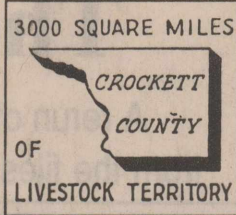

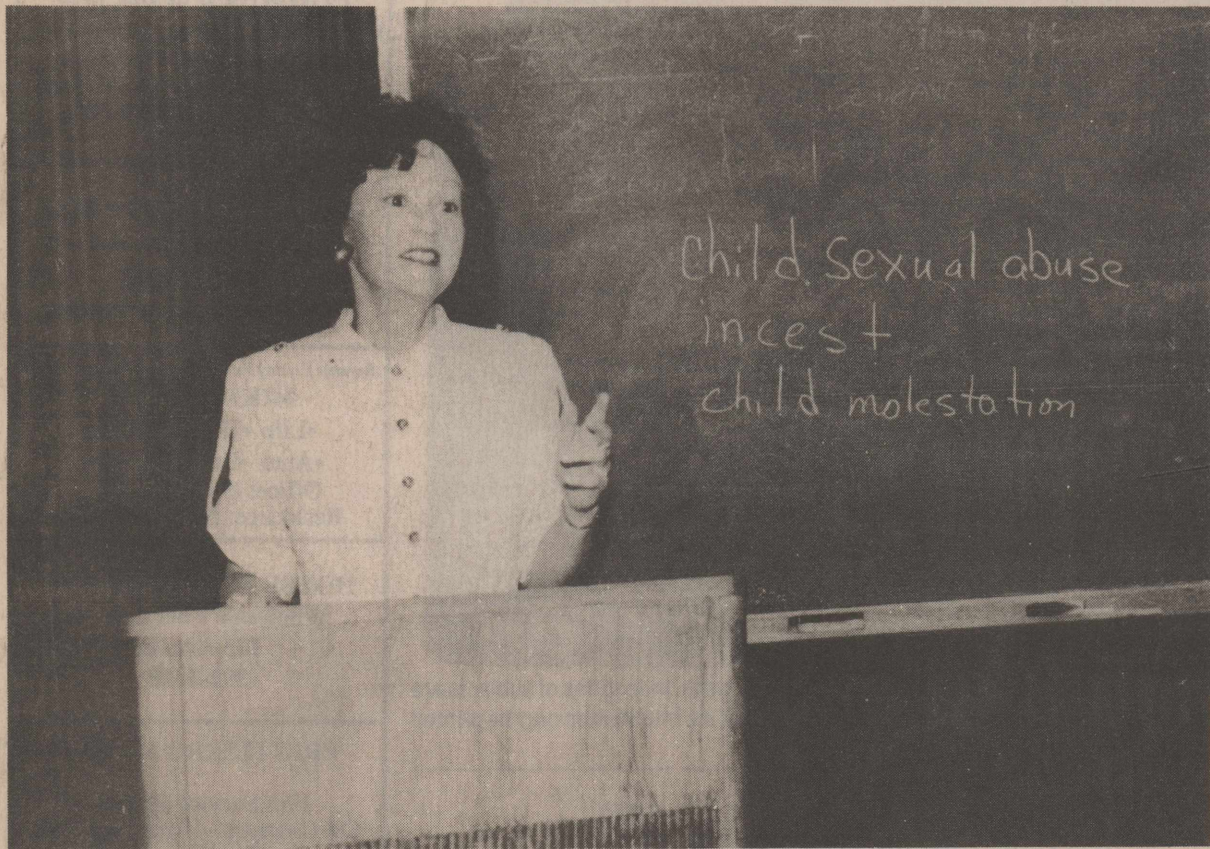

Hospital and Care Center scholarship program

A scholarship program sponsored by Crockett County Hospital and Care Center enables two local people to further their educations in the health care field. A financial assistance policy developed by the board is designed to help maintain an adequate number of licensed hospital and care center personnel.

Health care professionals needed locally are registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, laboratory and radiology technicians according to Bill Boswell, hospital administrator.

Board member Concha Zapata heads the scholarship selection committee. Mrs. Zapata has a list of ac-

credited schools and applications available for interested persons.

In order to be considered for the scholarship program, the prospective student must have been officially accepted into the program of his or her choice prior to applying for assistance. Boswell or Mrs. Doris Hull, care center administrator, will help anyone in need of assistance with admissions paper work.

Prospective scholarship recipients must meet with and participate in an interview with the selection committee. Following the interview, the committee will make a written recommendation to the board.

Once the applicant is selected, he or she will be required to sign a contract with the hospital or care center to work for a specified time period after graduation, sign a promissory note for the amount of the financial assistance agreed upon, and provide proof of academic success periodically during the training period.

If a student does not complete education requirements for any reason not acceptable by the board of directors, the student must repay all monetary aid received to that date.

Macias assigned to Ozona DPS unit

New Department of Public Safety Trooper Ben Macias has been assigned to the Ozona unit effective March 1.

Macias, who is married to the former Leticia Guerra of Ozona, was a

jailer for Crockett County Sheriff's Department when he applied for admission to the DPS Academy.

Following a stringent 22-week training period at the academy in Austin, Macias returned to Ozona to

complete the mandatory six-month probationary period.

"The DPS tries to place recruits as close to home as possible," explained Macias who has served his probationary period with Trooper Richard Barton as his partner.

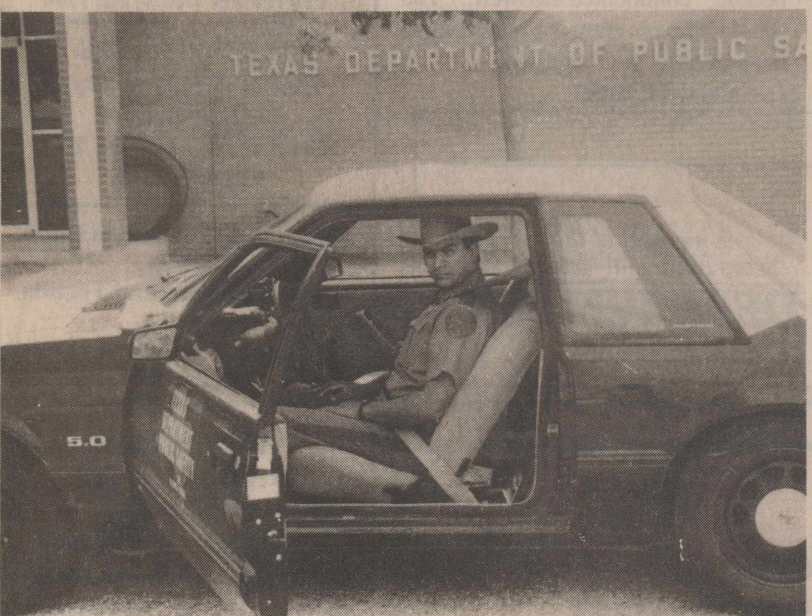
The student's day begins at 5 a.m. and includes two daily sessions of running and calisthenics, training in self-defense and firearms along with classroom work, said Macias. Trainees study such subjects as penal code, criminal code of procedure, traffic law, and driver's license law.

Discipline at the academy is very strict according to Macias. "The DPS prides itself on discipline.

"The instructors push you to the limit and more." Macias' class began with 139 members and graduated 96 troopers.

Becoming a DPS trooper has been a goal of the Richmond native since high school. He attended Angelo State University where he earned the number of hours required to apply for admission to the DPS Academy.

Ozona woman jailed on murder charge

22-year old Sylvia Villarreal Palacio of Ozona was arrested Tuesday, June 22, at her residence after the 112th District grand jury brought down an indictment charging the woman with murder in the death of her 2-year-old daughter, Juanita Palacio, Dec. 5.

Crockett County Sheriff Jim Willson reported that the mother

brought the child to the hospital where she died under suspicious circumstances, and an investigation was initiated by his office and Child Protective Services of San Angelo, with assistance from the Texas Rangers.

The woman remains jailed in San Angelo after she was unable to post \$25,000 bond set by Crockett County Justice of the Peace Christine Davee.

Court resumes fairground maintenance

Commissioners voted Monday to continue maintaining the fairgrounds as in the past until an agreement which will protect the taxpayers' interest can be reached with the Crockett County Fair Association. The vote paves the way for the 36th annual Lions Club Youth Rodeo scheduled for early August.

Crockett County ceased paying the utility bills and stopped all work at the fairgrounds in late March as the result of a telephone conversation between Auditor Sandy Stokes and District Attorney J. W. Johnson.

Stokes told the court he has paid the outstanding utility bills after District Judge Brock Jones on June 12 authorized payment until a contract could be worked out.

Consideration of a 25-year lease agreement offered by the fair association was tabled Monday until county officials could talk with association members about some of their concerns.

"J. W. says this lease still doesn't protect our interests," commented Judge Kathryn Mayfield.

At the June 25 meeting, court members approved sending Bill Boswell and Sharman West of Crockett County Hospital to an indigent care workshop Aug. 15-17 in Austin.

The court voted to appoint Martha Gries to the hospital board as a replacement for Beth Smith who recently resigned.

Proposed rules for swimming pool managers were also approved by the court.

Bids were opened and tabulated for the sale of a variety of county equip-

ment.

Kenro Plumbing of San Angelo was the sole bidder on a plumbing project for Crockett County Care Center. Commissioners voted to reject the bid, clarify specifications for the project and request bids a second time. The specifications were changed to require L-grade copper rather than CVPC pipe.

During a discussion of non-agenda items, water district president Dan Davidson asked the court for information on the status of the dump. The district needs a new trash truck and wants to be sure the truck will work with whatever trash disposal system the county selects, Davidson said.

Earlier this month the court hired Gary Harris of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper Inc. to do a professional engineering study of the county's solid waste management problem.

If Crockett County decides to go with a new landfill, the permitting process will require two years, Mayfield said. Two offers of land sites have been withdrawn and tentative offers by other landowners were never formalized according to Commissioner Jim House.

Harris is expected to complete in 30-60 days a feasibility study which considers landfill, transfer station or incinerator as methods of trash disposal for Crockett County.

Judge Mayfield told Davidson she will keep the district updated on the waste disposal problem.

Commissioners went into executive session to discuss personnel. No action was taken when they returned to regular session.

Child sexual abuse seminar held in Ozona

Jane D. Bingham, Tarrant County Junior College MICSAIT coordinator, talked about the overview of child sexual abuse and family dynamics in incest cases during a three-day seminar in Ozona last week. Ms. Bingham also spoke on child protection assessment.

Sheriff Jim Wilson spoke on focusing on investigation procedures of law enforcement.

Interviewing the victim of child sexual abuse was the topic presented by Linn Munkerud of the Rape Crisis Center of Abilene.

John Brogden, supervisor of the Texas Department of Human Services in Fort Worth, talked about investigation strategy in child sexual

abuse cases. Criminal court procedures were discussed by Donnie Coleman, assistant district attorney of Kimble County.

Michael Strain - MSSW, private practice, of Fort Worth, talked about treatment referrals and modalities and the role of probation/parole in child sexual abuse cases.

Representatives from Eden, Menard, Big Lake, Ozona, Pecos County, Sonora and San Angelo child welfare boards, law enforcement officers, district and county judges, attorneys, clergymen and Texas Department of Human Services were in attendance at the sessions held from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

education program must agree to work for the hospital/care center for two years. Those completing a two-year program of study must agree to work for three years.

In addition to the local scholarships, information is also available through the hospital for application to the Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition and Forgiveness Loan program authorized by the 71st Legisla-

ture and administered by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

"The board of Crockett County Hospital and Care Center and county commissioners are to be commended for their forward thinking in making these scholarships available to local people," commented Boswell. "The scholarship program is a good way to keep people in Ozona who want to live and work here."

Although I was treated with the utmost respect, I don't feel the teenager was. She was talked to in a very loud, authoritative voice as if she had committed a horrible act. It seems she had honked her horn several times in succession. I'm not sure why she was treated this way, but maybe it was because it happened by the Sergeant's home, and it was about 10:30 at night, but I'm still not sure that is a good reason to treat someone the way this young person was treated.

My husband and thirteen-year-old daughter were witnesses to this incident and also agreed that the teenager was not treated with respect. My daughter even commented that that was why young people hate policemen. We tried to explain that the law says that citizens should keep their cars in good working condition, and horns are not to be used except for emergencies. Both of these laws are for the safety of the people, but all my daughter could see was the discrepancy between how the adult was treated and how the teenager was treated.

I know young people can be very rude and abusive, but this young person was not. Maybe other instances that I am not aware of led up to his officer's behavior, but it seemed quite inappropriate to me. I know that law enforcement officers deserve the utmost respect, but respect cannot be demanded. It must be commanded.

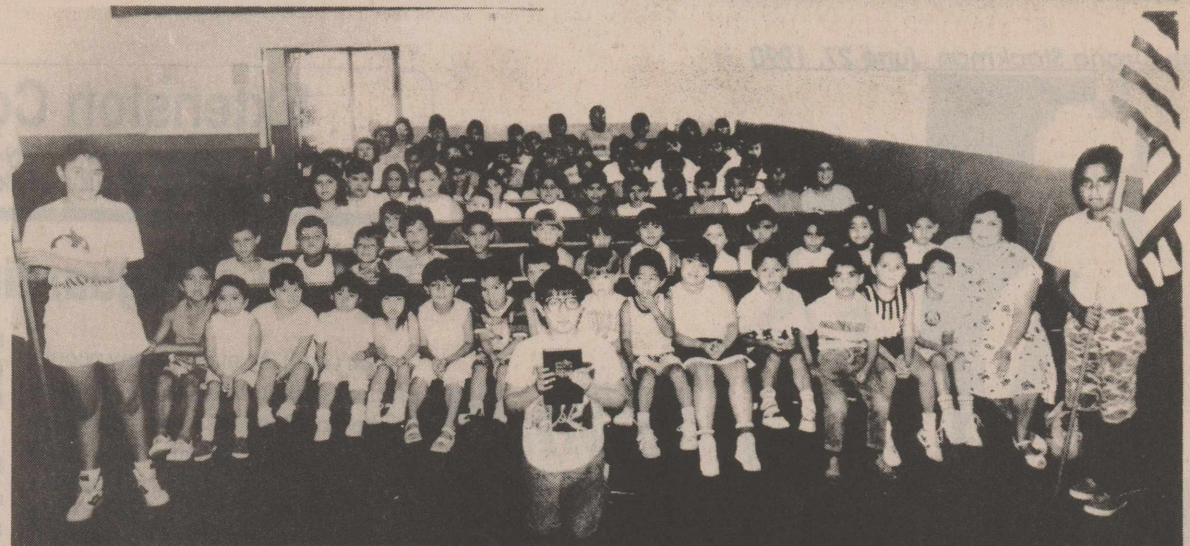

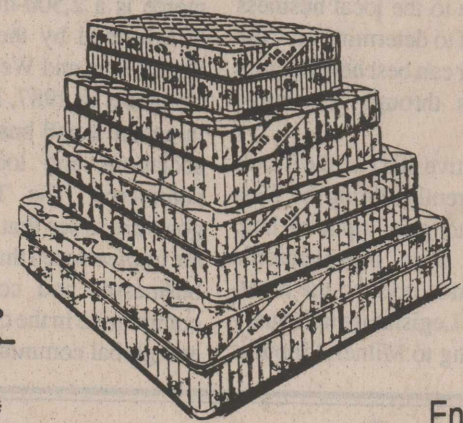
There is no entry fee - all pies will be donated to the club for their "Pie by the Slice" booth, and funds raised

Tips on safeguarding picnic foods

Don't hold the mayo! Many people are uneasy about eating chicken salad, potato salad and similar dishes at summer picnics because they have heard that foods made with mayonnaise are the most likely to cause food poisoning.

Scientists have shown that adding mayonnaise to food does not make it more dangerous. Food containing mayonnaise may actually be slightly safer than similar foods without mayonnaise because the acid in the mayonnaise slows the growth of the bacteria that cause food poisoning. However, studies have shown that the acid content of "homemade" mayonnaise may be too low to create comparable protection.

Mixed foods like chicken salad and potato salad probably got their bad reputation simply because they undergo a lot of handling during preparation, and this can contaminate them with bacteria.

When the pleasures of a leisurely picnic are spoiled by a bout of food poisoning, sick picnickers are often quick to blame the food. Seldom do they realize that the cause of sickness is more often the handling of the food rather than the food itself.

To play it safe, follow these tips:
-Scrub hands before starting food preparation and between steps.

-After using knives and other utensils on raw meats, eggs, fish and poultry, clean thoroughly, especially before using on other foods. Failure to clean is one way to spread harmful bacteria.

-Thoroughly scrub work surfaces after raw meats are cut or where raw meat juices have dripped.

-Use clean sponges, dish cloths and rubber gloves; over-used ones can spread germs.

-Refrigerate cooked foods such as chicken, potatoes and ham as soon as they stop steaming. Cooling foods to room temperature before refrigerating encourages bacterial growth. Perishable foods may not be safe to eat if they have been held at room

temperatures of 60 degrees Fahrenheit or higher for more than three or four hours.

-Refrigerator chill all perishable food before packing. Keep them in a cooler with ice or commercial reusable cold packs until you are ready to eat. If you use ice, pack the food in tight containers or plastic bags so that it doesn't get wet when the ice starts to melt. Transport to picnic in insulated containers.

-Hamburgers or other raw meat should go into the cooler, but keep them separate from other foods. Uncooked meats contain relatively large numbers of bacteria, some of which could be harmful. The common food poisoning types of bacteria are sensitive to heat, so cooking will kill them, making the meat safe to eat. These bacteria can cause problems, however, if they contaminate other foods such as salads which don't receive further cooking before they are eaten.

-And don't hold the mayo. Add it to salad and sandwich mixtures during initial preparation.

-At picnics, keep food out of direct sun. To reduce traffic in and out of picnic hamper, pack food to be eaten first at the top of container.

-Don't be tempted to carry leftovers home. It is safer to discard perishables.

Emergency farm loan applications being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by natural disaster are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Eden, FmHA County Supervisor Ben Rucker said.

Crockett County is one of 16 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the severe storms, flooding, and tornadoes.

Ben Rucker said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Mr. Rucker said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs

will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Feb. 8, 1991 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Rucker said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. Citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Eden is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The FmHA office day for Crockett County is the 4th Thursday of every month from 10:00 a.m. til 12:00 p.m.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.
