## Marilyn Cox chosen outstanding citizen

Marilyn Cox was recognized as the community's outstanding citizen Feb. 21 at the 27th annual Ozona Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

Mrs. Cox was lauded for her community service in the presence of family and friends at the Crockett County Civic Center.

The honoree has served as chairman of the Community Center board, as an officer in the golf association and a past president of the Ozona Woman's Forum. While serving as chairman of Crockett County Public Library's board, she was instrumental in obtaining grants for the facility.

She has served as a Sunday school teacher, organist and member of the Women's Society of Ozona United Methodist Church.

In 1986, she wrote a book about her grandfather, a small town preacher, Rev. R. C. Hicks.

For many years she has performed book reviews for the Forum, Ozona Woman's League and other clubs.

Recognized as the community's unsung heroes were Esme and Elliott Barrera. The Barreras are involved in Boy Scouts, and he is a Webelo Scout leader. They are members of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church where Elliott is a sponsor of the Altar Boy Society and she is a CCD teacher.

Elliott is a member of EMS, presi-

dent of the Crockett County Library board, president of the Ozona Fire Department and serves on the board of directors of the school district.

As a member of Knights of Columbus, Elliott was the first to receive the Knight of the Year award. He has held the office of advocate, deputy grand knight and grand knight.

Esme is an early childhood teacher in the Ozona school system and serves on the Crockett County Welfare Board and Community Center Board.

The Barreras are the parents of six children, three who are foster children.

Elliott accepted the award for Esme and himself as she was in Austin attending a school related seminar.

Organization of the year recognition was awarded to Dare to Care. Formed in the summer of 1989 as a youth summer activity and mission outreach, youth and adults from the community's churches worked together for about 10 days doing repairs to homes. This past summer, five separate work sites were included in their undertaking.

Many Ozona residents and businesses have become involved in the project through contributions of time, talent and money.

Under the supervision and direction of Frances Curry, David McCa-

ley, Gary Vannoy, Opal Mobbs and Chuck Morris, this organization has helped restore many homes. McCa- ley coined the phrase Dare to Care as an appropriate name for the endeavor.

Mrs. Curry accepted the award for the organization.

Outstanding teacher of the year Shirley Kirby is a native Ozonan who began teaching here in 1966. She has been a third grade teacher since 1970. In addition to classroom teaching, she has been a ready writing coach for UIL.

Colleagues and students say that what makes her a special teacher is her wonderful rapport with her students. She plans to retire this year.

Mrs. Kirby is a member of Ozona Woman's Forum and serves on the board of Ozona United Methodist Church.

Ozona's outstanding young person Gilbert Rico has been a member of the National Honor Society for three years, a UIL literary participant for two years and is Senior Class representative.

Gilbert was district honorable mention in football last season. He has qualified for state in cross country the last two years and has participated in Dare to Care since its beginning.

He ranks second in the Senior Class and is respected by fellow classmates and the faculty at Ozona High School.

Each honoree was introduced by chamber president Diane Myers. Plaques were presented by Doug Meador, first vice-president.

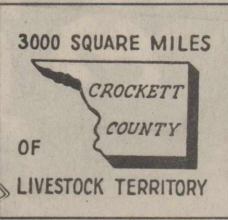
Accomplishments of the chamber during the past year and plans for the future were outlined by Mrs. Myers.

## Felicita Flores charged with murder in death of Mario Flores

Felicita R. Flores of Ozona was arrested Monday and charged with murder in connection with the death of her husband, Mario Flores.

The 5:55 p.m. arrest was made less than two hours after the Bexar County

Medical Examiner ruled that Flores' death was a homicide.

Sheriff's deputies were dispatched to a residence on Walnut Street at 3:46 a.m. Monday where they found Flores suffering from a knife wound

to his left chest.

"Persons at the scene told officers that Mario had stabbed himself," Sheriff Jim Wilson said.

Flores was taken to Crockett County Hospital where he was pronounced dead. Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne

ordered an autopsy, and the body was taken to San Antonio for examination.

Sheriff's deputies and Texas Ranger Danny Rhea began investigation of the case and developed information that led them to believe that Flores'

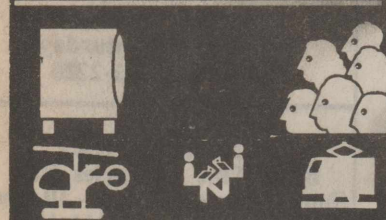
wounds were not self-inflicted, Wilson said. Confirmation was received from the medical examiner's office at 4:30 p.m.

Mrs. Flores was arraigned by Judge Hearne Tuesday morning on a charge

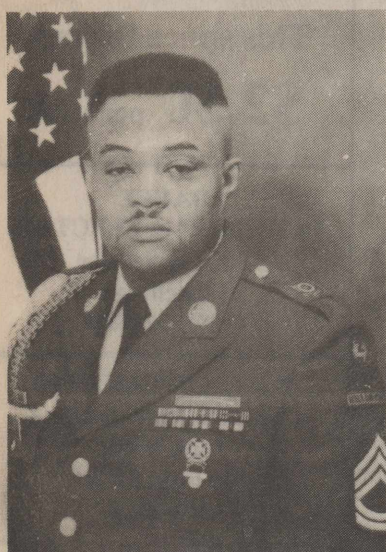
of murder. Judge Hearne denied bond and appointed an attorney to represent her.

The case will be referred to the Crockett County grand jury for action.

## County auditor projection shows county reserve funds will dwindle

A 7-year economic projection for Crockett County shows reserve funds dwindling to zero Auditor Sandy Stokes told commissioners Monday night. Stokes' figures included an annual allowance for \$100,000 unpredictable expenditures and five percent inflation.

The auditor expects the reserve to drop to \$650,000 by the end of 1991.

Options to slow or reverse the trend include across the board savings such as a five percent decrease in expenditures by all county departments, cutting services, which means letting employees go, cutting salaries or passing along some of the cost of benefits to employees, or a tax increase.

New commissioner Fred Deaton, a former hospital board member, pointed out that a 3-year plan of operation adopted by the hospital has the potential to save county dollars.

Stokes' comments came during a discussion by the court on the need to purchase a track loader and street sweeper. The 1991 budget includes \$50,000 for lease-purchase of a track loader and no money for a sweeper. Cost of a new track loader is \$119,000, said Eddie Moore, road department superintendent.

The court voted to table any action on the loader and sweeper until a later date.

Court members did approve purchase of a 20 yard dump bed trailer at a cost not to exceed \$6,500. The trailer will be used initially to haul approximately 3,500 cubic yards of rock and flex base material which is being given to the county in exchange for clean up of the storage site and blading a road. The exchange results in a savings to the county on road materials.

The current budget allows \$60,000 for materials to be used on roads. This amount is half what was allocated in 1990.

A report by Gary Harris and Danny Winchester of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper outlined pros and cons of

solid waste disposal alternatives available to the county.

A new site, a transfer station and a baler operation were options presented. A feasibility study conducted by the firm projects the waste disposal needs over a 30 year period.

Court members agreed that figures are needed on the cost of closure of the dump now in use and on permitting a new site. "Two or three"

possible sites are under consideration," Judge Kathryn Mayfield said.

Commissioners reviewed and approved specifications for a new ambulance and authorized advertising for bids on same. The bids will be opened during a committee meeting at the hospital April 2 at 10 a.m.

Other agenda items approved included:

-easement from Johnny West

Hoover for pipeline for water drainage

-appointment of Robert Bryson, Tedra Ulmer, Billy Reagor and Bob Denson to the Economic Development Committee subject to their acceptance

-purchase of a 1975 half-ton pickup to be used in town by the parks department

-placement of bandstand at the

north end of the square by Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

Court members tabled hiring of replacement personnel for the road department until a detailed job description can be written and also tabled action on authorization of right-of-way on University property on County Road 305.

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## An editorial . . . . .

### To the residents of Crockett County:

I am sure that each of you are aware that the Texas Supreme Court has declared the Texas School Funding procedures unconstitutional and have ordered the State Legislators to come up with a equitable finance bill that will meet the court's definition of constitutionality.

The Court has ruled that the current funding system allows school districts with a wealthy tax base per student to raise more money per student than the other school districts that have a lesser tax base per student; therefore, it is not equitable nor constitutional.

The whole point of the Supreme Court decision was to eliminate the access-to-money advantage of the rich districts. By definition, that means you either level-down to the modest assets of the relatively poor districts, or you level-up to the assets of the rich districts. In the end the poor are going to win and the rich are going to lose.

The purpose of my writing this letter is to inform the citizens of Crockett County that we are going to be profoundly affected financially by what is going to take place in the next few weeks at the State Capitol in Austin.

Crockett Co. Consolidated Common School District is in the 97% of school district wealth in the State of Texas. This means that we are one of the wealthy school districts around the state. Of all the finance bills filed at the time of this writing, our choices are not which bill will be good for us, but rather which bill does the least damage.

Each of these bills has some type of recapture feature that allows school districts a base amount of money for each student if that district will tax at a rate specified in the bill. If that rate raises more money per student than the state allowed amount per student, then the district must send the excess amount to the state to be shared with other school districts.

What does all this mean to the Citizens of Crockett County? It means our property tax will rise drastically and the amount of dollars we have to spend for the education of our children will decrease. However, some bills will hurt more than others.

Senate Bill 351, sponsored by Sen. Parker, will do the most damage of the bills I have studied. It virtually does away with local control by creating Regional Taxing Districts that pool the local districts together for funding purposes. SB 351 does not provide the amount of funding required to operate an efficient educational program. It levels down and not up. It could require Crockett County to raise taxes as much as 71 cents per \$100, yet provide our district with several thousand dollars less per student than we now have. I urge each of you to speak out against this bill to your legislators and other state officials.

Of all the bills I have studied, the one that supports the idea of local control, levels up instead of down, and that would provide our school district with the most money for our tax effort, is the Working Groups Plan. This is HB 986 sponsored by Libby Linebarger. Again, I urge each of you to contact our state officials and give support to HB 986 and speak against SB 351.

### Parker services held in Earth County

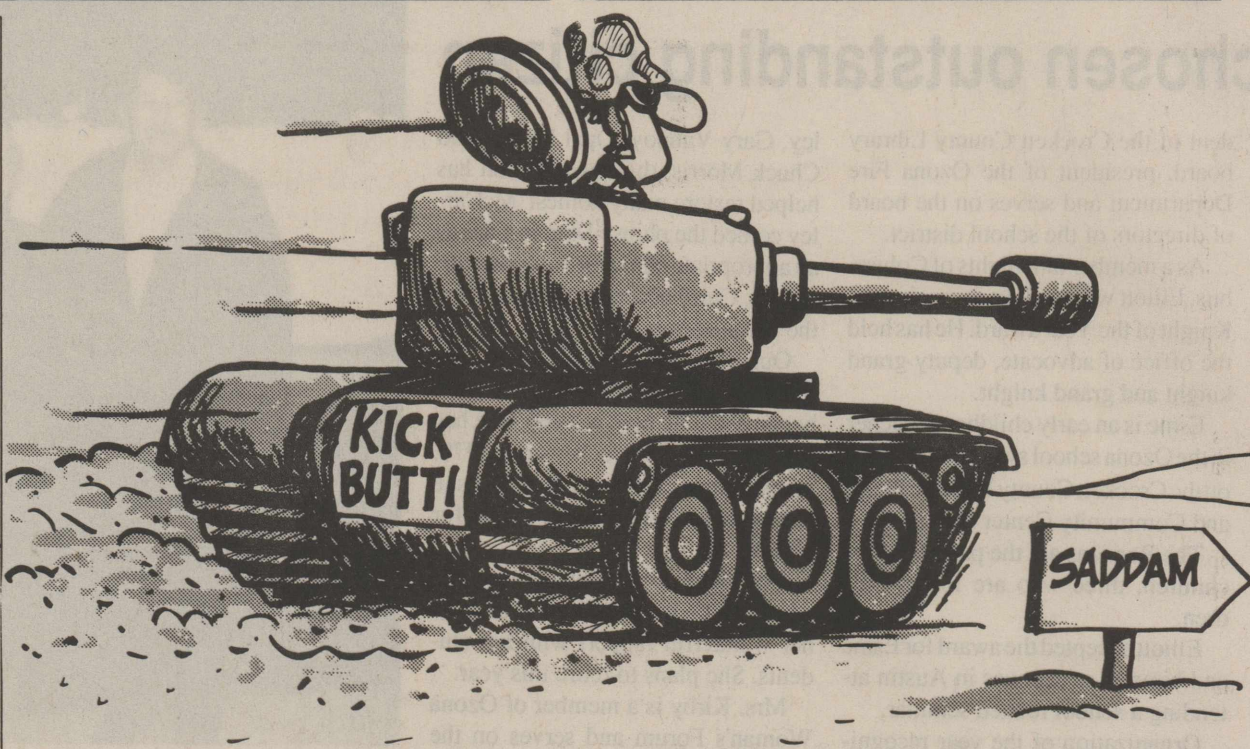
David A. Parker died Feb. 12, 1991, at his family ranch home in Erath County.

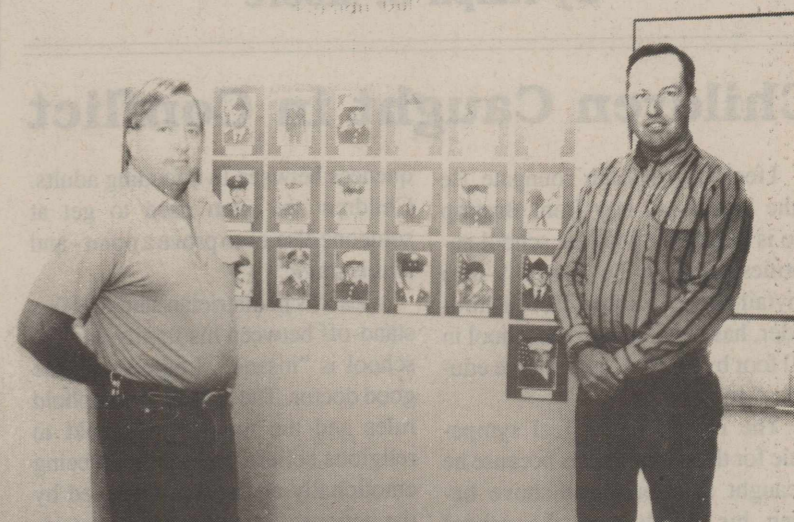

## A Preachers Pondering

### Children Caught in Conflict

I feel sorry of Zach Toungate. He is the 8-year-old boy from Bastrop who is in trouble with the school authorities because he has a 9-inch ponytail. Since October Zach, a third-grader, has been isolated at school in a 10 foot by 13 foot "alternative education" room.

The reason that I feel sympathetic for this youngster is because he is caught in a push-and-shove between his family and the school administrators. I'm sure he is a normal little boy who is rather confused about the national attention that his ponytail has drawn.

I'm not sympathetic over ponytails on boys! But a little kid? Come on - that's not the issue. The family claims religious reasons for his long hair, and the school authorities claim rights for dress codes. The family claims that dress codes are unconstitutional, and, indeed, if they interfere with religious practices they have a point.

Religious rights stand alongside civil rights when it comes to the law. No matter how strange it might seem, if people are sincere in their religious belief and practices - they have rights that society dare not infringe upon. There have been numerous clashes between the government and those claiming "religious" rights.

Some religions embrace beliefs that seem strange to most mainliners. Some don't believe in saluting the flag or observing various holidays. Others shun medical treatment. Some wear odd clothing. The list goes on and on. But, when these things are observed by sincere people in the name of religion, I think that they must receive due consideration.

It is tragic when children get caught in the conflict and have to suffer. You've read about the measles epidemic in Philadelphia where children are suffering because of a religious practice that forbids medicine. It is tragic, but there is still the point of constitutional rights in a free society.

In Zach's case, it seems he is caught between his family and the school people. It has developed to the point that both sides are acting unreasonably and, in essence, little Zach has nothing to do but accept harsh treatment. Have you ever seen a child get caught between parents and coaches over some stupid sports activity? Like Little League?

Sometimes a parent is reliving youth through the child, and a coach is set on winning. It all adds up to the child having to suffer the conse-

quences between two feuding adults. Children are often used to get at someone else or to prove a point - and that is tragic.

Zach's pediatrician said that this stand-off between his family and the school is "insane". I agree with the good doctor. The school must uphold rules and the family must hold to religious beliefs, but a child is being emotionally and socially harmed by the actions. Zach should be considered.

What does the Bible say about a situation like this? Is there any word from the Lord? In principle, yes. One must obey God rather than man. Sincere beliefs must be allowed. If the family is acting out of stubborn attitude, then settlement must be reached, but not at the expense of this little boy. Children are a "heritage of the Lord". They must not be abused in any way! I feel sorry for Zach. Think about it.

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## What's The Verdict?

Courtroom drama's made for a couple of good movies and several successful TV series. The series of events in the argument of the prosecution and defense before the bench are interesting and vivid, and a high tension continues to mount until the jury's verdict is read. Often we put ourselves in place of the defendant, and anguish with them until their fate's determined. However, there is a very real and more important drama that takes place before the Judge of Heaven and Earth. We don't have to imagine ourselves in place of the defendant before His seat of Justice - for we ARE the defendants! This is not a jury trial, but the Judge Himself will hear our case - since He's the One who wrote the Law, and the One against whom we've committed our crimes.

Some people think there is no accounting for what they do. They deny the obvious and say there is no God - or pretend that if He is the Creator that He's not concerned about what goes on in our world - or that He's not capable of doing anything about it. Other people think they'll be tried in the court of their own opinions, or by their fellowmen. So they work only for social justice, and not godly living. For them the majority rules, ie, what society accepts, they accept. In other words, they DO Their Own Thing. But Jesus says that's not enough, and makes it clear in Matt. 5, where He says: "I tell you, unless your righteousness is much better than that of the Scribes and Pharisees, you'll never get into the Kingdom of Heaven". So, "Doing the best you can" DOESN'T "Do It" with God. He demands more than you demand of yourself, and more than society demands of you. His is a Higher Court, where only perfection is accepted. The Apostle Paul says in Romans 2 that God'll judge ALL people by His Law, whether they've learned and accepted it or not. And chapter 3, verse 19 shows us the reality of guilt - and that the Law's condemnation is universal: "We know that whatever the Law says, it says to those who are under the Law, so that every mouth may become silent and the whole world may stand guilty before God". And WHAT does the Law say? According to Galatians 3, it says: "Cursed is everyone who does not continue to DO EVERYTHING written in the Book of the Law". And WHO is "under the Law"? Paul says that "every mouth" must be silenced, and that the "whole world" must be held accountable. So if we have a "mouth", if we're part of the "world", then we must be silent about any goodness or righteousness we may pretend to have of our own. At best, our obedience to God's Law is imperfect, inconsistent, and only external. So if I were on trial, there's no doubt that I'd be found guilty - how about you?

But the Good News is that God has put Jesus on trial in our place. Every Christian knows that the trials of Jesus Christ during Holy Week was actually their own trial. For whether it is before Annas, Caiaphas, Herod, or Pilate - Jesus was in reality standing in for us before the Judgement Seat of God. In the above reading from Matthew 26, we find that the Jewish Court was looking for "false testimony" against Jesus - for there was no true evidence. So the High Priest, in the blind hatred of his unbelief, put Jesus under oath in order to make Kim respond to the claim that He was the Son of God. Jesus accepted the right of the High Priest's earthly authority and answered honestly: "I AM!"

Jesus' willingness to submit to trial - and the punishment of the Cross, was an act of love. It was God who "so loved the world" that He sent His Innocent Son to die for the world which "stood guilty" before Him. So the High Priest condemned Jesus of blasphemy for claiming to be the Son of God, and asked the Court: "What's your verdict?". And only on the basis of a misconstrued trial and a faithless denial of the truth did Jesus accept the verdict of the Sanhedrin: "He's guilty, and deserves to die!"

When we look in on Caiaphas' courtroom, we must see ourselves sitting where Jesus sits. The irony is that the unjust verdict against Jesus is His Father's loving verdict for us - because Jesus is our substitute defendant before the judgement seat of God. And here's the paradox: Jesus is innocent, before God and man. Yet He's found guilty and worthy of death. We are guilty, under God's Law and in sinning against our fellowman. Yet we live, and in fact are promised eternal life with God in Heaven. How's that possible? There must have been a switch somewhere - and there was! St. Paul put it this way in Galatians 3: "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law, by becoming a curse for us, as it is written; CURSED IS EVERYONE WHO IS HUNG ON A TREE". The Cross of Christ is a double-exchange, for not only did our sin become Jesus' sin and our punishment become His punishment, but also His Innocence became ours. So we don't have to wait until Judgement Day to hear the verdict, for God's already announced it. At the same time Jesus was pronounced worthy of death, you and I were declared worthy of life. When Jesus cried from the Cross: "It Is Finished", it was! That's why Paul could write in Philippians 3: "I consider everything a loss, compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Jesus Christ my Lord...I consider them garbage, that I may gain Christ and be found in Him, not having my own righteousness based on the law, but the righteousness that depends on faith - that God gives those who believe in Christ".

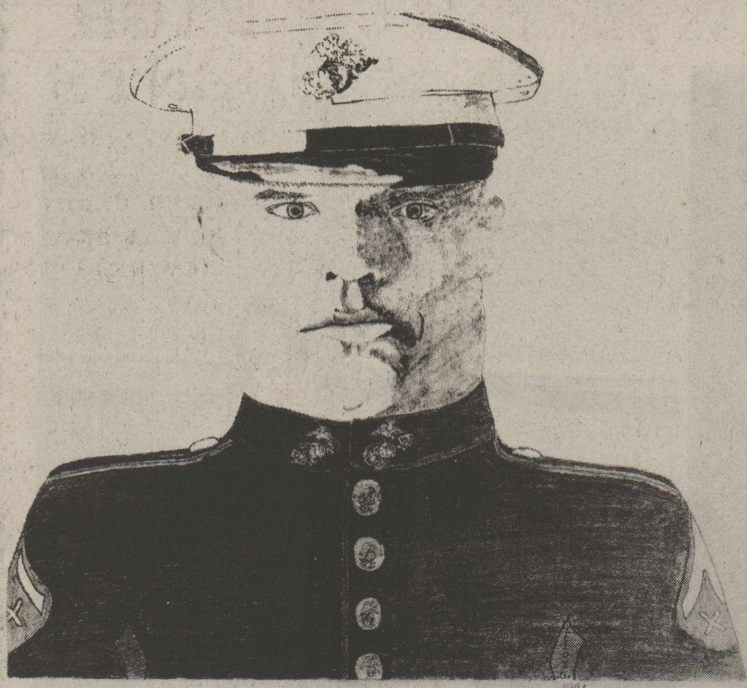
So nothing remains but to BELIEVE it and LIVE it! Run from the courtroom of God's Justice, yelling and telling everyone that nothing in your life matters anymore except Jesus! That's the life of a convicted sinner declared innocent! The trial is over! The tension of our sin-filled past is over! The verdict is in! Case closed - and every opportunity for thankful service to God is open! All that remains for us to thank the Innocent One who stood in our place, Jesus Christ!

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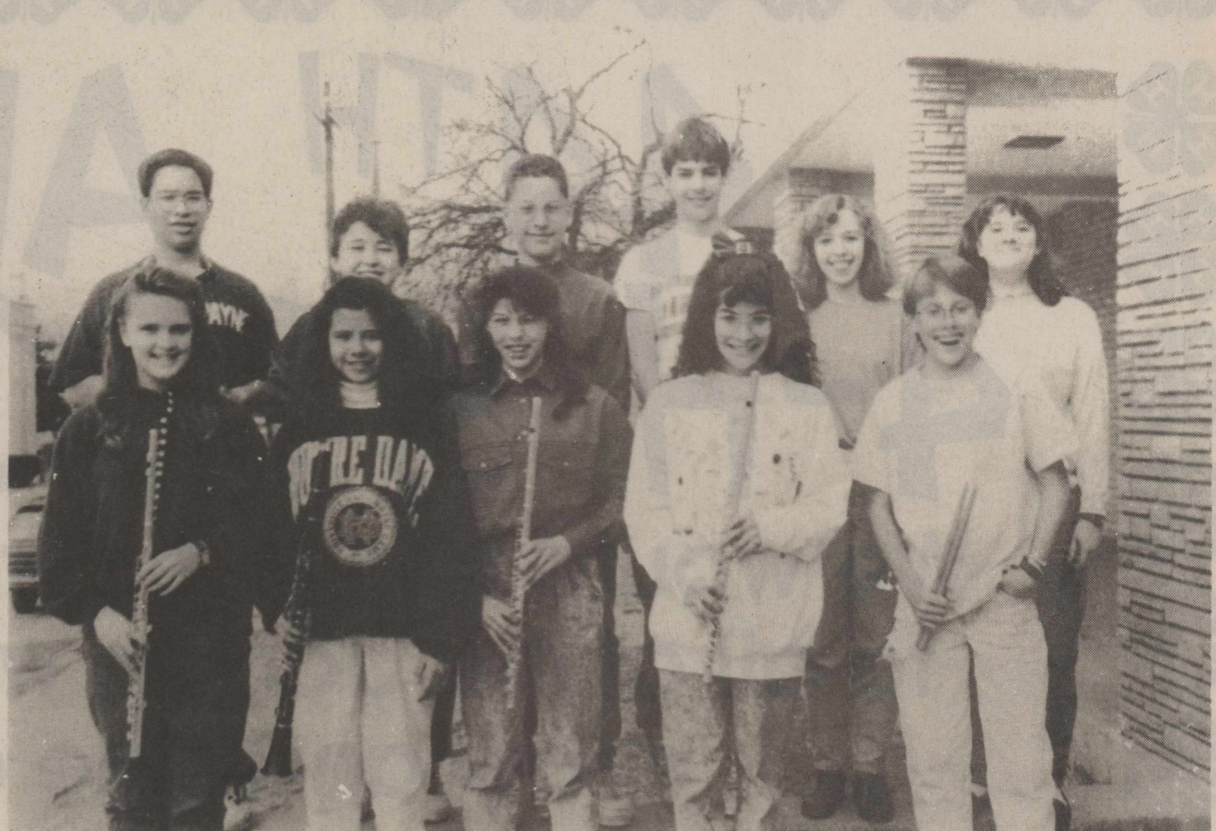

How I would feel if I was at war. If I were at war I would be sad. My

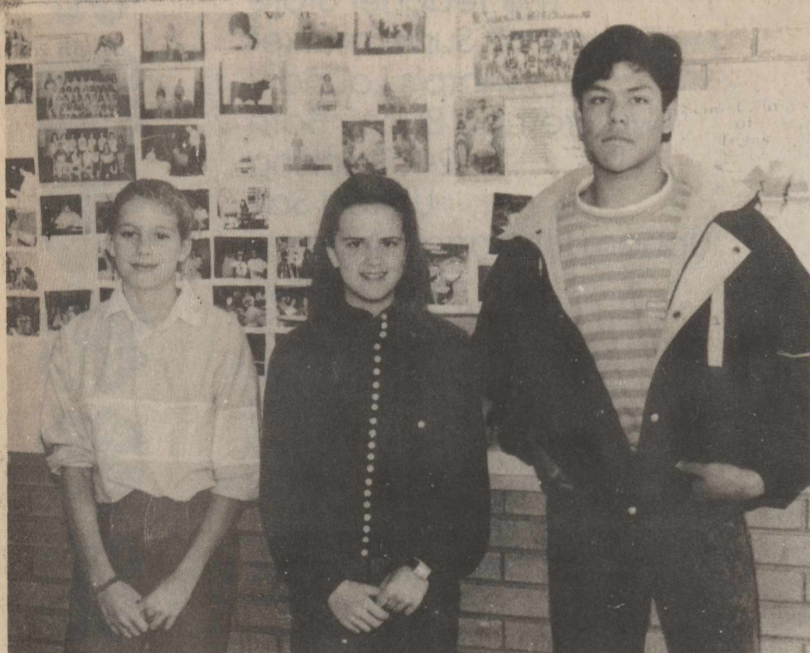
family would feel unhappy to see me at war. If I die my family would cry because they love me so much.
