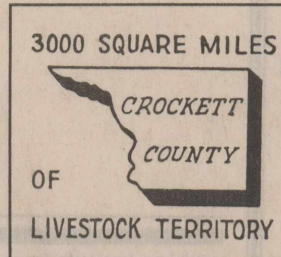

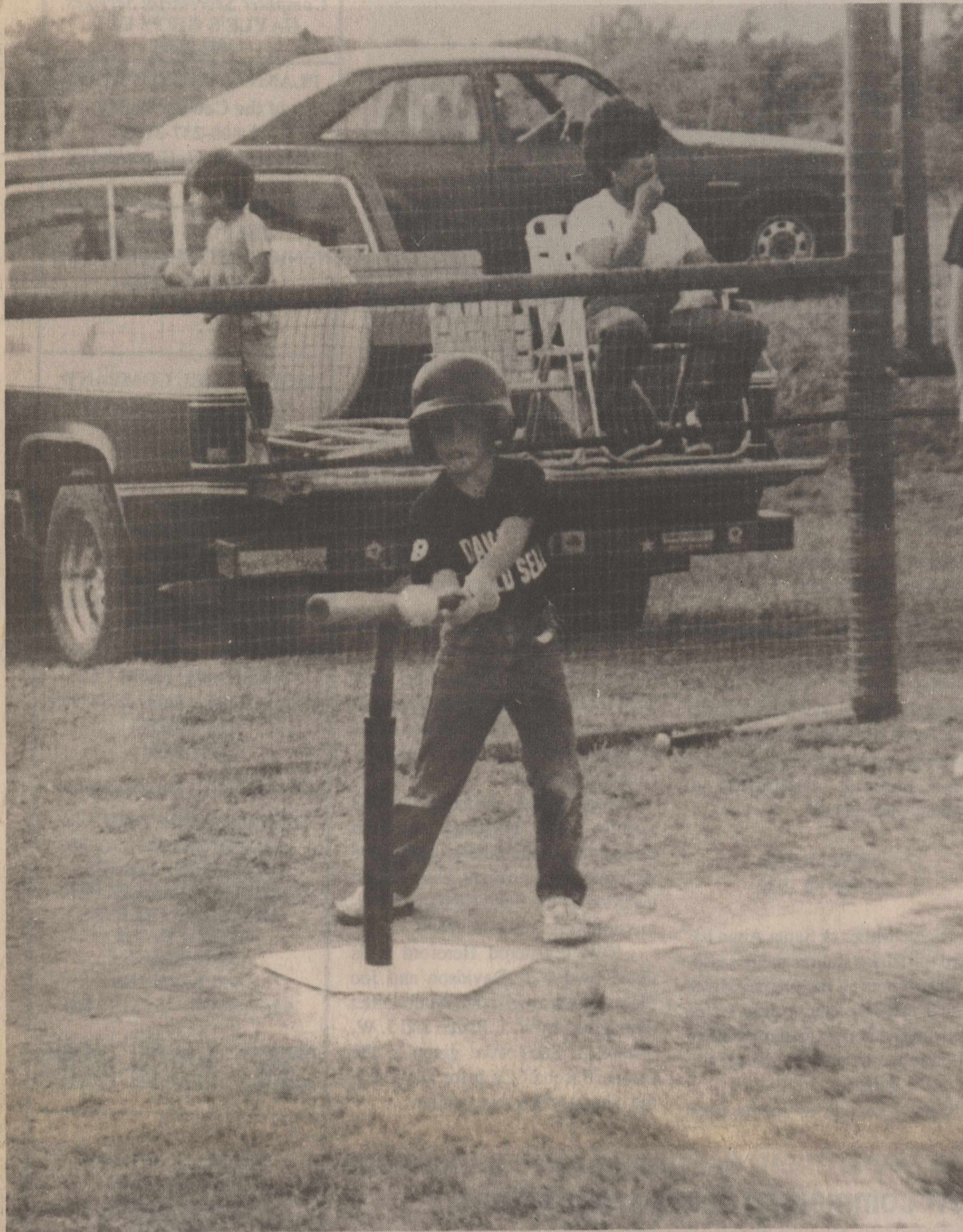

Commissioners approve right-of-way fencing on Henderson ranch, pass postal resolution

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday June 11, 1990, covering fourteen of the sixteen listed items on the posted agenda.

All reports were heard from the respective department heads with the exception of the fire department and sheriff's department.

Crockett County Tax Assessor and Collector Tommy Stokes made a recommendation to the court that all penalties and interest due the county on delinquent taxes owed by Sagi Petroleum Corp., with Big State Ranch, the royalty owner, involving eight stripper oil wells be waived, if the principal could be paid within a thirty day time period. This was being based on a letter addressed to the Tax Collector and Assessor from Dixon Mahon, attorney for Big State Ranch.

In the letter the attorney stipulated that the wells were non-oper-

able, and were previously operated by Sagi Petroleum Corporation, a defunct company. Mahon explained that Big State has someone interested in purchasing the wells, but will require some relief on the past due taxes. They have proposed to pay the principal in cash in full for all taxes previously assessed against Sagi up to a maximum of \$16,000.00.

Commissioner Jim House moved to waive the penalty and interest on the wells on the Big State Ranch property if the principal is paid within the 30 day time limit. DeHoyos seconded and the motion carried.

The court heard a presentation by Gary Harris, professional engineer with Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc., who described his firm's plan for a professional engineering study of the county's solid waste management problem. A contract and plan of action was presented to the court for their approval. DeHoyos moved to

approve the contract and Judge Mayfield seconded and the motion carried authorizing the judge to sign the contract.

Commissioners discussed and approved a resolution urging the United States Postal Service to create a "local governmental postal rate" as

Crockett 4-H'ers tops in state contests

Crockett County 4-H members Tamie Reagor and Matthew Marshall walked away with top honors in two contests at the 1990 State 4-H Roundup this week, as other 4-H members won kudos of their own.

Reagor, the daughter of Billy and Judy Reagor, took another first-place demonstration win with her illustrated talk, "Mohair: Setting the Standards for Fashion" in the Clothing Educational Activity. She received a \$400 sewing machine and other prizes for her efforts. Reagor was last year's winner in the Sheep and Goat category.

Matthew Marshall led the county's Range Evaluation team to a second-place finish and received honors as first high point individual in the highly competitive contest, followed closely by teammate John Williams, who receive recognition as second high individual. Also on the team were Martha Mayfield and Fleet Worthington.

"The New Look of Lamb" proved to be a hot topic in the Meat Science contest for Julie Childress and Jennifer Davidson, as they placed third out of nine teams. This is their first year to do a demonstration, and they each received a plaque for their efforts.

The Wool Judging team placed fourth, with Andy Stokes, Martin Childress, Chad Upham and Terry House competing for Crockett County. In the Family Life Educational

Activity, Katharine Durham and Hollie Williams were sixth of 18 teams with their talk on teen involvement in cults.

Whitney Vannoy received a blue ribbon and was in the top half of her class at the State Food Show on Tuesday.

The county's Range and Pasture Grass Identification team of Angie Marshall, Justin Southern, Mike Kenison and C'Jay McKinney faced some tough competition in their contest. No ranking was available at press time.

One of the highlights of the week came with the recognition of Ozona rancher Pleas Childress III as a 1990 Texas 4-H Alumni Award winner.

Childress, a former state-winner in range judging and record books, was one of only six alumni to receive recognition this year. In a speech at Tuesday night's opening assembly, he challenged 4-H members to combine one of Davy Crockett's famous sayings, "Be sure you're right, then go ahead," with the 4-H motto, "To make the best better."

Childress was accompanied to this year's awards banquet, held prior to the assembly, by his wife, Sandra

and parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pleas Childress II.

Other adults attending this year's Roundup were Larry and Elaine Williams, Nancy Vannoy, JoNel Stokes, Vaden Aldridge and county Extension agents Billy Reagor and Tedra Ulmer.

The agents noted that they were extremely pleased with the success of the 4-H'ers in the contests, and with their exemplary behavior while at College Station. "It's a privilege to take these fine young people to represent us before the State of Texas, as well as being a privilege to have their parents and other leaders along," said Ulmer.

Ulmer and Reagor also urged other 4-H members to begin planning now for demonstrations and judging teams in 1991.

Williams nabs \$8,000 scholarship for outstanding 4-H work

John Williams, son of Larry and Elaine Williams, was one of fifty recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships at the Texas 4-H Roundup in College Station last week.

Williams, a 1990 graduate of Reagan County High School, received the scholarship based on his 4-H work, academic achievements and college entrance exam scores. The scholarship was one of 93 awarded through the Texas 4-H Foundation this year, with a total of \$581,000 presented at Tuesday night's opening assembly, in addition to several other special scholarships totaling \$10,050.

Williams is a past state record

book winner who plans to attend Texas A&M University in the fall and major in agribusiness. His career plans are to become a lawyer and specialize in agricultural or water law.

He was one of over 400 4-H members from the state who submitted scholarship applications. John is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Williams of Ozona.

County Extension Agents Billy Reagor and Tedra Ulmer stated, "We are very proud of John's accomplishments, and of the way he has met his goals in 4-H through the years. We hope this will inspire other 4-H members in Crockett County to work towards these scholarships."

The Department of Public Safety announces new commercial license regulations

The 1990s are bringing changes to the state's transportation system that will ultimately affect the general public of Texas as well. During this year alone, three regulations become effective in Texas that are intended to make the state's highways safer.

In June Texas drivers wishing to keep their commercial license must take a written—and possibly a road—test to obtain the new Commercial Drivers' License. Department of Public Safety officials will begin testing in June. Texas drivers have until April 1992 to obtain a commercial drivers' license, however, state officials predict it will take two years to accomplish the licensing process for the approximately 1 million commercial operators in Texas.

In July all interstate motor carriers operating in excess of 10,000 pounds GVW and intrastate motor carriers operating in excess of 10,000

pounds GVW and intrastate motor carriers operating in excess of 26,000 pounds GVW must have had an annual inspection performed within the previous 12 months on all commercial motor vehicles by July 1.

All intrastate carriers and interstate carriers with less than 50 drivers must have a drug testing program in place by Dec. 21, 1990.

Few people realize the impact these regulations will have on the trucking industry and the state. Clearly, the intent of these regulations is to ensure that only safe drivers operate commercial vehicles. However, an unknown factor at this point is just how many drivers will become unqualified to drive in Texas. With the trucking industry already experiencing driver shortages, the regulations will make enlisting new drivers even more difficult.

The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Area youth receive hunter training

Sixteen young people from this area participated in a hunter education camp held June 1-3 at the ranch of Gene and Betty Perry. This was the third year for the camp to be held in Crockett County for the purpose of preparing youngsters for their future in the world of sport hunting, with topics covering safe handling and use of firearms, care of game, wildlife management and identification, wilderness survival, hunter first aid, game laws, and hunter ethics. The annual affair is sponsored by the Texas Game Warden Association with help from associate members and donations from individuals in this and surrounding communities.

Successfully completing the Texas Hunter Education Course were Ky Montgomery, Matt Mecke, T. J. Weddle, Lynne Haire, and Casey Upham, along with campers from Marfa, Eden, and San Angelo.

The curriculum for the course offered at the Crockett County camp is based on the state course administered by the Hunter Education Division of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department and is designed to train students in safety and competence in the field of sport hunting. It is through this course that hunters receive the training mandated by state law, which will eventually require that all hunters born after Sept. 1, 1971 be certified to hunt in Texas. This camp is an official function of the Crockett County 4-H

Field & Stream Program and, like a similar camp held in Kerr County each summer, is a project of the TGWA. Thanks to the Game Warden Association and its contributors and supporters, there is no charge to the kids for this weekend of fun and education.

Local contributors for this occasion were J. Cleo Thompson, Cecil Buckner of Texaco, Inc., David Pagan of Circle Bar Pit Stop, David Gunn of The Pecos River Crossing Store, Arthur Franco, and Jeffery Sutton.

Adults participating in the camp were W. D. Haire, Dee Keilers, Bob Harris, James Montgomery, Brent Pool, Randy Wilson, Dennis Clark, Devin Rhea, Jay Haire, Dr. Tom Behr of Del Rio, County Agents Billy Reager and Mike Barker (Marfa), TPWD Biologist Mary Humphreys of Sonora, TPWD Asst. Hunter Education Coordinator Terry Erwin from Austin, and Texas Game Wardens Robert Newman (Marfa) and Rod Chalmers. As usual, cooking chores were handled by Crockett County Deputy Harvey Hill, and as usual, everybody gained weight.

The camp will be offered annually for area youth and is projected for the second weekend in June next summer. Adults needing to take a course before this hunting season should contact Rod Chalmers (392-3972) or W. D. Haire (392-2148) before Sept. 1.

Local enumerator part of national agriculture survey

Although some of us may have trouble getting from "here" to "there," Diane Garner of Fort Stockton has no problem finding her way as she travels the back country roads with only a stock tank or windmill as a landmark. In fact, the less travelled highways and byways of Texas provide many of the short cuts Garner needs as part of her job as a field enumerator with the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

Beginning June 1, Garner will once again fill up the gas tank and log many travel miles, as she begins interviewing farmers and ranchers in Crockett County for a national agricultural survey. 1990 may be the year to count people, but Garner is going to be busy counting livestock and collecting data on crop acres.

Information gathered on this confidential survey will be used to make state and national estimates of crop acres, livestock inventories and grain stocks, information that is vitally important to the producers in Crockett County, Garner noted.

"These estimates are a working tool farmers and ranchers can use in their production, marketing and investment decisions and are the only unbiased information source available," state statistician Dennis Findley reported.

Survey information will be extremely important this year in meas-

uring crop and livestock losses from the severe flooding across north and east Texas.

Field enumerators provide a basic link in the data collecting service of the Texas office, since they are the primary personal contact Texas producers have with the agency. Currently there are over 100 field enumerators working on farm and ranch surveys across the state.

Most of the enumerators have an agricultural background and are familiar with the many day-to-day problems facing Texas producers. "Like the farmers and ranchers they are interviewing, our enumerators also deal with low prices and severe weather conditions at harvest and mother cows that wait until 3:00 a.m. to calve," Findley added.

The June Agricultural Survey is the largest of a series of surveys conducted throughout the year by the Texas office. The random sample of producers selected for this survey represent a broad cross-section of Texas agriculture, and producers selected for this survey represent other operators of similar size and type.

"Our field enumerators will be putting in some long hours during the next two weeks," Findley reported, "but their hard work is the only way to provide Texas producers with accurate, reliable agricultural information."

County 4-H fashion show set Monday

Battered women not so different

Much of the research on battered women has been aimed at discovering how they differ from the norm. There are indications, however, that the physical, behavioral and emotional responses to battering may be a normative response to stress and perceived loss, similar to that experienced by women contemplating divorce. This leads to the conclusion that a more appropriate comparison sample for battered women might be women also considering ending a marital or significant intimate relationship.

This information is included in a Fall 1989 review from the Coalition Report, newsletter of the National Coalition for Women's Mental Health.

The information, provided by Wilma Y. Igwe, program director of the Institute of Cognitive Development Inc. Family Shelter of San Angelo, goes on to say that the study compared the responses of battered

women with those of other women having serious problems in an intimate relationship. One of the most striking findings of this research was the similarity of responses between battered and non-battered women who were also in problematic intimate relationships. The two groups were similar on the majority of variables, including self-esteem, self-care, self-blame, depression, and control in the relationship.

Both groups scored significantly below normative groups in self-esteem. The battered women had more frequent and severe physical symptoms of stress and grief and had thought of or tried more solutions to the relationship problems.

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

board meeting of May 9, 1990. The motion carried.

Concerning ambulance business, Dr. Sims, ambulance medical director, told the board that a patient loading and unloading training session had been conducted. Doug Meador, ambulance coordinator, again stressed the need for more beepers. He also reported that the cost to erect a building to house the ambulances would be approximately \$30 to 35,000.00. John L. Henderson suggested it might be possible to add another bay to an existing building at the fire department. The board asked John L. and Bob Falkner to research the situation and report back next month.

Cecil Buckner made a motion, seconded by Concha Zapata, to pay both the hospital and care center bills. The motion carried.

The hospital financial data and statistics were discussed.

Fred Deaton made a motion, seconded by John Daniels, to adopt the education assistance policy, to limit the number of students to two per year, and to limit the assistance to \$300.00 per month per student. The motion carried. Concha Zapata was appointed as chairperson of the screening committee and was instructed to select two or three more committee members. The hospital and care center administrators will attend the committee meetings.

Fred Deaton made a motion, seconded by Concha Zapata, to purchase six new Shenwa Two-Tone beepers with chargers from John L. Henderson at a cost of \$325.00 each. Three are to be paid for out of the ambulance budget, two from the hospital budget, and one from the care center budget. The motion carried.

The board was informed that the commissioners court had let the bid for replacing the water lines under the care center and that the bid requested a quote for plastic pipe rather than copper.

After a review of cost versus revenue, the board tabled until next board meeting any further discussion on whether to return to the Medicare program.

Cecil Buckner made a motion, seconded by John Daniels, to leave the hospital dietary department as it is. The motion carried.

The possibility of a random drug testing policy was presented at the meeting, but the board expressed no interest.

The board was informed that the commissioners court did not want to change the cost the jail is paying for meals in the middle of a budget cycle.

John Daniels reported that the free hospital furniture that he was offered was not much better than what is now in the hospital. He will, however, be able to get some over-bed tables that are in good condition.

Fred Deaton made a motion, seconded by John Daniels, to present to the commissioners court a list of possible changes to the county wide

personnel policy which was developed by the committee appointed to review the policy. The motion carried.

Concha Zapata made a motion, seconded by John Daniels, to purchase an Intellect 250P ultra sound unit for \$2,000.00 from Hitech Companies and to pay for it by voucher, thereby saving \$150.00. The motion carried.

No additional policies were formulated concerning hospital/care center employees attendance at seminars.

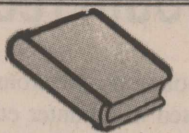

Railroad commission assesses \$3,600 in penalties

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$3,600 in administrative penalties this week to six oil and gas operators for problems under Commission well plugging rules.

Barn-Co Production, Inc. of Levelland was ordered to pay a total of \$1,000 for five inactive and unplugged wells on the Clark lease in Young County; South Plains Petroleum of Brownfield was assessed \$600 for one well on the C. M. Lyons lease in Scurry County; Trilex Energy Corporation of Austin was penalized \$500 for one well on the Davis Heirs Gas Unit lease in Wharton County; Jatt Petroleum, Inc. of Crane was

ordered to pay \$500 for one well on the Heagy-Myrick lease in Pecos County; and, Atkinson and Frasier of Abilene was penalized \$500 for one well on the R. B. Weddington "C" lease in Eastland County.

In addition, one operator agreed to pay a penalty without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Deen Drilling Company of Archer City was assessed \$500 for ten unplugged wells on the Cowan and McKinney lease in Archer County.

To date in 1990, the Commission has levied more than \$411,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed a total of \$1,125,000 in such penalties.

Drilling permits show increase

A total of 1,265 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in May, according to RRC Chairman Kent Hance. In April, the total was 1,241. May 1989's total was 1,244.

The May total included 751 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 51 to re-enter existing well bores, 40 to deepen existing holes, 168 to plugback existing holes and 99 for other wells. Operators were also issued 156 amended drilling permits.

In the first five months of 1990, the Commission has issued 6,318

drilling permits, a 14 percent increase from the 5,418 issued during the same period of 1989.

The 1,265 permits issued in May included 600 oil permits, 215 gas permits, 391 oil and gas permits, 24 injection permits, seven disposal permits, and 28 other permits.

Hooper accepts superintendency at Marathon

The administrator is particularly proud of the fact that OJHS has shown a gradual gain on the Stanford Achievement Tests during the past three years.

Hooper came to Ozona from Menard where he had been elementary principal for one year. Prior to that time, he taught vocational agriculture at Goose Creek ISD near Houston.

Not all heroes get the credit they deserve

Take Fort Worth resident W. B. "Spider" Webb. This Texan performed many acts of bravery as a combat pilot during WWII, receiving 27 awards for his service, including the Navy Cross. He was recommended for our highest military award, the Congressional Medal of Honor, following his daring action one summer afternoon in the Pacific. But, the bureaucracy got in the way and the recommendation was never properly reviewed.

I was a combat pilot during that war, and can appreciate Spider's amazing story. I've asked fellow Texan, and World War II aviator, President George Bush to take another look at this case. Here's what happened.

In June of 1944, a 24 year old navy enlisted man who had risen to become an office, Spider Webb, was flying combat missions off the USS Hornet. All the pilots had put in a rough day, flying at least one or two four-hour strikes against Guam. But, late in the day, another strike was ordered, and Ensign Webb volunteered.

Shortly after take-off he spotted a downed pilot, and asked permission to cover the man until help arrived. Descending to 100 feet, he dropped dye packets to assist in the recovery.

As this was taking place Spider glanced up and caught sight of a long line of aircraft, 40 or 50 planes, flying low. He was puzzled because he knew there should be no more strikes that day. The question was answered however, as the planes turned and he saw the big red markings on the sides of the aircraft. He quickly buckled his harness, and made this long remembered radio transmission:

"Any American fighter near Orote Peninsula... I have forty enemy planes surrounded and need a little help."

Then, he launched his one-man attack.

In short order three enemy aircraft were destroyed. Maneuvering behind three more planes, Ensign Webb again opened fire. Only four of his guns were working, but he was able to down two more planes, despite hot pursuit from the enemy and intense anti-aircraft fire from the ground.

Now his guns had quit completely, so Spider headed out of the fight. But, by pumping his chargers, four guns regained life and he banked around to get another enemy plane. Again, his guns quit. Again, he pumped his chargers. This time only two guns kicked in, but he was able to fire on two more planes before he headed back to the Hornet.

Ensign Webb managed to land his F6F fighter even though his landing gear had been destroyed, his canopy had been shot off, and his goggles had been shot off his helmet. There were 147 bullet holes in his plane, but Spider was unscathed. The craft was rolled off the Hornet and buried at sea.

For this action, admiral Mark Mitscher recommended Ensign Spider Webb for the Medal of Honor, saying he "destroyed six dive bombers in a single fight, and probably destroyed two others." But somewhere up the chain of command that recommendation was rewritten and the fact that he single-handedly attacked 40 enemy planes was left out.

I have urged the President to re-examine what happened in 1944 and determine whether an injustice was done that can now be corrected. Surely anyone who would risk his life in this way to defend his country deserves a thorough and careful review of his heroic conduct.

Any way you look at it, Ensign Spider Webb is a true American hero, someone we Texans can be proud of.

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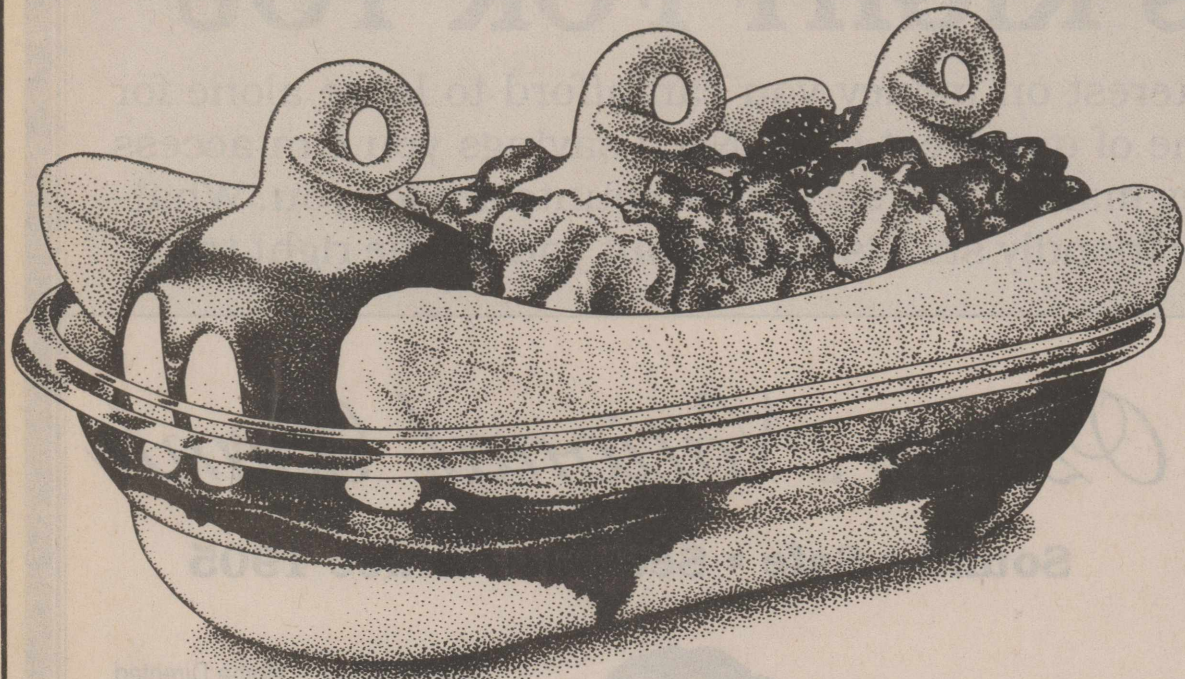
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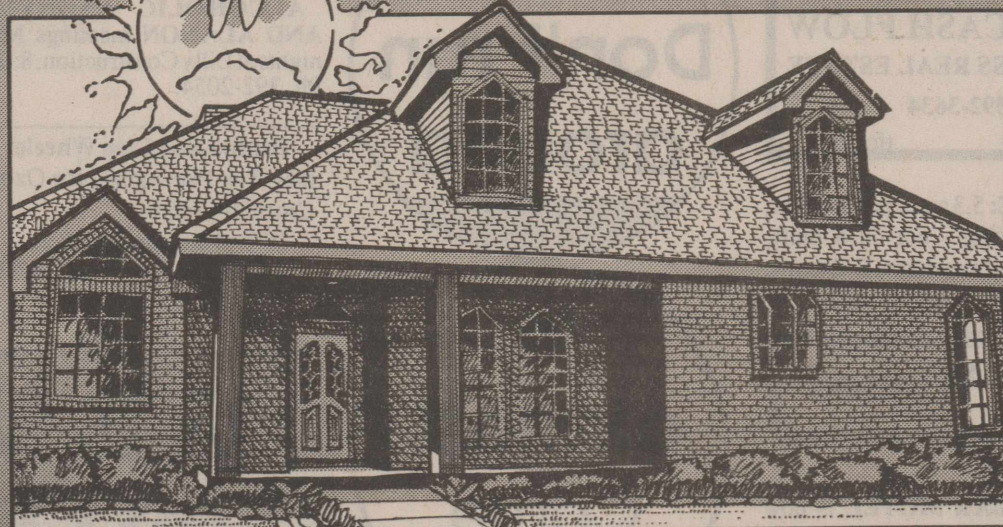
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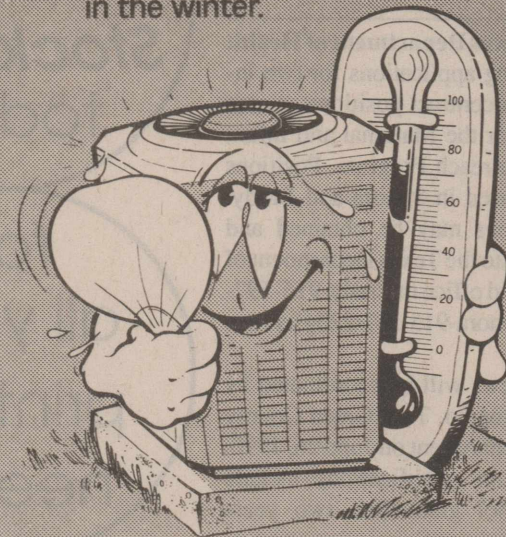
