

Commissioners vote to continue road maintenance

Commissioners voted unanimously Tuesday that all roads presently maintained by the county be considered as dedicated to the county with maintenance to be continued pending completion of a numbering system currently underway.

Any landowner who wishes to give a written dedication may do so, but this is not necessary, said Judge Kathryn Mayfield.

The vote to continue road work came following statements from Mayfield and County Attorney Orlando De Hoyos regarding the legality of county maintenance on rural roads in Crockett County. DeHoyos presented the court with a written opinion earlier this month stating that the legality of maintenance of roads outside the town of Ozona was in question.

De Hoyos Tuesday told the court and a large number of landowners that a criminal investigation by his office centered not on the maintenance of roads, but on the proper use of county funds by the court on roads.

Immediately after opening the special court session, Judge Mayfield moved first to the item on the agenda "County Attorney authority". Reading from the Texas Constitution and Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes, she covered duties and authority of

the county attorney and laws regarding county roads.

Mayfield quoted from Sect. 41.007 of the Texas Government Code that a district or county attorney, on request, shall give to a county or precinct official of his district or county a written opinion or written advice relating to the official duties of that official.

She went on to say that neither opinion of Attorney General nor advice of county attorney has force of law, although commissioners' court can follow advice of those officials prior to rendition of a judgment by a court of competent jurisdiction.

The judge stated that road supervisor Eddie Moore had been called to De Hoyos' office and told that he would be "thrown in jail" (for working rural roads...) and did myself likewise on Friday, and it's my understanding his stance has not changed."

Action of the court in voting to consider all roads currently maintained as under implied dedication makes the situation purely a civil matter, De Hoyos said after Tuesday's meeting. The question of whether roads are public or private will now be between the court and landowners, no longer involving the county attorney's office.

A motion earlier in the meeting that Crockett County continue to work on roads as in the past, repair and continue present maintenance until stopped by a court order was passed with Jim House, Janet Hill and Mayfield voting for and Sostenes De Hoyos and Chuy Castro voting against.

During an ensuing discussion, De Hoyos told landowners, "if you want us to maintain, you make the decision for us. What they're (the court) saying is whether you like it or not, it's ours."

According to De Hoyos, University of Texas land representatives and owners of property along 12 of the 29 roads already numbered in the county have contacted his office and are ready to sign a dedication.

An order issued by commissioners' court in 1934 calling for all roads maintained by the county to be considered county roads, methods by which landowners may legally change the status of or close a road and statutory methods of converting pri-

vate to public roads were discussed in an informal question and answer session involving members of the audience, court and De Hoyos.

A statute passed in 1981 states that a private road can become public by "purchase, condemnation, dedication (defined as the explicit, written communication to the commissioners' court) or final judgment of adverse possession in a court of competent jurisdiction." Although the statute does away with common-law methods of acquiring public roads, it does not affect any road that was in use by the public before 1981. Crockett County has not constructed any new roads since 1981.

There are two classes of common-law dedications - express and implied. When writing or by oral declaration, you have express dedication. Acts of the landowner give rise to implied dedication if the actions are such that an ordinary person believes

there was an intent to dedicate the road and the public is using the road.

In other business, court members voted to approve revised specifications and advertise for bids for care center plumbing, voted to authorize advertising for bids for surplus equipment, tabled a request by Constable Raymond Borrego that he be provided with one of two surplus Sheriff's Department cars slated for disposal, approved purchase of a radio for the new parks department pickup, accepted and authorized the judge to sign a contract for on line data processing real and business personal property and tax collection, and designated the third week of June as clean up week.

During a discussion of non-agenda items, court members and Eddie Moore, road supervisor, considered pros and cons of contracting future paving work.



Accident fatal to San Angelo man

Rodolfo Zapata Sepeda of San Angelo died in a one-car accident Thursday morning on Hwy. 163 just north of Ozona. Zepeda was a front seat passenger of a car driven by Franklin Meek of San Angelo.

The men and two others were southbound when the vehicle veered to the right and struck a mesquite tree on the

west side of the road across from the industrial park.

EMS personnel and firemen worked to extricate the accident victims from the wreckage. The driver and a passenger were treated at the local hospital and transported to a San Angelo hospital. One patient remained hospitalized in Ozona.

Ozona's Special Olympians earn State awards May 24

The temperature and the competition were both hot as Ozona's Special Olympic athletes competed in the Texas Special Olympic summer games in San Marcos May 22-24.

Steven Leal started the competition for Ozona on Wednesday morning with the softball throw. He ran into some stiff competition, but managed to come away with a fifth place ribbon for a throw of 32.8 meters.

In the afternoon, it was Brian Branch's turn to carry the Ozona banner into competition. He carried it well as he was able to heave the softball 18.4 meters on his final throw to edge out his competition by 80 centimeters and bring home the first place gold medal.

On Thursday, it was back into the competition. In one of the most exciting races in his age group, Steven Leal was edged out by one-half step and had to settle for the second place silver medal in the 100 meter dash with a time of 14.8 seconds.

Brian Branch finished off Ozona's quest for the gold Thursday afternoon in the 50 meter dash. He recorded a time of 12.61 seconds and brought home the third place bronze.

The 1990 Texas Special Olympics marked the 23rd year of the event in the state. Former Dallas Cowboys Coach Tom Landry, honorary head coach for the games, told the 3,600 special olympians they share much of what makes a National Football

League Hall of Famer.

In opening ceremonies in Bobcat Stadium on the Southwest Texas State University campus Landry listed their willingness to compete despite what may seem like overwhelming odds to others; the talent needed to keep up with the game; their demonstration of courage every time they enter a field of competition; and their competitive spirit that does not allow them to accept losing.

The spectacular opening ceremonies featured skydivers bearing the Texas Special Olympics flag and a spectacular fireworks and laser light display.

Nothing could equal the excitement generated by the 339 teams of parading athletes who filled in the outline of the state of Texas. When the lights were turned off in Bobcat Stadium, the athletes became 3,700 points of light with small flashlights.

With the lights twinkling on the field, pentathlete Gina Young, Area 10 Athlete of the Year, carried the "Flame of Hope" from the upper deck of the stadium, passing it off to several other special olympians who looped the track twice before Richard Johnson of Houston lit the torch.

Forming the outline of Texas for the athletes were the 300 law enforcement officers who had completed the torch run and raised a record \$215,000 for Texas Special Olympics.

School is out, so watch out, says a safetygram from the Texas Department of Public Safety Education Service Region in San Angelo.

The key is to see children in time to avoid a collision. Search from curb to curb for pedestrians who could enter your path, especially in neighborhoods and around playgrounds.

Watch for toys, bikes and other clues to the invisible presence of children. A ball that rolls into the street will probably be followed by a child.

When you drive in suburban or rural areas with no sidewalks, watch for children who walk along the edge of the road or on the shoulder. After dark and during foul weather when visibility drops, allow more time to stop.

Everyone who enters the roadway is vulnerable to injury, but children on foot are even more at risk. The number of children outdoors increases during the summer months. Take extra care to keep them alive, says the safetygram.

Outdoor living and a good attitude are the secrets of Bud Mayes' long life says his wife Polly. Bud observed his 90th birthday in February and was honored by his family with a reception May 20 in Ozona.

"I was wondering the other day what became of those 90 years," said Mayes during a recent interview. A conversation with this still active gentleman reveals that most of those years were spent as a cowboy.

"I was going to retire at 70," said Mayes who last climbed on a horse at age 82.

Mayes, who bases his life on a "live and let live" philosophy, learned cowboying when his father ran the Ward Cattle Company west of Big Lake. "I just like ranching. That's all I've ever tried to do," said Mayes.

His early school days were spent at Stiles. At age 16, he put formal education behind, leaving Simmons College to work for the Harris Brothers at Big Lake.

"I saw the railroad come through from Angelo to McCamey," remembers Mayes. He worked cattle throughout the area before the railroad was built.

The family moved to the Slaughter Ranch at Sheffield before Bud turned 18. By the time his draft notice found him, World War I was over, and he didn't have to serve. He was required to register at age 45 for World War II, but was not called up.

Bud thinks of himself as a horseman and was a great horsebreaker, said Polly. He and his late brother, Ben, broke 29 horses one summer at Sheffield.

Mayes volunteered few stories from his cowboying days. "They're so many and so short," he quipped.

He did tell of nights of sleeping on the ground and awakening covered with ice and snow. The hardest man he ever worked for fed his crew on cornbread, moiasas and clabber. "I lasted nine days until they could get

somebody else," said Bud.

Mayes came to the area in 1923, living west of Ozona. He has called Ozona home since 1939 except for six years spent ranching in Colorado for Dick Henderson. At the time of his retirement, he worked for Jack Wilkins on the Flying W Ranch.

Bud Mayes married the late Clara Friend when he was 23. They raised two daughters, Helen and Ethel. Helen lives in Roswell, NM, with her husband, Max Wilson. Ethel and her husband, Dick Henderson, divide their time between Kerrville and Colorado.

Seven grandchildren, two step-grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren complete the family begun by Bud and Clara.

Bud Mayes and Polly Eppler married in 1983. A native of Menard, Polly has lived in Ozona for 20 years. The two make their home with their Siamese cat Junior in the Chandlerdale Addition where she also has her business, Polly's Cakes.

Bud screened-in their large back porch last summer. Polly points out with pride. "Friday s always come too soon for Bud. He has something to do every day," she said.

"I just last about an hour," responded Bud with a grin.

Mayes is one of 50 interviewed by Patrick Dearen, author of *Castle Gap and the Pecos Frontier*, for inclusion in a book being written to preserve the lore of the cowboy age.

Approximately 60 guests from Kerrville, Sonora, Big Lake, Bronte, Floresville, Austin, San Angelo, El Paso, Midland, Rankin, Del Rio, Lubbock and Roswell, NM, attended the reception honoring Mayes.



Teen sexuality: what can we do?

Last week, I began a series of columns addressing the problem of teen sexuality in Crockett County. I also gave you some facts and figures from the recent teen sexuality survey at Ozona High School.

To recap, about 75 percent of the student body taking the survey reported they have had sexual relationships. The ages with the most students reporting the first sexual encounter were from 13 to 16.

We also found that parents can have a positive impact on their teens' sexual behavior, judging from the fact that most students who said they had not had sex reported their parents had "a great deal of influence", while the opposite was true for teens who were sexually active.

This week, I'd like to give you a few more items from the survey, some more national figures, and then some suggestions for things we adults in Crockett county may be able to do to stem this tide.

One of the questions parents should be vitally interested in was "Where were you when you first had sexual intercourse?" For males, the highest number reported a friend's home (35%), with a car, their home, and their partner's home all receiving about 17-18% each.

For female respondents, the partner's home and friend's home both accounted for a majority of the answers—25% and 27%, respectively. Their home accounted for 17% of the responses, and a car was named by 22%.

As parents, this can tell us that we need to be more aware of where our children are, how they're being supervised, and who they're with. Luckily, this is an area we can more easily do something about, by supporting each other and communicating with each other.

Other questions in the survey indicated that many youth have sex more often than once a month, 38% of males indicated they have had from 2-4 different partners, and 32% of the females said they have had more than one partner. This is worrying not only because of the risk of pregnancy, but because with multiple partners, the risk of sexually transmitted disease is also multiplied.

Eight true statements were included on the survey, asking the youth if they knew the facts. Responses ranged from 70% incorrect to 14% correct.

What does the research say about teen sexuality? First, there are many factors leading teens to risk their future by becoming sexually active without thinking about the consequences. Traditional institutions such as the family, school and community often fail to provide teens with a positive view of the future of an affirmative self-image.

We also have to view this problem in the context of our society - which places a great deal of emphasis on sex, especially in the media. In essence, teens are given a conflicting message—Just say 'No' while everyone else says 'Yes.'

So what can we do? We're not helpless if we do several things:

1) Take responsibility for the problem—it's not "someone else's" and it's not going to "go away." All of these children are the future of our town and our nation.

2) Work together to solve the problem. If you belong to community organizations or civic groups, sponsor programs to help educate your members about the problems relating to teen sexuality and ways we can stop the tragedy from repeating itself again and again.

3) If you're parent, take responsibility by learning better communications skills, knowing where your children are and who is supervising them, and not being afraid to set limits on behavior.

4) use our community's assets — a good school system, our civic center and other extracurricular activities, the "close-knit" feeling we have here—to find programs and activities to keep kids busy, raise their level of self-esteem, and educate them about why they shouldn't be sexually active!

5) Encourage open communication between family members about sexuality. If you feel uncomfortable

discussing these subjects in a non-threatening way, consider a parent-child class on sexuality. These may be available through your church or a civic group in the future.

6) Remember that along with the "mechanics" of sex, young people need information on values and decision making. The best place for them to receive this is in the home or church. And as a parent or young adult, remember you're a role model - whether positive or negative.

The Extension Home Economics committee will be sponsoring several different programs and courses in coming months for youth and their families. We hope you will take advantage of these. We also hope you'll contact us for information about human development and sexuality. We have a publication available, "Parents talk to their pre-adolescent children about sexuality," as well as other information, free of charge.

Farming, ranching survey underway

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1990 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.

State statistician Dennie Findley said that information from the surveys will help producers plan their production and marketing for 1990. "Good marketing requires good information and advanced planning. Information from the surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures that can be used when making their marketing plans.

"There are many uncertainties facing agriculture," Findley added, "and accurate, reliable figures will give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions for the coming year."

The results of confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published late this summer. The 1990 planted acreage report will be released June 28 and the U. S. cattle inventory will be released July 27.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. Individual reports will be combined with other reports to state estimates.

Remember these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.
