## Court discusses roads, tax rate

Some of the heirs to the Parker Estate in northwestern Crockett County and persons leasing parts of the land met with commissioners June 10 regarding classification of road serving the property. The road in question runs from S.H. 190 north through the George Thompson Ranch and Parker Estate to S.H. 349.

After hearing from both sides, those wanting the road open and county maintained and those asking that it be closed, commissioners voted that until overruled by a higher authority, the road from the Parker Ranch headquarters to Hwy. 190 be a county road. The motion also included the information that the section of road from the Parker Ranch headquarters to Hwy. 349 was closed in 1964 when abandoned by the county. William E. Allen asked to go on record as not wanting that stretch of road closed.

County Auditor Sandy Stokes reported that valuations for 1991 are expected to increase \$47,000,000 over last year's figure of \$490,000,000, up approximately 10 percent.

The current tax rate is .615 cents per \$100 valuation. With the projected

increase in valuations, the effective rate could be reduced to .5741 and generate the same amount of revenue. Stokes advised against such a move, however, suggesting that commissioners consider setting a rate that would help offset some of the drop in the county's financial reserve.

During a report by Eddie Moore, road supervisor, commissioners voted to approve the expenditure of an additional \$750 for repairs to the D-5 dozer. They also voted to get estimates on repairs for the 503 Gallion motor grader.

The court voted to table action on an agenda item regarding right-of-way fencing on County Road 208.

A decision was reached after lengthy discussion to allow county employees overtime pay for after hours work constructing cattleguards. Moore had requested the court consider overtime pay or contract cattle guard construction as replacements are needed.

Garland Young, civic and youth center director, reported that 179 youths attended the all-night graduation party. Of these, 34 were seniors.

A mid-summer dance for teens has been set for June 29. The back-to-school dance is scheduled for Aug. 17.

Commissioner voted to endorse the actions of the hospital board following a report by Bob Denson. The administrator reported on a called meeting held June 6 where the board approved expenditure of \$2,907 for supplies for a new ambulance and added the name of a former worker to fill a vacancy on the approved part-time list of housekeeping personnel.

In response to a \$3,000 water bill at the cemetery for last month, commissioners instructed Onecimo Ortiz, parks supervisor, to chart a watering schedule for the cemetery. The plan to water areas on a rotating basis should save on water and alleviate some pressure problems as well.

Helping Hands' Meals on Wheels program served 1,132 meals during May. Commodities were distributed to 82 families totaling 187 individuals.

Librarian Louise Ledoux told commissioners a recent Big Country Library System meeting held in Sonora provided much useful information. The special subject area referencing program focused on medical, legal and agriculture references for the small library.

Bert Dickinson told the court about a solid waste collection and disposal service offered by Pack Rat Services Inc. of Andrews. The four-year-old company is to provide estimates on service to Ozona.

Clerical workers Kayla Longoria, Ampara Enriquez and Jill De La Garza met with the court and requested to be paid by the scale under which they were hired rather than a new scale instituted in August of 1990. Commissioners agreed to a revised pay scale for these three after considering the circumstances.

No action was taken on agenda items concerning the airport. Development of the facility will be discussed in a Texas Aeronautical Facilities Plan regional meeting Wednesday, June 12, at 10 a.m. in the Crockett Room.

Commissioners voted to approve a bond for Ninfa Fierro, new employee in the clerk's office approve adding probation officer Stephanie Chapman to the county's insurance program effective July 1 with reimbursement to be made by the probation department

approve repairs to a DPS radar unit prohibit vehicles or trailers (other than maintenance) on the downtown park because of the new sprinkler system

authorize Judge Mayfield to execute easements from Bobby Vargas, Romeo Perez and Eva Borden for construction and maintenance of underground culverts for water drainage on their property on Mulberry Street

meet, through the Texas Association of Counties, federal regulations for a permit for the county shop where vehicles are maintained

approve chamber of commerce requests for removal of old playground equipment and opening of existing restrooms at fairground park.

## Scholarships awarded to nursing students

Scholarships for two nursing students were awarded last week by the Crockett County Hospital and Care Center Board. Recipients Sheryl Chandler and Judy Farris received their first checks for \$300 from scholarship committee chairman Concha Zapata and Bob Denson, hospital administrator.

Both women are pursuing R. N. associate degrees in applied science at Angelo State University.

The scholarships of \$300 per month will be repaid through work at the local facility when the women complete their studies.

Mrs. Chandler is a second year nursing student. Her studies will be completed in May of 1992. She has been a resident of Ozona one year, moving here from Sonora.

"I'm really looking forward to going to work at the Crockett County Hospital," said Mrs. Chandler. "The money I receive from the hospital will be well spent. This scholarship program is a good investment and will

enable the hospital to assure future work force.

"Ozona community needs to rally behind their hospital and its staff to maintain quality care and to assure that the hospital remains open. A hospital is a valuable resource for any community."

Sheryl and Steve Chandler are the parents of two children, Britney and Brandon.

Mrs. Farris is a 1973 graduate of Ozona High School. She has completed her academic basics at ASU

## Reagor receives \$8,000 4-H scholarship

Tamie Jayne Reagor, daughter of Billy and Judy Reagor of Ozona, was awarded a Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo 4-H Scholarship totaling \$8,000 at ceremonies conducted at the 1991 Texas 4-H Roundup last week by the Texas 4-H Foundation.

The Texas 4-H Foundation has the largest scholarship program in the world and awards over a half million dollars annually to top 4-H members. They administer the Houston scholarships, which are "presented in recognition of outstanding scholarship, citizenship and leadership."

Reagor, who is an 8-year 4-H member, plans to use her scholarship to attend Texas A&M University and major in animal science. She hopes to use her education to promote agricultural products and work for the Mohair Council of America.

She was in the top ten of her class at Ozona High school, where she was a varsity cheerleader, drum major and band member, worked on the annual staff, played varsity basketball and was president of Just Say No her senior year.

She was the 1989 Ozona Lions Club Rodeo Queen and received the C. E. Davidson Memorial Scholarship for high point contestant from Ozona in 1989. She was also first runner up for the Miss Mohair Title in 1991.

In 4-H, Reagor served as District VI 4-H council secretary, county council president and club president. She was a member of the county's 4-H and Youth committee and a teen leader in livestock and foods projects.

She had state-winning demonstrations in both the sheep and goat and clothing contests, and she exhibited lambs, steers and Angora goats in local and major shows. In 1989 she exhibited the grand champion lamb at San Angelo and also had the cham-



pion Brangus steer at San Antonio.

She was awarded the Mother Davidson Trophy as the county's outstanding 4-H member in 1990, and also received the Dan Bean Memorial Scholarship for her outstanding agricultural projects.

The highest statewide award in 4-H, the Gold Star, was awarded to her in 1989, and she was one of only 3 4-H members from the district honored at the 1990 Rural Youth Honor Banquet.

Reagor said, "For more than half my life, I have dedicated myself to achieving goals in 4-H. It will be a great honor to represent the Texas 4-H Foundation as a scholarship recipient while I work to reach even bigger goals."

Williams, a former 4-H member and winner of the gold star and Mother Davidson awards, has been a leader in range evaluation and livestock for a number of years.

His entire family has been—and still is—actively involved in the 4-H program.

The nomination stated, "Larry makes every trip a learning experience—stopping to look at new types of plants, touring historical sites, and making the entire trip a family time."

The group has raised its own money to travel on range judging trips, so that no one is left out because of lack of funds.

And the group has been successful—placing high at state the last few years. Larry is now working to build up the range judging program in Reagan County, where his young son, Tom Ben, attends school and is in the 4-H program.

Billy H. Reagor, County Extension Agent-Agriculture, was surprised at the banquet with the Texas Volunteer Leader Association Meritorious Service award.

The award is given in recognition of the impact made by an agent on the 4-H program in Texas. A person must be nominated by their adult leaders to qualify.

Reagor's influence has been felt on the district, state and national levels, with contributions to sheep and goat project materials.

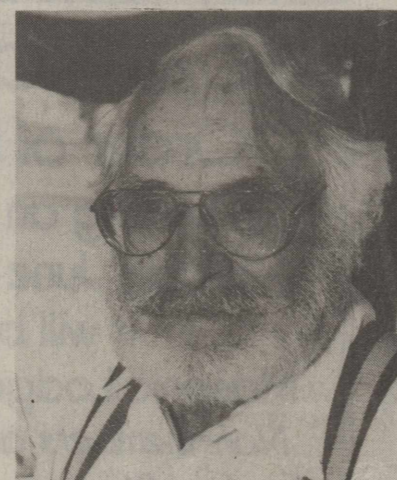

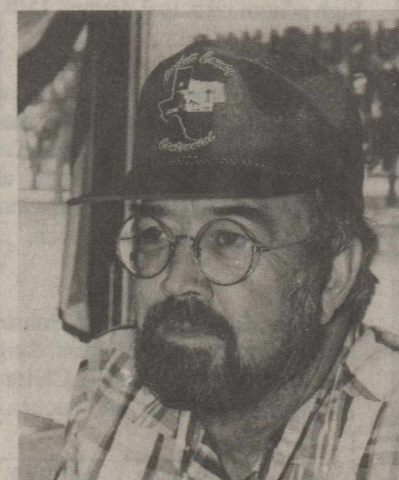

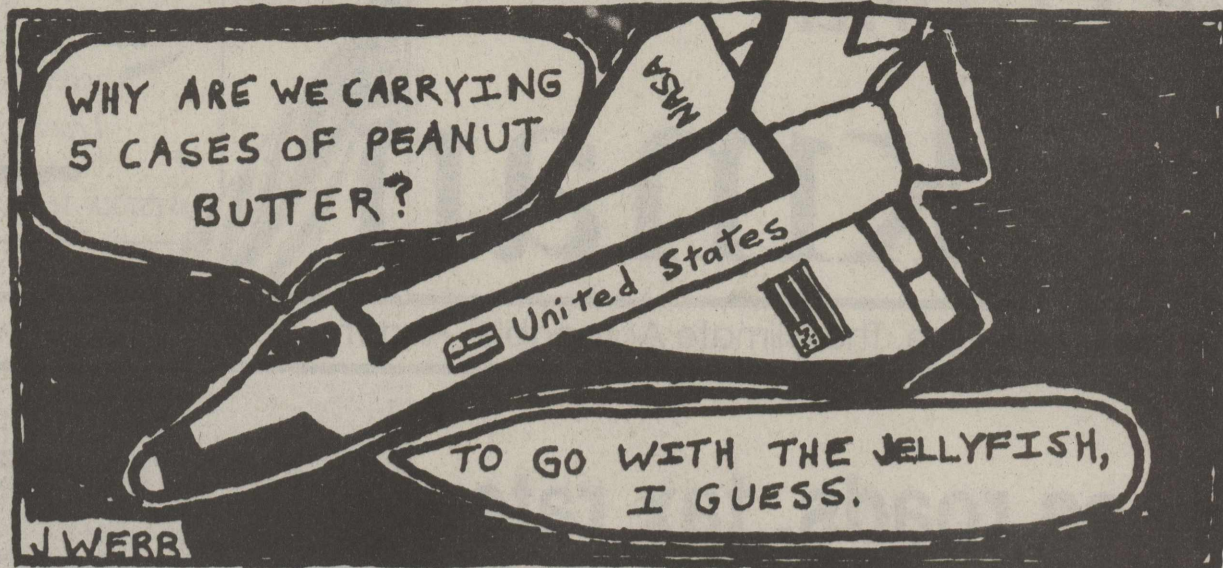

No farmer ever plowed a field by turning it over in his mind.

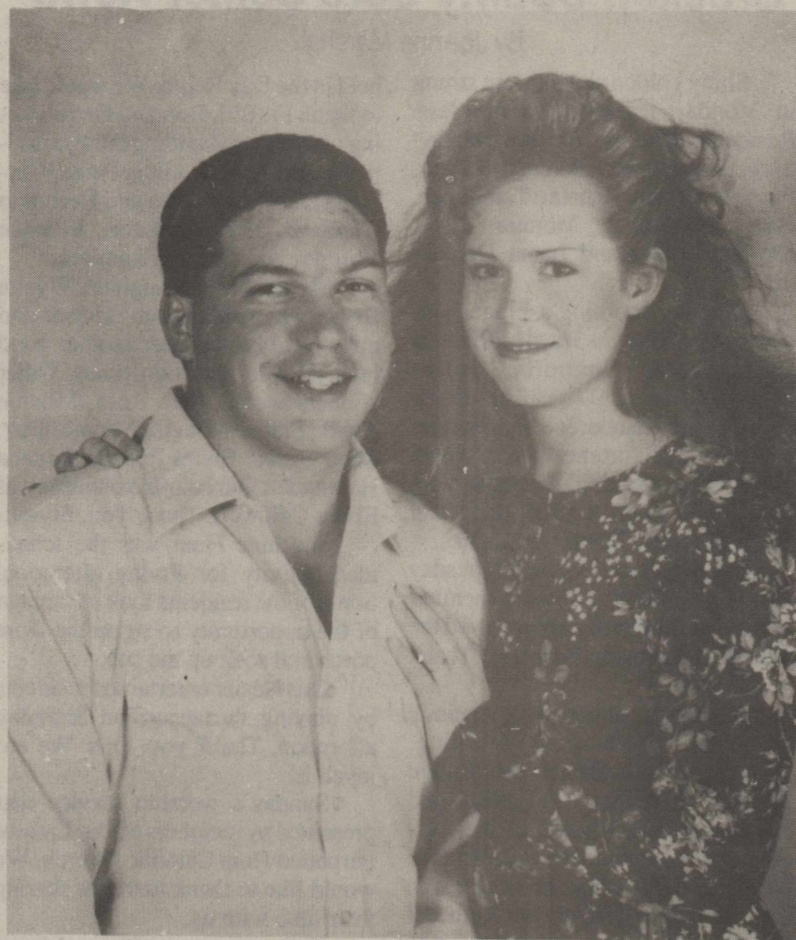

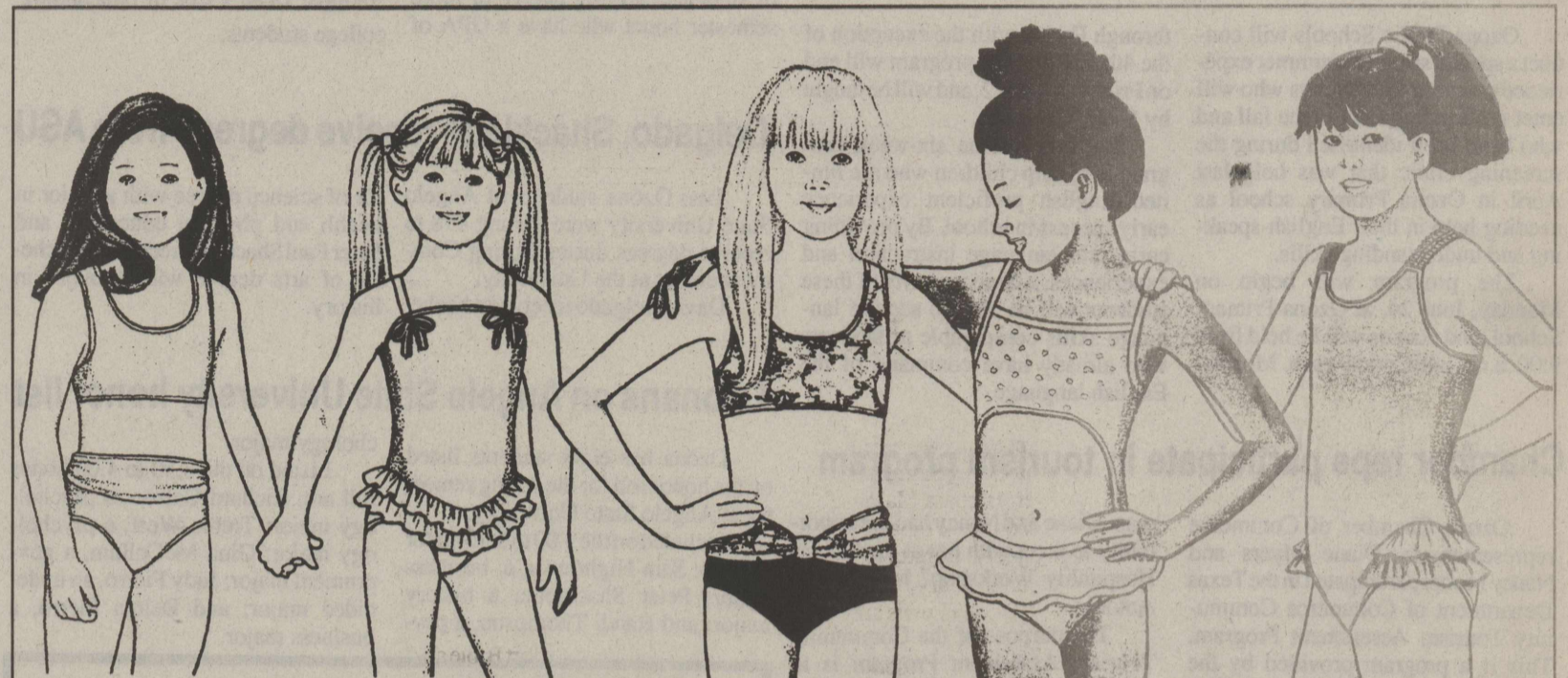

"The spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words."

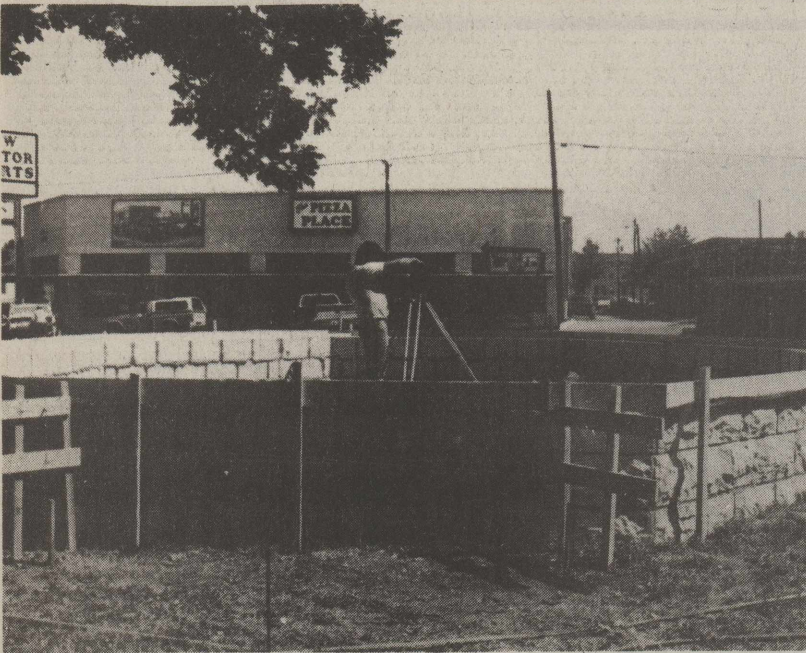
When we pray, we can remember God's promise that "the spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words."

It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

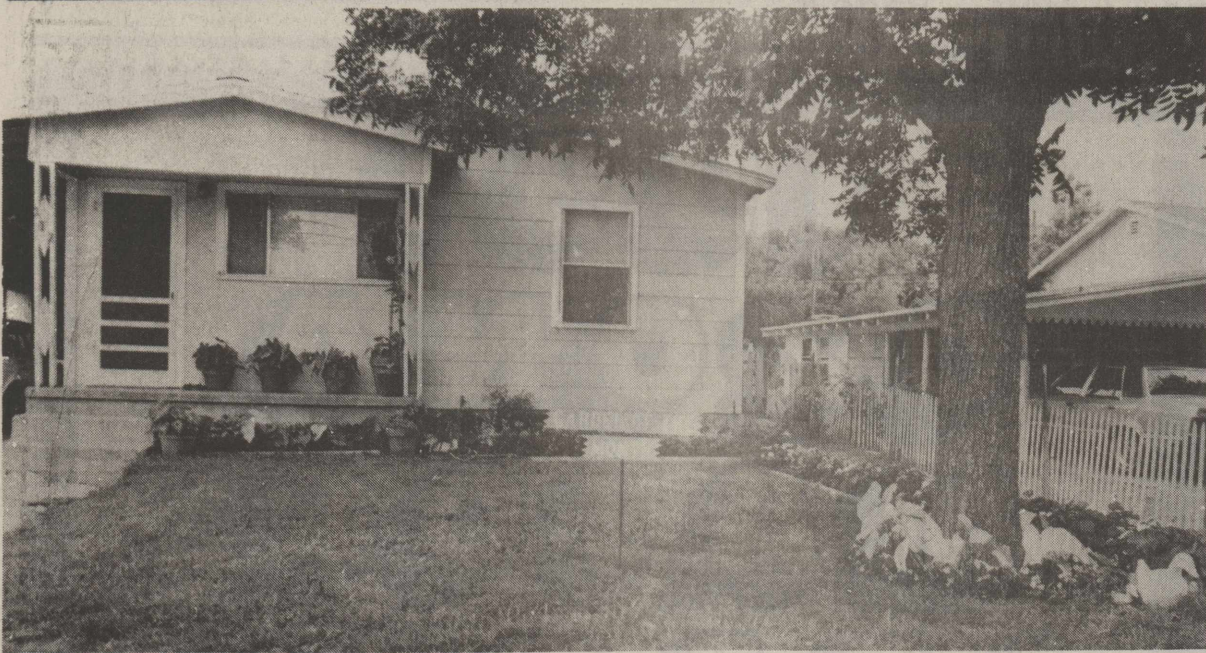
Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

## Hospital board searching for new doctor

John Daniels opened Thursday's called meeting of the Crockett County Hospital and Care Center board with a statement, affirmed by nods from members, that they would "continue to search for a doctor and continue operation of the hospital until it becomes clear we cannot". The assurances were directed to new administrator Bob Denson in light of a decision by Dr. Marcus Sims to follow through on his resignation.

Dr. Sims will be available at his Ozona office approximately two days per week through June and will cover some weekends. He is now a member of the staff at Shamrock Clinics in San Angelo.

The board is working to find an additional doctor through two search agencies and through personal contacts.

A financial report presented by Denson shows the hospital and care center to be \$21,000 under the amount budgeted for the year to date.

Ambulance coordinator Doug

Meador asked the board to purchase items needed for the new ambulance which is expected to arrive later this summer. Although a telephone would be helpful, Meador said he could not justify the cost. Board members did approve expenditure of \$2,907 for the needed supplies and equipment.

The EMS made 13 ambulance runs and nine transfers during May. Five EMTs, four new and one renewal, are expected to be certified following examinations in San Angelo this week.

Denson reported to the board on several actions that are being taken to prepare the hospital for Medicare eligibility. The facility must be Medicare certified in order to be approved for the Concho Valley Rural Outreach Grant sought for four counties. The grant application will be reviewed June 12 in San Angelo.

Board members voted to substitute the name of a former worker on the county's approved list of part-time workers to replace a hospital housekeeper who is no longer available.

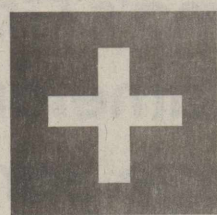

### Angelo Community Hospital becomes first area smoke-free hospital

On June 1, 1991, Angelo Community Hospital became the first hospital in San Angelo to adopt a SMOKE-FREE policy. The policy results in a total ban on smoking in all areas of the hospital.

A single exception to the policy allows certain patients to smoke in their rooms upon the patient's physician's written medical order. The sole exception applies to terminally ill patients and patients being treated for other chronic addictions.

Explaining why the hospital took this action, hospital president Robert Butler said, "Smoking has become inconsistent with our mission of disease prevention and health promotion." The public looks to hospitals as the leaders of our health care system, and Angelo Community Hospital has decided to provide the leadership in promoting smoke-free hospitals, Mr. Butler said.

As more knowledge is gained on the health hazards of the passive inhaling of smoke by non-smokers, said Mr. Butler, we have an obligation to recognize the health concerns of smokers and non-smokers.

Mr. Butler also said that more

and more organizations are asking hospitals to take a stand. Smoke-Free hospitals have been endorsed by the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, the American Medical Association, American Academy of Pediatrics, American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Physicians, Texas Hospital Association, and the Surgeon General of the United States.

## Lloyd Bentsen addresses problem of high cost health care

We have to find a way to make it less expensive to stay healthy.

Americans spent over \$600 billion, nearly 12 percent of our GNP, on health care last year. Studies show that health care costs shot up 21 percent in 1990, outstripping personal income to the point where American families now spend roughly \$1 out of every \$9 on health care. Yet over 30 million Americans, 75 percent of them from working families, don't have any health insurance.

In this recession, people don't only worry about losing their jobs. They often worry just as much about losing the health coverage that goes with them.

In the midst of this crisis, the President's budget released in February proposes to cut Medicare by an additional \$25 billion over five years. These cuts, on top of what was agreed to by Congress and the Administration during budget negotiations last year, would mean cutting \$70 billion out of Medicare over the next six years.

By cutting Medicare, the Administration is shooting at the wrong target. Health care costs have been going

up faster than Medicare costs. In fact, the Texas Hospital Association (THA) estimates that 70 percent of Texas hospitals are already losing money on Medicare patients. According to THA, the average Texas hospital suffered a loss of \$970 on each Medicare patient in 1990. Ninety-five of the 508 hospitals that were forced to close down across the country in the 1980s were in Texas. Further cuts in Medicare would jeopardize already struggling hospitals.

I have written to Budget Director Richard Darman telling him of my opposition to these proposed cuts. I told him that I view any effort to impose additional deep cuts in Medicare as a violation of the five year budget package agreed to last year by Congress and the President.

Cutting Medicare is not a health policy, it's a placebo. We need to initiate a national search for better ways to make affordable, quality health care available to all Americans. As Chairman of the Finance Committee I am planning for hearings on the economic squeeze that's being put on middle income Americans. Health care will be high on our

list of priorities. We'll be searching for ways to develop a national public and private sector strategy that attacks the twin problems of cost and access to health care in America.

The United States has the best health care in the world - for those who can afford it. But for the wealthiest nation in the world, a nation that

wins more Nobel Prizes than the rest of the world combined, that's not good enough.

The real problem is rising medical costs. By continuing to chop away at Medicare, the Administration is making the Band Aid smaller and hoping the wound will go away. This only ensures that the wound - rising health costs - will fester.

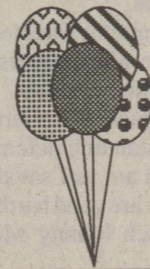

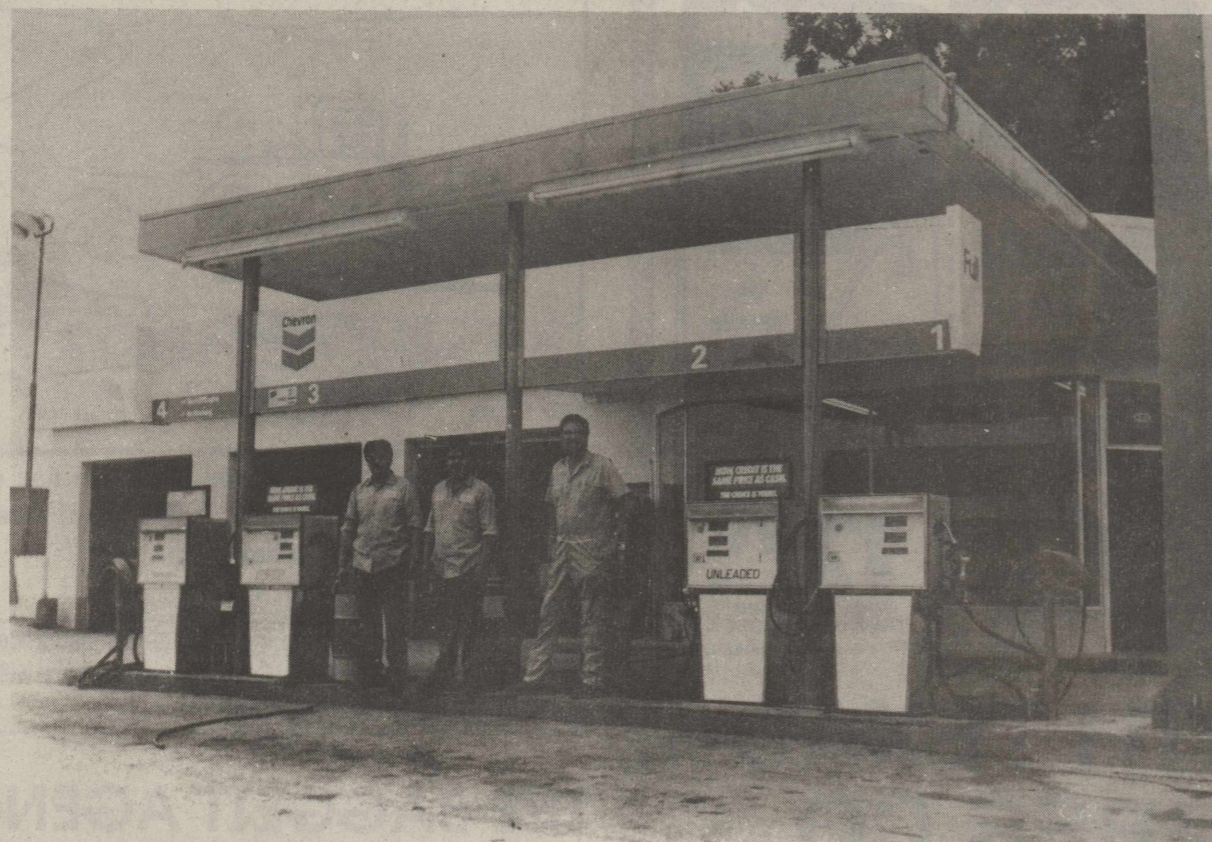

## County 4-H Club excels at roundup

4-H'ers from Crockett County took top awards in numerous contests at the 1991 Texas 4-H Roundup held last week at Texas A&M University, with over 2,000 youth from 14 Extension Districts competing in over 40 contests.

On Tuesday, Jennifer Davidson started off the week with a 3rd place finish in the State Food Show. Her entry in the fruits and vegetable category was one of over 60,000 entered in the nutrition project across the state this year.

Immediately following the food show, Tamie Reagor received an \$8,000 Houston Livestock Show Scholarship for her 4-H work. Over half a million dollars was awarded to 82 4-H members, who were selected for interviews out of over 300 who applied for scholarships this year. Tamie will use the scholarship to major in animal science at Texas A&M.

Roundup demonstration and judging contests on Wednesday also netted good results for local 4-H'ers. In the sheep and goat contest, Julie Childress and Jennifer Davidson placed second with their illustrated talk, "One of the Chosen," about adoption. In range judging, the team of Matthew Marshall, Martha Mayfield and Justin Southern placed second.

Hollie Williams placed fourth with her family life demonstration, "And Then There Were Five," and the wool judging team of Anthony Sanchez, Chad Upham, Terry House and Travis Davidson also placed fourth.

The Share-the-Fun act with Tamie Reagor, Mike Kenison, Whitney Vannoy, C'Jay McKinney, Steffy Sutton, Chris Cornett and April Graham overcame a disaster with their taped music to walk away with fifth place in that highly competitive category.

Other county 4-H'ers also competed in the state contests. Adrienne Dickerson competed with "Concrete Facts" in the open class, and the team of Katharine Durham and Carri Chandler presented "A Crash Course" in the consumer life skills contest.

The plant identification team of Fleet Worthington, Heather Hill and Gary Thompson also competed.

Larry Williams was one of the District 6 honorees in the "Salute to Excellence" award luncheon to recognize outstanding adult leaders for their work in 4-H.

## SBA filing deadline June 17

A Small Business Administration (SBA) Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) declaration was made in November 1990 for agriculture-dependent businesses in several Texas counties. The declaration resulted from agricultural losses due to drought and adverse weather occurring in Texas Jan. 1 through Sept. 17, 1990, and continuing. Although farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for these loans, small business concerns without credit elsewhere and small agricultural cooperatives without credit elsewhere dependent on these farmers and ranchers are eligible.

In addition to agriculture-dependent businesses, nurseries are also eligible to apply if they have been affected by drought. According to SBA Acting District Director G. Ted Ressler of the San Antonio District Office, the filing deadline for EIDL applications under this declaration is June 17, 1991. The following coun-

ties were declared for EIDL assistance: Bee, Caldwell, Concho, Crockett, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Hays, Irion, Refugio, San Patricio, Schleicher, Sutton, Fayette, Goliad, Kimble, Menard and Tom Green.

Eligible businesses seeking loan information and applications may call toll-free 1-800-527-7735.

Eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives in these counties must have experienced substantial financial losses as a result of agricultural damages caused by the drought and specified weather. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the drought and specified weather are not eligible for SBA economic injury loans. This program is available only to businesses that are considered small by SBA size standards and do not have credit available elsewhere.

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**Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 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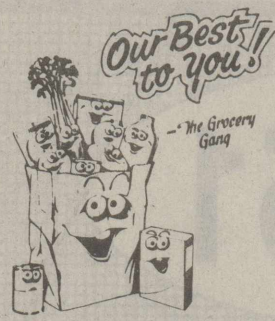
