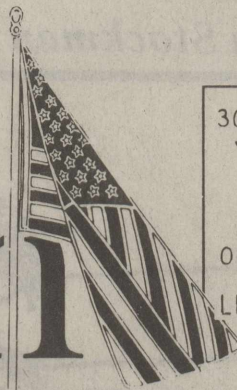

Screening clinic April 17-18

The annual free screening clinic sponsored by Ozona Public Schools will be held April 17 and 18. Screening will be conducted in the areas of hearing, vision, speech and communication, fine motor and gross motor skills and learning abilities.

If your child will be five on or before Sept. 1, 1991, bring him or her to the Ozona Primary School between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Wednesday, April 17.

If your child will be four on or before Sept. 1, 1991, bring him/her between 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. on Thursday, April 18.

Please bring your child's birth certificate, shot records and Social Security number. These will be needed before he can begin school next fall.

The Crockett County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will offer free fingerprinting for each child. A photo of your child may be purchased for \$1 if you would like to have one. This is not required but is offered as a service to the parents.

The screening clinic will help you see how well your child is growing and will help you know what you can do to help your child get ready for school.

Health Fair volunteers and exhibits needed

Community organizations are being asked to volunteer for the 1991 Crockett County Health Fair, slated for Thursday, May 16, at the Civic Center from 1:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M.

"Volunteers are needed to help with registration, snacks for the workers at the fair, and with the hospital and Department of Health booth, among others," said Tedra Ulmer, county extension Agent-Home Economics.

"We are also in the process of contacting community organizations to participate with services and exhibits," said Ulmer. The agent noted letters are going out this week. "If you do not receive a letter, please give our office a call" at 392-2721.

Anyone interested in volunteering for the Health Fair, which is co-

sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Extension Home Economics Committee, Texas Department of Health, and Crockett County Hospital, should also call the Extension Office or go by to sign up.

Specific duties may include taking blood pressures, height and weight measurements, and assisting with publicity distribution, in addition to the other afore mentioned needs.

"Community participation is one of the things which enables our Health Fair to attract service providers from San Angelo and other areas" said Ulmer. This year, she noted, United Blood Services' monthly drive will be held in conjunction with the Health Fair.

Contributions spent wisely says Cancer Society

"Contributions to the American Cancer Society in Texas represent one of the best returns on the dollar that I know of," said Becky Childress, chairman of the American Cancer Society's 1991 educational and fund raising community crusade in Crockett County.

In preparing for the April community crusade, Childress feels it is important for Ozona residents to know how the Society invests their contributions. "We are proud of our fiscal record, and I know our friends and neighbors will be even more willing to give to the American Cancer Society when they learn how well their money is being spent," she said.

The local Cancer Society Residential Crusade will be hosted by the Alpha Alpha Mu Sorority Monday, April 8, in the afternoon.

Contributions raised in 1989-90 will be invested during this fiscal year (September 1, 1990 - August 31, 1991) in Texas as illustrated:

"These expenditures are in line with what contributors are interested

in supporting," Childress said. "And, as these figures show, we are concentrating our efforts on fulfilling our mission to support research, education and services to patients."

"The American Cancer Society last year sponsored research investigations in 10 major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totaling more than \$10.2 million," said Childress. "We are fortunate that so much promising research is taking place here," she said.

"Programs that help people are our priority," Childress added. "We keep a tight control over our administrative costs and keep them within acceptable limits, as this breakdown indicates."

American Cancer Society programs like those that benefit cancer patients (Reach to Recovery, volunteer transportation, medical equipment loans, etc.), help educate the public about cancer prevention and detection (films, pamphlets, exhibits, the Great American Smokeout and this spring's Great American Food Fight Against Cancer), and inform the medical community about advances in cancer treatment and diagnosis are delivered and administered primarily through volunteers.

"Volunteers help maintain these

impressive figures, and volunteers are responsible for the success we've had here in Ozona," Childress said.

Missionaries Larry and Beth Wester of Mexico were the subject of a feature story recently in the San Angelo Standard Times. Wester, son of Nell Wester of Ozona, and his wife have spent the past 2 1/2 years establishing and administering a trade and Bible school in Puerto Escondido. The couple recently began construction on an orphanage and hope to some day build an academic school.

The Westers made a verbal contract in January of 1988 with The Tree of Life Church to have a Bible school in operation in three years. The couple began the work with six months of language training in Guatemala.

Starting from scratch in the jungle involved everything from clearing the land to legally setting up the school with the Mexican government.

At the end of the first year of operation, Arbol de Vida (Tree of Life) graduated seven students. There were eight graduates the second year.

Upon fulfilling their trade school contract last December, the Westers began focusing on the orphanage, The Hope House. Children ages 3 through 14 will be accepted at the orphanage which will house 24 youngsters. At 14, children will have the option to remain and continue school until they are 18.

The Hope House is sponsored by Workman Ministries International and should be open by December of 1991 depending on donations.

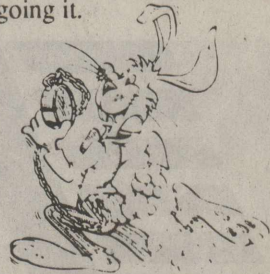
This was the second time the dog had tangled with a porcupine in defense of her food. The first round resulted in more than 2,000 spines being extracted from the dog's face and throat.

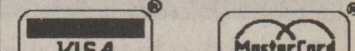

Somewhere in this story there is a lesson about worth. God said, "The first shall be last, and the last shall be first." It's true. Really! I saw it happen the night of the Academy Awards. Mike is one of those "jars of clay" that God speaks through. I saw the stars that night, but Mike Sewell was, by far, the brightest one.

Think about it.

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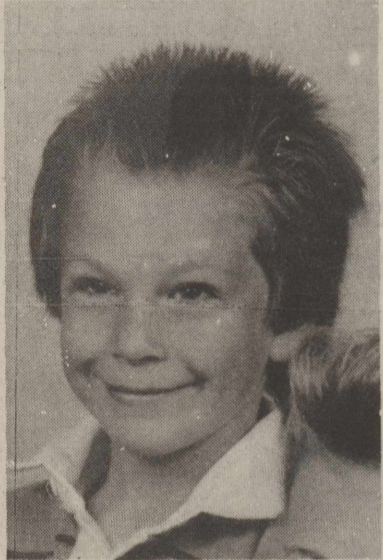

Rankin child facing bone marrow transplant

Trace Gipson is a six-year-old child of Rankin, Texas and if things don't change for him, he won't live to see his 7th birthday. Trace is afflicted with leukemia.

He is in need of an expensive bone-marrow transplant. However, what's lacking right now, even as Trace is undergoing extensive chemotherapy treatments in Cook-Ft. Worth Children's Medical Center, is money.

Lots of it. Trace is the son of Rev. and Mrs. Randy Gipson, pastor of the Faith Assembly of God Church of Rankin and has been in Rankin for only two and one-half years. He has two sisters, Tori, who is eleven, and Trista, who is three. Both of his sisters are compatible for the transplant, but the test results are not back yet as to which one is the best suited to be the donor.

This disease was found the last part of June of 1990, and he has undergone chemo treatments since that time. The treatments he is currently taking will cost \$1500 per quart and he will require five quarts for a total of \$7500. The hospital cost is approximately \$1000 per day.

This last stay in the hospital lasted seven days and after being dismissed, he had to return the next day due to an infection and will be required to stay

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at least another four to five days. He will then have to return to the hospital for another five days of extensive chemo treatment before the transplant can take place.

The family has already undergone several months of these treatments, and before this last stay in the hospital, had a medical bill of \$35,000. However, the real mind-boggling expense will come from the bone-marrow transplant that is to take place in about four weeks. The cost of this surgery is going to run about \$300,000 with the family facing the real dilemma of having to raise \$100,000 before the day of the transplant.

So far, this small community has come up with \$13,700, but there is currently only around \$12,500 left in this trust. This community of only 1,011 people has rallied together once again in the effort of trying to arrange more fund raisers for this cause, but due to the small population, they are now asking for assistance from their neighbors.

"We have got to have help and would appreciate any assistance that can be given at this time of emergency," said the sponsors of the Trace Gipson Fund.

Listed below is information concerning the trust fund that has been set up and also persons available for any information that might be needed concerning this cause.

"Once again we would like to tell you how much we would appreciate any help from our neighbors that might

be possible at this time. Thank you and God bless," said the sponsors.

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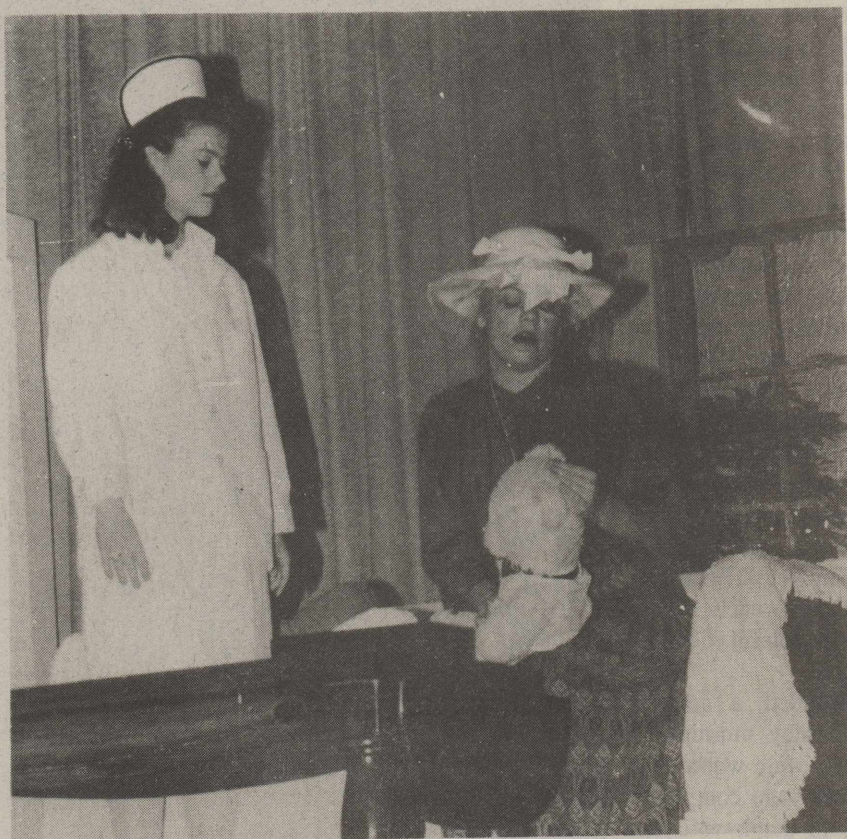
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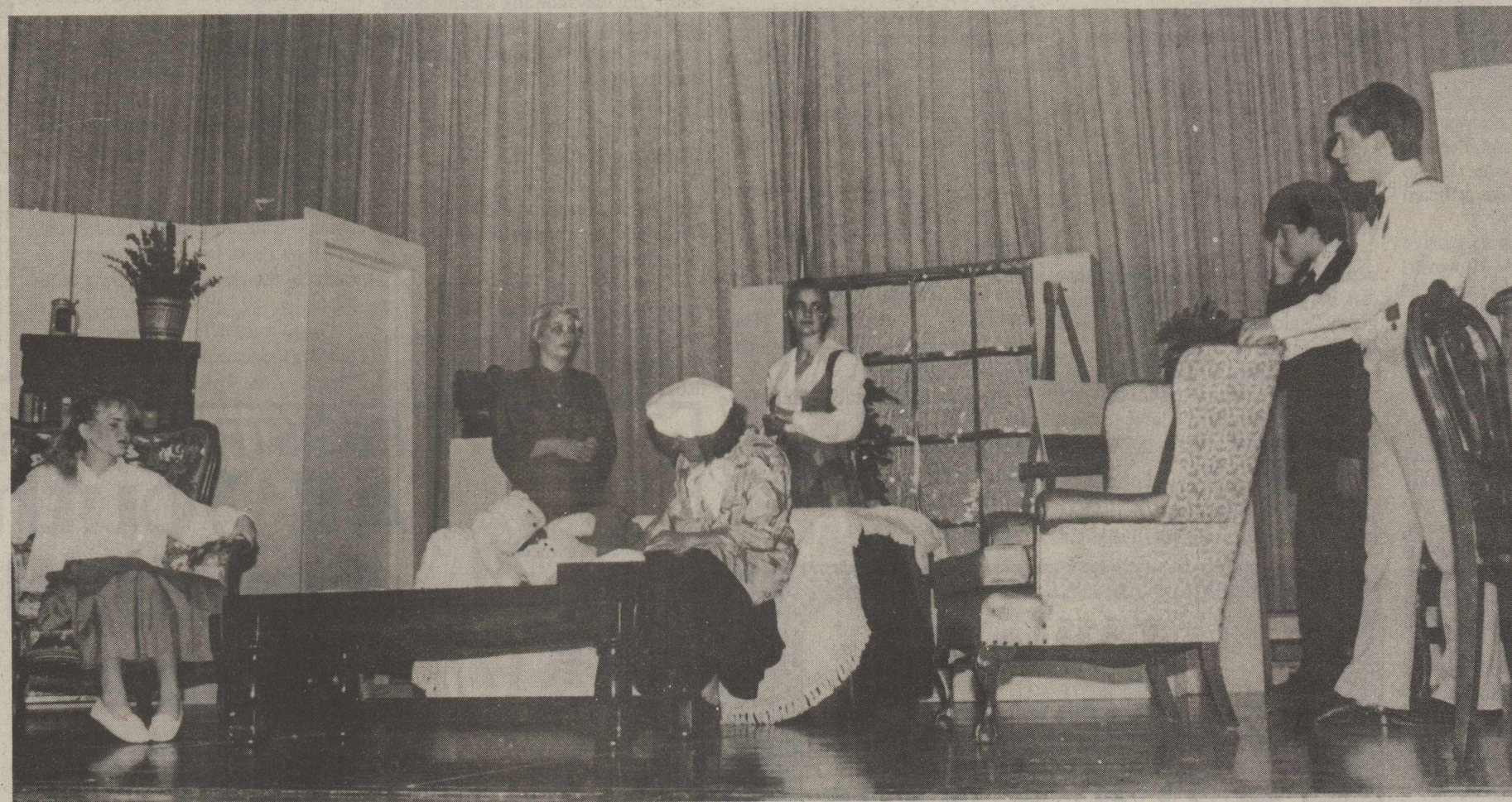

Sharp increases in rabies in SW Texas

Annual veterinarian vaccination drives are having special significance in Texas as a rabies outbreak grinds into its sixth month in the worst flare-up in the state this year.

Uvalde and Edwards counties alone—counties which usually report only 1 or 2 cases per year—reported almost a third of the cases statewide reported in February.

Dr. Catherine Tull, a veterinarian with the Texas Department of Public Health Region 6 office here, said 21 confirmed cases of rabies and more than 20 clinical cases in domestic and feral (wild) animals have been reported in her 21-county region since January. Most of these cases have been in foxes and most were in Uvalde and Edwards counties.

In February alone, 25 cases of rabies were confirmed by the Bureau of Veterinary Public Health statewide. Eight of the cases were in Tull's region.

Four confirmed cases of rabies out of 9 animals tested have been reported in rural animals in Crockett County since January 1, 1991. One skunk, one fox and two stray cats tested positive.

Reagan County which does not have veterinary service has sent the Ozona Veterinary Clinic one stray cat which tested positive.

Coming up second in number of reported cases for January was Region 6 (North Texas) with seven cases reported. The largest number of cases—three—in that region were reported in Denton County. No figures were available by region for February, but Denton County had reported three positive cases in skunks.

Uvalde County reported four cases in January, five in February, and four so far in March, and Edwards County reported two cases in January and February and three thus far in March.

Sutton County—just north of Edwards County but in a different public health region—reported two cases in January and four cases in February.

Rabies is one of the oldest diseases known to man. A highly fatal disease for wild and domesticated animals and man, it affects the central nervous system. The highest incidence is in wild animals, particularly skunks, foxes, bats and racoons, said Dr. Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Rabies is endemic in Texas, with the disease being more prevalent in some counties than in others. Areas of outbreaks change each year and some counties may report no problems at all.

Composite three tournament score totals for the six teams are: Iraan-1197, Ozona "A"-1220, Stanton "A"-1247, McCamey-1446, Ozona "B"-1490 and Coahoma-1524.

Judge nutrition advice before following

Where do you get your nutrition information? I hope it's not from a national periodical where husbands are found to be vampires and 190-year-old women give birth to alien babies. You get the point.

Advice on nutrition has become almost as common as advice to the lovelorn in popular magazines. Most people wouldn't think of experimenting with their health - yet that's just what happens when they indiscriminately follow the advice given in many of these magazines.

The Food and Drug Administration surveyed the nation's newspapers and magazines for one month several years ago - and came up with a total of 435 questionable ads in publications ranging from the smallest of weekly newspapers to multi-million circulation magazines.

But those 435 ads hardly scratch the surface of the true volume of dubious advertising in that period. After all, with more than 10,000 daily and weekly newspaper and general-circulation magazines in the U.S., any such search is going to miss a lot!

Unfortunately, many Americans cling to the mistaken notion that if something's wrong with your body, food either caused it or can fix the problem!

Magical thinking about food is as old as human mythology and is not easily overcome by the relatively new science of nutrition. Our minds may recognize that moderation is the key to a healthy diet, but our hearts are often swayed by the extravagant promises of nutrition extremism.

We need to make our own informed judgements about the accuracy - and usefulness of - nutrition advice. Dr.

Stephen Barrett, board member of the National Council Against Health Fraud and editor of "Nutrition Forum Newsletter" offers a few principles for helping the public distinguish between nutrition facts and fallacies:

--Don't believe anyone who suggests most diseases are caused by faulty nutrition

--Be skeptical of anyone who offers a simple answer to a complex problem. Remember the old tried-and-true maxim: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!

--Don't believe anyone who says that everyone needs vitamin supplements to be sure they get enough. Most people can get all the vitamins they need by eating a varied and balanced diet.

--Be wary of anyone who uses only anecdotes to support a claim. Testimonials don't prove a treatment works. Look for controlled studies.

--Adopt a healthy lifestyle. Eat a balanced diet; maintain a reasonable weight; and exercise appropriately.

If you're concerned about your health and want to take advantage of some free and low-cost testing and good, free information, mark your calendar now for Thursday, May 16, and the 1991 Crockett County Health Fair. It will be held at the Civic Center from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., and there is no charge to attend.

"People who plan to retire this year may want to call about their plans soon," Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently. Upp noted that a 1991 change in the Social Security law may limit the start of benefits to the month the person actually retires, making it more important than it used to be to notify Social Security of plans to retire.

"Depending on their earnings, some people may still be able to get additional benefits by applying for Social Security early in the year, even though they won't be retiring until later in the year," Upp said.

"If we are contacted early in the year, we can look at current earnings and benefit information that can help

you choose the most advantageous time to start your benefits," Upp said.

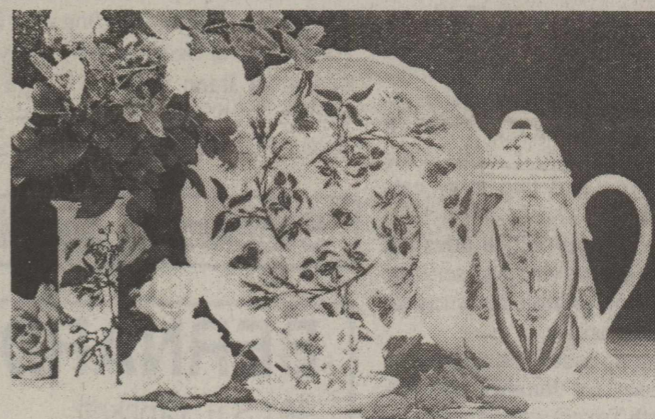

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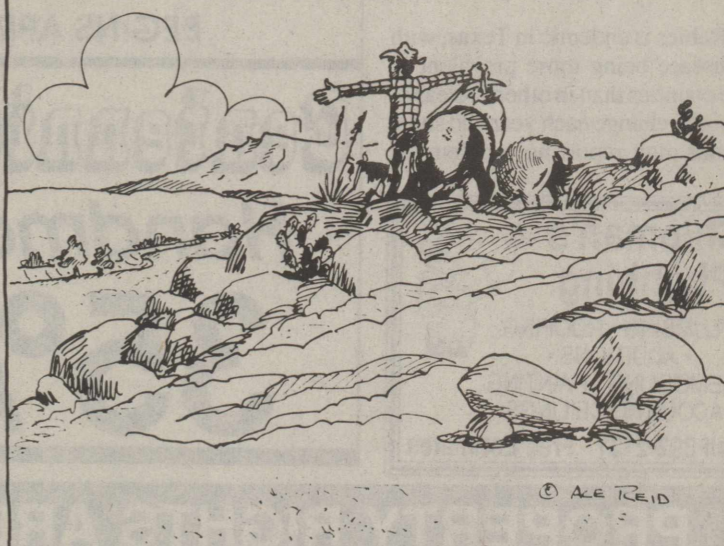

DPS reports violent crime rate up in Texas

The overall major index crime volume in Texas for 1990 dropped 1.3 percent. However, five of the seven crime categories showed increases compared to 1989.

"The index crime total for 1990 in our state was 1,329,339 compared to 1,346,846 for the previous year," said DPS Director Colonel Joe Milner. "Because of a decrease in some property crime, the crime rate declined to 7,825.9 per 100,000 population from 7,926.8 in 1989."

Milner said all of the violent crime statistics went up in 1990.

"Unfortunately, the increases in these four categories amounted to 17.7 percent for murders, 10 percent for rapes, 16.9 percent in the number of robberies, and 15.5 percent for aggravated assaults."

The DPS director said two of the three property crime statistics showed decreases.

"The number of burglaries dropped by 8.1 percent, and thefts had a slight decline of 1.4 percent," Milner observed. "However, motor vehicle thefts continued to climb with a 2.3 percent increase."

Twenty percent of the major crimes investigated by Texas peace officers were cleared last year, the same figure reported for 1989.

The number of arrests in Texas for 1990 were up by 10.5 percent,

totaling 999,940 compared to 905,166 for the previous year. Persons taken into custody for drug-related offenses fell by 13.1 percent, with 62,384 reported last year and 71,800 brought in during 1989.

"DWI arrests increased by 9.5 percent, reaching 112,802 last year compared with 103,008 the year before," Milner pointed out. "We appreciate the many efforts of Texas law enforcement agencies and citizen organizations to address this serious problem. However, it remains the number one factor behind traffic fatalities in this state."

Milner also noted that the number of law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty in 1990 came close to the extremely high number in 1989.

"Sixteen officers died during enforcement duties last year, and 17 lost their lives in 1989," Milner said. "We had hoped the 1990 number would be much lower."

A ten percent increase was noted in the number of assaults on Texas peace officers in 1990. "That number totaled 5,059 last year and 4,580 in the year before," Milner said.

The rates for "demand" MLDA are \$.30 per listing request (after applicable allowances), with a maximum of 10 listing requests per call. The rates for "appointment" MLDA are \$1.00 per minute, with a 15-minute minimum.

The optional services DACC and MLDA are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Those persons who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps will be able to use DACC and "demand" MLDA free of charge. If approved by the commission, DACC and MLDA will be available beginning May 13, 1991. First-year projected revenues for DACC are approximately \$9.6 million. First-year projected revenues for MLDA are approximately \$1.7 million.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

CROCKETT COUNTY WATER CONTROL & IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, P. O. Box 117, Ozona, Texas 76943-0117 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10059-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 500,000 gallons per day from the Main Wastewater Treatment Facilities. The permittee is also authorized to dispose of the treated effluent by irrigation. The plant site is approximately 3,000 feet west of State Highway 163 and approximately 2.5 miles south of Interstate Highway 10 in Crockett County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Johnsons Draw; thence to the Devils River in Segment No. 2309 of the Rio Grande Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge and whether the proposed discharge will cause significant degradation to any high quality waters in the area. The unclassified receiving waters of Johnsons Draw have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 2309 are contact recreation, exceptional quality aquatic habitat, and public water supply. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that effluent limitations for minimum dissolved oxygen concentration have been added and provisions for the disposal of sludge have been made more stringent. The renewed permit has also added application rates not to exceed 4.5 acre-feet/acre/year for the irrigated land. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
