Board approves new call system for hospital

At a meeting Sept. 24, members of the board of directors at Crockett County Hospital/Care Center voted to purchase a nurse call system and update the telephone system for the hospital.

The nurse call system will be designed so the care center can be incorporated at a later date if needed. The telephone system will allow addition of the clinic and care center lines to the system.

Cost of the system is \$11,281.50 plus installation. The board voted to pay it out over a five year period.

Tim Brewer presented information on a "Barely Sick Child Program" he had suggested before for the hospital. He was asked to obtain more information on the operation of such a program.

Brewer also informed the board of the Nov. 10 C.R.O.P. walk sponsored by 4-H and local churches and encouraged participation by hospital and care center personnel. Participants will walk for donations. Brewer said he is applying for one-fourth of the money to stay in Ozona in the food bank and Helping Hands.

Following a meeting in executive session, the board voted to place the director of nurses on salary rather than

hourly wage.

As the result of a request in the suggestion box, directors voted to have every employee punch a time clock whether on hourly wage or salary.

During the care center portion of the meeting, board members were told that four of the heating/air conditioning units in resident rooms had gone down and were being repaired. One new unit has been purchased and is on hand should a unit go completely out.

Board members decided to establish a renovation committee for the

care center. Mrs. Frank White will be chairperson. Other members are Mrs. Dick Kirby, Mrs. Don Long and board members Dr. Tim Brewer and Mrs. Concha Zapata.

The committee will provide needed coordination and direction toward upgrading of existing resident rooms and living areas in the care center.

The first meeting of the renovation committee will be in the care center Friday, Oct. 2, at 10 a.m.

Commissioners continue quest for fort funding

Tom Palmer, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department regional supervisor who oversees Fort Lancaster, and fort supervisor Ron Alton met with commissioners Monday night to discuss possibilities for keeping the fort open.

Fort Lancaster State Historic Site closes Nov. 30 if a plan for operation is not worked out between the state and Crockett County.

Ron Holliday, public lands director, and Carolyn Scheffer, director of park operations for the state, were to have attended the meeting. Since one was unable to come, Palmer said he was attending in their place.

Palmer had promised answers to several questions raised at a previous court meeting, and he gave some of those Monday night.

After a talk with Ms. Scheffer Monday, Palmer said he feels sure the residences will be left at the park. He

is consulting the TPWD legal department to see if equipment can be left.

Financial support from the state is "still an if", Palmer said. "I think there's some flexibility there. They're looking at grant money, but I can't give an answer tonight."

Palmer gave court members a letter from an Austin couple volunteering to operate the fort for a year with no salary after their retirement at the end of 1993.

Intern programs with college students were also discussed. Alton said colleges and universities he has contacted are interested in receiving information from Fort Lancaster when it becomes available.

TPWD is considering advertising for someone who might operate the fort on a concessionaire basis for fees taken in, Palmer said. The advertisement will go through his office and "will not be done unless you feel

comfortable with it," Palmer said.

Deeding the historic site back to the county would be a last resort if no agreement can be reached, Palmer said.

A public meeting to discuss the fort closure is scheduled for Wednesday afternoon in the Crockett Room. Andrew Sansom, executive director of the TPWD and Ignacio Garza, chairman of the TPW Commission, Rep. Harvey Hilderbran and John Hoffmann, aide to Rep. Bob Turner, will be present. They are to arrive at the airport between 1:45 and 2 p.m.

Ozona softball team places at World Tournament

The tournament featured 118 softball teams from across the country, mostly from the states of Texas, New Mexico, California, Arizona, Oregon and Washington. The team Texas Connection, which was put together and captained by Harvey Sanchez of Ozona, managed to successfully compete as indicated by their tie for 16th place in this tournament.

The team managed to win its first three games in order to move into the winner's bracket in the 3-day tournament. They fell short in the next two games to the San Diego, CA, Rags team and then to the El Paso Sharks bunch. The William Ed, OR, Amadores team went on to capture the first place trophy.

Ozona team members were excited about their high finish since most of the teams were from large cities. The high finish justified their hard work and dedication to the sport, and further served to indicate the quality of softball being played in West Texas.

Walsh story brings phone calls

The story of Patricia Candace Walsh, who has been missing since January of 1990, was aired on the television program "America's Most Wanted" Friday, Sept. 25.

Sheriff Jim Wilson said he had received several phone calls following the program, part of which was filmed in Crockett County. The Walsh family has also received several calls with information which is being checked out, Wilson said.

None of the tips have furnished any "concrete leads", however.

Sheriff Wilson said he thought the program was put together well and he hopes that some definite leads will develop from the show.

Court tables pipeline easement

Court members met with Texas Parks and Wildlife regional supervisor Tom Palmer and Fort Lancaster superintendent Monday night to discuss options for continued operation of the fort. (See related story, this issue)

The court voted to table action on an agenda item regarding placement of a gas transmission line down Johnson Draw by Lankford Oil Co. The area is mostly in Fred Deaton's precinct, and Deaton was not in attendance at the meeting.

Auditor Sandy Stokes asked the court to amend the 1993 budget by adding back in \$100,000 slated for landfill acquisition. Commissioners voted for the amended budget.

Hospital/care center board president Martha Gries presented information on a new call bell system and telephone system upgrade for the hospital. The board voted to pay out the purchase over 63 months at their last meeting. Commissioners in-

structed her to get a price for a cash purchase rather than a lease to own type purchase.

4-H members Katharine Durham and Whitney Vannoy invited court members to attend the awards banquet and Gold Star banquet next month. They gave a brief report on activities and benefits of the 4-H Club and listened to a proclamation read by Commissioner Sostenes DeHoyos declaring Oct. 4-10 National 4-H Week.

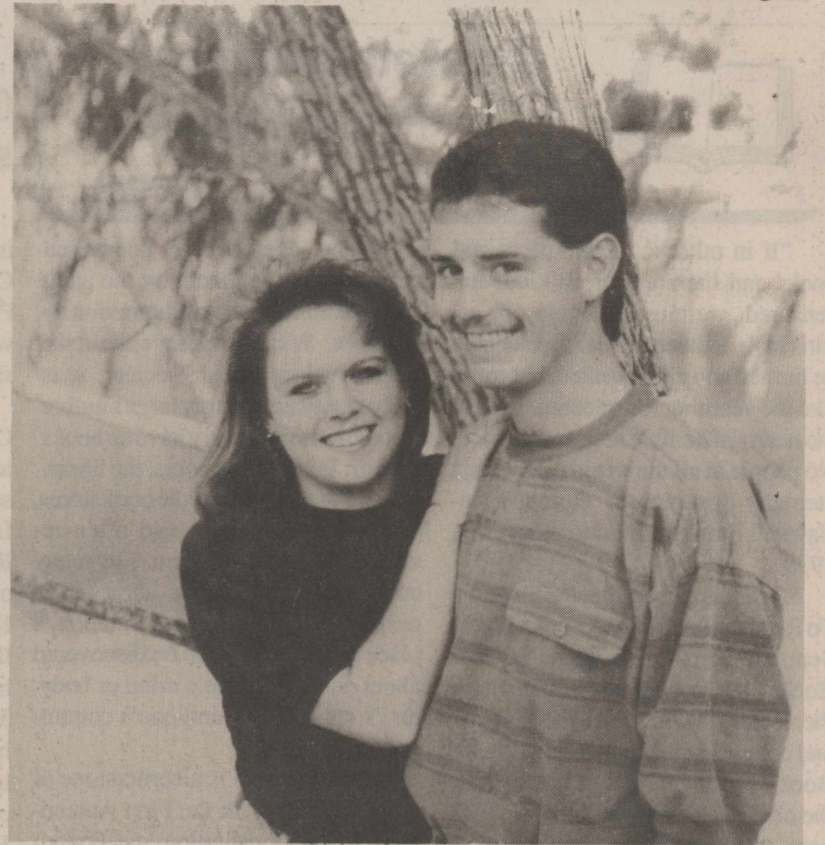

Crockett County Public Library News

"If in other lands the press and books and literature of all kinds are censored, we must redouble our efforts here to keep it free. Books may be burned and cities sacked, but truth, like the yearning for freedom, lives in the hearts of humble men and women. No people in all the world can be kept eternally ignorant or eternally enslaved." Franklin Delano Roosevelt, 1938.

CCPL is celebrating the Freedom To Read during Banned Books Week, Sept. 28-Oct. 2. The theme is Open Books For Open Minds. Although the theme for the libraries, bookstores, and college stores sponsoring Banned Books Week in 1992 seems to state the obvious to those in the book business, it provides an opportunity to address an underlying and disturbing trend in this country. Many Americans are all too aware that open books lead to open minds and would rather that both be kept closed.

A large and vocal group of Americans believes that it cannot trust its children to act either responsibly or within certain limits, after reading, viewing or hearing certain books, magazines, video, or rock recordings. Not able to trust its own children, this group sees a need to restrict knowledge and access to information to other people's children as well as, when possible, to other adults. This group would ban or severely restrict children's access and the availability of material to which they think children should not be exposed. Since court decisions have not accorded to minors the same First Amendment rights as adults, we are seeing movement towards a more restrictive society.

"Books and ideas are the most effective weapons against intolerance and ignorance." Lyndon Baines Johnson, 1964.

Because of the subjective nature of judgement, no consensus exists as to what is "harmful to minors." Challenged books are more likely to be those that espouse views different from those held by the parents, or which deal with issues parents feel are better postponed to adulthood. Religious fundamentalism is also a common issue. Objections based on socio-sexual references continue to abound and account for many challenges. The objection is most likely to revolve around an adult's perception that teens are too young to know about sex. In this day widespread HIV infections and the AIDS epidemic, this is deadly.

Books are the only mass communication medium still left to minors that is not subject to some degree of censorship, unlike, for example television, movies, radio, magazines, or newspapers. It is in books where

youth has historically uncovered knowledge denied them by the adult world, or discovered truths previously unknown. Whatever it says about the relative values in our society, it is likely that a surprisingly large number of homes in this country have no books in them. It is in the schools, the libraries, and in some cases, the bookstores, where these truths are so often revealed for the first time. In many communities, the public library is an oasis in a desert of misinformation, a place where things can be discovered about one's self, one's mind or body, one's community, and one's country and world.

"A free press is a cornerstone of our democracy. In the First Amendment to the Constitution, our Founding Fathers affirmed their belief that competing ideas are fundamental to freedom. We Americans cherish our freedom of expression and our access to multiple sources of news and information." Ronald Reagan, 1982.

The real solution to censorship is to have every citizen literate, and able and willing to read absolutely everything that he or she can get. Whether books have to do with sex or politics, race or religion, good or evil, no harm is inherent in the act of reading or in the words on a page.

Visit your Public Library and check out a Banned Book! You'll be surprised at what people do not want you to read!

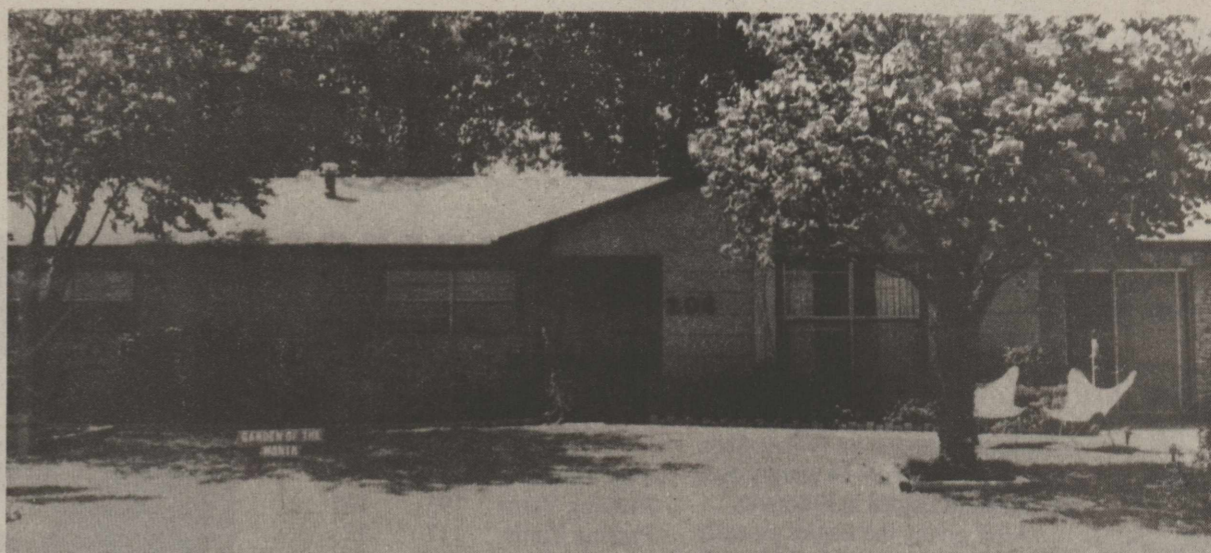

The Eagles weren't through, however; with the help of a pass interference call against the Lions, and two passing plays, Eldorado put together a drive that moved them into the end zone with 7:22 left in the final quarter. The PAT was good and the Eagles went ahead 14-13.

With the clock ticking, the Lions went to work. Starting on their 35 yard line, the Lions moved down the field. A pass play from Castro to Alex Borrego and runs by Michael Fay, Jason Yeager, and Castro to Alex Borrego set up the final scoring play by Ozona. Ozona's winning touchdown came with 3:28 left in the game as Chris Sanchez scored on a 40 yard pass play from Castro. Ozona's two point conversion attempt was unsuccessful and the Lions went ahead to stay 19-14.

"I was real proud of our kids," said head coach Don Payne. "They showed a lot of character and confidence throughout the game. Our offense moved the ball very well and our tackles were more consistent. Eddie DeLuna, Julio Martinez, and Alonzo Hernandez did an outstanding job on the line which made it possible for Michael Kenison and Joe Mendoza to make some good plays. We needed this victory to build our confidence. We sure hated to lose Chad Upham and Louis Longoria to injuries. Both of these fine young men were doing a great job for us when they went down. We wish them a speedy recovery."

Michael Fay led the Lion offense with 17 rushes for 96 yards. Justin Castro passed for 117 yards.

The Lions are 1-3 for the season and 1-0 in district action. Their next game will be against the district favorite Wall Hawks next Friday, Oct. 2, in Lion Stadium.

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Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press *67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

* These rates are in addition to the initial installation charges and monthly basic service rate. For residence customers, installation charges are \$2.70 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$5.40. For business customers, the charges are \$5.40 per feature, with a maximum charge of \$10.75.

** Anonymous Call Rejection is \$3 per month if purchased without Caller ID and is \$1 per month when purchased with Caller ID Name or Number.

This proceeding has been designated Docket No. 11362, and a hearing on the merits has been scheduled for November 16, 1992. The PUC has jurisdiction to consider this matter pursuant to Sections 16, 18, 37 and 38 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA). This application was filed pursuant to the provisions of the PUC's Substantive Rule 23.24. Among the issues that will be addressed in this proceeding is the legality of the Caller ID device and service under Texas wiretap laws.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. The deadline to intervene is October 26, 1992. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. Ozona Grill and Bar opens in Dallas

DALLAS—The Ozona Grill and Bar recently opened its doors on the busy Greenville Avenue strip, bringing a little bit of Crockett County to the people of Dallas.

The restaurant's creator, owner and operator is John Pate, a longtime friend of Cuatro and Sadie Davidson of Ozona. They met when both Mr. Davidson and Mr. Pate attended Southwestern University in Georgetown, and have continued the relationship for the past 20 years.

"Ozona was my introduction to West Texas," Mr. Pate recalls. "There were no TV or radio stations available (in 1971) and, being from Dallas, I was in total culture shock. But as I returned to visit over the years, Ozona became my escape from the pressures and hassles of the big city."

These days, Mr. Pate finds it difficult to get to Ozona as often as he would like, so the restaurant is his attempt to recreate the peaceful, friendly feelings that he associates with the town. Pate admits to the difficulty of the job.

"I want to give my customers the illusion of being shut off from the outside world," he said. The restaurant has a large, outdoor seating area that has become a Dallas landmark because of the large trees and peaceful setting that have somehow survived the growth of the surrounding urban area.

"You would never know you were sitting 150 feet from one of the busiest streets in Texas," Pate continued.

Pate also wants to create a social atmosphere like that of Ozona. "Everybody knows everybody. In fact, I've had at least 50 people who have come in and who are either from Ozona or have friends in Ozona. We've discovered that we have mutual friends, and that establishes a unique relationship between the restaurant and its customers that would not have been possible if I had called it 'John's Place'."

But Pate also chose the name to pay tribute to the town and the many good friends he has there. "Ozona is a great place to be. If the Ozona Grill and Bar brings recognition to the town in some way, that makes it even better. I've always worn my Ozona gimmie caps over the years to promote the town, and now I get to wear them to work as well."

A statement at the bottom of the restaurant's menu reads:

"Ozona, Texas, is located 90 miles south of San Angelo on I-10. The masthead of *The Ozona Stockman* reads: 'Out In The West Where The Air Is Pure, The Climate Agreeable, And The People Friendly—The Best Place On Earth To Call Home.' We hope you find the Ozona Grill and Bar an acceptable substitute for the real thing."

"Now I get to go to Ozona every day," Mr. Pate said.

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
