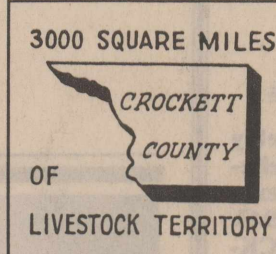

Hospital board to look at long range plan

Members of the Crockett County Hospital and Care Center board of directors agreed on the need for a long-range plan when they met last week. A study to determine the feasibility of a return to Medicare certification will be done as one phase of the plan.

Board members voted to hire a consultant who is a specialist in the area of Medicare conditions of participation to make the study. Approximately 1.5 days will be required to do the study.

Figures cited indicated that last year there were 71 patients treated elsewhere who could have been treated in the Ozona hospital if it were Medicare certified. Treatment of these 71 patients amounted to \$250,000 in revenue.

Construction of an enclosure to protect ambulances, renovation of four hospital rooms and providing clinic quarters for Dr. Sims someplace other than in the hospital were other items discussed for the long term plan.

"If we're going to be a hospital, let's do it right," said John Daniels who led the discussion for a plan for the facility.

Enclosures for the ambulances have been discussed at previous board meetings. Ten members of the local Emergency Medical Service were present May 9 to support the request for ambulance housing. Material costs and other necessary information will be presented at the June meeting by Doug Meador and Eddie Moore.

"I'm going to offer you my support now to get this done," Daniels said in reference to the ambulance housing.

Jo Davidson reported on the progress made by herself and other auxiliary ladies who are gathering facts and figures necessary for hospital room renovation.

During her report, Mrs. Davidson commended the board on behalf of a group of citizens for its work on doctor's contracts and the way the hospital is being run. "A number of people thought the board ought to get a pat on the back," Mrs. Davidson said.

Board chairman Armando Arredondo appointed a committee composed of Daniels, Fred Deaton, Cecil Buckner, Doris Hull and Bill Boswell along with one employee from the hospital and one from the care center to review the proposed county-wide personnel policy.

Board members voted to request that commissioners court un-table the care center plumbing bid specifications, complete work on the specifications and issue a bid request.

The board also voted to request that the court allow the hospital to bill the Sheriff's Department the same cost per meal for prisoners that the hospital and care center are paying.

A vote was taken to request that the court adopt the bad debt policy approved by the board in April. At the April meeting, commissioners voted to change notice periods in the bad debt policy which had been approved

by the hospital board.

Care center administrator Doris Hull reported she has four possible applicants for the educational assistance program being considered by the board.

Currently the care center has three empty beds. One or two of these will be reserved for future use by Crockett County residents, but an attempt will be made to fill any other empty beds

County attorney halts rural road maintenance

A letter written by County Attorney Orlando De Hoyos questioning the legality of county employees working on rural roads brought a halt to road maintenance in Crockett County this month.

According to De Hoyos' May 8 letter sent to court members and Eddie Moore, county road supervisor, no work should be performed on any roads outside the town of Ozona until and unless the roads are dedicated to and accepted by Crockett County.

An agreement to dedicate roadway on the Shannon Ranch to Crockett County will enable the road department to complete work currently underway there according to Moore.

Streets in town are expressly dedicated, De Hoyos told the court Monday. If work is done on anything outside of town, "you are taking a risk," he said. Dedication of roadways to the county is necessary before work can be done under the law.

DeHoyos suggested each land owner be contacted and given opportunity to dedicate their roads to the county.

Investigation of road maintenance in Crockett County stemmed from two complaints regarding property where owners asserted ownership on roads previously maintained by the county, De Hoyos said.

Initial research shows that no roads outside the town of Ozona have been expressly dedicated, De Hoyos said. Court records from 1934 state that the county will maintain all existing roads and designates the roads as public

roads, referred to as "neighborhood roads".

Former Ozonan convicted to 5-year term for wire fraud

Jacob C. (Jakie) Young, a former Midland stockbroker of the Midland branch of Merrill L. Lynch Brokerage and a 1958 graduate of Ozona High School, was convicted of two counts of wire fraud by District Judge Lucius Bunton Monday, May 7, said U. S. Attorney Bill Torrey.

Young, 50, was convicted April 10 of manipulating the accounts of two Texas women who had entrusted funds to the Midland branch of Merrill L. Lynch brokerage.

Young, who had been a sales representative for the Merrill L. Lynch brokerage house since 1967, was charged with devising a scheme from 1984-88 to defraud an El Paso woman of \$1.265 million from her account. The scheme also included the manipulation of funds of an Andrews woman, Torrey said.

Besides being sentenced to five years in prison, Judge Bunton ordered Young to make restitution of about \$1.4 million to his former firm, Torrey said.

Young's sentence also included five years of supervised probation following his federal prison term, Torrey said.

School computer six-year plan outlined

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, May 8, approved a district long-range plan for technology which was developed by a technology planning team composed of community representatives, students, teachers and administrators and presented by Sherry Scott, director of special programs.

The six-year plan covers three main areas: (1) using technology-based systems for instructional purposes in the classroom; (2) evaluating, developing and acquiring computer hardware and software for use in the classroom; and (3) fostering computer literacy among public school students.

The plan also addresses keyboarding, which is a psychomotor skill involving the touch method of input to a standard keyboarding device. Beginning in the 1990-91 school year, computer hardware and software to run a reading program will be acquired for Ozona Primary School, and a computer laboratory consisting of a minimum of a network server, 20 computer stations and printers will be established at Ozona Intermediate School. The present high school computer laboratory will be upgraded with new IBM-compatible equipment, and the Apple computers in the high school lab will be transferred to the junior high school to create a second computer lab in that school.

Also during the 1990-91 school year, students in kindergarten through grade three will receive pre-keyboarding instruction, and students in grade six will take a six-week course in keyboarding. Students in grades seven and eight will take a course in computer literacy, and a beginning reading and writing skills program will be implemented in Ozona Primary School. For teachers, opportunities will be provided for computer education training prior to August of this year, and inservice will be provided by the district and individual campuses in the use of appropriate software to support instruction. During the year a staff inservice plan will be developed which will prepare existing and future personnel to teach in a

technologically-equipped classroom, and a district plan for evaluating and purchasing computer software will also be developed.

During the 1991-92 school year, students in grades four and five will receive keyboarding instruction, and two computers per classroom in kindergarten will be acquired. Two computers per classroom for grades one and three will be purchased for the 1992-93 school year, and in 1993-94, a second computer lab will be established on the high school campus, and two computers per classroom in grades two and four will be purchased. In 1994-95, two computers per classroom in grade five will be purchased, and in 1995-96, an im-

proved video projection system will be established on all campuses.

During the meeting the trustees also approved a school policy manual update and a media contract with the Region XV Education Service Center.

Dyslexia program May 21

Dyslexia, a learning dysfunction, will be the subject of an educational and information meeting to be held Monday, May 21, in the Crockett Room at 7:00 p.m. Refreshments will be served.

"This is part of an educational and outreach program of Texas Scottish Rite Hospital," said Paula Bailey, who has worked to acquaint local teachers and school administrators with the learning problem that affects perhaps 15 percent of all youngsters. "They have developed a series of taped demonstrations of expert teachers working with dyslexic children, and the local Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star are sponsoring the meeting on the 21st."

Mrs. Bailey urged parents, teachers, and interested people to attend the meeting, especially if they know of children, or anyone, who suffers from learning disabilities. "The signs of dyslexia are often subtle and difficult to detect. People reach adulthood without knowing that the troubles they have in school are the result of a special problem that they have in processing information—especially in reading. When we all first learned to read, we probably had trouble remembering which was the b and which was

the d. A dyslexic is a person who lives with that kind of confusion, and many others, throughout their lives. And some people learn to compensate and overcome the problem. Nelson Rockefeller was dyslexic, and he became vice-president of the United States."

But for every Rockefeller, Mrs. Bailey said, there are thousands of dyslexics who go undetected and are forever branded as "slow learners," or "brain damaged," or "remedial problems."

"Learning problems lead to many other problems," Mrs. Bailey said, "but our primary concern right now is education and doing what we can in our schools to help children who have this condition. It is no respecter of sex, social level, or race. It's a human problem, and the Scottish Rite Hospital program is an excellent start for those of us who work with the kids."

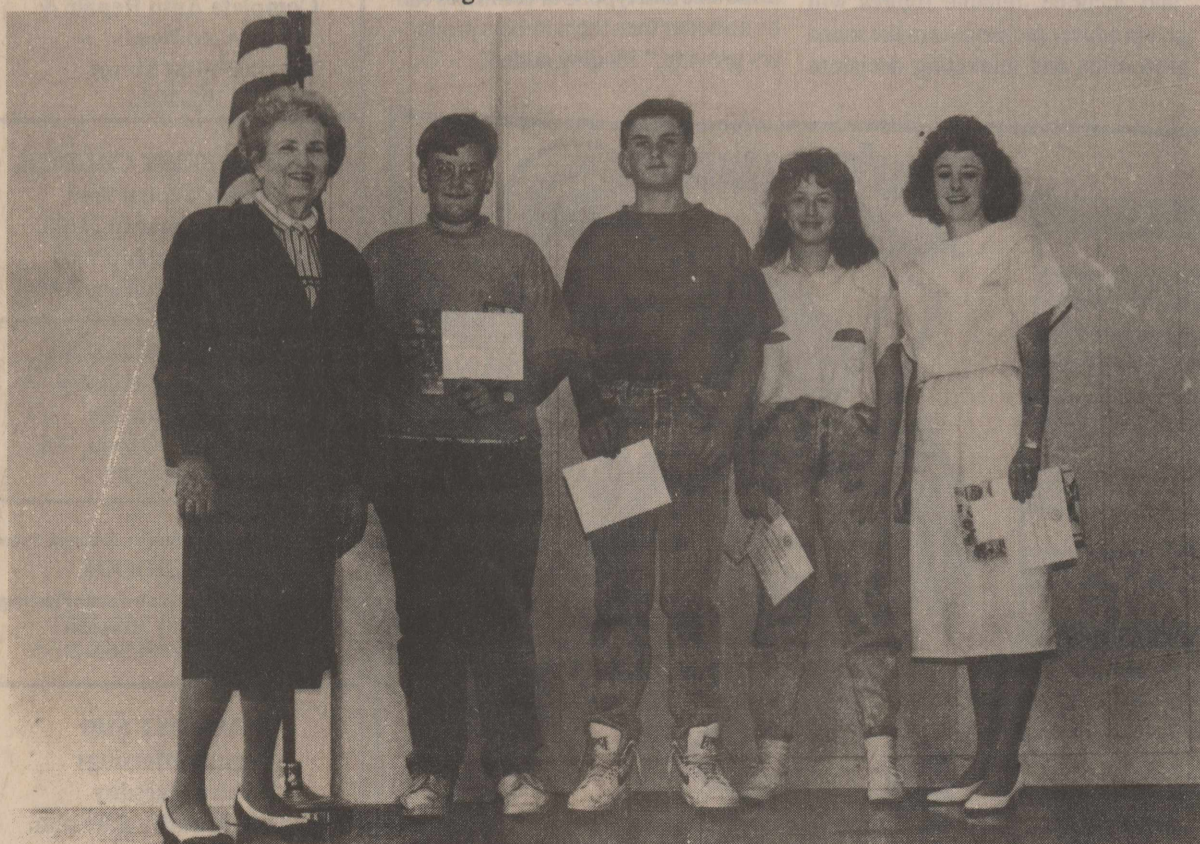

Texas Senate week in review

AUSTIN - Facing a June 1 court takeover of public school funding in Texas, Senate and House negotiators will attempt this week to break a stalemate with Gov. Bill Clements over education finance reform.

A compromise \$555 million education reform bill is expected to emerge this week from a Senate/House conference committee amid renewed threats from Clements to veto the plan.

The bill, similar to one passed by the Legislature last session, won approval last week in both houses, but went to conference committee to resolve differences in the Senate and House versions.

If Clements vetoes Senate Bill 1, as he did earlier this month with a half-cent sales tax hike that would have funded a similar education reform plan, a newly-appointed court master will present his funding plan to State District Judge Scott McCown on June 20.

Last week, McCown named former State Supreme Court Justice William Kilgarlin as master to devise an equitable plan for distributing state funds to public schools. Under the terms of the court order, Kilgarlin may draw his own plan or he may select the compromise plan now being negotiated in the Legislature if Clements and lawmakers fail to reach an accord.

Lawmakers have been in continuous special sessions since February 27 attempting to design a funding plan that would more evenly distribute state money among 1,068 public school districts in Texas. Last year, the State Supreme Court ruled the current fund distribution plan unconstitutional

because it favors property-rich districts over poorer ones. The court gave lawmakers a May 1 deadline which McCown extended last week to June 1.

Although Senate Bill 1, with its \$555 million first-year price tag, passed both legislative houses last week, Clements' negotiators continue to argue in favor of a \$250 million first-year funding plan.

Funding for the Clements-backed plan would have come from fee increases and budget transfers, while Senate Bill 1 would likely require a combination of those tactics plus a sales tax hike.

A sales tax bill has not yet been brought forward in the Legislature this session. Clements' veto of a sales tax increase killed the entire education package last session.

Lawmakers are once again discussing the possibility of attempting to override the threatened veto, a move that would require a two-thirds vote in both houses.

If Clements is successful in killing the education reform package, the court will then implement the plan of its choice to be funded from available revenue.

That eventuality would result in a redistribution of school funding with money taken from richer school districts and given to poorer ones.

Such a move, some lawmakers argue, would force an increase in local property taxes in wealthier districts to compensate for the loss in state aid.

The Senate and House were to reconvene Monday (May 14). The joint conference committee on Senate Bill 1 was to resume negotiations on that date.

Midyear crop and livestock report survey

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1990 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley emphasized that information from these surveys will help producers adjust their production and marketing plans for 1990. "Good marketing requires good information and advanced planning. Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their marketing plans.

"There are many uncertainties facing agriculture," Findley added, "and accurate, reliable figures will give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions

during the coming year."

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1990 planted acreage report will be released June 28 and the U.S. cattle inventory will be released July 27.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. Individual reports will be combined with other reports to state estimates.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.

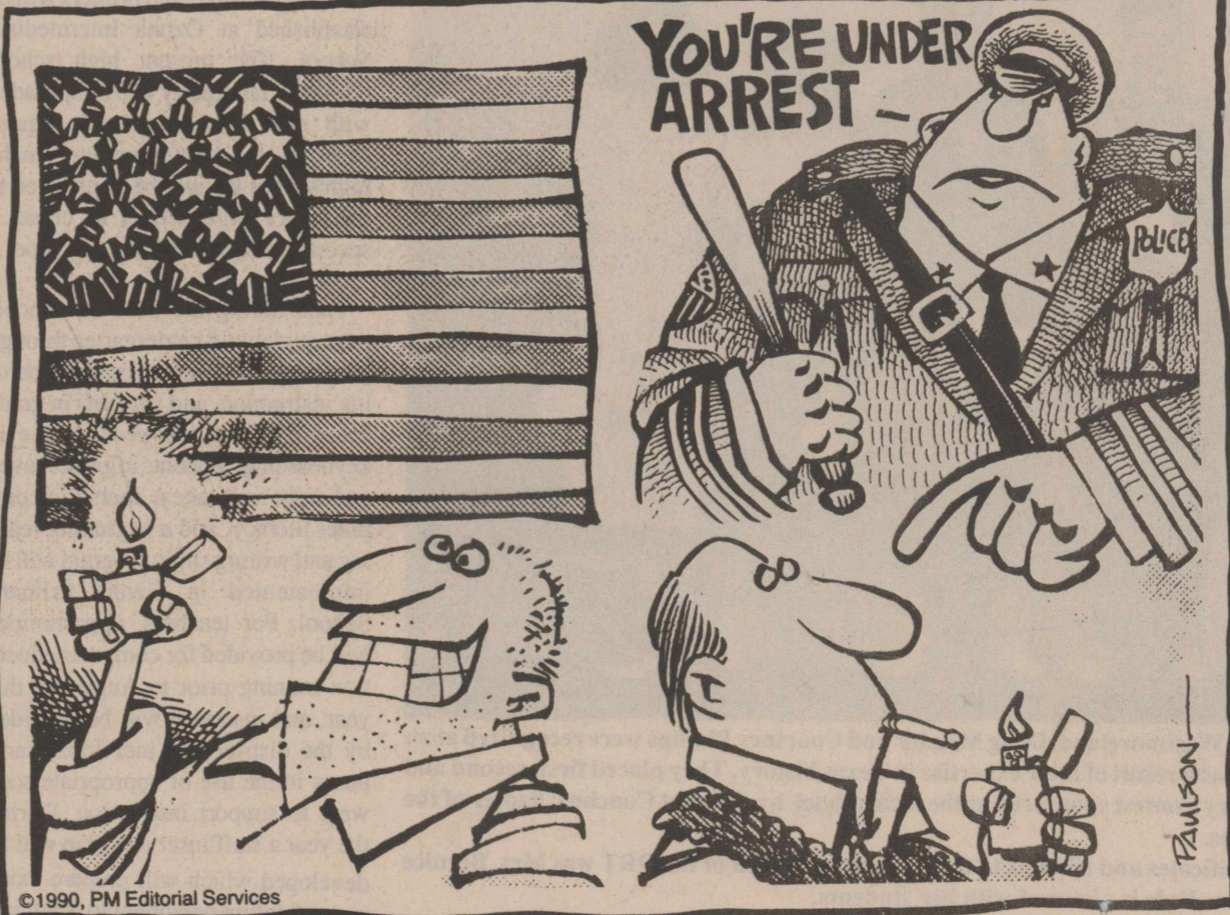
Percentage of occupancy in April was 0.01 with an average length of stay of 1.40 days and an average daily

Number of clinic visits to date are 1653 compared to 1224 for the same period last year. Total emergency room and clinic visits for the year to date number 2100.

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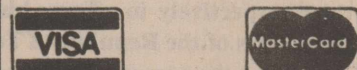

County residents save bundle at Health Fair

Crockett County residents took advantage of free tests for cholesterol, blood sugar, anemia and pulmonary function at last Thursday's annual Health Fair to the tune of over \$16,000, according to Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent.

Ulmer noted approximately 300 cholesterol and anemia tests were performed, and about 130 persons tested for blood sugar levels. "As an example of the value of the tests, the pulmonary function exam given by Community Hospital would normally cost \$40—they tested 100 persons, a savings of \$4000 to people in our community," she added. Persons taking advantage of all the testing offered were able to save about \$100 each.

Over 540 persons attended the event, ranging in age from small children to high school students to senior citizens. Fifteen different organizations sponsored booths and testing, including the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Crockett County Home Economics Committee and Texas Department of Health, co-sponsors of the event.

Other organizations participating were Shannon Medical Center, Med-Sport Clinic, Angelo Community Hospital, Crockett County Hospital, Public Library, EMS/Ambulance Service, Sheriff's Department and Water Department, Texas Department

of Public Safety, Beltone, River Crest Hospital, American Cancer Society and Planned Parenthood.

"We appreciate both our local exhibitors and participants and those who traveled all the way from San Angelo to help us out," said Ulmer. "I especially want to thank all the volunteers who help us with registration, testing and by bringing food for the health fair workers," she added.

"Without the many volunteer hours given," the agent stated, "we couldn't put on this health fair each year—nor would it be as successful and as helpful to the people in Crockett County."

The event was open to all persons in Crockett county, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap. If your group or organization is interested in participating in next year's health fair, contact the Crockett county Extension Office at 392-2721.

Greetings from Taiwan

I know it's been a long time since you've heard from the Rachers and we apologize for that. We have so many things to bring you up to date on, hardly know where to begin.

December went fast and furiously. We entertained 161 people in our home during this time and we had a wonderful time of celebrating our Lord's birth. We gained many new friends and had sweet fellowship with some dear old friends from our previous school.

The day after Christmas neither Patti nor I could get out of bed. I came down with the flu and Patti's back started hurting again. I recovered from the flu, but this was just the beginning of Patti's problems. Let me fill you in.

We began our search for some medical answers about Patti's back right after Christmas. We went to several doctors who took X-rays and told us there was nothing wrong. They would send us home with a big bag of pills and say, "in three or four days you'll be fine," but she wasn't.

Meanwhile our new upstairs neighbors arrived Feb. 8th. Their apartment was being remodeled, so they stayed with us. The Lord sent them at just the right time. I was trying to do my work and Patti's and not doing so well. The hours were unbelievable. The Francis, Glen and Diane, (missionaries from Indiana), were just wonderful to us. Diane pitched in and got the house back in shape and I could concentrate on my other duties. It wasn't until the first week in March that we found out what Patti's real problem was. She turned iodine yellow and began to itch all over. We immediately suspected hepatitis. So off we went for a blood test. The numbers were off the scale!! On March 8th, we admitted Patti to Mackay Hospital and for two weeks she underwent tests. They discovered a tumor on the pancreas which had blocked some bile ducts from the liver. They also found some enlarged lymph nodes and a couple of questionable places on the bone scan. She went into surgery on March 23rd to correct the bile duct problem and they took some lymph nodes for a biopsy. The tests results of the biopsy came back negative, which left the doctor's scratching their heads. They sent the biopsy out again for further tests, this time it came back positive indicating she has a form of lymphoma cancer. The #1 option was chemotherapy.

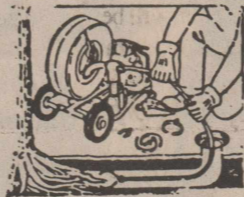
On April 17th Patti and I with the Lord's guidances, reached a decision, and that was to stay here in Taiwan and take the treatment. On April 20th Patti began a six month chemotherapy treatment. In light of all this, the good news is that the doctors say that this type of lymphoma cancer responds well with chemo treatment and has a success rate of about 75 to 80 percent cure.

These are hard and trying times for Patti and I, but we know Our Lord has a purpose for it. (Romans 8:28) We would like to thank each of you for holding us up in prayer before the Lord, during these trials. We couldn't make it without your support. Prayer is so important to us. We are on a huge battle field here in Taiwan, for we live in a country where only 2% of us are Christians. There are also more temples to other gods, and more god shelves in the homes of the people, than any other country in the world. The demonic activity is very strong here. Every morning and evening we can hear the music and chants of the two temples that we live near. We truly "struggle not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms." (Ephesians 6:12) So therefore we must put on the full armor of God. One of our greatest resource is prayer (Eph. 6:18). Thank you for praying for us.

Now I must close this newsletter with a lot of things unsaid, but we promise not to wait so long between letters. This may seem to be a depressing newsletter, but let me assure you that we are not discouraged, set back a little, but not discouraged. We Praise Our Lord for the privilege of serving Him here on this mission field. He did not promise us freedom from trials or tribulations, but He did promise us that He would never leave us or forsake us, and that someday soon we will share in His kingdom which is to come. We Love You.

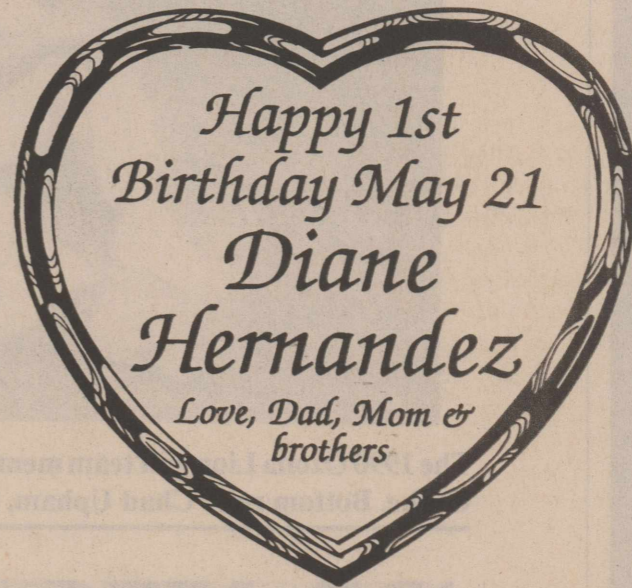

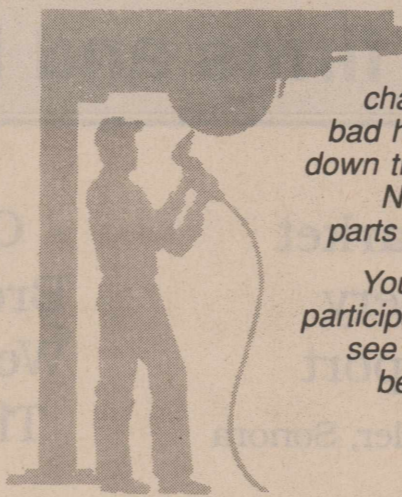

Diplomas mean dollars

It's almost graduation time, and we here at the Extension office are already getting "misty-eyed" over losing yet another crop of seniors we've come to know and love almost like our own kids.

But don't get me wrong—I'm proud of each of them for graduating, and also relieved—because new figures from the U.S. Bureau of the Census show more strongly than ever that what people earn is a direct reflection of how much education they have obtained.

Let's look at a chart which gives the median annual income for all individuals 18 years of age and older working year-round in 1987.

Level of Education	Median Income
Less than 8th grade	\$6,214
8th grade	\$7,183
High school dropout	\$7,914
High school graduate	\$12,040
Some college	\$14,554
College graduate	\$22,381
College plus	\$30,606

Median income means half of the workers earn less than that amount, and half earn more. The figures make it clear—the more education a person has, the greater his or her earning capacity. Although there are always exceptions, most high school dropouts can't expect to earn what college graduates do.

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West Texas Sheep Conference set

Area sheep producers are urged to attend the West Texas Sheep Conference May 18 at Angelo State University's Management, Instruction and Research Center (MIR Center). The conference is being sponsored by the Extension staffs in Tom Green, Menard, Schleicher, and Concho Counties.

The one-day event begins at 9:00 a.m. with registration and coffee provided by Tom Green National Bank. The formal program is set for 9:30 a.m. with a welcome given by Tom Green County Extension agent, Rex Jones.

"Because the sheep and wool industry is so vital to this area the coordinators of the conference have made a real effort to present the best information possible to help producers make practical management decisions to increase their net income," Jones said. "During the conference, we will be looking at ASU's facilities and using live animal evaluations to illustrate points made during the day."

Ram epididymitis, a venereal disease which has created much concern among area producers, will be the subject of the day's first talk. Addressing the issue is Dr. Charles Livingston, recently retired Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) Veterinarian from San Angelo. Livingston will discuss the most current means available for detecting epididymitis.

Dr. Chris Lupton, San Angelo based TAES wool lab coordinator, will speak on the Australian method of wool grading some ranchers are trying this year. He will also demonstrate a portable wool press or baler being used in conjunction with the grading method.

The morning's next two speakers will discuss the merits of ultrasound, a technique growing in popularity that is used to determine pregnancy and the number of fetuses in sheep. Dr. Laird Lawrence, with Fredericksburg's Hill Country Veterinary

Clinic, will discuss his work for the public using the device. Menard rancher Bill Austin will then share his management practices based on the results of ultrasound.

The final speaker for the morning session is Dr. Tom Craig, parasitologist at Texas A&M University. Craig will give an update on internal parasite control. He will also give the latest research information on the effectiveness of all drenches now available and the best times for their use.

A free lunch is being provided courtesy of Merck and Company, All Flex-Vet Brand Ear Tags and the Pitman-Moore Company.

After lunch the conference will move from the MIR Center to the ASU sheep facility for the afternoons live sheep presentations. ASU staff members Dr. Gil Engdahl and Clayton McCown will describe the school's lambing facilities and discuss the advantages in a shed lambing management program.

The next speaker, Dr. George

Ahlschwede, is an Extension sheep and goat specialist based at San Angelo. He will demonstrate palpation techniques used in determining epididymitis.

Following a short break, Jamie Kothmann, owner and operator of Menards' Kothmann Commission Company, will look at the lamb market outlook and the type of feeder lamb desired by the trade. He will discuss the most desirable breeds as well as the best breed crosses for feedlot performance and carcass quality. He will also touch on conformation points needed in the ideal feeder lamb.

The remaining conference speakers will demonstrate live animal selection techniques used in selecting

breeding stock. Explaining yearling ewe selection techniques are Dr. Frank Craddock, extension Sheep and Goat Specialist at Uvalde, and Rex Stultz, Concho County Extension Agent. Selection criteria for Rambouillet rams will be presented by Sterling County Rambouillet producer Clinton Hodges.

The day's final speaker is Menard County Extension agent Sam Kuykendall. Kuykendall will discuss what to consider in selecting blackface rams.

Adjournment is set for 4:15 p.m. For further information, contact your local county Extension agent.

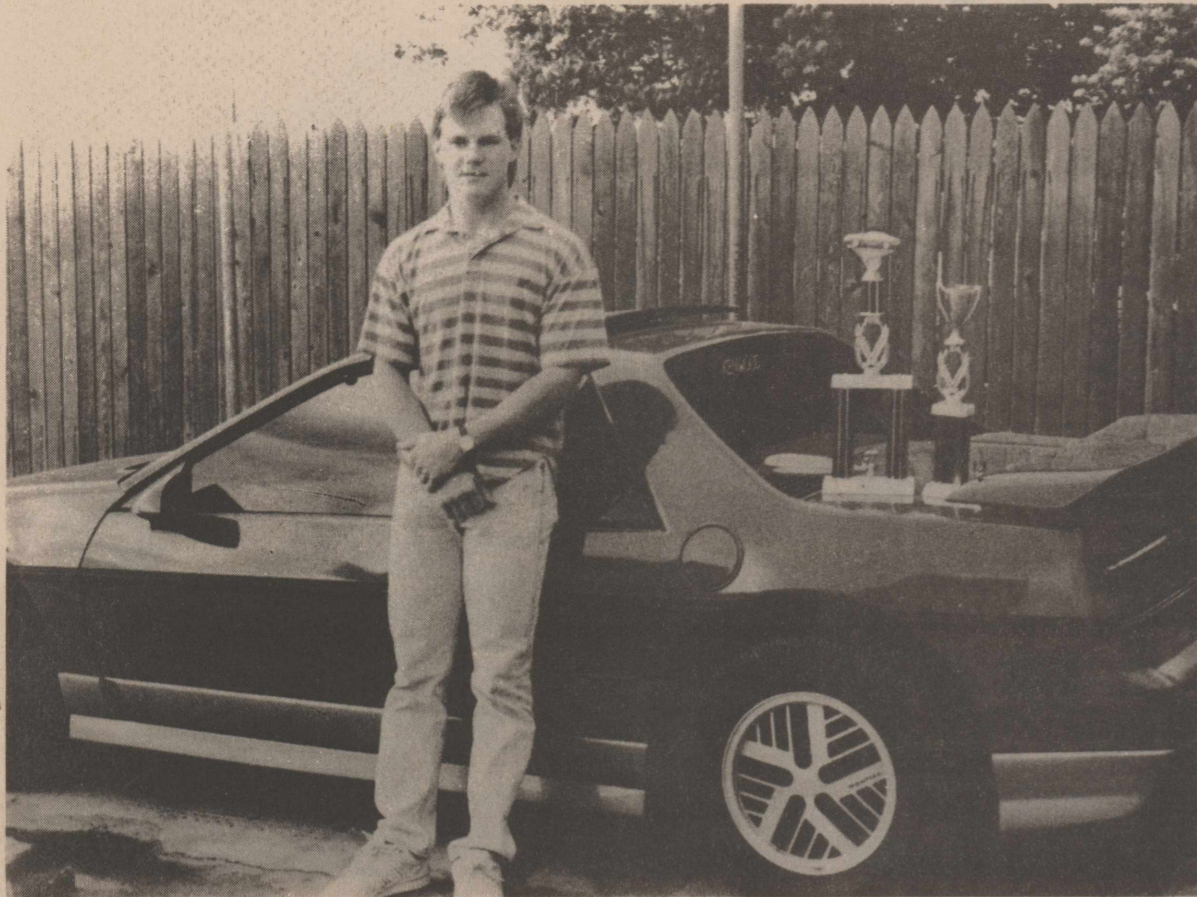

Camp Sweeney geared for diabetic children

Every summer, over 300 young people between the ages of six and eighteen attend a very exclusive camp near Gainesville. The entrance requirements are strict: the child must have diabetes.

Too often, regular summer camps turn away a child with diabetes because of their special diet and medical needs. But Camp Sweeney, organized over 40 years ago, is a place for the child to learn while having fun. All of the activities of a regular summer camp are offered: horseback riding, swimming, boating, fishing, arts and crafts, riflery, archery, movies, dances, and carnivals.

At Camp Sweeney a 24 hour medical staff skilled in the knowledge of juvenile diabetes gives campers supervision and attention. At daily medical lectures the campers learn the vital importance of balancing their insulin intake and their diet in order to live longer, healthier, and happier lives.

Diets are formulated according to each individual's needs, giving the diabetic valuable examples of how to exchange foods to include an occasional "treat" so he won't feel left out around his friends at home.

Camp Sweeney is located ten

miles northeast of Gainesville, Texas, near the Oklahoma border. Camp facilities include six air-conditioned cabins, lodge, hospital, and various staff cabins and a pavilion where arts and crafts and rainy day activities such as country and western dancing are enjoyed. Camp Sweeney also has two tennis courts, basketball/volleyball courts, soccer and baseball fields, a swimming pool, horseback riding, archery, riflery, and a 34 acre lake where the children enjoy paddle-boat- ing, canoeing, rowing, and fishing.

Camp Sweeney has never denied admission to any child with diabetes. The only requirement is to have diabetes and be between the ages of 6 and 18. Each year approximately 75% of all campers receive scholarship aid which is funded by donations from friends, foundations, and United Way agencies.

The first three-week session will begin on June 10 and end on June 29; session two will be held from July 1 to July 20; and the final session is set for July 22 to August 10.

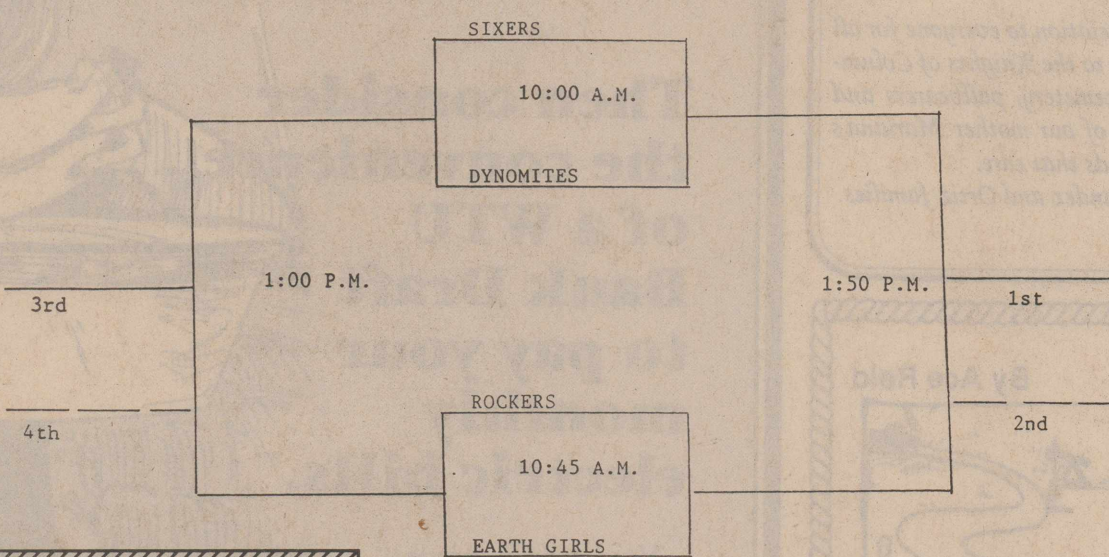

nance of roads are factors to consider if the court takes the position that roads have been impliedly dedicated to the county, according to De Hoyos.

The attorney emphasized it is his opinion that no work should be performed on any rural roads until they are dedicated and accepted by the commissioners court. "I take this position until it can be determined which roads existed prior to 1934."

Judge Mayfield requested that De Hoyos talk with other county attorneys and come up with a procedure and recommendation to rectify the problem.

At the May 14 meeting, a called meeting was set for May 29 at 9 a.m. to receive the recommendations.

Later in the day, commissioners

went into executive session after hearing a proposal by John Neville that the county become involved in establishing a prison at the Crockett Heights property owned by Crockett Detention Center Inc.

"You can go into executive session

to discuss hiring 40 additional personnel," Judge Mayfield told the court, noting that it would be "inappropriate to go into executive session to discuss a lease.

No action was taken when the court resumed in open session.

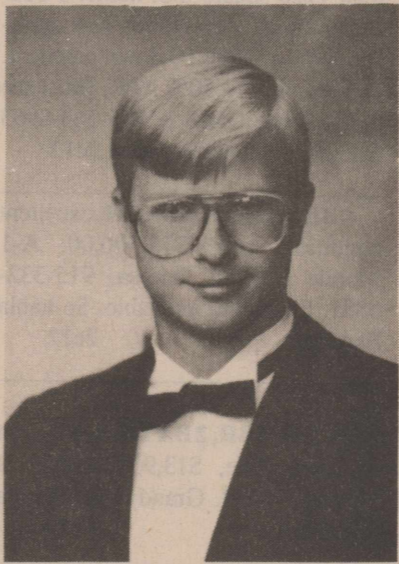
