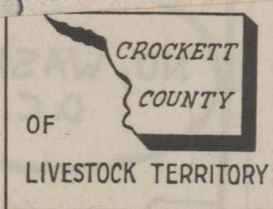

AMAX to acquire Ladd Petroleum from GE

AMAX Inc. announced Nov. 14, that its subsidiary, AMAX Oil & Gas Inc., had agreed to acquire the capital stock of Ladd Petroleum Corporation, a unit of General Electric Company, for a purchase price of approximately \$515 million plus net working capital. Closing is expected to occur before the end of 1990.

Ladd Petroleum is engaged in the production, exploration and development of oil and natural gas in many of the major producing areas in the United States and Canada. The company owns interests in approximately 650 miles of pipelines and gathering systems, and six gas processing plants, four of which are 100 percent owned and operated. It markets approximately 275 million cubic feet per day of natural gas.

Ladd's total proven and probable reserves are estimated at 500 billion cubic feet equivalent (BCFE). Proved reserves are 80 percent developed. Of the total reserves evaluated, 80 per-

cent are proved and 77 percent represent gas and gas liquids. Reserves are located predominantly in fields with long lives and well established production histories.

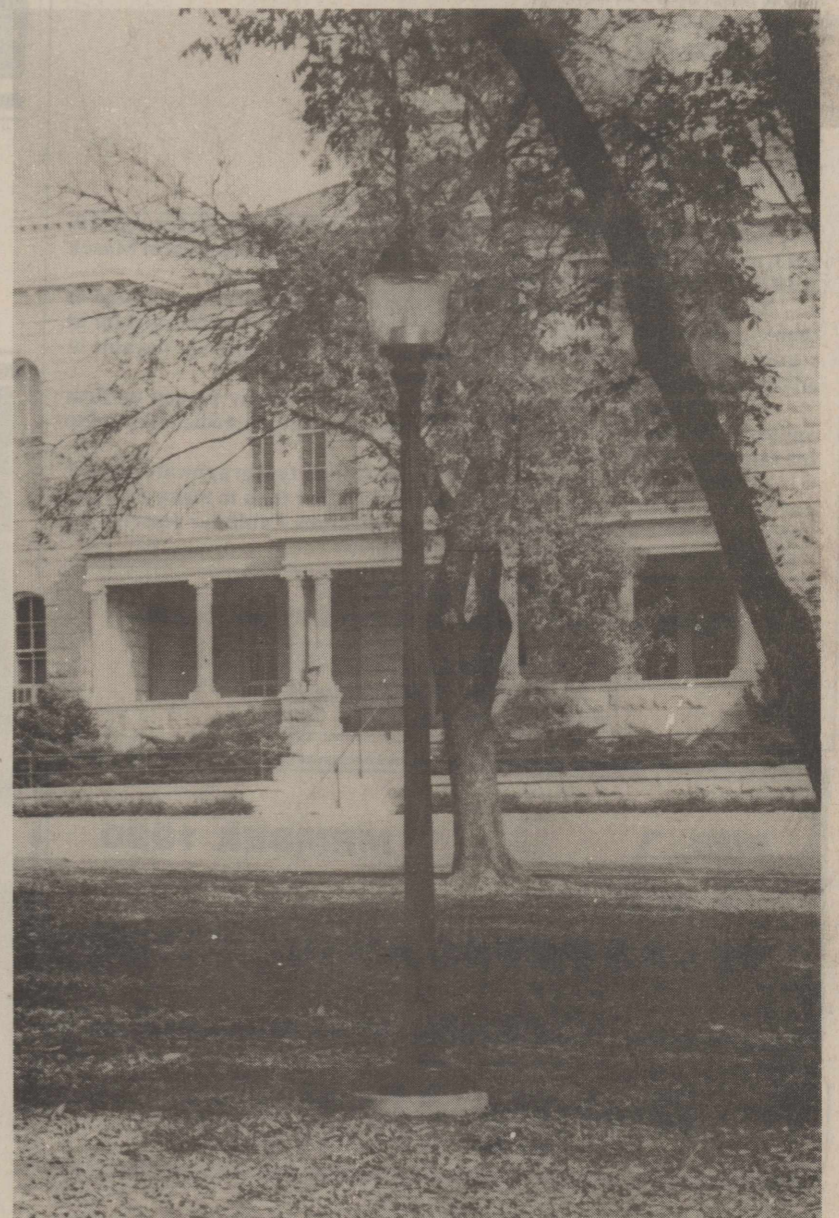
Commenting on the proposed acquisition, Allen Born, AMAX Chairman, Chief Executive Officer and President, said, "Ladd Petroleum's assets and operations are a very good strategic fit with AMAX. The majority of Ladd's major properties and

assets are in the Gulf Coast, Texas and Oklahoma, areas where AMAX's present properties are concentrated. The combined synergies of Ladd's and AMAX's operations and marketing will give us a major position in the natural gas marketplace of the 1990s.

"The acquisition is in keeping with our long-stated strategy of building AMAX's domestic natural gas business. It will increase our reserve base to approximately one trillion

cubic feet equivalent (TCFE) of domestic natural gas reserves, contribute immediately to current performance, and position us well for the opportunities ahead."

AMAX Oil & Gas Inc., headquartered in Houston, is a wholly owned subsidiary of AMAX Inc. It presently has interests in more than 1,500 natural gas wells and reserves of approximately 500 billion cubic feet equivalent.

Board accepts vehicle bids

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, Nov. 13, approved a bid from Mustang Chevrolet for the purchase of a twelve-passenger school van and a bid from Glasscock Chevrolet for a school automobile. Bids on both vehicles were also received from Lynn Alexander Motor Company, Cecil Atkisson Chevrolet, Jim Bass Ford, Iraan Motors, and Randall Motors.

Board members considered bids on the remodeling of the high school welding building, but they voted to reject all bids on the project. A budget amendment for district expenses incurred for the regional and state band marching contests was approved by the trustees, and the board also approved the purchase of computers and monitors for a computer laboratory in Ozona Junior High School.

Superintendent Jim Payne presented reports on the district's preliminary plan to conduct a Read-Aloud program for three-year old children, as well as a plan to offer a Scholastic Aptitude Test preparation program for high school students who want to begin planning for enrollment in college.

Due to the many basketball activities that will be held next month, the trustees discussed alternate meeting dates for their December meeting, and this date was set for Thursday, December 13.

DeHoyos serves aboard USS Vandergrift

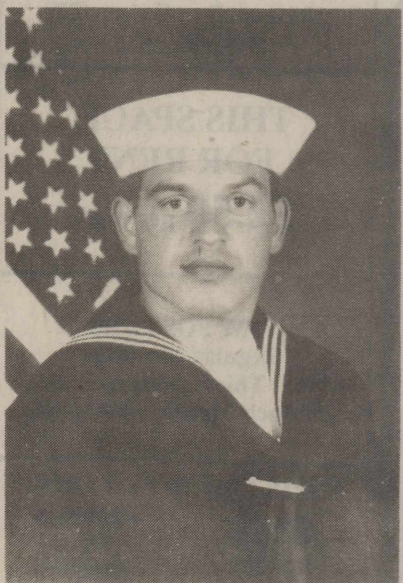
Navy Petty Officer Third Class Rico F. DeHoyos is a 1978 graduate of Ozona High School and currently serves with the United States Navy aboard the USS Vandergrift FFG-48. The guided missile frigate USS Vandergrift was deployed in the Middle East in support of Operation Desert Shield beginning in June of 1990 and

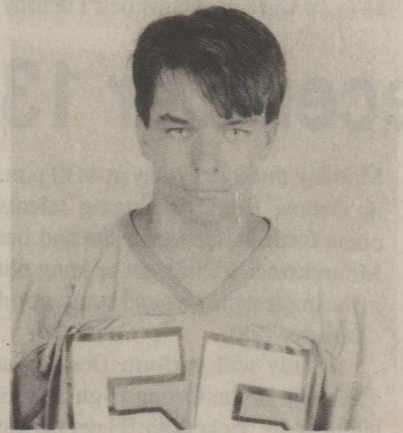
Honorable mention recognition on

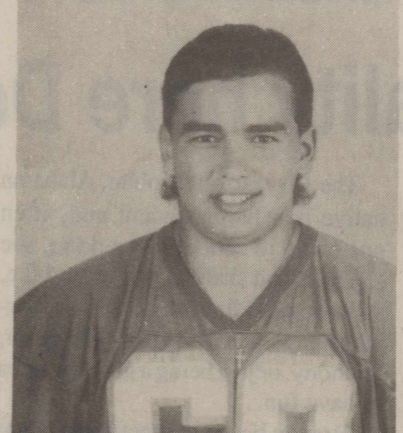
Randel Wilson, defensive end.

Wall placed 10 players on the first team and eight on the second team. Iraan had six players named to the first team and three to the second team. Coahoma's first team all district

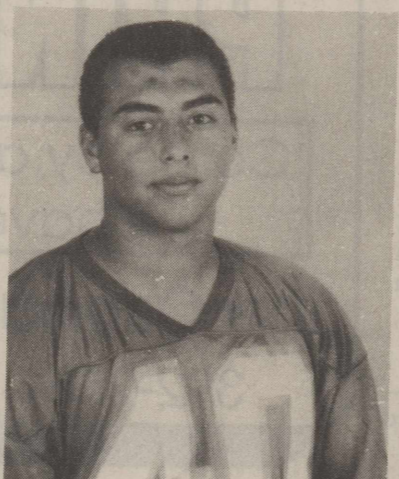

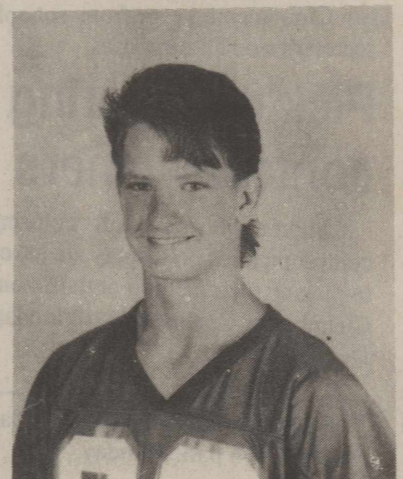

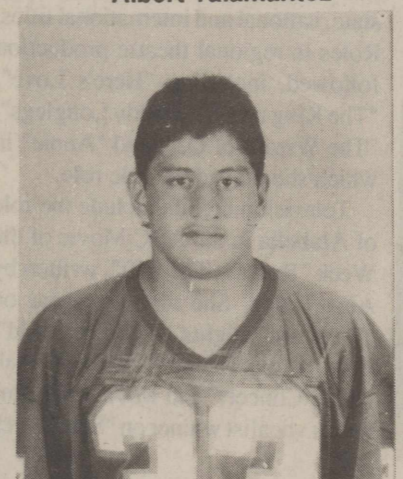

TIPS TO CLIP

"Helpful Hint From the Cookie Jar"
Correct techniques and ingredients can make a great deal of difference in a finished product, particularly when baking those holiday cut-out cookies.

"Creaming" the sugar and butter properly will result in the desired light, tender texture. The crystals of sugar (shaped, appropriately enough, like little snowflakes) catch bits of butter when thoroughly creamed together. During baking the crystals melt, leaving tiny air pockets and a fine, light cookie results. This chemical change is eliminated if creaming is incomplete, and a heavier product results.



Use chilled butter, cut into smaller pieces for easy creaming. Presoftening will usually necessitate additional flour for ease in handling the dough and cause a less tender cookie.

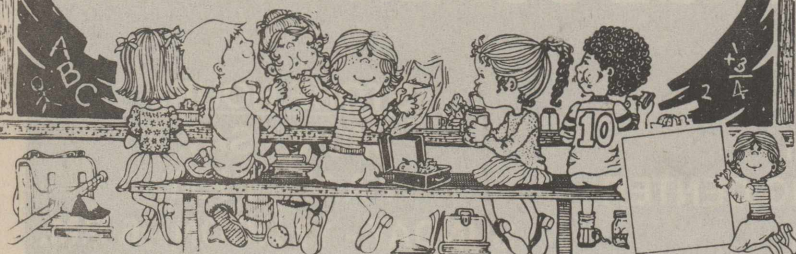

A Preacher's Pondering

Old Age

Many older people have endured hardships of one kind or another to get where they are today. The younger generation can learn many lessons from the older folks. The advise and productivity of the aged should be sought and encouraged.

Billy Mills told me about an old man who had all the answers, but no one ever asked him any questions. I think that there is a bit of truth in that. You know it is tragic, in a sense, that while many older folks have the experience and expertise - the younger generation hunt and scratch for the answers in the wrong places. Too bad that our youthful society has neglected the wisdom of the aged.

Some societies, the Orientals for instance, value the aged. There was a time, years ago, when American culture appreciated the elderly more. The dominance of youth has taken away a very precious resource in neglecting, or ignoring, the older generation.

Scripture mandates respect for the elderly: "Rise up in the presence of the aged, show respect for the elderly and revere your God..." (Lev. 19:32). Job said, "Is not wisdom found among the aged? Does not long life bring understanding?" (Job 12:12). The gray-headed are on our side (Job 15:10).

I notice that many churches have more elderly people than young folks. While that is a sad commentary on our times, it is not fatal because it is the elderly who are wiser. The aged have a tendency to trust God rather than themselves. It takes years to learn

that. Think about it.

"When God speaks..." our opinion or our interpretation being mixed up in them that will "make the church known." Jesus' identity was revealed by His speaking and by His actions, and the people knew this was the Messiah.

If we speak only the words of God and His doctrine unadulterated, He will reveal her...

"Now they have known that all things whatsoever thou has given me are of thee...and they have received them, and have known surely that I came out from thee, and they have believed that thou didst send me." John 17: 7, 8.

When Jesus was on this earth, He glorified the Father through the completion of His mission by humble obedience. He finished the work the Father had given Him to do. He knew His mission. He knew His purpose. He responded with urgency to the needs of those around Him, and through this His identity was revealed to any who received His message.

Jesus said, "I have given unto them the words that thou gavest me." It's very easy, almost without being conscious of the fact, to alter the meaning of another's statement by adding or deleting a word or a phrase. Christ was very careful to speak only those words of instruction and doctrine given Him by the Father. He did not add to or delete from them in any fashion. And they that received them saw that He was Christ. His identity was revealed.

There was no other sound like the voice of God. When an individual is repeated, his words are heard but not his voice; whereas, when the pure words that are given by the Father are spoken, His voice is intermingled in them. One does not simply hear His words, but is able also to hear His voice.

In John Chapter 7, officers were sent to arrest Christ, but they returned without Him, and when they were questioned, their reason was simply "...Never man spake like this man" verse 46.

In John 12:49, Christ cried out,

"For I have not spoken of myself, but the Father which sent me, He gave me a commandment, what I should say, and what I should speak." There are others who at one time or another claimed to be divine entities. But this man sounded different. When He spoke, His words were direct from Heaven. His words were not simply audible to the human ear, but were supernatural. They reached into the very depths of a man's soul. But when God speaks, when God's voice is heard, revelation is given! Identity is revealed!

In Deuteronomy 18:9-13, the people of God are being instructed to be different from all other nations; however, in the last verse of that chapter, they are given the means by which to identify a True Prophet sent from God. It was a very simple process. "When a Prophet speaketh in the name of the Lord, if the thing follow not, nor come to pass, that is the thing which the Lord hath not spoken, but the prophet hath spoken it presumptuously: Thou shalt not be afraid of him!" verse 22.

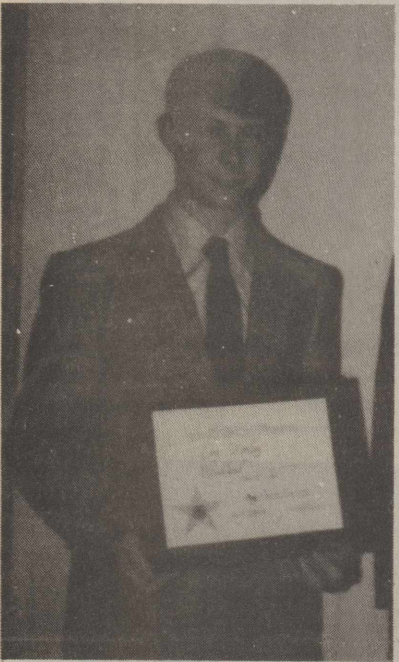
Worley receives Gold Star Award

Economic injury loans available

Julio Perez, district director of the U. S. Small Business Administration in San Antonio, announced Nov. 19 that SBA is accepting applications for economic injury disaster loans from eligible small business concerns without credit elsewhere and small agricultural cooperatives without credit elsewhere.

Applicants must have sustained substantial economic injury because of their dependence upon farmers and ranchers who suffered agriculture damages caused by drought and adverse weather conditions which occurred Jan. 1 through Sept. 17, 1990, and continuing. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters are eligible.

Businesses located in the following counties have until June 17, 1991, to submit an application with SBA: Bee, Caldwell, Concho, Crockett, Fayette, Goliad, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Hays, Irion, Kimble, Menard, Refugio, San Patricio, Schleicher, Sutton and Tom Green.

This loan program is intended to assist agriculture-dependent businesses and small agriculture coopera-

tives who sustained a substantial decrease in sales (or other forms of economic injury) directly due to losses incurred by farmers and ranchers to whom the business usually sells. In some cases, this may include non-agriculture-related businesses which sustain a substantial economic loss directly due to the inability of the farmers affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the drought and adverse weather are not eligible for SBA economic injury loans.

This program is available only to businesses that are considered small by SBA size standards and do not have credit available elsewhere. The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is four percent. The loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to \$500,000. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.

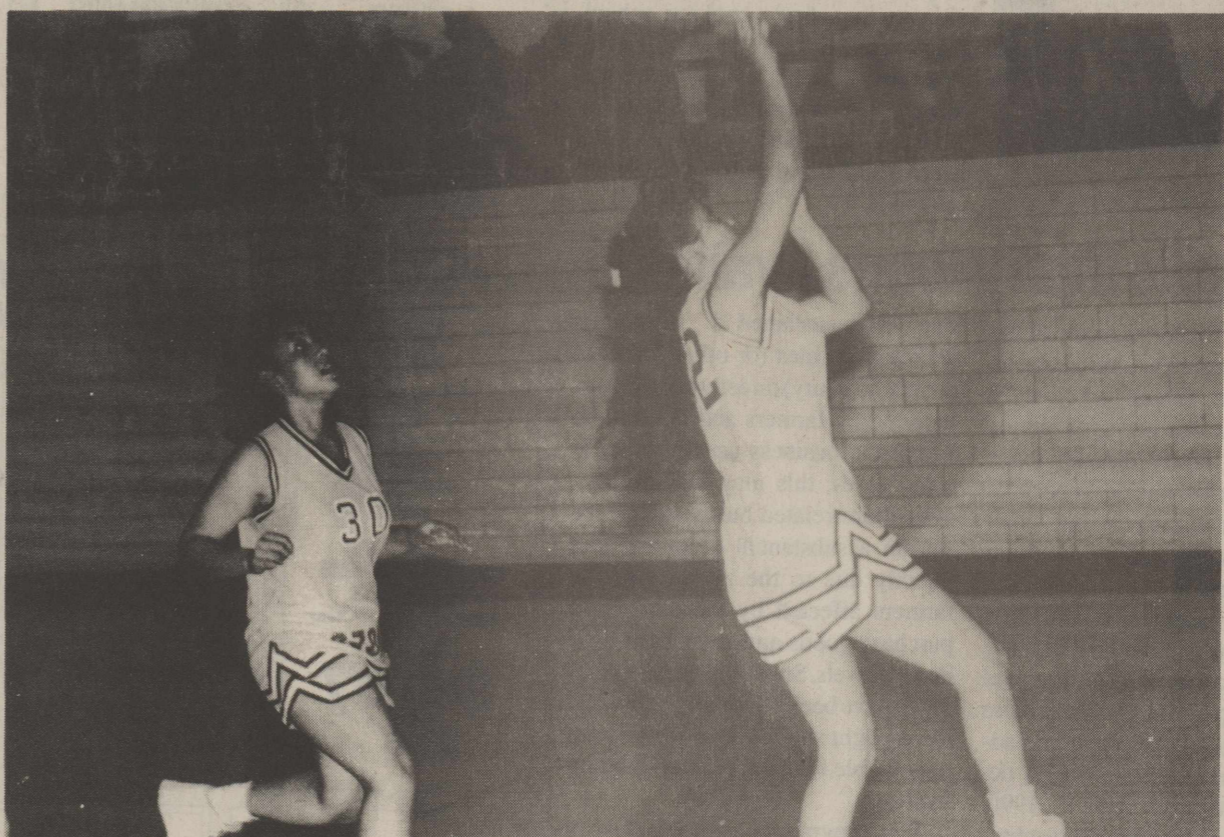

Mohair shipment headed overseas

A promotion trip to Eastern Europe earlier this month has already resulted in the shipment of a small amount of mohair to Czechoslovakia for a test program, Jeffrey Sutton said Monday. Sutton, vice-president of the Mohair Council of America, and Brian May, executive director for the council, traveled to Budapest, Hungary, Prague, Czechoslovakia, and Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Nov. 4-11 where they met with manufacturers and trade officials.

The small amount of hair which has been shipped is for testing by a manufacturer who wants to be sure the fiber will do what he needs it to do, Sutton said.

The three countries all manufacture carpets, Sutton said, and efforts were made to develop an interest in incorporating mohair into the product.

Wherever they went, the Texas envoys explained the GSM-102 program administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agriculture Service. Through this program, money is loaned to countries for purchase of U. S. agriculture products. Each country was very interested in the program, Sutton said.

Technical assistance from the U. S. for producing mohair products was also a selling point for the product.

The trip resulted in positive contacts with persons important in the purchase of raw materials in these countries, Sutton said. Individuals knowledgeable in the use of mohair in hand knitting and machine knitting were also contacted on the trip.

A spring trip to promote mohair in India and China is being planned for late March or early April, Sutton said.

If you remember and hunger for those tasty concession stand fried pies from the fifties, these recipes are for you.

Opal Everett made the pies for the class fundraisers when children Janie and Tommy were in school here. "I'd just as soon make fried pies as cookies," said the ranch wife and mother of five.

Husband Tom Everett claims he married her for her cooking, and an excellent cook she must be. The two will celebrate their 50th anniversary next year.

When Tom and Opal married "I didn't know a sheep from a goat," she said. A farmer's daughter from near El Campo, Opal came to love West Texas and its people.

She admits to being a "homebody" who loves to cook, sew and keep house at their Pandale ranch.

The Everetts' children are: Jane of Dennison, Tommy Jr. of Sterling City, Fannie of Ozona, Bill of Big Spring and Alton of Pandale.

Opal makes both apricot and apple fried pies. She also has a cream cheese pastry for use when baking the pies is desired.

FILLING FOR APRICOT TURNOVERS

Cover an 8-ounce package of dried apricots with water. Place on high heat until boiling. Lower temperature and cover pan and let cook until soft.

Add 2 to 2 1/2 cups sugar, dash of salt and nutmeg to taste. Mash apricots with potato masher and cook until thick, adding a paste of 2 tbsp. flour and 2 tbsp. margarine to thicken if necessary.

Remove from heat, add 1 tsp. vanilla and 1 tsp. lemon juice, cool.

Roll out cream cheese pastry cut into circles 2 1/2 to 3 inches in size or larger if preferred. Place about 1/4 tsp. apricot filling on small circle, more on larger ones.

Fold over, press together with tines of fork. Prick holes in top. Place on cookie sheet and bake 15 to 20 minutes in 400 degree oven or until brown. Remove immediately to cake rack that has been placed on a cookie sheet.

With teaspoon, pour a glaze made of powdered sugar, water and vanilla over each turnover. Cool. Can freeze to be used later. Dried apples or peaches may also be used. Adjust amount of sugar to taste.

CREAM CHEESE PASTRY

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 pound cream cheese
- 1/2 pound butter

Work together in mixing bowl. Pat into a ball. Wrap in waxed paper and chill for several hours or overnight. Can be frozen, then left in refrigerator overnight or let stand at room temperature until thawed enough to roll.

FRIED PIE CRUST

- 3 c. flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 3/4 c. Crisco
- 3/4 c. sweet milk

Cut shortening into flour, salt and baking powder until it resembles coarse meal. Combine milk, stir until smooth. Roll, cut and fill according to filling recipe omitting holes in top. Fry in deep fat.

Opal's lemon pecan cake has long been a favorite of The Stockman editor and her sister-in-law, Bernice Crow of San Angelo, who sends the cake to family members in other states each Christmas.

OPAL'S LEMON PECAN CAKE

- 1 lb. butter (must be butter, not margarine)
- 1 lb. brown sugar
- 6 eggs
- 4 cups flour
- 1 oz. lemon extract
- 1 lb. pecans
- 1/2 lb. candied cherries
- 1 1/2 lb. candied pineapple

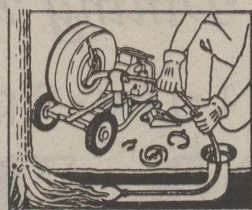
Cream butter and sugar; add eggs one at a time. Add lemon extract. Add flour, mix well. Mix in fruit and pecans.

Bake in greased and floured tube pan at 225 degrees for 3 hours.

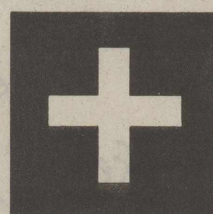
Contractor begins road work Nov. 26

Communicating with teenagers

Adolescent-parent conflict is not new—it dates back as far as recorded history. That may be a surprise to many of us who think our teens are unique—but at least now we know we're not the first to suffer!

The reason we hear so much about this conflict today is that for the first time in history, adolescents are living at home beyond puberty. In the 1800s, for example, they left home as apprentices, or married shortly after reaching sexual maturity. Today, they may continue to live in the parent's home seven to ten years after reaching this sexual maturity.

As many of us can testify, the adolescent years can be a trying time for any maturing teen and his/her parents. But a "war zone" at home can be prevented if both you and your teenager can work at understanding each other.

The National Institute of Mental Health offers the following suggestions for improving communication with teenagers (and thereby saving your own mental health):

—Give your undivided attention when your children want to talk. Don't read, watch TV, or busy yourself with other tasks.

—Listen calmly (as possible!) and concentrate on hearing and understanding their point of view. (Just grit your teeth and nod your head—works every time!)

—Speak to teenagers as courteously and pleasantly as you would to a stranger. Your tone of voice can set the tone of a conversation. (That reminds me of "do unto others." Just think how you'd feel if someone else talked to you like you talk to your teen! Would you be happy or furious?)

—Understand your teens' feelings even if you don't always approve of their behavior. Try not to make judgements. That's not saying you can't express your own feelings and values, but you must respect theirs as you would have them respect your own!

—Keep the door open on any

subject. Be an "askable" parent.

—Avoid belittling, humiliating, and laughing at what may seem to you to be naive or foolish questions and statements.

—Encourage your teenagers to "test" new ideas in conversation by not judging their ideas and opinions, but by listening. Then offer your own ideas as plainly and honestly as possible. Love and mutual respect can co-exist with differing points of view.

—Help your teenagers build self-confidence by encouraging their participation in activities of their choice (not yours!).

—Make an effort to commend and praise your teen often and appropriately. Too often we take the good things for granted and focus on the bad, but everyone needs to be appreciated.

—Encourage your teenagers to participate in family decision-making and to work out family concerns together.

—Understand that they need to challenge your opinions and your ways of doing things to achieve their successful separation from you—a separation that's necessary and essential for their own, healthy adult identity.

Finally, talk to other parents. You'll find things much easier to handle if you know you're not alone. To help you, the Crockett County Extension Office is offering STEP/Teen classes. For information on time, place and cost, call 392-2721. These classes are for couples or individual parents, and I can testify that they are extremely helpful.

And for a good extracurricular activity which teaches leadership, citizenship and opens the doors to friendship and many other opportunities, why not consider 4-H for your child?

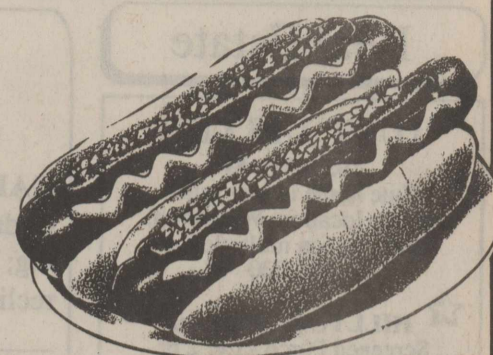

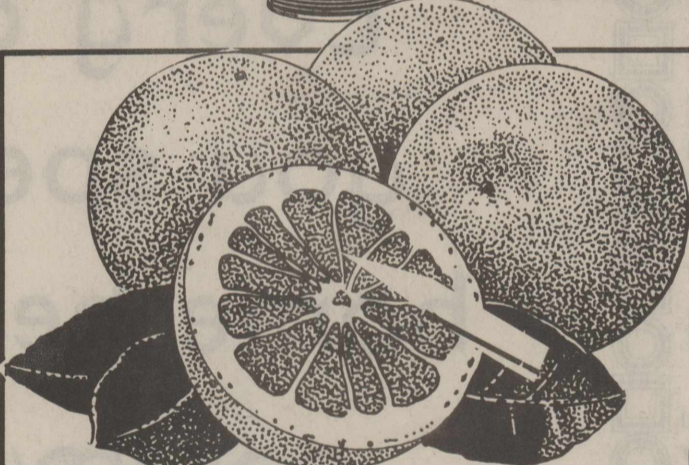
