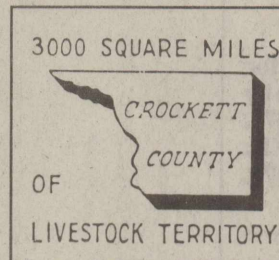

Commissioners favor new roof for hospital and care center

Commissioners voted Monday night to place on the agenda at their Feb. 10 meeting issuance of certificates of obligation to fund replacement of the roof at the hospital and care center and any other capital expenditures needed. The action came following a report by Bob Denson, facility administrator, stating that the roof problems were "critical" at the care center and "serious" at the hospital.

The court also voted to have a structural engineer inspect the facility to determine if the building will support the proposed gable style roof.

Following a presentation by John L. Henderson and Doug Meador requesting county funds to assist in constructing a building to house ambulances, the court voted to include the amount needed from the county in the certificates of obligation.

The long-sought ambulance building moved nearer to reality earlier this month when the Lions Club pledged \$5,000 toward the project, Deerfest Association pledged \$8,000, and West

Texas Utilities pledged \$2,500. A 50'x50' insulated metal frame building with concrete floor and meeting/training room is proposed. The amount needed from the county was estimated at \$20,000.

Specifications for the building have been approved by the hospital board.

Approximately 50 supporters of the project attended the court meeting.

Bids for a computer system for the hospital/care center were neither ac-

cepted nor rejected when the board met Jan. 24, Denson said. Both bids were extremely over budget. The director of information at Shannon Hospital will be asked to visit the hospital to help determine whether the proposed system can be scaled down, and the board also plans a search for a company that sells computer time as a possible alternative.

Bids for employee medical and hospital benefits were opened at 6:15

and discussed for about an hour and a half. Bobby Zesch of White and Zesch Insurance in San Angelo and Jay Register of Blue Cross were present to answer questions from the court.

The county is faced with a health insurance cost increase of 38% this year to maintain the same coverage carried in 1991. Premiums for the past year were \$580,000.

Commissioners asked Zesch and Register to return Friday morning

with a plan which would include no more than a 20% increase. The court will reconvene Friday morning at 8.

Before recessing Monday night, commissioners went into executive session to discuss personnel.

Moran heads Neighborhood Health Watch for Crockett Co.

"This program is similar to crime watches, but Neighborhood Health Watchers look out for each others' health," stated Gloria Moran. "We are very fortunate to have this new program in Crockett County, and I am very privileged to work on this city-wide project to help other persons."

The Neighborhood Health Watch Volunteers will be the preventive health eyes and ears in their neighborhood and convene for monthly meetings to discuss a health topic with their neighbors. These volunteers will

be trained by the VISTA (Volunteers In Service To America) coordinator, Mrs. Moran, on the availability of neighborhood health resources and common health concerns.

Neighborhood Health Watch Volunteers, after a series of orientations, will be able to advise their neighbors concerning the importance of immunizations of children against infectious disease, breast feeding, regular check-ups, tetanus vaccinations,

Energas announces agreement to sell Ozona system

LUBBOCK - Energas Company announced on Jan. 28 that it has signed a letter of agreement to sell its Ozona natural gas distribution system to Mr. Norman Smith, owner of Ozark Exploration, Inc. of Dallas.

A closing date of May 1, 1992, has been proposed. The closing of the transaction is subject to the execution of a definitive agreement.

The sale will affect about 1,250 customers of Energas Company in the Ozona area.

"Service to our customers and our operations in Ozona will remain unchanged until a definitive agreement is reached. We will work to ensure a smooth transition to the new owner," said Gene Ehler, president of Energas Company.

Ehler said the Ozona system is remotely located from Energas' other operations, and the sale of the system will improve the company's operational efficiency.

Energas Company, a division of Atmos Energy Corporation of Dallas, provides natural gas service to more than 310,000 customers in West Texas.

Tambunga announces for Pct. 1

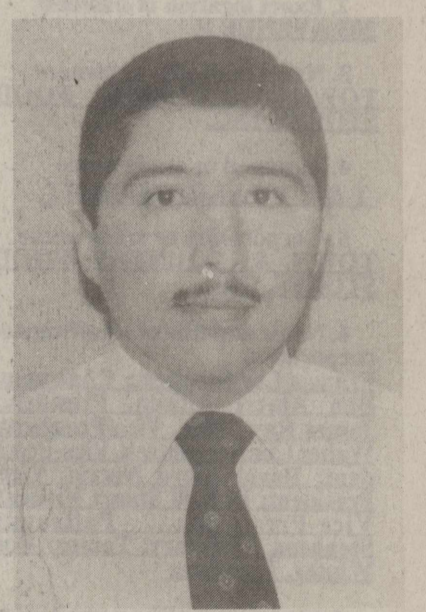
Frank Tambunga has authorized The Ozona Stockman to publicly announce his candidacy for the position of County Commissioner of Precinct One.

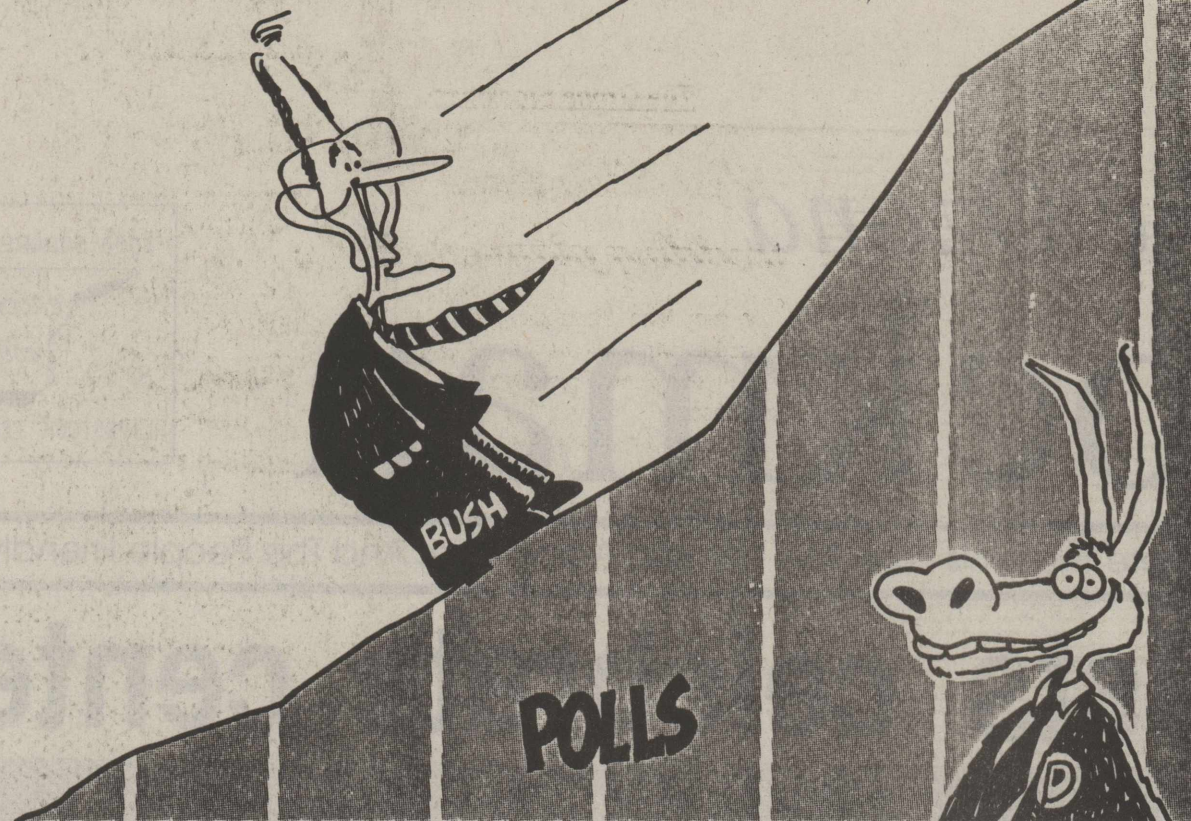

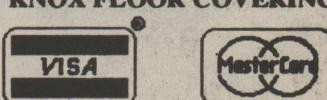

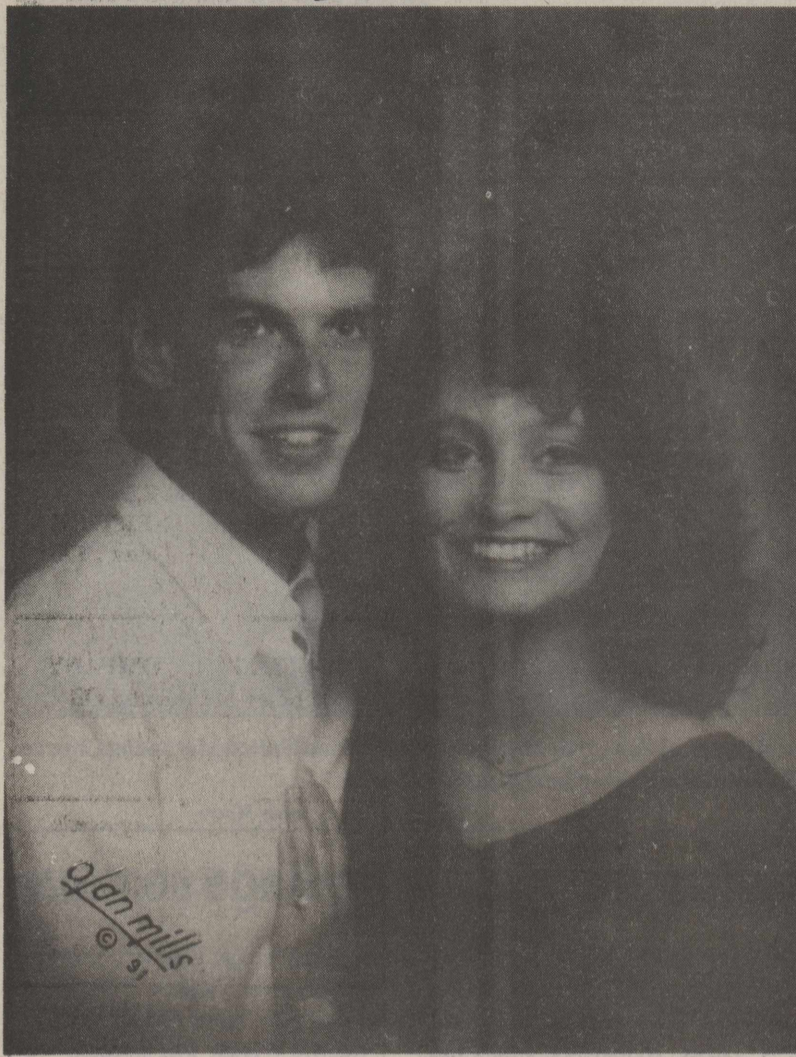

Ozona Intermediate School faculty played host to Mrs. Shirley Spear, Wink Public School language arts teacher (grades four through sixth), and author of *Write/Right*, Thursday, Jan. 23, from 3:30-6:30 p.m. All interested faculty were invited.

Mrs. Spear's workshop deals with teaching all school populations how to do well on the TAAS test. Mrs. Spear's students rank in the top percentile on the TAAS in writing with the majority scoring three's and four's, (100%). These scores include those of special education, E.S.L., and new students in her classes. Her holistic approach to writing works well for the average and slow student. Mrs. Spear said, "when students in special education and remedial reading score a three or a four, something good is going on."

Maxie Watts, Mrs. Spear's superintendent said, "I've watched Mrs. Spear, both as her principal and superintendent, develop this process, and I'm her biggest 'cheerleader'." Her workshops are divided into two, one for grades K-5 and another one for grades 6-12.

"It's times like these when teachers come together to acquire valuable training towards helping their students excel that we're performing as one school with one goal - education of all students," said Manley Holmes, principal of Ozona Intermediate School.

The teachers who attended the workshop feel, as a whole, that Mrs. Spear "has the answer". Her 100% results on TAAS and the results of her ready writing team which entered five contests and won all five are proof. Students in her writing classes entered

Intermediate teachers are excited about the quality workshop Mr. Holmes provided for them with the prospect of equally good workshops in training for teaching TAAS in reading and math.

Sunday's worship service was presented by members of the Church of Christ. A large number of visitors attended, and we enjoyed the special fellowship that followed. Thank you for coming.

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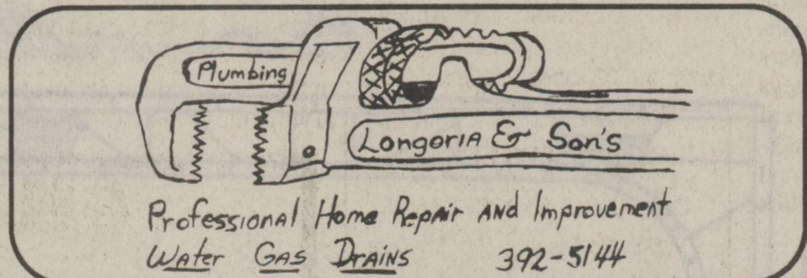

Public service dominates life of Herbierto Gutierrez

"Do you know the way to San Jose?" is a song which poses no problem for Herbierto Gutierrez. Gutierrez lived and worked in San Jose, CA, for 15 years before moving to Ozona in 1974.

The decision to move was made for Gutierrez by a doctor who told him that after two heart attacks it was time for a different lifestyle. Ozona seemed the logical choice for Aurora and Herbierto Gutierrez. He already owned a house here and his mother, Soledad Gutierrez, now 93, also lived in Ozona. When he originally came to the U. S. from Mexico, Gutierrez worked for nine years at the Wayne West Ranch.

The change from his job with the migrant coordinate division of the Economic Opportunity Commission and his work with the San Jose Model Cities program to an outdoor job was just what the doctor ordered.

In California, working with young people was part of Gutierrez' life. While with the E.O.C., he and a co-worker got the idea for a football soccer league for the youth of the community. Through his efforts, the league was organized and the Latino Club involved as sponsors. Gutierrez became president of the Latino Soccer Club.

At the end of five years, more than 200 youngsters were registered in the California Soccer League through Gutierrez' efforts. The Latino Club sponsored two clubs of 30 members each. Newspaper articles of the time tell of two of the club's best players being selected by the U. S. Olympic Team for the Mexico City games. Several boys earned college scholarships as a result of their soccer playing, too, Gutierrez says with pride.

After five years with uniforms, travel expense and playing fields being made available through donations, the soccer teams project received funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development through the City of San Jose. Gutierrez acted as special coordinator for development and organization of 16 junior soccer teams from the Model Cities area.

Finding and administering grant money was his job with the E.O.C.

Five albums filled with photographs, newspaper articles and letters of commendation testify not only to the work done by Herbierto Gutierrez with San Jose youth, but also of his work in community development and his political interests.

A wall in his Ozona home is covered with plaques and commendations reflecting his community involvement. Two of the plaques were awarded "for

dedication to the poor people in the community in recognition of community involvement and constructive involvement in communications". These awards came from the Mexican American Community Organization, the Model Cities Donations Committee and the Association of Newsmen from Mexico.

Gutierrez and his wife, Aurora, headed the San Jose Hearst food giveaway program which benefitted 6,000 local and area residents. The two million dollar project aimed at winning the release of Patricia Hearst from the Symbionese Liberation Army began in California when the SLA said it would negotiate her release only after distribution was well underway. Seventy volunteers assisted in the San Jose distribution which took 48 hours to complete. Other cities had like programs.

Letters from organization heads, mayors, U. S. Rep. Don Edwards, the director of the City Demonstration Agency, Social Services Task Force, Redevelopment Agency, Model Cities executive director and others all testify to the efforts of Herbierto Gutierrez to better his community. "Highest dedication," "exemplary," "important communications link," "outstanding and unselfish dedication," "devotion as a community organizer," are some of the terms used to describe Gutierrez and his work in San Jose.

Bob Martinez, executive director of the Model Cities program said "Mr. Gutierrez has been an asset to our program in his efforts to maximize our efficiency as an organization and minimize the needs of our Model Cities community by trying to improve social, economic and educational needs of the 60,000 people involved in our program."

Gutierrez has been involved in political matters for 35 of his 68 years,

an interest which continues in local issues today. He headed the organization committee of San Jose's Council on Latin American Affairs. The council dedicated its efforts to improving civil rights and other conditions for Spanish-speaking people, working for fair rental practices, jobs, creating a better image of Latin people and cementing community relations with the police department.

Gutierrez worked for the election of Gov. Jerry Brown and for U. S. Rep. Don Edwards and for other candidates at the local level. When he came to Ozona to make his home in 1974, Gutierrez worked with the Mexican American Community Organization to provide jobs for Hispanics. He later worked for the Ozona schools for nine years before starting his own service business.

Gutierrez is filled with enthusiasm for any project he takes on, and he receives commendations. His work as a gardener not only produces beautiful yards, but has earned several Garden of the Month awards. His own yard is an example of his efforts, and plants fill the home as well.

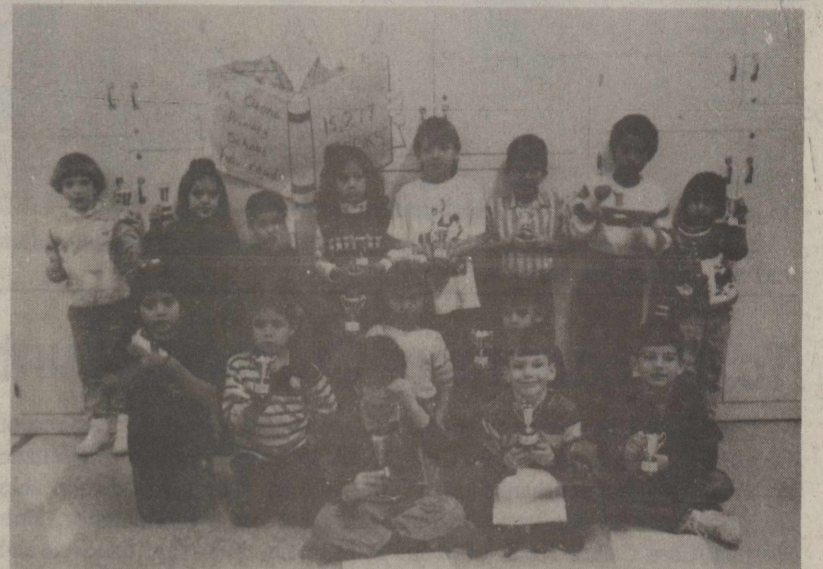

ASCS announces disaster payment program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood and other natural disasters in either 1990 or 1991.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said county ASCS official Herb Schwertner. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from Feb. 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

Schwertner said producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. He

said that farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. "If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by Feb. 3, he or she should call the county ASCS office."

Schwertner explained that a producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and he expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS office.

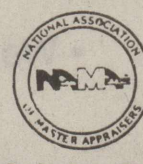
