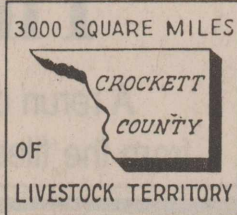

Court begins work on budget

Preliminary work on a county budget for 1991 begins this month. A mid-year financial report by County Auditor Sandy Stokes at commissioners' court Monday forecasts a \$400,000 drop in the end of year balance compared to 1989. "If we keep going this way, in about two years we'll be down to the nub," Stokes warned the court.

Cash balance at mid-year was 2.1 million, Stokes said. The balance is expected to be 1.2 million at the end of 1990 compared to 1.6 million in 1989.

Hospital administrator Bill Boswell appeared with bills for court approval. The hospital board's July 5 meeting was not held for lack of a quorum.

Road supervisor Eddie Moore told the court that maintenance of road equipment is lagging because of additional work his mechanic does maintaining equipment for other departments.

The problem is probably temporary because the road department is involved in heavy construction now, he said.

Court members and Onecimo Ortiz, parks supervisor, agreed to use a parks employee as an additional mechanic to relieve the situation.

Heavy construction on Shannon Ranch was to be completed Monday. Asphalt will be applied there before the road crew goes on to repair damaged pavement in other parts of the county. Work is expected to begin on Taylor Box Road Aug. 1, Moore said.

Low water pressure at the cemetery is creating a problem for Ortiz and his crew. Watering there must be done early in the day before townspeople begin watering, he said.

Pressure testing, a pressure booster and a reservoir were discussed as possible solutions.

Louise Ledoux presented the court with a copy of the public library's 1991 operating budget and a list of goals and objectives.

The summer reading programs for children have received good response, she reported.

Meals on Wheels served 357 lunches in June and distributed commodities to 76 families (158 people). The program is in danger of closing because of lack of funds, said Commissioner Janet Hill. One means of continuing would be to have food prepared at the hospital.

When asked what he thought about that, Boswell replied, "that would be great".

During his report, civic and youth center director Garland Young advised that the mid-summer dance was moved to July 27 because of the availability of Dr. Toons.

The board accepted the resignation of Cathy Landon at its last meeting, Young said.

The number of prisoners in Crockett County Jail decreased to 11 as of Monday according to Sheriff Jim Wilson. There were 36 persons placed in the jail during June. Sheriff's Department personnel served 11 civil papers and received 345 calls for assistance in June.

Sharp receives third death sentence

Michael Eugene Sharp, an Odessa man convicted by a Crockett County jury in the 1982 murder of Brenda Kay Broadway of Kermit, is scheduled to die by lethal injection July 18 at Huntsville.

Two previous execution dates have been stayed, and Sharp's attorney, Steven James of El Paso, plans to file a request for another stay of execution this week.

James, who believes a federal court will review the claims, plans to appeal for a federal review of the case in the 5th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans if the stay is not granted. If unsuccessful there, he plans to

appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Ms. Broadway and her two daughters, Christie Michelle and Selena Kay Elms, were abducted from a Kermit carwash on June 11, 1982. The older girl, Selena, witnessed the murder of her mother and sister, but escaped from Sharp and testified against him in both trials. He is serving a life sentence for the murder of 8-year-old Christie.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals granted a 60-day stay on the first execution date of March 24, 1988, seven days before Sharp was to die. An indefinite stay was granted two days before Sharp was to die on May 10, 1989.

The rodeo arena grandstands were packed on the evening of July 4 when the Sahawe Indian dancers of Uvalde performed. Brightly colored costumes and professionally executed authentic dances from several tribes combined to delight onlookers of all ages.

Sheriff Jim Wilson introduced the elite group of Scout dancers after leading the audience in several patriotic songs.

Tim Brewer, pastor of Ozona United Methodist Church, told the crowd patriotic speeches and fireworks seem to be a necessary part of any Fourth of July celebration and proceeded to deliver the speech.

A generous fireworks display provided by the chamber of commerce was ignited by fire department members to conclude the program.

Moore safe in midst of upheaval

A Fourth of July call from South Africa ended days of worry for Nancy Moore. Details gleaned from several brief calls are sketchy, but she now knows for sure that her husband Ralph is safe after being in the midst of a political upheaval in Zambia's capitol city, Lusaka.

Moore, preacher at Ozona Church of Christ, was traveling through Lusaka with others from the Namwianga Christian Schools in Kalamao at the time of what was first thought to be an attempted take over of the government, Mrs. Moore believes.

Knowledge that there was a problem came when daughter Melissa received a call from her father on June 28 advising that he was all right and was not at the school.

The family received further word that Moore was safe on July 3, but the best news came with a "Happy Fourth of July" call letting them know he was back at the school.

"It is all so muddy," said Nancy of the details of the ordeal. She looks forward to learning all about the experience when he arrives home July 18.

Moore left Ozona June 20 to preach and teach in the Christian school for three weeks.

Five sentenced in district court

Five persons were sentenced last week in Judge Brock Jones' 112th district court.

Martin Martinez Jacabo received a 10 year sentence to the Texas Department of Corrections, probated, and was fined \$5,000 plus court costs and costs of a court appointed attorney on a charge of burglary of a habitation.

Amadao Perez Hernandez, charged with driving while intoxicated/felony,

was sentenced to five years T.D.C., 60 days shock probation and fined \$1,000 plus court costs.

Randy Dale Conly was sentenced to five years T.D.C., probated, and fined \$5,000 plus court costs. He had been charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

Roberto Yruegas Ybarra, charged

with arson, was sentenced to 10 years T.D.C., probated, fined \$3,000 and court costs.

Lucio Fierro was sentenced to 10 years T.D.C., deferred adjudication, and ordered to pay restitution of \$2,970.53 to the Texas Department of Human Resources. He was charged with tampering with government records.

Murals emphasize county's western heritage

The first of a series of murals depicting the Old West heritage of Ozona should be in place by late July according to Diane Myers, chamber of commerce president. Jack Feagan of

Ingram has been commissioned to begin the project with a painting of early pioneer settlers.

Sam Perner agreed Friday to allow display of the work on the side of his

building at the intersection of Highways 290 and 163.

Feagan brought a sketch of the first mural planned for Ozona to the chamber office last week along with

sketches and scale models of works he did in Ingram during Kerr County's centennial year. The Ingram project was a chamber member's idea to cover the walls at a newly renovated building with eye-catching scenes from the county's history.

Upon completion, 10 historically accurate murals measuring 12'x12' covered two walls. The last mural prepared for Ingram was a 76'x8' panorama placed on Texas Hwy. 27.

Feagan's western murals are in the Hyatt-Regency on San Antonio's Riverwalk. He, along with two helpers, painted 17 of the 30 larger-than-life murals at Sea World of Texas. He also created or supervised artwork throughout the park. He recently completed a large aquatic mural for the Phoenix airport.

The outdoor works are done with acrylic paint and then covered with ultraviolet inhibitor for protection from the sun, Feagan explained. Each 12'x12' mural takes approximately two weeks to paint.

The Ozona murals are part of the chamber's effort to attract tourist trade to the community. Funding for the project will be through donations. To learn how you may be a contributor, call the chamber office at 392-3066 or write to Box 1135, Ozona, TX 76943.

Teens sought for Rodeo Queen's Contest and Court

Crocket County's teen girls are invited to participate in this year's Rodeo Queen Contest or Queen's Court activities during rodeo week.

Young women from 8th grade through high school are being sought to participate in either the Queen's Contest or as a member of the Queen's Court. The event is sponsored by the Ozona Lions Club.

To participate, anyone interested must contact the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721 by noon on Friday, July 20. Queen contestants must be 14 or older, and the court members must be in the 8th grade or above. All participants must be residents of Crockett County.

Queen's contestants are judged on poise, appearance, public speaking and horsemanship. They must model two western outfits of their choice, and wear long sleeve shirts, western-style pants or dress jeans, a hat and boots for their horsemanship judging.

Court participants model in the "Queen's Gala" on Thursday night before the rodeo. This year's event

will be held at the rodeo arena slab beginning at 8 p.m.

Court members can either wear their own outfit or borrow one from a local store. The Circle Bar Truck Stop Store, Davis Boot and Saddlery, The Teacher Store, Martin's and Small Fashions have all agreed to work with the girls on wardrobe items for the western style show.

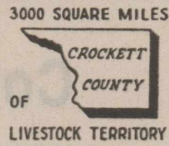
Court members are required to ride on a float in the rodeo parade and to ride on a truck in the grand entry each evening of the rodeo. No horseback riding ability is needed.

House Bill 2566, teacher career ladder bill, ruled unconstitutional

The Texas Supreme Court recently reaffirmed its earlier ruling that declared unconstitutional House Bill 2566, the controversial career ladder bill passed in 1989 by the 71st Texas Legislature.

The ruling means that thousands of Texas teachers now will be paid career ladder money that had been delayed due to school district uncertainty over which law to use when making career ladder decisions.

"The court's decision settles the issue," said Commissioner of Education William Kirby, "and we will be sending school districts a letter recommending that they go ahead and make 1989-90 career ladder decisions based upon the law as it existed prior to House Bill 2566."

The court's ruling was applauded by Carolyn Little, past president of the 50,800-member Association of Texas Professional Educators and a plaintiff in the lawsuit. ATPE originally filed the lawsuit seeking to have HB 2566 declared unconstitutional in July 1989. ATPE maintained in its lawsuit that the version of HB 2566 approved by the 71st Legislature was not the same version signed by the Governor.

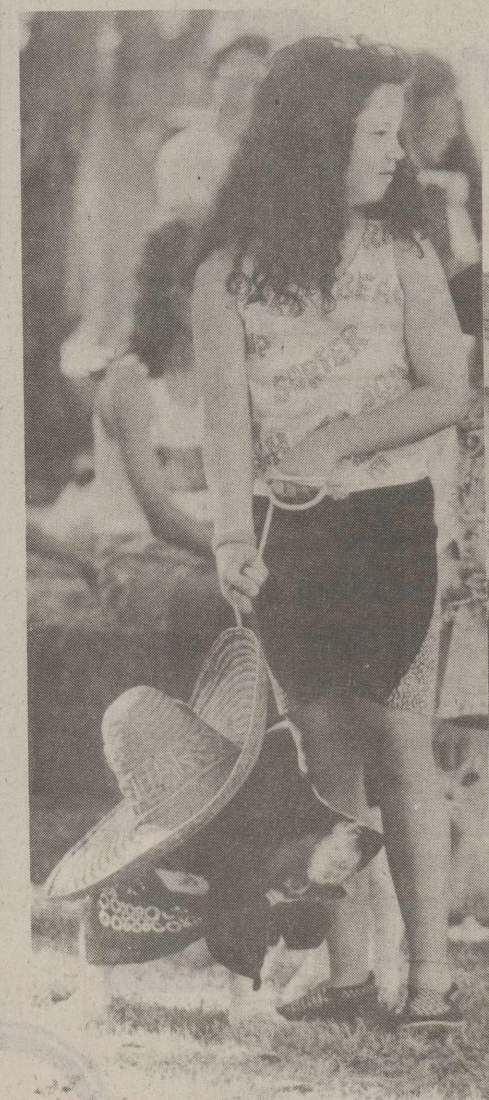

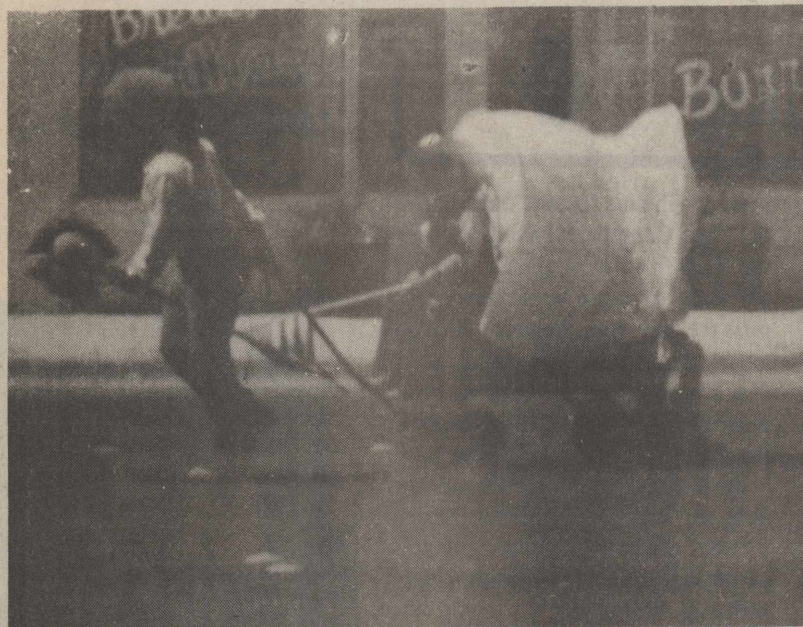

Gramm briefed on Ft. Stockton guayule project

U. S. Senator Phil Gramm was in Fort Stockton June 30 to receive a briefing at the Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment station on efforts to develop a domestic rubber source.

A 500-acre test site at the station 12 miles west of Fort Stockton has been planted in the guayule shrub, which grows wild in the Chihuahuan Desert of the Big Bend and produces high quality natural rubber during the winter months.

Guayule (pronounced why-oo-lee), was investigated by the U. S. government during World War II when the Japanese overran Southeast Asia and cut America's rubber supply. The plant, first used by Indians in Mexico and later discovered by Spanish explorer, was used by Intercontinental Rubber Co. to produce rubber in 1903.

In the early 1900s, guayule provided approximately 50 percent of the nation's rubber supply. As the product demand increased, it became easier and cheaper to buy rubber produced

in tropical climates. After the loss of the supply during World War II, the U. S. government began an intense research program with the planting of 32,000 acres of the shrub in California.

The war ended just before the first crop was to be harvested, and the government plowed or burned all 32,000 acres and filed the research data.

Seed stock which was saved has made continued research possible. Chauncey Benedict, professor of biochemistry and biophysics at Texas A&M, and his research team, have increased the plant's rubber production through stimulating the enzyme that produces rubber in the shrub.

The plant's low-water requirements make West and South Texas ideal for growing guayule. The shrub may eventually compete with synthetic rubber which cannot be used in certain products.

Examples are steelbeltd radial tires which must contain 30 percent natu-

ral rubber and airplane tires which are 100 percent natural rubber.

Commission changes Texas hunting regulations

AUSTIN - Changes in archery deer hunting regulations, modifications to the antlerless permit system and a prohibition of running deer with dogs were among hunting regulations adopted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in late May.

The commission voted unanimously to enact a statewide ban on hunting deer with dogs, a practice which was allowed in 10 East Texas counties during the last half of the 1989-90 hunting season. The ban, along with other hunting regulation changes, will be effective Sept. 1, 1990.

Department officials cited a study showing that deer densities were lower in areas where hunting with dogs was permitted, compared to areas of similar habitat where the practice was prohibited.

The commission also adopted white-tailed deer archery season dates that will not conflict with general season dates, a situation that occurred last year because of calendar variations. This year's archery season will be Oct. 1-31, and the general season is set for Nov. 3, 1990, through Jan. 6, 1991. The whitetail season in South Texas is set for Nov. 10-Jan. 13. The mule deer season for the Panhandle is Nov. 17-Dec. 2, and the Trans-Pecos season is Nov. 24-Dec. 9.

Officials announced a new concept in management of the antlerless deer harvest in all or portions of 14 counties. Informally referred to as "doe days", the system allows the taking of

antlerless deer without landowner issued permits on specified days during the hunting season.

In Gonzales, DeWitt, Wilson, Kames and portions of Guadalupe, Lavaca and Colorado Counties, antlerless deer may be taken only during the first nine days and final nine days of the general season. In Caldwell, Bastrop, Lee, Fayette, Washington, Waller, Austin and portions of Guadalupe, Lavaca and Colorado Counties, antlerless deer may be taken only during the first two days and final two days of the general season. The commission also reduced the buck bag limit from two per season to one in Gonzales, DeWitt, Wilson, Kames and Guadalupe Counties.

The commission authorized a return to the landowner-issued antlerless permit system in eight counties and a portion of a ninth. These are Limestone, Freestone, Anderson, Robertson, Leon, Brazos, Madison, Grimes and the portion of Houston County west of State Highway 19.

In addition to the archery season date change, archers also should be aware that the commission repealed the requirement for having the owner's name inscribed on hunting arrows, and legalized the use of retractable "nunchcutter" style broadheads.

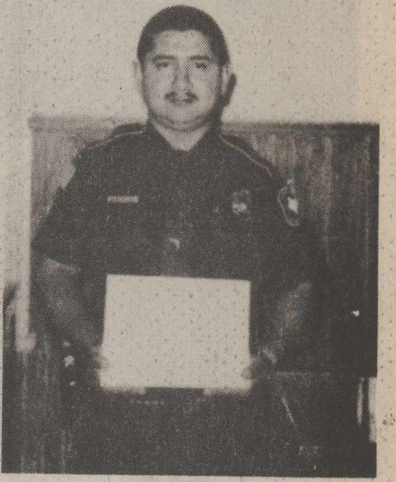

Helping your child learn to read

Learning to read is an important part of childhood. For many children it seems to just come "naturally," while for others it is an ongoing struggle. Parents can help their children acquire reading skills in a number of ways:

- * Let your children see you read so they will have a model to follow.
- * Provide a comfortable, special reading area and a variety of books, newspapers and magazines.
- * Take your children to the library to get library cards, to check out books, and to listen to films and stories. Most libraries will allow children to have library cards as soon as they can write their names.
- * Read store and road signs, package labels and license plates.
- * Reward the child's reading achievement with a trip to the library, the purchase of a new book or praise about how well the child is doing.
- * Write down your child's story as he or she tells it so that it can be seen in print. The child can draw pictures to illustrate the story. Save the story and read and savor it together.
- * Give your kids bookcases (a cardboard carton covered with contact paper will work) where they can store books.
- * Play readers theater (each individual has a part and they read aloud together), act out stories, present puppet shows of favorite books.
- * Give books as birthday and holiday gifts.
- * Show pictures and ask what might happen next; being able to predict what will happen next is an important reading skill.
- * Read to your children every day. Sometimes let them choose the books. Read your old favorites or those that teachers or librarians recommend. Once your child can read on his own, you need to continue reading at a higher level.

- * Talk about the books you read together. Ask questions about the story: Where did the story take place? Which of the characters are you most like and why? What happened first, second, last? Why did you like this story? How does it make you feel? Think of a question to ask me about the book.

The single most important activity that parents can do to assist their children in reading is to read to them throughout childhood and especially, during preschool years.

The benefits are greatest if the child is an active participant, engages in discussions about stories, identifies letters and words and discusses the meanings of words.

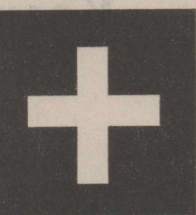
