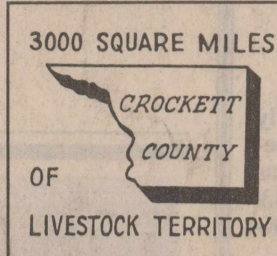

Miscommunication between D.A. and auditor.....

Doctor's paychecks temporarily frozen

Payments to doctors under contract to Crockett County Hospital were temporarily frozen last week, the result of a "miscommunication" between District Attorney J. W. Johnson and Auditor Sandy Stokes.

"Sandy felt he had received a legal opinion from the district attorney that the contracts were illegal," said Judge Kathryn Mayfield Monday in describing the events of last week. During a March 28 telephone conversation between the men to discuss the budget, the subject of doctor's contracts came up. As an outcome of that conversation, Stokes notified the hospital he could not write the doctors' checks.

On Friday, Johnson instructed Stokes by letter to continue making disbursements under the procedures in effect.

At the same time, Stokes was advised that Johnson's office will initiate an investigation into the disbursement of county monies to physicians.

As of last week, the district attorney had not read the doctors' contracts, Judge Mayfield said. Those contracts are currently being reviewed by Crockett County Attorney Orlando De Hoyos.

The Texas Constitution, Article III, Sec. 52, says it is unlawful for a county to "lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever," Mayfield explained.

Under this article, county payment of utilities for and maintenance of the Fairground Association property, which includes the rodeo arena, is "clearly a violation of the Texas Constitution," Mayfield said. "A lease won't cure that situation. We can't expend any more funds out there." The judge said she hopes that situation can be resolved.

County involvement with Ozona Municipal Airport was "not brought up," Mayfield said.

Local officials are closely watching a situation with doctors in Pecos County which Johnson has advised is illegal. Commissioners there refused payment of a doctor relocation subsidy payment to Memorial Hospital in Fort Stockton after Johnson and Pecos County Auditor Becky Espino recommended the payment be denied.

The subsidy was for a doctor who plans to move to Fort Stockton and set up private practice.

According to a report in the March 29 issue of the Fort Stockton Pioneer, Pecos County commissioners had approved payment several months ago of \$15,000 in advance of services to a doctor recruited by Iraan General Hospital.

Johnson said payments of this type are illegal primarily because they are an extension of credit with county funds and that the funds are, in this situation, being used to subsidize private enterprise.

Information received by Judge Mayfield from Johnson pertaining to

the Fort Stockton situation an hour before commissioners and the hospital board met March 26 led her to tell both groups "we might have a problem with our contracts," she said. "If we find we are in violation, we will make whatever modifications need to be made."

The contracts with Doctors Robert Owensby and Marcus Sims were written by Bill Boswell, hospital administrator, based on contracts used by other West Texas hospitals. "If we're in trouble with our contracts, a lot of other hospitals are, too," Boswell said.

An opinion written by Attorney General John L. Hill in 1976 for the county attorney of Waller County regarding county contracts with physicians to practice in county medical clinics found their proposed contract within the statutorily conferred powers of the commissioners court.

The opinion, received by Boswell Tuesday, outlines a situation similar to that of Crockett County.

Lady Lion golfers out-distance Stanton for district championship

The Ozona Lions turned the heat on to make up 36 needed strokes in the final round of the district golf tourney to loop around Stanton for second place. Ozona's total of 1614 strokes was just under McCamey's 1585.

In medalist play, Tim Segura of McCamey turned in a 349 for first

place, with Jay Haire, Ozona's top shooter, six strokes over the second place medalist, Kenny Baggett of Reagan County. Daun Williams had a 405 to tie with Chris Smith of McCamey and Jason Yeager of Ozona totaled his score card with a 413 to best Chris Carder of Stanton.

Dreams sometime come true.....

When you wish upon a star.....

When you wish upon a star, dreams sometime come true as they did last month for Ozona's Daniel Armijo. The 4-year-old cancer patient was a guest of Disney World's Magic Kingdom and Epcot Center during a five-day trip which included his family.

Making Daniel's wish come true were the Fort Worth Wish for Wings program and Give Kids the World of Florida.

In Florida, Daniel, his parents Janice and Duane Armijo, brothers Duane Jr. and Paul, sister Suzette and grandmother Mrs. Elizabeth Armijo of Del Rio were guests at the Holiday Inn Kids' Village. The village is like a small community for families and

children with lifethreatening diseases from all over the world, Daniel's father explained. The family also went to Sea World and Cocoa Beach in Florida.

Daniel at first ducks his head and speaks softly as he tells of the trip while sitting in the safety of his father's lap. As the story progresses, he grows more animated, telling about seeing Mickey Mouse, Goofy, Snow White and her dwarfs, Chip and Dale, and his favorite Disney character of the trip, Pluto.

A simulated ride through the human body at Epcot Center called "Body Wars" was the best part of the trip to Daniel who has fought his own body war since being diagnosed with

cancer at age two.

The discovery of a tumor on Daniel's bladder began a cycle of treatment at home and in Odessa under direction of doctors at Cook-Fort Worth Children's Medical Center. Later, radiation shrank the tumor, and Daniel's cancer went into remission for a time. But it returned. And with the return came six surgeries.

Since the first of January, Daniel has had surgery at Cook's for the removal of his bladder and prostate. After a month of hospitalization and a brief trip home, a cat scan back at Cook's showed a mass still in his pelvic area and small tumors in both lungs.

Since early March, Daniel has been on experimental chemotherapy. He is tolerating the dosages so well they have been increased. Recent scans show that although his tumors are not decreasing, they are not increasing either. At the end of each three week chemo cycle, Daniel returns to Cook's for more tests.

Daniel makes the family strong, says his mother. "He's an exceptional child. He'll come out of these things and he'll say, 'Jesus, take my pain away.'" He will be five on April 19.

This small boy with a shy grin no longer attends classes at Ozona Community Center. "We're trying to keep him quiet right now," explains his father. Keeping Daniel quiet is not always easy one notices as Daniel rushes down the sidewalk to the car with his father hurrying after him.

Daniel was the subject of a column by Jon McConal in the Fort Worth Star Telegram in late March to focus attention on Children and Hospital's Week being observed at Cook's.

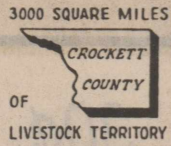

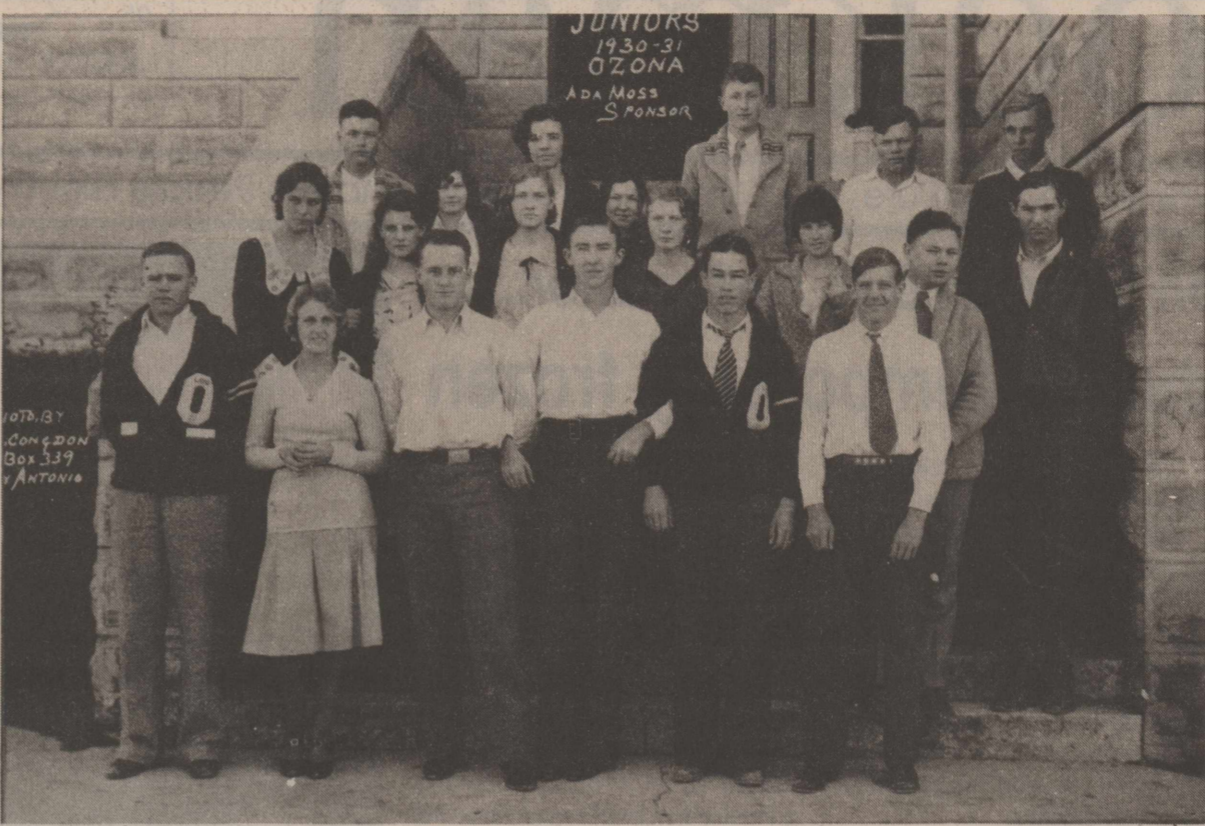

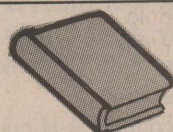

CCPL is celebrating Arbor Day on Tuesday, April 10th. By tradition, Arbor Day is celebrated on the Friday following February 1st, but each state observes Arbor Day on a different day. CCPL is commemorating the first Arbor Day Celebration that was held on April 10, 1972 in Nebraska. It began when a man named Julius Sterling Morton moved to Nebraska. For the first time he saw a land with no trees. Morton missed the trees and talked to government officials about planting trees in Nebraska. People agreed to help and set aside April 10 for this day, naming it Arbor (tree) Day.

Each time we use our cars, turn on lights or television, or heat or cool our homes, we are using fossil fuels or their products (natural gas, heating oil, kerosene, gasoline, or coal). As these fuels are burned, they produce millions of tons of carbon dioxide. Once the carbon dioxide gets to the upper atmosphere, it traps in heat and has a warming or greenhouse effect on the earth. Some scientists predict that this global warming will lead to the melting of the polar ice caps. The result will mean flooded coastal areas in which half the world's population now lives.

How do you spell relief for the earth? T-R-E-E-S. Yes, one answer is

to plant trees. Would you believe that one tree alone can absorb up to 48 lbs. of carbon dioxide each year? An acre of forest can absorb up to ten tons of carbon dioxide each year! Studies show, however, that for every four trees that die or are removed each year, only one tree is planted. Even more alarming is the rate at which tropical rain forest are being destroyed. Recent estimates show that we're losing a section of rain forest the size of football field every second and an area the size of the state of Pennsylvania (40,000 square miles) every year. There is a way you can help—just plant some trees. Contact your county soil conservation district or cooperative extension service. Many soil conservation districts offer seedlings for Arbor Day, and the National Arbor Day Foundation also offers trees and information for the Arbor Day celebration.

CCPL wants to thank the Ozona Garden Club for their gifts of live oak trees. In 1988 the club celebrated Arbor Day and planted the first live oak in memory of Oliver West. In 1989, a tree was planted in memory of Virgel Powell, and this year the third live oak was planted in memory of Margaret West. We deeply appreciate the gift of these beautiful memorial trees. They will be enjoyed at the library for years to come.

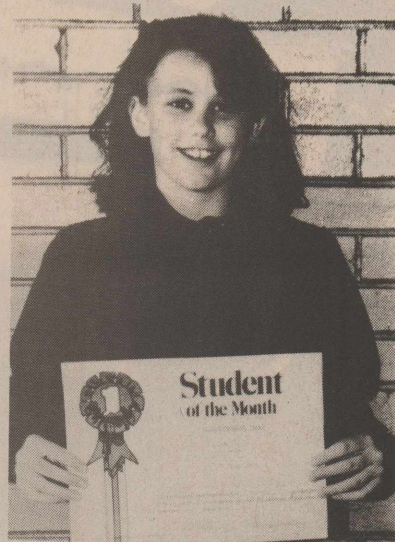

Historic photograph arrives in Ozona

Mrs. Margaret Alford acquired a piece of history last week with the purchase of a 1879 photograph of a Texas cattle drive from her uncle, V. W. "Vic" Young. The photograph has been a cherished possession of the Young family for more than 57 years. The value of the 111-year-old photograph wasn't discovered until 1978 when Young sent the photo, which was given to him by his father who is pictured in the scene, to a Dallas firm for restoration. Found between the picture and its frame was a letter written in Young's Father's handwriting dated June 25, 1926, which provides background about the picture.

The letter gives the drive's location as the forks of the Tulia Canyon in Swisher County. Before the letter was found, people had believed the photograph was made in Palo Duro Canyon.

The 10,000 cattle in the 1879 picture were the first cattle located on the Staked Plains according to the letter. The Tulia Canyon location (actually spelled Tule) was the location of a mass horse slaughter in 1874 by a General MacKenzie.

J. Frank Dobie's book, "A Vaquero of the Brush Country", quotes Young's

father as saying MacKenzie had captured the horses from Kiowa Indians and did not want to have them recaptured.

The photograph was originally owned by Texas rancher Charles Goodnight who had it colored in 1926 and gave it to John Young.

Young discovered the negative of the photo through the Amon Carter Museum in Fort Worth. The museum located the negative in the William Jackson photo collection owned by the State Historical Society of Colorado in Denver.

Archeology Awareness Week to be observed in Ozona

Governor Bill Clements has signed a proclamation setting aside the week of April 8-14, as "Archeology Awareness Week". In order to observe this locally, The Crockett County Museum, in conjunction with the Crockett County Historical Commission and Historical Society, has made arrangements to bring a speaker to Ozona Monday, April 9th.

Mr. J. A. Jaquier will speak to the faculty and students of Ozona Jr. High School in the afternoon. He will speak again at 7:00 p.m. at the Ozona National Bank's Crockett Room. The public is invited and encouraged to attend the seven o'clock address.

J. A. Jaquier (or "Jag", as he prefers to be called) is a charter member of the Archeological Steward's Network of the Office of the State Archeologist, organized in 1984.

In this role, he has been responsible for education and information programs and for investigation of potential archeological discoveries for a radius of 100 miles around San Angelo, his home town.

Jaqu began his archeological career with the excavation of the foundation of the Post Surgeon's Quarters at Fort Concho in 1969. He obtained a master's equivalency from the University of Texas at San Antonio and has been a research associate with UTSA's Center for Archeological Research since 1974.

As a professional archaeologist, Jaq has been fortunate to participate in prehistoric surveys and excavations from north to south Texas, including Stacy Reservoir. Historical excavations were performed at the Alamo and Fort Mason.

Jaq is perhaps proudest of his direct participation in Fort Concho's award-winning "Digging History" program. Over 500 6th grade students in the San Angelo Gifted Education (SAGE) program have been introduced to the thrill of professional excavation and laboratory work over the last nine years. These youngsters have left with true understanding of the critical need to protect and preserve our fragile cultural heritage.

House pleads guilty

According to U. S. District Court records, House collected \$17,759.90 in excise taxes on gasoline and diesel in 1986, but did not forward that money to the federal government.

"When dealing with the I.R.S., have your attorney and your accountant present or you are liable to get hurt," House said Monday in an interview with The Stockman.
