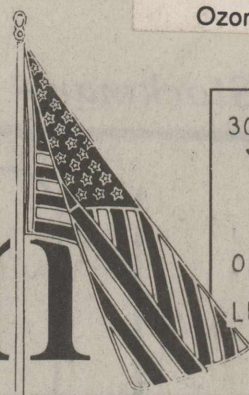

## Ramirez heads for state in 3200 run

Ozona High School junior Mark Ramirez qualified for the state track meet Saturday with a second place

finish during regional competition at Abilene. Ramirez ran a time of 10:17.14 to earn his trip to Austin.

Mark will run at approximately 6:15 p.m. May 11 according to Coach Pete Maldonado.

Ramirez placed fourth in the 1600m run with a 4:41.

Lee Galan also placed in the regional meet with fifth place in the pole vault with a jump of 13'6". The pole vault contest was the best Coach Brad Brevard had ever seen with nine boys jumping over 13' and five over 14'. Brevard coaches the Ozona pole vaulters.

Mike Kennison threw a personal best of 42'11" in the regional shot put, but did not make the state meet.

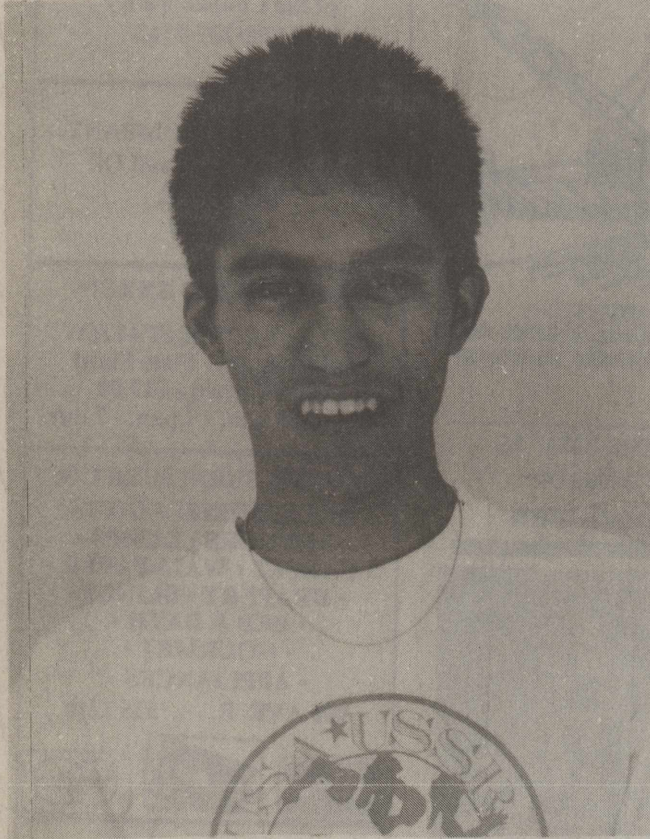
James Tambunga also represented Ozona in the shot put at regional.

This is the third year for Ramirez to qualify for regional in the 1600. He placed fifth in the event as a freshman. He also ran the 3200 to third place as a sophomore.

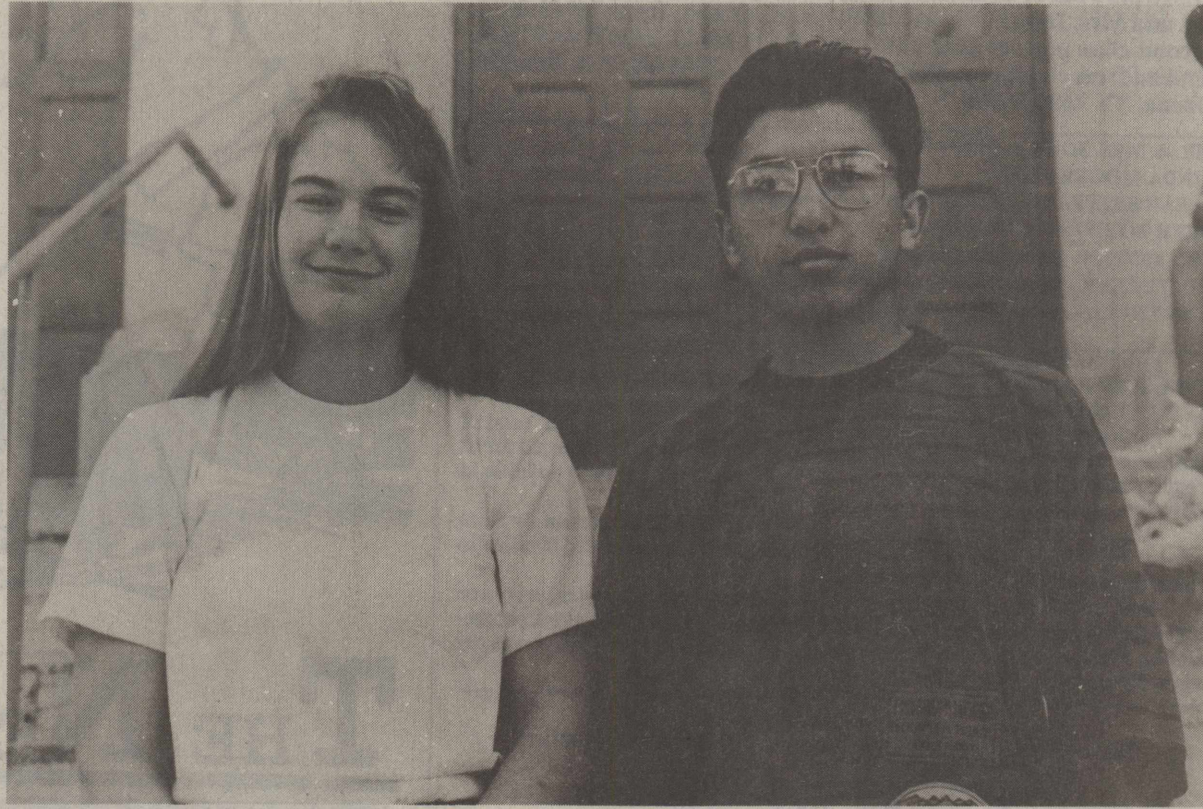
Two years at the state cross country meet earned Ramirez a 22nd place this year and seventh as a sophomore. He has been named to the 1990 Texas Track and Field All-State Team.

Following graduation next year, Mark plans to study to become an optometrist and hopes to continue running while in college. He is currently ranked in the top three of the Junior Class at OHS, is a member of the National Honor Society and has been recognized in Who's Who of American Students. He has been selected to go to Washington, D.C. this summer with the National Young Leaders' of America program. He is a member of the Assembly of God Church and its youth organization.

## Webworms invade Ozona

Webworms have invaded the fruitless mulberry trees in Ozona. If you have a fruitless mulberry tree, then the chances are that you have webworms.

According to Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent, most of the trees he has observed the past few days have webworms in them.

This is the worst webworm situation that the Agent has ever observed in the early spring.

The mild winter and favorable

moisture conditions are mainly responsible for the early occurrence of this pest.

Insecticide applications for control of these webworms include Dipel, Malathion, Diazinon, Cygon, Sevin and Orthene.

Now is the time to control them to prevent the unsightly webs and defoliated limbs in the fruitless mulberry. For more information, call the County Extension Office at 392-2721.

## Local businessman completes Doctorate

James L. Queen of Tedford Jewelry has recently returned from The University of Iowa where he completed the final exam—the defense of his dissertation—for the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Music Literature and Conducting. Dr. Queen completed course work for the degree prior to his becoming Director of Choral Music Activities at Angelo State University in 1985 and has been working on the dissertation for the past four years. The research topic, the Requiem masses of Friedrich Kiel, resulted from an investigation of available music scores in the New York Public Library.

When asked why someone with a doctor's degree in music is in the retail jewelry business, Queen replied, "Artistic endeavor is essentially the same, whether applied to singing or selecting fine china or crystal. As unusual as it may appear on the surface, the motivating force in conducting or playing music, like the motivating force in the jewelry business is helping people experience fine things."

Dr. Queen has just completed his sixth season as Conductor of the San Angelo Symphony Choral. He is also the Choirmaster for Emmanuel Episcopal Church in San Angelo.

Prior to doctoral studies at the University of Iowa, Queen was Director of Choral Music for the Lufkin School District and conducted the choirs at Lufkin High School. A graduate of Baylor University with both

undergraduate and graduate degrees in music education, he began his teaching career in the Waco school district.

Queen is married to the former Valerie Tedford with whose parents they expanded the family business to open Tedford Jewelry in Ozona last October. They moved to Ozona in September and bought the Schneemann home across from the Crockett County Library. An avid gardener, Queen hopes to restore the yard of their home to its former beauty as soon as possible.

## Gordon Wood to speak at athletic banquet

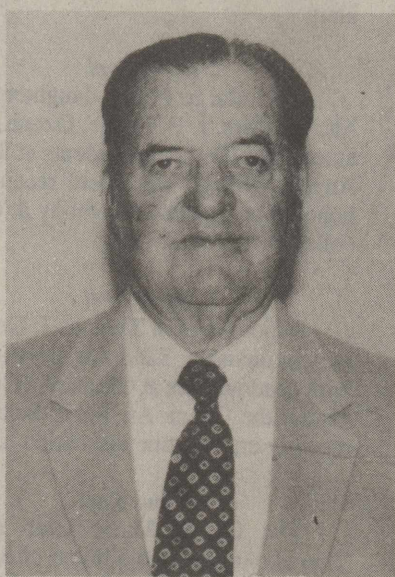
The annual banquet honoring Ozona athletes will be held Tuesday, May 7, at 6:30 p.m. in the civic center. Tickets will be available at the door for \$3.50.

Guest speaker for the event is Gordon Wood, legendary coach from Brownwood. Wood holds a career record of 405 victories, 88 losses, 12 ties; nine state championships and 24 district titles.

During the years Wood coached in Brownwood, 1960-85, his teams recorded 257 wins, 52 losses and seven ties. Seven of his nine state championships were earned here, 1960-65-67-69-70-78-81. His Brownwood teams also earned 15 district titles and shared in two more.

Wood led his Stamford team to two state championships in 1955 and 1956. The Stamford teams played to six district titles during the 1951-57 years of Wood's coaching which included 81 wins, six losses.

His career also includes Victoria 1958-59 12 wins, seven losses, one tie; Winters 1950 seven wins, three losses; Seminole 1947-49 20 wins, nine losses, two ties, one district title; Roscoe 1945-46 17 wins, two losses,

two ties, one district title and share of another; Rule 1941-42 11 wins, nine losses.

Professional achievements and recognitions include: director, vice-president and president of Texas High School Coaches Association, coached North All-Star team to victory in 1958, coached Texas All-Star team to victory at the Oil Bowl in 1977; member Texas High School Coaches Assn. Hall of Honor 1967, chosen four times as Texas high school football coach of

year by Texas Sportswriters Assn., National High School Coach of Year 1979, received distinguished alumni award from Hardin-Simmons University in 1979; elected to Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 1982, inducted into Texas Hall of Champions in Waco, chosen coach of the year by Houston Touchdown Club.

Brownwood's Cen-Tex Stadium was renamed Gordon Wood Stadium in 1980.

## 4-H judging contests held here Saturday

Some 150 area youth participated in the annual Crockett County Wool and Mohair, Range and Plant Identification contests that were held Saturday, April 20, at the Ozona Civic Center and at the Double T Ranch.

The range and plant identification contests were held in the morning with 14 teams competing and the wool and mohair judging contests were held in the afternoon, with 29 teams competing.

The contests are sponsored annually by the Crockett County 4-H Clubs and the Crockett County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The contests are invitational, but also serve as eliminations for District 6 for State 4-H Roundup. Crockett County adult leaders served hamburgers at noon for contestants and coaches.

In the Senior Division of the Wool and Mohair Judging Contest there were 11 teams. Sutton County-1st; Kerr County-2nd; and Kendall County-3rd. Chad Upham was high individual in wool judging.

Reagan County was 1st in wool and Crockett County was 2nd in District VI. Both these teams will go to State 4-H Roundup. Other team members were Terry House and Travis Davidson.

In the Junior Division, Menard had 1st and 2nd; Nolan County was 3rd; there were 10 teams in this division. Lauren Wilkins and Casey Upham participated in the Junior Division.

In the Novice Division, Menard was 1st; Val Verde-2nd; Menard-3rd. In the Senior Division of the range

contest, Sutton County was 1st; Menard-2nd; and Crockett County-3rd. In the District VI division, Crockett County was 1st and 2nd. Matthew Marshall was 4th high individual. Other team members were Angie Marshall and Martha Mayfield.

Senior division of the plant I.D. contest- Menard was 1st, Crockett County was 2nd, and Sutton County was 3rd. Matthew Marshall was 2nd high individual.

District VI Division- Crockett County was 1st and 2nd. Randal Wilson, Robert Bryson, and Fleet Worthington will be representing District VI at the State Roundup in this division.

Junior Division of the Range Contest- Schleicher County-1st; Runnels County-2nd; and Crockett County-3rd. Crockett County team were Jason Hignight and T. J. Young.

Junior Division of plant I.D.- Schleicher County-1st; Crockett County-2nd; and Runnels County-3rd.

Novice Division of range judging- Menard was 1st, Reagan County was 2nd, and Menard County was 3rd.

Plant I.D. contest, Novice Division- Culberson County was 1st, Reagan County was 2nd, and Menard County was 3rd.

The officials for the contest were Dr. Allan McGinty for range and plant I.D. and Dr. Rick Machen and Dr. Frank Craddock for wool and mohair.

Coaches for local teams were Vaden Aldridge for Range and Terry Criner for wool and mohair.

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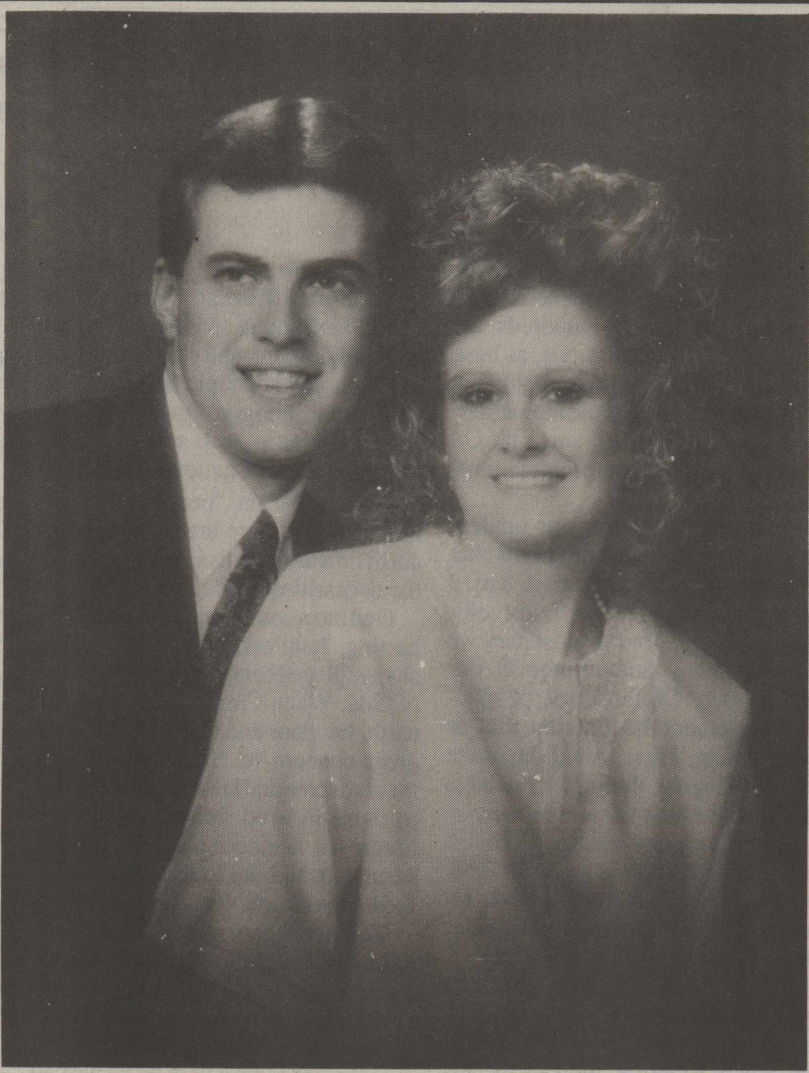

The Asian "boat-people" remind us that there are indeed many adrift on a dangerous sea seeking only the necessities of life.

God has a compassionate heart. The hurting, helpless, and hungry have always played center-stage in the mind of God. When Christ lived upon this earth, the poor and displaced were of great concern to Him. Both Testaments decree that help should be given to those in need. Manna fell in the desert for wandering Israelites, and Jesus touched the loaves and fish to feed a multitude. Yes, God cares!

Complacency is a thief. It robs us of helping those in need. Our good intentions die in the realm of "tomorrow". There is a Lazarus at all of our gates. We might not see him now, but there might come a time when we call for him to bring us a bit of relief.

I don't know the answer, but I do know that we must be compelled to help the world's refugees. The Lord said, "the first shall be last, and the last first". Living in plenteous America, that concerns me.

Are you absolutely certain that if you were to die tonight, you would go to Heaven? Well, what if you did die tonight, and you found yourself standing before God as He asked you, "Why should I let you into my Heaven?" What would be your reply?

None of us like to think about dying, but it is an event every one of us must face someday. The New Testament assures us that it is appointed unto each person once to die and after that comes the judgement (Hebrews 9:27). Are you ready to meet God? 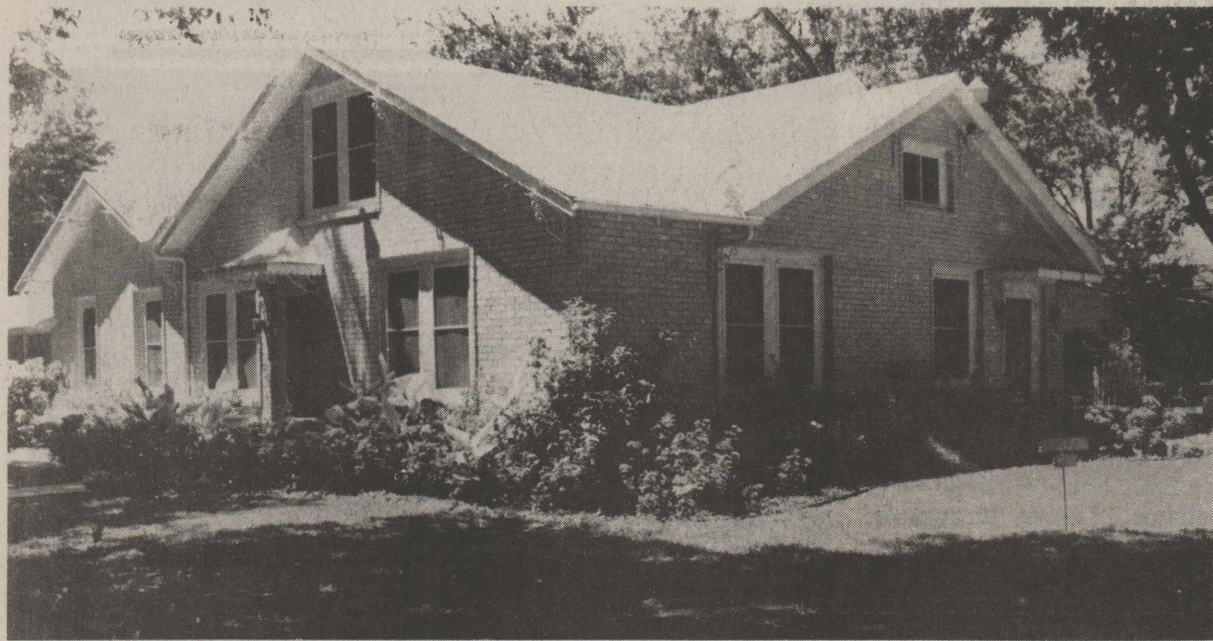

## 1991 Family Land Heritage Program begins registration for farms and ranches

Agricultural Commissioner Rick Perry announced recently that registration for the 1991 Family Land Heritage Program will open May 6 and extend through August 16. "TDA is looking for all the farms and ranches in Texas that have been active and productive for the same family for at least 100 years. We want to recognize the families who have provided us with farm and ranch products as a matter of long-term tradition," Perry said. The Family Land Heritage Program was created by the Texas Department of Agriculture in 1974 to honor farms and ranches throughout Texas for maintaining continuous

agricultural production for a century or more. Since the program's inception, more than 2,500 properties in Texas have been registered. The program's basic requirements are: the land must have been agriculturally productive and owned by members of the family for 100 years or more; a minimum \$50 per year income for a farm or ranch of 10 acres or more or \$250 minimum income for those less than 10 acres; and immediate family members must actively manage and direct the everyday operation of the farm or ranch. If all of the land has ever been rented to someone outside the family it will not qualify.

Applications must be certified by the county judge of the county in which the land is located, and supporting documents must accompany the application when it is presented to the county judge for certification. The Texas Department of Agriculture is the final judge of eligibility. The honorees will receive a certificate in the name of the property at the annual ceremony held in Austin. Those who feel they meet the basic requirements and wish to apply may obtain an application from their county judge, county historical commission chairperson, the nearest TDA district office, or by writing to: Family Land Heritage Program, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

## Letter from Terry and Patti Racher

Dear Family and Friends, It's been a long time since we've sent a newsletter and a lot of changes have taken place. Let me try to catch you up on all the news. It's been a long hard struggle for Patti and I in this fight with cancer. It was a year in March since she had her surgery. After surgery, she went through six months of chemotherapy. That was a real roller coaster ride. After six months of treatments the doctor said he would recommend palliative radiation to kill the pain, but there wasn't anything else he could do. Patti has been in Houston over 7 long weeks. Because we are still residents of Texas, and M.D. Anderson Hospital is a Cancer Research Center, the treatments will be initially without cost. Even with the treatments being free, it is quite expensive for Patti to stay in Houston while having the treatments. We're trusting the Lord to provide the needed expenses as He always has. The doctors are saying she will have to be there for at least another 10 weeks. Right now we have just enough finances to last us for 4 or 5 weeks. WE NEED YOUR HELP. If you feel led by the Lord to assist in our expenses, it would be greatly appreciated. Please pray with us about this need. Please pray for Karen as she lives out her commitment in front of her unbelieving family. Thanks be to each and everyone of you for all your prayers and support through the years. We are truly blessed to serve the Lord in this foreign land and He has abundantly blessed us with a wonderful "state side" support group. Thank you for your faithfulness. God bless each and everyone of you with His best gifts.

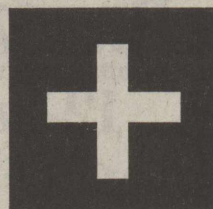

## Local organization receives funding to assist homeless

Governor Ann Richards announced this week that the Texas Department of Community Affairs has funded the Tom Green County Community Action Council \$20,475 to assist in the prevention of homelessness in the local area.

The organization is one of 55 across Texas that TDCA has chosen to receive assistance.

The counties in the service area of the community action council include Crockett, Kimble, Reagan, Sterling, Tom Green, Concho, Irion, Menard, Schleicher and Sutton.

The funding is part of the \$2,055,737 Emergency Community Services Homeless Grant Program awarded to TDCA in February by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The program provides a variety of services aimed at the assistance and

prevention of homelessness in the local community.

Specifically, it seeks to prevent potential homeless situations through shelters and temporary assistance with bills, such as rent and utilities.

TDCA withheld \$500,000 of the grant to be distributed as performance awards later in the contract year.

The awards will be distributed based on criteria which may include planned performance versus actual performance, cost per client served, types of activities and assistance provided an amount of total grant spent on direct services.

TDCA was established by the Legislature in 1971 to assist Texas communities in achieving solutions to economic and social problems and to improve the effectiveness of their local government.

## Lloyd Bentsen supports Texas highways

As we develop America's highways, we have to make sure Texas isn't left by the side of the road.

For 35 years Texans have contributed more than their fair share to the development of our national highway system. Money paid in federal gasoline taxes goes into the Highway Trust Fund and is used to finance the federal highway program which allocates money to individual states. But Texas receives much less than it contributes to that fund.

In past years Texas has received as little as 64 cents in federal highway funds for every dollar it contributes to the Highway Trust Fund. At the same time, some states have received as much as \$2.50 in federal funds for the dollar they paid.

In 1982 I pushed legislation through Congress that made sure each state gets back at least 85 percent of the funds it contributes in federal highway taxes. I later had to amend my 85 percent guarantee to close a loophole that was allowing some of our money to escape. Since the Bentsen amendment went into effect, Texas has received \$2 billion more in highway funds than it would have under the old law.

But the Surface Transportation bill unveiled by the Administration earlier this year would remove our 85 percent minimum allocation from the Highway Trust Fund. It's not the first time the Administration has opposed that 85 percent provision. As in 1982, I will once again try to change their thinking to make sure Texas gets back at least 85 percent of its contributions.

American economic competitiveness depends to a great extent on our transportation system's ability to move people and goods quickly and efficiently. Our highways are the bloodlines of our economy. Clogged routes and arteries are as damaging to American economic health as they are to a body's health.

Today our highways are having trouble keeping pace with our expanding commerce. Sixty-five percent of peak-period traffic on city highways and 42 percent of travel on urban roads occurs under congested conditions. In addition to wasting time and energy, the motor vehicle emissions produced in these traffic jams are the leading cause of urban air pollution.

The prospect of a free trade agreement with Mexico heightens the need to develop the Texas highway system. More goods traded between the United States and Mexico pass across the 889 mile Texas border than through any other state. If our bridges and highways can't accommodate the increased flow of commerce, many of the benefits that would come from such an agreement could get held up in traffic.

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## Crockett County remits \$7,128.61 in mixed drink taxes for Oct., Nov. and Dec. of 1990

State Comptroller John Sharp Tuesday sent checks totaling \$11.7 million to 219 counties and 446 cities that tax mixed drink sales.

The checks represent the counties' and cities' share of the state's 14 percent mixed drink tax collected during October, November and December of 1990.

Sharp said that the state collected \$56.6 million in mixed drink taxes during the fourth quarter of 1990, up 23 percent from \$46 million in 1989's fourth quarter.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission. City and county tax rebates are sent out quarterly by Sharp's office.

## Local teacher aides attend computer workshop

Lubbock was the location for one of the Josten's Learning Corporation Spring Workshops and two computer lab attendants from Ozona attended. Julia Homes from the primary school and Susie Sohl from the intermediate school spent Monday and Tuesday, April 22nd and 23rd, with about 150 other lab attendants, teachers, and administrators from 25 or so West Texas cities and communities sharing information and ideas.

The inspirational and informative guest speaker was Dr. Harry Bohan, who opened the sessions with math teaching tips laced with rhyming humor entitled "Developing that K-12 Feeling in Mathematics." He gave an alarming statistic to ponder: there are currently 1800 more math vocabulary words in the third grade than words found on the reading vocabulary list. Stressing the need to combine these vocabulary teaching efforts, Dr. Bohan enhanced the old math words with memory aids that contain rhyming, alliteration, and "catch phrases". An example of a memorable phrase is his use of a "Free Ride"—Use what you already know

to make solving a problem easier.

To complete the first day, there were two more sessions on TAAS testing and Tech Tips. The Josten's compact disk contains an official version of the TAAS tests for grades 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11. Most of the handouts for correlating the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills and Objectives with the enforcement lessons on the Josten's disk are already in use by Ozona, as we had requested and received a special TAAS workshop put on by our Josten's consultant for the January 14th teacher planning day. Our personal consultant from the San Antonio District had provided the Ozona schools with the new updated version of the Josten's program within the first week it became available in Texas with the TAAS addition, and has continued to keep us supplied with all the available correlation and operation manuals. This workshop showed how to better utilize these materials.

The advice from the technician for the Lubbock Area was rather brief and related that the minor problems encountered in the new version of the

disk would soon be corrected with an updated and repaired disk. He provided the lab attendants with eight technical handouts in order to better combine the interaction of the IBM Novell Network and the versatility of the Josten's Network.

Climb Every Mountain and Cooperative Learning completed the second day of these high energy sessions—motivation and group stimulation make activities from both of these sessions useful in the lab, classroom, or as a working unit. Mrs. Holmes and Mrs. Sohl walked through a simulated unit of research. They tied classroom activities on Indians into reading comprehension stories (excerpts from books on Indians) and lessons in the computer session. The instructor for Josten's Learning Corps, provided the teachers and lab attendants with a folder brimming with notes, sample lessons, and award ideas to bring home to share on how Cooperative Learning can be put together, the benefits to even the slowest child in the classroom, and the motivation factors for teacher/child/parents.

## 1991 Veterans Benefits Handbook available

One of the federal government's all-time best-selling publications, "Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents," has been updated for 1991 and is now available from the U.S. Government Printing Office.

Published by the Department of Veterans Affairs, the 92-page handbook describes such VA benefits as medical care, education, compensation, pension, life insurance, home loan guaranty, vocational rehabilitation, and burial assistance. It also explains the eligibility requirements for each program and outlines claims procedures.

The handbook, which sells for \$2.50, includes special sections on veterans benefits administered by other federal agencies, including the Department of Defense and Labor. VA advises consumers that the hand-

book is sometimes reprinted, with few or no changes, and sold by nongovernment related firms for considerably higher prices.

Addresses and phone numbers of all VA offices, medical centers, national cemeteries, Vietnam veteran counseling centers and other VA facilities are listed by state.

"Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents" ranks fourth in total sales of publications by the U.S. Government Printing Office. More than two million copies have been sold.

## National Drinking Water Week May 5-11, 1991

There's a lot more to drinking water than meets the eye is the slogan for National Drinking Water Week May 5-11, 1991.

"America's drinking water is the best on earth. It's not that way naturally," says John Daniel, chairman of the 1991 National Drinking Water Week Coalition. "Providing safe drinking water is becoming increasingly complex, and the public needs to be better informed to prepare for making some essential personal and public decisions."

In an effort to educate the public about drinking water, the coalition shares the following water facts:

There is the same amount of water on Earth today as there was three billion years ago.

Three percent of the water on Earth is freshwater and only one percent is available for human consumption.

Sixty-six percent of a human being is water.

Seventy-five percent of the human brain is water.

Seventy-five percent of a living tree is water.

You could survive about a month without food, but only five to seven days without water.

On the average, each American uses about 160 gallons of water a day at a cost of 27 cents.

Bottled water may cost up to 1000 times more than municipal drinking water and may not be as safe.

Two-thirds of the water used in an average home is used in the bathroom.

Typically four to six gallons of water are used for every toilet flush.

On the average, a person uses two gallons of water to brush his or her teeth each day.

A 10-minute shower uses about 55 gallons of water.

A leaking faucet can waste up to 100 gallons of water a day.

The average person spends less than one percent of his or her total personal expenditure dollars for water, waste water, and water disposal services.

There are about 60,000 community water suppliers in America.

Public water supplies must meet or exceed Environmental Protection Agency standards. Many public water supplies consistently supply water that is much better than the minimum standards.

The Amendment to the Safe Drinking Water Act in 1986 increased the number of contaminants to be regulated from 26 to 83 and expanded EPA's enforcement authority.

If a drinking water supplier violates any federal standard, the utility by law must tell the customer.

Current water treatment methods are designed to make drinking water clear and to kill germs.

The pipes that carry drinking water from treatment plants to homes are regularly cleaned.

It takes about 39,000 gallons of water to produce the average domestic auto, including tires.

It is not safe for hikers and backpackers to drink water directly from remote streams.

One gallon of gasoline can contaminate approximately 750,000 gallons of water.

You can help prevent pollution of drinking water sources by carefully disposing of the chemical products you use in your home.

An acre of corn contributes more to humidity than a lake of the same size.

## Ozonan part of top Air Force group

S/Sgt. Robert G. Maldonado is a member of a disaster preparedness division selected as best in the Air Force for the second time since 1986. Maldonado, a member of the U.S. Air Force for almost 15 years, and others of the division, working under the 96th Combat Support Group, recently learned of the 1991 selection.

Winning is nothing new for the Dyess AFB division. The disaster preparedness team won three awards at Strategic Air Command level in March of 1991. They were selected for SAC's Best Installation Program award along with winning the top Disaster Preparedness Officer and Noncommissioned Officer.

According to Capt. Steven Willoughby, chief of 96th CSG Disaster Preparedness, it takes a real team effort plus another key ingredient to win at Air Force level. Willoughby was quoted in the Dyess AFB newspaper, *Peacemaker*, as saying "effort is a big part, but I have found that attitude is the main difference. I have never seen such positive and affirmative attitudes as I have witnessed with this group of people. Good attitudes are what made us the best."

The 11-man division is responsible for initial and refresher chemical warfare training, specialized team training, and emergency response planning.

"You can imagine the workload we experienced during Desert Shield preparation. We provided extra effort to make sure our deploying troops were better than 'just' prepared, they were 'better prepared,'" Cpt. Willoughby said. In addition to this, 50 percent of the division also were deployed to support Desert Storm."

The award will be accepted by Cpt. Willoughby in May at Eglin AFB, FL. He will also be recognized as Air Force's runner-up for the Outstanding Disaster Preparedness Officer.

Maldonado is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Maldonado of Ozona.

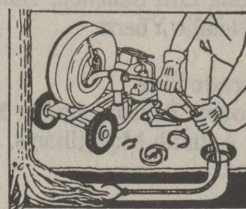

## 4-H'ers enjoy clothing tour in San Angelo Livestock judging and rifle teams do well in district

4-H'ers and adult leaders enjoyed a 4-H clothing tour to San Angelo on Saturday, April 27.

Members participating in the tour were Lauren Wilkins, Robin Conner, Jennifer Usener, Susie Hester, Ruby Tambunga, Kim Weddle, Ky Montgomery, Jo Lynn Vannoy, Whitney Vannoy, Katharine Durham, Adrienne Dickerson and Steffy Sutton.

Parents accompanying the group were Nancy Vannoy, Carmen Sutton, and Linda Usener, in addition to County Extension Agent Tedra Ulmer.

The group began their journey with a trip through the wool and mohair lab at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center north of the city. They learned that the center does testing for individual producers as well as for ongoing research projects. They saw a scouring train, combing and spinning machines, an electron microscope used to measure fiber diameter, and a new computerized system for fiber measurement.

They also were able to compare wool, mohair and cashmere with Angora rabbit fibers, and learned the steps in processing wool, mohair, and other fibers.

The group then traveled to the Cutting Corner for a lesson on sewing machines and pattern/fabric selection. Senior 4-H member Steffy Sutton explained the steps in choosing a pattern and fabric, then pairs of 4-H'ers went through the steps of selecting a pattern and compatible fabric.

Lunch at Shakey's proved to be a real treat, followed by a visit to the Carriage Boutique for a quick lesson on accessories. The prom dresses proved to be a real attraction!

Following the Carriage Boutique, the 4-H'ers went to Sunset Mall, where they had a short overview of the consumer buying project, then divided into teams, compared three garments, and filled out consumer buying worksheets just as they would in the project. Because of their superior performance in this area, each youngster will receive a special surprise in the mail soon.

At the conclusion of the consumer buying exercise, the 4-H'ers learned about opportunities related to the clothing project from senior 4-H'er Katharine Durham, who is co-chairman of the state 4-H Teen Fashion Board.

She explained both boys and girls

may complete either buying or sewing projects and can compete for prizes and scholarships in local, district and state fashion shows. They may also compete in record book categories such as clothing and fashion revue for scholarships and the chance to model in the National 4-H Fashion revue at National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Or, 4-H'ers may put together a method demonstration or illustrated talk. In 1990, Crockett County Sr. 4-H'er Tamie Reagor won the clothing educational activity at State 4-H Roundup with her talk on mohair and received a sewing machine worth \$400.

Durham also noted this year's 4-H clothing Camp in June at the Texas

4-H Center in Brownwood and the trip she will be taking in August to the Southern Region Textile Symposium in North Carolina.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.

Two teams of 4-H members represented Crockett County this weekend in district competition at Big Spring and Crane.

The junior livestock judging team of Tara Wilkins, Casey Upham, Lynne Haire and Mason Wilkins was third in their contest out of 10 teams. They also captured third place in oral reasons and in the cattle judging division.

### Growing turf in shade is perennial problem

Shade is desirable in the landscape, but it is the No. 1 problem in growing turf grass.

"Many people just do not understand that grasses do not do as well in shade as they do in full sunlight," said Dr. Richard Doble, turf grass specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "There are a lot of situations where you just can't grow grass in the environment that you have."

"Environmental changes caused by shade have a major effect on grass," Doble said. "Reduced light, less extreme temperatures, increased humidity, restricted air movement, competition from trees, increased disease problems and shallow root systems are all products of shade."

Additionally, grass in shade has less ability to use nitrogen, less photosynthetic activity, less growth, less wear tolerance, more susceptibility to preemergent herbicides and less tolerance to cold.

"The problem is not fertilizer or water, it is light," Doble said. "To grow turf in the shade, you must have a shade-tolerant grass."

Bermuda grass and buffalo grass have little shade tolerance. San Augustine is probably the most shade-tolerant warm season grass, followed closely by centipede and zoysia. Tall fescue, a cool season grass, will grow in moderate to heavy shade where San Augustine fails.

For any success at growing grass in filtered shade, Doble suggests these practices:

1. Start with a grass variety suitable for shade
2. Raise the mowing height
3. Water deep and infrequently
4. Apply nitrogen moderately in fall and spring
5. Avoid high nitrogen applications in the summer

In many heavily shaded areas, it is best to use ground cover plants or other landscape materials rather than wasting time and money trying to go against nature, Doble says.

### Check household pets, livestock for screwworms

With warmer, humid spring weather at hand, livestock producers and owners of household pets should check their animals frequently for wounds and possible worm infestations.

Fly populations normally increase during this season. Blowflies and other species become more active. They deposit their eggs that form young larvae along such damp areas as animal wounds.

Although the United States and Mexico have both been declared free of the screwworm — a costly insect pest that feeds on warm-blooded animals including humans — constant vigilance must be practiced to remain free of the problem.

"This became very apparent in December of 1989, when a U.S. soldier who was injured in Panama and infested with screwworms there, returned to a San Antonio hospital with larvae still in the wound," Medial diagnosis proved it was a screwworm case.

The soldier was treated and dismissed from the hospital.

"The problem was that some of the larvae — not sent for official identification to an accredited laboratory — was discarded with other hospital medical trash, later compacted and dumped at an area landfill," Hoelscher said.

To head off a possible outbreak of screwworms around San Antonio, the Joint U.S.-Mexico Screwworm

Eradication Commission sent a number of plane loads of sterile screwworm flies to treat the entire South Texas area, the entomologist explained.

Although there is no known threat of re-infestation at present, owners of livestock and pets should check their animals frequently for infested wounds.

If worms are found in wounds, representative samples of about 10 worms each should be collected and sent in a container of alcohol or formaldehyde to an accredited laboratory, such as the federal identification lab at Mission, for positive identification. Mailing kits are available from county Extension Service offices or the Mission lab.

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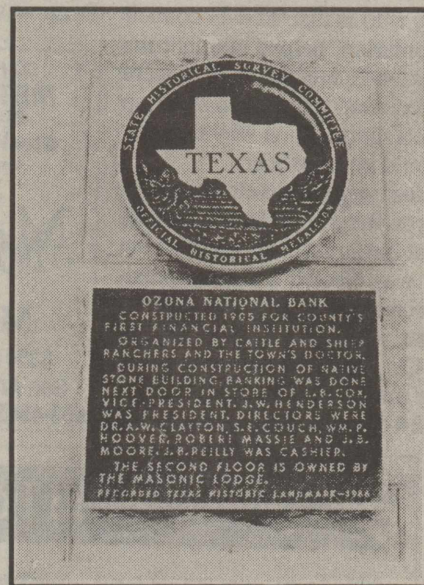
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
