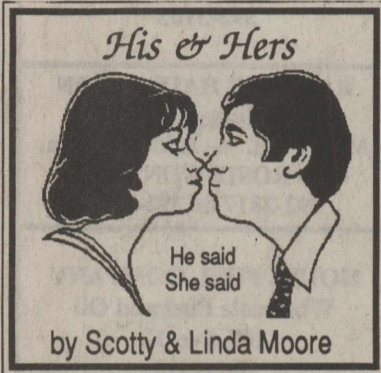

"After winning two national fiddle championships, performing hundreds of concerts across the country and recording two albums with Nashville's Smokey Mountain Boys, Julie Ann Carpenter appears to be poised near the edge of fame and fortune."

Julie is well-known for her exciting performance style. Red Steagall introduced her at the National Cowboy Symposium by saying: "The fiddle is a very moving instrument. ## School board hires four teachers

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Thursday, June 18, approved the employment of four teachers in the local school system for next year.

Tiffany Pullig, a 1990 graduate of Abilene Christian University, will teach physical education in Ozona Junior High School. Kristy Smith, a 1992 graduate of Texas Tech University, will teach in the three-year old program at Ozona Primary School, and Alvin O'Dell, a 1970 graduate of Abilene Christian University, will teach history in Ozona Junior High.

Deanne Robertson, a 1982 graduate of West Texas State University, will teach mathematics in Ozona High School.

During the meeting, the board approved a five-year school plan for implementing educational technology in the district. The plan, presented by Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton, is the product of a district committee of administrators, teachers, parents, students, and other community members who attended a series of meetings to review the technology that is pres-

ently in use in the district and recommend technology priorities for the future. Members of this committee are: Sammy White, Chris Cornett, Linda Moore, Orlando DeHoyos, Mel DeHoyos, Frank Tambunga, Wilda Ramos, Wade Richardson, Maria DeLaRosa, Lou Haire, Glenda Winkley, Bill Williams, Donny York, Sherry York, Rod Miller, Walter Spiller, Manley Holmes, Don Howard, John Curry, Ted Cotton, and Jim Payne.

The plan for next year calls for video-disc technology in science to be implemented in grades one through twelve. Video-discs are 12-inch discs filled with graphics, film, slides, and text that are played through a video-disc player and viewed through a television monitor. Video-discs are accompanied by printed teaching guides, such as readers, activity books, and other illustrated material. They can contain up to 54,000 frames of information on each record that can be controlled through the use of a remote control device or barcode reader.

"Video-discs bring textbooks alive and allow groups of students to actively participate through the use of visual images; therefore, they are able to see concepts visually as well as reading about them in a textbook," Cotton said.

The 1992-93 school year plan will also include the purchase of graphics calculators for mathematics courses in Ozona High School, computer software purchases for all four schools, automation of the high school library (phase one of three phases), and staff

Health care surveys must be returned to Crockett County Hospital by June 29 in order to be counted, Martha Gries said Monday.

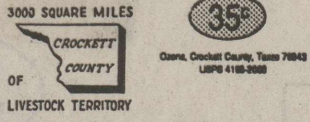
The surveys will be shipped to Atlanta, GA, for tabulation.

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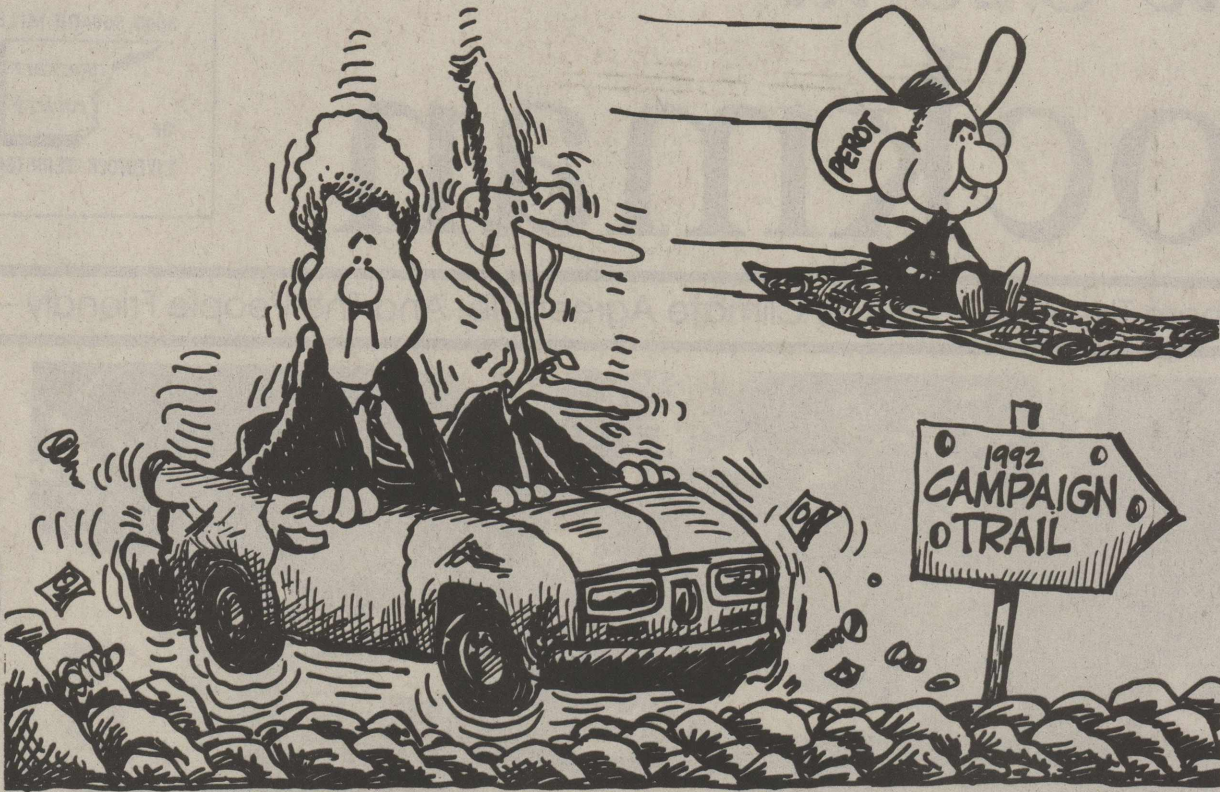

I myself work at a hospital and our attitude and morale is so different.

But so are our people.

I would hate to see what would happen if your definition of an emergency ever did arise. How long will that lecture be?

development for utilization of technology.

During the 1992-97 school years, the district will establish second computer labs in Ozona High School and Ozona Junior High, purchase microscope projection systems for science and a video-disc curriculum for social studies, finish the automation of the high school library, purchase a satellite system to deliver staff development for teachers and enrichment courses for students, purchase additional computers and software for students to use in their classrooms, and begin the automation of the junior high school library.

Trustees also approved a bid from Texas Heating and Air Conditioning for the purchase of air conditioning units at Ozona Junior High School. The present units have been in use since 1977, and break-downs for repairs are becoming more common. The new air conditioning units will be more economical and energy-efficient.

Also during the meeting, Superintendent Jim Payne informed trustees that the Texas Education Agency has notified Mr. Manley Holmes, principal of Ozona Intermediate School, that the school has qualified under the Texas Successful Schools Award for a monetary grant based upon outstanding gains on the third and fifth grade Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) scores from the previous year.

Only 107 of 6,097 school campuses statewide are eligible to apply for this award. "This is a positive reflection on both the Ozona Primary School campus and the Ozona Intermediate School campus," Payne said.

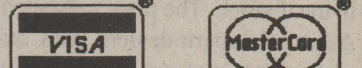

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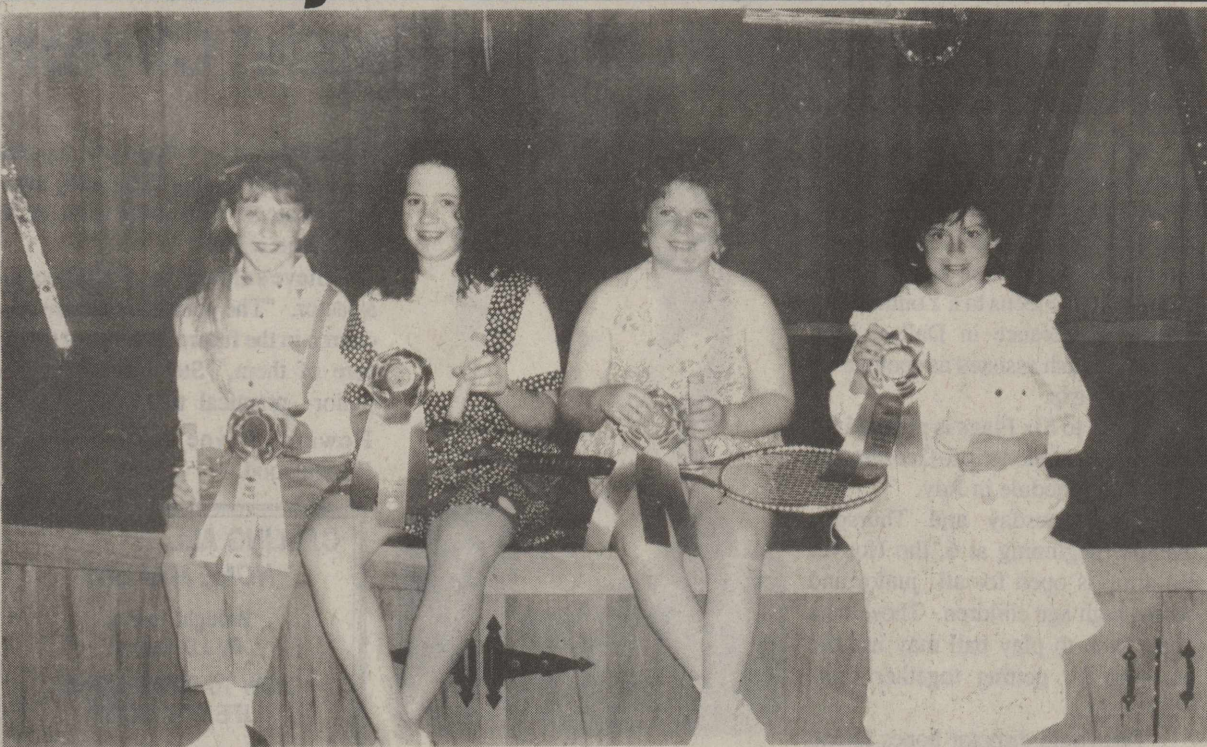

## June declared "5 a Day" month

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry has declared June "5 a Day" Month in Texas, stressing the need for all Texans to increase their daily consumption of fruits and vegetables.

Promoted by the Produce for Better Health Foundation in cooperation with the National Cancer Institute, the "5 a Day - For Better Health" program encourages consumers to increase their daily consumption of fruits and vegetables to at least five servings. The 5 a Day concept has also been adopted by the Texas Department of Agriculture and promoted through its nutritional education efforts.

Most Americans fail to eat the recommended three to five daily servings of fruits and vegetables; according to a recent Gallup poll, 65 percent of those surveyed said they only eat fewer than two.

Meeting the recommended serving requirements is not as difficult as it sounds. One serving can be a medium apple, one-half cup of sliced peaches or cooked carrots, three-fourths cup of orange juice, one-fourth cup of dried fruit or one cup of raw, leafy spinach.

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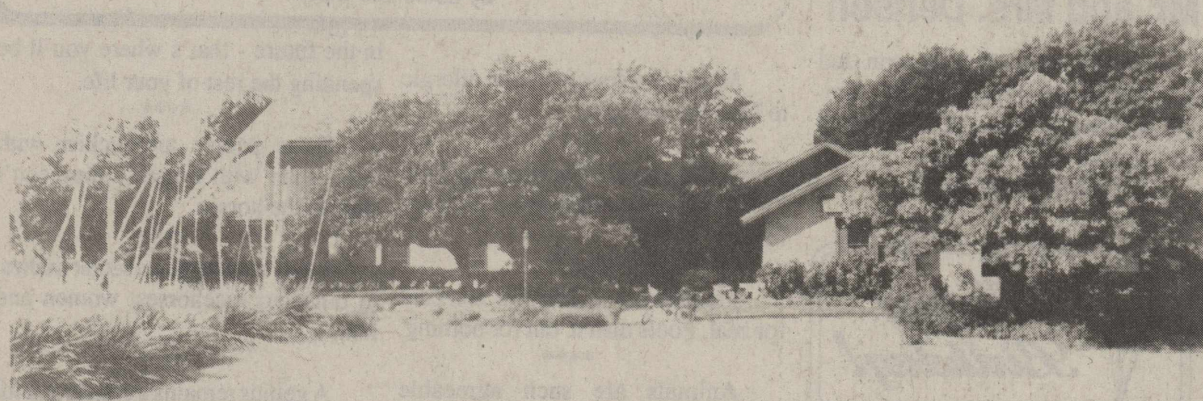

The Crockett County grand jury met June 15 and 16 for the first time in almost a year. There were 40 matters to be brought before the jury with 22 indictments resulting.

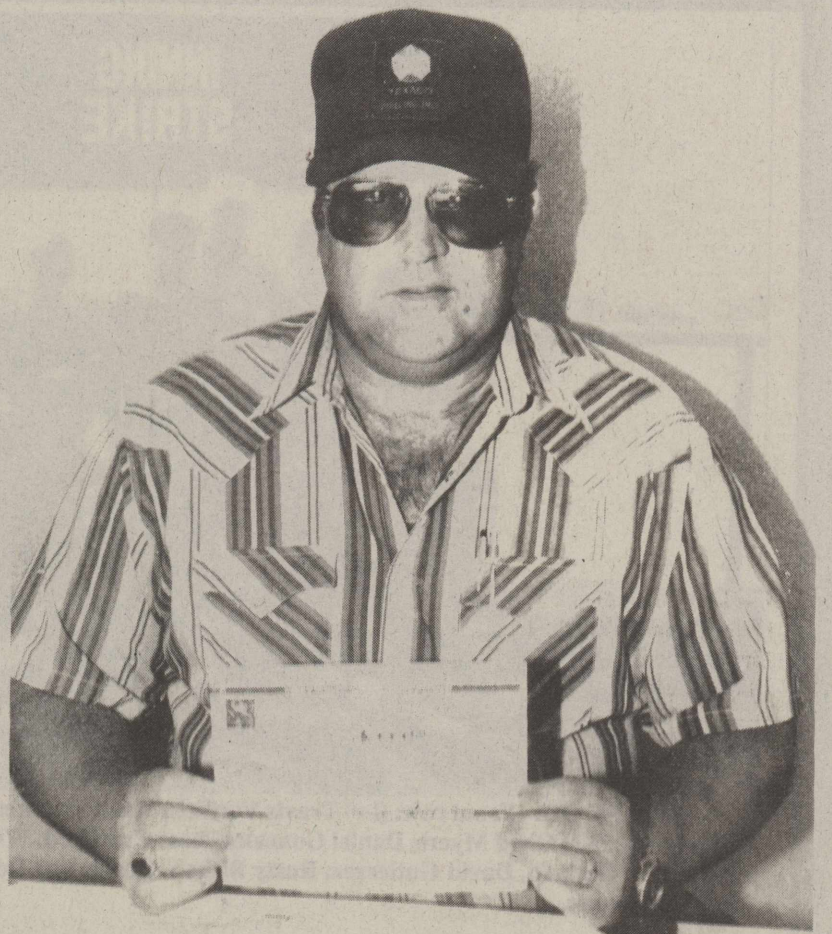
The county clerks' office is waiting on bonds and unable to release information regarding the indictments at this time according to Ninfa Fierro.

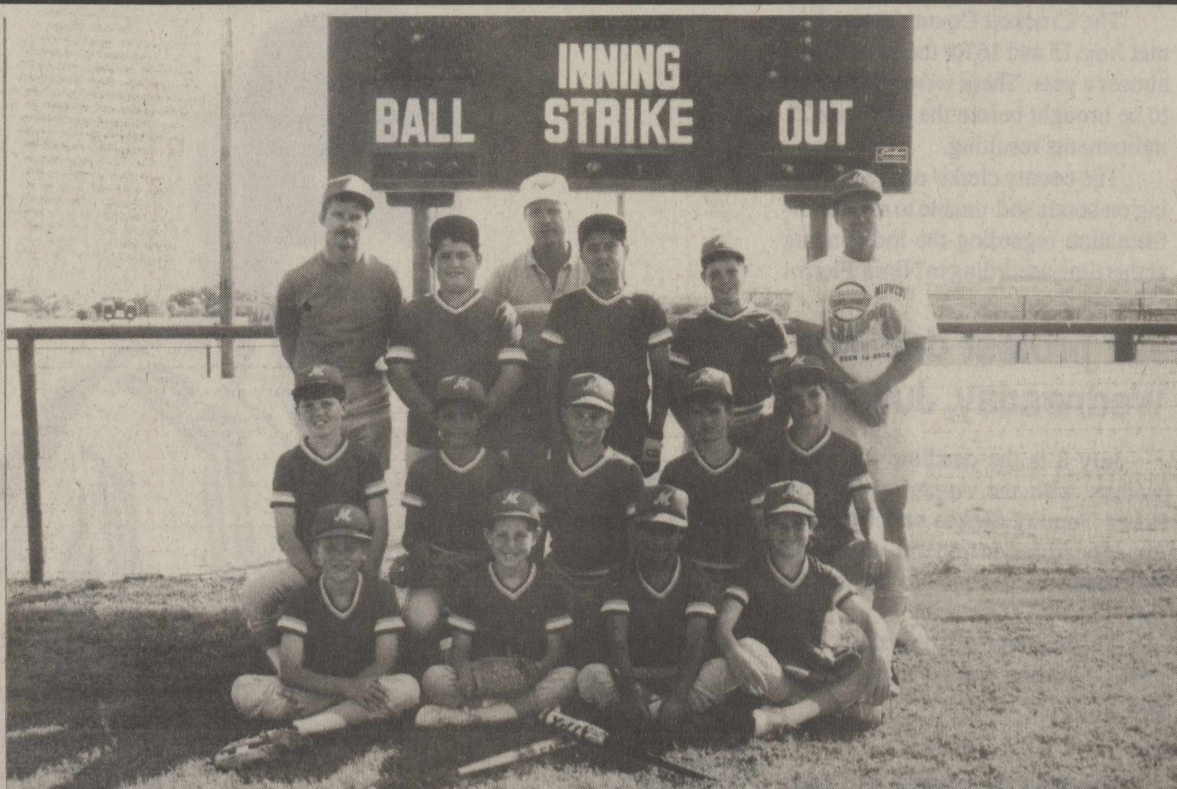

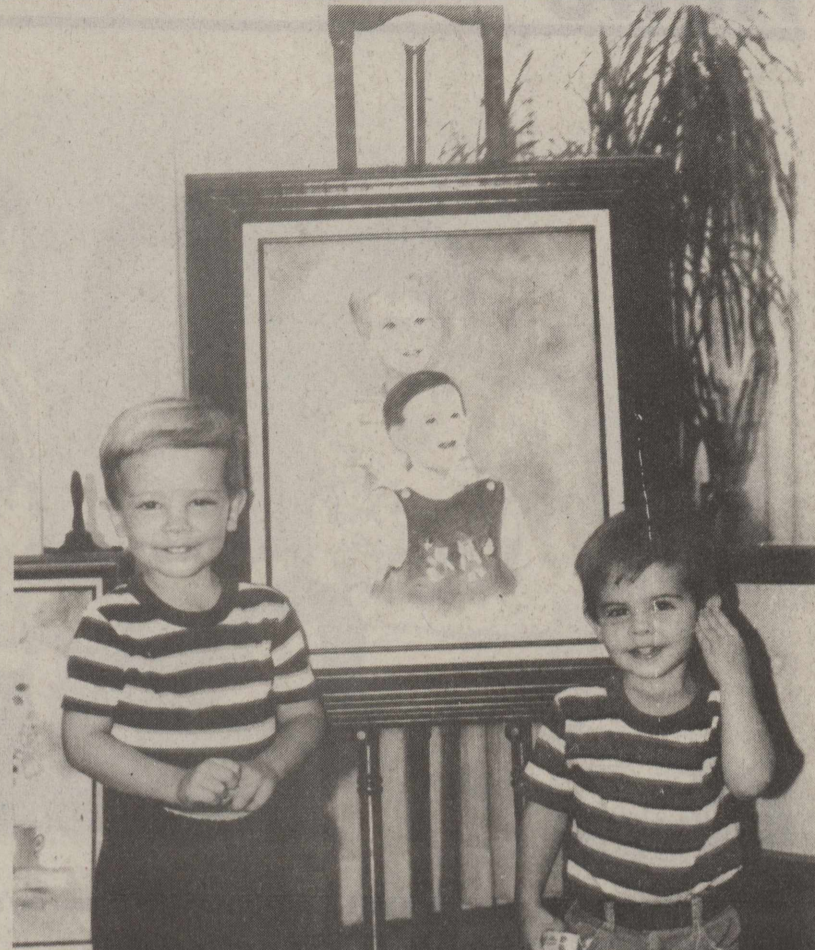

## Architect Jack Meeks to design roofs

Jack Meeks, architect, has been hired to design the roofs for the hospital and care center reported board president Martha Gries in a board meeting Thursday, June 18. It is expected to take at least four months to complete the roof design and one month to let the bid. Completion of the project should be in the early part of 1993.

It was noted that the roof of the Mitchell Room, which normally serves as a visiting area in the care center, may not be usable if there is much more rain. The care center day room will be an alternative until the new roof is completed.

The personnel committee was asked by Mrs. Gries to be present Saturday afternoon, June 20 at 4:00 p.m. and on Sunday afternoon, June 21, to meet with a new administrator candidate from Scotland Neck, North Carolina. A prior applicant did not want to discuss the position further until the North Carolina applicant was interviewed.

The physician recruiting program has temporarily been put on hold. Mrs. Gries will get in touch with the firm to learn the reason for delay.

Mrs. Gries reported that she was impressed with the response to the community survey. The responses will be accepted by the hospital, postage paid, through June 29. The survey was mailed to all Ozona families to obtain answers to such questions as what type of facility would benefit the community in the future, what additional clinical services could be offered and many more.

The speciality clinic which opened with Dr. Price Burdine, orthopedic surgeon from San Angelo, was a success. Nine to eleven patients were reported to have attended his clinic. Dr. Burdine will be back in Ozona Thursday, July 9. It will be advertised in the the Iran newspaper as well as in The Ozona Stockman.

Board member Jack Baggett Jr. reported that Paul Jurek of the Mental Health Mental Retardation (MHMR) Center in San Angelo needs a space here in Ozona to counsel Ozona teenage patients along with psycho/socio patients. Dr. Joe Logan's former offices are being looked at since they have a reception area and two office areas. More details will be obtained before a decision is made. Mr. Baggett suggested that the hospital not charge MHMR for the use of the utilities citing the fact that county counseling and speciality clinics would be beneficial to the hospital as well as the rest of the county. MHMR would install its own telephone system. Mr. Jurek said it might be possible for his counseling clinic to join the Green Thumb Program which provides state funds for the hiring of receptionists and other clerical staff. If this should happen, these personnel could possibly be used in scheduling appointments for speciality clinics sponsored by the hospital. More details will be obtained before the board makes a decision.

Martha Villarreal, nurse's aide, appeared before the board with a description of the duties which she performs requesting that her salary be upgraded. The matter of compensa-

tion was discussed in the executive board meeting and Mrs. Villarreal was given a raise in salary.

Martha Gries reported the purchase of a new 100 gallon hot water heater to replace the failed one in the hospital, a new compressor and generator for the large freezer in the kitchen, a new part for both the ice maker and the exhaust fan in the kitchen. The small autoclave donated to the hospital 30 years ago is inoperable. The suggestion was made that perhaps one of the larger hospitals in the area might have one to donate.

Dr. Robert Owensby reported that the medical staff met June 12 for their monthly meeting. He reported that they had reviewed ambulance transfers for the month and it had been noted that medical records were up to date. There were no problems reported under infection control, no transfusions were given and there were no pathology reports.

Members of the budget committee will attend a workshop Friday, June 26, at 9:00 a.m. Committee members are Martha Gries, Concha Zapata, Jack Baggett Jr., Martha Vickers, Marilee Robertson and both physicians.

The list of long-range plans was looked at once again. There was discussion of the need of purchasing an ambulance in 1993 instead of 1995 as well as upgrading the ambulance service in general. There will be more discussion before the list is presented to the commissioners court in July so it may be included in the budget for 1993.

Her latest Album, "Fiddlin' Up a Storm," is available on both cassette and compact disc. It contains a nicely paced selection of 17 songs, showing Julie's competent, dynamic fiddling at bluegrass, western swing, waltzes, gospel, and other good old traditional numbers. The new album has been receiving rave reviews. The Devil's Box, one of the premier magazines on traditional fiddle, calls the album "spectacular" and says of Julie: "This young lady has genuine talent and she is not afraid to let you know about it."

Julie is presently an honor student in the 9th grade at John Glenn Junior High in San Angelo. Although she has never lived in Ozona, she counts Crockett County as home because her family (Jones Miller and Will Miller) members were among the pioneer settlers of Crockett County. Her grandparents Morris and Willena Miller both graduated from high school in Ozona.

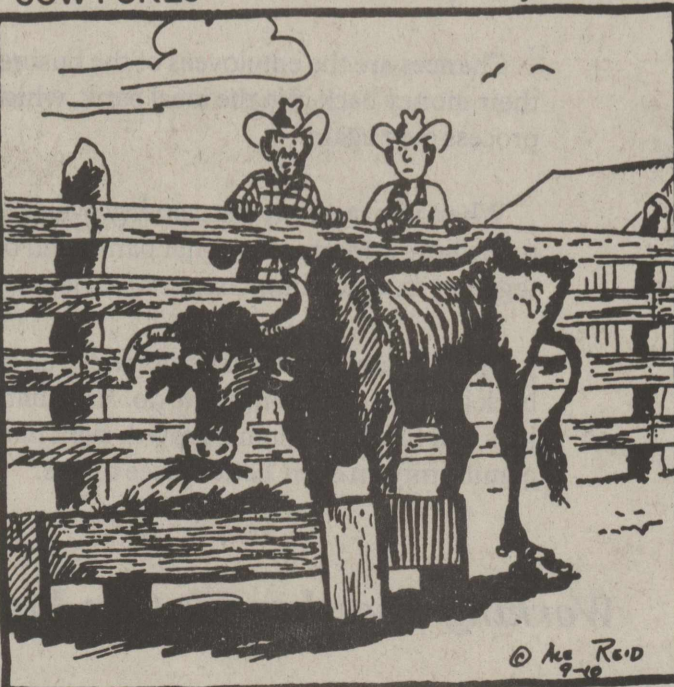
