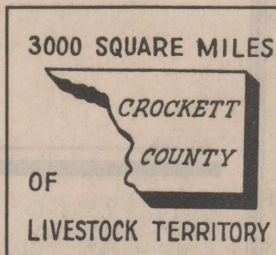

Phil George to speak at All-Sports Banquet

Phil George of San Angelo will be the key-note speaker for this year's All-Sports Banquet which will be held at the Civic Center, Monday, May 7th, at 6:30 p.m.

Phil George is now in his 40th year with Angelo State University. He came to San Angelo in 1949, and since then he has coached with the basketball, football, track, baseball, and golf programs. For 11 seasons, George served as football line coach. During this span, seven linemen received All-American honors. He was Ram basketball coach from 1949 to 1978, and athletic director for 18 years.

George is one of the winningest college basketball coaches in the country with a record of 514 wins and 244 losses.

He was named Conference Coach-of-the-Year in 1957, NAIA District 8 Coach-of-the-Year in 1967, and NAIA District 4 Coach-of-the-Year in 1976. The Rams' Junior College cage squads won Pioneer Conference titles in 1954, 1955, 1957, 1959, 1960, 1961, 1962, 1963 and 1964 under George. In addition, the Rams won NJCAA regional titles in 1957, 1959, 1961, 1962, and 1964, and the 1957 squad won the NJCAA National Junior College crown.

George, an associate professor of kinesiology, is currently serving in

his 40th year as a member of the teaching faculty.

George earned his bachelor of science and master of education degrees, plus additional work toward a doctoral degree from the University of Texas at Austin. During his career as a UT cager, the Longhorns finished third in NCAA in 1947, played in the National Invitational Tournament in 1948, and won two Southwest Conference championships. Over this span (1942-43, 1946-49) the Longhorns won 87 and lost only 14.

George is a member of Calvary Lutheran Church where he has served as president of the congregation for five terms and on numerous congregational and regional committees. He is either currently (or has in the past) served on various community service boards, i.e. YMCA, United Way, Chamber of Commerce, American Red Cross, Salvation Army, Boy Scouts of America, American Heart Association, State Bar Grievance Committee, and San Angelo Country Club Board.

During World War II George served as an Army Air Corps pilot in China-Burma-India theater of operation. He was recalled in 1968 and served for 1 1/2 years in Viet Nam, Europe, and U. S. He retired from USAF Reserve as a Lt. Col. with over 6,500 pilot hours.

George and his wife, Toddy, have three children, Jennifer, Judy, and Mike, plus eight grandchildren.

Tree peeled by lightning bolt

A large pecan tree at the home of Mrs. Walter Augustine was stripped of its bark when struck by a bolt of lightning last Wednesday morning. The bark exploded from the tree, leaving the trunk as clean as if it had been whittled with a knife.

Pieces of the bark were thrown into the backyard of the Augustine home and into the backyard of the Farris home across the street.

The "terrific bolt" of lightning sounded like it came down between the Augustine house and that of Henry Sellers next door said Mrs. Augustine. When the lightning struck at 3:33 a.m., "it set off every smoke alarm in my house," said Connie Farris who lives on 12th Street directly across the street from the tree.

Discovery of the damage came with

daylight, and a county work crew was soon on hand to block off the street from traffic and cut down the 38 year old tree.

Three splits were made in the trunk by the lightning, and splinters protrude from the portion of the splits visible in the remaining stump.

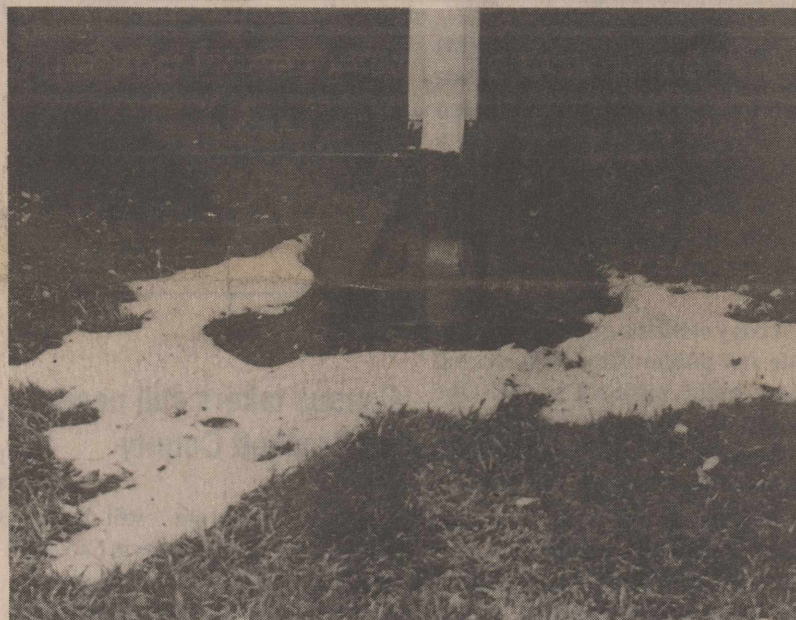
The same front which damaged the tree dumped six-tenths of an inch of rain and marble size hail on Ozona.

Tony Gomez found ice 1.5 inches thick extending about 18 inches into the grass from the auto shop building at Ozona High School.

Hailstones formed icy areas behind the Methodist Church, remaining there at 10:30 a.m. under cloudy skies with the thermometer reading 45 degrees.

Commissioners ok airport grant

Commissioners voted Monday to accept a grant proposal for a master plan study at Ozona Municipal Airport. The FFA grant of \$37,800 was announced in March.

A master plan for airport improvement is a necessary step toward acquiring additional grant funding for airport improvements.

Judge Kathryn Mayfield was authorized by the court to sign the pro-

posal on behalf of the county.

Court members discussed whether or not to pursue an economic development plan for the community. Commissioners then voted to have Judge Mayfield write the U. S. Department of Commerce requesting that the county be designated as a re-development area. Crockett County qualifies for economic development assistance by virtue of its unemployment rate.

A committee made up of members from a cross-section of the community will be selected by the court to determine possible projects for consideration.

Jones, Vasquez qualify for State UIL Meet

There is but one date left on the UIL literary calendar for this school year, and that is the state meet which is to be held on May 4 and 5 in Austin. Two Ozona students, Margaret Jones and Michael Vasquez, will be competing on those dates at the University of Texas campus.

Margaret is the 17-year-old daughter of Judge Brock and Camille Jones. Margaret will be competing in

persuasive speaking, which is the event she won last year at the state meet. Margaret's UIL record is quite outstanding, as she has been a state literary qualifier three out of her four high school years.

As a freshman, Margaret won district in Lincoln-Douglas debate. She placed third that year in both regionals and state. As a sophomore, she won district in both L-D debate and persuasive speaking. During her

junior year, Margaret placed second in district competition in L-D debate, however persuasive proved to be her thing as she placed first in district, second in regionals and won state.

"I'm excited," Margaret said. "It's going to be nice because it will be on the UT campus, and that's where I'm going to school next year. I hope to repeat last year's performance."

Michael, who is going to compete in informative speaking, is a sophomore. Activities that take up Michael's time have been UIL and Just Say No Club. This year, Michael placed second in both district and regional competition. He is also a youth representative in the Parish Council at the OLPH Catholic Church. Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Vasquez are his parents.

"I think it is a pleasure to represent our school at state," Michael said, "but having fun comes before winning. I also owe a lot to Mrs. Frances Curry who has helped me so much."

Mark Ramirez, another sophomore placed eighth in Keyboarding (typing) at regional. Mark's sponsor Mrs. Margaret Spiller, said, "the competition was really stiff this year."

Other students competing at the regional contest were Marissa Cordova and Jennifer Colin in poetry reading, Michael Kennison in ready writing, Amy Graham in science, Sylvia Pena-Alfaro and Jimmy Williams in Lincoln-Douglas debate. Sarah Pullen in both news and feature writing, Sotero Fuentes in literary criticism and Myra Wilson in persuasive speaking.

"I think the Ozona kids all performed extremely well at the regional meet," said UIL sponsor Frances Curry. "I'm thrilled that we get to go to the state meet."

Adult sponsors accompanying the competitors to regionals at Abilene Christian University were Katrece Hale, Margaret Spiller, Ellen Lipsey, Frances Curry and driving the bus was John Curry.

Absentee voting ends Friday

Absentee voting by personal appearance in the May 5 school trustee and water district directors' elections ends Friday, April 27.

As of 10 a.m. Tuesday, there had been 184 votes cast by personal appearance in the school trustee election. Three of the 17 mail out ballots requested had been returned by that time.

Special education students qualify for state Special Olympic games in May

A first for the town of Ozona occurred on Saturday when two special education students and their coach traveled to Odessa's Ratliff Stadium to compete in the area 18 Texas Special Olympic games.

Ninth graders Bryan Branch and Steven Leal along with their special education teacher/coach Jim Cox completed with 9 other teams in Special Olympics track and field events. Before the sun had set, Ozona was bound for the Texas Special Olympic summer games to be held in San Marcos, May 22 through May 25.

Both Bryan and Steven qualified in two events. Bryan won second place in the 50 meter dash with a time of 12.89 seconds and fourth place in the softball throw with a toss of 15.4 meters. Steven took first place in the 100 meter dash with a time of 14.28 seconds and second place in the softball throw with a toss of 36.81 meters. In Special Olympics, participants are grouped according to age and ability. This helps equalize the participants' chances for success.

Ozona students grow space tomatoes

Student scientists in the seventh grade life science class at Ozona Junior High School are planting gardens to experiment with tomato seeds from space.

The students are monitoring plants from space-exposed seeds and Earth-based seeds, searching for differences caused by long-term exposure to cosmic radiation. Results gathered by the students will be forwarded to NASA for a final report.

The seeds were on board the Space Shuttle Challenger which was launched April 6, 1984. For nearly six years they were exposed to the harsh environment of space, subjected to cosmic radiation, temperature extremes, weightlessness, and the vacuum of space. The seeds returned to Earth January 29, 1990, aboard the Space Shuttle Columbia.

The Space Exposed Experiment Developed for Students (SEEDS) was one of 57 experiments housed on the recently recovered 11-ton Long Duration Exposure Facility satellite.

The 12.5 million tomato seeds were distributed by NASA in March in 180,000 kits containing an equal number of Earth-based seeds to teachers from the upper elementary school to the university level for experiments and study.

Students will be looking for possible mutations to the tomato plant, such as changes in fruit size and color, growth rate, and leaf, stem and stalk shapes and sizes. OJHS students record the growth rate of their space and Earth tomato plants daily as part of

the project. Because of the late start, the plants probably will not bear fruit before the end of the school year according to teacher Lloyd Winkley.

The seventh graders planted 50 each of the space and Earth seeds. Eight of the space seeds and 10 of the Earth seeds did not come up.

SEEDS is a cooperative project between NASA and Park Seed Company of Greenwood, S.C. SEEDS has the potential to involve four million students and 40,000 educators.

News stories resulting from an unsigned memo from a NASA contractor saying there was a "remote" danger that fruit from the space tomatoes could produce poisonous fruit have had little effect on the SEEDS projects. No such warning was included in written materials sent to the teachers directing the experiment. However, because of the publicity, only plants grown from Earth seeds will be sent home with the students at the end of the year, Winkley said.

ELECTRIC METERS — SEALED FOR SAFETY

Electrical meters measure the amount of service delivered by measuring the flow. Every meter in operation has some current flowing through it, and residential meters usually carry the full load. The typical residential load can be up to 200 amps of current.

Removing the meter while it is under load, that is when current is flowing through it, can lead to disaster. The metal housing is at a different electrical potential from the meter. Any contact between the metal housing and the meter will result in a violent discharge or "arc" of electricity between them.

Your meter should be removed or serviced only by representatives of your utility company, or by electricians or emergency personnel authorized by your utility.

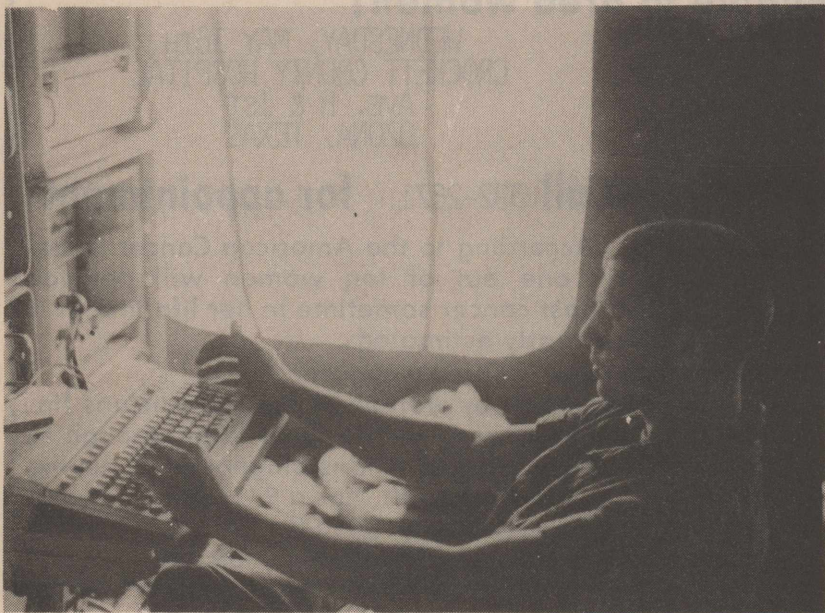

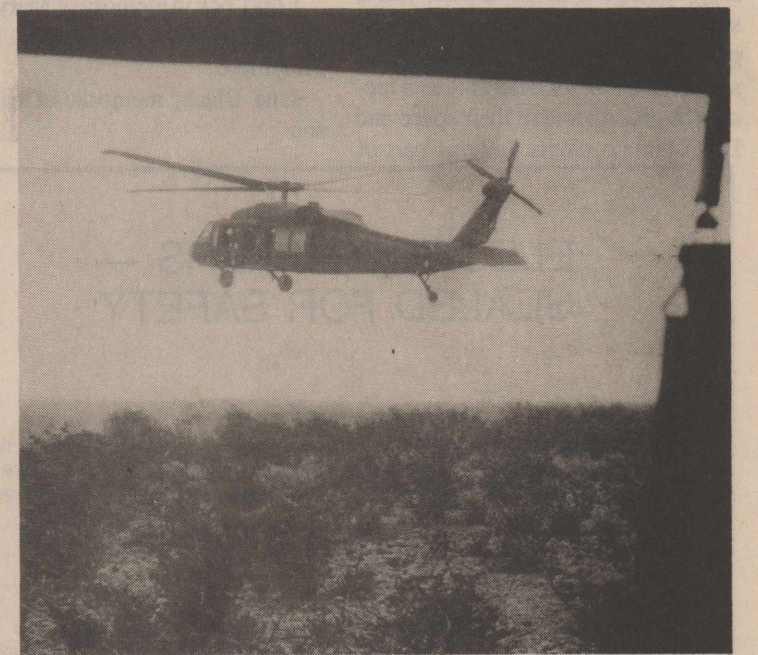

6th Cavalry Brigade lays down red carpet for press

Overtwo-thousand battle clad airborne soldiers, 614 vehicles and 100+ aircraft of the 6th Cavalry Brigade (Air Combat Division) of Ft. Hood set up shop for a week of training exercises known as Sabers West III in the Ft. Stockton area Saturday.

Poor weather conditions, low visibility and rain showers slowed the progression of men and machines to the West Texas area, making necessary the refueling of the large military helicopters at the Ozona airport Friday.

Apache (tank killers), Blackhawk (chinook cargo), Huey and Kiowa military helicopters lined Ozona's Municipal Airport runway waiting to be refueled by Mr. and Mrs. James Hearne, Ozona airport managers, while pilots and crew members answered questions from Ozona citizens as they gazed at these amazing machines of war.

The Sabers West mission is in its third year beginning in and around the area of Dryden. It was then moved to Ft. Stockton in 1989 and will again be headquartered at the Ft. Stockton airport this year.

For the first time the press has been invited to witness the Sabers West exercise area along with its equipment, organization and tactics, and did so from an airborne Blackhawk helicopter.

Reporters from the *Odessa American*, *Ft. Stockton Pioneer*, *Sul Ross Skyline* and *The Ozona Stockman* gathered for briefing regarding safety regulations of the Blackhawk helicopter before takeoff at the Ft. Stockton Airport Saturday afternoon. All press members were required to sign forms releasing the United States Government of any legal action if an accident occurred.

The group was flown to the tactical air support outer headquarters southwest of Ft. Stockton. Camouflage coverings of the unit on the ground made identification of men and equipment virtually impossible.

After landing, the press was given a tour of the headquarters along with its personnel and electronic maneuver control equipment. A slide presentation covering the Sabers West III operation and training purpose was given by the commanding officer of the Mobile Armored Corps Phantom group.

While an old cavalryman, watching from his well-drilled horse, wouldn't recognize the equipment of today's cavalry trooper, he probably would recognize some unit pennants he rode under.

With the Army's newest and best equipment, the 6th Cavalry Regiment of III Corps' 6th Cavalry Brigade (Air Combat) is the same regiment that served on horseback in Southwest

Texas throughout the post-Civil war period of settlement. The regiment, with its Apache attack helicopters, is the maneuver element of the brigade.

The regiment's first combat after the Civil War was in July 1867, against a large force of hostile Indians. Eighteen Medals of Honor were awarded to troopers of the regiment during the 1867-68 Indian campaigns near Big Bend. Troops C and E won campaign streamers while separately patrolling the Fort Stockton-El Paso area and engaging raiding Cheyenne and Apache bands. The regiment's push west ended in New Mexico in 1871.

After duty in Nebraska, Wyoming and the Dakotas, the regiment fought in Cuba during the Spanish-American War. There, in 1898, its troopers charged San Juan Hill alongside Teddy Roosevelt. They served during the Philippines insurrection and, in the 1900 Boxer Rebellion, were the first westerners to enter the Forbidden City in Peking. With peace restored, the regiment once again sailed for Galveston, where it resumed border duty.

In 1916, Pancho Villa led his irregulars on raids into New Mexico and Texas. In response, a punitive expeditionary force was organized under Brig. Gen. John Pershing, with 6th Cavalry Troopers riding in its ranks. After the expedition, the regiment was based in Marfa, Texas, west of Alpine, on border patrol.

Deployed to Europe for WWI, the regiment did not see combat and returned after the war to serve the inter-war years at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. In July 1944, the 6th Cavalry Regiment landed in Normandy with Gen. George Patton's 3rd Army and fought through Europe to V-E Day.

In 1963, the regiment was inactivated, but was reactivated in 1967. In 1971, the regiment's 1st Squadron arrived home in Texas, moving on to Fort Hood in 1973. The 2nd and 3rd squadrons were reactivated at Fort Hood in 1986, and the 4th Squadron in 1988.

"Our main reason for choosing this part of the country for training is because the terrain is similar to many

of the troubled spots of the world such as Afghanistan and the Persian Gulf," said the officer. "We go through all of the motions of moving heavy equipment and supplies using all means of transportation available which includes railroad, highways and air transport just as if it were real war."

"The whole operation is based around the Apache attack helicopter and its ability to carry out operations at night in low level flight providing aerial combat support for ground troops," said the officer. "Our chances of being shot down are considerably less at night, and we are able to fly at night using special pilot night vision equipment."

The officer emphasized that the Army is doing everything in its power to work with ranchers and people of the area regarding low flying aircraft during the lambing and kidding season. "We would like to make everybody happy because we need to come back next year," said the officer. "The ability to go out and train in an area like this enhances our readiness for war which could be a possibility at any moment. We support the local areas as much as we possibly can."

The press was then flown in near proximity to Apache training maneuvers before returning to Ft. Stockton Airport.

Lt. Col. Thomas Konitzer briefed the group and answered after mission questions. He emphasized that the Apache is the finest aerial combat support helicopter in the world.

"Budget cutbacks have endangered the Apache program with closures of manufacturing plants of replacement machines. We have one congressman in Washington who would like nothing better than scrubbing the whole Apache program altogether."

"We may wake up one morning with the Bear at our front door, and it will be too late to get back to full operational status,"

said Konitzer.

Statewide toll free numbers for accident reporting

AUSTIN - Beginning Oct. 1, motorists in Texas will be able to use a toll-free telephone number to report traffic accidents, suspected driving while intoxicated cases, criminal activities and other emergencies.

The new number is 1-800-525-5555. It will be answered on a 24-hour basis by communications personnel at the Department of Public Safety Headquarters in Austin. Calls will be routed to the appropriate law enforcement

agency on a priority basis.

"This number does not replace the 9-1-1 service you may have in your area," stressed DPS Assistant Director James Wilson. "The new 800 number is intended to be used in cases where no 9-1-1 service is available, or in instances where the person needing assistance does not know another emergency number to call. It should not be used to seek routine information or service."

Local quilter to exhibit

Mrs. Billie Rose Bailey has been invited, as a member of the American International Quilt Association, to display her prize winning quilt, "Rose's One and Only Peony Quilt" May 10-11 in Lake Charles, LA. She will also assist with the exhibit sponsored by Friends of the Decorative Arts.

The exhibition, titled Quilts of the South, will be held in conjunction with Lake Charles' annual Contraband Days celebration. In addition to the display of quilts, there will be a lecture on quilting presented by a representative from Southern Living Magazine.

The quilt was designed by Mrs. Diane Herbort of Alexandria, VA, and quilted by Mrs. Bailey. They won first place honors in the group effort division at the Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild show in February. The peony quilt placed second in an international show and competition last year in Houston. It is pictured on the American Quilt Engagement Calendar for the month of February, 1990.

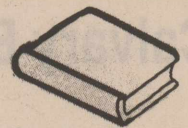

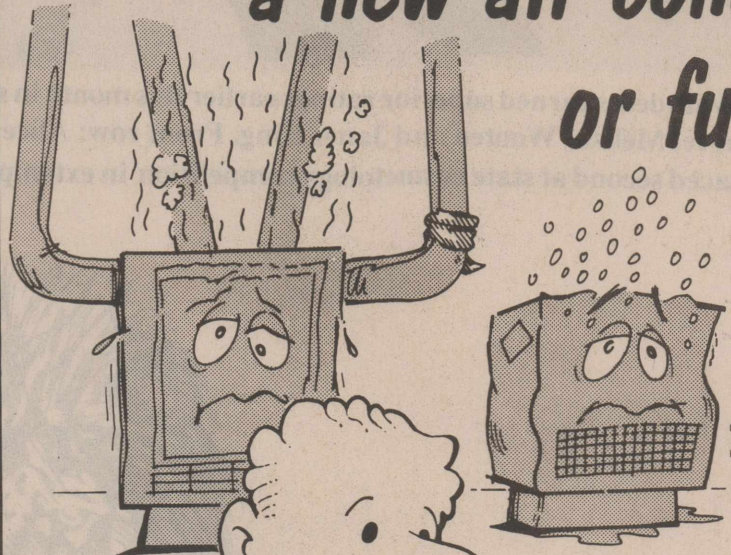

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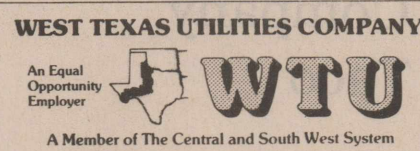

Fierro and Wilson survive "junkless" day

Well, folks, they did it! Fred Fierro and Jim Wilson actually survived their "junk food-less" day on April 19.

You may remember seeing their photo on the front page of last week's paper. They were pledging to give up high-fat, non-nutritious junk for a day to emphasize the American Cancer Society's "Great American Food Fight Against Cancer."

I asked them to keep a diary of what they ate that day—and since they're both officers of the law, I know I can trust their word about what they had to eat. Of course, as Fred noted, he was asleep for most of the day after coming off duty, so it wasn't too hard on him.

And I know Janet Wilson has Sheriff Jim on a strict, low-fat diet. He muttered something about "If I ever see another Bran muffin, I'll..." But I didn't catch the rest of what he said.

What they ate on the 19th is really interesting—they didn't put their names on their individual food diaries when they turned them back to me, but I bet I can guess that Fred was the one with all the fruit and one meal at a local restaurant. Jim was the one with yep, you guessed it—an oat bran muffin for breakfast!

Let's look at their food intake for the day and see how they did.

Fred started out at 12:15 and 1:30 a.m. with cups of coffee, then had grapefruit at 4 a.m., a banana at 6:15 a.m., more coffee at 7 a.m. An apple at 8:45 a.m., then obviously crashed till 3 p.m., when he woke up with a diet soft drink.

He hit a local restaurant for their low-cal chicken meal and a cup of coffee at 5:15 p.m., then two more apples and coffee the rest of the day. Other than probably being pretty hungry and maybe needing a bit more from the milk, bread and cereal and

meat group, he did pretty good.

Jim is obviously a married guy with a wife who takes good care of him. Breakfast consisted of a cup of coffee, small glass of orange juice, two homemade oatbran muffins and one more cup of coffee.

For lunch, he had a diet drink, and chicken enchiladas made with corn tortillas and low-fat cheese, fresh strawberries, and a cup of coffee.

Supper featured spaghetti with meat sauce—and someone read the label and discovered what the fat content was. The meat in the sauce was ground turkey (but check the proportion of fat calories—any lean ground meat would be fine also; just make sure no more than 30% of your calories come from fat in a day). Two sourdough rolls with diet margarine and a diet soft drink finished off the meal.

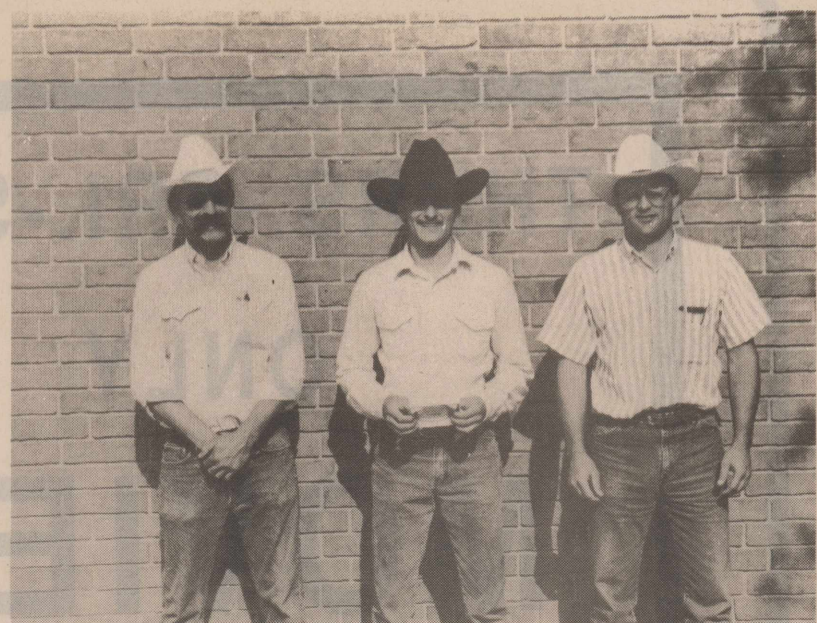

Following a report from Bob Falkner, fire chief, on the progress of the new fire truck project, commissioners approved payment for fittings, valves, hoses and other items needed for the truck.

Delivery of the chassis is expected during the first two weeks of May, and the pump for the truck should arrive any day, Falkner said. The truck is being built by fire department members.

Commissioners voted to accept District Attorney J. W. Johnson's financial report for 1989, budget for 1990 and an audit report of seized funds forfeited to the D.A.'s office.

Sandy Stokes, county auditor, explained that the legislature requires an annual report to the court of forfeited funds and submission of a budget by the D.A. before any of these funds can be spent. The audit of the funds is also required by the legislature.

During a discussion of non-agenda items, Judge Mayfield reported that she had received a proposed lease agreement for fairgrounds property from Crockett County Fair Association. The information will be forwarded to the district attorney's office.

Commissioners discussed the possibility of having the hospital kitchen under the care center as most meals are prepared for center residents.

Judge Mayfield said she has written neighboring towns regarding the possibility of using their landfills. Only one community has responded with interest, but their landfill permit may not be the type needed to accept Ozona's trash, the judge said.

Numerous persons have expressed an interest in recycling trash locally according to the judge.

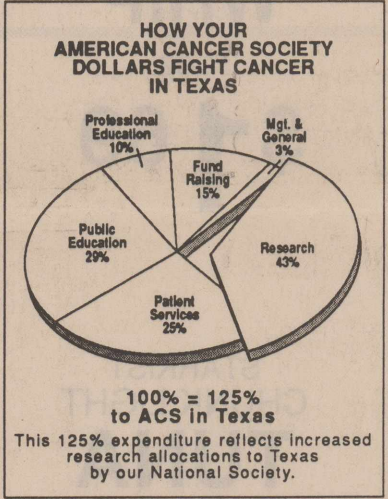
"Trees have always played an important role in the economic and cultural development of Texas," said Clements.

Hospital to sponsor breast cancer detection unit

According to The American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have Mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art X-Ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent

unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women.

On Wednesday, May 16, the Mobile Unit will be parked at Crockett County Hospital, Ave. H and 1st, in Ozona. Appointments may be made by calling 392-2671.

This is an eye opening fact for many farmers and ranchers. In fact, many people only worry about estate planning if they hear of a friend's "problem" in settling an estate or paying estate taxes. "But," Hayenga continued, "for many families the estate tax savings are not as large—if they have smaller operations. In fact, for many farm/ranch families, the income tax savings of a properly prepared estate plan can be greater than the estate tax savings."

Three two-day seminars talking about these complicated tax topics will be held at:

San Angelo-May 8-9, 1990

Waco-May 15-16, 1990

Harlingen-May 22-23, 1990

The program is structured to help farmers and ranchers learn how to lower their tax burden and ease administrative burdens that affect passing their estates to their loved ones. In addition to discussing estate planning systems, tax savings possibilities will be discussed from corporations, part-

nerships and trusts when family members are involved in the business.

Making gifts to avoid estate taxes will be discussed also. "There are two problems with making excessive gifts—the first is dying poor; the second is the adverse income tax consequences the gift can cause the recipient. Two problems that affect family operations—planning for inflation and growth of the business will be discussed. Another topic, how to be fair among all children when one child is interested in the family business and others are not will be addressed.


