Hill receives member of year award

Captain Harvey Hill of the Crockett County Sheriff's Department received the Texas Game Warden Association's Region I Associate Member of the Year award for 1990. The award was presented at the annual TGWA convention held in Austin Feb. 17-19.

The prestigious award is given in each of 10 regions of the state to the associate member who makes the greatest contribution of time and effort in helping the TGWA achieve its goal of "Conservation for Future Generations", through assorted projects such as deer hunting summer camps for underprivileged youths and general community service.

Region I is the largest geographical region in the state, running east of Del Rio to east of San Antonio to El Paso and from the Rio Grande River to the New Mexico state line.

"Hill received this award in recognition of his contributions to the youth of Texas," said Game Warden Rod Chalmers. "Since 1985, Harvey has been the behind the scenes hero of youth hunter training camps and West Texas Boys' Ranch youth deer hunts sponsored by the TGWA and held on the Perry Ranch in Crockett County. He also has been a major contributor of time and supplies in the Crockett County 4-H Field and Stream activities.

"The presentation of this award is long overdue."

Cpt. Hill has been with the Crockett County Sheriff's Department since October of 1976. He is a native of Maverick County where he served as chief deputy and his father was a Border Patrol agent.

"Harvey's attitude and the way he involves himself with the commu-

nity is what I admire in him as a police officer," said Sheriff Jim Wilson. Wilson also praised Hill for his involvement with the young people of the community.

Ozona Relays Saturday

Competition in the 39th Ozona Relays scheduled for March 16 in Lion Stadium begins at 9 a.m. with the field events.

Running prelims begin at 11:30 with the 3200m run followed by the 400m relay, 100m I.H., 110m H.H. 100m dash, 800m relay, 400m stock, 300m hurdles, 300m I.H. and 200m dash.

The 3200m relay will be run at 2 p.m. while additional field events are happening.

Track queen and beau will be introduced at 4 p.m. prior to the finals.

Reagan County won the first meet, Eldorado has won twice, in 1962 and 1964. Marfa, Iraan, Crane and Colorado City have single year championships to their credit.

Junction has won the meet four times.

Court studies financial problems, considers new street sweeper

Adopting a budget policy for 1992 involved putting on paper eight possible remedies to the county's financial problems when commissioners met Monday night. Court members set priorities for cutting the 1992 budget as follows:

1. Savings through across the board percentage cuts of expenditures in all departments
2. Look for grant money
3. Charge for county services and seek other ways to generate revenue
4. Personnel cuts
5. Cut services and contract work instead
6. Pass on cost of fringe benefits to employees
7. Cut salaries
8. Raise taxes

The term "budget constraints" was heard several times Monday as the court considered purchase of needed items. Debate on new equipment versus used centered on a track loader for the road department. Replacement of the street sweeper will most likely be in the 1992 budget if the one in use can be made to last out the year. Used loaders are available, but sweepers are not.

Court members reviewed and adopted a map designating county

roads during a report by Eddie Moore, road supervisor. All county maintained roads have been numbered and signs placed on all but two.

An agenda item to designate all county roads as third class was tabled until Moore and individual commissioners determine which should be second and which third class. Once a road is designated third class, it can not be upgraded to second class.

Purchase of material for right-of-way fencing on two miles of University land on County Road 305 was approved. At their January meeting, court members voted to place two bump gates on this road. Only one will be placed since the road is being laned.

In a separate action, the court voted to buy the fencing supplies from South Texas Lumber.

During Moore's report, commissioners voted to adopt paving and seal coat plans for the year.

The court tabled authorizing Judge Kathryn Mayfield to contract with a commercial driver's license school for training county employees until more information is available. All commercial motorists who drive vehicles in excess of 26,000 pounds or transport hazardous materials that require the vehicle to be placarded must have the new commercial driver's license by April 1, 1992.

Commissioners approved advertising for an individual to monitor dumping at the land reclamation site (south dump). Hours of operation are 8 a.m. - noon, 1-5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. Commissioners agreed they need to look into charging for individual dumping as other communities do.

As part of the requirements for closing of the landfill east of Ozona, the court authorized Judge Mayfield to contract with a surveyor to determine boundaries. The motion also authorizes surveying the road to the airport, a step necessary as part of a grant application.

Following a vote to approve the final draft of a lease between the fair association and Crockett County, commissioners voted to allow use of the grounds by the Southside Lions for a carnival April 22-28.

Votes were taken to table purchase of a wood chipper and to contract with an answering service for 911 emergency service.

The court voted to advertise for bids for law enforcement and public officials' liability insurance and approved a contract with Pritchard and Abbott for on-line data processing services for the tax office.

Written reports were received from Helping Hands and the fire department.

Board to apply for Medicare certification

Members of the Crockett County Hospital Board of Directors voted to change their meeting time to 6:30 when they met March 7. The board meets regularly on Thursday before the second Monday of each month.

March 25 is the target date for Dr. Marcus Sims to be in his new office in the professional building. Administrator Bob Denson told the board. Renovation on the quarters will begin as soon as the health nurse office is moved.

Forms necessary to apply for Medicare recertification have been received at the hospital, and application will be made, Denson said.

A problem with the pager encoding system has been taken care of, but the equipment should be under consideration for replacement within the next 12 months according to John L. Henderson.

As a result of a wage and hour audit, the hospital must audit employee records for the past two years to determine if overtime is owed to any employees. Nursing personnel who worked the day or evening shifts during this period are to receive one additional hour pay to compensate for interrupted lunch breaks.

A location other than the hospital for the 911 emergency telephone

system is being requested. The matter was discussed at commissioners' court Monday, but no action was taken.

Board members voted to approve Cheryl Chandler to receive the nursing scholarship of \$300 per month for the remaining months of her schooling.

After a review of a cost comparison between the dish washing machine and the Auto Chlor Model A4, board members voted to enter a rental agreement for the new machine. Savings will be approximately \$2,000 per year.

The committee to create a profile of a physician to be recruited to the Ozona office will meet soon. Committee members are: John Daniels, Martha Gries, Carmen Sutton, Dr. Sims, Dr. Robert Owensby, Martha Vickers and Bob Denson.

The possibility of applying for two grants available to rural hospitals was explained by Mr. Denson. The board voted to enter a contract with Melanie J. Smith of the Thomas A. Gordy Group to prepare a grant application for the Rural Healthcare Transition Grants Program. This item will be brought to commissioners for approval in a meeting called for Thursday night.

The maximum amount awarded through this grant is \$50,000. A second grant through the Rural Outreach

Program is for up to \$300,000. Mr. Denson will work with the grant writer to develop an application satisfactory for both programs.

In a separately convened care center meeting, board members voted to pursue the increase in the nursing home license from 42 to 45 beds. The nursing home was constructed to accommodate 45 beds.

Expense involved would be for room furnishings.

The board voted to approve vacation coverage for Connie Arredondo, lab/X-ray director, during the first two weeks of July. In a second motion, the board also agreed to pay Mrs. Arredondo a flat fee for the time period of 5 p.m. Friday to 5 p.m. Sunday for lab coverage when it is impossible to contract with an outside person to cover the time period.

Board members also voted to approve replacement of the groundskeeper who resigned in January and to replace two full-time nurses' aides in the nursing home who are taking personal and medical leaves of absence. The nursing coverage will be achieved by increasing a part-time person to full-time and training a potential relief person.

Groundskeeping will be arranged through the county.

Present to give monthly reports were: Garland Young, civic and youth center; Louise Ledoux, library; and Bob Denson, hospital and care center.

While discussing an agenda item to replace the vent hood in the civic

center kitchen, commissioners decided to turn the matter back to the center's board for other possible solutions.

ASCS to review 1990 Farm Bill

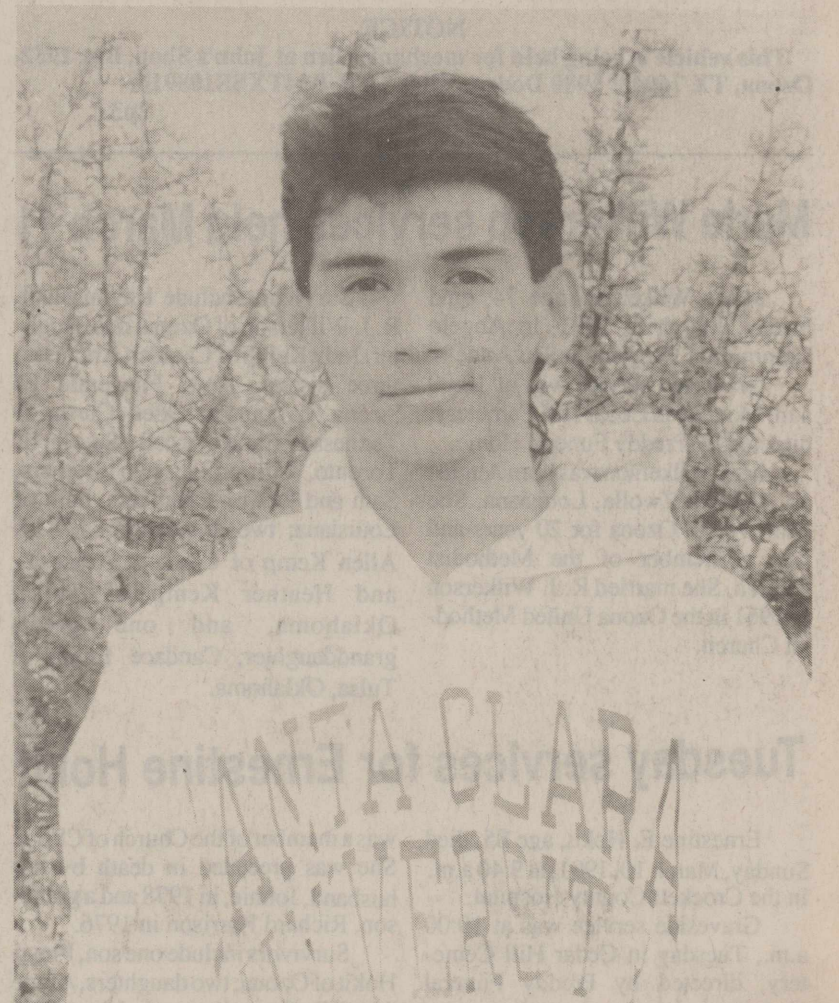

A Preachers Pondering

Questions

Life presents us with some very difficult questions. And every question has at least two sides. I don't have as much trouble with the questions as I do with the answers. You're that way too, aren't you? Although there are a few people who know it all, or think they do, I imagine most of us ask more questions than give answers. Some time ago, my granddaughter spent several days with us. She has "talkative" blood in her, gets it from her mother who got it from her mother. She asked a multitude of questions. She is in a pre-school program, and I have been to graduate school, but I couldn't answer all her questions. There is nothing like being humbled by a child.

You know the kind of questions kids ask: "Can your dog read?", "How do you know?", "How did God make an alligator?", "Does a butterfly dream?", "How do you know?", "Is Granny making a pie for supper?" (Now there's one I thought I knew. "No!!", I said confidently.) You've heard these questions from children, and a thousand more.

As the years pass, these childish queries take a more mature turn. "What is a DNA molecule?", "Is alcoholism genetic?", "Can I have the car tonight?", "Why do we have to go to war?"

Yes, life poses hard questions. We don't always have the answers. Even What? When? Where? Why? Which? Who? and How? are often difficult, and they're the easy ones generally.

I just don't have answers for many questions that are asked of me. Questions like: "Why did this happen to me?", "Why did my child die?", "Why did my husband leave me?", "Is abortion right?", "Why?" "Why?" "Why?" Questions - no answers! I can laugh-off the childish interrogations, and I can pass others on to the science teacher. But there are far too many that I can't laugh-off or pass-on. I can't answer them either. I can only drop my head, ache in my heart, or shed a tear.

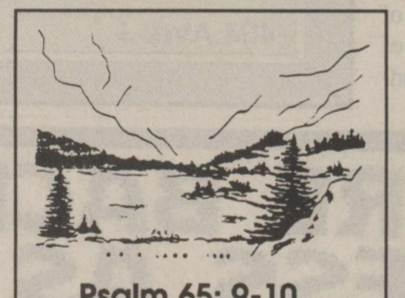

Bill of Rights exhibit begins March 19 at Presidential Museum

A dramatic photographic exhibit depicting the people and events that sparked the Bill of Rights and related amendments will be on view at the Presidential Museum in Odessa beginning March 19.

The Bill of Rights Exhibit celebrates the bicentennial of the passage of the first ten amendments to the U.S. Constitution. Viewers will step into the not-too-distant past and see history in the making through rare photographs, illustrations, and other visual highlights of events bearing directly on our constitutional freedoms.

Brief accompanying text explains some of the controversies surrounding the passage of these amendments, bringing vividly to mind similar issues that confront us today: Why not punish criminals in the same way they treated their victims? Why make an already brutalized victim appear in court to relieve potentially traumatizing events? By becoming re-acquainted with the basic freedoms, guaranteed us under the Bill of Rights, visitors to the exhibit will have these and other concerns satisfied or placed in perspective.

The exhibit will be on display at the Presidential Museum for six weeks beginning March 19. The four major eye conditions leading to blindness are diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, cataracts, and macular degeneration. Early diagnosis and treatment are critical to helping persons experiencing loss of sight. With proper training and counseling, individuals who are losing their sight can continue leading independent and

Parents can act

Parents today are challenged to meet the heavy demands of their own work schedules, in addition to that of their growing family. All too often, parents react to children and their requests in ways that reflect their own feelings of being overloaded.

Having a simple plan of action can help parents respond appropriately, even in times of stress. A simple formula which has proved helpful for many parents is that of ACT.

What's ACT? Just a three-step process. It means to ACKNOWLEDGE feelings, COMMUNICATE limits, and TARGET two choices.

Let's look at an example of how ACT can work. Twelve-year-old Mary comes rushing in an excitedly tells you her new "best" friend has invited her to go shopping in San Angelo this evening.

Step one: Since children need to feel they have been heard, parents need to respond in ways which let children know their feelings are legitimate. For example, the parent might say, "I know how much you want to go to Angelo and how excited you are that Susie asked you to go."

Step two: When parents state the limit and the reasons why the request can't be granted children are more

likely to understand and accept the situation gracefully. Thus, the parent can say, "However, tonight is school night, so you'll need to wait until a weekend or spring break to go shopping in Angelo."

Step three: Offering alternatives which are acceptable and within the limits that can help to "de-fuse" the situation—making the "No" easier for the child to accept. "You can plan to go shopping with Susan on Friday night or Saturday afternoon," gives Mary two acceptable alternatives.

ACT can be used with children of all ages and in most circumstances. When parents practice ACT, they reduce the chances of conflict because they have acknowledged the child's feelings, calmly reminded the child of the limits, and provided the child with two alternatives rather than a flat "No!"

Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale Mar. 14

The Annual Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale is set for March 14 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station 27 miles north west of Rocksprings on Texas 55.

Almost 400 rams from some of the finest Rambouillet flocks in the world are on the test. By the sale day, data will have been collected from the animals on such important traits as breeding soundness, rate of gain and wool characteristics. Only the top 30 percent will be eligible for the sale.

The day begins with an informal inspection of the rams and performance test data in the morning. A "dutch-treat" lunch catered by the Sutton County 4-H Club starts at 11:45 a.m.

A formal program begins at 1 p.m. under the direction of John Allen, Edwards County Extension Agent. Dr. C. A. (Butch) Taylor, Experiment Station superintendent, will discuss the importance of sheep to rangelands of the Edwards Plateau and ways to manage around the bitterweed problem.

Pierce Miller of Ozona and San Angelo, secretary of the American Sheep Industry Association, will report on the group's recent activities. Dr. Maurice Shelton of the Experiment Station in San Angelo and the test's coordinator will talk about breeding for carcass merit.

Discussing the ram test will be Dr. C. J. Lupton, wool and mohair researcher at the San Angelo Experiment Station. Fred Rose of Del Rio, representing the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Association, will present Certified Ram Certificate Awards.

The day will conclude with the sale of performance-tested rams under the direction of Dr. George Ahlschwede, sheep and goat specialist with the Extension Service in San Angelo.

DPS is now testing all currently licensed commercial and bus drivers

The DPS is now testing all currently licensed commercial truck and bus drivers.

All commercial motorists who drive vehicles in excess of 26,000 pounds or transport hazardous materials that require the vehicle to be placarded are required to have a commercial drivers license (CDL) by April 1, 1992. Bus drivers, including school bus and church bus drivers, who drive buses designed to carry 16 or more passengers, including the driver, will also be required to obtain a CDL by the same date.

Exempt from the CDL requirements are farmers, when they are driving within 150 miles of their farm, military personnel, recreational vehicle operators, emergency vehicle operators, and fire fighters when operating fire fighting vehicles or equipment.

Commercial drivers who must carry the new CDLs cannot renew their current licenses due to expire between now and April 1, 1992. They should plan to visit the DPS Driver

License offices for CDL testing as soon as possible and no later than one month before the expiration date.

To ensure that all commercial drivers in Texas who must have the CDLs obtain them in time to avoid penalties, the DPS Troopers have set a special date for CDL testing in this area. The test will be conducted on April 29, 1991, from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the Ozona High School Cafeteria. For applications and details on taking this test contact your local Department of Public Safety Office as soon as possible. Free CDL handbooks are available at all drivers license offices.

Everyone is encouraged to prepare and take advantage of this opportunity to test.

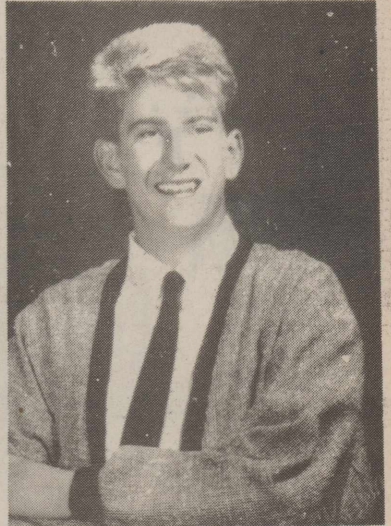

Chamber reps attend hospitality workshop

Two days of intensive training were sponsored by the Texas Department of Commerce, Texas A&M and Southwestern Bell, the creators of the hospitality training program. 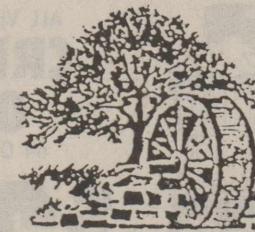

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


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
