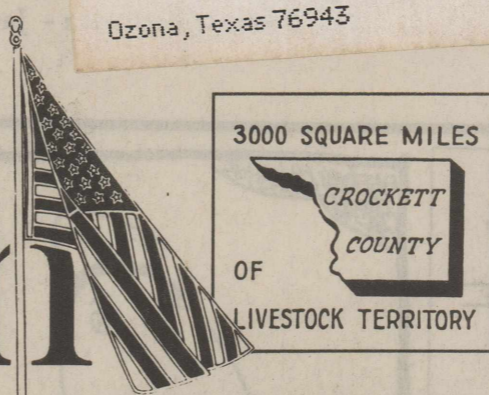

Man sought for questioning on Phillips murder case

Sheriff Jim Wilson this week received an artist's drawing of a subject wanted for questioning in connection with the Dec. 25 murder of Dean Phillips. The sketch was made from a photo taken on a surveillance camera at a local convenience store.

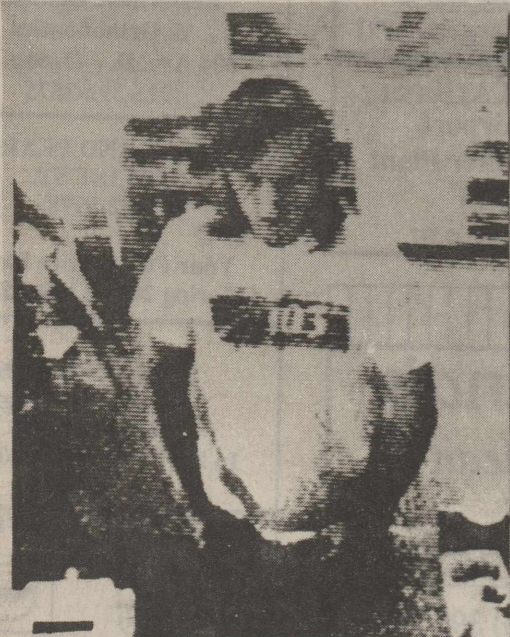
The subject is described as a white male, 20 to 30 years old, 5'8", 135 to 165 pounds, blondish hair with a reddish tint, and fair skin. He was wearing a white T-shirt with the logo "K103" on the front.

The unidentified man was driving an older model Dodge or Ford delivery type van, faded light blue or green in color with a bright green door on the passenger's side and a white front bumper. The vehicle was possibly bearing California license plates.

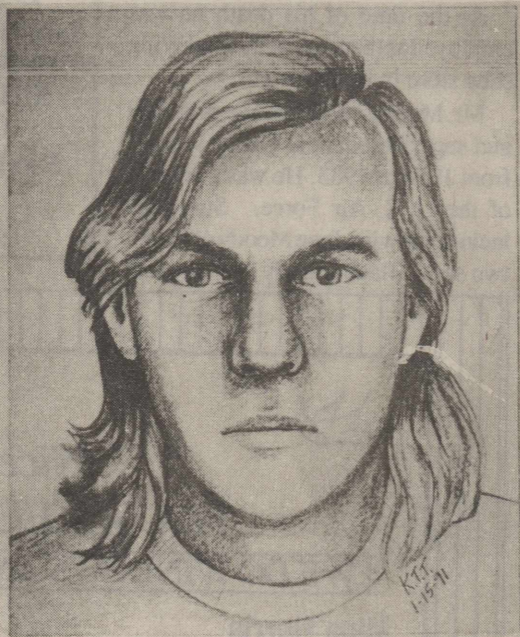
Both the subject and the van had been seen earlier in the evening at several other businesses. He purchased gas and inquired about availability of a mechanic and location of a junk yard, stating he had radiator trouble.

He also asked about a self service type laundromat. During this time, one witness claims to have seen some type of movement in the passenger's seat but could not tell if it was a person or a dog.

\$3.6 million..... Judgment awarded Rankin woman in suit against district attorney, others

A former Rankin woman was awarded \$3.6 million last week in U. S. District Court in Midland in a conspiracy suit against former Upton County Sheriff Glenn Willeford, 112th District Attorney J. W. Johnson, Upton County and Walter Woolf Jr.

Mary Turner was seeking \$12 million in the suit filed in January 1989. The former convenience store owner claimed that her constitutional rights had been violated when she was arrested Aug. 7, 1985, near McCamey and charged with possession of methamphetamine.

The arrest occurred after sheriff's department officials allegedly found about a gram of methamphetamine behind a stack of cups in her store. Woolf was convicted for planting methamphetamines in Turner's convenience store in 1985. Other defendants claimed he acted alone.

In her suit, Turner claimed that Willeford paid \$500 to Woolf to plant the substance and then provide a tip to the Sheriff's Department.

Charges against Turner were dismissed at the request of Willeford

and Johnson in mid-trial in 1987 when it was discovered that Woolf planted the narcotics.

U. S. District Court Judge Lucious Bunton had, in October of 1989, issued a summary judgement which halted Turner's suit against Willeford, the county and state. Bunton also ruled that Johnson could not be sued as a county official, but only as an individual.

Bunton's ruling was overturned in the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans in September of 1990.

The Jan. 17 ruling awarded Turner \$500,000 in actual damages from Upton County. Former Sheriff Glenn Willeford and District Attorney J. W. Johnson, who also serves as district attorney for Crockett County, were each penalized \$1.5 million in exemplary damages. Woolf was penalized \$100,000 in exemplary damages.

Willeford and Johnson, who were present at the trial, plan to appeal. Neither man took the witness stand.

In comments made after the trial, Johnson maintained there was no evidence of a conspiracy.

Tamie Reagor selected runner-up Miss Mohair

Tamie Reagor of Ozona, one of only two high school students in Friday's Miss Mohair pageant at Kerrville's Y-O Hilton, brought home honors as first runner-up to the overall title.

A silver tray was presented to Miss Reagor for her award. Following the competition, she was also invited to travel to New York this spring as part of a mohair promotion effort by the Mohair Council.

She was also asked to present her state-winning 4-H talk, "Mohair: Setting the Standard for Fashion", and model for Ol' Sonora Trading Co. at the Mohair Extravaganza to be held this coming weekend in Kerrville. More than 2,000 attended last year's event, during which Tamie also presented her talk and modeled.

The 18-year-old daughter of Billy and Judy Reagor and granddaughter of Mrs. Pauline Johnson, also of Ozona, is a senior at Ozona High School where she is president of the Just Say No Club, was drum major for the Lion Band, and has been a varsity cheerleader and on the varsity basketball team. She is also a member of the annual staff and a regular on the honor roll.

Her sponsors for the pageant included Ozona National Bank, Ozona Storage, Thornton's Supermarket, Mason, Myers and Stokes, Crockett County National Bank, T&T Village Supermarket, The Ozona Stockman,

black blouse and black leather heels. For the interview, she chose an ivory mohair dress of her own design. In the evening wear competition, Tamie chose a silk dress from the Teacher Store.

Reagor's qualifications for Miss Mohair are numerous. She currently owns a small herd of commercial Angora goats, and has been involved in promoting mohair for the past two years with her state-winning 4-H method demonstrations. Those demonstrations and her other mohair-related promotions have reached over 1,500 people.

In 1990, Reagor was interviewed about mohair and Angora goats by the San Angelo Standard-Times for their special section on wool and mohair.

Tamie currently serves as District VI 4-H Council secretary.

In 1989, she was named Lion's Club Youth Rodeo Queen and received the Jay Miller memorial belt buckle and the C. E. Davidson memorial scholarship at the rodeo.

At the Miss Mohair pageant, Tamie was runner-up to 23-year-old Carrie Stieler of Comfort, a junior at the University of North Texas majoring in fashion merchandising. Seven young women participated in this year's contest, which is based on overall appearance, an interview with judges, and personality.

Each contestant was required to give a two-minute presentation on the mohair industry, in addition to answering an impromptu question and modeling both daytime and evening ensembles. Judges were Dr. Joe David Ross of Sonora, former Miss U.S.A. Kim Dutton of Boerne, and Perry Bushong, president of the American Angora Goat Raisers Association and former Mohair Council president.

For the Friday night banquet and competition, Tamie modeled a royal blue mohair jacket with black leather trim, worn with a black leather skirt,



War In The Gulf

News of war in the Persian Gulf captured the attention of the world last week with the outbreak of hostilities Jan. 16 in Baghdad. America and much of the world focused on CNN television as Bernard Shaw, John Holliman and Peter Arnett gave an account of the Allied Forces' air strike and retaliatory ground fire from the Iraqis as seen from the windows of their ninth floor hotel room in Baghdad.

The strike came came hours after the expiration of the United Nations' Jan. 15 deadline for Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait. Events leading to the onset of battle began five months earlier with the Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait by forces of Iraq's President Saddam Hussein.

From Washington, President George Bush declared that "The liberation of Kuwait has begun." The country's leader continued to say that "We will not fail".

Constant news coverage provided viewers the latest information from Baghdad with frequent updates from the Pentagon and from Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, and Allied headquarters.

In the United States and abroad, protestors were televised as they gathered to demonstrate against the war while elsewhere others held prayer vigils.

Military and national leaders cautioned against first strike euphoria, warning the citizens that this war may not be over quickly.

Allied pilots were captured in Iraq and their words and images sent around the world while cautions to abide by the Geneva Conventions were issued from the Allies.

Televised newscasts began bearing such legends as "Cleared by" Saudi Govt., U. S. Military, Iraqi censors. Various government and military spokespersons became more cautious in their responses to media interviewers for security purposes, and by Jan. 22, U. S. and British television stations had agreed to cease specific forecasts of weather conditions in the Middle East.

Ozona schools recognize School Nurse Awareness Week

This week has a special meaning for Mrs. Lu Ingram, school nurse for Ozona Public Schools.

In recognition of the important role that school nurses play in the lives of children across the state, Governor Ann Richards has proclaimed the week of Jan. 21-25 as School Nurse Awareness Week.

Mrs. Ingram functions as the heart of the school health program in Ozona, and her duties include keeping current immunization records on approximately 900 students in the local school system, administering first aid, taking sick children home, and checking on children with communicable diseases.

She is also responsible for screening all children for vision and hearing difficulties, screening junior high school students for scoliosis (abnormal curvature of the spine), and conducting spot dental checks for students in grades one, four, and six.

"Nurse Lu" as she is commonly called by teachers and students, is married to Huey Ingram, and they have two grown sons, Don in Dallas and Drew in Midland. For the past 35 years, Lu has lived in Ozona and has

worked for various doctors, as well as the Crockett County Hospital, as a Licensed Vocational Nurse. She has been Ozona's school nurse for 10 years, and her interests include travel, fishing, and working with children.

Community service also claims Mrs. Ingram's time. She is a past president of the Ozona Women's Forum and teaches an adult Sunday School class at the First Baptist Church. Several years ago Lu was honored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce with its "Unsung Hero Award" for her many acts of unselfish love and caring throughout the community.

Betty (Mrs. Keith) Klepper was welcomed as a new member.





A Preacher's Pondering

Chances

When I was a child, I liked to take chances. It was daring and exciting. Childish minds are optimistic - they never expect failure. As I grew older, taking chances was not nearly as rousing. Maturity wants certainty. Even calculated risks are frowned upon by those who are seasoned.

Geoff Bodine, the 1986 winner of the Daytona 500, lost the following year because he took a "calculated risk." He chose to remain on the track instead of making a refueling stop, and he ran out of gas three laps from the finish line.

Mr. Bodine's reaction to his loss was philosophical. "If you never take a chance in life," he said, "it's dull and boring." But, as he found out, taking chances, even calculated ones, is very costly. In fact, taking chances sometimes puts dullness and boredom into life rather than removing it. I imagine he found the awards presentation that year extremely dull and boring.

If you have ever driven a lonely section of West Texas highways (who in Ozona hasn't?), you had better have some gas in the tank. Taking a chance that you can make it to the next town for fuel might lead to a dull, boring wait or a tiresome walk of 30 miles or so.

Juvenile thinking stays on the track instead of taking time to prepare. Calculated risks rob one of the prize. Maturity prepares. Preparation takes the chances out of life. Yes, it is costly, time consuming, and inconvenient - but it sure beats running out of gas short of the goal.

Many people miss the victories of

life because they choose to take chances. These childish individuals see their gamble as a sure thing, but they end up short of the finish, broke, or in the middle of nowhere. Very few ever succeed at taking chances, but most who prepare succeed.

You might be one who is taking a "calculated risk" that God will bless you. You might think you are too busy to stop for Him. Many things in life might hold you to the track. You can be deceived into thinking that you have enough time and energy left to reach the goal, but emptiness comes at the least expected moment - sometimes near the finish, ask Mr. Bodine!

Worship is a fill-up on life. The preparation in Bible study, prayer, and fellowship gives one renewed energy. A simple stop can insure your finish. Obedience to our Maker is a sure thing, but you will have to make a pit-stop. That stop, to worship and serve the Lord, won't take that long, and it will send you on the way to the finish line.

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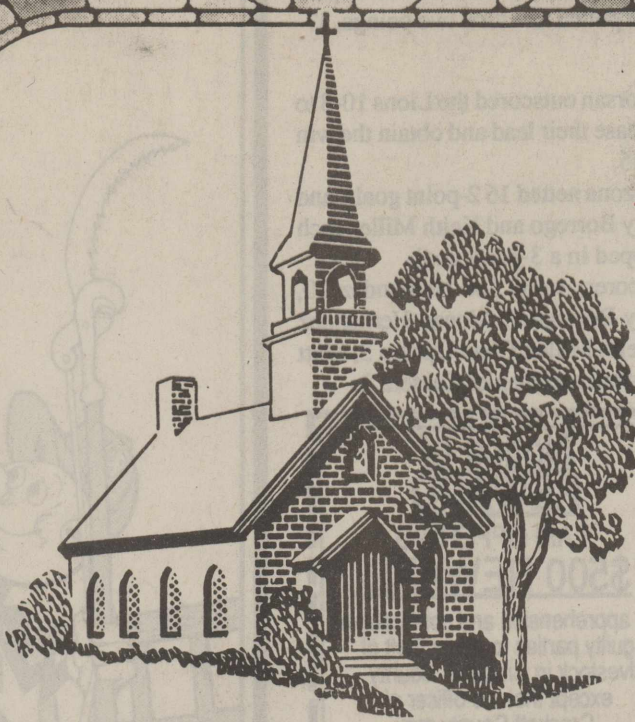

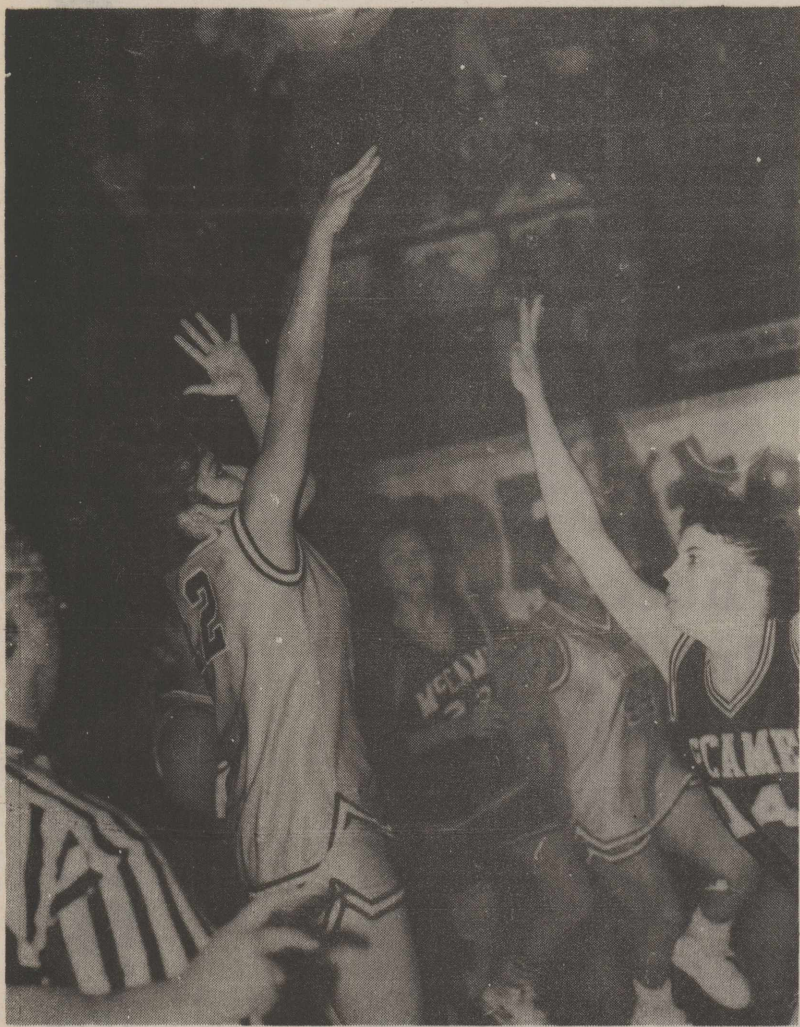

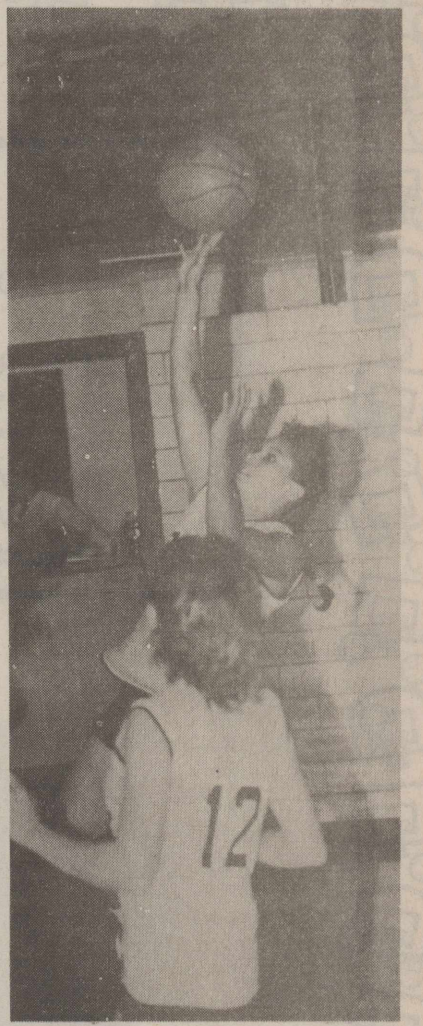
The game began slowly and headed in the wrong direction with Stanton leading the Lions 12-9 at the end of the first quarter.

only use the course during practice hours, while students whose parents are members can use the facilities at any time.

DeHoyos proposed that all students in the golf program use the Ozona Golf Association's driving range located nine miles northwest of Ozona to hit practice balls and use another golf course, possibly in Sonora, to play practice rounds during the 1990-91 season. Board discussion was held concerning this proposal, but no action was taken.

Board members approved a contract with Texas Tennis Court Surfactors of Dallas to repair and resurface the eight tennis courts located at Lion Stadium. At the present time the courts are very worn and have at least 15 low areas where water forms shallow pools, and these areas will be repaired and leveled prior to resurfacing and repainting. Work on the project will take approximately five weeks and will begin sometime this month.

The trustees reviewed bids received on the sale of two large school buses, a 1982 Pontiac sedan, and a 1976 GMC pickup, and they approved the sale of these vehicles to the highest bidders. The two school buses were purchased by Cecilio Cerna, the Pontiac was sold to Mari Vargas, and the pickup was sold to J. B. Miller.

During the meeting, district and campus improvement plans for this school year were approved, and the local school board also approved the appointments and maintenance of 43 teachers on the teacher career ladder for 1990-91.

Superintendent Jim Payne informed the trustees that the district had employed a certified teacher, Marilyn Fairchild, as a substitute for Rod Schneider, who is on military leave of absence, and he reported on a proposal prepared by Nobe Associates of San Angelo to conduct a survey of the high school campus and its accessibility to the physically handicapped. The trustees asked Mr. Payne to obtain more information on this proposal and present it during their next regular meeting which will be on Tuesday, Feb. 12.

Commissioners appoint economic development committee members

In a replay of their April 9, 1990, meeting, commissioners met Monday to hear a repeat presentation on ways to obtain economic development grants for Crockett County.

Tom Nance of Beeville, a representative of Carlos Colina-Vargas AICP and Associates of Austin, again outlined preliminary steps necessary in applying for these grants.

Nance is currently involved with development projects in Pecos and Presidio and has worked with other projects in Wink and Fort Stockton.

Crockett County became eligible for economic development assistance through its high unemployment rate.

Although the county is eligible for assistance, it first must have an economic development plan formulated by a court appointed committee before applications for grants can be made.

Once a project is identified, grants are sought for a feasibility study; then technical grants are applied for. Business commitment is obtained and other necessary grants applied for to begin a project. The start to finish process sometimes takes several years, Nance said.

Court members voted to hire Nance at a fee of \$3,000 to work as a consultant with the local committee.

Appointed as economic development committee members were: Don Long, J. D. Brown, J. B. Miller, Dan Davidson, Pleas Childress Jr., Pete Maldonado, J. R. Bhakta, Diane Myers, Becky Childress, Sostenes DeHoyos and Nancy Moore.

Commissioners also approved allocating of \$2,400 a year for the Texas Department of Health office in Ozona. That office is being moved from the county owned doctors' building to make room for an office for Dr.

Marcus Sims. Court members voted to approve painting, some repairs and replacement of linoleum for a Texas Department of Health office in the building formerly rented by Dr. Steve Sessom and The Hideout.

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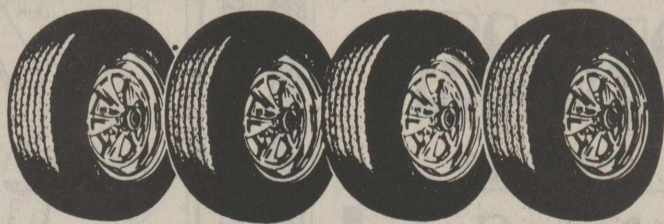
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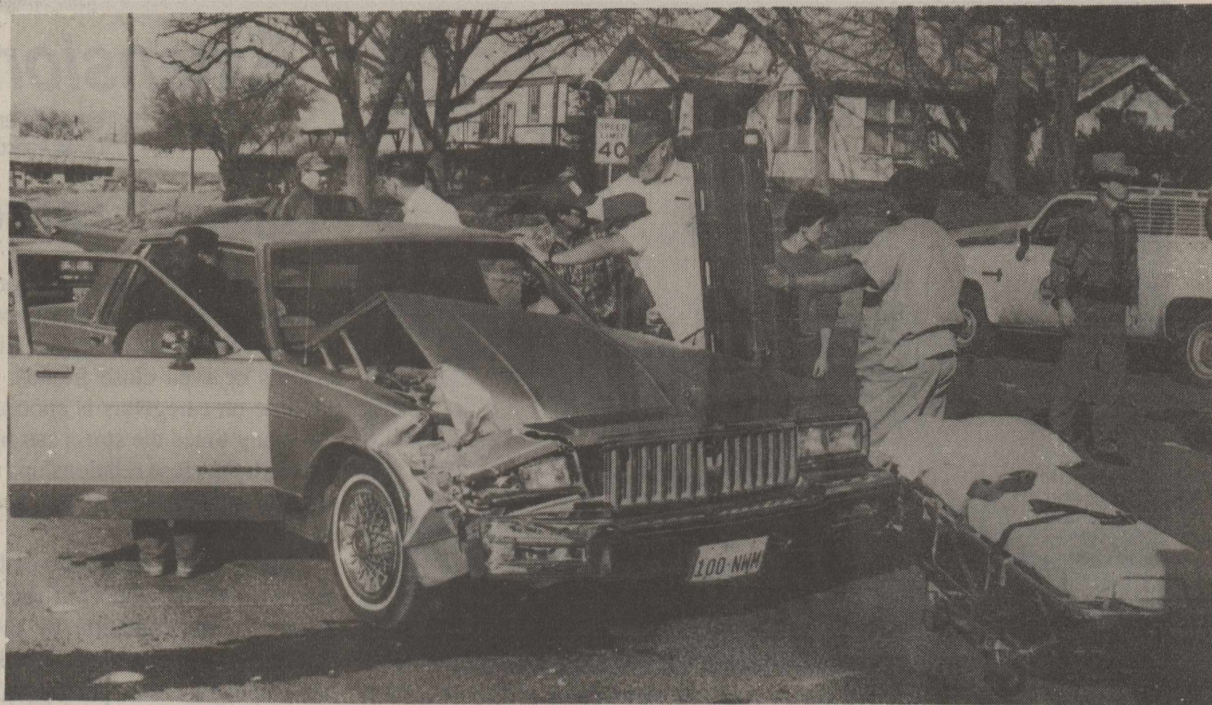
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Mrs. Teresa Martinez was taken by ambulance to Crockett County Hospital for treatment of injuries received in a two-vehicle accident last week in Ozona.

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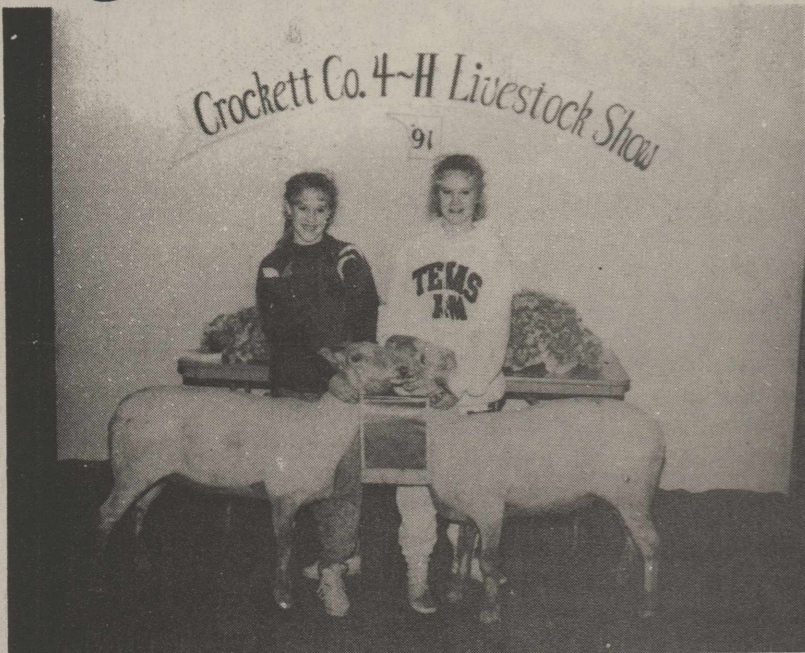

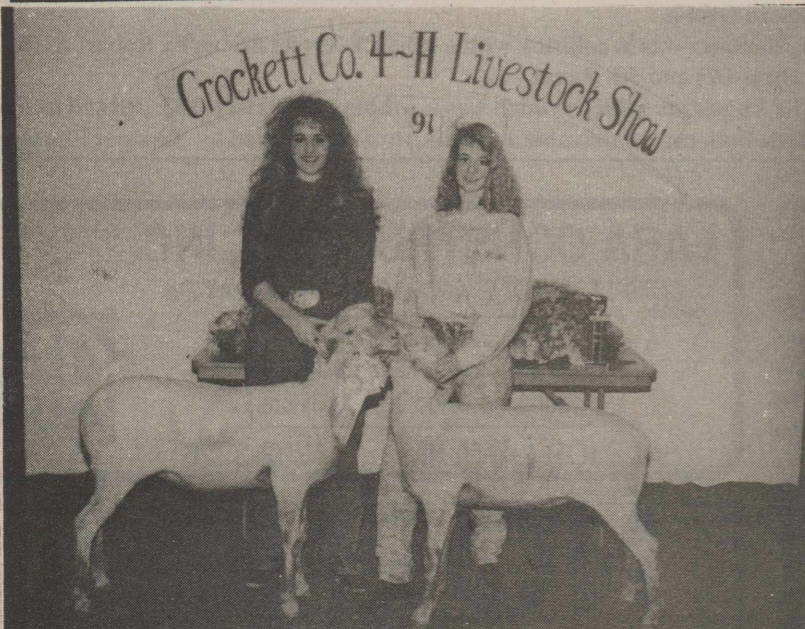

"Games" caregivers hate to play

As our population ages, more of us will be in the roles of caregivers—to elderly parents, other relatives, spouses or even close friends. The pressure on caregivers is enormous, and many times the stress can interfere with the close relationships they need to maintain with the person they're caring for.

Many times, caregivers of frail, elderly relatives wonder if they are victims of manipulation by the ill person. Caregivers may feel "tricked" into helping the older person, only to turn around and find the older person doing the same task when another family member is around.

Researchers have identified some of the following "games" and their consequences:

Using age as an excuse
When asked to do something, the elder says, "Wait until you're old, then you'll see how hard it is."

Feigning
While going "along" with the caregiver's requests, the older (ill) person exaggerates difficulty. When it comes to what he or she wants to do, there is no problem doing it.

Playing tricks
The older person wants something and is worried about getting it, but rather than ask directly, the elder pretends to need something else. For example, the person who fears being alone may fake pain or failing to get an overnight family attendant.

Just wait until your back is turned

The older person does what the caregiver wants until that person's back is turned—and as soon as the caregiver is out of sight, the elder goes back to undesirable behavior.

For example, a person with emphysema may not smoke while the caregiver is around, but smokes later, then needs help. Manipulative games, however, take two participants. If the caregiver refuses to "play" the ill or older person cannot control through manipulation. Several suggestions to stop these "games" are:

*Use humor. Laugh at the game

rather than getting caught up in it.

*Set limits. Say what you can and cannot do. Tell about other demands on time and energy. Be firm. Get support from others to help you stick to your limits.

*Look for sources of manipulation. Frequently, manipulation occurs when loss of independence occurs, or fear of this loss is strong. Check physical symptoms, acknowledge concerns of elders and give reassurances that you understand fears without giving in.

*Be honest. Tell the elder how you feel about the game being played—without getting angry. Explain your needs, too.

Changing patterns of interaction that may have started in childhood is not easy, but it is possible. Support groups can be a helpful way to see you through this process of change.

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
