,500 per month. Every three months, the amount he has earned seeing patients is averaged. He then receives 85 percent of anything he has made exceeding \$8,500.

All monies earned for the hospital by both doctors through tests, use of facilities, etc. go to the hospital. Only the basic examination fees are counted toward the contract guarantees.

Personnel matters, including contracts and/or salaries, are normally discussed by governing bodies in executive session, not in a public forum.

As of Monday night, there were no plans for further meetings on the contracts.

Mohair producers form marketing board

West Texas mohair producers have formed a marketing pool to better meet the needs of an expanding industry.

The United States Mohair Marketing Board was formed in Sonora Feb. 6 after four previous meetings in area towns indicated a large amount of hair would be committed to such a pool.

"There are a lot of respected producers involved," said board chairman Jeffrey Sutton. More than 200,000 pounds of mohair were signed up Feb. 6 and more than half-a-million pounds are expected to be committed by the Feb. 28 cut off date for the 1990 spring clip.

The five warehouses involved in the program are: Ozona Wool and Mohair Co., Sonora Wool and Mohair

Co., West Texas Wool and Mohair Association of Mertzon, Southwestern Wool and Mohair Inc. of Eden and Del Rio Wool and Mohair Co.

The marketing pool is open to any producer in the United States, and interested producers are asked to contact their warehousemen. Those warehouses interested in participating should contact Glen Fisher at Sonora Wool and Mohair Co.

Membership certificates, which include the number of animals to be committed to the pool, are available from any of the five warehouses in the program.

The key to the program is getting as much tonnage as possible in the first year, Sutton said.

The association expects to pay

producers one-third of the estimated price for their mohair when it is delivered to the warehouse. An additional one-third should be paid about 30 days later with the balance paid when the value of the clip is determined at the end of the year.

The payments will be made from a fund comprised of a five cent per pound deduction on all mohair in the pool. The deduction remains with the board for five years. Plans are to return the first year's fund, dollar for dollar, to producers in the sixth year. The second year's fund would be returned in the seventh year.

The pool provides a better method of marketing with more leverage, Sutton believes. The mohair will be graded according to world-accepted

standards and will be offered for sale throughout the world.

Officers of the board in addition to Sutton are: Pat Jackson of Mertzon, vice-chairman and Gary Leonard of Del Rio, secretary.

The 12 directors elected for a temporary six-month period are: Bob Childress and Sutton of the Ozona area, Gary Leonard and John Finegan of the Del Rio area, Hayden Haby and Armer Earwood of the Sonora area; Bill Tullos and Pat Jackson of the Mertzon area and Bobby Zesch and Don Conner of the Eden area.

Elected as at-large members are Allen Beck and Joe David Ross of Sonora.

The next committee meeting will be Feb. 28 at 7 p.m. in First National Bank of Sonora, Sutton said.

Ozona complying with EPA regulations

Anyone who has driven through Ozona lately will no doubt have noticed the excavations being made on the property of many local service stations. These businesses are responding to a nationwide call for the regulation of underground storage tanks. Curtis Keith, who is maintenance supervisor for the Ozona Public School system, recently attended a seminar given by the Texas Department of Health. He returned with the following statistics: 2 million tanks already exist, 75% are bare steel, and 1 out of 4 are leaking already.

On December 22, 1988, the Environmental Protection Agency handed down a package of new regulations designed to prevent ground water contamination by gasoline and other products which are stored underground. Under the EPA's plan, each state is charged with implementing its

own set of regulations. The state's rules are required to be as strict or stricter than those proposed by the EPA. The state must then submit its plan to the EPA for approval. The State of Texas approved its version on Sept. 29, 1989.

A large number of people are affected by this legislation. Ernest McFarland, who is a field investigator for the Texas Water Commission, noted that "all underground storage is affected, not just petroleum products." Those who must comply with the new regulations are, as he put it "anyone with an underground tank that is not exempt." The guidelines are so complex that this determination must be made on a case by case basis.

Although some of the new regulations have already forced permanent measures to be taken, the package is not yet complete. As Mr. McFarland pointed out, the EPA has not yet reviewed the Texas version, and "it would not be at all unlikely for there to be further changes at this stage." Also, though the EPA doesn't require it, state law also covers above ground tanks. As of now, the only

requirement is that these tanks be state-registered, but according to McFarland, "above ground tank regulations are likely to come in the very future."

A guideline sheet supplied by the EPA outlines the major requirements for the primary target of the legislation—underground tanks which store petroleum products. First of all, every tank—new or existing—will have to install spill/overflow prevention and corrosion protection (for piping also). The spill/overflow prevention consists of catchment basins, and either automatic shutoff devices, overflow alarms, or ball float valves. Corrosion protection is achieved by fiberglass coatings

on tanks and lines, and the use of "sacrificial anodes," pieces of metal that corrode in place of the steel tanks they are attached to.

Eventually, all tanks will be required to use a system known as monthly monitoring: automatic tank gauging to detect unexplained drops in fluid levels, vapor monitoring to detect leaking gases outside the tank, internal monitoring of piping, ground water monitoring with shallow wells, and "other approved methods." At the present time, owners can opt for monthly inventory control (on all

Judge Mayfield to represent county at Washington D.C. SPEC landfill meeting next week

Commissioners voted Monday to have Judge Kathryn Mayfield represent Crockett County at a meeting to discuss landfills next week in Washington, D.C.

Judge Mayfield will join other representatives from counties who are members of SPEC, Sparsely Populated Entities Coalition, to meet with Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and Sen. Phil Gramm. Possibility of a meeting with Environmental Protection Agency officials also exists at that time.

Commissioners will meet again Feb. 26 to consider possible dump-ground sites for Crockett County. Several individuals have offered land.

Setting a closure date for the east dump and closure requirements were discussed during the meeting. Members agreed on April 1, 1990 as a cut off date for accepting tires at the local dump.

Court members listened to comments from citizens attending court to request a contract renegotiation for Dr. Robert Owensby. Dr. Owensby was asked to address the court on the matter, and later in the day he and Dr. Marcus Sims were given the opportunity to meet in executive session with the court and three hospital board

members to discuss contracts.

Dan Davidson water board president, and Doug Meador met with the board to discuss use of county equipment by the department in emergency situations.

A video prepared by hospital employee Julian Ramirez was played

TEA accreditation team to visit

Members of the accreditation team from the Texas Education Agency will be available on Wednesday, Feb. 21, to meet with parents and patrons who have an interest in expressing their views and opinions about the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District, according to Garland Davis, school superintendent.

Interviews will be conducted by team members beginning at 6:00 p.m. in the board room of the administrative offices located at 797 Avenue D. Every school district in the state

is required by law to be visited by an accreditation team from the Agency to evaluate the quality of its educational programs and to determine what progress the school district has made since the last visit.

During the interviews, emphasis will be given to the quality of instruction and community support present on each campus in the district. Areas to be evaluated by the team include planning, curriculum, instruction, services to students, instructional resources, personnel, governance, community conditions, and physical facilities.

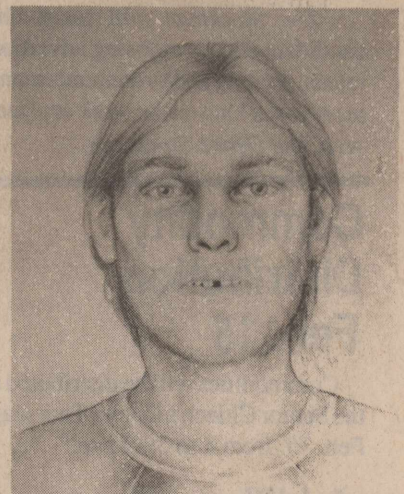

Murder victim identification sought

Crockett County Sheriff's Department is requesting the help of the public in making identification of an unidentified body that was found murdered on Jan. 21, 1990.

The body was found on Interstate 10 thirty-two miles west of Ozona on Sunday, Jan. 21, 1990. There was no identification found on the body. The victim had been beaten and shot in the head. It is believed that the murder occurred on Friday night, Jan. 19, 1990, or Saturday morning, Jan. 20, 1990. The victim is a white male in his 20's, 5' 11-1/2", weighs 129 pounds, reddish blond hair with a light beard and mustache. The victim was wearing a light grey sweat shirt, blue jeans and hiking boots. The teeth of the victim have about a 1/4" gap between the front two teeth and the lower two middle teeth have an overlap. The victim has also had wisdom teeth removed and several fillings.



The offense is being investigated by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Rangers. Anyone who thinks they might know the person or might have seen him are requested to contact the Crockett County Sheriff's Department in Ozona at 915-392-7661.

Texas gas production decreased in November

Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced Jan. 24 that Texas oil and gas wells produced 454,967,152 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in November, compared to the October gas production total of 457,118,507 Mc. November's production was down 2.86 percent compared to November 1988's production of 468,402,739 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary November production, were: Pecos, 26,392,854 Mcf; Zapata, 23,866,682 Mcf; Webb, 23,494,139 Mcf; Panola, 14,493,437 Mcf; Hidalgo, 14,001,467 Mcf; Crane, 13,129,634 Mcf; Hem-

phill, 9,474,948 Mcf; Crockett, 8,756,204 Mcf; McMullen, 7,797,305 Mcf; Moore, 7,518,254 Mcf.

Texas gas production in November came from 185,228 oil wells and 46,461 gas wells.

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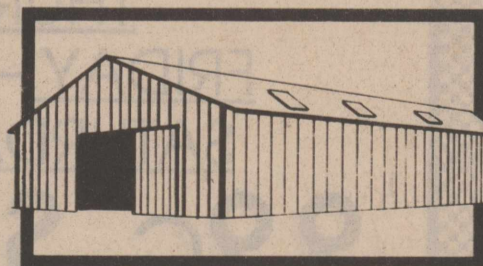

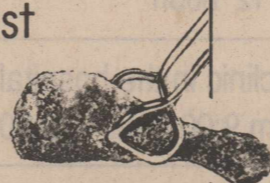

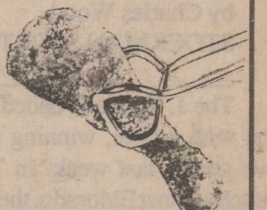

tanks) and tank tightness testing (yearly for existing tanks, every 5 years for new tanks), but these stop-gap measures can only be used until December 1998.

Deadlines for implementing these procedures vary according to the age of the tank. All new tanks must have leak detection, corrosion protection, and spill/overflow prevention at installation. Of the tanks which already exist, the government is strictest with those installed in 1965 or before. According to Ronny Jetton, of Echo Pump Service, "tanks 25 years old or older should already have been certified leakproof or removed by December 22, 1989." If they are tested and found to be tight, the tanks must then be tested annually, with monthly level monitoring. If such a tank is not certified and is used anyway, the owner can, according to Mr. Jetton, be assessed a fine of \$10,000 per day.

To avoid the expense of prolonged testing and monthly monitoring, many businesses have chose to have older tanks removed. The procedure for removing a tank, however, is itself complicated and expensive. According to Mr. Jetton, "the lab work alone is really expensive. Six oil samples must be taken from each pit. Each sample tested can cost at least \$160. It runs about \$1800 per pit with labor, mileage, etc."

It is important to note that "not just anyone with a backhoe can dig up these tanks," as Mr. Jetton points out. The state must be notified 48 hours before digging starts. Officials from the Texas Water Commission must be present to inspect the digging site. The tanks must be de-fumed, either by compressed air or with dry ice. Then the contractor must monitor the inside to make certain that fumes are at lower than explosive concentra-

tions. Trying to dig up a tank without following these procedures is both dangerous and illegal.

Although most owners of old tanks will be faced with high expenses, the cost truly rises when the inspectors find a leak. The cost largely depends upon the extent of the leak and how much soil has been contaminated. Not only must the defective tank be replaced, but the contaminated soil must be taken up and disposed of in a Class 1 landfill, the nearest of which is in San Angelo. There is a fund, however, which is designed to help out financially in case a leak is found. The Texas Petroleum Product Delivery Fund will pay all expenses after the first \$10,000 and up to \$1 million, but only if there is a leak.

The new rules have forced many local businesses to take action, with many difficulties and much expense.

In addition to providing the traditional communication with the local media, Humble will be representing WTBR throughout the West Texas area. She will be working with friends of the Ranch to develop support for the boy care programs.

Humble brings to the Ranch a strong background in communications and agriculture. Having spent the last four years in San Antonio, she was previously employed as a sales representative for Lone Star Meat Company, and as an account executive from 1985-87 with Reata Advertising, a livestock advertising agency.

Humble's agricultural background stems from growing up on the Rio Concho Ranch near Sterling City. She received a B. S. in agricultural communications in May 1984 and a Master of Agriculture degree in July 1985, both from Texas Tech University.

As a working ranch operation, WTBR is currently home for 50-60 boys age 6-17. Located 17 miles west of San Angelo, the ranch is a licensed basic child care facility best suited for boys who are neglected, having learning or truancy problems or from broken homes.

West Texas Boys Ranch is funded solely through donations without federal funding.

S. S. Rep. to visit

Garland Gregg, representative for the San Angelo Social Security Office, has scheduled his February visit to Ozona. He will be in the Conference Room on the Second Floor of the Courthouse Annex on Wednesday, Feb. 21, between 2:00 p.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Anyone who wants to file a claim for benefits, get information, or transact other business with the Social Security Administration may contact him at this time.

Enriquez Chevron, for instance, had to remove three tanks of 1,000 gallons each which were over 25 years old. They were replaced by a single 14,000 gallon tank. In addition, two other tanks were upgraded to meet EPA standards. The total cost is still unknown, but Alfred Enriquez, who leases the station from Glenn Sutton, assured it will be expensive.

Cervantez Texaco had four tanks, totalling 14,000 gallons of capacity, which were over 25 years old. These were removed, and have since been replaced by above ground tanks, at a cost of \$35,000. Fortunately, though Leo Cervantez owns his filling station, his expenses were covered by Rio Grande Distributors, who actually own the tanks he uses. Other businesses with newer tanks have gained a reprieve for now, able to comply by passing tightness tests and taking monthly inventories. But even these businesses will feel the pinch eventually, when they have to upgrade or replace their equipment.


Although the new regulations have brought economic difficulties for many, they have not come without some justification. According to Ernest McFarland, whose San Angelo office controls a 21-county region, there are many confirmed cases of gasoline contamination already. Pecos, Abilene, and even San Angelo have gasoline tainted ground water. These areas, fortunately, do not use ground water for drinking purposes, relying instead on surface water. In Maryneal, 60 miles north of San Angelo, the situation is quite different. Maryneal, which up to now has depended solely upon its underground water supply, now must have its drinking water trucked in by the State of Texas. Gasoline has rendered Maryneal's ground water unsafe for human

consumption.

According to Dee Keilers, of Crockett County Water Control, Ozona's water supply does come from ground water. There are nine wells, each 414 feet deep, which provide the county's water. To ensure its quality, the water is tested regularly, for bacteria every month, and for other contamination every three years. In April of 1989, the Texas Department of Health tested Ozona's water for vola-

tile organic pollutants, using samples taken in December of 1988. For benzene, one of the most toxic components of gasoline, the tests showed levels of less than one part per billion, in other words—undetectable. "So far our water has tested good and clear," Dee Keilers reports. On the other hand, he warns, "I won't say we could never be in trouble. If we did get gasoline in our water it would be a disaster to the community, to say the least."



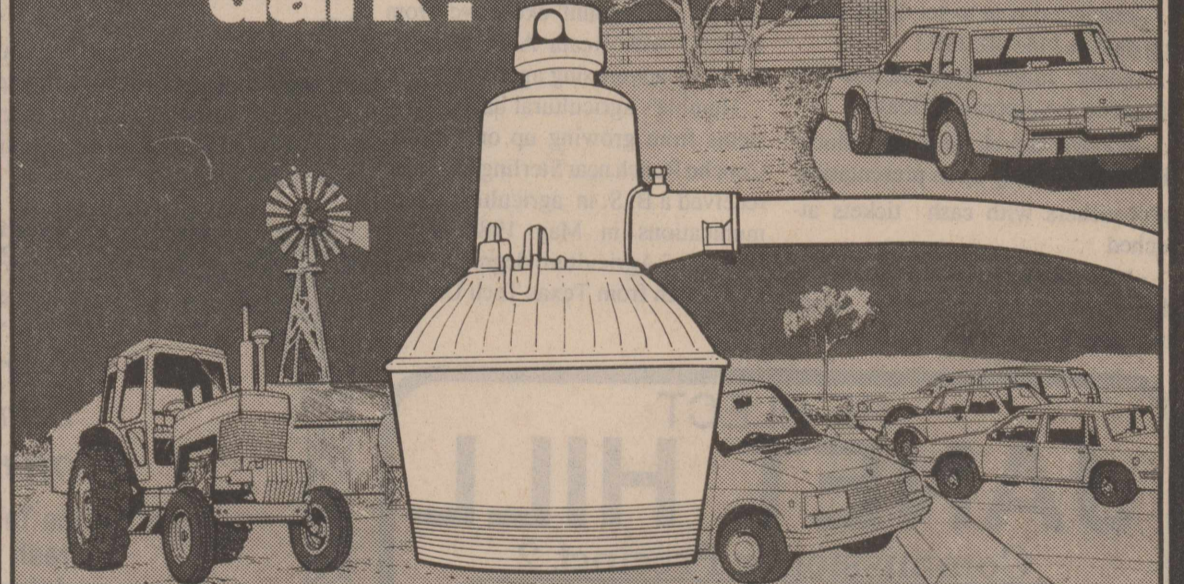
Public warned to use extreme caution at highway construction site between Barnhart and Mertzton

Special license plates coming this spring

Thanks to new legislation, Texans will soon be able to obtain special license plates with the name and insignia of their favorite Texas college or university and support a special scholarship fund for the school at the same time.

The legislation also provides for specially designed license plates and lower registration fees for Pearl Harbor survivors and Purple Heart recipients.

The plates, for passenger cars and light commercial vehicles, were approved in the last session of the legislature. They will be available in late spring.

Collegiate plates will be issued for any public or private college or university that can certify to the department that at least 1,500 of the plates will be purchased. The collegiate plates will cost \$30 in addition to the motor vehicle registration fee. Of that cost, \$25 will be deposited in a special scholarship fund for the school. Personalized collegiate plates are available for \$40 plus all other applicable fees.

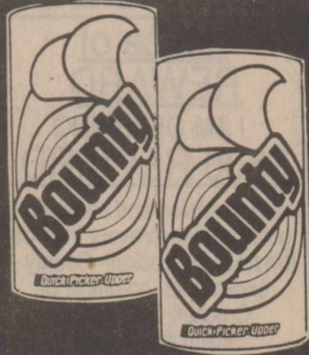

Feb 16 deadling for ag producers to return forms to County Extension offices

Feb. 16 is the deadline for ag producers of Texas' 25th Senatorial District to return the pre-collection form they have received to their County Extension Office if they plan to take part in a pilot project aimed at taking unusable ag pesticides to a collection site for disposal.

"The forms were mailed to producers earlier with a reminder to return them to the local Extension office by Feb. 16," said Billy Reagor, Extension Agent of Crockett County. "This means if you return the form by mail, you must allow adequate time for it to get to our office by that date. If you bring the form to the Extension office, return it before 5 p.m. on Feb. 16," Reagor said.

If ag producers did not receive a form, contact the Extension office and request one. But do this immediately since time is short.

The Extension agent emphasized that the program is strictly voluntary in nature. No fees will be charged to participants.

The pilot program is intended to allow pesticide applicators within the designated area to dispose of unwanted pesticides that may pose a hazard to them, their families and the nearby farm and ranch community, the Extension agent reminded.

Thirty-seven Texas counties will be involved in the pilot program authorized by the recent 71st Legislative Session whereby producers within State Senatorial District 25 may de-

liver unwanted and unusable agricultural pesticides to a collection site for disposal.

State Sen. Bill Sims of San Angelo, a businessman and rancher, sponsored and gained passage of the resolution that sanctioned the pilot program, which is to be conducted under the direction of the Texas Water Commission, the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The agent said this pilot program has been designated as the "Texas Pesticide Amnesty Day Program." It is intended to encourage pesticide applicators who are storing small quantities of pesticide waste to take these materials to a collection center for disposal.

Temporary collection centers will be located near El Paso, Pecos, Saint Lawrence, Hondo and Del Rio, with exact sites to be announced later.

Agencies involved in this project hope to gain experience necessary to develop an effective disposal program for Texas.

Ag producers are eligible to take part in El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Reeves, Jeff Davis, Presidio, Brewster, Pecos, Ward, Loving, Winkler, Crane, Upton, Midland, Glasscock, Reagan, Crockett, Terrell, Val Verde, Edwards, Sutton, Schleicher, Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Menard, Kimble, Mason, Gillespie, Kerr, Real, Bander, Medina, Kendall, Comal and Blanco counties.

Ranchers should maintain federal income tax, S.S. records on workers

Ranchers, starting on Jan. 1 of this year, were required to start withholding federal income tax from wages of employees.

Employers must keep on file a completed W-4 form for each employee. This W-4 form determines the correct amount to withhold from each paycheck, based on how many exemptions an employee may claim, including dependents and disabilities.

Ranchers also will have to provide W-2 forms to workers each January, starting this year. These forms will provide details on how much the worker earned and the amount that was paid to Social Security and federal income tax accounts.

Regarding seasonal migrant workers who don't live in the area where the rancher resides, the employers will have to be able to show they have made a good-faith effort to locate the workers so that the W-2

forms could be sent to them.

This means that the employers should obtain and put the permanent addresses of their workers on file for reference.

Workers who do not earn the minimum taxable wage base of \$4,400 will be eligible to recover all federal taxes that have been deducted. Ranchers may want to offer assistance to their workers in obtaining such refunds when warranted.

Ranchers should use the IRS Circular E to determine correct withholding rates. They can call IRS toll-free at 800-424-FORM to obtain this circular and other forms.

In addition, ranchers are reminded that the Social Security tax rate for 1990 also increased from 7.51 percent to 7.65 percent for employers and employees and to 15.3 percent for those who are self-employed.

County receives mixed drink tax rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$11.1 million on Monday to 219 counties and 437 cities that collect sales tax on mixed drinks.

The checks represent the counties' and cities' share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during October, November and December of

1989. Under state law allowing the sale of mixed drinks, Texas cities and counties each receive a 12.5 percent share of the state tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries. Crockett County received \$1,971.97 as its share of the \$8,575.79 collected here.

JoLynn Vannoy placed 11th in both middle heavy weight and heavy weight finewool classes. Leigh Chandler placed 21st in the light weight finewool cross class.

In the steer show, local exhibitors had an excellent day, placing six out of seven steers. Chad Upham exhibited the second place light weight Hereford steer, and his brother, Casey, placed second with his middle weight shorthorn steer. Tamie Reagor placed second with her light weight Santa Gertrudis steer. Andy Stokes took and third place with his middle weight polled Hereford. Maintaining the court docket for Judge Brock Jones is her primary job responsibility. His jurisdiction includes the criminal, civil, and juvenile cases in the five county area. Setting cases, notifying parties, reserving courtrooms, requesting petit and grand juries and obtaining visiting judges and court reporters when necessary are also part of the court administrator's job. Coordinating the parties necessary for trial including attorneys, district attorneys, defendants, sheriffs, court reporters, bailiffs, probation officers, juries and witnesses is another demanding dimension of the job.
