Board votes not to reinstate dismissed care center employee

A part-time care center employee who was dismissed earlier in the week spoke to board members at their May 9 meeting regarding reasons given for her termination and the way it was done. Following statements by Mrs. Helen Kenison during the "comments from the audience" portion of the meeting, she was asked to talk with the board in executive session. No action was taken regarding the matter once the board returned to open session.

Following a called meeting of the board May 13 to discuss personnel, board members voted against reinstating Mrs. Kenison.

Board members did vote on May 9 to accept and approve a pay scale by grade for hospital and care center employees after returning to open session. The scale, developed from information from salaries paid in Big Lake, Sonora, Eldorado and Iraan resulted in approval of an increase in pay for six registered nurses and one insurance clerk/coder. Directors of nurses will not receive a salary increase unless they are functioning as nursing staff.

A bid by Taylor Made Ambulance company in the amount of \$54,725 was recommended for ac-

ceptance by Bob Denson, administrator. Board members voted to accept the bid, which was also recommended by Doug Meador, EMS coordinator. The amount budgeted for the ambulance is \$58,000.

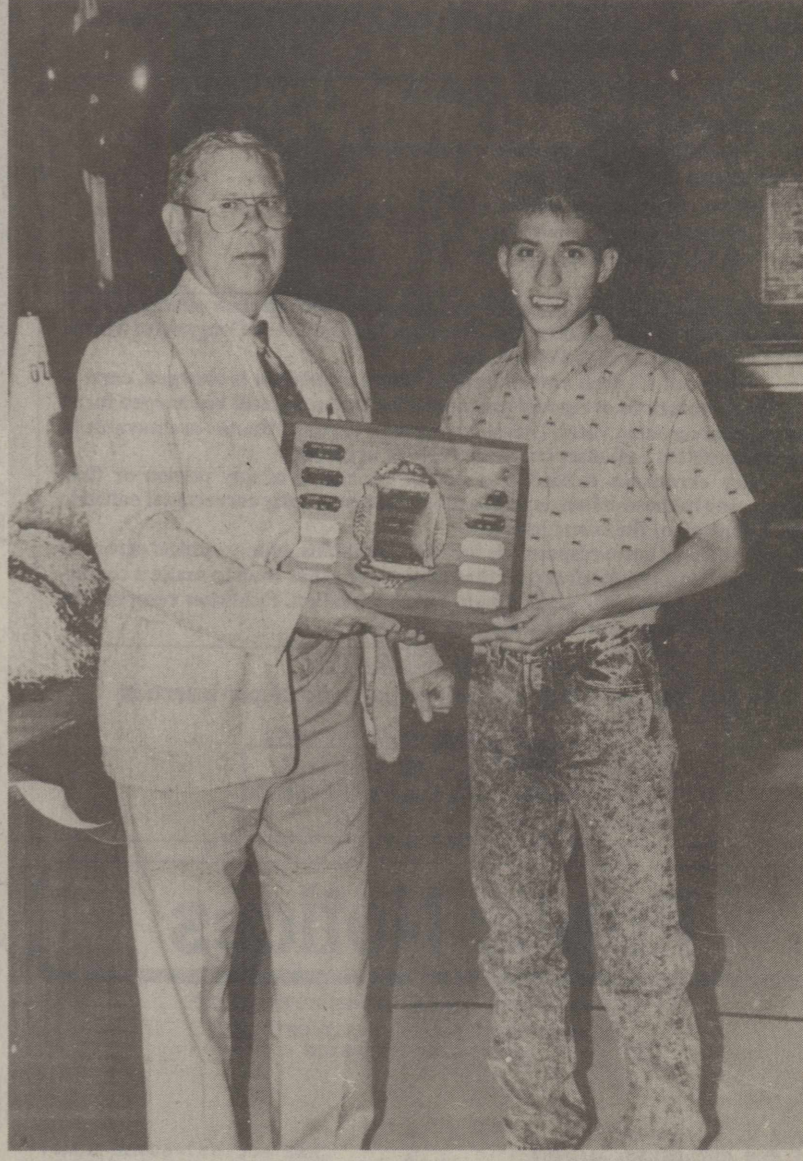
The board also voted to renew maintenance contracts on a copier and two pieces of laboratory equipment.

During a financial report by the administrator, the board learned that during the February-April period, the hospital/care center is \$46,000 under the budgeted loss amount.

Denson showed carpet and molding samples for a renovation project. He is to get prices for tile replacement for 10 patient rooms and carpet for the hall, lobby, conference room and nurses' station so renovations may be planned.

The board was told that Dr. Marcus Sims will be in his new office in the Professional Building beginning May 20.

The board approved the following clarifications regarding scholarship recipients: scholarships begin when the student is in concentrated study (medical subjects), and pay back required is one year of work at the local facility for every six months or \$1,800 of scholarship money received.

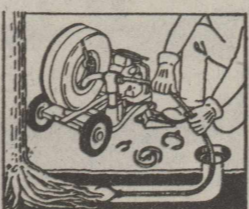

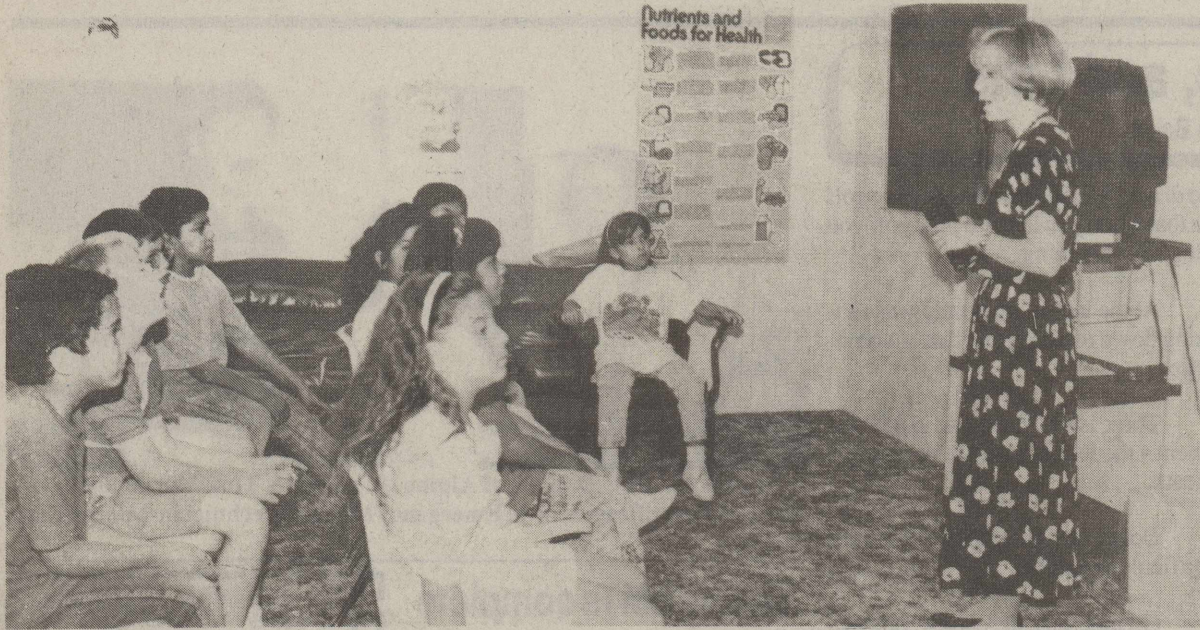

Volunteers in training for family shelter work

Ozona volunteers for the Institute of Cognitive Development Family Shelter program will be ready to assist by May 18 according to Leslie Perry, outreach coordinator. The shelter program sets up safe havens in each community of a 14 county area and trains volunteers to tell women about the San Angelo shelter and resources available.

Volunteers are scheduled so that someone is always on call from a list kept at sheriff's offices. Although meetings between the abused client and volunteer take place at the jail, victims do not have to file a charge, and no report will be made, Ms. Perry said.

To arrange for help, victims should call the hotline number, 1-800-749-8631. The shelter then contacts the local sheriff's office to arrange for a volunteer to meet the victim if necessary. Someone from San Angelo can usually come to pick up those needing shelter if the call is

received before 8 p.m. Anyone in immediate danger should contact the sheriff's office first, Ms. Perry stressed.

If shelter is needed during the night, the victim and volunteer are escorted by a deputy to the local safe haven until transportation to San Angelo can be arranged.

Commissioners review airport master plan

Commissioners reviewed and discussed an airport master plan Monday night. The plan, which was presented by Mark Orbeck of West Texas Consultants, is a step in the process of applying for grant money for airport improvements.

Earlier in the day, the court reviewed a Special Warranty Deed drafted by Double T Ranch deeding airport land to the county. Judge Kathryn Mayfield was asked to contact Jimmie Thompson regarding the deed.

Attorney Al Elliott of Sonora, representing Erby Chandler, and James P. Boldrick, a Midland attorney representing Mrs. Ema Adams, met with

the court to discuss a portion of road commissioners voted March 25 to include as county road.

No changes were made in the previous decision.

Monday the court voted that the road east from Highway 163 through the Adams, Johnson and Savell Ranches to the Sutton County line be considered county road by implied dedication. The road will be maintained by the county.

A large number of interested landowners were present for the road discussion portion of the meeting.

- purchase of a \$400 tack strip for attaching decorations in the main room of the civic center
- purchase of a venthood for the civic center on a bid of \$3,500
- purchase of an ambulance on a bid of \$54,725

-as pool managers Sarah Hignight and Refugio Chipman with pools to be kept open after school starts on weekends through Labor Day

-purchase of three radar units requested by DPS

-resolution withdrawing from 911 participation agreement for Texas Association of Counties Unemployment Fund

-engagement of audit firm for statements of cash receipts and disbursements for year ending 12-31-90

-acceptance of a proposal from Allison and Associates to formulate a redistricting plan for Crockett County

-appointment of Jim House as representative for rural rail district

Fatal I-10 accident

A Baytown man was killed in Crockett County May 11 in a one vehicle accident two miles east of Ozona. Dead at the scene was David Lopez Contreras Jr., age 27.

Injured in the accident were Gonzalo Hernandez Lopez, 33, of Highlands, Joe Cornell, 20, of Baytown, the driver, Juan Jose Huerta, 33, of Baytown, and Antonio Guerrero Perez, 29, of Pasadena.

Huerta and Perez were treated at Crockett County Hospital and released. Lopez and Cornell were transferred to Angelo Community Hospital in San Angelo. Lopez was reported to have a dislocated shoulder and Cornell was treated for two broken legs.

The accident occurred when the pickup driven by Huerta ran off an I-10 overpass and fell 25 feet to an access road.

Reports indicate Huerta was eastbound when he apparently fell asleep at the wheel. The vehicle went over the guard rail and ran off the overpass.

Blood Drive May 16 at Civic Center

Ozona will conduct a blood drive from noon until 6 p.m. Thursday, May 16, at Crockett County Civic Center. All healthy persons over age 17 are invited to give blood during the drive to help patients in this community. The drive will be held in conjunction with the Health Fair going on at the same time.

Blood is one of the doctor's most valuable resources, and many people are alive today because blood was available when they needed it. In this area, 65 blood donations are needed each month to meet patients' needs. United Blood Services, the area's nonprofit community blood provider, relies entirely on volunteer donors to help maintain a constant, sufficient blood supply. Blood comes from only one source - healthy people who are willing to give of themselves.

"Donating blood is safe, simple and satisfying," said Paula Kenner, community relations director for United Blood Services. The body contains about 10 to 12 pints of blood, and, since the body constantly manufactures blood, the amount given is quickly replaced.

The donation process takes only 30 minutes, with about five to seven minutes for the actual donation. First, a medical history is taken. Temperature, blood pressure, pulse and blood iron levels are checked. After the blood is collected, it is typed and tested for diseases that might be transmitted to those receiving transfusions. This procedure benefits the donor as well as the patient, because, if any of the tests indicate a need for medical attention, the donor is referred to his or her personal physician.

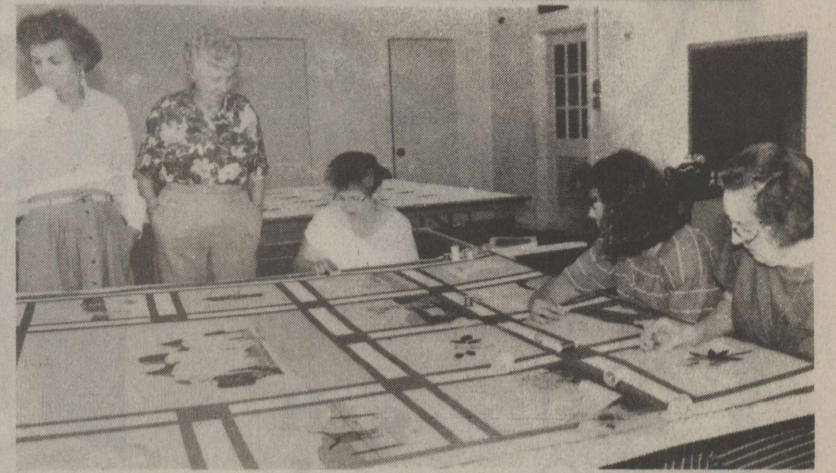
Persons interested in trying out for narrator spots in the centennial pageant are asked to attend try-outs Monday, May 20, at 7 p.m. in the high school auditorium.



Dr. Word, who lives and practices in Lubbock says: "No one knows how we will win. It may be by some exotic genetic engineering, or a new drug supporting our immune system. Steady gains in early diagnosis, removal of more carcinogens like tobacco, improved surgery or new innovations in chemotherapy may lead the way. Similar to the latest weapons of war, our new high-tech tools in diagnosis are now faster and more accurate. In addition, they are increasingly sensitive to early disease, easier on the patient and more readily avail-

able on an outpatient basis."

The doctor continued by defining some of the most important cancer detection methods used by the medical system in Lubbock. Mammograms, ultrasound, CT, fine needle biopsy, nuclear medicine, MRI and fluoroscopy are all mentioned.

"We all would like to go back to the good ol' days of lower cost, less paper work and a closer doctor-patient relationship. But when the chips are down and life is hanging in the balance, no one wants to do without the high-tech care of modern medicine," Word concluded.

He is the son of Taylor Word of Ozona.

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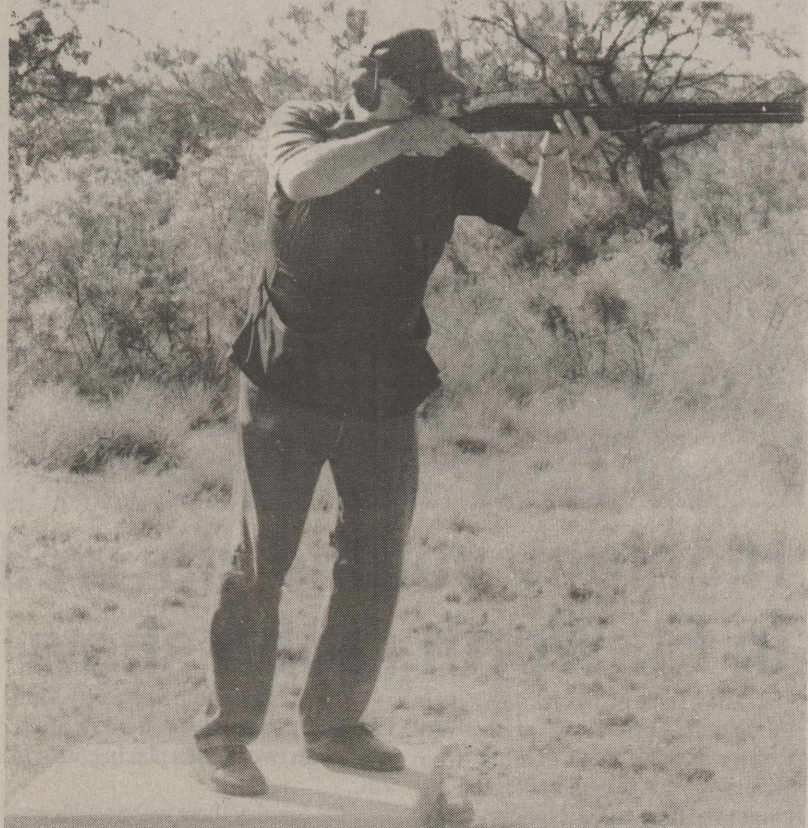

Pecan Nut casebearer control

Insecticide application for control of the pecan nut casebearer in Crockett County should be made between May 21 and May 25.

Control measures should be applied to control the small casebearer larvae just after the larvae hatch from the eggs and before they begin to tunnel into the nutlets (two days after hatch).

There will be some difference in the time that casebearer hatch between pecan varieties within orchards and in home yards. To determine the best time to control casebearer, the nutlets should be inspected daily for eggs and the first casebearer damaged nutlet. When the first damaged nutlet is observed, control measures should be applied. A thorough job of inspection must be done or casebearer will cause considerable damage before the damage is detected.

Homeowners can use Zolone, malathion, or carbaryl (Sevin) which may cause aphid problems - or B.T. products such as Dipel, Biobit, or Thuricide for casebearer control. Commercial producers may use azinphosmethyl (Guthion), Lorsban, endosulfan (Thiodan), malathion, or phosalone (Zolone). Follow the directions on the label for mixing and applying the spray treatment.

Zinc can be applied to the foliage of pecan trees when applying an insecticide for casebearer control. Regular zinc applications are needed for good development of pecans in Crockett County.

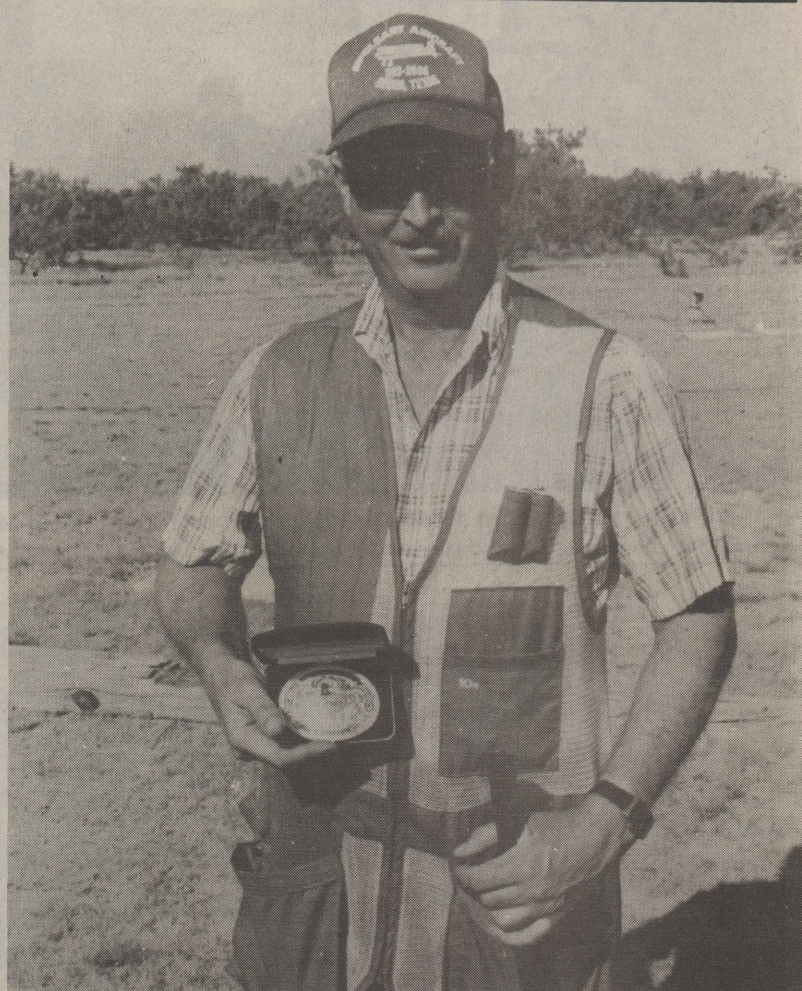

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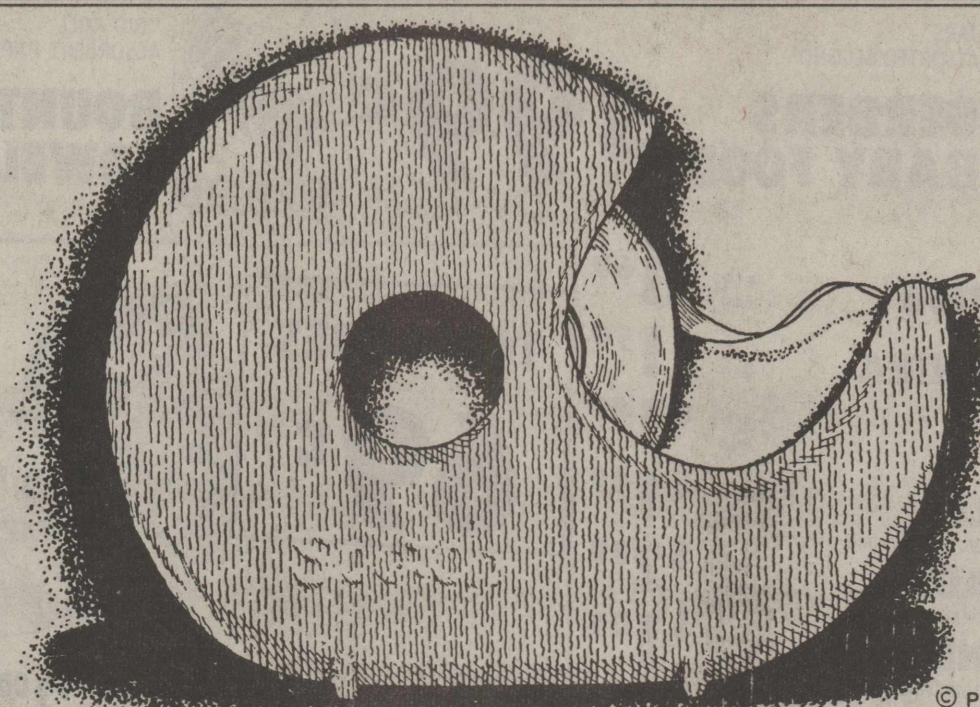


